





# February "Valentine's Day" Blues Bash: For Lovers of the Blues

We have some special treats for you this month, to show our affection for our audience members, so we hope you'll join us for our February Blues Bash on Valentine's Day, February 14. Our bash is held every second Tuesday from 7-9 p.m. at Capps Club in Kenmore.

This month we wanted to feature some artists who could "bring the love." So we asked the talented husband-wife team of Heather Jones & Donny Jones to play an acoustic set of some of their smoking hot R&B-tinged soulful blues and classics for us. Well-known in Michigan, these two have made Washington their home in recent years, touring the state with their band, The Groovemasters, and hosting a popular weekly jam on Mondays at Dawson's Bar & Grill in Tacoma.

Described as deeply honest and soulful, without sounding forced and affected, an anonymous reviewer said, "Heather recalls the great classic soul singers of yesteryear as she carves out her own beautifully modern niche." We couldn't agree more.

Donny Jones does a fantastic job of backing Heather on guitar, and also adds vocals to their strong set of danceable hard-workin' blues covers and originals.

Adding heart to the night will be the newly formed super-group of popular Northwest heavy-hitters, MSD: Moxey/Sabol/Dosumov. The three were heard for the first time together this past December at Capps Club, performing as "The Merry Gentlemen" for our holiday celebration. These cats had the audience dancing and cheering through their entire set of rockin' Blues-Americana. They had so much fun and made such a memorable debut, they decided to expand the experience.

Frontman Robin Moxey, a Los Angeles native, signed with Geffen Records at the tender age of 21. A soulful singer and kinetic guitarist who blends raw energy and polished finesse, his skills have earned him accolades and a Bogner Amplification endorsement. Robin also continues to act as a producer, mixer and songwriter with the worldwide movement Playing For Change and has since its inception, most recently working on *PFC 3* featuring Keith Richards, Los Lobos and Keb'Mo.

Richard Sabol has also worked as a professional musician most of his life, after meeting Buddy Rich when he was a child in Rhode Island. From his early days in high-profile blues-rock groups and "hair bands" to his current status as one of the hardest-working in-demand drummers of the Northwest Blues scene, Sabol gives his all. He has shared the stage with The James Gang, Deep Purple and Quiet Riot, earned a Best Blues Drummer Award from the Washington Blues Society and been featured on the cover of the Bluesletter. His wild-eyed style coupled with his precision and love for the craft, make him incredibly watchable and add to his legendary status.

Rounding out the rhythm section, Bassist Farko Dosumov is an award-winning, internationally respected and versatile bass guitar virtuoso.

Farko and Richard played together in the Randy Oxford Band, when they were honored as one of the top five blues bands in the world at the International Blues Challenge in Memphis. *Earshot Jazz* magazine featured Dosumov on the cover and called him, "a musician of lofty technical skills balanced by earthy blues roots, with a growling, well-defined tone and a relentlessly smoking groove and locked-in time feel."

Together, Moxey, Sabol and Dosumov play with a lot of passion, unparalleled talent and raw, unbridled energy: a perfect match for the blues lover on Valentine's Day.

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# **Street Team Report: North Sound**

I am pleased to usher in a new Bluesletter feature from the perspective of a street team volunteer. The Washington Blues Society has a team of local volunteers who deliver Bluesletters across Washington State (and in British Columbia) and this is the first article in a series that is designed to inform Bluesletter readers about the blues society's regional presence.

I first became involved with the Washington Blues Society as a Street Team member for former president Rhea Rolfe as I took over the Ballard area from the Blues Boss and expanded Bluesletter deliveries from eight locations to 30. During that time, I reduced that territory to 15 stops when I moved further north. Around that time, I volunteered in the merchandise booth and then stepped up to take the vacant position of Merchandise Director for three and a half years. I was elected Vice President in 2009 and that was an important year for the Washington Blues Society. That year, The Blues Foundation honored the Washington Blues Society with a prestigious Keeping the Blues Alive Award. After serving as Vice President, I served in the appointed position of Advertising Director. In addition to either elected or appointed positions I have held with the Washington Blues Society, I have also written for the Bluesletter and the blues society membership has honored me with nominations and BB Awards in the blues writer category.

# Why do I do this?

Well, in a nutshell, it's because I love the blues. As for serving as a Street Team member, I felt it was an easy way I could contribute. At the time I first distributed Bluesletters in Ballard, I was not a regularly published writer. The fact that I have been published with a degree of regularity in the Bluesletter gives me extra incentive to work on the best blues publication in the world produced by an all-volunteer affilate with The Blues Foundation. I am hopeful that my fellow Street Team volunteers are also working to get this publication into more readers' hands across our region.


