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Letter from Washington Blues Society President Tony Frederickson

Hi Blues Fans and Musicians!

The first part of my letter is directed at musicians, club owners, bookers, and others involved in the promotion of events, gigs, shows, etc. We are doing some major upgrades to our website and this is going to lead to some changes in how we do the calendar. As of Aug 1st we will be building our print calendar exclusively through our website. So, for the September issue of the Bluesletter the calendar in that issue will be whatever has been received on our online calendar. There will be no more e-mail submission process to our Calendar Editor as of August 1st.

We know change is hard, but there has been a lot of thought, time and effort put into moving us this way and we want to provide opportunities to get the greatest amount of exposure for your gigs, events, shows, etc. It is important that you learn how to use our online calendar for submitting your shows! Our IT Director has prepared a Power Point to show you how and it is on our website: we will be sending you links to it if we have your correct e-mail address. The process is easy and quick and with the Power Point, and support from Sherri Roberts-Grimes and Rick Bowen, we know this will be an easy process to learn. The benefits are huge as our print and obline calendars are not always aligned with each other. Some people only post online and some people only post through the

e-mail submission process. By routing everything through the website we will increase the number of fans that see your upcoming gigs online (and print). More eyes seeing means more people attending! It will also give you a little more time to do your postings for the calendar. Instead of the 10th of the preceding month deadline that we currently have the new deadline will be the 15th.

The new online calendar is one we have been testing for a year now and it has many features and benefits that make it easy to use, fast and reliable, and will help you reach more potential fans! Our web hosts work with us constantly to keep us at the top of search engine lists and we frequently come up at or near the top in online searches for music. This means that this will be the calendar that most fans see when searching for music! This information will also be in the Bluesletter as many fans like to have a print calendar in planning their entertainment choices, plus the added benefit of having a few more days to get your show into the Bluesletter calendar. There is another benefit to you, too! This calendar is in a format that allows other music calendars to add this information to their calendar and we are already being picked up by several other calendars! This means more eyes seeing your upcoming gigs, shows, events, etc., and that means more potential fans coming to your gigs, shows, events, etc.

We know there will be some growing pains as we change to this new method; we are confident that this will benefit all musicians, clubs and showrooms with an easy to use process to get your information in front of as many eyes possible with the least amount of work! We really do want to help you with a free, easy to use tool that will help you promote all of your gigs, shows, events, etc!

For fans, if you know a musician or two please share the above information with them. We need your help in getting this change out to as many as possible so this transition is as smooth as possible! Change is always hard, but this change has benefits that far outweigh the learning curve and will benefit our entire community. This will be a busy summer for us all with festival season and the upgrades to the website, but your Board of Directors is excited and determined to bring all and many more new benefits to everyone and especially our dues current members! Please keep reading the Bluesletter for more upcoming developments in the next few months! Be sure to stop by the booth and say "HI" and check out our new t-shirts and other cool merch! Over time, I think that our calendar will have the functionality of award-winning electronic resources like STLBlues.net (the first Keeping the Blues Alive Award recipient in new media).

Next month, I hope to include my report on blues on the Olympic Peninsula, a story on the White Rock Blues Society's 10th anniversary, plus summer festival previews and shows.

Welcome Back Jimmy "Duck" Holmes


Bentonia, Mississippi blues legend, Jimmy "Duck" Holmes, will be visiting the Pacific Northwest with performances at the Vancouver Island Music Fest on Vancouver Island July 14 - 16, 2017. Details are also being completed for a July 13 performance in Vancouver, Canada. Holmes' appearances are part of a national tour supporting the success of his newest album, *It Is What It Is*.

Last year, Jimmy "Duck" Holmes, performed at the Acoustic Blues Showcase Saturday on August 6^{tth} at McCurdy Pavilion and at Blues in the Clubs on Friday and Saturday nights during the Acoustic Blues Workshop in downtown Port Townsend.

This year also marks the 45th Bentonia Blues Festival in Bentonia, Mississippi from July 12 - 17, 2017. Blues fans from around the world enjoy the unique and deeply authentic blues experience provided by the festival. Started in 1972, the Bentonia Blues Festival is the oldest blues festival in the country. It starts on July 12 with nightly blues performances at the historic Blue Front Café, Mississippi's oldest surviving juke joint, culminating in a full day of blues on the festival grounds just north of town. The festival's down home atmosphere has attracted thousands of visitors who return year after year to enjoy listening to authentic blues while also visiting with the performers. Featured performers this year include Leo "Bud" Welch, Terry "Harmonica" Bean, Jimmy "Duck" Holmes, Tito "Harlem Slim" Deler, Bill Abel and Cadillac John, Mike Munson, 19th Street Red, Wes Lee, Ms. Pleschette, and BBB, a blues trio from La Paz, Bolivia who formed a tight bond with Jimmy during his Bolivian tour last year.

