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

The Memory Maker

Making memories with Rocky Allen at the Best of the Blues Awards

If a picture is worth a thousand words, Rocky Allen has said quite a lot, very well. In addition to a lifetime of snapping great images, the Snohomish-based photographer and musician has been creating the "In Memoriam" slideshow for the Best of the Blues Awards since 2013.

He can't quite remember how he got started doing it, but now that he does, he pays more attention when he hears of someone's passing. He says he feels a little like a virtual undertaker, in that he spends time learning about the people who have passed the previous year, and then presenting them in an honorable way. He says he thinks about each individual and the people they left behind. He keeps them in mind as he spends the 30 to 40 hours every spring putting together the project.

Allen has been contributing to the Washington blues community since he arrived here more than a decade ago, as a bass player and as a photographer. He played steel guitar as a kid, but started his music career in earnest in his late 30s when his children were grown. As a founder of the West Coast blues group, The RoadDogz, Allen used his photography skills in service to the band's marketing and website as they transitioned to Seattle from their California base. In a cooperative effort between him and his then-girlfriend, they organized a group of friends and models called The RoadBabes, who followed the band. He honed his portrait skills doing photo shoots that would potentially benefit the band and the women's portfolios. "When I learned what a website was and that the entire world could see it, that's when my marketing instincts kicked in," he says. "The RoadBabes were responsible for a great deal of our publicity."

He also worked briefly for an Orange

County entertainment company, where he expanded to assisting other local bands with photography and video, including blues acts Karen Lawrence & Blue by Nature, White Boy James and the Shari Puorto Band. Seattle performers continue to utilize Allen's skills for their marketing packages, though he is semi-retired now. Polly O'Keary and the Rhythm Method are customers and fans. "Rocky is not only an amazing photographer, he is an amazing human being. Working with him, we have always felt very comfortable and relaxed, and that's part of the reason why we always get such great images from Rocky." He has dozens of different kinds of photography on his website, rockyallenphotography.com. The last time he played bass professionally was at the 2015 Freedom Fest with Terry Parker & the Back Alley Cowboys.

Allen works with Washington Blues Society Board members to come up with a list of recently deceased musicians for the slideshow. He then puts some thought into choosing the images and where to place them. He uses an older program called Aperture to input the photos and the names. The presentation is usually a combination of blues-inspired national and international performers, blended with local musicians and Northwest friends of the community recently lost. "I try to look at it from the perspective, especially with local people, that this is somebody that we know, that somebody loved."

The exercise inevitably brings up thoughts of his own mortality. Allen has had his share of challenges to his health in recent years. Hospitalized and near death at least twice in the last three years, the goodnatured 65-year-old wonders aloud, with a laugh, who will be putting this together when he's no longer here to do it. "Probably most of them didn't know they were going to die that year," he shrugs.



Sometimes he is called to use a photograph that he took. "The ones who really get to me," he says, "are the people who passed unexpectedly." He also realizes, though, that no matter who it is, death is the great equalizer. "It doesn't matter how famous you are or how much money you have, you're still going to die."

This year's Best of the Blues Awards ceremony takes place at the Northwest Music Hall in Everett. Allen is usually there to see it when it goes from the laptop screen to the big screen. Backed by live musicians, it's often experienced as the most powerful and memorable few moments of the show. Asked how he feels seeing the finished product at the theater, he hesitates. "Honestly...I'm sitting on the edge hoping it all goes down without any problems," he says, and then turns thoughtful. "I'm certainly communicating something."

While not playing or speaking, through the images and how they're presented, it's worth more than words to many in attendance. Allen helps us remember how important it is: these people, this music, this life.

As time went on, Joe Johansen and I were doing our best to live the life of the real patrons on Tacoma's historic Lower Broadway. I actually had my hair processed. It all happened at Felix's barber shop, the pool hall. I told him what I wanted done. He never asked why. He just asked me to get on the chair. Since he put a towel over my face I couldn't see what was going on, but It was very clear that there was more than Felix working on my hair and they were having a great time. When it was over I looked like a white boy whose hair was dead. It just kind of just laid there.

I started wearing a cap.

Blind Pitts was one of the more popular attractions on the street. Always dressed to the max and sitting in front of the Congo cafe in a Cadillac. Story was he had been a big time pimp for several years right up until his wife threw acid in his eyes for sleeping with one of his ladies. One of his ladies was Leana. She held court in a second floor room above the Congo Cafe. She had a boyfriend who was a real deal gangster. Leana and I were just hanging out together for laughs. That all stopped when I heard that he was getting out of the jail and WANTED TO TALK TO ME!

