He went to Mexico almost every year to escape the cold and we often would run into each other there as we shared many mutual friends and spent time down in Melaque, a small town on the mainland along the Pacific coast that we both enjoyed as a base point for our adventures down south. We shared a love of good food, good wine, and good tequila and spent many hours debating these with our mutual friends and each other.

These past few years, Jef fought health issues and I would go over to his home and spend a little time visiting and just being a friend, trying to lift h s spirits and offer encouragement. 

#### LETTER FROM THE EDITOR



Hi Bluesletter Readers!

During the production of this issue, I attended my very fi st Legends of the Blues Show at the Byrne Performing Arts Center in Arlington, Washington. The show featured the Northwest Blues Broads who opened for the award-winning Janiva Magness. The Northwest All Star Blues Broads are Stacy Jones on harp and keyboards, Sonny Hess on guitar, Sheri Roberts Gre-

imes on keyboards and vocals, Lisa Mann on bass, Faith Stankevich on drums and Sheryl Clark on saxophone. Janiva played most of her new CD, Change in the Weather: Janiva Magness Sings John Fogerty (Blue Elan Records) and treated us to a few songs from Northern Blues and Alligator Records back catalogue, such as "You Were Never Mine" and "The Devil is an Angel, Too."

The next day, Keeping the Blues Alive Award-winning DJ John Kessler interviewed her at Lake Forest Park's Thi d Place Books where she read from her fi st memoir, Weeds Like Us. My fi st Legends of the Blues show (actually, it was the event's seventh annual show!) was exceptional as was Janiva's reading in the bookstore. Long-time volunteer Jeff Nicely has worked on this for many years to bring people to Arlington for very special presentations of live music and I look forward to what the Arlington Arts Council will do later this year. As I introduced Janiva from the stage, I talked about how the Arlington Arts Council has creatively and sustainably funded arts programs in the community, the Council's work with the city council and the Arts Council's partnership with local schools. To me, Arlington has a replicable model for other communities to follow for the way local elected offi als, working artists and community partners can work together to contribute to the livability of a community. I was particularly impressed with how the Arlington Arts Council collaborate with local leaders, use sales taxes, access tourism and lodging taxes and include community members (especially young people at Arlington High School).

Th s month, The CD Woodbury Band, Blue Moon Marquee and Brian Butler's CD, Butler's Blues, will represent the Washington Blues Society at the International Blues Challenge in Memphis. Several blues society street team volunteers will distribute this issue of the Bluesletter around spots that attract blues fans, and if I were going this year, I'd make sure to drop some off at Alcenia's Restaurant on Front Street, the lobby of the Peabody Hotel and King's Palace on Beale Street. Special thanks to CD, A.W. and Jass and Brian for including their International Blues Challenge program bios and photos in this issue and best of luck to all!

This issue also honors the blues life of Keeping the Blues Alive Award-winning photographer Jef Jaisun, who passed away with his longtime companion, Jayne. She texted from Jef's cell phone that he passed away quietly, and more importantly, not alone. I am very grateful for the work of Jen Taylor of VividPix Designs as she sent me the collage of Jef's work that she designed for the 2007 International Blues Challenge program book. It's in this issue. Jef's passing is a wake-up call for me, personally: Th s year, I'll do better at connecting with members of our extended blues community, especially blues elders, to express my appreciation while they are alive. Special thanks to Rick Bowen for compiling a sampling of remembrances from social media.

I've updated our blues venue listings to separate out venues that host live blues in Idaho and Montana. Instead of just including them in the East of the Mountains listings, the number of clubs that offer live blues in Idaho and Montana has grown overtime, thanks to Washington Blues Society members and blues performers who send it the names of venues that include blues music on their calendars.

Finally, I wanted to let potential contributors know the formats for stories and photos for this magazine. All editorial copy must be sent as a text or Microsoft Word attachment (and not simply embedded in an email). All photos must be high resolution (300 dpi or greater), formatted as a TIF or PSD file, and saved in traditional print media CMYK (that's Cyan-Magenta-Yellow-Black) formats. As a result, photos from social media generally do not work in traditional print media, and just like editorial copy, all photos must be sent as attachments.

Due to the sheer size of digital print images formatted for traditional print media, many contributors opt to submit photos through a file sharing site like DropBox. Please remember: Images for traditional print media are very, very large and images for social media, due to their comparatively lower resolution (such as 300 dpi for print and 72 dpi for images that look perfect on a computer screen, Android phone or iPhone).