Jimmy "Duck" Holmes is the embodiment of the raw country blues that blues fans often mistakenly lament has disappeared. Jimmy is referred to as the Last of the Bentonia Bluesmen since he is the only remaining Blues musician taught by Henry Stuckey, the man who developed the unique and haunting Bentonia Blues and taught it to Skip James, Jack Owens and others. After Henry Stuckey and Skip James passed, Jack Owens continued Jimmy's instruction while the two would sit and play at the Blue Front Café. Started in 1948 by Jimmy "Duck" Holmes' parents, Jimmy took over the old juke in 1970. The local blues musicians would meet at the Blue Front, shoot pool, have a few drinks and show each other the "real" way to play. Today, Blues fans from all over the world travel to the Blue Front to soak in its history and hear authentic blues from Jimmy "Duck" Holmes.


This year will be a busy year for Holmes as he will be appearing at national and regional music festivals, in a new blues documentary, in a Netflix series and featured on the new Forever Stamp from



the US Postal Service. Jimmy's touring schedule will be supported by national and targeted media including features on NPR's American Routes and other national radio programs and featured articles in leading Blues magazines, including the cover of Living Blues Magazine.

Blues Festival Preview: 24th Annual Gorge Blues & Brews Festival in Stevenson

Stevenson's signature summer blues event returns for its 24th year. Mark your calendars now for Friday and Saturday, June 23-24 when Gorge Blues & Brews Festival hits the Skamania County Fairgrounds in Stevenson, Washington. We will celebrate 24 years of musical genius, awardwinning craft brews and fabulous food in the spectacular setting of the Columbia River Gorge.

Start your weekend off right on Friday night when we feature all things local from 6:00 pm to 10:00 pm. Walking Man Brewery, Backwoods Brewing and Thunder Island Brewing will be pouring their tasty brews and there will be a nice selection of local wine. Tasty barbecue will be available, hot off the grill, from the Stevenson Eagles Lodge and Stevenson High School Senior Parents. Bring your boogie shoes because some of the best of our home grown musicians will have you on your feet all evening. Kenny Lee and the Sundowners and Big River Band will be on the stage. On Saturday, the festival is packed with excitement from noon until 10:00 pm. It is a well known fact that the best brews in the Northwest can be sampled at this festival so choose carefully - you will run out of room long before you run out of choices. 14 craft breweries will be representing the Pacific Northwest, from Stevenson to Seattle. If it is wine that you prefer, four of the best regional wineries will be pouring. Two cider houses will serve up their product including Stevenson's own Jester & Judge Cider and locally made whiskey may be sampled from Skunk Brothers Spirits. Several new seasonal releases will be featured at this year's festival so come prepared to taste a delicious beverage vou have never experienced before.

Along with our traditional summertime entrees, we will have a multitude of phenomenal flavors to mix and match with your beverages including Greek gyros and baklava, exotic sausages, homemade pies and of course, barbecue.

"Blues" is the second word in our name and you will be able revel in continuous live blues music filling the air with bands on two stages. This year's line-up is impressive. 2017 Blues Hall of Fame Inductees

The Blues Foundation welcomed the 38th class of Blues Hall of Fame inductees on May 10, 2017. This year's 14 richly deserving honorees represent all five of the Hall of Fame's categories: Performers, Non-Performing Individuals, Classics of Blues Literature, Classics of Blues Recording (Song) and Classics of Blues Recording (Album).

The six performers chosen for induction include two distinctive vocalists, Mavis Staples and Latimore; a pair of legendary guitarists, Magic Slim and Johnny Copeland along with longtime Howlin' Wolf sidemen guitarist Willie Johnson; and piano-man Henry Gray. They will join the more than 125 performers who already are Hall of Fame members. The year's non-performer selection is *Living Blues* magazine co-founder and radio show host Amy van Singel, who passed away in Sept. 2016.

The Classic of Blues Literature pick is the rightfully recognized *Father of the Blues*, W.C. Handy's 1941 memorable autobiography. John Lee Hooker was among the Hall's first inductees in 1980 and now his 1966 Chess album *The Real Folk Blues* will enter the Hall of Fame in the Classic of Blues Recording Album category. The quintet of Classic of Blues Recording songs includes Bo Diddley's signature tune "Bo Diddley," Tommy Tucker's much covered classic "Hi-Heel Sneakers," the Albert King hit "I'll Play the Blues For You," Son House's "Preachin' the Blues" and "I Ain't Superstitious," which features 2017 inductee Henry Gray playing on Howlin' Wolf's well-known 1961 recording.