Currently, I deliver Bluesletters not only to three important locations, but also other places that include the doctor's office, an auto repair shop, my favorite local pub, and other places. My three mainstays are the BB Award-winning Engle's Pub in Edmonds and Big E Ales and Silver Platters in Lynnwood. The blues society's relationship with Silver Platters dates back to the time when this great music resource was located near the Northgate Mall.

Engel's Pub has supported the blues for many years with free live blues shows on Wednesdays, Fridays and Saturdays that frequently features top local blues talent. On Tuesday, Lou Echeverri hosts a popular jam session, and while the jam session's not exclusively blues, it's still a very good time. Engel's Pub has a friendly, small-town vibe and an excellent craft ale selection plus hard pops for patrons looking for 80 proof cocktails. Established in 1934, Engel's Pub is one of the oldest continuously operated bars in the state. When the music starts up so do the dancers. To list the bands I have seen at Engel's Pub, it would fill a Bluesletter and include most of the region's top blues artists.

Big E Ales is just off 50th Avenue West near 208th in Lynnwood. Established in 1997 by Brew Master Rick Ellersick, the brewery has grown and along with the brew pub and Big E Ales are available at 150+ select pubs and small bottle shops. Rick's four sons and their families are involved in both the brewery and the front of the house. The familyfriendly room expands for special sporting events and a summer beer garden. They offer up tasty pub fare (the garlic fries rock!) and have a special Wings Wednesday serving 10 wings tossed in your choice of five yummy house made sauces. Big E Ales brew about a dozen varieties of beer, ranging from a smooth Golden Ale to a dark, rich Scotch Ale. plus seasonals and a pair of IPAs: the 12th 1/2 man and 2 Pint. In addition to brewpub-tapped pints, Big E Ales fills growlers and sells Tall Boy 4 packs, party pigs and kegs to-go.

Silver Platters is tucked behind the Lynnwood Convention Center and is a local independent retailer selling music, movies and more with a vast CD selection that includes a sizable blues section which does feature many local artists. Silver Platters has been in business for over 30 years selling new and used CDs, DVDs and vinyl. Silver Platters also has locations in Bellevue and in Seattle's SODO area. The staff is helpful and will gladly help you with special orders from items not in stock. Silver Platters also offers Washington Blues Society members a 10% off discount.

Edmonds and Lynnwood have long been bedroom communities north of Seattle. Located 11 miles north of Seattle, Edmonds is the gateway to the Olympic Peninsula through the Washington State Ferries from Edmonds to Kingston. Founded in 1890, Edmonds is the oldest incorporated city in Snohomish County. As in many communities across Washington state, logging and the railroad have shaped Edmonds' history. The Edmonds History Museum is located in the former Carnegie Library, and downtown Edmonds is well-known for its art galleries, a fabulous bakery, and a number of exceptional parks (including an undersea park for SCUBA divers), a classic movie theatre, the Driftwood Players plus the annual Bite of Edmonds, a car show, a farmers ' market and other attractions. Famous Edmonds residents include Ken Jennings (Jeopardy) Rick Steves (World traveler and tour guide extraordinaire), Rosalynn Summers (Olympic medalist figure skater), and

Billy Stapleton (an exceptional guitarist and member of Little Bill & The Blue Notes).

Lynnwood is located a little farther north than Edmonds and was once a source of timber. Fiveacre stump farms were sold off and replaced with housing developments when State Route 99 was the primary highway in our state. While Lynnwood may be better known as a home for strip malls, it is the home of Alderwood Mall, which opened in 1979. Ten years earlier, the community adapted to the newly-expanded Interstate 5, and today, both Highway 99 and Interstate 5 boast thriving commercial sectors that include retail shops, car dealerships, housing opportunities and entertainment options. Lynnwood has one of the few remaining bowling and skating facilities in the state and a 22-acre wetlands park.

In doing research for this article, I learned that nobody really knows with certainty how Edmonds got its name. There are a couple of theories that point to either a senator from Vermont named Edmunds or nearby Point Edwards (which was originally named Point Edmunds). Lynwood, however, was named by a Seattle developer who built a building at the intersection of Highway 99 and Alderwood Road (now 196<sup>th</sup> Street SW). He named the building "Lynn" for his wife and "wood" for Alderwood.

I hope that this initial article from a member of the Washington Blues Society Street Team was informative and I look forward to upcoming contributions from my fellow Street Team members. I understand that Rocky Nelson first volunteered for this opportunity from his home in Salkum, Washington, and I look forward to Rocky's observations on how and where he distributes his cache of Bluesletters.