I'm thinking he is gonna kick my ass, shoot me or God only knows what. As it turned out, he wanted to thank me for looking out for his woman.

One evening Joe and I were eating in the Congo. The waitress brought us our food and I paid her. It gets better. She brought me my change.

He gives me the finger.


To date, Music4life Everett has raised over \$20,000 and provided over 300 instruments for Everett Public Schools.



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

A Fond Farewell to the Wildflower Wine Shop

Live blues with Miranda Kitchpanich, Jesse James, Andrew Cloutier & Nick Mardon

It was just a week after 'SNOWMAGEDDON' on March 9th at the Wildflower Wine Shop, a popular little restaurant and live music venue in North Bend.

I was booked for my very first headline gig, and needless to say, I was a little anxious and very excited. It was all thanks to Nick for this opportunity!

I had come to the Wildflower Wine Shop one night to see The Nick Mardon Blues Trio with Jesse James on bass as I had done many times before. I love sitting in with them and playing some of the songs that Nick and I did together at the 2019 International Blues Challenge in Memphis. Club owner Kimberlea Miller came out to the parking lot as the guys were packing up their gear after the gig and offered another date to Nick and his band.

Out of the blue, Nick smirks at me and tells to Kim "Hey, Miranda isn't doing anything that night."

So, that's how I got the gig. Kim had seen me on her stage countless times and was pleased to hear that Nick and Jesse would be backing me up as my band for that night. I absolutely love playing with these guys, especially together. Nick brought in Andrew Cloutier, a beloved local drummer with well-known talents. He's played festivals, the Highway 99 Blues Club and has been the drummer for Left Hand Smoke and Lee Oskar! I was a lucky girl with a line-up like that and I knew it.

We pulled together a set full of blues and classic rock. So, naturally, I went about inviting many of my favorite people. As I said before, the snowstorms had just ravaged the region and people were not sure they were going to make it out to the show.

As the room filled up with so many friendly



and loving faces, I began to get impatient to get started.

We opened with "Damn Right I Got the Blues" (Buddy Guy), and played two 90 minute sets that included some originals, plus "Ain't No Sunshine" (Bill Withers), "Rock and Roll" (Led Zeppelin), "Chain of Fools" (Aretha Franklin) and so many others that would not have been as successful without Nick, Jesse, or Andrew.

Thanks to these guys, I was able to lay every bit of what I had out on that stage that night. I still can't get over how full the room was and how loud that crowd was. I had invited so many people, at that point I had absolutely no idea who would show up (so many of them did!) It really meant the world to me to see so many close friends and family there for my first show as a headliner!

For the past few months, I've been stepping in to play bass with Jesse James and the MOB.

It's been such a good experience getting out there and playing with Jesse - it's given me the opportunity to share the stage with yet



another amazing musician. It has given me the chance to grow, learn, and adapt as a working musician myself. I love calling Nick my "Blues Partner." We've had some crazy adventures in our short time working together and I hope there is much more to come! Maybe next time I'll even have a set with more original tunes! And, as always, thank you so much to the Washington Blues Society for always being such a huge supportive part in my blues journey.

Blues you can use...



Steve Riley & the Mamou Playboys *Voyageurs* (Self-Released)

Steve Riley is the "real deal" in Cajun music, he is an acknowledged master of the Cajun accordion and fiddle. Steve formed the Mamou Playboys in 1988 and they have 14 releases with four being Grammy nominated in the Best Traditional Folk Album category, including their previous release Grand Isle. (Steve has another pair in side project winning a Grammy in 2012 with The Band Courtbouillon.) The 13 tracks on Voyageurs include four originals and three traditional songs with Mamou Playboy arrangements. The Playboys open Voyageurs with "Au revoir Grand Mamou" sung in Cajun French as is a majority of their music. Grand Mamou refers to the area in and around the town of Mamou in south central Louisiana. The next tune is "Plus Creux" a bounce song with about half the lyrics in English as they sing "you might find diamonds, you might find gold; but if you don't dig you will never know." The next track is a traditional song "Allons boire un Coup" which has a folky feel and a double-time beat. One of the standouts is the traditional "Bernadette" which got me tapping my toes immediately. Another is the Cajun accordion and fiddle romp "'Tite fillede la campagne" which also features some fleet-fingered guitar work. "Malcolm's Reel" is an instrumental with a brisk tempo and solos on accordion, fiddle and guitar. Voyageurs is a fun album which I highly recommended. Malcolm Kennedy



Brett Benton
Live at the Highway 99
Blues Club
(Country Blood Records)

