Chris Thomas King was chosen by the Coen brothers to play the role of itinerant bluesman Tommy Johnson along side George Clooney in the movie "O Brother, Where Art Thou? (2000)." Larger than life on the silver screen, Chris Thomas King, acoustic guitar in hand, captivated audiences the world over, silencing his critics. His authenticity as a folk blues artist, by any measure, proved to be undeniable. A star of stage and screen was born. New fans the world over packed sold out theaters and art centers to immerse themselves in his illuminating melodious glow. King sold millions of records and won numerous awards, superseding the success of his folk blues predecessors.

King's major contributions to the O Brother, Where Art Thou phenomenon, along with its follow up album and tour, "Down From The Mountain," has inspired a new generation of musicians such as, Hozier, Mumford & Sons, and the Lumineers. His songs "Hard Time Killing Floor Blues" and "John Law Burned Down the Liqour Sto," to name a few, have been covered by numerous artists including legend Buddy Guy.

Thirty years after becoming the last major folk blues discovery of the 20th Century, Chris Thomas King, whose career is a coda for the folk blues revival of the '60s, is today, one of the most important artists in the world for having changed the way we think of blues.

In a newly-written song King sings a remarkable refrain that goes, "The blues was born in, Louisiana, not Mississippi, or Texarkana," about the ostensible fallacy that it orginated in the Delta. He then goes on to state unequivocally in the following verse, "Down in New Orleans" is "where the blues was born. You can still hear the sound of, Buddy Bolden's horn." Thankfully, also in New Orleans, we can still hear the enlightened art of Chris Thomas King.

You may have seen this truly original solo guitarist performing locally with a washboard artist or busking outside the Everett Xfinity Arena during hockey games. Jesse Weston Band

Jesse is back after a year-long personal hiatus and fresh from winter gigs with the BaiLee Weston Band, featuring northwest legendary band leaders Steve Bailey and Brian Lee. Jesse Weston behind the piano and the microphone is a showstopper. His vintage keyboard tone, classic blues and modern grooves keep the room and the mood swingin'. Jesse admits he's been through a tough personal time in the last few years, which saw the end of his marriage, but says he's received incredible support from the blues community, so come out August 8 to give him some more love and bathe in the goodness he and his band have to share.

Guitars and Such

Although I would not consider subjecting anyone to my lack of ability to play a guitar, I find these musical instruments fascinating and view them not only as instruments that, in the right hands, can be used to create music that touches the depths of my soul; but also as pieces of incredible craftsmanship and beauty.

I enjoy spending time marveling at the various instruments hanging on the walls at shops like American Music on Fremont Ave North in Seattle, Guitarville on Highway 99 in Edmonds or Emerald City Guitars on South Washington Street in Seattle's Pioneer Square.

Browsing and marveling at everything from new factory direct items to vintage and "franken guitars" (meaning guitars built from disparate pieces and named after Mary Wolstencroft Shelley's monster) is just fun to me. One thing that always catches my eye are the real bare bones instruments like cigar box guitars, washboard guitars and other guitars made from unusual found materials, built and used by artists like Nathan James, Super Chikan, Nick Vigarino, Reggie Miles, Moreland & Arbuckle and the Homemade Jamz Blues Band all come immediately to mind.

These homemade units are rarely to be found in a shop and must typically be purchased directly from the artisan. Many of these contraptions have only three or four stings, some less; but some have six or more. Technically if they only have one string they are a diddly bow; but that is open for debate as well. I have seen several played live and am always surprised by the amount of sound from A) such a small instrument and B) so few strings.

The history of homemade instruments is of course the history of all instruments; but after manufacturers and large companies began to make guitars, banjoes, mandolins, ukulele's and such there were still folks who just couldn't afford them and so they made their own from what they had available to them.

There are illustrations and photos of cigar box guitars from the Civil War through the turn of the 19th century. During the depression people still wanted to play music and so they just made their own instruments to play. The history of the blues is intrinsically intertwined with this tradition. Many a player who later gained fame started on a diddly bow or cigar box guitar.

I made myself a washtub bass back in the 1990s and I bought a four-string cigar box guitar several years ago made by Cliff Rice (Ben Rice's Dad) at the Blues for Food Fest at Magnuson Park in Seattle. At the Sunbanks Music Festival a couple years back there was a booth called Front Porch Guitars run by a gentleman named Ron Davison, selling some really fine looking units, I really noticed the beautiful craftsmanship and I asked him about tunings for just four strings. Ron handed me his business card which had some tunings on the back, including DADF#, EBEG#, FCFA and GDGB open tuning.

More recently, I ran into a guy, Blane M. Hixon, with a booth at a street festival in Georgetown with some choice boxes. Now not being a player, I don't pick them up and give them a test run for tone and feel or check the action; I just admire the art and craftsmanship that I see; but I am sure these puppies play just as fine as they look. In our blues community, I can think of several well respected players who work on, repair, customize guitars and/or build custom instruments like Eric Daw, John Stephan, Billy Stapleton and Mark Riley just to name a few.

In this short article, I have merely touched on the subject of cigar box guitars, custom guitars and such and I know there are plenty more purveyors of select instruments in our community, and I encourage some of you to write a follow up piece to this for a future Bluesletter.



