Hi Blues Fans,

We had the Washington Blues Society statewide International Blues Challenge Finals at the Port Gardner Landing in Everett at the very end of August, and due to publishing and printing dates for the Bluesletter, this is the first opportunity to let you know

about the spectacular day of music that occurred. And, it turned out to be one of the best days of music that I personally have ever experienced. Each act brought their "A" game.

Going into the event, we had to change our date, and that lead to changing multiple other dates for other events, but with the help and coaching from the City of Everett and the Port of Everett, we were able to pull everything together. I will admit that I was worried we wouldn't be able to get the word out effectively and let everyone know about the changes to this event and others, but our team did a great job and I was so happy to see our blues community come out in record numbers!

We anticipated an audience of around 300-400 people at best, and we were surprised that attendance topped 700! Thankfully, most carpooled and we had space for the all the cars between the overflow and the main parking areas! The weather was pleasant, the new layout allowed more people to take advantage of the Beer Garden (A big shout out to Anacortes Brewing for their continued support) and the chairs we rented provided enough seating that everyone who attended was comfortable and had as good a time as I did!

And as I stated earlier the music was stellar! The day opened with Flying Blind, a new duo to our community. They set the bar high and we were off and running. Rafael Tranquilino brought a band of allstars with him and got the crowd up on their feet and many of them stayed up for the rest of the day! Stanislove brought his RooTsters duo to the stage next and didn't allow anyone to catch their breath with a solid set of originals and vintage covers. Eric Rice brought his new band up, The Slide Pocket, and rocked Port Gardner. Brian Butler took the stage next and showed us all why he deserved to be there as he played many originals from his newest CD.

Bobby Patterson and his band followed and treated us to an excellent set driven with stellar guitar work. Blue Moon Marquee barely got to the venue in time due to challenges at the border, but they didn't let the stress of the trip affect them and put on a show that keep everyone enthralled. The T-Town Aces took the stage next and laid down a solid set of very traditional blues. Robert and Randy followed with a solid set that featured a whole new look of the talented Bobby Patterson. I hope we see much more of this duo!

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
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Hi Bluesletter Readers,

Honoring Mark Whitman

Last month, many blues artists sent remembrances of Mark Whitman, whom we lost during the production of last month's Bluesletter. I am pleased that Rocky Nelson's interview with this Pacific Northwest blues giant is updated for this issue. In that interview, we learn a little bit about the Blues Industrial Giants ("B.I.G. Band") and his latest record. Perhaps more importantly, we learn about Mark's exceptional resilience, determination and grit as a stroke forced him to switch from his beloved guitar to keyboards after a severe stroke. His multicolored "Franken-Strat" was one of the most memorable axes in his arsenal "back in the day" that I remember from Sunday night blues jams in Shoreline, Washington.

Blues On!

When I first heard Rafael Tranquilino's rallying cry of "Blues On!" several years ago, I wondered why I hadn't heard anyone else use that term in 50+ years of listening to blues music. This issue features photos from Mike McNett at the 2019 Blues On Festival at Old Town Park in Tacoma and I'm pleased that Lady A, Kim Archer, 2019 International Blues Challenge finalist CROS, the Stacy Jones Band and the Nick Mardon Band are in this month's issue. This past year, I ran into Kim Archer at the Seattle-Tacoma International Airport twice. Once, when I was leaving for the East Coast and a second time when I returned home. It was a thrill to see her play the blues on the B Concourse as part of the airport's live music program. I've seen live blues players at the O'Hare Airport in Chicago and the Bergstrom Airport in Austin and am glad that Sea-Tac offers opportunities like this to local blues musicians.

The Blues On! Festival received a Keeping the Blues Alive Award from the South Sound Blues Association last year as well as a nomination in the Best Community Festival category for the Washington Blues Society Best of the Blues awards. While Mike missed Little Bill's set at Blues On!, I'm pleased that Little Bill's monthly column in this issue is also one of his most memorable. Ever. Especially if you're a musician who's played at weddings.

Welcome Back, Kathy Rankin!

Bluesletter frequent contributor Kathy Rankin is back with a review of the 2nd annual Sisters Rhythm & Blues Festival in Oregon. Festival Review: 2nd Annual Sisters Festival

An exceptional festival featuring national, regional and local blues performers.

The 2019 Sisters Rhythm and Brews Festival was held at Village Green Park in Sisters, Oregon on July 26th and 27th. This is an intimate festival presenting huge talent while feeling up close and personal at the same time. There is a great stage, open seating which makes it easy to watch the artists get close to their fans. The festival provides a rare connection of intimacy that is getting harder to feel these days at many larger events where fences separate fans from performers.

Eric Gales, Mr. Sipp, and Christone "Kingfish" Ingram joined forces and performed several songs together captivating the audience. One of the songs they performed was "Smokestack Lightnin." It was an incredible performance of all three of them trading licks! Castro Coleman, AKA Mr. Sipp The Mississippi Blues Child, is a native of McComb who wows his audiences with his dynamic stage persona and guitar mastery. Mr. plays straight-ahead blues with no reservation and feeling. With 125+ recording credits to his name, he's played on more than 50 national recordings with several Grammy-nominated projects. He was the 2014 International Blues Challenge winner, the 2014 Gibson Best Guitarist Award Winner, and the 2014 Blues Bobby Rush Entertainers Award. He loves to casually stroll through the audience so everyone gets a chance to see him up close and personal.