Performers

Henry Gray, who played piano in the Howlin' Wolf band and other Chicago blues groups before returning to his native Louisiana in 1968, has rarely been in the spotlight, but has steadily built an impressive resume entertaining audiences around the world with his blues-drenched piano pounding. Gray, born in 1925, is still performing regularly six decades after his first recording sessions in Chicago.

Willie Johnson recorded only a few songs on his own, but as a sideman his storming barrage of distortion and incendiary guitar licks in the 1950s, especially on the early records of Howlin' Wolf, earned him a lasting reputation as a groundbreaking commando in the annals of electric guitar playing. Mentored by Wolf in their Mississippi days, Johnson played in Wolf's band in the South and in Chicago, and recorded for Sun Records in 1955.

Mavis Staples, one of America's premier singers of gospel and soul music, has expanded her musical mastery with her performances in more blues-based settings in recent years. The blues is nothing new to the Staples family, as Mavis' father and founder of the Staple Singers, Roebuck "Pop" Staples, was a devotee of Delta blues master Charley Patton back in Mississippi. Mavis, born in Chicago in 1939, remains on her lifelong mission to inspire and uplift her listeners no matter what musical genre she employs.

Johnny Copeland was one of a bevy of blazing guitar slingers to emerge from the vibrant Third Ward of Houston, Texas, and one of the city's most powerful singers as well. Establishing himself with a series of blues and soul singles beginning in 1958, he attained national prominence in the 1980s recording blues albums for Rounder Records. His daughter Shemekia has followed in his footsteps by winning multiple Blues Music Awards.

Magic Slim led one of the most relentless, harddriving bands in Chicago blues history for several decades until his death in 2013. Born Morris Holt in Mississippi in 1937, he earned his nickname from his friend and fellow blues guitar ace Magic Sam. Slim was also known for possessing perhaps the largest repertoire of any blues artist, always able to pick up another song from the radio or the jukebox, enabling him to record more than 30 albums and garner dozens of Blues Music Awards nominations. His son Shawn "Lil Slim" Holt is ably carrying on the family blues tradition.

Latimore, the abbreviated stage name of singer, keyboardist and songwriter Benny Latimore, has cut a dashing figure on the Southern soul circuit ever since he began touring in the 1970s on the strength of hits such as "Stormy Monday" and his best-known original, "Let's Straighten It Out." Latimore, who was born in Tennessee in 1939 but has called Florida home since the 1960s, is now a distinguished and still spirited love philosopher and elder statesman of the scene.

Individuals; Business, Production, Media or Academic

Amy van Singel, known to blues radio audiences as "Atomic Mama," was a cofounder of *Living Blues* magazine in Chicago in 1970. She and her former husband Jim O'Neal published the magazine from their home in Chicago until they transferred the publication to the University of Mississippi in 1983. Her radio career began at Northwestern University and included stints at stations in Chicago, Mississippi, Memphis, Alaska and Maine. Amy died in her sleep at her home in Maine on Sept. 19, 2016, at the age at 66.

Classics of Blues Literature Father of the Blues by W.C. Handy is a monumental opus that is indispensable to the study of American musical history. Published in 1941, the book traces Handy's background as a trained orchestra leader, his discovery of the blues and the struggles he endured to become a successful music publisher. It is often cited as a primary resource on the earliest years of blues history. No book is more deserving of designation as a Classic of Blues Literature.

Classics of Blues Recording; Album

The 1966 John Lee Hooker album *The Real Folk Blues* is the latest of several Chess Records' The Real Folk Blues albums to be elected to the Blues Hall of Fame. Whereas the rest of the LPs in the series by Muddy Waters, Howlin' Wolf and others were compilations of older recordings, the Hooker album was newly recorded in May of 1966 in Chicago. Hooker was his inimitable and spontaneous self, reworking some of his older songs and improvising new ones, accompanied by his Detroit guitarist Eddie Burns and Chicago sidemen Lafayette Leake and S.P. Leary.

Classics of Blues Recording; Singles

"Bo Diddley" was not only the 1955 hit record that made Ellas McDaniel famous — it also gave him his professional name. The famed "Bo Diddley beat," an energized update of the old "Hambone" rhythm, rocked the world, and Bo continued to create classics for Checker Records in Chicago with his innovative blend of blues and rock 'n' roll.

"Hi-Heel Sneakers" by Tommy Tucker was the last blues record from the mighty Chess Records catalogue to hit No. 1 on the charts. Recorded in New York in 1963, the single on Chess' Checker subsidiary label topped the *Cash Box* magazine R&B charts in 1964. Tucker's enticement to "put on your red dress" and hi-heel sneakers has resounded on countless bandstands ever since.

"I Ain't Superstitious," an ominous Willie Dixon composition recorded by Howlin' Wolf in 1961, is best known to rock audiences through the Jeff Beck Group's 1968 cover version featuring Rod Stewart on vocals. On the original session for Chess Records in Chicago, Wolf's band included Hubert Sumlin, Jimmy Rogers, Sam Lay and 2017 Blues Hall of Fame inductee Henry Gray.