One fi al note about pictures: Please do not send pictures with the camera-supplied identifier (instead, please title the image with the subject's name and photographer's name so that I can provide proper photo credits on our masthead.

I hope that each and every Bluesletter readers' 2020 is better than their 2019.

# Good Luck at the International Blues Challenge

The CD Woodbury Band, Blue Moon Marquee and Butler's Blues are headed to Memphis

Brief bios and pictures courtesy of each artist The CD Woodbury Band: Guitarist, vocalist, and songwriter CD Woodbury and his bandmates have been bringing their mix of contemporary blues stylings to club and festival stages all over the Pacific Northwest, resulting in multiple awards and international radio airplay. In 2018, dealing with hand injuries, health, and relocation, CD considered giving up gigging for good. "For good" lasted six months, he's back and better than ever. CD is returning to Memphis with long-time musical partner Don Montana on drums, the masterful Patrick McDanel on bass, and ace multi-instrumentalist Mike Marinig on keys and sax.

#### Solo/Duo: Blue Moon Marquee

Stemming from the Badlands of the Canadian Rocky Mountain prairies, this authentic duo writes and performs original compositions influenced by anything that jumps, swings or grooves. A.W. Cardinal howls with a distinctive thick and smoky vocal while playing a jazz tinged blues guitar. Jasmine Colette, aka Badlands Jazz, is the rhythm section who not only commands the upright bass but also keeps the swing with both feet while singing harmonies. Blue Moon Marquee's passionate performances and smoldering onstage chemistry is their trademark, and the way Colette's honey tones lift A.W.'s beaten down "Bukowskiesque" mystique is something that enthralls audiences from the back-alley lounge to the public square.

#### CD: Butler's Blues by Brian Butler

Brian Butler is an exciting solo blues artist who injects his own stamp on the blues while sustaining its rich emotion and sound. Singer, guitarist and harmonica player, his shows feature original songwriting including "Snow River", "The News About Billy", "Place Pigalle", and "Animule



Hall". Brian includes classic and obscure covers in his sets to create a powerful journey through the blues. An expressive and powerful singer, he backs his vocals with commanding guitar playing that rings with authority. Brian's songs whether thoughtful, humorous or seductive all have strong rhythmic drive and are delivered with swaggering confide ce. His occasional harmonica adds another voice to the dynamic mix. His recent award-winning CD release, Butler's Blues, has been wellreceived by blues authorities and fans. In a complex world of music Brian Butler is preserving the tradition of the blues while forging his own unique path.

While CD Woodbury, Blue Moon Marquee and Brian Butler's CD will go to Memphis, Amanda Kitchpanich will participate in the blues youth showcase (see p 18).

# Celebrating the holidays at Louie G's in Fife!

### An exceptional holiday party hosted by the South Sound Blues Association

The South Sound Blues Association rang in the holidays in fi e fashion Friday, December 6, by treating members to dinner and a show featuring three top-notch blues acts. Louie G's in Fife has become a favorite venue for these community gatherings, and owners Peter and Kay Kesling and their staff have the set-up down to an art.

For the musicians, there's a big stage, great sound, and a responsive sound guy (Chris Petersen).

For the guests, all of the aforementioned, plus tables arranged to accommodate socializing, a decent-sized dance fl or and a generous pizza, salad, and dessert buffet throughout much of the evening. AND then, the music ...

Joel Astley (T-Town Aces, High Note Group, Duo w/Raf) was a busy man this night, serving as MC and kicking the party off in a roots-like duo with guitar master Tom Boyle (T-Town Aces). With Joel trading licks and melody on harp and vocals and Tom comping with chords, rhythm and a little fi ger picking, their set included a couple of Thunderbird classics, a little Jimmy Reed, and a standout original, "Work with What You Got."

The duo made a big enough sound to inspire the fi st dancers, so that by the time the next act took the stage, the party was already hopping.

The Rece Jay Band was a celebration in itself - a BIG band out of Auburn. Rece Jay is the bandleader, songwriter, and lead singer, and is backed by a whole lot of talent. The band featured trumpet, two saxes, keys, two guitarists, bass, drums - each of whom seemed to be having a very good time.

With six CDs to her credit, Rece is by no means a stranger to the Pacific Northwest music scene, but she seems to write her songs before selecting a genre, like so many of our song crafters do. Thus, she is most often described as "Rock, Pop, Country, and R&B". For this show, the "B," as in blues, was well represented. "Cold Hard Fact" and "He Drives" were my favorites this night, both featuring heavy bass lines, smart lyrics, and generous solos for each musician.