Guitarist Eric Gales made his debut appearance at the 2019 Sisters Rhythm and Brews Festival. Joe Bonamassa says that "Eric Gales is one of the best guitarists in the world today" and Eric has collaborated with Carlos Santana, Dave Navarro, and Joe Bonamassa, to name a few. Gales has played guitar religiously since childhood, with influences from Jimi Hendrix, B.B. King, and Albert King. Gales has been honing his vocal chops to bring even more talent to his band! His wife also plays in his band, drums, and percussion). His 15th studio CD, *Middle* of the Road, hit number four on Billboard's Top Blues Album Chart and number one on the I-Tunes Blues Chart.

Rising star Christone "Kingfish" Ingram, a 2017 high school graduate, played an exceptional set at the festival. He is a Portland, Oregon favorite having performed at the Waterfront Blues Festival several years in a row and played at the 2019 Winthrop Rhythm and Brews Festival to a very excited crowd as well. His style of playing is hugely influenced by Delta blues greats Muddy Waters, the electric blues of B.B. King, and the rock of Jimi Hendrix. Keeping the blues alive and well, Christone "Kingfish" Ingram continues wherever he goes to carry the prestigious blues torch with class and skill but also delivers his own original smoking hot guitar licks.

When Sipp, Kingfish, and Gales finished "Smokestack Lightin,""the audience was in complete disbelief. Did this really just happen? Wow. This single performance will go down in local blues history of one of the best performances at this festival. These artists are keeping the blues tradition going strong.

Who says the girls can't tear it up on stage too? Larkin Poe is proving that they have the chops, the style, and the expert songwriting skills to do what the guys do and quite well. National Public Radio considers them as "A sister act with staying power." The songwriter, and multi-instrumentalist sisters Rebecca and Megan Lovell are Larkin Poe and they carry on their roots rock 'n' roll sound. They are described as "bewitching, gothic soul, and outlaw country - a true and unsettling mixture of grit and soul." Their new CD, Venom & Faith, features the duo at their best. They were influenced at an early age by rock and roll (classic rock and roll, the 60s, 70s, 80s mostly) and they rock that, too. The sisters and band tore it up performing their original songs with an intensity of fire leaving behind smoke trails.

The sisters were on the road this summer for three major events in our region: Waterfront, Winthrop Rhythm and Sisters. For me, it was like being "on the road with Larkin Poe," because I saw them perform at each of these events. With their talent, they've graced the big stages of Bonnaroo Music Festival and Glastonbury Festival, where they played alongside Elvis Costello, Bright Eyes, and Sugarland. They were nominated for 2019 Blues Music Awards "Band of The Year.

Other acts included JD Simo, who replaced Joanna Shaw who was scheduled to play but had visa conflicts. Simo flew across the country to perform for a thrilled and surprised audience. I was impressed with the raw intensity of their performance. Rolling Stone lauded "JD Simo spins soulful psychedelic blues rock with an improvisational bent reminiscent of the Grateful Dead and Stevie Ray Vaughan." I had never seen anyone perform with such frenzied raw intensity. They recently joined Phil Lesh & Friends for a night dubbed "Dead Blues" and released a new album *Off at 11*.

Other great acts included Walker T. Ryan, who opened the festival. Walker T Ryan is a well-known blues icon in Eugene having played for decades. I first saw Ryan at the 1992 Waterfront Blues Festival. Ryan draws people in with his original style of playing, his skill on the guitar, thoughtful lyrics and his intimate connection to the audience. He is a solo act and he makes every note count keeping his audience interested. Obviously, he is highly inspired by the greats when he saw legendary blues greats such as Lightnin' Hopkins, Son House, and Mississippi Fred McDowell perform. He is honored to witness that and then carry on the blues legacy. Ryan gains fans and is respected for his original style of music wherever the road takes him. These blues greats have inspired him to take the "blues road." Ryan is an expert his solo, fingerstyle, player and watching him play his guitar and dobro is inspiring in itself. He has a credit list of opening for great acts such as Taj Mahal, Leon Russell, David Bromberg, and even a rock group, Steppenwolf. Ryan has his own style and soul and plays music the way he feels it.

Another solo artist pulling off an incredible performance was McDougall, a one-manband. When you are a solo artist, every note counts and there is no hiding behind other musicians). Hailing from Portland, Oregon, this expert singer/songwriter, and multiinstrumentalist McDougall plays more than folk-based songs so he is able to reach a wider audience. McDougall is out in front and by plays his own big, upbeat melodies and a constantly changing his genre of music so it cannot be labeled just one type of music, it has many flavors. His well thought out lyrics is reminiscent of the past while playing in the present and the future all wrapped up in one performance.

At only 12 years old, the festival introduced its youngest artist songwriter and multiinstrumentalist CJ Neary. His career has taken off as he's earned multiple national titles in jazz, fiddle music and a performance at the Grand Ole' Opry.

Rooted in acoustic folk and country blues, Sisters Rhythm and Brews Festival gave Jake Smith a huge welcome to the stage. Smith is otherwise known as "The White Buffalo." He grew up in Oregon and California. He shares musical connections to Bob Dylan and Leonard Cohen. He says his style is influenced by country, and punk rock but still he remains mostly firmly rooted in acoustic folk and country blues. Music has many flavors and he carries a wide range in his vocal style or pitch. His songs are featured in the popular series Sons of Anarchy and Californication as well as the full-length feature film Shelter. He has been a guest on Jimmy Kimmel, performed at Bonnaroo Music and NPR named him as one of 12 artists to watch out for in the future.