The Brett Benton/Gordon Townsend Duo represented the Washington Blues Society at the 2018 International Blues Challenged where they were semi-finalists. Brett plays a heady mix of Northern Mississippi Hill Country Blues, Delta Blues and roots

music. The six tracks on the EP feature two originals and was recorded live at the Highway 99 Blues Club in 2017. Ed Maloney introduces Brett and Gordon and then they go into Mississippi Fred McDowell's "Kokomo Blues." Brett stays close to the original style; but with Gordon he they add distinctive Hill Country elements. Next up is the original "I Got a .45" a dark song with bristling slide guitar, pulsing drums and crashing cymbals. A name that resonates for many folks hearing the term Northern Mississippi Hill Country is RL Burnside and RL is represented well on "Miss Maybelle," which was on 2000 Fat Possum Records CD, Wish I Was in Heaven Sitting Down. Brett's take is particularly inspired. Brett and Gordon then open Mississippi Fred McDowell's songbook on "Shake 'Em on Down" with an exceptional update. Brett introduced the next one, an original, "Hard Love" saying, "this is the first song I ever wrote, and I was mad this day too" then proceeds to play a slow rolling blues Brett closes out the EP with Robert Johnson's "Preachin' Blues," a song he recorded at his final 1937 Dallas session. and was also the B side of the last 10" 78 rpm record released by Vocalion after Johnson's death in 1939. The A side was "Love in Vain.". They speed it up doing it in double time with several short tempo breaks giving it a unique feel. Brett is currently working on a new release and has some choice originals ready to go that he performs at his shows. Highly recommended. Malcolm Kennedy



Rockin' Johnny Burgin Neoprene Fedora (West Tone Records)

Rockin' Johnny opens his latest solo releasee

from 2017, Neoprene Fedora which is half spy movie theme music and half surf rock instrumental of the coolest kind, and there is an interlude that brings in a Chuck Berry element giving it a bluesy feel. "Guitar King" is a song by Andrew "Blueblood" McMahon whose long association with Howlin' Wolf gave his electric bass it's

nickname ("Howlin' Wolf Bass"). It is straight up post-war Chicago blues and shows Burgin to be a solid blues vocalist and a top-flight guitarist. Joining Rockin' Johnny on this CD is award-winning producer/guitarist Kid Anderson, Aki Kumar on blues harp, Bob Welch on guitar and piano, Alabama Mike on vocals, Nancy Wright on sax and June Core on drums. Johnny brings in Steve Wills on accordion and Billy Wilson on rub board for "Kinda Wild Woman," "Please Tell Me" and "Our Time is Short" giving them all a Louisiana feel. Alabama Mike takes the vocals for "Smoke and Mirrors" a relationship gone wrong song and "I Did the Best I Could" singing "we never argued, and we didn't fight/oh; but something went wrong and it never got right; but I did the best that I could" followed be a stinging guitar solo. Aki brings distinctive vocals and blues harp to his original "Self Made Man." Aki also sings and plays on a tune writtenby Chicago's singing and slinging drummer Willie Williams, "My Baby's Gone" with Rockin' Johnny channeling Hubert Sumlin and Aki doing Carey Bell's blues parts with Johnny "Cat" Soubrand playing Eddie Taylor's guitar lines. On "My Life's Enough for Me," Rockin' Johnny has an Albert King thing going on and closes out Neoprene Fedora with "Goodbye Chicago" as he laments the dearth of a blues scene in a city so closely tied to blues music. This album's the bomb. Malcolm Kennedy

Brian Butler Butler's Blues (Self-Released)

Brian Butler has been on the local blues scene for some time and his last CD, Wait All *Night,* was nominated by the membership of the Washington Blues Society as Best Blues Recording as is Butler's Blues for this year's awards. The album features 13 selections including 10 originals. In addition to solo gigs Brian is one of Brian Lee's Orbiters and plays in the new Spencer Jarrett Blues Band. Brian is an exceptional musician playing guitar and blues harp, his singing is top notch and his song crafting is also notable. Brian opens with "Johnny Young" a song about a mandolin player who was a regular on Chicago's famed Maxwell Street playing with Sonny Boy I and Muddy Waters in the early 40's and in clubs with Little Walter with few sides of his own and was rediscovered in the 1960's. One of the standouts on Butler's Blues is "Mississippi Woman. " This song is the real deal and deserves major radio play. The two of the covers are fairly obscure, "Lead a Horse to Water" by R&B/blues singer Earl Thomas and "Yonder Comes the Blues" by the sparsely-recorded folk rocker Fred Neil. The third cover is "A Nickle and a Nail" a song sung by O.V. Wright which Butler does in a beautiful mellow bluesy style. "Oxbow Blues" is a solid finger picking instrumental and "News About Billy" is a heartfelt song of the loss of a friend and life's lessons. Brian closes out the CD with "Place Pigalle" a song about a Pike Place Market venue steeped in Seattle history that ranges from the Klondike Goldrush to a blues dive in the 70s affectionately called "the Pig." Ask any musician around town who was active at the time on the blues scene and they will have tales about "Place Pigalle." I give the album my highest recommendation: An instant classic. Joe Blue & the Roofshakers Keep It Real (Self-Released)

