Been a great start to the summer so far! June is the month that we hold our International Blues Challenge Semi-Finals, and we have completed three so far.

We started off in Snohomish at Collector's Choice Restaurant & Lounge. This was an action

packed day with talented musicians presenting their music for consideration by our volunteer judges. There were many highlights: At the end of the day, Eric Rice's Slide Pocket moved on as a Band and Brian Butler moved as a Solo/Duo. Wild cards were the T-Town Aces in Band and Brett Benton in Solo/Duo. Each entrant played well and it was a great day of music.

The following week, we were in Tacoma at the Airport Tavern, a fun little bar that reminded me of the clubs that used to make up Pioneer Square. It was a short line-up, but some very talented musicians laid it all out in their sets. A new Randy Oxford's Blues line-up moved on to the finals in the Band category, and a band we had at a recent Blues Bash, TUN finished in the wild card spot. The RooTsters moved on in the Solo/Duo. The Airport Tavern is a fun establishment and has an active line up of music and other fun activities. They had a pinball tournament after our event and it's been a long time since I've seen so many cool pinball machines!

The following Sunday, we were in Anacortes at the Rockfish, home of Anacortes Brewing, one of our corporate partners. There wasn't an empty seat all day long and it was an extremely talented line up. Canada's Harpdog Brown and his Traveling Blues Show played a strong set and moved on to the finals in the Band category. Rafael Tranqulino came in a very close second place and moved on in the wild card. John Greyhound Maxwell moved on in Solo/Duo.

We still have events in Cashmere at Club Crow and in Spokane at Bridgeport Cellars. Both of the events have talented line-ups too! This will be another year that the state of Washington and the Washington Blues Society will be well represented! Reserve Sunday, August 25th for International Blues Challenge finals! It will be a full day of great music!

I also want to give a shout-out to Jim Allchin and his team for their well-deserved second place finish in the Blues Category of the International Songwriters Competition! Very prestigious!

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


Rocky Nelson's Greek blues odyssey takes a snapshot of today's blues scene in Athens and Mark Dalton recalls electrifying evenings in Seattle's Pioneer Square in the late 70s and early 80s at Hibble and Hyde's with Issac Scott and Albert Collins. Michele D'Amour captures Grammy-winning producer Lawrence "Boo" Mitchell's work on the latest Michele D'Amour & The Love Dealers CD, *Heart* of Memphis, recorded in Willie Mitchell's legendary Royal Studios during this year's International Blues Challenge week in Memphis.

I am also pleased that the Washington Blues Venue Guide has returned in print this issue. While it doesn't capture the 300+ venues of our more robust and interactive online resource on our web site, it provides a quick overview of venues that offer live blues throughout the Pacific Northwest (including the Inland Empire).

Next month, I plan to include a preview of this year's Washington Blues Society International Blues Challenge statewide finals scheduled for the waterfront stage at the Port Gardner Landing in Everett on August 11th. The Port Gardner Landing is home to the Thursday night Music at the Marina summer concert series which features Aaron Crawford playing Americana on July 11th followed by the award-winning Stacy Jones Band on the 18th (my birthday!) and the Dusty 45s on the 25th. Next month, the Randy Oxford Band returns to the Port Gardner Landing on the 8th followed by the Mark DuFresne Band on the 15th, Leroy Bell and His Only Friends on the 22nd and Clinton Fearon on the 29th.

Until next month, please add our monthly second Tuesday Blues Bash to your calendar, and more importantly, bring a friend!