# Washington Blues Society New Membership Opportunities!

At a Board meeting earlier this year, the Board of Directors of the Washington Blues Society decided to offer two new membership levels: one for corporate and business members and one for blues acts (Duos and Bands). Contributions may be taxdeductible; please check with your tax preparer to see which new opportunity is right for you.

Each corporate, business or band membership includes a blues society membership card (with discounts!), a subscription to the Bluesletter, and nominating and voting privileges for the annual Best of the Blues ("BB Awards") awards celebration.

**Corporate and Business Memberships**: these opportunities have been designed to attract for-profit businesses to support the mission of the Washington Blues Society. Modeled after similar membership opportunities available from The Blues Foundation or the Cascade Blues Association, this is the Washington Blues Society's inaugural attempt at providing a range of benefits to Gold, Silver and Bronze business members.

Corporate and Business Membership Levels 14

# Gold

One monthly color business card-sized ad, a passthrough link to the Washington Blues Society website, and four voting memberships. Dues donation: \$1,000.

# Silver

One bimonthly color business card-sized ad – that's six placements per year, plus four voting memberships. Dues donation: \$600.

# Bronze

One quarterly business card-sized ad – that's four placements annually, plus four voting memberships. Dues donation: \$400.

# **Band Membership**

The following example is for a four-piece blues band: \$25 annual dues for the fi st member; each additional member, \$20 (for a total of \$85 – that's a \$15 savings off the standard membership rate!). When personnel members change, replacement members will pay \$20 and each original member will continue to enjoy their membership for the duration of their membership.

# Duo Membership

This month, I wanted to bring back my periodic "Blues on the Road" column to not only fill space but also inform readers about live shows that caught my attention on sites like Pollstar.com or ExperienceHendrix.com shortly before our deadline.

While I've tried to narrow my suggestions to live blues shows from nationally-touring blues artists, regular readers of this column know that I often include other genres of music that I appreciate as well. As always, please check with the venue or artist webpage to verify start time, date and ticket prices.

The Kirkland Performing Arts Center - the home of the Washington Blues Society annual Best of the Blues ("BB Awards") welcomes the California Guitar Trio and Montreal Guitar trio to the Pacific Northwest on the 11<sup>th</sup>.

Tower of Power returns to Jazz Alley from the 7<sup>th</sup> to the 11<sup>th</sup> and, if you've not seen this exceptionally-

talented line-up from Oakland, California, I highly recommend TOP for its diverse set lists, staying power - with roots in the Bay Area music scene since 1968 - and an exceptionally talented lead singer, Memphis native Marcus Scott.

Eric Burdon and the Animals return to the Pacific Northwest for shows at the Admiral Theatre in Bremerton on the 17<sup>th</sup> and the Broadway Center for the Performing Arts on the 18<sup>th</sup>. The band then sails on the Flower Power Cruise with 60s performers Chad and Jeremy, Rare Earth, Micky Dolenz, Spencer Davis and many other performers who were popular when top 40 radio was king in the hands of Pat O'Day when he held the afternoon drive-time disc jockey slot at Seattle's trailblazing KJR Radio.

Experience Hendrix 2017, presented by Fender, returns to Seattle's Paramount Theatre on the 19<sup>th</sup> with Jimi Hendrix' bassist Billy Cox and guitarists Buddy Guy, Zakk Wylde, Jonny Lang, Kenny Wayne Shepard and a host of other players that will honor Jimi Hendix' musical legacy. Special guests include Keb' Mo,' Beth Hart, Ana Popovic, The Slide Brothers and Los Lobos' David Hidalgo and Oscar Rosas.

Kevin Selfe will play his last Pacific Northwest club gig prior to relocating back to the East Coast at Seattle's Highway 99 Blues Club. Joining Kevin on the 25<sup>th</sup> will be the Portland All-Star Blues Band, featuring Jmi Bott, Chris Mercer, Allen Markel, Joe McCarthy, Brad Ulrich, and Steve Kerin. From the 22<sup>nd</sup> to the 25<sup>th</sup>, Los Lobos will play four shows at the Triple Door in Seattle, and from the 23<sup>rd</sup> through the 26<sup>th</sup>, the Hyatt Regency Bellevue will host WinterGrass 2017. This year's WinterGrass line-up includes 2016 International Blues Challenge solo/duo winners Ben Hunter and Joe Seamons and award-winning acoustic guitarist Orville Johnson.

The Kent-Meridian Performing Arts Center will feature International Guitar Night on the 25<sup>th</sup> with Brian Gore, Luca Stricagnoli, Chrystian Dozza and Debashish Bhattacharya.