The Fabulous Roofshakers began in 2006 and were quickly BB Award nominated for Best New Band. Founding members Bruce Koenigsberg on bass and Gordon Bensen on sax are still part of this dynamic band. Joe "Blue" Giorello (Tim Turner, Highway 99 All-Stars Band) has been the front man since 2013 and other Roofshakers are Conrad Ormsby on drums, Paul Sommer on guitar and Ron Baker on sax. Keep It Real is their first release as a unit. Joe Blue has been nominated for BB Awards in 2010 & 2015 for Best Harp and in 2015 for Best Sax. Keep It Real is a collection of nine well-selected covers from Louis Prima to War, Fats Domino to an uncredited Ronnie Earl. The Roofshakers open with Prima's classic "Jump Jive & Wail," a song given new life by the Brian Setzer Orchestra in 1998. BB King's "Got a Mind to Give Up Living" features touches of the Peter Green/ Fleetwood Mac version and the Butterfield Blues Band take from East-West with Joe blowing solid blues harp. Wille Dixon wrote "Back Door Man" for Howlin' Wolf and the opening guitar lines and rhythm recall the "Creeper Returns" with Gordon blowing some sweet sax. Lee Dorsay's "Get Out of My Life Woman" has been covered by Iron Butterfly, The Kingsmen, both Albert and Freddie King and was on East-West, too. "Bring It On Home," also by Dixon, is classic Sonny Boy Williamson II and is a tune Led Zeppelin famously covered, and this version fades out just like Sonny Boy's original. They close the album with a song frequently cited as the first rock & roll hit, Jackie Brenston's "Rocket 88 "with Joe on harp and Gordon on sax. Keep It Real is a solid outing. Malcolm Kennedy



Mary Lane Travelin' Woman (Women of the Blues Records)

Chicago blues promoter Lynn Orman and her new record label, Women of the Blues, has sparked Mary Lane's first CD in 20 years with Travelin' Woman. It reminds me of how Hound Dog Taylor and the HouseRockers compelled Bruce Iglauer to form Alligator Records (more on that in my review, Bitten by the Blues: The Alligator Records Story, June Bluesletter). I've seen Mary Lane at the Chicago Blues Festival and at downtown clubs over the past 15 years and I've thought that Mary Lane was a straight, unbroken link to blues artists who made the Great Migration from the South to the Chicago. Prior to leaving Arkansas, she sang with Howlin' Wolf, Robert Nighthawk, and James Cotton. After moving to Chicago, she sang with Junior Wells, Magic Sam, Howlin' Wolf and Elmore James when clubs like Silvio's Gatewood's Tavern and the 708 Club were hoppin.' On Travelin' Woman, awardwinning producer Jim Tullio and Mary Lane co-wrote nine of the 10 tracks (with the title track from Jim Tullio, Mary Lane and Leroy "Werewolves of London" Marinell). Standout tracks include "Travelin' Woman" with sax parts from Chicago Rhythm and Blues King Gene "Daddy G" Barge and Terry Ogolini, "Some People Say I'm Crazy," with Corky Siegel, "Make Up Your Mind" that artfully pairs Mary with Colin Linden on acoustic slide dobro and "Bad Luck and Trouble" with Chicago guitarist Dave Specter. Mary Lane is the subject of a documentary, I Can Only Be Mary Lane, that has screened at many film festivals. I urge Bluesletter readers to learn more about Mary Lane: Find the documentary, buy the CD and discover this Chicago blues treasure. Buddy Guy introduced her as "the real deal" at his club at a screening of the documentary last year, and he knows what he's talking about. Eric Steiner



Terry Robb Confessin' My Dues (NiaSounds))