Regional Blues Festival Previews

Wallace Blues Festival: July 12-14 Anyone who has been will tell you that the Wallace Blues Festival is Capital F Fun. The entire three block downtown area is blocked off with Wallace Blues Festival stages! You can have a cocktail or beer anywhere on the street. There are shops, vendors, restaurants and museums all around this friendliest of scenic Idaho mountain towns. Wallace is on I-90, about 70 miles east of Spokane. There are rooms in Kellogg, only nine miles away with a shuttle to Wallace, as well as never full \$10 camping at the high school with showers and bathrooms. Sammy Eubanks has been a big part of the Wallace Blues Festival since it began eight years ago. He has started the party on Friday night at The Red Light Garage and he has ended it with his All Star Sammy Jam on the Main Stage every Saturday night. This year, we are honoring his amazing achievement of finishing 2nd place at the International Blues Challenge in Memphis. Sammy put together a band of veteran Pacific Northwest players and achieved what several hundred blues bands from across the world could not. We have asked Sammy to bring this All Star Band together to headline the festival, so that we may see their International Blues Challenge set and honor them for this achievement. Also on the Main Stage will be Ghost Town Blues Band, a modern blues band with an intimate knowledge of blues, rock and improvisational jams. This Memphis-based 2014 International Blues Challenge second place winner is not your grandpa's blues band. Their live show has been captivating audiences in the U.S. and Canada with second-line horns, cigar box guitars and electric push brooms, Allman Brothersstyle jams and a rapping trombone player. They've promised to march right through downtown Wallace! The Main Stage will also feature Diego Romero Band, a young man that has become a favorite of the Inland Northwest. Spokane native Tim Langford brings his rockin' Blues Music Awardnominated Too Slim & The Taildraggers to the stage and the sweet heart of the Inland Northwest, Sara Brown, brings her band and big voice as well. There are 20 acts on four stages, including Bobby Patterson, Tuck Foster, Zach Cooper, Shuffle Dawgs, and a blues breakfast on Saturday and Sunday at The Elks with Kenny James Miller Band playing acoustic and Inland Empire Blues Soeiety Best New Blues Artist, Jan Harrison. On the Wrong Side of the Tracks

I'm not really sure why but I have always had an interest in criminals. No one in my family except for my late uncle Elmer, had ever been in prison. As it turned out he had nothing to do with his wife's demise. The actual culprit was her mother.

Enough about that. let's get back to my fascination with the underworld. It really went into high gear when I started working as a musician. The South end of Tacoma was where I met up with the real deal. All I can say is his first name was John. He had complete control of the taverns and night clubs in that part of town. If you had eyes to work out there, you worked for John.

One example of our fear of him: I received a call from one of his people saying John wanted to talk to me NOW. What to do? Go talk with John RIGHT NOW! A fellow musician made the drive out to one of his places and we were met by one the same people. He had us sit down in an office and tells us John will be right in. Didn't happen. We were waiting for at least an hour and too afraid to get up and leave. Finally, the guy comes back and says we are to start that night. When I ask why, I was told that the band they had hired broke the contract and that one of John's friends would take care of it. NO PROBLEM. Luckily, we didn't have a job at the time. We lasted one night. No thanks, no money.

Did we complain? What do you think?

Then, there was the time Joe Johansen and I set up camp at a flea bag apartment on Pike Street in Seattle. The manager had a thing for musicians so we were living rent-free. We were down to playing teen dances with a KJR disc jockey name of Jockey John Stone and singing for drinks at The Roll In tavern. Then we met Little Bob. Bob had a convertible, was dressed to the nines and had lots of \$\$\$. He also was a pimp and made a great living loaning money and charging big bucks in interest. Joe and I wanted to be like Little Bob in the worst way. He finally introduced us to a working girl by the name of Jane. The deal was if she was arrested, we were to bail her out. We also paid for a place for her to live. This all came out of what money she made and turned over to us.

Looking back now, I can't believe we were OK with this.

Well, the first night she went out, some jerk beat her up. She came back to our place and went in the bathroom. Little Bob told us that she felt she had failed us and that we needed to kick her ass. We are thinking someone already did that and called bull on Bob's advice.

He said "go ask her."

Turns out she agreed with Bob. OK, we weren't up for being pimps.

What else ya got? He asked us to make a trip to this address and get the money he was owed from a loan. Not a big deal. Joe and I wanted to look as much like gangsters as possible, so we wore black shirts and white ties. It was decided that Joe would go the door and get the money. I would wait in the car. The next thing I know, the guy is yelling at Joe and he has a gun! Then, he fires one off up in the air.

That's it for me, I start driving away and Joe is running after me. What are we gonna tell Little Bob? The guy wasn't home.

OK, I'm living in California trying to make a go of it before I move my family south. We take a job at a club in Hollywood called the Classic Cat. The place is being run by two dudes by the names of Sparky and Big. They both looked and acted like mob guys. One afternoon we decided to go in the place for a drink. There is a band auditioning. Not a big deal, we are booked for two weeks. These guys are REAL bad. I mean REAL bad. We are sitting behind the two managers.



Once the guys finally end the song, they are asked how much they are charging. They come in real low and are told they will start that night. Both the bosses turn around with, "You guys are done."

Again, did we get paid? Again, what do you think?