Tommy Castro and The Painkillers return to the Pacific Northwest and I hope their set list includes several new songs from 2015's Alligator Records CD, Method to My Madness. On the 24<sup>th</sup>, the band plays the Alberta Rose Theatre in Portland followed by dates at Tacoma's Temple Theatre on the 25<sup>th</sup>, Seattle's Triple Door on the 27<sup>th</sup>, Conway's Renaissance Room on the 28<sup>th</sup> and back down to Oregon shows at The Belfry in Sisters on March 1<sup>st</sup>, Jaqua Concert Hall in Eugene on March 2<sup>nd</sup> and The Rogue Theatre in Grants Pass on March 3<sup>rd</sup>.

Kathy and the Kilowatts Let's Do This Thing (Lectro Fine records)

Award winning singer songwriter Kathy Murray was raised in Chicago and Austin, the influence of these two iconic music cities is felt in her songwriting and vocal stylings. Her tough, right to the point lyrics reflect the gritty streets of Chi Town and a laid back, smoky alto delivered with a whisper of drawl, is pure Texas charm. She burst on the Austin music scene three decades ago with her band Kathy and the Kilowatts, wowing audiences with a tremendous live show, and sharing the stage with everyone from Albert Collins to Koko Taylor. Kathy's third full length album Let's Do This Thing, released in February of 2017 features 15 news songs written by Murray, who won the Australian Blues Association "Song of the Year" Chain Award for her song, "Call Me Mrs. Blues." The sizzling tracks of Roots, Blues and Classic R&B were recorded in Austin Texas and produced by her longtime musical compadre and husband guitarist Bill "Monster" Jones. The duo is joined by many amazing musicians and dear friends from the Lone Star State including: Al Gomez and Henry Rivas of The Westside Horns; who light up the sultry ballad "Beautiful Moments," and the jump boogie "Each Kiss." Dylan Cavaliere and his triple slap upright bass groove brings the rockabilly romp "Loveaholic," to life, while drummers Richard Ross and Nina Singh round out the rhythm section. Kathy cowrote serval tunes with her multi-talented brother David Murray who also added guitar, bass, percussion, and vocals. Ben Buck on beat box vocal adds a new twist to the boogaloo "Spell It Out." Kathy explains that "These songs are all at least partly autobiographical," which makes the collection easily accessible and genuine; which is certainly the goal of many a songwriter. Rick J Bowen

The Paul DesLauriers Band *Relentless* (Big Toe Productions)

The Paul DesLauriers Band (PDB) finished in second place at the Blues Foundation's 2016 International Blues Challenge representing the Montreal Blues Society. Relentless is the followup to their 2014 awar- winning eponymous debut. This power trio has garnered many Maple Blues Awards and the PDB has five nominations for the 2017 awards, each with individual honors plus Electric Act and Entertainer of the Year. The 10 tracks on Relentless are all originals with the band working out the music and arrangements and DesLauriers (pronounced "de-loree-yay") writing the lyrics with longtime collaborator Alec McElcheran. Along with Paul on guitar, vocals piano and theremin are Greg Morency on fourand eight-string string bass and Sam Harrisson

on drums and percussion. The opening track on Relentless is a full throttle blues rocker titled "Stewtro Rock (Just Got Back.)" followed by "I'm Your Man" which is included on the The Blues Foundation Presents: International Blues Challenge #32 2016 CD. On "Ten Fleet Tall" the power cords and thundering rhythm drive the song and "Still Under My Skin" has a little bit of that Texas trio in it. A couple of my favorite tracks are "Up in the Air" with Paul on slide guitar and "We Just Might" which has a Bobby Patterson feel to it. My favorite cut, "If I Still Had You" is a slow, burning tune that features a searing solo from Paul. If solid, take-no-prisoners high energy blues rock is what you enjoy, then Relentless is just the ticket. Crank this bad boy up! Recommended. Malcolm Kennedy

Patty Reese Let In the Sun (Azalea City)