The CD release party for Confessin' My Dues, co-sponsored by NiaSound and the Cascade Blues Association, kicked off Terry Robb's 2019 Spring-Summer tour of the Pacific Northwest, California and British Columbia on March 1st at The Secret Society Ballroom in the Rose City. As of press time, the tour has 60+ dates scheduled to showcase this exceptional 13song CD. Confessin' My Dues is Terry Robb's 15th solo recording and it includes a diverse set of music ranging from traditional ragtime and fingerpicking to stinging slide guitar blues. Terry Robb is one of the most accomplished and recognized bluesmen in the Pacific Northwest and he is a member of the Oregon Music Hall of Fame and the Cascade Blues Association Muddy Awards Lifetime Achievement and Hall of Fame. I was particularly impressed by Terry's slide work on "High Desert Everywhere" and the uptempo title tune. Terry's understated vocals fit "Heart Made of Steel" and a ballad about Highway 61, "Darkest Road I'm Told," nicely. "Now Vestapol," a bright instrumental, reminds me of classic fingerpickers like Chet Atkins and Doyle Dykes, and each time I listen to that song, I hear something new. Terry plays acoustic and Resonator guitars on a majority of the songs on Confessin' My Dues, and on the remaining cuts, seasoned Portland-based jazzmen Dave Captein (Tom Grant, Jessica Williams) play stand-up bass and Gary Hobbs (Stan Kenton, Michael Brecker) play the drums. On "Keep Your Judgement," Executive Producer and Photographer Stuart fingerpicker and Americana extraordinaire Adam Scramstand join the trio on backing vocals and rhythm guitar. Confessin' My Dues is new acoustic blues classic that I enjoyed from start to finish. Eric Steiner

Harpdog Brown
For Love & Money
(Dog House Records)

I'm admittedly a big Harpdog Brown fan, so this review won't be as objective as it probably needs to be. Over the last 20 years, I've seen him at Grinder's in Shoreline, in local International Blues Challenge competitions at blues society events in White Rock and Abbotsford, British Columbia and on the Kitchener Blues Festival Main Stage in Ontario. For Love & Money follows two strong 2016 blues CDs, Travelin' With the Blues and What It Is. For Love & Money features 13 songs that take us from the Crescent City, up the Mississippi Delta and Chicago on a diverse musical journey that includes jump blues, second-line, post-war harp-fueled Chicago blues and a classic interpretation of "Blue Light Boogie" from Louis Jordan and His Tympany Five. Harpdog's new band features Dave Webb on keyboards, Bob Grant on drums, Jeremy Holmes on "Doghouse Bass." A dynamic, three-piece horn section gives For Love & Money a big band feel with William Abbott on clarinet and alto sax, Jerry Cook on baritone and tenor sax and Skye Lambourne on trombone. Harpdog's original "Reefer Loving Woman" sounds like it's straight out of Tipitina's (or The Snug) in the Crescent City and a cover of Brandon "Yukon Slim" Isaak's "I'll Make It Up to You" is buoyed by jaunty clarinet work from William Abbott. Two of the songs are particularly fanciful: "Stiff" and "Vicious Vodka" are sure to be late-set crowd pleasers (especially when the alcohol is flowing). After listening to this CD a few times, I marveled at how adept Harpdog Brown is with a pen (or computer keyboard) as a songwriter as well as the harp. In addition to being a three-time award winner of the prestigious Maple Blues Award from the

Toronto Blues Society in the Harmonica Player of the Year category (2014, 2015 and 2016), Harpdog also has had three nominations in the Western Canadian Music Awards, received the Fraser Valley Music Award and a Juno nomination. In addition, Harpdog is the only Canadian blues artist who has won a Muddy Award in the Best NW Blues Release category from the Cascade Blues Association for his Home Is Where the Harp Is CD in 1995. In 2016, Harpdog was nominated for Maple Blues Awards in the Harmonica Player, Male Vocalist and Album of the Year categories for his 2016 CD Travelin' With the Blues. This year, Harpdog Brown & The Uptown Blues Band is nominated for Best Band in the Washington Blues Society's Best of the Blues ("BB Awards"). Natalie Hahn's CD design, 16-page booklet with lyrics and background from Harpdog and awardwinning producer Steve Dawson, sets the bar high for blues CD packaging. For Love & Money showcases a strong big band sound influenced by New Orleans and Chicago blues and will likely land on (or near) my list of "top 10" blues CDs released in 2019. Eric Steiner



Blues Traveling: The Holy Sites of the Delta Blues By Steve Cheseborough Updated and Expanded Fourth Edition University Press of Mississippi, 306pp,

The fourth addition of Steve Cheseborough's *Blues Traveling: The Holy Sites of the Delta Blues* is a book I recommend to every blues enthusiast. Even if you haven't traveled to the land where blues began, this well-researched book is an interesting and educational read.