"I'll Play the Blues for You," recorded by Albert King in Memphis for the Stax label in 1971, was written by Jerry Beach, a longtime fixture on the Shreveport, Louisiana, music scene who died in 2016. In Beach's lyrics, sung with warmth and tenderness by King, the blues becomes a source of soothing and comfort. King's 45 spent eight weeks on Billboard magazine's Best Selling Soul Singles chart in 1972

"Preachin' the Blues," a two-part single by Son House on the Paramount label from 1930, is a prime example not only of House's intensity as a Delta blues singer and guitarist but also of his lifelong inner conflict between the lure of the blues life and devotion to the church. House, who did preach in church at times, also sang of the hypocrisy he saw in religion with lyrics such as "I'm gonna be a Baptist preacher and I sure won't have to work."

Delbert McClinton to Headline 30th Annual Winthrop Rhythm & Blues Festival!

Delbert McClinton, who over the course of a 60year career, has won multiple Grammy awards and scored top hits including "Givin' It Up For Your Love" and "Good Man, Good Woman," will headline this year's 30th Annual Winthrop Rhythm and Blues Festival.

This year's festival, in keeping with 30 years of tradition, will feature a legendary headliner, a taste of zydeco, some acoustic and roots music, a bit of funky blues, a helping of searing blues guitar, a spectrum of some of the newest and most creative blues artists on the circuit today, and of course, the festival house band Too Slim and the Taildraggers.

Delbert McClinton is not only a legend, he rose to fame on the shoulders of the greatest legends in blues. Delbert was still a teenager when he got a house band gig in Texas that had him sharing stages with Jimmy Reed, Howlin' Wolf, Freddie King, Albert Collins, and Gatemouth Brown. He parlayed that foundation and his own innovative harmonica and songwriting skills into a string of hits in the 1980s and 1990s, and even after he faded form the charts, he commanded the respect of the music industry, winning Grammies well into the 2000s.

Returning to the festival are zydeco favorites Chubby Carrier and the Bayou Swamp Band, whose lively shows have delighted Winthrop crowds on several occasions.

Among the young and innovate blues acts coming to the festival are Marcus King, Southern Avenue, and Lukas Nelson and the Promise of the Real. Marcus King, at just 20, is a protégé of Gov't Mule guitarist Warren Haynes, and his brand of funky R&B, southern soul and Americana has won him a devoted fan base nationwide. Southern Avenue is a Memphis based band founded by an Israeli guitarist who is joined by two sisters, one who sings and the other who drums. The band is rounded out with keys and bass, and recently signed with Stax Records.

Lukas Nelson and the Promise of the Real, founded by Willie Nelson's son Lukas, call themselves "Cowboy Hippie Surf Rock" and are named for a song by Neil Young, who they eventually worked for as a backing band. Since then, the band has toured with Willie Nelson and B.B. King.

More traditional but no less creative is Rae Gordon and the Backseat Drivers of Portland, Oregon. Fresh off their triumphant third place finish at the International Blues Challenge in February, the band plays blues in a classic, timeless style, led by the stratospheric voice and playful stage presence of multi-award winning Rae Gordon.

The festival will host two more IBC alumni, including 2016's first place winners The Delgado Brothers, a blues band with Latin flavor whose rising career has included a collaboration with John Mayall. Southern California funk-blues artist Sugaray Rayford also scored high at the IBCs with a second place finish in 2006. Since then, Rayford has toured internationally, and has appeared in film and television soundtracks.

Delivering the roots music that Winthrop fans have come to expect in the early sets is bluegrass duo Rob Ickes & Trey Hensley. Rob Ickes has been named Bluegrass Dobro Player Of the Year 15 times, and Trey Hensley was a country music prodigy by the age of 11, when, as a protégé of Marty Stuart, he landed his first appearance on the Grand Old Opry.

Providing the scorching Texas guitar that no blues festival would be complete without is Carolyn Wonderland, a Texas songwriter and bandleader with a cult following for her virtuosity on guitar, slide guitar, mandolin, trumpet and piano. She is also a dedicated philanthropist, frequently performing in the Austin area to raise money for food banks, soup kitchens and homeless shelters. The Winthrop Rhythm and Blues Festival witnessed her generosity when, after the wildfires of 2014 forced her to cancel her scheduled appearance, she donated to support those affected by the fire anyway.

And of course, the festival will include long-time fan favorites Too Slim and the Taildraggers, who will have performed 29 of the festival's 30 years.

At a Board meeting earlier this year, the Board of Directors of the Washington Blues Society decided to offer two new membership levels: one for corporate and business members and one for blues acts (Duos and Bands). Contributions may be taxdeductible; please check with your tax preparer to see which new opportunity is right for you.