With a superb balance of steamy and sultry, power and passion, in her vocals and the ability to cover a wide range of dynamics and genre's, from rockin' blues to power soul and smooth ballads, Patty Reese delivers the full package on her new album Let In The Sun. Her fifth album, released January of 2017 on the cooperative label Azalea City Recordings, features nine new original tunes and two inspired covers that demonstrate Reese's skills as a music stylist par none. Opening with the swampy blues "Is It Too Late For Me," featuring wicked slide guitar from Jonathan Sloane, followed by the greasy Texas shuffle "Your Love," then the supersonic horn funk "Soul Satisfier," a track that could have been from the Lydia Pence and Cold Blood catalog. And just when you are ready to put Reese into the blues shouter category she gets soft an intimate during the smooth swinging torch song "I Won't Let You Down." The title track is glorious bit of gospel infused joy and optimism, recorded "Live" at Airshow Mastering in Takoma Park, MD, this track feature's the Patty Reese Band's ability to gel and jam without any overdub's. The feel-good vibe of "Radio Song," has 70's Bonnie Raitt sound that celebrates the power of music. Reese and company bust out a dish Cajun flavored second line on the house party track "Awesome Sauce," and get little country for the hill stomp "I Hear A Lie." Bob Dylan classic "Don't Think Twice It's Alright," is given a soulful reading with Reese breathing tender mercy into the vaunted lvric. Reese closes the album on acoustic guitar with the lovers' lament "Goodbye," an elusive gem written by Steve Earle that she makes her own. Let In The Sun is certain to shine a light on Patty Reese and her many talents. Rick J Bowen

Various Artists *The Blues Foundation Presents: International Blues Challenge #32 2016* (Blues Foundation/Frank Roszak Promotions)

As Washington Blues Society members and readers of the Bluesletter know, our representative to the Blues Foundations 32<sup>nd</sup> International Blues Challenge, Ben Hunter & Joe Seamons, won the Solo/Duo competition and their version of the traditional "Black Sheep Moan" is featured as the final selection. On last year's The North Wind and Sun CD, this song was titled "Kansas City Moan." Ben and Joe took a pair of songs, "Black Sheep Blues" and "Moaning the Blues," by the somewhat obscure artist Pigmeat Terry and spliced them into one. To do justice to each performer and song on this CD would easily fill a page, and I will cover three here. The Blues Foundation Presents: International Blues Challenge #32 2016 opens briskly with the 2<sup>nd</sup> place finalist in the band competition, The Paul DesLauriers Band representing the Montreal Blues Society doing "I'm Your Man" from their new release Relentless clearly displaying their strong talent. This is followed by InnerVision, representing the Columbus Blues Alliance and Solo/Dou 2nd place finalist performing "Hound Dog." This is an original song and not the Big Mama Thornton classic. Both blind at birth, Genene Blackwell plays keys and Sam Shepherd sings, plays guitar and harp. Sam was also the recipient of the Lee Oskar Best Harp Award. These nine selections are an excellent introduction to this skilled collection of artists and reflects the diversity of blues music performed by the 250+ performers who participated at last year's International Blues Challenge. The Blues Foundation Presents: International Blues Challenge #32 2016 will not be available in stores; however, it will be available at the 33rd IBC in Memphis and on-line from the Blues Foundation at www.blues.org. David M' Ore Passion, Soul & Fire (Self-Released)

The title of his third album Passion, Soul & Fire, from San Francisco's David M'ore describes the man and his music perfectly. Born in Argentina, he picked up an old guitar that his godfather bought him for his eighth birthday and immediately began to explore vintage records. His family wanted him to play classical and flamenco music, but M'ore loved the music of Jimi Hendrix and Deep Purple. He attended a conservatory of music where he would sneak behind the piano and play ACDC. David M'ore performs on a custom-made Stratocaster carefully modified to his specifications, demonstrating his acclaimed six string technique on eleven new original tracks

and one inspired cover of Deep Purple classic" Mistreated," that was recorded spontaneously live in the studio in one take. The album opens with straight ahead Texas blues, "The Devil's Land," featuring his gritty, gruff vocals that sound like they should come from an old blues man from the deep south. The instrumental tribute to the power of electric guitar "Johan Sebastian Blues," is a shred fest treat, and the extended 10-minute slow blues "You Said You Loved Me" is reminiscent of Gary Moore, in both its sheer power and intensity. M'ore blends acoustic and atomic on the voodoo groove "Sweet Little Baby" and the slinky shuffle, "The 12 Song," is playfully injected with classic guitar riffs. Fans of big guitar playing, who enjoy hard rock that strays towards the blues rather than heavy metal, will dig deep into this album and immediately share the Passion, Soul & Fire of the explosive guitar attack of David M'ore, a man and his muse. Lisa Biales The Beat of my Heart (Big Song Music)