The third edition of *Blues Traveling* had 258 pages and an 18-page index. The fourth edition tops 306 pages and has a 22-page index. The fourth edition includes extra pages on Beale Street in Memphis, the Mid-Delta Area which covers Tutwiler to Glendora including Rosedale, Dockery and Drew. The journey from Greenwood to Vicksburg also features new information on Indianola, Belzoni, Rolling Fork and Vicksburg.

Ten years ago, I reviewed the third edition of this book. The fourth edition is a substantial update to the earlier edition. *Blues Traveling* includes numerous sites that do not have official Mississippi Blues Trail markers and includes interesting information about many that do. There are helpful maps of regions and small towns to locate these sites off the beaten blues path.

Steve takes us down to towns like Alligator, the home of Robert "Bilbo" Walker's Wonder Light City juke joint and Shaw, the birthplace of David "Honeyboy" Edwards, in the MidDelta. We also visit Nitta Yuma, a small town south of Hollandale on Highway 61 that is home to Bo Carter's grave.

Many folks interested in the blues know that there is more than one grave marker for Robert Johnson. Last count, there are three headstones honoring Robert Johnson. There is also some uncertainty about the year Sonny Boy Williamson II (aka Aleck Miller) was born, too. Cheseborough takes thins far deeper into the region and folks who made the blues. The latest edition of *Traveling Blues h*as invaluable information on places like Mound Bayou, Margaret's Grocery and Market in Vicksburg, about churches, small museums and juke joints. Fortunately, the book offers suggestions for juke joints that still offer live blues in the Mississippi Delta.

Cheseborough's travelogue takes readers through important blues sites and towns from Memphis to the Delta with stops on Highway 1, Highway 61, Highway 49W and 49E to Highway 6 and the Natchez Trace Parkway. He also eloquently describes the Mississippi River, the Sunflower River and the Yazoo River, the Cold Water River and the Tallahatchie as well as railroad towns that have long been abandoned.

As someone with a strong interest in the artists who created and played the blues, I find the history described in the fourth edition to be fascinating, and in reading the pages of *Traveling Blues*, I learned of new places and people not on my blues radar.

My library contains more than 50 blues books and I find Cheseborough's book invaluable. I have had the opportunity to spend a few hours on Beale Street and Blues Traveling informed and enhanced my experience. I highly recommend *Traveling Blues*, particularly for blues fans who make the pilgrimage to Memphis and the Mississippi Delta. Malcolm Kennedy





Rockin' Johnny Burgin at the Salmon Bay Eagles

Chicago blues guitarist Rockin' Johnny Burgin has perfomed across the the world playing 250 shows a year. Born in Pennsylvania, Johnny Burgin grew up in Mississippi and South Carolina. He learned guitar parts from his father before moving to Chicago in 1988 to attend the University of Chicago where he was a DJ.

Quickly enamored with the blues, Johnny paid his dues and apprenticed with the Ice Cream Men with notable Chicago bluesmen Steve Cushing on drums, Scott Dirks on harp and Dave Waldman on guitar. Tail Dragger hired Johnny and they played four nights a week on the West Side with Lurrie Bell, Jimmy Dawkins, Little Arthur Duncan and Johnny Littlejohn. Burgin toured the Midwest with Pinetop Perkins and then

nationally with Sam Lay. In 1994, Burgin formed his own band with Jimmy Burns on vocals and guitar and they soon scored a Monday residency at Smoke Daddy. In 1996, Delmark signed Jimmy Burns with Johnny's band and released Johnny's debut *Straight Out of Chicago* in 1997 followed by *Man's Temptation* in 1998. Shortly after that, Johnny toured Europe and North America.

In 2002, Burgin took a break from music to be a family man. He returned in 2009 with four CDs between 2010 and 2017. In 2016, he moved to the wine country near San Francisco. There, he worked with harp masters Andy Santana and Aki Kumar and guitarist, producer Kid Andersen and others. Johnny worked on *DeLay Does Chicago*, *Tail Dragger Live at Rooster's Lounge DVD*, *Howlin at Greaseland: A Tribute to Howlin' Wolf* with Alabama Mike,

Tail Dragger and Terry Hanck.