Film Preview: "I Am The Blues"

This month, blues fans in the Pacific Northwest, and British Columbia's Lower Mainland, have an exceptional opportunity to see a new documentary written and directed by documentary film maker Daniel Cross at the Seattle International Film Festival's (SIFF's) Uptown Cinema from the 8th to the 15th. Cross is an award-winning Canadian film maker, and he's as effective at letting his material tell a story as legendary documentarians like Michael Apted, Errol Morris and Ken Burns. I Am The Blues is a one hour and 46 minute journey down to the Mississippi Delta and Lafayette, Louisiana and Cross and his team capture live blues in legendary juke joints like Po' Monkey's Lounge in Merigold, Mississippi and the Blue Front Café in nearby Bentonia. Three years in the making along backrounds in Louisiana and Mississippi, I Am The Blues has garnered critical acclaim and prizes like the Best Feature Length Documentary and Best Cinematography in a Feature-Length Documentary at the Canadian Screen Awards in Toronto this past March.

Grammy-winning Bobby Rush is our tour guide, and early on in the film, we learn about the history of communities like Mound Bayou and Tutwiler, Mississippi. Bobby walks in front of the Blues Mural in Tutwiler and gives us a history lesson: Mound Bayou and Tutwiler were thriving African-American communities as they were founded by freed slaves.

En route to his native Louisiana for a fish fry and jam session at a community center, Bobby Rush tells us that "he'd always dreamed of being onstage with Cab Calloway or Muddy Waters." Picking cotton as a young boy, Bobby looked skyward and envisioned himself as a bandleader while his mother admonished him to focus on the rows of white cotton before him. In the film, it's a joy to see him with Little Freddie King, Lazy Lester, Lil' Buck Sinegal, Barbara Lynn and former Howlin' Wolf piano man Henry Gray.

At one impromptu jam at a friend's house, Henry described what it was like working for Howlin' Wolf for 14 years. Henry described the Wolf as a stern taskmaster who wouldn't tolerate any smoking or drinking while on his bandstand. Of course, Gray said that the Wolf would gamble, drink and carry on before and after gigs, but he was focused on putting on a memorable show and was known as a strict bandleader.

Cross uses a near-hidden camera to eavesdrop on Bobby Rush negotiating with a club owner regarding payment for this full band (and dancers). The proprietor's voice is clearly stressed when he realizes that ticket sales have not met the band's expectations and he offers to go to every ATM to raise money. We won't know the end of the story as the film focuses on Bobby and his dancers preparing for the show: Bobby in a sequined royal purple sportcoat with white boots and the dancers in skin-tight outfits.

I've been to several of the communities featured in the film: Despite grinding and persistent poverty, residents of communities like Como and Bentonia, Mississippi still celebrate their musical roots. At one point, Jimmy "Duck" Holmes leads what many blues guitar aficionadoes might consider a "master class" in the Bentonia style. I am also heartened by increased blues tourism and the Mississippi Blues Trail, which honors artists and communities that have made significant contributions to what Morgan Freeman once called "America's classical music."

The closing credits reference more than two dozen songs that are featured in the film: Some as snippets or background music as well as fulllength performances. Like Lazy Lester, Carol Fran recorded on the Excello imprint and one of the many highlights in the film include "Sunshine" Sonny Payne spinning a 45 RPM record on KFFA Radio during the King Biscuit Flower Hour (sponsored by Shack Up Inn in Clarksdale, Mississsippi). Carol tearfully tells the story behind "Emmit Lee" in a touching interview. Later on, we learn that she's Henry Gray's niece (and the familiar banter between Lazy Lester and Carol Fran after at the community center jam is priceless!).

I Am The Blues tells exceptional stories, features memorable performances by many blues elders in Mississip and Louisiana and I recommend this movie highly.







Contributions may be taxdeductible; please check with your tax preparer to see which new opportunity is right for you.

Each corporate, business or band membership includes a blues society membership card (with discounts!), a subscription to the Bluesletter, and nominating and voting privileges for the annual Best of the Blues ("BB Awards") awards celebration.

Corporate and Business Memberships: these opportunities have been designed to attract for-profit businesses to support the mission of the Washington Blues Society. Modeled after similar membership opportunities available from The Blues Foundation or the Cascade Blues Association, this is the Washington Blues Society's inaugural attempt at providing a range of benefits to Gold, Silver and Bronze business members.

Corporate and Business Membership Levels

Gold

One monthly color business card-sized ad, a passthrough link to the Washington Blues Society website, and four voting memberships. Dues donation: \$1,000.

Silver

One bimonthly color business card-sized ad – that's six placements per year, plus four voting memberships. Dues donation: \$600.

Bronze

One quarterly business card-sized ad – that's four placements annually, plus four voting memberships. Dues donation: \$400.

Band Membership

The following example is for a four-piece blues band: \$25 annual dues for the first member; each additional member, \$20 (for a total of \$85 – that's a \$15 savings off the standard membership rate!). Happy 10th Anniversary to the White Rock Blues Society!

This past May, I had the pleasure of celebrating the 10th anniversary of the White Rock Blues Society at what's billed as "Canada's Caribbean," The Pacific Inn and Resort on King George Boulevard just two miles North of the USA/Canada border in White Rock. The anniversary featured three days of music that began on May 19th with a discussion of the blues in a private dining room next to the Rhumba Room at the resort. I had the pleasure of catching Saturday's show that featured the six-piece Tom Lavin and the Legendary Blues Band that also included Jason Buie's CD release party for his excellent Driftin' Heart CD that I reviewed for this issue of the Bluesletter. On Sunday, the blues society hosted a showcase of local performers that included International Blues Challenge competitor and awardwinning harp player Harpdog Brown.