My introduction to the voice and music of Lisa Biales was her 6th release, 2012's Just Like Honey and I was very impressed. Every once in a while, I you stumble across something incredible and Lisa Biales' (sounds like "be Alice") voice is just that. The Beat of my Heart is Lisa's ninth release and features a dozen varied selections including a song, "Crying Over You" written and recorded and released on 78 by her mother Alberta Roberts back in 1947. Lisa is backed by some serious "A" list talent with Producer, Director and Arranger Tony Braunagel also playing drums, recording and mixing engineer Johnny Lee Schell sharing guitar duties with Paul Brown, Larry Taylor on bass, Jim Pugh on keys plus a stellar horn section and more. The dozen tracks are all well selected covers with a wide variety of styles from old timey to funk. Biales opens with a true to form version of Mabel Scott's "Disgusted" and another standout is Fats Waller's "Messin' around with the Blues." The tour-de-force is "Crying Over You" with the first verse from Lisa's mother's original and then Lisa's absolutely magnificent voice soars. Biales is backed by Brown on a 1957 Gibson L5, Chuck Berghofer on an 1813 upright bass, Pugh playing a Steinway and Lee Thornburg taking a trumpet solo. "Wild Side of Life" was written by Henry Glover and recorded by Lula Reed in the early 1950s. Very highly recommended. Malcolm Kennedv

Knickerbocker All-Stars *Texas Rhody Blues* (JP Cadillac Records)

*Texas Rhody Blues* is the third release and as with the second offering there are a mix of new and returning contributors. With players from both Texas and Rhode Island performing a collection of Texas blues, for a project sponsored by the Knickerbocker Music Center (KMC) a non-

profit music school in Westerly, RI. With Sugaray Rayford, Duke Robillard, Brian Templeton and Willie J. Laws on vocals; Duke, Monster Mike Welch and Jimmie Vaughan on guitars; Al Copley, Bruce Bears and Matt McCabe on the piano and a seasoned crew mostly of current and past Roomful of Blues horn players plus Brad Hallen on bass and Mark Teixeira on drums this is definitely an All-Star bunch. The song selections are off the beaten path; but include tunes by Lowell Fulson, Jimmy McCracklin and Clarence "Gatemouth" Brown. The Knick's open up with Smokin' Joe Kubek and Ron Levy's "Texas Cadillac" the title track from the late Kubek's 1993 release. They show they came to lay down the business. With Monster Mike on guitar and Sugaray on vocals. Law's takes the vocals on McCracklin's "You've Got Me Licked." Robillard and Vaughan trade guitar licks while Duke sings on a trio of songs including the swinging "I Have News For You." Probably the coolest thing is track 12 with a minute of T-Bone Walker talking about his early days, followed by Templeton singing Walker's "Tell Me What's the Reason" Very highly recommended. Cee Cee James Stripped Down & Surrendered (FWG Records)

Four years in waiting Stripped Down & Surrendered is the follow up to James' highly acclaimed Blood Red Blues, brings out a new side of Cee Cee. Well known for her powerful and raw vocal delivery and heartfelt songwriting Stripped Down & Surrendered shows us a new side of this talented performer. The dozen originals were cowritten by Cee Cee and her husband Rob "Slide Boy" Andrews who also plays the guitars and bass. James opens with the aptly named title track setting the tone of the album with Cee Cee singing "my eyes are clear, my ears can hear, my hands done let go, my soul is free, I can taste my truth, I done ate my sins/I know nuthin' about tomorrow or where I'm truly goin,' but; I ain't goin' back to where I been/I just gotta keep on singin,' 'cause love has done stripped down and surrendered me." There are so many excellent cuts there just isn't space to cover them all; but standouts include "Hidden and Buried" with Rob on slinky acoustic slide and Terry Nelson on keys, "Love Done Left Home" featuring Kevin Sutton Andrews on lead guitar and Cee Cee displaying some of her vocal range and tone. One of my favorite cuts is the slow blues of "Thank You for Never Loving Me" with Jeffery Morgan on keys and Cee Cee leaving her soul bare for all to hear and see. I give Stripped Down & Surrendered my very highest recommendation. Malcolm Kennedy

# Sheri Roberts Greimes Bleeding Heart (Self-Released)

When I looked at the listing of serious "A" list talent supporting Sheri Roberts Greimes on her new five song EP Bleeding Heart I was definitely intrigued to hear it. Sheri went through a life threatening medical situation which has left her on oxygen all the time. It has taken Sheri three years to regain her strength to sing again and we're lucky she has made a choice to live her passion. Each of the five songs are well-written, original blues ballads. Bleeding Heart opens with the title cut which is a slow paced ballad that could have come from Janis Joplin. This is followed by "Po Girl Blues" a medium paced blues with a bit of swing and Sheri singing, "well when it's quitting time, the only thing on my mind is to party my blues away/I need to think a plan to find me a good man to love me and take me away/but until then I'll keep on working for the weekend and I'll just keep singing the poor girl blues" followed by short solos by Kevin Sutton on guitar and Mike Marinig on sax. My favorite track is "Gunna Be Alright" which was clearly inspired by "I'd Rather Go Blind" and it has the power and soul of that blues classic and Marinig's sax solo nails it. The lap steel guitar by Mark Lagen gives "Month of Mondays" an old school country feel and "Slip Away" is more of a singer/songwriter piano piece with a nice touch of country. # Fiona Boyes *Professin' the Blues* (Reference Recordings)