Portland-based Hillstomp played at the Sisters Rhythm and Brews festival in 2018 and were a huge hit. Described as a "junk box blues duo" they have a keen ability to look for American music that was perhaps forgotten, they take a collection of that to "recycle traditional elements into a fresh and distinctive brand of do-it-yourself hill country blues stomp." On stage, Hillstomp plays assorted buckets, cans, and BBQ lids, paired with their raw infectious slide guitar, this is a unique style of music carried on in Hillstomp tradition. They're very well known for creating "a bit of North Mississippi trance blues, a bit of Appalachia, and a dash of punkabilly."

David Jacobs-Strain loves to play music and reach out to a growing audience wherever he goes. His home is in Oregon, but he has adoring fans all over the world. David Jacobs-Strain has appeared at festivals from British Columbia to Australia including Telluride Blues Festival, Philadelphia Folk Festival, Bumbershoot, and Blues to Bop in Switzerland and also recently at the 2019 Winthrop Rhythm and Blues Festival, opening both days of the festival. He is described as "A song poet and fierce slide guitar player." While his music speaks of open roads, longing hearts, and flashbacks of Oregon, the emotions have a tendency to run big and small, and lyrics that turn quickly from literal to figurative. His live shows transition from being totally humorous to subversive blues to balladry, and then swinging back to swampy rock and roll."

It is all about music but it is also about community. Sisters Rhythm and Brews Festival donates proceeds to local nonprofits and charities specializing in housing and empowering youth and families, such as Heart of Oregon Corps Youth Build Program. This organization teaches building trades and works with youth and volunteers at the Heart of Oregon. They specialize in teaching local youth life skills, work ethic and work skills, empowering them to earn a living wage which gives our youth a sense of pride in their work.

The other organization is Sisters Habitat for Humanity which provides a solution to the need for affording housing in Central Oregon (which is in great need, especially to those families that do not qualify for a traditional home loan). It serves as a way to bridge the gap between hard-working families who are oftentimes struggling to make ends meet and homeownership.

He said he was driving the bride and groom to the hotel after the wedding. We had just played the first set and were taking a break when the car guy came by.

He said he wanted to hang out with the band. We talked for a while and he ask me if I liked playing for weddings. I told him I hated them, and only did it for the money. I ask if he knew anyone at the celebration.

"Yes I do, the bride is my daughter," he said.

The guys in the band did a real fast exit. Usually the father of the bride gives the band a very generous tip.

The one in Puyallup was definitely one for the books. We loaded in and found the bandstand was just inside the door. You will understand why this was important in a minute. As the guys were sitting up the gear, I couldn't help but notice that the Mexican guests were sitting on one side of the room and the other non-Mexicans were on the opposite side.

Could it be that there was some concern that either the bride or groom had selected the wrong person to marry?

Well, if the two older ladies standing by the food table yelling at each other had anything to do with it, here we go! With everyone in the room watching, grandma number one threw a large bowl of something at grandma number two. Not to be out done, number two reciprocated with the large dessert tray at number one.

Are you keeping up with this?

Then there was Jan's and my wedding. I was on the road playing in North Bend Oregon at a place called Jack the Rippers. Jan took a greyhound from Seattle for us to tie the knot. I should introduce Margo at this time. She was a hooker out of Portland with tattoos on parts of her body. Well, the guitar player took a fancy to her and they started living together. Since Margo was the only lady we knew in town, it was decided that she would be our bridesmaid. On the night of the wedding, we all drove to where the justice of the peace held court. He had just started when, all of a sudden he stopped, look at Margo, and said, "Don't I know you?"

Margo said "I don't think so."

Remembering a Pacific Northwest Blues Icon

"... I've got five tunes toward my next CD. I'm just giddy with anticipation over it!"

Editor's note: This month, the Bluesletter continues to honor the legacy of bluesman Mark Whitman. Last month, we ran remembrances from me, Randy Oxford, Michele D'Amour-McDanel, William "Bill" Mattocks, Eric Rice, Tony Frederickson, Tim Scott, Clancy Dunagin, Bill Blackstone, Scotty Harris and Malcolm Kennedy. Over 10 years ago, Rocky Nelson interviewed Mark at his South Seattle home for the Bluesletter and this interview continues to live online at DamnGoodTunes.com. The following is a slightly edited version of the original interview. I'll let Rocky take it from here...

I am proud that the Washington Blues Society chose to reprint this interview with a dear friend, family man and loved one. Mark was a gentle "Giant " of a man and my sincere condolences to his wife, Maridel and family. May his memory live on in all of our hearts.

Reintegration they call it. Reset, decompress. After spending four Christmases in my Afghanistan sandbox with Team America, it was time to come home. Vanna, the quintessential Washington Blues Society raffle queen, helped me spend my fifth Christmas in Manhattan taking a big bite out of the Big Apple. I was back in the good, old USA. In the rear with the gear. Home of the Big PX.

Old habits die hard and old soldiers just fade away. My first action was to fade back into the Pacific Northwest blues scene swing of things. I cruised the mean streets of Skid Road in downtown Seattle and hung out at the Highway 99 Club, the Crocodile, Jazz Alley, Pioneer Square and the Salmon Bay Eagles in Ballard. I slummed with the Washington Blues Society's "Mr. President," Eric Steiner, and a large contingent of Washington blues fans as a semi-finalist Judge at the International Blues Challenge in Memphis where the Washington Blues Society's entrant, The WIRED! Band won first place honors over 150+ other competitors from around the world.