A Magical Night at Royal Studios in Memphis Recording the Heart of Memphis CD with legendary producer Lawrence "Boo" Mitchell

Being at Royal Studios for recording our fifth album, Heart of Memphis, earlier this year was a magical and humbling experience. It wasn't the gold records that got me, or the signatures of famous musicians on the wall. The key moment was when I was in the vocal booth, where there was an old microphone in the corner, and Grammy-award winning producer Lawrence "Boo" Mitchell pointed to it casually and said, "That's Al Green's mic."

Wait, what? I grew up listening to Al Green. Just being in the same room with his old microphone was an honor. And, no, I didn't touch it.

How did we get to that point? Well, in 2018, while we were preparing to compete in the Washington Blues Society's International Blues Challenge, we had a band meeting and decided we would go to Memphis as a group regardless of the outcome. We made it to the finals in Snohomish (and lost to Sammy Eubanks) but our album, Wiggle Room, did very well on the Roots Music Report (#1 for 13 weeks) and two of the songs from that CD won Global Music Award bronze medals. It seemed like a great time to go, so we made our travel plans.

At the same time, I was setting things up to make the most of the trip. I let the Washington Blues Society know that we would be in Memphis as a group during IBC week, and that we'd love to play the Pacific Northwest Showcase. I also put my name in with the National Women in Blues, which chooses their showcase participants by lottery. Both showcases came through, and then I got the idea to record an album while we were in Memphis. I had already written several songs, some of which we had been performing live. The song "Another Sleepless Night," which opens the album, was part of our set at the Washington Blues Society's finals.

I thought long and hard about where to

record. Sun Studios came to mind, of course; and then a friend recommended Royal Studios. A bit about Royal - it's in a building that was originally a theater and was converted to a studio in 1957. It's one of the oldest perpetually running studios in the world! Willie Mitchell, who was originally a trumpet player, was instrumental to the modern Memphis soul sound and brought the studio to a new level after taking on the producer role in 1969. In addition to Al Green, Mitchell worked with Ann Peebles, George Jackson, and Bobby 'Blue' Bland, to name a few. Lawrence "Boo" Mitchell, Willie's son, runs the studio today and has worked with his own amazing roster of talent. When I reached out to him about recording there, and sent him some of our past recordings, he could not have been more gracious, and we lucked out because there was a recording slot open for us!

Fast forward to late January 2019. The band is in Memphis, we've performed at both the Pacific Northwest and the National Women in Blues showcases, and have been having a great time seeing friends, listening to the bands in the challenge, and doing some sightseeing; Michele D'Amour and the Love Dealers band being me, Patrick McDanel (bass), Dave Delzotto (drums), Jeff Cornell (guitar), Brian Olendorf (keys) and Noel Barnes (sax). One of my favorite moments was Patrick and Brian buying matching black satin embroidered jackets at Lansky **Brothers!**

We all piled into the van and drove to Royal Studios, unloaded our gear, set up, and dove right in with "Memphis Soul Stew," the King Curtis classic, and the only cover on our album. Royal Studios has an atmosphere I can only describe as magical; certainly the energy of all the great players who have worked there and the music they've made permeates every inch of the place.

We ended up recording six songs that night, ending at around 1:30 a.m. Boo handed





me my hard drive with the recordings that I guarded with my life until I handed it to Steve Feasley, an amazing engineer here in Seattle with whom we've worked on each of our albums.

We weren't sure what we were going to title

the album until Jeff Cornell, our guitarist, and I co-wrote "Heart of Memphis" shortly after we got home. We recorded that song and one other tune here in Seattle, added some backing vocals here and there, recorded a horn section on three tunes, added some solos, and we were on to mixing and mastering and all the fun finishing work that goes into an album.

As of May 15th, we've learned that Heart of Memphis debuted on the Roots Music Report's jazzy blues chart at #3, two weeks before its release date! Wiggle Room is still on that same chart at #6, more than eight months after its release. We never expected to have two albums on the charts at the same time!

Issac Scott Plays the Blues

"Of all Pacific Northwest blues players, Issac Scott stands out for his absolute commitment..."