The party was in overdrive by the time the T-Town Aces hit the stage to close out the night, jumping right in with their signature, blues-based, jazz-spiced show. Joel Astley returned to the stage on harp and vocals, as did Tom Boyle on guitar. They were joined by David Hudson on drums, Les White on bass, and a very sparkly Dennis Ellis on sax.

Working from a 16-song set-list, the Aces gave us a great mix of originals ("Down to the Rims"), ("Money Talks") and fresh arrangements of blues classics, some familiar (Sonny Boy Williamson's "Early in the Morning"), and some more obscure songs (Frogman Henry's "Ain't Got No Home"). The evening ended with a highenergy version of Jimmie Vaughan's "Feeling Good." And YES, WE WERE!

Big thanks and kudos to the hardworking South Sound Blues Association folks who planned and pulled off a wonderful holiday event: President Andy Pasilis, Secretary Kim Cvitkovic, Director Dominick Veiga and Perlita Clark. ### A true champion for blues music, blues musicians and New Orleans history & culture


I will always remember Jef Jaisun as a proudly unrepentant hippie. True to the ideals of the 1960s, he fi mly believed that you could fi ht City Hall with logic, passion and reason, and sometimes win. Jef was among the last counterculture figu es who actively engaged community radio stations like KRAB-FM and he believed in the power of arts and culture to bring people together. Eventually, Jef trimmed his hair and got certifi d as an electrician (and he focused so much energy on helping his friends in Louisiana). The last time I saw him late last year, he regaled me with stories of his work in New Orleans, his passion for Community Coffee, and before I left, he filled the back of my Honda with greens from his raised bed garden. We talked about DJs, ranging from Chicago's Dick Biondi to Seattle's Pat O'Day, too. I've traveled with him to Memphis and Mississippi and I'll never forget his acceptance speech at the Keeping the Blues Alive Awards. (Eric Steiner)

"When I heard that BB King was going on tour in Europe," he reminisced. "I wanted to be a part of that. There was no way I'd miss that tour. So, I brought my camera and started shooting. I just had to be there."



### 2007 Keeping the Blues Alive Award for Photography: Jef Iaisun, Seattle, WA

Jef Jaisun has been actively photographing the Blues for over 30 years. Whether he's working the Jazz Fest main stage or hanging out at the Back Porch in Chicago, or sitting in your favorite Blues joint, Jef can always be found where the music is. He is staff photographer for Blue Suede News and Blues ToDo Monthly, two long time Northwest music publications. Since 1980, his work has been featured in every major American Blues magazine and on the covers of numerous CDs. In 2004, he donated more than 250 photos to the Blues Music Archives at the Chicago Public Library. His rare 1985 photo of B.B. King embracing Luther Allison at Switzerland's Nyon Festival was a highlight of 2006's KBA-winning book, The B.B. King Treasures. Since Hurricane Katrina, Jaisun has worked closely with the New Orleans Musicians Clinic and other organizations, both as photographer and fund-raiser. And 40 years ago, he authored the underground hit, "Friendly Neighborhood Narco Agent," still played today.

# **2020 Keeping the Blues Alive Awards**

### Congratulations to the Keeping the Blues Alive Award Class of 2020!

Each year, The Blues Foundation presents the Keeping the Blues Alive (KBA) Awards to individuals and organizations that have made signifi ant contributions to the Blues world. The Blues Foundation will present the 2020 KBA Awards during a recognition lunch Friday, January 31, 2020 in downtown Memphis, Tennessee. The KBA ceremony will be part of the International Blues Challenge (IBC) weekend of events. The 2020 IBC dates are January 28 - February 1.

Unlike the Blues Music Awards, the award recognizing the past year's best in recordings and performance voted on by thousands of The Blues Foundation's members, the KBAs are awarded to non-performers strictly on the basis of merit by a select panel of Blues professionals. Noted educator, author, journalist, and KBA Chairman Art Tipaldi notes "The KBA may be awarded for the recipient's work in the past year but most often reflects a lifetime of work; we don't view the recipient as the winner of a 'best of the year' category. Consistent with this philosophy, the committee generally refrains from awarding the KBA to an individual or organization more than once. Rather, we select a new deserving winner each year, except in rare cases when a signifi ant period of time has elapsed since the fi st award."

Congratulations to the 2020 Keeping the Blues Alive Award recipients.