I remember offering White Rock Blues Society president Rod Dranfield advice when he and Jason Buie formed the blues society in 2006. Since the early days that featured The Twisters (before that band's tragic accident), Jason Buie, David "Boxcar" Gates, and MonkeyJunk, the White Rock Blues Society has hosted over 100 live performances in venues as diverse as provincial parks, First Nation celebrations, a renowned recording studio (Blue Frog) and a number of local bars. Rod and his team have steadily built a reliable blues following at venues like the Crescent Legion's Club 240, West Beach Bar and Grill, and the blues society turns each large conference room of the Pacific Inn and Resort into a juke joint when it hosts fundraisers and its annual New Year's Eve party.

Saturday night's show featured a young girl from nearby Maple Ridge, Lauren Webb. This 10-year old confidently belted out the blues. My favorite memories of that evening include the presentation of Jason's guitar that was lost years ago but found in a pawn shop and his band powering through new material from the *Driftin' Heart* CD. I had heard of Tom Lavin and the Legendary Blues Band from Canadian blues friends, but hadn't seen them live. Originally from Chicago, Tom relocated to Canada and started a blues band with his brother, and during his set, he reminded the audience that he's "been on the road for the last 39 years." At the anniversary show, Tom led his band through an exceptional set of rocking blues and capped off his sets with songs that were popular on the radio in the 1980's, such as "Thirsty Ears," "Doing It Right on the Wrong Side of Town," and "Boppin' The Blues." Late in the evening, he donned a White Rock Blues Society t-shirt with its distinctive logo that reflects the society's mission: "Roots music for the rock."

After 10 years of blues experiences in White Rock and South Surrey, I'm admittedly biased. I look forward to driving two-plus hours up to British Columbia's Lower Mainland. Each time I attend a White Rock Blues Society event, I learn something new and discover new blues talent, like Delaney Rose, Summer and the Sinners, Dalannah Gail Bowen (and Owen & Owen), and Arsen Shoumakov. I'd be remiss if I left out promoter Mario Brox of this short piece: Mario's helped several Washington Blues Society artists with his enduring connections in his native Europe and, like Rod, Jason and Harpdog, is a great blues ambassador for artists that call South Surrey, Delta and White Rock home.

Blues Festival Preview: Roots & Blues at Salmon Arm

The 25th annual Roots & Blues Festival will be held in Salmon Arm, British Columbia from August 17th through the 20th. Sponsored by Toronto Dominion, main stage performers include Los Duendes, Boogie PatrolRicky Skaggs & Kentucky Thunder, Kenny "Blues Boss" Wayne, Booker T. Jones' Stax Revue, Stephen Fearing and Five Alarm Funk. Washington Blues Society member Keith Scott will participate in the electric and acoustic workshops, and Roots & Blues is unique in that one-half of the music is played in intimate, workshop settings. That's 24 hours of music!

I am pleasantly surprised that the festival is promoting Keith's firstever appearance at the Roots &Blues Festival: "For blues fans, the region's favorite roots festival has added another veteran of the Chicago blues scene with guitar playing and singing Keith Scott. Scott received his musical education over 30 years ago jamming with greats like Buddy Guy, Junior Wells and James Cotton, and then became a member of the legendary Chicago-based Jimmy



Dawkins Band. Scott will be a welcome addition to Roots & Blues in both the acoustic and electric blues workshops."

I've had the pleasure of seeing Chicago blues legend John Primer at the Chicago Blues Festival and at Buddy Guy's Legends. The Roots & Blues Festival's website does a nice job of summarizing Primer's contributions to the blues: "John Primer has undisputedly helped build the sound and style of Chicago blues as we know it today. The echoes of tradition bellowing from the birthplaces he played such as: Maxwell Street, Theresa's, Checkerboard and Rosa's Lounges, pulse from every chord in his fingers today. John Primer is a Chicago Blues Living Legend. John's father died tragically in Mississippi when he was young. When his mother found work in Chicago, John soon followed, bringing the sounds and spirit of Mississippi with him in 1963. He then fell for the music of both the city's west and south sides. Fronting his first band. The Maintainers, he was asked to join and eventually lead the house band at the world famous Theresa's Lounge in 1974. Over the next seven years, John would play with such blues originators as: Sammy Lawhorn, Junior Wells, Buddy Guy, Smokey Smothers, Lonnie Brooks and many others shaping the foundations of the Chicago blues to come. In 1979, the great songwriter Willie Dixon persuaded him to join his band the Chicago Blues All Stars. John traveled the U.S., Mexico and Europe, trying on hats as a rhythm guitarist, lead slide player and powerful singer. Muddy Waters heard John play and six months later Muddy recruited him not only as his guitar player and bandleader, but also as an opening act. John stayed loyal to Muddy until his death in 1983."