Sometime around 1975, Isaac Scott showed up in Seattle. Legend has it that Isaac's uncle was down at the Boulder Café on First Avenue listening to Tom McFarland play the blues. His uncle decided that Isaac, new in town at the time, just had to come down and give Tom a listen, so he called over to where Isaac was staying on the pay phone, said "Isaac, you gotta get down here and check this out!" and he held the phone up toward the bandstand so Isaac could hear the music. Isaac came down, McFarland talked to him on a break and immediately got him up onstage to sit in, and Isaac's musical career in Seattle started that night! Pretty soon Isaac was playing at the Boulder Café too, both with McFarland and with his own rough trio (backed by a young Twist Turner and Don "Jr. Earl" McNeff who was trying - with mixed success - to learn the bass). "The Isaac Scott Band" got more serious when I was recruited on bass along with Kim Field, fresh back in town from the East Coast, on harmonica.

Here's an excerpt from an article I wrote for the fourth issue of the fledgling Washington Blues Society *Bluesletter* of July, 1989, reflecting on my long friendship with "Seattle's Big Time Bluesman" and his importance to our local music scene:

Of all Pacific Northwest blues players, Isaac Scott stands out for his absolute commitment to the music, and his willingness to illuminate the darkest corners of the soul for the enlightenment of us all. Isaac Scott gives you the news, what's happening right now, and he delivers it as directly, forcefully and honestly as it comes.

As I look back over my long friendship with Scott, a number of things spring to mind. I can remember long nights in the dives on First Avenue - Pig Alley, The Victorla, The Ridge - dangerous places, I suppose, but back then they had an exhilarating edge to them that gave everything a kind of neon clarity. You never knew just who you might be playing for, but if you played it right, it was a sure thing they would respond. Scott knew how to get it right, if it took all night. Sometimes it did take all night. But back then, time seemed a small thing, and there was plenty of it. If it took 45 minutes to get a shuffle worked around to just the right groove that would empty every seat in the house onto a sweating, writhing, shouting dance floor, a 45 minute shuffle was what it would be. And the spirit would spread, with Isaac's guitar slashing the air in rich laser bursts of sound, driving home the blues' transcendent message. As James Brown once said, "We're here, and we might as well make the best of it."

Things got even more intense when The Isaac Scott Band hooked up with Albert Collins for a series of gigs spanning several years. Many of these nights were at Hibble and Hyde's, a long-gone club next to Doc Maynard's in Pioneer Square. Back in the



late-70's and early 80's, Hibbles was a cooking club that ran live music until 4am; a perfect club for "The Master of the Telecaster," who seemed to be just warming up when most humans were ready to topple from exhaustion.

A typical evening at Hibble's would start off with Collins arriving a little before showtime, having driven straight through from Los Angeles to Seattle. He'd haul his monster Quad Reverb into the club, plug it in, and we'd be off for 90 minutes of mind-bending music. There were times when Scott and Collins would be almost nose to nose, grinning, sweat pouring off them and everyone else in the club, both guitars just streeling out sheets of sound and I knew, any second, the ceiling was going to crack overhead... 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Athens Blues: Still Alive & Well

Blues on the Road

A blues traveler retraces his steps of 46 years ago... By Rocky Nelson

This past Easter, I returned to Athens for the first time in 40+ years. Beginning somewhere between Iraq and a hard place near the Garden of Eden on the highway to hell, I left dust storms, scorpions and "ships of the desert" (camels) behind for the birthplace of democracy. Athens, the ancient home to philosophers Aristotle, Plato and Socrates and the playground of gods and goddesses like Zeus, Apollo, Aphrodite and Athena, is now a lively, sprawling modern metropolis home to over 3M people. I settled into the port of Piraeus (the "naval" of Athens) recalling my earlier visit in 1973.

A warm spring sea breeze blew softly and the sweet smell of orange blossoms filled the air. Although now somewhat gentrified, Piraeus is still awash in local character. Sea creatures, street urchins and salty dogs ply their trade and go about their business. Boutique hotels double perfectly for crash pads while one scouts about. It's easy to get to Piraeus from the airport on the local metro rail or public bus. High speed ferries make the port an ideal departure point for Aegean island-hoppers. Massive cruise ships drop off tourists like invading war parties of olden times to see the historical sites.

I followed the crowd to the Parthenon. Butterflies danced on wispy thermals above hordes of tourists moving in waves on aged paths around the Acropolis. Alley cats still rule the roost here as they eye you warily for a snack. To escape the hustle and bustle, I called a few local Greek musicians to learn about the blues scene in their mother country during the same week of this year's Washington Blues Society "BB" Awards.