Trying to get a handle on the occasional night terrors and the freedom of unrestricted movement, I focused on telling a small story of a longtime friend. It seemed the right thing to do. Washington Blues Society Calendar girl Maridel Fliss and Mark Whitman invited me to their crib for a welcome home dinner. Over a scrumptious meal of fresh Alaska halibut, we talked about Pacific Northwest blues history. It was an unforgettable evening with two very exceptional Washington blues people, Mark Whitman and Maridel Fliss.

The Interview

RN: Good evening Mark. I understand you have been in the recording studio lately. You have a new recording to listen to?

MW: Yep, we just finished it up. The release date is February 18th at Cee Cee's in Burien.

RN: Tell the readers a little about yourself. How long have you been playing and who are some of the folks you have played with?

MW: I've been a guitar player for about 58 years. I started out being a road man for "Don and the Good Times." Ron Overman left the band and started a band called the "King Biscuit Entertainers" after the King Biscuit Flour Hour out of Helena, Arkansas. That was in 1968. We were based out of Longview, Washington. Then we went to work for Pat O'Day.

RN: Pat O'Day, a well-known DJ from the Pacific Nothwest! Pray tell, how did you get together with him, sir?

MW: Well, in that day and age, if you didn't work for Pat O'Day you didn't work. We made good money. Pat booked through Seattle Mercer and they booked gigs all over the Pacific Northwest. Blues musicians and people used to come from all over to hear us play. Next came Bitteroot then Springfield Rifle. Later I played with the Sweet Talkin' Jones Band, and we played all over Pioneer Square and the Pacific Northwest.

RN: This new CD, *Always be the Blues*, how do you feel about it?

MW: I like it a lot. It's a real musical album. Not just a rehash of blues, it's things I brought with me all of my life. I do a Springfield Rifle tune arrangement of "Wacka Wacka" and I give credit to them on the CD. I have two original songs, the title cut and "98.9." I arranged the entire CD except for "Wacka Wacka." It's produced by me and Jimmie Free. I do a Lonnie Mack tune called "Oreo Cookie Blues." The "B.I.G Band" played on it, which is my band with Dick Powell, Fat James, Keith Wohlford, Jonnie Lewis, Lonnie Williams and Dave Christenson.

RN: Blues Industrial Giants, or "B.I.G.," were infamous, how?

MW: We were really "BIG" (as in size), 2,000 pounds of blues fun, we partied hard and we sounded really good!

RN: Some of your vocal arrangements were done with Kathi MacDonald, another local favorite. How do you like working with her?

MW: I love working with Kathi, she's great! I've known her about 30 years. One of my tunes "High Heel Sneakers" actually took eight years to develop.

RN: Eight years? Did I hear you right?

MW: Yeah, I had to take time out to have a stroke.

RN: I understand that you have had some health challenges lately. Care to tell us about

it? How have you been?

MW: In 2007, life was goin' good, I was on top of the world. I had a new guitar, I just got married. We were playing 28 gigs a month. We played the Sunbanks Blues festival, I got back home and had a stroke the next morning. All of a sudden I couldn't walk and I couldn't play.

RN: Wow, what did you do to overcome that, Mark?

MW: Well, bad things happen to good people and I was in a bad way. I thought that my life was done. I thought that if I couldn't play music, and couldn't play my guitar, my life was over. One minute I could play and the next minute I couldn't. It wasn't like a disease. I couldn't wrap myself around that. It took the love of Maridel and a lot of other angels in my life to put this old man back together again. Darrel Lombard and Pat Hughes gave me a Hammond Organ.

Bob White fixed it so I could play it. When they gave me this organ I practiced like a Mad Man. Justin Kausal-Hayes came every week and played music with me, or I should say, played music for me. For, like, two years. Before I even realized I couldn't play, he kept the music alive in me. We have a friend named Dr. John Blye who has some theories about stroke victims and treated me. He cured me of the depression of my loss. My band stuck with me through all the hard times and I love them for it. I would complain and Maridel would say "it could have been worse, I could have lost you, the universe has given you a second chance, use it wisely". So taking that to heart... I have a second chance. I play both the Hammond B3 and the guitar on this CD. It's like they always said, "if you practice and practice, you'll get good at something".

RN: So, your "lesson learned" is practice, practice?

MW: Yes. I'm getting better and better. I want to play organ at the level I played the guitar at. So, that's a challenge. But...I am getting it and I feel good about it!!! Just because you're older doesn't mean that you're done!

RN: We appreciate that you are back gigging again. What's next for you?

MW: We have four projects. We are putting the "B.I.G." album on CD (never released), and we are re-releasing the "Sweet Talkin' Jones" album. Also we are putting together a CD of the Mark Whitman, Sweet Talkin' Jones reunion at the Mt. Baker R&B Festival from last year. And last...I've got five tunes towards my next CD. I'm just giddy with anticipation over it! I never started playing music to make money. I started because I love to play. That's what I do!

RN: Indeed, Mark. Thanks for all you do!









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2020 Best Self-Produced CD Contest

Open call for blues artists to enter their CD in the 2020 International Blues Challenge

The Best Self-Produced CD, selected by a national panel of judges at the 2020 International Blues Challenge in Memphis is an important part of our mission to celebrate blues recording and to ensure the future of this uniquely American art form.