JJ Thames: Have Blues, Will Travel

"Have Blues, Will Travel," might be the first major US tour for soul-blues belter JJ Thames, but she has been on this road since she was 17-years-old, and singing from the age of nine. A classicallytrained musician with years of jazz under her belt, Thames (pronounced Timms) on the cusp of turning 35, is a veteran performer of many genres and styles, having shared the stage with everyone from Bobby Blue Bland and Marvin Sease on the Chitlin' Circuit to Reggae's Outlaw Nation and Fishbone. It's a pretty impressive resume for someone who was told time and again that she wasn't a very good or very soulful singer. Thames is philosophical. "I think you have a choice," she says. "You can take that and use it as motivation or you can allow it to dash your dreams." The choice she made is pretty clear.

A radiant beautiful woman with a quick smile and sometimes deep purple hair, the "Mississippi Blues Diva" from Detroit, as she has been called, started her journey in the same city as Motown, and was a seasoned chanteuse at 17. Asked about early blues influences or singing in the church. Thames says neither initially drew her interest. Hearing her powerful instrument, recalling the passion of Koko Taylor or Etta James, it's hard to believe. Both her debut recording, Tell You What I Know, and her second album, Raw Sugar, recently nominated for a 2017 Blues Blast Music Award for Best Soul-Blues Album, open with soulful gospel-inspired tunes. The latter, Oh Lord, is an original (as they all are on Raw Sugar,) an old-timey-sounding, sparse composition with guitar, mandolin and vocals artfully added by Ben Hunter & Joe Seamons, the WBS-sponsored winners of the 2016 International Blues Competition in Memphis.

The song pleads for divine assistance on the bumpy journey we all take while we're here. Thames is no stranger to struggle, and you can feel this from the beginning of the record. She has no qualms about putting her life in her songs, proclaiming, "All my music is personal." Indeed, in the span of two albums you will hear the full spectrum of life's ups and downs, tragic events and intimate moments. Raw Sugar includes a song about a woman in a questionable relationship considering an abortion; not a topic you hear in song too often. Lyrics on both albums are direct and surprising, vocals nuanced and wrenching, as she lets you behind the curtain where many of us hide our most personal lives.

She recently shared on social media pictures from the photo shoot for the album cover she shot a year and a half ago. At the time, she was struggling to just get out of bed and not cry her makeup off. Deeply depressed and dealing with anxiety and PTSD after a recent separation, she audaciously wore the white silk wedding gown she had worn full of hope less than a year before, to an 16

abandoned warehouse with the photographer. She explained the range of emotions she was dealing with and wanted the CD to reflect. She says as she tromped through the filthy location, the dress began to resemble the marriage, and she was able to throw it away, and with that, start a new, more empowered chapter.

Her writing and her music seem to be a similar catharsis for her, and for her listeners. "You listen to my records, you know me personally," she says, explaining that people come up to her at events and tell her all the time how they connect with her music and feel like they know her. They share how something they heard got them through a tough time: homelessness, a divorce or even the death of a child. They identify with her, and she with them, because the music is autobiographical, and all these things have come to pass.

A mother at 17, it was not always easy to make ends meet. Her second son, Zion Paul, was diagnosed with lymphoma and died just days from his second birthday. Thames mother, a psychiatrist, also passed from cancer at age 44. With each tragedy, Thames has diagramed her pain and her process and worked through to the other side. It is exorcised again and again in the songs and the performances. Not coincidentally, she says her lowest times brought her some of the most growth. She has always had the same dream, but because of circumstances, it periodically took a back seat to business school or the ministry, to survive or revive.

The church is in Thames' blood, and most certainly in her voice. Her father retired from General Motors and became an ordained minister as Thames was reaching adulthood. She too, became fully ordained and licensed and worked in the church for two years, leaving music behind. Then one day, the minister who had guided her, brought her into his office for a heart-to-heart. "He told me, hey, I think you need to go back to the music industry. And I was like, wait, what?" She says he told her that he really felt like that's where she was supposed to be. "That's your pulpit. That's where you'll make the biggest impact and the biggest difference. " She knew he was right and tried to make another go. "I said, You don't have to tell me twice."

But success only came in spurts, and in between, more heartache and trying times. Just when it looked like the very worst thing had happened and her dream might die right along with those closest to her, she found the strength to scratch her way up again.

She said she's had people chastise her for her single-mindedness and honesty in this. She explains that the loss of her son was the worst thing that ever happened to her, but it was also, simultaneously, a positive force for change. "It was the thing that shook me," she says. "It made

me look at life and say, you know what, you've just got to go for it. Life's too short."

She dropped everything, including an engagement. She moved back to Detroit again to pursue her dreams and then to New York. As she describes her drive, you can see her resolve. "It was a trying time but it was also a time where I was writing so honestly. And I became this transparent individual where, you know, I have no secrets. And I feel like my story is supposed to be told. I feel like everything that I've gone through is just motivation for other people, so I don't regret it."

She felt like she was on the right path but there were still a few detours. The brief "very bad marriage" may have set her into a dark place, but it also gave her a lot of writing material. "I get to sing songs about it and people understand. I honestly think that had a lot to do with the healing process. Writing that record and getting it off my chest. It put me in a position to where I was open to love again," she says. And she is in love again, with her best friend, again. A longtime companion, member of the band and a strong guiding force who helps keep her affairs in order, is never far from her side. "We're very different," she says. "I'm a free spirit and he is not." She smiles a beatific smile. "We balance each other out. He loves me well."