Professin' the Blues is the follow up to Boyes' highly-acclaimed 2015 release Box & Dice on Fresh! from Reference Recordings. As with that album, the informative 20-page liner notes include a short commentary from Fiona as well as guitar used on each song, photos of the instruments, technical tuning information and a page each on drummer Jimi Bott, bass player Denny Croy and engineer Keith O Johnson. The pair of covers are Big Joe Williams' classic "Baby Please Don't Go" with some wicked slide work and gritty vocals and an impromptu version while the tapes were still rolling of fellow Aussie musician Chris Wilson's "Face in the Mirror." The songs are traditional blues in style with contemporary twists. Fiona opens with "Can't Stay Here No More" played on a National Reso-Phonic Style "O" with minimal percussion backing. On the upbeat number, "Lay Down with Dogs," Fiona sings "but honey I got your number, baby and you can't fool me/you lay down with the dogs you're gonna get up with fleas." On "One Rule for You" Boyes is backed by bass and drums as she sings about the double standard of power. "Kiss Me Darling" has an island feel and the instrumental "Catfish Fiesta" appropriately has a hybrid New Orleans/Latin feel. Very highly recommended. Malcolm Kennedy

# The Blues: Why It Still Hurts So Good

(Yakkabiz Publishing, Huntington Beach, CA)

I was pleasantly surprised by Marie Trout's *The Blues: Why It Still Hurts So Good.* In this new book published by Huntington Beach, Californiabased Yakkabiz Publishing, she applies traditional qualitative research methods to what may be one of the most personal and subjective aspects of blues music.

As a long-time fan of blues music, I instinctively "get" that "Sweet Home Chicago," "The Thrill is Gone," and "Dust My Broom" move me. When Eric Clapton and Robbie Robertson were trading leads on "Further On Up the Road" in Martin Scorsese's The Last Waltz, I knew that Bobby "Blue" Bland's classic blues song transcended geographic, racial and emotional boundaries when I first saw that documentary film in the 1970s. This book does an exceptional job of exploring deep and personal connections between blues music and its fans.

Marie tells a compelling story on how blues music has grown to reach a largely white, middle class baby boomer audience. She elegantly presents information in four distinct sections of the book:

Part 1 - Today's blues fans,

Part 2 - Historical insights regarding the special connection between blues music and its audience,

Part 3 - Rituals in blues music, and

Part 4 - The healing power of the blues.

I thoroughly enjoyed The Blues: Why It Still Hurts So Good as it reminded me of a similar book on Chicago blues written by Dr. David Grazian, Blue Chicago: The Search of Authenticity in Urban Blues Clubs published by the University of Chicago Press in 2003. Like Dr. Grazian's work, Marie adapted her doctoral dissertation for a more public audience. While I wished she would have included an index and full transcripts of her interviews with Bruce Iglauer, Joe Louis Walker, Fantastic Negrito and John Mayall, Marie thoroughly explores how blues music reaches into listeners' hearts and minds. I hope that she will consider releasing these interviews on her website, in blues music magazines or another book. I especially appreciated how Marie relates her subject matter through the voices of blues musicians, blues fans and industry professionals alike.

In addition to interviews with blues pioneers and new blues artists, Marie's work synthesizes the results of more than 1,000 respondents to an online questionnaire that included 62 questions.

# **Blues Book Review**

Personally, I can't imagine the work that goes into coding that much data, but I hope that she had a computer program to help analyze her responses. When I was in graduate school in the 1980s, I marveled at my fellow Seattle University classmates who took on similar academic research challenges with an IBM XT 286 personal computer running Lotus on Windows 3.0.

I especially liked the way she deftly weaved her own personal experience as an artist manager, wife and mother throughout the book. For over 25 years, she's managed husband Walter Trout's musical career, stood by his side in good times and bad and helped raise three sons in the process. During some pretty dark days that led up to Walter's successful liver transplant, Marie used her studies in graduate school as a prosocial escape from what I've read was a true "near death" experience for her husband.

*The Blues: Why It Still Hurts So Good* is an important contribution to the literature of the blues. While some readers may be put off by the more academic passages in the book, I strongly recommend that they work through them to get to the next chapter.


All proceeds from sales of *The Blues: Why It Still Hurts So Good* will be donated to the Handy Artists Relief Trust (HART Fund) of the Blues Foundation. The HART Fund assists blues musicians and their families in financial need and provides acute, chronic and preventive medical and dental care as well as funeral and burial expenses.