Each corporate, business or band membership includes a blues society membership card (with discounts!), a subscription to the Bluesletter, and nominating and voting privileges for the annual Best of the Blues ("BB Awards") awards celebration.

Corporate and Business Memberships: these opportunities have been designed to attract for-profit businesses to support the mission of the Washington Blues Society. Modeled after similar membership opportunities available from The Blues Foundation or the Cascade Blues Association, this is the Washington Blues Society's inaugural attempt at providing a range of benefits to Gold, Silver and Bronze business members.

Corporate and Business Membership Levels

Gold

One monthly color business card-sized ad, a passthrough link to the Washington Blues Society website, and four voting memberships. Dues donation: \$1,000.

Silver

One bimonthly color business card-sized ad – that's six placements per year, plus four voting memberships. Dues donation: \$600.

Bronze

One quarterly business card-sized ad – that's four placements annually, plus four voting memberships. Dues donation: \$400.

Blues Performer Memberships

Band Membership

The following example is for a four-piece blues band: \$25 annual dues for the first member; each additional member, \$20 (for a total of \$85 – that's a \$15 savings off the standard membership rate!). When personnel members change, replacement members will pay \$20 and each original member will continue to enjoy their membership for the duration of their membership.

Duo Membership

Duo acts will be similarly priced: dues for the first member is \$25 with the second half of the duo paying \$20 – the same replacement membership discounts as in the Band Membership category will apply.



The May Blues Bash!

Hailing from Vancouver, Washington Amber Sweeney opened the May Blues Bash with a set on solo acoustic guitar to accompany her powerful super soulful alto. She declared "I don't play straight blues, but it's in all of my music. Blues is about emotion and stores and groove," as an intro to her song "Chasing Ghosts." Sweeney got the house singing with and her party anthem "In The Great Northwest." She is promoting her new album Believe In Love which she donates \$1 from every album sale to Rock Solid teen center in Vancouver. Sweeney spoke about the importance of community and thanked everyone for being involved with Washington Blues Society in supporting the music community, before "Rivers Edge," a swinging R&B tune that built up to a bold vocal climax. Sweeney then sang the title tune for "anyone who needs a break up song,"

Our full band was Skinny Blue, a tight trio who opened with a gritty blues rocker "Where Ya Been." Thys Walwork introduced the band and had drummer Kevin Blackwood launch into a mini drum solo as the intro for the Hendrix-styled "No Surprise." Lead singer and guitarist Walwork then spoke of growing up South Africa and Hong Kong before emigrating to Seattle for college and falling for a local girl. He first heard the blues in downtown Seattle from his soon to become mentor Chebon Tiger who taught him about the history of the blues and helped form the foundation for his original material. He laid down sweet leads on his vintage Telecaster for another song from their debut CD, the psychedelic blues shuffle "Times are Done."

Thys then did a dark bluesy cover of Springsteen's "Dancing In The Dark" before Blackwood played a smooth rhumba groove that became the foundation for another original, "Hit The Gas," which featured reverb-filled leads in a Spaghetti western surf guitar style. Vocally, Walwork's smooth tenor reminded me of Chris Isaac. He then dedicated the ballad, "You Belong," to his wife of 18 years and his daughter who is off to college in the fall. For that song, he played a cherry red Gibson 335 for the solo R&B balla. The next song "Leave Your Ligtht On," was a sweeping complex blues rocker with an intro of synth bass drone and swirling guitar notes before revving up into a groove.

When Thys was a kid, his dad brought home his very first CD, Born in the USA from Bruce Springsteen, and he thought to himself "Wow if that is what America is about, I am going there someday. You know Bruce isn't blues but he is a great storyteller." They then dove into a cover of "Downtown Train," with a honky tonk blues feel that brought dancers to the floor.

Rusty Williams *Got Blues?* (Element 6 Music)

Veteran Pacific Northwest guitarist Rusty Williams fulfills his lifelong dream with the release of his debut solo album Got Blues? The disc features 10 songs from Williams that finds him exploring his musical roots and new found pathway blues, rock, Latin and island sounds. The title track, a smooth honky tonk blues shuffle, opens the album featuring some fine slide guitar work. "Mystery Street," then paints a picture of a juke joint-lined bayou town. A punchy drum beat gives way to a shifty rhumba for the lively tale of a dangerous character "Bad Jose." Williams is joined by old friends Jim King on sax and Billy Mac and Merrilee Rush for the rollicking tribute to good times and party music "Corner of rhythm and Blues." The loose and bouncing acoustic centered "Caroline Jones," has a definite Jerry Garcia feel, while the trip to a salsa dance floor "Zanzibar," is fueled by spicy instrumentation. Williams pushes his vocals a bit too far on the tracks "Cool Breeze," and a cover of "Don't Miss Your Water," he is better served sticking with the talk/sing blues shouter vocal style he uses on the snarky shuffle "Dance Your Way Out." A solid effort from a home studio, But Got Blues? could have been better served with a more stripped down approach with less studio tricks on the vocals and guitars and the use of more live drums. Eliza Neals 10,000 Feet Below (E-H Records)