Thames seems to exhibit an openness and a rare self-confidence and ease with herself that is unusual for someone her age, or for anyone, really. She seems incapable of having a shallow exchange; direct and forthcoming, curious and observant. Her experience and upbringing explain some of this, and growing up on the stage. But there is something else.

"Actually I have Asperger's. I'm an "Aspi" and proud of it. I was diagnosed as an adult," she says about learning she carried aspects of the syndrome classified as a mild form on the autism spectrum marked by social anxiety. "It explains my superpowers," she says. She smiles and shows me the Wonder Woman tattoo on her arm. "I got the Wonder Woman tattoo when I was diagnosed." For her, it explained a lot and she could finally own those parts of herself that were special and different.

"When I sing, I actually see notes," she explains. "I smell colors. I hear colors. You know, the color pink has a smell: it smells like ... sunshine." She says a lot of people call these "auras." She just knows that when she meets people, she sees certain colors with them. She says she didn't always understand that most people don't experience the world like that. "I can walk into a room and I can feel the heaviness or the happiness or discord," she says. "I've made a lot of people uncomfortable over the years. I've learned not to stare. I've learned how to make eye contact." She now accepts... She says she just tells people if she does something quirky

or weird, that she has Asperger's, which seems to make things less awkward. "I'm unapologetically me and I'm OK with that," she says. This attitude makes her a perfect match for United by Music North America, the non-profit that supports professional growth and performances by and for musicians with physical and intellectual challenges and barriers to the music industry. UBMNA pairs their members with professional working musician mentors. Thames spent a week as a mentor in Portland last month, performing with the group at the Hotel Rose as part of the Safeway Waterfront Blues Festival.

"I'm just honored to be a part of it," she says. "Watching all of these artists use their super powers. They're absolutely amazing."

JJ Thames & The Violet Revolt continue the "Have Blues, Will Travel" Tour across the US through August, performing at Seattle's Highway 99 Blues Club on Wed, August 30. (Tickets at highwayninetynine.com and more information and tour dates on <u>iamjjthames.com</u>) Then it's on to Europe in the fall._

Thames has definitely travelled with the blues and come through them, not looking back except maybe to reflect on lessons learned and to write those cut-straight-to-the-bone lyrics. She says she continues to make peace with the past and practices forgiveness. She seems to have shed her skin, looking all bright and shiny and stepping out into the light. "That's what I preach," she says. "Follow your dreams. Follow your heart. Live authentically. You know, live out loud. Even when you get it wrong, get it wrong loud," she laughs. "It's okay. Nobody has it all figured out." And of course, with the ease and grace with which she utters these wise words, she does indeed sound like she's figured out quite a bit. You want to travel along and see where the road takes her. At this point, she says she's staying present, appreciating every minute and has no regrets.

"Someone asked me, what would I tell her if I could go back and talk to my 17-year-old self," she offers. "I sat there and thought about it, and I said, You know what? You're right. All of your dreams are right. It turns out good in the end."

Blues CD Reviews

Naomi Wachira Song of Lament (Doreli Music)

The definition of the word "lament:" A formal expression of sorrow or mourning, especially in verse or song; an elegy or dirge. The Kenyan-born, Yakima-based artist Naomi Wachira chose to title her sophomore album Song of Lament, as she feels the music ""was born out the many tragic losses we've witnessed globally - ranging from cases of police brutality to the refugee crisis - that made me grieve about who we've become, but also burned a desire in me to create art that would serve society at large and hopefully lessen the chaos around us." A bold, brave and almost brutal statement to describe the birth place of a music that is so lovely, calming and touching. The 11 track collection which certainly feels like one big song was recorded at Seattle's historic London Bridge studio, and produced by Eric Lilavois (Saint Motel, Atlas Genius, My Chemical Romance) with contributions from Dave West (organ/ Rhodes), Teo Shantz (drums), Masa Kobayashi (bass), Tommy Sandovallegos (percussion), Eric Lilavois (percussion), Owuor Arunga (trumpet) and Andrew Joslyn (strings). The crisp and clean production is a focused on the earth-shattering alto of Wachira, who picks up the torch of heroes of afro pop and folk singing Miriam Makeba, Angelique Kidjo, Joan Armatrading, and Odetta. Like those groundbreaking artists, Wachira accompanies herself on acoustic guitar which she nimbly strums throughout, guiding her soaring vocal and centering the ensemble. The album opens with the musical life lesson, "Our Days Are Numbered," with Wachira preaching "learn to be wise, learn to be kind." The funk and world percussion then jump up a notch for questioning call out "Up in Flames," and then she tackles issues of equality over a sweet reggae beat for "Beautiful Human." Joslyn's mournful strings accompany her as she attacks the zealots who perpetuate violence in the name of faithful religious expression head on for the pleading "Where is God?" She then shares a tribute to her fallen countrymen for the funeral song "Farewell." The title track is an homage to mother Africa as well as a strong rebuke of her citizens and the lack of humanity among the world's first peoples. Wachira delivers words of encouragement on the gently rocking "Run, Run Run," and the all-acoustic choral "Murathimwo," she shifts back and forth between English and Swahili as she attempts to give praise and devotion to her parents. She then leaves us with one more set of questions to ponder on the rumbling ³/₄ time ode "Think Twice." It would be so easy to play off Wachira's Song of Lament as an album of lovely world music wall paper because the harsh realities of the lyrics are colored by such truly beautiful music, much in the way that roses carry thorns. David Brewer Drivin' Wheel (Self-Released)