#### Peter Astrup

Well known to thousands of musicians in Europe and the United States, Peter Astrup has dedicated his life to establishing, and expanding, the blues music scene in his native Denmark and throughout Europe. After two decades of producing and promoting blues events in Europe, he founded the Frederikshavn Blues Festival in that northern Danish port city in 2006. Recently renamed the Blues Heaven Festival, this premier blues event now attracts audiences from 17 countries to enjoy performances by 15 blues, soul, and gospel bands over two full days. In 2018, Astrup launched a second festival, Blues Paradise, that is held the same weekend as the Frederikshavn event. His dedication to blues music has been widely recognized and he has been honored with many awards and accolades, including the French website ZicaZic's International Festival of the Year in 2018 and the 2018 Danish Music Award as Hoochie Coochie Man of the Year for being a pioneer of blues music in Denmark.

#### Dr. Rob Bowman

Dr. Rob Bowman, associate professor of music at Toronto's York University, is an accomplished blues educator lauded for his scholarship as well as for his support of Toronto's blues music community and his involvement in Canada's prestigious Juno Awards. A six-time Grammy nominee, Dr. Bowman received the 1996 Best Album Notes Grammy® for his 47,000-word monograph in the 10-CD box set The Complete Stax/Volt Soul Singles, Vol. 3: 1972-1975. In 1998, he won the prestigious ASCAP Deems Taylor/Virgil Thompson Award for his book Soulsville U.S.A.: The Story of Stax Records, which was inducted into The Blues Foundation's Blues Hall of Fame in 2013. Dr. Bowman has written liner notes for more than 88 blues releases, has been published in distinguished academic journals, and has produced compilations by Isaac Hayes, Carla Thomas, Lou Reed, Otis Redding, and Booker T. & the MG's. Besides teaching the blues in university classrooms, as he has since 1978, he also currently mentors and manages the award-winning Toronto blues band Samantha Martin & Delta Sugar.

#### Cali Blues & Folk Festival

The Cali Blues & Folk Festival is a signature event of the Centro Cultural Colombo Americano in Cali, Colombia. Founded in 1954, this nonprofit binational center is dedicated to enhancing the friendship between Colombia and the United States

through an array of arts, cultural, and English language education programs. In 2007, the Centro began the Cali Blues & Folk Festival, which presents blues artists from the USA, Mexico, Argentina, Spain, and Colombia. Its substantial education and community outreach initiatives include the formation of the Colombian Blues Society in 2014. U.S. blues artists such as Michael "Hawkeye" Herman, Rich DelGrosso, J.P. Soars, and Jon Del Toro Richardson have co-led blues education master classes and educational workshops with local artists that annually attract 500-plus youths (from elementary schools through universities) in eight cities during the festival. Sustained by partnerships with the Mayor's Offic and the Secretary of Culture and Tourism, the Valle del Cauca Promotion of Cultural Programs, the Colombia Ministry of Culture, and the U.S. Embassy, the Cali Blues & Folk Festival has networked with other Colombian festivals to expand performing opportunities for their nation's blues musicians.

#### Hal & Mal's

Operating out of the circa-1923 GM&O freight depot building in downtown Jackson, Mississippi, Hal & Mal's USA Blues Club was founded in 1985 by brothers Hal White (now deceased) and Malcolm White, current director of the Mississippi Arts Commission. While Hal & Mal's has presented all types of music, the main focus has been blues and R&B. The club, in fact, was one of the fi st white-owned venues in central Mississippi to book black bands. Albert King was their fi st act, and B.B. King, Koko Taylor, Little Milton, Mose Allison, James Brown, Charlie Musselwhite, Buckwheat Zydeco, Johnny Winter, R.L. Burnside, Pinetop Perkins, and Bobby Rush performed there over the years. For the past 13 years, Hal & Mal's has partnered with the Central Mississippi Blues Society to host Blue Monday, a show/jam featuring local blues talent as well as visiting musicians who come to play with the Blue Monday

Band. With more than three decades of blues music history, the venue has been identifi d by scholars as deserving of a Mississippi Blues Trail marker from the Mississippi Blues Commission; installation of the marker currently awaiting funding.

#### Jimiway Blues Festival

In 1994, the father-and-son team of Benedykt Kunicki and Oskar Kunicki founded the Jimiway Blues Festival in Ostrów Wielkopolski, Poland. Named in tribute to Jimi Hendrix, this nonprofit initiative is rooted in the mission of presenting a broad spectrum of blues music styles. Music enthusiasts travel from far and wide to attend this two-day event, which is held annually on the third weekend of October. The festival contains a diverse lineup of live concerts, jam sessions, and exhibits of music photos. Internationally renowned blues artists including Sugaray Rayford, Lil' Ed & the Blues Imperials, Kenny Neal, Joe Louis Walker, John Németh, Curtis Salgado, Nick Moss, Coco Montoya, Tommy Castro, Toronzo Cannon, Mr. Sipp, Lucky Peterson, and Albert Cummings have performed at Jimiway. Its organizers also are devoted to showcasing Polish blues stars and promising young blues acts as a way to bring together multiple generations of musicians and fans.