Award-winning Detroit blues-rock vocalist and keyboard player Eliza Neals' new release, 10,000 Feet Below, follows on the heels of her successful 2015 album Breaking and Entering. Howard Glazer's rocking guitar is featured on most tracks. Ten of the 11 cuts are originals written or co-written by Neals who also produced the project. The album opens with "Cleotus," which has a driving rhythm and hand-picked and slide acoustic guitars. This is followed by the slow burning blues of "Another Lifetime" which really gives Eliza an opportunity to cut loose some on vocals and Howard to show what he can do with six strings. "Burn the Tent Down" is a strutting rocker, while both the title track and "You Ain't My Dog No More" rock with one foot firmly in the blues. Paul Nelson is the featured guitarist on the melodic "Cold Cold Night." The lone cover is Skip James' "Hard Time Killing Floor Blues" simply titled "Hard Killing Floor" here and done with an original arrangement highlighted by Neals' keyboard playing. 10,000 Feet Below makes frequent ventures into brawny rock, but Neals' vocals handle it well, and when she is doing the blues as on "At the Crossroads," which features Billy Davis on guitar, she does it with command and expression. Recommended. Malcolm Kennedy

Selwyn Birchwood *Pick Your Poison* (Alligator Records)

Selwyn Birchwood's second release on Alligator, Pick Your Poison, picks up where his major label debut, Don't Call No Ambulance, left off. Don't Call No Ambulance received a Blues Music Award in 2015 for Best New Artist Debut building upon a number of milestones that included winning the 2013 International Blues Challenge. Pick Your Poison features 13 new original songs, and unlike the previous CD, Selwyn sticks with his roadtested band that features Regi Oliver on sax and flutes, Huff Wright on bass and Courtney "Big Love" Girlie on drums and percussion. I found the songwriting, playing and vocals stronger than on the band's first Alligator release and especially like the wry social commentaries in "Even the Saved Need Saving" and "Police State," but appreciate the more uplifting and forward-looking "Are Ya Ready?" The CD starts out strong with "Trial By Fire" with Regi ushering in the song on flute before Selwyn launches with some stinging slide guitar lines. Selwyn's guitar on "Heavy Heart" reminded me of a classic song from another Alligator artist, the late Chicago bluesmanFenton Robinson. "Heavy Heart" reminded me of Boz Scagg's cover of Robinson's "Somebody Loan Me A Dime (especially Duane Allman's soaring solos). Pick Your Poison, though, is not all hardcharging blues: the contemplative "Lost in You" gives Regi a chance to shine on sax and for the band to slow things down a bit. The CD closes with what many may consider to be a protest against all things corporate, "Corporate Drone," where "They cut my days and cut my pay/They even wanna cut my hair." Pick Your Poison is a solid contemporary blues CD and I recommend it highly. – Eric Steiner

Amy Black *Memphis* (Reuben Records)

Concept albums have been a staple of the recording industry for some time now, with the format of a theme or story line that binds all the music together allowing and artist to dig deeper into the songs and sometime deeper into themselves. Amy Black left behind her Boston stronghold and relocated to Tennessee to find her roots, and for her fifth release, she focused her creativity on the city she was conceived in, Memphis and the namesake album is slated for release this month on her own Reuben Records label. Black teamed up with the Grammy-nominated, Emmy-winning producer and leader of the Bo-Keys, Scott Bomar. Together, they recorded seven originals and three well-chosen covers. Black is an accomplished singer, but on Memphis her songwriting skills take center stage. The album opens with her smoldering R&B tale dedicated to Bobby Bland, "It's So Hard

To Love An Angry Man," setting the stage for the Memphis revue with smoking horn blasts, tasty Hammond B3, gritty leads and dramatic vocals. Black sings of her heartache while the band bumps to the rhythm of "The Blackest Cloud," then downshifts into the sweet introspective gentle sway of "Without You." The first cover song of the album is the poignant plea for world peace "If I Could Reach Out and Help Somebody." Black stretches her vocal muscle on the slow gospel blues "Let The Light In," then pays tribute to Anne Peebles with "What Makes A Man." Black closes the show with the oft recorded dramatic slow blues "I Need Your Love So Bad," Rick J Bowen

Gina Sicilia *Tug of War* (Blue Elan)