It feels strange to be introducing David Brewer to Seattle blues fans, since he has been a major force on the Seattle blues scene for over 35 years, wellknown for his rocking blues and guitar-driven jams. After backing Albert Collins for several years on the road and sharing the stage with many of the biggest names in blues, Brewer found his way back to Seattle and has led his own groups since. He has won Washington Blues Society B.B. Awards for "Best Guitar Player" and "Best Songwriter" several times, and has done numerous European tours since 1995. His sixth and mostrecent CD, entitled Drivin' Wheel, finds him doing his own arrangements of ten songs by some of his favorite artists, including Leon Russell, Roosevelt Sykes, Warren Haynes, ZZ Top, Smokey Robinson, Taj Mahal, J.J. Cale and others. Brewer is very fond of high-energy, rocking shuffle blues, and these abound throughout. Standouts on the record are Muddy Waters' "Blow Wind Blow," which is given a heavy, straight-8 feel, an arrangement of the Beatles "Help" by (the late Seattle blues great and Brewer's friend) Isaac Scott and John Lee Hooker's "Little Wheel," a long-time fixture in Brewer's live sets. As a guitarist, Brewer has carved his own overdriven style from the work of Freddy King, B.B. King, Albert Collins and Albert King. He has also always shown a love for bluesy Southern rockers, including the Allman Brothers, ZZ Top, JJ Cale and Leon Russell, and this record's songs continue that tradition. Compatibly supported by bassist Tracy Arrington (Curtis Salgado), Hammond B-3 organist Mike Kalanj and drummer Chip Hart (Arsen Shomakhov), and recorded, mixed and mastered by Raven Humphres at Blackwing Studio in Marysville, Washington, this recording will be sure to satisfy the many fans who miss seeing David Brewer on a regular basis and wonder what he is "up to" these days. - Eric Madis

Zelda Starfire *Wommando* (Self-Released)

Like a blast out of a double-barreled scatter gun the nine-song album *Wommando* from Seattle one-woman band artist Zelda Starfire hits you full in the face with grinding guitar, kick drum and caterwauling vocals. Recorded live in the studio by Steve Feasely at his workshop Love Studios, Seattle, *Wommando* marks both the new reality of indie recordings that are released as a digital album only and a throwback to quick and dirty, low budget records pf yesteryear. Zelda opens with the furious country punk, "How The Hell Did I Get Here," pounding hard on acoustic slide guitar and blowing crude harmonica while delivering the tome of the morning after with the great line" I

reek of whiskey, there's guilt in my hair." The fever pitch of "Chicken Killin" lives up to its title. Zelda refines her gig a notch as recants the ill-fated tale of Kansas cowboys who hired a well Witcher to lead then to water on "Water Witch," adding some clever finger picking and a June Carter growl to her vocal. Jenny Hill joins in on violin adding long lyrical notes to the time shifting ballad "Home," and helps build the tension to the fiery punked-up Celtic reel "Grand Daddy Long Legs." Some crazy distortion on the vocals punches up the energy of the hill Country Blues Stomp "In My Drawer," then Zelda tries her best to be a onewoman acoustic Metallica for "Union Horse." The lilting ballad, "In Your Sleep, closes the set with Jenny Hill returning with her fiddle as melodic counter point to Zelda's breathy vocal on a siren's lullaby. Rick J Bowen

Michele D'Amour and the Love Dealers Lost Nights at the Leopard Lounge (Warrior Poet Productions)

I just jumped on the bandwagon. Michele D'Amour and the Dealbreakers' new CD, Lost Nights at the Leopard Lounge, has already attracted positive reviews from a number of sources, although I've resisted reading them, in an effort to maintain a respectable objectivity. Luckily, the album speaks for itself. Michele has assembled a strong collection of her original songs, conceptually centered around the (fictional) Leopard Lounge and the characters who populate it. Everybody's got a story, and Michele presents them in a fresh, unadorned voice, letting the music and the lyrics carry the themes forward. Michele's band is a story in itself, with husband Patrick McDanel on bass, (and trombone and vocals). His contribution to the album earned him a featured article in Bass Musician magazine titled, "Bass Player Patrick McDanel's Grooves Distinguish Blues Band's Sound." I was going to say that! This album is RICH with interesting grooves, always entertaining and very danceable. Ronnie Bishop and Rick Bowen take turns providing the percussion half of that bottom end. Ryan Higgins pulls out a wellcrafted guitar solo or complementary rhythm or some other kind of magic on every track. And he plays trumpet. No lie. As for the songs, the album declares itself "Blues" from the opening bars of the first song, "No Good." Ryan serves up a tasty guitar intro over a classic shuffle that pulls us right in and then drops us into next song -a slow blues along the same theme - "Trouble." Sultry and strong, Michele's delivery is straightforward, the notes precise, her tone cool and often ironic. The title song, "Leopard Lounge" has a complex, rumba-like groove. We learn that at the lounge "the glasses smell like bleach and the water tastes like mud." Michele's lyrics are spare, but certainly evocative. Lost Nights at the Leopard Lounge includes 11 great songs plus a playful extra track ... more music than space permits me to analyze

It's a classy production in every way, including attractive cover art and package design by Tim Sutherland. So, go ahead - JUMP ON that bandwagon. You'll have lots of company. Jane Henderson.