Johnny's most recent solo CD, Neoprene Fedora, followed 2015's Greetings from Greaseland (Kid Andersen's studio). Rockin' Johnny has a live album in the works, and a new CD, Dos Hombres Wanted, with Spanish blues harp player Quique Gomez on VizzTone. In 2019, Johnny moved to Portland, and he plays the Salmon Bay Eagles for a very special show after a month-long tour of Japan and a show at the the Redwood Coast Music Festival in Eureka. Alabama-born and Southern-raised, Brett "Bad Blood" Benton has been obsessed with country blues ever since he was a child, listening to his parents' and grandparents' records at an early age. By his teens, he was playing behind a drum kit, and by his early 20's, was learning his way around slide guitar. In 2016, he left the South to perform his own brand of Delta and country-style blues around the country and the world. Currently in the Pacific Northwest, he has played many local, regional, and national festivals and a countless number of venues in just a few years' time, and most recently, he has signed with Seattle's own Knick Knack Records. His first studio release, You Got to Pray, is just out, and the CD will be available at the Blues Bash.

Benton has shared stages with his friend, Cedric Burnside, and with Walter Trout, the Selwyn Birchwood Band, Samantha Fish and International Blues Challenge winners Ben Hunter & Joe Seamons. Benton followed in their footsteps, winning the regional spot and going to Memphis the next year to represent the Washington Blues Society in the International Blues Challenge. Known for his fierce rhythmic finger-picking and melodic slide guitar, as well as his booming voice, Brett's raw style is best heard paying homage to its roots. He's exciting to watch, "stompin' and hollerin' " solo with acoustic slide guitar or playing electric alongside a heavy, dynamic style of drums that really emphasizes what country blues is all about: the hypnotic groove that gets folks up and dancing! This smokin' five-piece ensemble sizzles with soul and a rockin' blues-infused blend of originals and classics. Their

sound is mesmerizing, warm and polished. Composer, keyboardist, and vocalist Chris Cootsona founded the group and writes classically-trained guitarist and vocalist Nick Fair. These Seattle natives welcomed Chicago-born Lauren Santi as the lead vocalist, adding fiery flare and a sophistication beyond her years. With Keith Moon-influenced, LA session-player Will Bagby on drums, and longtime Bay Area musician Bill DeHart on bass, the group comes together like a secret recipe where each stand-out ingredient complements the others. Originally scheduled to play back in February, when we had to cancel due to weather, TuN agreed to come back in the spring. We are so excited to feature this band whose music breathes new life into the funky sounds of the '60s and '70s. Check out their new single "Cicero" from their album now in production, at tuntheband.com, and come check them out in person on Tuesday, May 14.

Music on Main brings a special live music event to historic downtown Ritzville, Washington

Blues, Southern rock and country sounds are destined for Main Avenue in Historic Downtown Ritzville on Sunday, May 26, 2019. Free live entertainment is being made possible through the efforts of Brenda Owens and her H.E. Gritman Building nonprofit organization.

The new event is free to all ages and will include music, vendors and raffle drawings. Music on Main will coincide with the annual Ritzville Classics on Main car show hosted by the Ritzville Classic Car Club. The stage will be located on Washington Avenue adjacent to Main Avenue where the car show's participants have their vehicles on display.

Music begins at 12:05 PM with four Pacific Northwest bands gathering to liven up the Memorial Day weekend Spring Fest events in Ritzville. Sheri Roberts Greimes with JoMomma opens things. The Hankers take over at 1:45 PM. The Sara Brown Band turns up the heat at 3:30 PM. At 5:15 PM, Sammy Eubanks comes on board to take us out with a bang with special guest Peter Rivera (Rare Earth) joining him in his set!

Owens is combining her love of music with a passion for restoration of the H.E. Gritman Building, which she owns. The classic structure is located at the heart of Ritzville's Historic Downtown. While Owens resides in Montana, she has spent the past year implementing a plan to fully restore the two-story brick building constructed in 1902 by H. E. Gritman. A corner turret with conical roof and a corner tower room on the second story make this building a true icon.

Music has long been in Owens' veins. She currently helps coordinate the Big Sky Blues Festival in Noxon, MT. Knowing how popular the former Ritzville Blues, Brews & BBQs was during its 18-year run, Owens set out to bring music back to Main Avenue. Memorial Day Weekend is the perfect opportunity. It's the annual gathering for the Ritzville Alumni on Saturday. The weekend features Art in the Park on Saturday and Sunday, Alumni Banquet on Saturday night, Classics on Main on Sunday and the Ritzville Fire Department Pancake Breakfast on Monday. And now, Music on Main!

For a first effort, Owens' has ensured that the music will be epic.

Sheri Roberts Greimes has a beautiful, powerful voice worthy of any blues stage. In fact, it has been said that Sheri "Can sing the blues like nobody's business." She will be joined by her band, JoMomma.

Earlier this year Sheri competed in the International Blues Challenge in the solo/ duo category. Her powerful voice and bluesy, country rock sound has earned her many accolades. She has been nominated for the Washington Blues Society's 2019 Best Female Blues Vocalist and Best Solo/ Duo Performance.