The following guidelines are inteded for Washington Blues Society artists to consider for the Washington Blues Society Best Self-Produced CD Contest. The winner of this statewide CD competition will represent the blues society in Memphis next year.

Best Self-Produced Official Rules

Entries for the Best Self-Produced CD are permitted by Blues Foundation Affiliated Organizations only.

Each Blues Foundation sffiliate is permitted one entry.

The CD entered may be recorded and performed by an act other than is entered in the current year's International Blues Challenge.

Compilations are not eligible.

Only CDs released between November 1, 2018, and October 31, 2019, are eligible for consideration as The 2020 Best Self-Produced CD.

While The Blues Foundation encourages a competition at the affiliate level to determine the CD it will sponsor for Best Self-Produced CD, it does not require one. As an affiliate of The Blues Foundation, the Washington Blues Society conducts a competition to determine the CD it will sponsor, overseen by the executive board.

The CD may not include a board member or officer of the sponsoring affiliated organization. A performer who has previously been nominated for a Blues Music Award (formerly the W.C. Handy Blues Award) shall not be eligible for this competition. A CD issued in the name of an otherwise eligible performer which also includes the contributions of a Blues Music Award nominee may be ineligible, depending on the extent of the contribution.

Please contact The Blues Foundation directly confirm eligibility. to A CD on a record label that has been previously nominated for a Blues Music Award (formerly the W.C. Handy Blues Award) shall not be eligible for this competition. WBS Judging will take place in October. Judges will remain anonymous in order to protect them from outside influences and represent a cross-section of professionals from the blues radio and print industry. The final results will be announced at the finals of the International Blues Challenge on Saturday, FEB 2, 2020 held at the historic Orpheum Theatre in Memphis, TN.

Evaluation Criteria:

Judges will evaluate each submitted CD on the following characteristics. The criteria considered are listed in order of importance.

- (1) Blues Content
- (2) Musical Performance
- (3) Audio Quality and Production Value of
- the Recording
- (4) Professionalism and Visual Appearance of Cover Art and Design
- (5) Credits and Liner Note Information.

How to Submit

Artists are asked to submit four copies of their album to the following address. Submissions MUST be received by The Washington Blues Society no later than October 8, 2019, at the October Blues bash or by mail at the following address: Washington Blues Society Best CD -4003 Friday Ave Everett WA 98201. Blues Book Review: Weeds Like Us

"One of my blues heroes, Taj Mahal, had said he loved me. He said I was doing important work." By Eric Steiner

Janiva Magness Weeds Like Us (Fathead Records) 267 pages, 100+ Photos

Janiva Magness' inspiring memoir, *Weeds Like Us*, opens at one of the peaks of her storied blues career. May 7, 2009. Ten years ago at the Blues Music Awards in Memphis, I watched Janiva's face flood with utter shock and wide-eyed disbelief when B. B. King announced that the 2009 B.B. King Entertainer of the Year was Janiva Magness. This was Janiva's fourth time on the ballot in this category, and since then, she's garnered 14 nominations and taken four statuettes home..

Full disclosure: I've had the privilege of working with Janiva as a spokesperson for National Foster Care Month at Casey Family Programs and we've presented workshops at youth conferences and Blues Foundation events. As a result, my review isn't unbiased. Far from it. I've aked Janiva to write a book more times that I can count and I'm glad that she's working out some of the typos as she works on a second printing. I've also been a fan dating back to my first Janiva Magness show 20+ years ago when I was a blues columnist Midwest Beat magazine.

Weeds Like Us opens on a high note among blues royalty. Bonnie Raitt was up on stage with B.B. King and Janiva's recollection in the introduction of the book is a moving account behind the scenes accepting one of the blues world's highest honors. In 31 chapters, Janiva tells her life story unflinchingly as she recalls the lows of depression, child abuse, suicide attempts and the highs of multiple Blues Music Award wins, several successful CDs and a show in Baghdad with Bluesapalooza outside the Green Zone. Along the way, Janiva shares details of some pretty bleak periods in her life, recounts early succeesses with the MoJomatics in Phoenix and recalls foibles unique to working with blues record

labels.

Of the many vignettes in *Weeds Like Us*, I like the exchange with Taj Mahal after she won a Contemporary Blues Female Artist of the Year BMA in 2007 shortly after Northern Blues released *Do I Move You*?


"As I made my way to the lobby, I bumped into Taj Mahal, who had been holding court with some friends and admirers. He stopped me in my tracks to say congratulations.

"Do you realize what you have done?" he asked with intensity. "That was an incredible performance! They love you! They all love you, the young ones, the older ones, the black ones and the white ones! Do you realize what you have done? I really dig what you're doing. It's very important for us all! Keep doing it. Never stop. We need you."

Are you fucking kidding me? In my shock and gratitude, I said thank you about a million times before somehow excusing myself to go to the ladies' room. I locked myself in one of the stalls and began to sob like a baby. I could not comprehend what had happened. I'd won best female artist of the year and one of my blues heroes, Taj Mahal, had said he loved me. He said I was doing important work. If I'd died then and there, I would have been a happy, satisfied woman."

Weeds Like Us is often difficult to read, especially about Janiva's childhood, which included parental suicide, child abuse, multiple foster homes, substance abuse at a young age, an internal dialogue tuned in to "KFUK Radio" and some pretty questionable relationships (e.g., "Mr. Bad.").