#### Jus' Blues Foundation

Established in 1995, this Georgia-based 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization was founded "to preserve blues heritage through cultural arts by nurturing the soul of the blues with historical blues education programming." Jus' Blues has promoted that education to youths and performing artists in communities nationwide and around the world. The foundation acknowledges the originators of the blues by archiving and preserving the legacy of those artists, and also honors those under-the-radar musicians who are still performing in the blues and soul traditions. The foundation has expanded its goals by recognizing the best in blues and soul music artistry through the annual Jus' Blues Music Awards and Conference, while also establishing itself as a prominent leading blues and soul music advocacy and outreach organization.

#### Kentuckiana Blues Society

Located in Louisville, Kentucky, the Kentuckiana Blues Society was founded in 1988 with the goal to preserve, promote, and perpetuate the blues tradition in all its forms. Th ough extensive research and documentation, the KBS has made major inroads in authenticating the history of the blues in Louisville. Their work has resulted in the discovery of valuable rare photos and interviews, as well as the locations of many early blues-related sites. From its inception, the KBS also has played an active role in the local blues scene. Albert Collins, Pinetop Perkins, Henry Townsend and other blues greats were all able to appear in Louisville under the auspices of the KBS. Since 1988, the KBS has been involved with, and supportive of, multiple local events including the Garvin Gate Blues Festival, Germantown-Schnitzelburg Blues Festival, and the Louisville Blues & Barbecue Festival. Though its historical work and present day community involvement, KBS reveals a strong commitment to keep blues tradition fl urishing so that generations to come will be able to know and appreciate this style of music.

#### Dr. Janice Johnston

Dr. Janice Johnston has been an advocate for blues musician health since becoming involved with The Blues Foundation in 2013. As the chairperson of The Blues Foundation's HART Fund, Dr. Johnston has worked tirelessly to expand the offerings of this fund, which was established to ensure that blues musicians can get the resources needed to secure healthcare for both acute and chronic conditions. She spearheads the free health screenings originally held as part of the International Blues Challenge and Blues Music Awards and that now have expanded to other music festivals and conferences. Johnston regularly negotiates on behalf of musicians to lower their costs for services, and seeks outpatient assistance programs so that musicians can independently continue their care. She also helped develop teams of volunteers in Memphis, Nashville, Las Vegas, and other cities, along with coordinating the hiring of registered nurses to support the program where volunteers were not available. Blues musicians the world over continue to benefit from her ongoing health advocacy on their behalf.

#### Kathleen Lawton

One of the world's preeminent blues DJs, Kathleen Lawton has hosted the radio show Crazy 'Bout the Blues on San Mateo-based KCSM-FM since 1988. It can be heard live on terrestrial radio at 91.1 FM, and streaming via the Internet, every Friday from 9 p.m. until midnight Pacific time. The program has also aired on Radio Free America (www.radiofreeamerica.com) for the past several years. As a result, Lawton's listenership extends beyond the Bay Area to blues fans worldwide, from Montevideo to Mumbai and Miami. Lawton received the Blues DJ of the Year Award in 2004 from the Bay Area Blues Society. While jazz is KCSM's core music, Lawton's mission has been to show listeners how the roots of jazz, and so much modern music, lie in the blues, from Son House and Hop Wilson right up to the Cash Box Kings and Howell Devine. Above all, she aims to entertain and delight all during her three-hour Friday-night show with the passion, wit, wildness, and diversity of the blues — plus gospel, zydeco, and soul music -and make her listeners become "crazy" bout the blues."