Michael Limnios and Theo Alexiou were

eager to talk about Athens' blues scene. While overlooking the Athenian Rivera, we began a three-day marathon of questions and answers focused on the blues. Michael is a well-known blues writer in Athens and has interviewed Johnny Winter, Buddy Guy, John Lee Hooker, BB King and Koko Taylor. Theo was once a Proedrikí Frourá, a member of the Presidential Guard, esteemed duty for Greek servicemen. Now, he is a legit blues guitarist inspiring a new generation to enjoy the blues.

I asked Michael for his personal take on the blues in Greece.

"Local bands have accompanied American artists who performed in Greece," he said. "Some of the more popular artists who have visited our country include Louisiana Red, Hubert Sumlin, Joe Louis Walker, Johnny Winter, Phil & Buddy Guy, R.L. Burnside, Junior Wells, Albert King, Screaming Jay Hawkins, Luther Allison, Otis Rush, Magic Slim, John Mayall, Son Seals, Koko Taylor, John Hammond, Katie Webster, Shemekia Copeland and Irma Thomas."

While Athens has yet to establish a permanent blues club, venues like Kyttaro, Gagarin, and the Half Note Jazz Club offer live music that includes blues. Many large, open air summer festivals feature blues artists, too.

I was particularly interested in Theo's playing in the US and his 2017 CD with Theo & The Boogie Sinners, *Made with Greece. Made with Greece* is a concept CD with musicians from Greece, the USA and Australia (including players of Greek heritage). American Blues veteran Tommy

McCoy wrote the songs, which include tributes to BB King and Albert Collins.

"I put together all the Greek elements I had into one project," said Theo. "These elements combine blues-rock and Greek tales from the past, such as the Battle of Marathon and to today's "Dark Days." The album was reviewed by the Blues Blast near Chicago and tracks like "Gone to Marathon" is fully enriched with Greek elements and history and it got some really great reviews. The BB King tribute track, "The King Is Gone," made it to the rock "Top 100 charts" in the Netherlands reaching third place for three weeks in a row."

I asked Michael about contributions Greece has made to what Morgan Freeman considers "America's Classical Music."

"Greek-Irish writer Patrick Lafcadio Hearn was one of the first journalists who wrote and dealt extensively with Afro-American music such as field hollers and work songs in the 19th century," said Michael. "The emergence of the blues in Greece is connected to a popular national music called "Rembetiko" which began at the coasts of Asia in 1920 - areas then considered Greek and now Turkish. The Greeks are a people deeply connected with marine life. "Rembetiko" was considered underground music and was mostly listened to by pimps, alcoholics, drug addicts and lovesick people. Recordings were made in Astoria, New York, and "Rembetiko" music, which faded away in 1941, was named "The Greek Blues." I can still remember Charlie Musselwhite telling me when he was in Chicago he listened to "Rembetiko" on the radio and he understood the similarities it

had with the blues (mostly instrumental parts)."

"When artists of Greek heritage, such as Johnny Otis, Nick Gravenites, Frank Zappa, and Alexis Korner exist, how can one not be proud of a nation with a population of 10 million people where you can keep the blues alive? People like Shuggie Otis, Chris Cain, Bill Perry, Rocky Athas, Niko Lyras, Sam Samudio (Sam the Sham and the Pharaohs), Johnny Nicholas, Emilio Castillo (Tower of Power) are of Greek heritage and have been an inspiration to many musicians based on their unique interpretations of blues music."

"Today, things are in transition," continued Michael. "There are many bands poised to break onto the international blues scene such as Theo & The Boogie Sinners, Blues Cargo, Blues Wire, Nick & The Backbones, Daddy's Work Blues Band, The Jumpin' Bones, Shady Roots, Dimitris Rousopoulos, Blues Family, Blues Trackers, Dustbowl, Blue Flames and Eliana Nikolopoulou, The blues don't have a country or color. If you feel them you can play them! A local scene does exist, but it is in a state of siege so to speak. We all feel that we are underground and underdogs. This, of course, is nothing new to the bluesmen we were inspired by".

Dimitris Rousopoulos, songwriter and one man band, met Michael and me for coffee and conversation a few days later.

"The first blues song I heard was Lightning Hopkins on the local radio when I was 10 years old," Dimitris said. "This inspired me right then to learn how to play the guitar in the style of Blind Boy Fuller". The olive not falling far from the tree, he is a father of two musicians. "I also connected to the Lomax recordings through your Library of Congress and old vinyl LP's from local shops and bazaars." Noting that he currently plays solo acoustic gigs, I asked "what would you do to make things different for yourself?" Without skipping a beat he said proudly: "I would like for my new electric band to play nothing but Little Walter!"