Extended CD Review

Karen Lovely Fish Outta Water (Kingsized Soundlabs)

Karen Lovely's new CD, *Fish Outta Water*, is all Karen, with 12 original songs - blues, roots, and Americana - delivered fresh and tasty by the awardwinning singer and lyricist. You can tell a lot about a person by the company she keeps, and Karen has attracted some major talent to lend support to this project, including producer Eric Corne, who works with Walter Trout and John Mayall. Says Karen, "It was great working with Eric on this one... he pitched me songs that he thought would really work for me." These were added to the five songs Karen wrote, resulting in a satisfying exploration of thought-provoking themes and a whole lot of great music.

The spirit of collaboration is also apparent by the long list of musicians who appear on the album. Karen's core band here consists of Rick Holmstrom (Rod Piazza, Mavis Staples) and Doug Pettibone (Lucinda Williams, Mark Knopfler) on guitar, Taras Prodaniuk on bass, and Matt Tecu on drums and percussion. But listen and you'll hear fiddle, mandolin, Wurlitzer, steel drum, horns, violin, cello and more throughout the CD, applied judiciously and with effect by the featured artists. It's that attention to detail that makes this album so entertaining and rich in texture.

Of course the centerpiece of the project is Karen Lovely, with her strong, soulful voice reaching for the sweet spot in every song. Rough and tender, vulnerable and strong - Karen fearlessly sings the emotion beyond the lyrics. Listen to her low notes in the sultry "Nice and Easy," - smooth, rich, and flawless. And when she slips into those higher registers – pure and effortless. Based in Portland, Karen has been honored as a vocalist and performer at the regional and national level, with multiple nominations and awards from the Blues Foundation, Blues Blast magazine, Blues 411, and the Cascade Blues Society.

The album opens with the title song – "Fish Outta Water" – blues laid down on top of a spooky, twangy guitar effect and an organ noodling soulfully in tandem with the vocals. The track is deceptively simple lyrically, with a dramatic break mid-song - a surprise - the first of many genre bending delights on this CD. "Under the Midnight Sun, has a Motown feel, with sax and organ punctuating the bass line. Collaborator Eric Corne was inspired by the posts of Karen's visit to Iceland, as well as by the knowledge that she is a

confirmed city person. He wrote, "...but I could not escape the big, bright lights of the city, shining down on me just like the midnight sun." Karen sings this like she's joyful in the knowledge.

Other standouts – and there are many - include "Big Black Cadillac," an escape story with a stunning bass line and a Neil Young-like guitar solo at the end. Is it a bad dream or a recollection? "There's no turning back, to the life I had - I'm out here on my own. "Everything Means Nothing" is another great song. The title itself threw me into an existential crisis, but Karen tells me it's about how hard it is to love an addict, for whom everything means nothing ... except feeding the beast. The song has a compelling groove and features some very fine slide guitar work by another Portland friend, Ben Rice.

"Waking Up the Dead" is one of three Eric Corne songs that Karen chose to express her dismay with the current state of the nation. With a driving rhythm guitar, wailing slide guitar, and coronet flourishes, this song cooks. Here's verse 1 -

Saw the devil, walking like a man Hair like fire, skin shining golden brown Spoke of trouble, taking on the man Promised salvation, burned the whole thing down.

"Hade's Bride" ("There was a Time") is a more personal song and bears witness to the fine points of an unhealthy relationship. This is the rootsy, folksy, Americana side of Karen, and it's beautiful, sweet, and heartbreaking. "Next Time" has an up-beat, gospel feel, with a tinklin' piano and a classic, bluesy groove. The idea for the song arose from a conversation about God as a woman, Karen tells me. How would she reinvent the world?

> Next time there won't be no possessions Next time there'll be no yours and mine, Last I made you CEO; next time you're going be a regular Joe Next time I'm gonna shine a brighter light.

Karen's voice takes on a sultry, breathy quality in "Nice and Easy," a slow blues that could be about addiction or love or both. The song is powerful and evocative, regardless of context. Karen uses the space between the lyrics to full dramatic advantage, and the guitar, in Knopfler-like mode, swirls between the vocals. Like this:

> Baby twice ... I tried leavin ... you and me ... I'm lost ... beyond reason ... and I can't deny the chemistry.

"Punk Rock Johnny Cash" is a sweet, cheerfulsounding tribute to an orange-haired busker who used to sing and play in the San Francisco subway. This is the story of Jesse Morris – a talented musician, struggling with bi-polar depression, who took his own life. He seemed so strong, but in retrospect, "the dark in (his) heart was there in every verse." His death drew a strong response from people who were used to seeing and hearing him play every day. Karen sings about that in a chorus that's wistful and tinged with regret.

If I told you how I loved to hear you sing that song

If I said how much it meant, well, would you still play on?

I can hear you sing that song.

These are stories Karen feels compelled to tell and issues she feels passionate about exploring. I've added some links here for folks who may want to do a little exploring themselves. But aside from the important themes she addresses, it's all about the music. *Fish Outta Water* is a well-constructed collection of excellent songs, possibly Karen Lovely's best yet. So ,dive in! Jane Henderson.