Two things rang true for me in *Weeds Like Us.* When an under-aged Magness saw Otis Rush at a dive bar in the 70s, she was transfixed by the way he played: "And now Otis with his gut-searing music that seemed t



o suggest maybe there's something in this world that I actually can connect to." Janiva has triumphed over extreme adversity, time after time, and she credits many friends, an exceptional foster mother named Carrie and blues music as her salvation and joy.

This exceptional and inspirational memoir closes with a Spotify playlist with artists that inspired Magness throughout her turbulent life and includes Ray Charles, Billie Holiday, Lucinda Williams, Odetta, Bukka White, B.B. King, Leonard Cohen and nine original songs. The 100+ photos include family historical snapshots and photos with many blues luminaries (and classic 70s hair shots).

Janiva Magness will headline Legends of the Blues VII at the Byrnes Performing Arts Center in Arlington on Saturday, Nov. 23rd. Opening for Ms. Magness are the Northwest All-Star Blues Broads: , Stacy Jones, Lisa Mann, Sonny Hess, Sheri Roberts Greimes, Sheryl Clark and Faith Stankevich On Nov. 24th at 6:00 PM, Janiva will sign copies of *Weeds Like Us* at Third Place Books in Lake Forest Park. 
Shaun Murphy Reason to Try (Vision Wall Records)

The new CD from Shaun Murphy, Reason to Try, is worthy of a listen. This woman has chops! She belts out the songs with a growl and grump. Think Tina Turner, Aretha Franklin, Carolyn Wonderland and Mavis Staples blended together and you've got the sound of this powerhouse vocalist. She has been recognized with three Grammy nominations and two Blues Blast Music awards. The CD features Kenne Cramer and Tommy Stillwell on lead guitar; Tom DelRossi on drums, John Marcus playing bass, Eric Robert on B3 organ with Shaun on vocals and tambourine. The CD features 14 cuts, the last title being a Kramer original, "Same Old You," a contemporary blues tune with catchy guitar riffs. Shaun's version of "Road House Rockin," a hard driving blues song by Johnny Neal, drew me right in. Danny Power's "Reason to Try," is a testament to eyes closed, listening to the music and having your body moving of its own volition. A perfect song for a slow dance embracing the one you love. Shaun hails from Nebraska and now lives in Nashville. She first fell for the blues at the Ann Arbor Blues Festival where she saw Son House, Muddy Waters, BB King, Freddy King and Lightnin' Hopkins. Shaun also loves musical theatre: While in Detroit, she pursued musical theatre to quench her musical thirst and her performance in Hair landed her a Motown contract. For Motown, she recorded a duet CD with Meatloaf, Stoney & Meatloaf. The Shaun Murphy Band is currently touring with Bob Seger, a testament to the band's finesse and showmanship. Shaun has been singing with Seger since the early 80's and I'm happy that Reason to Try is her ninth CD. If you're looking for a CD that offers a great mix of rocky blues, traditional blues, down-to-earth tunes with lyrics that everyone can relate to, look no further. Cora Price

Keb Mo Oklahoma (Concord Records)

Keb' Mo's newest CD released this past summer, Oklahoma, is cause for celebration. The CD contains 10 songs that range from the up-tempo blues of "I Remember You" and "Ridin' on a Train" to songs that reflect the headlines like "Put a Woman in Charge" and "This is My Home." "Put a Woman in Charge" features Roseanne Cash on vocals and I hope several women seeking elected office consider using this song for their campaigns (with Keb' Mo's permission). "This is My Home" is an elegant song that tells compelling stories about Lupe and Mohammed, two workers who seek a better life in the USA in a factory and behind the wheel of a taxi cab. Oklahoma covers a lot of musical ground but one common theme through each song is a hopeful look forward. "I Should've" is a playful and engaging romp about "coulda, woulda, shoulda" moments we all have had, and in Keb' Mo's world, it's a joyful look about what might have been. The title tune, co-written with Oklahoma native Dara Tucker, named 2016 Nashville Industry Music Awards Jazz Vocalist of the Year, alludes to the state's troubled history with the Tulsa Race Riot of 1921 in the Greenwood neighborhood of Tulsa. Ultimately, though, Keb' Mo' takes us up on the high road recognizing the resilience of the Sooner State as "Jesus on the mainline, devil stay away, rain or shine, Oklahoma's gonna be okay." Taj Mahal is one of many special guests on Oklahoma and he reunites with Keb' on "Don't Throw It Away," which could be a new theme song for activists seeking to combat excess plastic harming our oceans even if ruffles the feathers of the industry pioneered by Belgian chemist Hendrik Baekeland ("Leo B." in the song). This month, Concord Records will release Keb' Mo's first holiday CD, Moonlight, Misteltoe & You, on the 18th. The CD coincides with the 25th anniversary of Kevin Roosevelt Moore's nom de blues change to Keb' Mo,' and I'm looking forward to celebrating the holidays with this CD. Eric Steiner

Polly O'Keary & The Rhythm Live as It Gets) (Self-Released)