Our conversation ended where sports teams have played for millennia, the Stadium. It is the spot of the world's first marathon finish, first present-day Olympic stadium and site of the first Olympic games.

I asked Michael, Theo and Dimitris how they were keeping the blues alive in Greece.

Michael summed it up nicely.

"The blues don't need us to keep them alive. We need the blues to keep us alive! The blues is not a local mission: The blues is a way of life and an expression of self. So, as Heraclitus said: "The sun is new each day." After all, Greek society keeps the blues alive because it gives its respect to the roots of the blues as we learn more and more about the blues. It is a universal nation of peace and love!"

As I left, I thanked them for their time and fabulous Greek hospitality.

To quote the late, great Johnny Winter, the blues is very much "Still Alive and Well" in Greece thanks to the tireless work, night after night and gig after gig, of bluesmen like Michael, Dimitris and Theo. Now, if they would just organize the cats so that they could tackle the pigeon problem...

H a d d e n Sayers Dopamine Machine A coustic

Dopamine

Dopamine Machine and Acoustic Dopamine are two individual self-released CDs released simultaneously by Hadden Sayers in 2018 before he was nominated for an Acoustic Artist award in the 2019 Blues Music Awards. For the electric Dopamine Machine, Hadden is on vocals and guitar with drums, bass and organ; on Acoustic Dopamine, he plays solo. On the electric CD, Hadden amps it up. Several are stout rockers, such as "Unsatisfied," "I Feel Love" and "Backbreaker." "Blood Red Coupe Deville" is a ballad, "Learning to Disappear" has an alternative rock feel and "Gravity" is a good folk-rock song. "Good, Good Girl" is billed as "Prince meets Devo in a blues bar." Enough said. To me, the standout is the thumping blues rocker "Hit the Road," featuring a pair of guitar solos first with picked, and then bent, strings and greasy slide. Sayers says "It was written without any concern for what genre it might fit into." A worthy goal met. I found more blues on the acoustic CD as Hadden gets more inside his songs playing acoustic. Sometimes, it blurs between blues, singer/songwriter and folk, but I like that. Ruthie Foster, for whom Hadden plays guitar, adds back-up vocals to both versions of "Waiting, Wanting," but Ruthie's vocals particularly shine on the acoustic CD. Other acoustic standouts include "Dopamine Machine," "Peppermint Patty," Good, Good Girl," and "Hit the Road." Malcolm Kennedy



Michele D'Amour and the Love Dealers Heart of Memphis (Blues Kitty Records)

Never being afraid of seizing the moment and capitalizing on an opportunity is a quality one must have to succeed in today's harried climate and it's certainly a sure fire way to fulfill your dreams. Michele and the Love Dealers took advantage of their trip to the birthplace of the blues during International Blues Challenge week this year by snatching up some available studio time at the legendary Royal Studios with owner, engineer and producer Lawrence "Boo" Mitchell. The seven new originals and the cover of a King Curtis classic were recorded live at Royal on a Friday night. They took those inspired tracks back to Seattle, added a bit of spice, and mixed it up for a May 2019 release as The Heart of Memphis. The Latin-flavored "Another Sleepless Night" opens the set and guitarist Jeff Cornell then throws down a gritty riff for the sordid tale of a woman scorned "Dirty Pool." The sultry rhumba, "Come On Over," features some fine piano, and sax man Noel Barnes, steps up for the first solo on the soul burner about hard luck and trouble, "Cradle to the Hearse." Drummer Dave Delzotto sets a frenetic pace for the funkified editorial of our frenzied world "No Time," with D'Amour laying out ironies of our instant gratification culture. The title track documents their trip to Beale Street and how the music seeps up from the very earth under the pavement in Memphis. The band pays tribute to the city on a romp through "Memphis Soul Stew," with each of the Love Dealers strutting his stuff on the spicy instrumental. The album closes with the Gospel blues of "Strange Angels," a bittersweet testament of the joy and pain found at a dancehall on any given night. This fifth album from Michele D'Amour and the Love Dealers may prove to be their finest effort as the group certainly did find the Heart Of Memphis and brought her home. Rick J Bowen