The Hankers deliver a strong mix of country, Southern rock and blues and they do so using a powerful combination created by a wicked fiddle player and a fiery, vivacious lead vocalist that has a sultry southern voice.

Front man Keith Niehenke uses his fiddle and bow to energize the stage. Julie Layne Niehenke turns that up a notch when she lets loose with her vocals. This band brings extraordinary vocals and powerhouse instrumental talent.

The Sara Brown Band, based in Kettle Falls, can take an audience's breath away. When you hear "Don't Mess with a Redhead from Stevens County," don't take the lyrics for granted. That tune can only be about Sara Brown. She packs powerhouse vocals in with a stylish, traffic-stopping stage presence. Her musical influences should provide a few clues. She pays homage to some legendary vocalists, listing Etta James, Billie Holiday and Beth Hart among her top inspirational favorites.

Rounding out the night is Sammy Eubanks,



and he and Ritzville have some serious history. Eubanks played there at least 10 times during the previous festival's run. He even anchored the Friday night kickoff parties at the fairgrounds.

Sunbanks Blues Festival coordinator Billy Stoops sums it up: "If you can look up 'cool' in the dictionary, you'll see this cat's picture."

Sammy's often referred to as "The Voice." He's won Best Male Vocalist 12 times and is a Hall of Fame member on the Inland Empire Blues Society, an organization he helped create.

He's spent a lifetime thrilling audiences and building a music legacy that has evolved into a national touring band. Earlier this year Sammy Eubanks & The Work'In Class represented the Washington Blues Society and advanced to the finals of the 35th International Blues Challenge and captured second overall out of a field of 260 Blues acts.

Washington Blues Society Sets Local Competitions for 2019 International Blues Challenge

The Washington Blues Society's local competitions for the 2020 International Blues Challenge in Memphis have been set! It's time for bands and solo/duo acts to make their plans to compete. One band and one solo/duo act will represent the Washington Blues Society (WBS) in Memphis at the world's largest gathering of blues musicians on January 28th through February 1st of 2020 on Memphis' fabled Beale Street.

We are working with the Inland Empire Blues Society (IEBS) to hold semi-finals across the state to make it easier for blues acts to participate. We will hold semi-final competitions on Monday, May 27th in Snohomish, WA at Collector's Choice Rest, on Sunday, June 2nd in Tacoma, WA at Airport Tavern, on Sunday, June 9th in Anacortes, WA at the Rock Fish Taproom, on Sunday, June 16th in Cashmere, WA at Club Crow, on Sunday, June 23rd in Vancouver, WA (TBA) and on Sunday, June 30th in Spokane. WA at Bridge Press Cellars. The finalists will compete on Sunday, August 11th in Everett, WA. If we receive more than 10 applicants for either event, our Board may select applicants via a lottery at the May 2019 Board meeting.

Each competition will follow the rules of the Blues Foundation. Each set will be limited to 25 minutes, and each competitor will be allowed one 15-minute set change. Any blues act that in resides in WA, OR, ID, MT, BC or ALB, may enter, and the act must include at least one who is a member of the WBS. Membership can be established at IBC entry, using the membership form in the WBS Bluesletter or online at www.wablues.org. Please note: Membership in CBA, IEBS or Idaho/Montana based Blues Society is accepted in place of the WBS membership requirement. The contest entry application may be downloaded from www.wablues.org, or in the April and May edition of the WBS Bluesletter and must include the non-refundable entry fee, which pays for the backline and a PA system. Each winner will be required to perform at a minimum of two fundraisers in 2019 and one fundraiser in 2020 at no charge. Proceeds from these events and fees, will be deposited into a WBS fund to help defray expenses to get each winning act to and from Memphis, but we cannot guarantee an "all-expense paid" trip. Band entry fee is \$30; solo duo entry fee is \$15. Applications and entry fees must be received no later than Thursday, May 14th.

All proceeds will help with expenses for Memphis. The WBS will help winners in fundraising, but cannot guarantee that all expenses for Memphis will be covered. Judges will evaluate each act using the Blues Foundation scoring criteria (www.blues.org/ibc/scoring.php) and rules (www.blues.org/ibc/rules.php). Acts may not be affiliated the WBS Board or act upon application. IBC rules also prohibit any act from competing three consecutive years at the IBC (www.blues.org/ibc/rules.php). Application is an initial statement of interest and not a binding agreement between the applicant and the WBS. Make your plans to enter now! Applications and entry fees must be received no later than Thursday, May14th.