Polly O'Keary and the Rhythm Method's newest CD, Live as it Gets, captures a perennial award-winning Pacific Northwest band at its best. Their 23-date fifth national summer tour included stops in Texas, Nebraska, Illinois, Missouri (BB's Blues & Soups!) and Tennessee. Polly is a six-time Washington Blues Society Best of the Blues Award winner in the Best Female Vocalist category and blues society members also voted her for a Best Songwriter award. Her husband, drummer Tommy Cook, is a twotime Best Blues Drummer award winner and this engine room is a powerful foundation for Dave Miller's exceptional guitar work. Eight of the 13 cuts are originals and I keep coming back to songs that clearly resonate with live audiences, such as "In My Father's House," "Sugar Daddy," "Hard Act to Follow" and the title cut from the 2017 Best Self-Produced Competition finalist at the International Blues Challenge in Memphis, "Black Crow Callin." Throughout the CD, the musicianship is first-class, and Polly isn't shy about injecting some serious attitude throughout the set (especially when she tired of visiting ex-boyfriends in prison). The CD packaging, thanks to photos from award-winning photographer Denise Hathaway, also caught my eye as the CD cover features the band entering the Engel's Club, 2009 winner of the Best of the Blues Award for Best Blues Club and the back photo shows the band leaving a club after the gig. Live as it Gets is one of my favorite live blues CDs released this year. Eric Steiner

Win and Denel, who grew up in Ashford, were thrilled to be able to publicly honor their friend and mentor Brad Moore and others who were instrumental in securing funding and construction of the park.

Randy was excited to play a part in bringing music back to the Mt. Rainier area after putting on a successful music festival in Mineral from 2007-2011 that ended upon loss of the venue. The great lineup continued with the Randy Oxford Reunion as co-organizer Randy Oxford grabbed his trombone and packed the stage with over a dozen musicians from the N and Canada who, along with eighteen-year-old rising star vocalist Miranda Kitchpanich, delivered a scorching



90+ minute set. The Hank Shreve Band brought the crowd to its feet with their smoking blend of harmonica, great vocals and a rocking rhythm section to close out the day without a drop of rain.

Fans, vendors and musicians alike left the show excited for next year. Junkyard Jane vocalist Leanne Trevalyan said "The Mt. Rainier Rhythm & Blues Revival is my new favorite festival! Surrounded by trees at the foot of our favorite mountain, this picturesque amphitheater provides the perfect setting - in five years this event is gonna be huge" about the venue. Blues on the Road

A quick preview of select national touring artists playing the Pacific Northwest this month.

This month, I wanted to bring back my Blues on the Road column to highlight select nationally-touring artists playing in our region. While some of the dates will likely duplicate those already in our online and print calendars, I'm consistently surprised at the constellation of exceptional opportunities to catch live blues apart from shows that land in our calendars. To paraphrase bluesman Keith Scott, "there's a big blues world out there."

For me, the month starts off on the last day of the Federal fiscal year, September 30th, (Happy New Fiscal Year 2020!) with the legendary Bettye LaVette at Seattle's Triple Door, the Tower Theatre in Bend on October 1st, Oregon and the Aladdin Theatre in the Rose City on the 2nd. I've seen her at the Chicago Blues Festival and it was a "blues bucket list" performance. I look forward to reading her 2013 memoir, co-written with David Ritz, *A Woman Like Me*.

On the 1st, Experience Hendrix 2019 kicks off an 18-date tour at Seattle's Paramount Theatre, followed by Arlene Schnitzer Hall in Portland on the 2nd and Eugene's Hull Center on the 3rd. The tour features Buddy Guy, Joe Satriani, Jonny Lang, Dweezil Zappa, Eric Johnson and Billy Cox (an original member of the Band of Gypsies).

One of my favorite bluesmen, Keb Mo, returns to Seattle on the 6th at the Moore Theatre prior to the Tower Theatre in Bend on the 8th and the Argyros Performing Arts Center in Ketchum, Idaho with young guitarslinger Jontavious Willis on the 10th. Mariners fans of a certain age may recall George Argyros' tenure as a Mariners owner prior to being ambassador to Spain.

This month, Alligator Records wunderkind Christone "Kingfish" Griffin returns to our region with shows in Vancouver, BC at the Fox Cabaret on the 10th with the Cerny Brothers and Seattle's Barboza on the 11th, the Wild Buffalo in Bellingham on the 12th and Portland's Star Theatre on the 13th.

A twin bill on the 16th at Seattle's Neptune Theatre sparks my interest with Todd Snider and Ramblin' Jack Elliott. Ramblin' Jack mentored Bob Dylan early in his career and when I was in high school near Chicago in the 70s, I followed Ramblin' Jack on the Rolling Thunder Revue in Rolling Stone magazine.

On the 22nd, Black Belt Eagle Scout plays Fawcett Hall at Alma Mater in Tacoma. She's on the vanguard of American Indian LGBTQ singer-songwriters and I find her work original and captivating.

Back in the days of DOS (read: 80s & 90s), I was a blues columnist for Cosmik Debris, one of the first online music resources spearheaded by DJ Johnson. I saw Reckless Kelly at the Tractor Tavern in Ballard over two decades ago and I'm pleased that they will return to the Tractor on November 1st and 2nd. Their 2003 Sugar Hill CD, *Under the Table and Above the Sun* is one of my favorite rockabilly and blues mash-ups.

On November 1st, "Worldwide West Side Guitar Man" Johnny Burgin plays Line and Lure Seafood Kitchen and Tap in Ridgefield at Ilani, a gaming destination developed by the Cowlitz Tribe and Salishan-Mohegan Tribe. The recent Portland transplant continues at the Skyway Bar and Grill in Zigzag, Oregon on the 2nd, The Ship in Portland on the 7th, and later in the month on the 18th, at the Oregon Lake Theatre and Café in Lake Oswego.