The book is scheduled for publication on February 3, 2017 during International Blues Challenge week in Memphis where Marie will participate in a panel moderated by blues scholar and author Don Wilcock. Prior to this panel in Memphis, Marie will host a special pre-release party onboard the Legendary Rhythm and Blues Cruise in late January.

The book concludes with an exhaustive 26-page bibliography that contains links to many of Dr. Trout's source materials and an evocative cover photo of Walter Trout by Keeping the Blues Alive Award photographer Aigars Lapsa.

Editor's Note: Walter Trout and his band return to Washington next month for shows at the Highway 99 Blues Club in Seattle on the 17th and the San Juan Community Theatre in Friday Harbor on the 18th.

# **An Exceptional Holiday Evening!**

On December 17, 2016, I had the good fortune to experience Uncle Wiggly's Hot Shoes Band's blues Christmas show at the Blue Frog recording studios in White Rock, British Columbia. Regular Bluesletter readers know that I enjoy events that include the White Rock Blues Society and the Fraser Blues Society in British Columbia. These communities in British Columbia's Lower Mainland are less than two-and-a-half hours from my back porch and each time I make that drive to a blues event, I learn something new and discover some great blues talent.

Led by Hank Lionhart, this exceptional show was performed over the holidays in Alberta and British Columbia at nine venues. The set list featured 20+ holiday-themed songs from the likes of Etta James, Blind Blake, Charles Brown and the band's 2015 CD recorded at Blue Frog Studios, Christmas in Jail. That title tune was one of the many highlights of the evening as was Booker T's "Christmastime in the City" and a soulful interpretation of "Merry Christmas, Baby." I had heard that Victoria Blues Society blueswoman Deb Rhymer frequently appears with Uncle Wiggly and she joined the show on other dates this year.

Uncle Wiggly's Hot Shoes Band represented the White Rock Blues Society at the International Blues Challenge in Memphis and they've been a top draw in British Columbia for decades. In their youth, the band opened for Muddy Waters, Koko Taylor, Paul Butterfield and many other blues legends.

Originals that I particularly appreciated were "Little Red Christmas Dress" and "My Christmas Angel." Lionhart shared vocals with guitarist Mark "West Coast" Comerford on a number of songs. As Blue Hart, Hank and Mark will return to Memphis to compete in the 2017 International Blues Challenge representing the Fraser Valley Blues Society in Abbotsford in British Columbia.

Joining Hank and Mark at Blue Frog were Andy Graffiti on drums, "Lightnin" Lonnie Glass on bass, Wynn Gogol on keyboards, Dave "The Duck" Rowse and Wayne Kozak on saxophone, and newcomer Bryn Badel on trumpet. Wynn's original song, "Wishbone," offered an opportunity to showcase not only his songwriting skills but also his ability to use a number of different piano playing styles in a single song. His playing reminded me of Clay Swafford who uses boogiewoogie and falsifying, when a piano player anchors a song with his left hand and explores the high notes with his right. Like Hank and Mark, drummer Andy Graffiti will perform in Memphis as a part of Harp Dog Brown's band that will represent the White Rock Blues Society at the 2017 International Blues Challenge.

As the show progressed, I marveled at how Blue Frog Studios engineers, volunteers and management turned a working recording studio into an intimate concert venue for about 150 people. In the lobby, a small bar offered Canadian beer and wine and a small alcove to reconnect with friends or make new ones. The wall featured a clef note with signatures of musicians who have recorded there and it was easy to spot Toronto bluesman J-W Jones and British Columbia's Kenny "Blues Boss" Wayne. This wall reminded me of the "Wall of Fame" that adorns stage left at the award-winning Highway 99 Blues Club in downtown Seattle.

Across from the seating area in the lobby was a wall of framed, autographed CDs of musicians who have recorded at Blue Frog and I was pleasantly surprised to see Monkey Junk's CD on the wall.

This month, Blue Frog brings a touch of Las Vegas to White Rock by hosting a tribute to the music of Frankie Valli and the Four Seasons over six shows from the 1st to the 10th followed by a Valentine's Day show on the 11th featuring Big City Soul. On the 17th, Jens Lindeman brings a show featuring the art of the trumpet, Brassfire, to the studio and on the 18th, Vancouver's Reid Jameson brings his tribute to Leonard Cohen to Blue Frog Studios.

As I wrote in my Letter from the Editor in the January Bluesletter, I hope that events like Uncle Wiggly's annual Christmas show attract more blues fans from South of the USA-Canadian border. British Columbia's Lower Mainland has a diverse and vibrant blues community that offers a number of creative opportunities to experience live blues music.