Gina Sicilia is a vocal stylist who has made her mark as a bodacious soul singer and torch song blues diva with a powerful husky alto. Sicilia recently made a move to Nashville and partnered with acclaimed producer Dave Darling for her sixth album Tug of War, out June of 2017, which finds her stretching her wings and delving into the singer songwriter genre and exploring a new set of musical and emotional pathways. The album title comes from a line in the track "Never Gonna End," an acoustic based tale that eludes to relationship struggles and the battle between the head and heart, this theme plays out thru all the album tracks and is a metaphor for Sicilia's "tug of war," within herself. The Memphis soul "I Don't Want to Be In Love," opens the album and sets the tone of conflicted emotions and slick production, that segues perfectly into the radio ready "Damaging Me." Her straight forward take on "He Called Me Baby," an R&B hit for Candi Staton. The country gospel-infused songs "I'll Stand Up," and "I Cried" shows Sicilia at her most vulnerable but determined best as a songwriter and vocalist. The swampy swing of the country blues "Abandoned," is an easy sing along. She then heads back into the bravado doing a saucy cover of the girl group hit "Tell Him." The album ends on a high note with "Heaven," an upbeat revival of redemption though the power of positive thinking. Rick J Bowen

Johnny Mastro & the Mama's Boys Never Trust the Living (Full CSB/Roxy Music)

Never Trust the Living is the follow up to Mastro's 2012 Rip Cat Records release *Luke's Dream*. Since then, Mastro has moved from Los Angeles to New Orleans and the 11 tracks featured here were culled from 72 takes of 27 songs all recorded in only two days. In the world of studio recording, this is the equivalent of, knocking it out and getting the goods. Johnny is on harp and vocals, Smoke is on guitar and the engine room is Rob Lee on drums and Dean Zucchero on bass. They open with some hard driving numbers, such as "Snake Doctor"

with bristling slide and harp accents and solos heavy with reverb, and then "Whiskey," where Johnny opens up on his harp solo. On "Judgment Day," Smoke tears into a raging and rocking guitar solo, and on "Monkey Man," Smoke is back on slashing slide as a foil to Johnny's harp. On "Don't Believe," they slow things down and play a more traditional blues groove and Johnny shows some of his harp skills while Smoke plays nuanced guitar lines (but the song fades just when he is beginning a solo). Johnny & the Mama's Boys take "House of the Rising Sun" and play it as an instrumental giving it a modern kick. They slow things down again for a true to form take on Freddie King's "The Sad Night Owl" from his Bonanza of Instrumentals with Johnny playing Freddie's languid lines on his harp. Recommended. Malcolm Kennedy

Lauren Mitchell *Desire* (Self-Released)

Tampa Bay soul vocalist Lauren Mitchell took some recent upheavals in her personal life and poured them into her music. She took a trip across the country to work with Tony Braunagel in Los Angeles with some top session players and Desire is the outcome. The 13 selections include four originals co-written by Mitchell and the balance of the set features covers, including songs performed by Aretha Franklin, Diana Ross, Bettye Lavette, Etta James and Betty Davis. Mitchell's robust vocals are evident from the opening track "(I Don't Needy Nobody to Tell Me) How to Treat My Man." "Soul Music" is a lilting R&B number and the title track is a solid example of low-down blues. Mitchell's vocals particularly shine on "Jump into My Fire," a song performed by Etta James. Aretha Franklin's "Good to Me as I Am to You" is done as a slow-paced soul blues and Diana Ross' "I Ain't Been (Licked Yet)" is performed with a decidedly funky swagger. Desire closes with the original "Brown Liquor" that features a driving keyboard and guitar driven blues about bad choices. Lauren Mitchell is a name to remember, and I expect to be hearing a lot more from her. Highly recommended. Malcolm Kennedy

Thornetta Davis *Honest Woman* (Sweet Mama Music)

Thornetta Davis has been called the Queen of Detroit Blues, and after one spin of her new CD, *Honest Woman*, I can see why. The 13 tracks are all originals. The short opening cut, "When My Sister Sings the Blues," written and read by her sister Felicia and the balance written or co-written by Thornetta. Davis kicks things into gear with "I Gotta Sang the Blues" with Kim Wilson on blues harp. Thornetta keeps the tempo up for "That Don't Appease Me" and gets an assist from the Larry McCray Band on the gospel and soul influenced "Set Me Free." She may be the Blues Queen of Detroit; but Thornetta goes to Louisiana for "I Need a Whole Lovin' to Satisfy Me" and guitarist Brett Lucas puts some polished slide accents on "Sister Friend Indeed." One of my favorite tracks is "Get Up and Dance Away Your Blues" which features a three-piece horn section. The title track is a slow paced bluesy R&B number with horns and sharp guitar. Highly recommended. Malcolm Kennedy