Jason Buie Driftin' Heart (Self-Released)

Jason Buie's latest CD features this British Columbia-based bluesman at the top of his game. Driftin' Heart includes four covers and seven originals. Buie is a co-founder of the White Rock Blues Society just across the USA border at Blaine and he serves as the society's music director. This vear, the White Rock Blues Society celebrates its 10th year under the leadership of president Rod Dranfield. The title tune is from fellow Canadian Sue Foley and Jason and his band reinvent Amos Milburn's classic romp, "House Party Tonight." Another cover, "You're Sweet" is as energized as Jimmy Rogers' original, and two things impressed me about this CD: 1) first-class blues musicianship and 2) exceptional original songwriting by Jason Buie and long-time Canadian blues drummer John Hunter (Slim & The Deuces). "Government Man" is a wry take on bureaucrats everywhere, whether they call Ottawa or Washington, DC home. "West Coast Daddy" is a fun, upbeat blues tune and "Suits Me to A Tee" and "12 O'Clock Check-out" are more than radio (and blues festival) ready. Joining Jason and John are George Fenn (Harris, Hunter & Fenn) on bass and Dave Webb (The Fabricators, Harpdog Brown, Rollin' & Tumblin') on piano and Hammond B-3. I highly recommend this diverse CD that features Chicago as well as Texas-tinged blues. A great blues record for your next house party! Eric Steiner

As noted in several Letters from the President, Tony Frederickson, over the past few months in the print Bluesletter, the Washington Blues Society calendar process is changing.


The Washington Blues Society depends on artists, club and venue owners, musicians and other blues partners to enter in their own information on our re-vamped website, www.wablues.org.



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A Good Life... According to Shane Dwight

Standing looking up at the front of the stage while hearing the first chords of a now familiar song roaring out across the landscape brings excited tingles. As Shane Dwight and his sidemen take the stage with a force of possessiveness rarely shown I watch intently for that split second flash of soulbearing personality.

Shane is a favorite because you can become lost in his lyrics and playing. His story telling remains grounded and to-the-point with hooks that play like loops, even years after, when a certain phrase or riff catches your attention.

It all did not get going for Shane until he was in his twenties and started singing to his already proficient use of his guitar. There were many years before when after seeing the film "Amadeus", he acquired a little keyboard with pre-recorded songs. He was ten or eleven at the time. Shane became in love with music. He immersed himself in the art of creating it. He told his mom that he was going to become like Mozart and write songs. He took saxophone lessons at age seventeen before he changed to guitar. Beginning lessons at a music store did not last long so Shane practiced with books at home and, chuckling, offers "Pressing rewind a lot". He found out that John Garcia, notable guitarist with John Lee Hooker, John Lee Hooker Jr, Zakiya Hooker, B.B King, Bonnie Raitt and many more, was available for lessons. "He changed my life", smiles Shane, "by having me listen to 'the cream of blues' and sending me home with tapes of all the greats that he had made for me. John was in the band when I began performing publically. By watching, I learned so much. He died last October. My first drummer Jerome Kimsey also passed away last year. I owe them so much for friendship and guidance."

Building confidence in the musical skills necessary is not easy and takes considerable patience. Over the years Shane has drawn on all of the life-skills he has accumulated from not only being a recorded touring musician but also a truck driver, a waiter, a collision estimator, a car detailer and parts guy for Ford Motor Company. Everything in life has brought him to appreciate the challenges as well as



the high points. This has not been easy at times as Shane was born with a bone disease that bothers him to this day. That said, it has also formed an inner fire that can been experienced on stage and on his eight studio albums. "The test is never to lose confidence in others no matter what difficulties you go through when somebody has done ya wrong. I turn it around by making art from all those experiences."

He broke onto the music scene when he won the Monterey Blues Festival Battle of the Bands in 2002, leading to playing many major festivals since that time. (i.e. Portland Waterfront Festival, Beale Street Music Festival, mentioning just two and playing the Legendary R & B Cruise twice.) The catalogue of songs he has written is impressive. A personal favorite is "Good Life", as there are so many aspects related to it. "Give Me Back My Money", "Don't Forget About Me When You Pray", "Call Me", "Talkin' To You, "You're Going To Want Me", "What You Need" plus "Done With You" have all had lasting mileage.

As far as his rig is concerned, Shane likes to keep it simple. He prefers his Fender Deluxe Reissue, Tube Screamer TS9.

"I gotta thing called 'Swamp Thing,' he said. "It's a vibro pedal. Recently bought a big muff pedal cuz we used some fuzz on the new CD and a Vox Wah pedal. I play a Fender Relic Custom Strat and a Heritage Gibson Les Paul currently."

Shane works hard at establishing his brand. With more than eight releases out there. A ninth album is about to be released in the fall on Vizz Tone. One tune he co-wrote with his friend Derek Aldridge he is pleased with is "Levy Girl". It is a bluesy rock Americana album featuring Patrick OHearn (John Hyatt), Frank Zappa (bass), Kevin McKendree (Grammy winner with Brooks and Dunne), Brian Setzer, Delbert McClinton (keys), Bekka Bramlett (daughter of Delaney & Bonnie, with Fleetwood Mac, Faith Hill, Vince Gill, etc.) and Kenneth Blevins (John Hyatt).

We certainly look forward to Shane and his band at Mt Baker R & B Festival in Deming, Washington, Saturday, August 5^{th} . It will be a great weekend as well as fun to reconnect a friendship.