When likeminded souls come together and fuse their talents and ideas into a focused common message that is when they move from being a group of players to being "a band." The members of south Seattle five piece TÜN have been working together for years in other projects, finally sharpened their direction, and came together to record Mercury Retrograde released this past April. The nine song collection of all original tracks is mixture of dance floor ready poppin' funk, gritty blues rock and scorching hot neo-soul. Keyboardist and vocalist Chris Cootsona leads the band that features powerhouse lead vocalist and lyricist, Chicago born Lauren Santi, along with guitarist Nick Fair, Will Bagby on drums, and Bill DeHart on bass. The funky love song "Magic" opens the set followed by shifting modern blues about Santi's hometown "Cicero" that features some groovy drumming and piano work. Flair opens with some howling guitar before Santi get down and dirty on the gritty "Lonesome Road." Cootsma takes over lead vocals and does his best Adam Levine for "Match Like You" and Santi takes us to church on the lovely Gospel fueled ballad "Water Bearer." TUN then blends old school and new school on the clavinet driven "Trouble," the dynamic nod to Diana Ross' "Invincible," and a call out to "Move Your Body," on the dance floor anthem "Filthy Fifth." The set ends sweetly with the mid temp neo-soul of "Fade Away," allowing each player to shine one more time. Titling their debut Mercury Retrograde must certainly be a tongue in cheek contradiction for TÜN is certainly moving in a forward direction with this harmonious release. Rick J Bowen



Duke Robillard always brings his big tone and major six string chops to anything he plays and his veteran and longtime band is top notch. Add to that well-selected material and a host of special guests with six vocalists (including blues chanteuse Sunny Crownover), and you have a winning combination. The songs on *Ear Worms* are from Duke's early years and cut across genres. The CD opens with Dave Howard singing Duke's lone original, "Don't Bother Trying to Steal Her Love," a straight up 4/4 old school rocker with a driving beat. Duke takes the vocals on "On This Side of Goodbye" with Sunny on backing vocals. Legendary Brill Building hitmakers Gerry Goffin and Carole King wrote the song, first sung by the Righteous Brothers in 1966. Chris Cote sings "Living with the Animals," a bluesy ballad and the title track from a 1968 Mother Earth album. These are followed by Duke's sweet take on the folk standard often credited to Leadbelly, "Careless Love," rendered here as a breezy instrumental (one of several on the CD). Sunny Crownover joins 60s British pop singer Julie Grant on a duet bringing back soul singer/songwriter Arthur Alexander Jr.'s "Everyday I Have to Cry Some." Grant released that song in 1964 when she was on the charts with Petula Clark. Mark Cutler sings and plays guitar on Dylan's "I Am a Lonesome Hobo" and Sunny sings "Sweet Nothin's," which Brenda Lee took to #4 on the 1959 Billboard charts. Keyboardist Bruce Bears sings on Allen Toussaint's funky "Yes We Can Can" and drummer Mark Teixeira does the Neville Brothers' lush "Yellow Moon" featuring solos by Robillard and Bears. Duke also nods to Link Wray on an exceptionally good instrumental take on "Rawhide," one of the many highlights on this strong CD for me. Recommended.

Delbert McClinton & the Self-Made Men + Dana Tall Dark and Handsome (Hot Shot Records/30 Tigers)


Texas troubadour Delbert McClinton returns with a swaggering and swinging new album, *Tall, Dark & Handsome*, set for release on July 26th. McClinton's 26th album further explores the depths of blues, jazz, Americana and roots on 14 new, original new songs, written or co-written by McClinton featuring his charismatic rasp, razor sharp wit and mastery of regional vernacular on tall tales of life, love, hard luck and loose women. If Mark Twain were a blues singer, he most likely would have sounded like Delbert McClinton. The set opens with "Mr. Smith," a jumping Big Joe Turner-styled blues. The swampy "If I Hock My Guitar" has McClinton playing the part of a down n' out bluesman contemplating a visit to the pawn shop to lift him out of debt. The Django acoustic swinger "No Chicken On The Bone" features blazing fiddle from Stuart Duncan to help him spell out his infatuation with a mystery woman. The easy going "Let's Get Down Like We Used To" glides along with sweet southern sentimentality. The spicy tango "Gone to Mexico," takes us on a colorful get away south of the border, and McClinton spells out his contempt for a nefarious woman who broke his heart on the Rat Pack-styled track "Lulu." He then explores the complicated relationship between the unlikely pair of "Ruby and Jules" before revealing his own heart on the lovely sonnet "Any Other Way." The crew then picks up the horn section again and heads to Bourbon Street for a lively second line, "A Fool Like Me." Tall Dark and Handsome, should prove to be another cherished addition to Delbert McClinton's anthology. Rick J Bowen