Johnny Burgin (Delmark Records)

Cutting his teeth as a young guitar player on Chicago's West Side, Johnny Burgin knows that the blues is best served up as a hot dish performed in front of an enthusiastic audience. His latest release, simply titled Live, is a perfect example of this notion. Captured on one night at the Redwood Café near Santa Rosa, California, the 14-song set of original material from and a tight backing band that includes Kid Anderson on guitar and piano, Steve Dougherty on drums and Chris Matheos on bass is as authentic as it gets. Burgin has a seasoned gritty tenor akin to Paul Butterfi ld, which is why he invited two stellar harmonica masters to sit in: The fie y Aki Kumar and living legend Charlie Musselwhite (who also made his mark in Chicago). Portland blues broad Rae Gordon also trades vocals with Burgin on two funloving tracks, and she takes the lead on one of her own tunes, the sassy "Late Night Date Night." Saxophonist Nancy Wright adds depth to the band on four tracks including the swaggering instrumental, "Louisiana Walk." A self-professed "traditionalist," Burgin, utilizes familiar themes in his songwriting and the CD feels like a longlost Chess Records session taped at 2120 South Michigan Avenue. This skill is highlighted on the slow burning "When a Bluesman Comes to Town." Burgin, being a smart bandleader, gives each of his players moments to shine throughout the whole set.

The Love Light Orchestra Featuring John Németh Live from the Bar DKDC (Blue Barrell Records)

The Love Light Orchestra took their name from Bobby "Blue" Bland's '61 #2 R&B and Top 40 Pop charting hit "Turn On Your Love Light." Recorded in Mid-town Memphis Live from the Bar DKDC features a 10-piece line-up, half members of the Bo Keys, with John Németh on vocals and the balance in demand Memphis players including two from the popular Mighty Souls Brass Band. The dozen songs are pure Memphis with selections from the songbooks of Bland, BB King, Junior Parker, Percy Mayfi ld, AL Green plus three originals, one each by project organizers Joe Restivo, guitar and Marc Franklin, trumpet; both from the Bo Keys and one from Németh. From the opening notes of Restivo's "See Why I Love You?" it is evident that the album is a monster. John and company go deep into the songbooks to pull out King's "Bad Breaks," Bland's "I've Been Wrong So Long" and "Poverty" and Junior Parker's "Sometimes." Every song is fantastic, and John is performing at the top of his game. One of my favorites is Charles Sheffield's Excello Records hit "It's Your Voodoo Talking" featuring Kirk Smothers' burping bari sax. Another highlight is Freddie King's "What About Love," this version featuring solos by Franklin on sax followed by Restivo on guitar, after all this is a horn album featuring the dynamic five-piece horn section. Németh's cut is "Lonesome and High" with John singing "I'm lonesome and high, and I'm looking for a friend/ladies, ladies won't you save me from my bitter end?" with his keyboard player Gerald Stephens and Joe both taking choice solos at the bridge. Next up is Franklin's" Singing for My Supper," a horn drenched percolating bluesy number that swings and sways as Restivo's punctuates it with stabbing guitar lines. The tour de force comes at the end with both Percy Mayfi ld's slow soul ballad" Please Send Me Someone to Love" and Al Green's seminal hit "Love and Happiness" both of which John nails. Very, Very highly recommended. Malcolm Kennedy



Weldon Kekauoha Pilialoha ('Ohelo Records)

Weldon Kekauoha's Pipiaoha was Grammy nominated in the Best Regional Roots Music category for the 55th awards and has received numerous local awards in Hawaii including Entertainer, Male Vocalist, Album

and Song of the year. He has performed in several prestigious clubs in Hawaii, Japan and the U.S. mainland. All 11 songs are delivered in the Hawaiian language and the wonderful liner notes have the Hawaiian words and English translations, additionally several have interesting anecdotes. These songs instantly transported me 2,700 miles southwest across the Pacific Ocean to the open-air pool side lounge where I saw Weldon and his band perform live, where several of the patrons got up to perform impromptu hula dances (I'm talking the real deal here.) The captivating lilting rhythms and beautiful harmonies abound as on "Ku'u Lei Hiwahiwa," a song which was a wedding gift about enduring love as represented by a fl wer lei. One favorite is the brisk paced "Leialoha Lei Onaoma" and another is the bouncy "E Ho'I Ke Aloha I Maunawili" a song of life and the joys of a child in the early 1900's on windward Oahu. "Ho'onanea" features slack key slide guitar and is another beautiful love song. Truly a terrific album which I highly recommend, and I also suggest looking Weldon up to see him perform when you have an opportunity. Malcolm Kennedy



II Cale Stay Around (Because Music)