Strongman *No Time Like Now* (Sonic Unyon Records)

On the new release, No Time Like Now, by Canadian blues rocker Steve Strongman nine of the 10 songs are originals co-written Steve and Rob Szabo who produced the project and adds bass, keys and percussion to several tracks. The lone cover is his longtime friend Randy Bachman of Bachman-Turner Overdrive's hit "You Ain't Seen Nothing Yet" with Randy as special guest swapping guitar leads with Steve. Strongman keeps some of the original hit's signature melody; but he slows the pace and some of the phrasing giving this classic rock staple a new and harder feel. One of the other standouts on this CD is "Money in the Bank," which features some resonator guitar along with the fiery lead licks. Another is "Old School" which opens with an uncredited blues harp teaser and features some slide guitar fills too. While songs like "Good Times" and "Bring the Hammer Down" swagger and strut, others like "Sometimes" and the ballad "The Day They Carry Me Away" have a mellower groove. Malcolm Kennedy

Tom Craig & Soul Patch *Get Ready for Me* (Self released)

Get Ready for Me is the debut for Tom Craig & Soul Patch and features a dozen original songs. Craig & Soul Patch represented the Central Delaware Blues Society at the 2017 International Blues Competition of The Blues Foundation in Memphis. This seven-piece outfit features a threepiece horn section with a tenor and pair of baritone saxophones with Tom on vocals and guitar. Dave Gross recorded, mixed and mastered Get Ready For Me as well as adding bass to four cuts. One of the standouts is the title track with a short, but biting guitar solo. Another is the slow-paced "my-woman-done-me-wrong" song of "She Did It to Me (She'll Do It to You)" with a Hammond B3 solo by Eric Johnson. Special guest Mikey Jr. plays blues harp on "Can't Stop Thinking About You," and adds backing vocals to the smooth shuffle "I Can't Help Myself" which also features a tenor solo by Vince Gleason. It would have been nice with the special talent that contributed to Get Ready for Me to hear Mikey Jr. really cut loose on a harp solo and maybe have Dave Gross add some of his considerable chops; but overall, this CD is solid and the horn section carries their weight. Southern Avenue Southern Avenue (Stax Records)

When I first heard Southern Avenue, I was floored. Floored by the way this recently-formed fivepiece band sound like they are straight out of Memphis (which they are). After reaching the semi-finals at the International Blues Challenge in 2013 with his own band, Israeli bluesman Ori Naftaly immigrated to Memphis to pursue music. He connected with singer Tierinii Jackson and drummer and sister Tikara Jackson, bassist Daniel McKee and keyboard player Jeremy Powell. As Southern Avenue, they've toured around the world playing diverse sets that include covers and originals. In 2016, Southern Avenue made it to the semi-finals of the 2016 International Blues Challenge. The Jackson sisters raised on Gospel and it's clearly influenced the band's sound. The lone cover on this CD is from famed Muscle Shoals songwriter George Jackson, "Slipped, Tripped and Fell in Love" and Art Edmaiston and Marc Franklin punctuate this classic soul song with solid sax and trumpet parts. Other guests include North Mississippi AllstarsLuther Dickinson, who plays a wicked slide guitar on the CD's opening song, "Don't Give Up." After listening to this CD a few times, I noticed that disc's 10 songs are bookended with positive, forward-looking songs. The opening "Don't Give Up" repeats a traditional call-and-response "When it hurts real bad/Don't give up" over a solid rock blues groove powered by drummer Tikara Jackson and bass player Daniel McKee. After songs of love lost ("What Did I Do," "Rumble") and love found ("Slipped, Tripped and Fell in Love," "Love Me Right," "No Time to Lose"), and a blues song that honors Ori Naftaly's new home town ("80 Miles from Memphis"), the CD closes with the hopeful "Peace Will Come" (and the background vocals from Ava Jackson, Laurie Jackson and Bradley Jackson remind me of some of my favorite Gospel singers). In 2016,

In the 1960s, Stax Records was home to genredefining soul and blues artists like Otis Redding, William Bell, Carla Thomas, Booker T & The MGs, Albert King, Sam & Dave, Isaac Hayes and The Staple Singers. I am pleased that the Concord Music Group has added the Memphis-based Southern Avenue to the reinvigorated Stax label.

This year, the Concord Music Group and Rhino Entertainment have teamed up to honor the 60th anniversary of the legendary Memphis-Based Stax Records. This partnership will be the first national marketing of Stax recordings since Stax and Atlantic Records went their separate ways in the 1960s.

Editor's Note: This summer, Southern Avenue will play the Safeway Waterfront Blues Festival in Portland on July 1st, Music on the Half Shell in Roseburg on the 18th, Seattle's Highway 99 Blues Club on the 20th and the Winthrop Rhythm and Blues Festival on July 21-22.