Christone "Kingfish" Ingram is no stranger to the Pacific Northwest. His blistering set at the 2015 Waterfront Blues Festival when he was just 16 years old is still attracting welldeserved attention online, and each time he returns to the region, Kingfish mentors young musicians with developmental challenges as part of United By Music North America. His 2019 Alligator debut, Kingfish, is an exceptional mixture of hard-charging, introspective and traditional blues. In addition to that set at Waterfront, Kingfish has played the White House, appeared on television with Rachel Ray and Steve Harvey, worked with Bootsy Collins, Rakim and The Game, and developed his first animated music video. Over 20 years ago, I wrote in my blues column in Midwest Beat magazine that I thought Chicago's Steepwater Band embodied "the past, present and future of the blues." I didn't (and don't) type those words lightly. Now that the Steepwater Band appears to be in transition, I see some of the same timeless qualities of that band in Kingfish, truly a rare gem in a very, very crowded field of talented young bluesmen who play traditional blues. Produced by Tom Hambridge, Kingfish offers up a diverse set of 12 strong songs, including the explosive "Fresh Out" (with Buddy Guy and Keb' Mo' joining Kingfish on guitar), the throughtful and reflective "Been Here Before" (with Marty Sammon on piano adding just the right contemplative touches) and the sparse yet evocative "Hard Times" (with Keb' Mo' on Resonator guitar). After each listen to Kingfish, I'm particularly impressed with this 20-year old's command of the blues and I look forward to Christone's growth as a bluesman in his own right as well as a representative of the younger generation of bluesmen from Clarksdale, Mississippi, including bass player Anthony "Big A" Sherrod, pianist "Red Clay" Swofford and guitarist Omar Gordon. For its diverse selection of original material, first class musicians that joined Kingfish in the studio like Buddy Guy, Tom Hambridge, Keb' Mo,' Marty Sammon, Chris Black, Tommy McDonald and Rob McNelley, Kingfish will land on many blues critics (and blues aficionados') top 10 CD lists for 2019.



True Blue with the Mark Riley Trio and Stevie & the Blue Flames

It's such a treat to have two multi-award winners and true local blues legends for the July Bash.

First, the Mark Riley Trio with Tom Erak on bass and Marty Vadalabene on drums will start off the evening. Mark Riley's guitar prowess, songwriting skills, and heart-felt delivery are as legendary as his custom-made guitars and his dry sense of humor. Over the years he's racked up more than 20 "Best of the Blues" awards in various categories. His new CD is titled "One Word," and he'll be sharing songs from it along with some well-loved favorites. Riley says he picked up a guitar 54 years ago and he's not done yet. We're sure glad of that.

Stevie and the Blue Flames will bring their big sound and sweet groove to cap the night at Collector's Choice. Formerly Steve Bailey & the Blue Flames, the band features Bailey on blues harp and guitar. One of the sharpest dressed men in the blues, Bailey says he's gone back to the original name he used in his youth. In addition to the seven years he spent in the Isaac Scott Band learning from the best, Bailey says he formed Stevie and the Blue Flames in the early 1980s and has maintained a tight band ever since. True words: the band received the WBS "Hall of Fame" award in 2015. Since then, Bailey has traveled and played extensively in Spain, England and Colombia.

Bailey is joined by Ray Hartman on bass, Steve Blood on guitar and Mike Mathis on drums. Originally from Hawaii, Hartman is the former owner of American Music. He's also lived in Switzerland and Asia, and worked as musical director at Sheraton Hotels in Asia/Pacific. A lifelong bass player, he played with the Hardly Everly Brothers, Dick Powell, and the Stacy Jones Band.

Steve Blood compliments any band he's in with fiery yet understated guitar playing. A lifelong south sound native, he played with the Nu-Vines for 20 years, Randy Oxford



Band for six, and James King and the Southsiders for seven years. He is a solid, knowledgeable guitarist who loves the blues.

From Dayton, Ohio, Mike Mathis fell in love with drums and piano at six-years-old. In 1974 he went on the road with Chuck Berry and in the 80's hooked up with Bo Diddley. He recently hosted a popular jam in Albuquerque before moving to Seattle. This band has come from all corners of the world to play for us!