JJ Cale passed away on July 26th, 2013, and the posthumous release Stay Around was loving compiled by his widow, musician and bandmate, Christine Lakeland Cale and friend and longtime manager Mike Kappus. All 15 original tracks were produced and mixed by JJ and have the sound and feel of his early records. Stay Around opens with the aptly titled "Lights Down Low" as JJ sings about 'just doin' my thang" and is an instant classic Cale song. "Chasing You" was released as the debut single from Stay Around and was released along with a very cool Cale road trip video, much of it from the DVD release To Tulsa and Back. "Girl of Mine" is a front porch blues and "Go Downtown" has a full radio ready feel. One of my favorite tracks is "Tell Daddy" with

keys and brushes on the drums as IJ sings "your dreams don't seem just right/so hard to get through the night, tell your daddy to help you through/don't wait, don't hesitate, throw away your trouble and communicate, let your daddy/help you through" and closes out with a perfect JJ riff. Another beauty is "Long About Sundown" which sports some slithery slide and masterly picking over a chugging rhythm. Although he received a Grammy Award for his 2008 record with Eric Clapton, Road to Escondido, Cale, a man won never actively sought out fame, never even got it from the box to the mantelpiece, that's just the kind of man he was, unassuming and very real. Songs Cale wrote have been covered dozens of times by numerous artists, most famously several were covered by Clapton, and Lynyrd Skynyrd had a big hit with one too, the royalties just from these covers allowed JJ the freedom to make and release his music the way he wished. I have been a major fan of Cale for a long time and Stay Around is quickly becoming a favorite. It is all killer and no filler. I give the album my highest recommendation. Malcolm Kennedy



Kim Smith Miller Norton Buffalo: Band Brother (Turn Point Press)

The new book by Kim Smith Miller, Norton Buffalo: Band Brother, released in the fall of 2019, is a photographic and testimonial tribute to the late Norton Buff lo, who is considered by many to be one of the greatest harmonica players of the last 50 years. During her time on the road with the Steve Miller Band from 1982 to 2012, Kim Smith Miller took thousands of photographs of the group and gathered a lifetime of memories.

Along with good friend and curator Ian Boyden, she culled her collection down to fit into the 200-page photo essay that includes Steve Miller's personal favorite photo of Norton Buff lo. The striking black and white images not only tell the story of a musical career, but also reflect a personal life full of dynamic drama and grace. Accompanying her remarkable shots are interviews with band members Kenny Lee Lewis and Steve Miller. Kenny Lee Lewis and Steve Miller recall fond memories of sharing the stage with Norton Buff lo for over 30 years.

Fellow harmonica player Curtis Salgado provides unique insight to the instrument relating the lessons he learned from his dear friend. Watching Norton Buff lo, Curtis realized that playing harmonica wasn't just playing an instrument, but "literally breathing music." Kim Smith Miller teaches us about the challenges of being a female photographer in the world of rock 'n' roll, and each of her photographs show how she captured the magic that happens every night on the road with a touring rock 'n roll band at the top of the charts.

Woven through each interview are fond memories, anecdotes, wild tales, and glimpses into the character that was Norton Buff lo, and how his magical personality affected all of those around him, as he strove to be a blessing to the world. Rick J Bowen



Jack Mack and the Heart

Live from Centennial Park, Atlanta 1996

(SSR Free Roll Records)

Resurrected from the ashes of the 1996 Summer Olympics in Atlanta, offi ally known as the Games of the XXVI Olympiad, the world fi ally gets to hear a recording of one of the greatest party bands ever to rock the house, Live from Centennial Park, Atlanta 1996, from Jack Mack and the Heart Attack. The album was released last month in conjunction with the new film Richard Jewell from Clint Eastwood and Warner Brothers. Jewell was a security guard who discovered a backpack with pipe bombs in it and he helped evacuate Centennial Park before the bombs exploded. Playing out like the syllabus of a master class, the 11-song set details the prime elements needed to be a successful working dance band. Which is precisely how they earned the moniker "the hardest working band in soul business," for over 40 years. The high energy sound of five original tunes and perfectly timed R&B and soul classics are designed to showcase each member of the band and ignite the crowd into a dancing frenzy. Albino Bennett kicks off the primeval funk groove of "(We Got) More Soul," with bassman Tim Scott, guitarist Andrew Kastner and John Paruolo on Hammond B3 falling in behind nicely. The mighty Heart Attack Horns of Lester Lovitt on trumpet and Bill Bergman on sax join in on the East Bay soul prototype. The stirring performance of the Staples Singers' standard, "I'll Take You There," is the fi st of two songs chosen to be featured in the new film. The fi al song of the set, "I Walked Alone," received ovations for the sweet R&B love song that was cut short by the senseless bomb blast. Nearly 40,000 people attended the 1996 Olympiad party on a sultry night in July of 1996. Now that this album has resurfaced, let us hope that they will remember the blessing of music and joy delivered by Jack Mack and the Heart Attack above and beyond the tragedy that cut short their dynamic performance. Last year at the International Blues Challenge, I was particularly taken by the performance of Miranda Kitchpanich and Nick Mardon at an afternoon jam session facilitated by long-time Blues Foundation volunteer, and Washington Blues Society president Tony Frederickson. I was impressed by Amanda's command of some pretty important blues references and the way she held the audience's attention.