Finally, I encourage all blues artists to use our online calendar at <u>www.wablues.org</u>. It's a complimentary resource alongside our venue guide and blues talent listings, and next month, thanks to the hard work behind the scenes by Washington Blues Society Vice President Rick Bowen, the Bluesletter will bring back blues radio listings for the first time in several years.

The elected board, in turn, appoints the following volunteer Director positions: Music, Membership, Education, Volunteers, Merchandise and Advertising.

While I understand that folks have limited time to volunteer, I've always considered the Washington Blues Society a little different (in a good way). In addition to elected or appointed positions on the Board, there are plenty of opportunities to help out at monthly Blues Bashes, to represent the blues society at one of 40+ festivals around the greater Pacific Northwest, and I'd be lying if I said I didn't have some self-interest going on here, with opportunities to write about live blues and blues CDs for the pages of this Bluesletter.

The photos that accompany this article tell an important story.

Our long-term partnership with the Poverty Bay Blues and Brews Festival has grown over the years, and this year, President Tony Frederickson and Membership Director Chad Creamer, along with the festival's Steve Swank raffled off our quilt that is made up of dozens of blues festival tee shirts. If you've been to a blues festival in our region in recent years, I'm hoping you'll recognize Tony and Chad from our merchandise booth. Many blues societies raffle off autographed guitars and I'd like to think that the blues festival t-shirt quilt is a little bit more personal (because there's a pretty good chance you've been to one of the festivals embroidered in the quilt).

In late 2015, I spoke at a meeting convened by KPLU-FM at Seattle's Westin Hotel regarding the station's planned sale of the station. I followed award-winning blues DJ Jonathan "Oogie" Richards (something I'll never do again because of his exceptional way with words). I implored KPLU leadership to maintain its steady diet of NPR News, All Blues with John Kessler and its exceptional local news programming. Fast forward nearly seven months later: Few could have predicted that a broad-based community group could raise \$7M to purchase the station now known as KNKX (pronounced "Connects"). Washington Blues Society Board members were there, every step of the way helping with donations and raising awareness of the importance of locally-owned media. I understand that the KNKX studios are a technological

marvel and encourage Bluesletter readers to tune in to Bird Note, All Blues with John Kessler, Blue Plate Special with Robin Lloyd and many notable locally-produced shows like Sound Effects.

While I may wonder if some of my fellow Board members actually sleep because they are involved in so many facets of our region's blues community, I know that I speak for Volunteer Director Rhea Rolfe when I type that our volunteers are a very important part of our blues society. Again, whether you can hang out in the merch booth for a weekend at a festival, write an occaisional CD review or help out as our "Vanna of the Moment" drawing monthly raffle tickets at our Blues Bash, please consider volunteering for the Washington Blues Society.

Meg Williams Band

Please join us as we welcome autumn with a simmering blend of treasured favorites and fiery new talents. Meg Williams will bring her band to the Blues Bash for the first time and Jeff Nicely and Randy Norris will lay down their comfy groove on Tuesday, October 8th.

Often compared to Susan Tedeschi and Bonnie Raitt, Meg William's guitar playing has captured the attention of listeners throughout Nashville and the US. She just released her full length album this spring, recorded at FAME Studios in Muscle Shoals. *Take Me As I Am: The Muscle Shoals Sessions* is on Nola Blue Records. It's been played on SiriusXM's Bluesville and radio stations world-wide along with her 2017 EP *Maybe Someday.* Her song "Little Bit of the Devil" reached #2 in the Top 50 Blues Rock songs.

Williams performs frequently at venues across the country with her band, as a solo/duo act, and as a guitarist for other artists. She recently competed in the 2019 International Blues Challenge (IBC) in Memphis, representing the Kentucky Blues Society. She was also the house band director for the IBC Women in Blues Showcase. Williams has performed at a slew of festivals lately, including the 2019 Ann Arbor Blues Fest with blues legend Benny Turner, the 2019 Tall City Blues Fest in Midland, TX, the 2018 Venice (Florida) Blues Festival, and the RedGorilla Music Festival in Austin. She's been a featured artist at Loretta Lynn's Ranch as an artist, and will play next at the Lone Star Blues & Heritage Festival and the 2020 Cincinnati

Norris & Nicely

Blending soul, rock, New Orleans rhythm and Delta blues, Randy Norris and Jeff Nicely have played music together for more than two decades. Performing as an acoustic duo for the last 12 years, Norris and Nicely represented the Washington Blues Society at the 2012 and 2013 IBC in Memphis and were awarded the 2017 WBS Best of the Blues Award for Solo/Duo Blues Act. Together, they also fronted the band Blues Therapy, and released two wellreceived recordings, *Doctor's Orders!* and *Second Opinion*.

Norris's warm charismatic vocals and high-energy guitar work have carried him through several years with Big Road Blues, the Ranford Band, the Emerald City Throwdown, and Randy Norris & the Full Degree, among others. He was also a member of Jack Mack and the Heart Attack and had a stint with The Boxtops doing sessions and sideman work. Nicely brings his solid soulful harmonica to the duo, as he has over the years as a member of the band Blues Playground. Comfortable in a wide range of genres, he's called upon for a variety of recording sessions. He was inducted into the Musician's Hall of Fame with his brothers in their Ohio hometown where they annually host a benefit concert, and has enjoyed volunteering his time as producer of the Legends of the Blues concert series in Arlington, which happens next month.