I thought back to the fi st time I saw Miranda perform. It was in 2014 at the Neptune Theatre's Nights at the Neptune show that we developed in partnership with a grant from the Seattle Theatre Group. That evening, entitled Music Marches On, featured many young performers led by the MusicBox Project and former Education Director Roy Brown through a revue of American music through the ages.

Music Marches On had its roots in the Washington Blues Society's strong history of helping young people learn about blues music. In 2001, the late James "Curley" Cooke developed Pacific Northwest Blues in the Schools as a standalone nonprofit organization apart from the blues society, and Annette Taborn joined him in providing blues education in schools, youth correctional facilities and select parks and recreation programs. Over time, editorial writer Lance Dickie covered Curley's work in The Seattle Times and highlighted the way he effectively and compassionately reached young people through blues music. I had the good fortune, along with Rhea Rolfe and Roy Brown, to work on a Blues in the Schools fundraiser at the SeaTac Holiday Inn many years ago that filled a ballroom with many BB Award winners at an exceptional jam session.

I wish Miranda the best in her return to Memphis this month!





Miranda Kitchpanich is a dynamic 18 year old vocalist, guitarist, bassist, and songwriter hailing from the rainy city of Seattle, WA. She grew up in a musically rich environment where her skills as a vocalist were developed at an early age. Miranda is honored to represent the Washington Blues Society for her fi h and fi al year as their Youth Showcase Act at the IBC. Her earliest influences come from inspiring artists such as Beth Hart, Etta James, BB King and Elmore James. "Like so many musicians, I have worked some pretty unforgettable jobs....""

Like so many musicians, I have worked some pretty unforgettable jobs. The one that takes the cake was in the 70s when I was asked to play at the Trojan Horse in Seattle.

The band was hired to open for The Chico Arnez show and needed a bass player. It was the strangest three hours that I had ever spent. Chico was a guy in his seventies and was into old time show business.

First off, there was a the 10-piece band, dancing girls and more! It started with the band playing a version of "Route 66." Then, enter several very close to nude showgirls singing "Here Comes Chico." Th s went on for about five minutes and out walked, "the Star of the Show," Chico Arnez, dressed in a bright pink suit. I'm not sure why, but the audience started clapping.

Ok, the girls leave the stage and Chico started singing. Mostly songs that were popular during the 1940s. The crowd loved it. He ended with, I swear, "God Bless America!" The entire room stood up and cheered. Even at this point, I was way beyond confused as to how he got a booking at the club. My jaw completely dropped when he started a song and then stopped the show and told the audience to excuse him while he tried to remember the lyrics. One of the guys in the band walked up and softly helped him with the words to the tune. I'm thinking, "this must be part of the show." It turned out I was way wrong; it was just the beginning.

Enter the dancing girls now dressed in even less clothing and doing a song and dance number. You would have had to be blind not to notice one of the girls in the front, who had obviously forgot the routine. It was really hard to watch, after several attempts, when she fi ally gave up and left he stage.

#### Then, HERE COMES CHICO!


He is now dressed in an orange suit. He starts talking to the crowd about his many years as an entertainer. While he is rambling on, the band leaves the stage. When they return, they have the same colored suits as the star of the show. Then, here comes the girls wearing the same color suit. I wasn't sure what this meant (and still don't). As the lights in the room dimmed, a screen appeared on the wall showing Chico's house, his car, his wife and his dogs. You get the idea. The stage lights come back on, everybody is on stage, all dressed alike singing "There's no business like show business."

Again, the audience is standing up cheering. And then...on came the BUBBLE MACHINE!!

It is obviously on the fast-bubble setting. The bubbles are flying out like bullets and filling up the room. People are screaming and running for the door. It was all completely unbelievable!

Chico was cancelled for the rest of his dates at The Trojan Horse and we were, OK by me, out of work.



Please nominate in the 2020 Washington Blues Society "Best of the Blues" Awards

Participation in nominating artists in the Washington Blues Society's annual awards program is one of the many privileges of membership in the Washington Blues Society.

I think that the most important things are to exercise your right to 1) nominate, and 2) vote. Your participation is important to the process.

The nomination ballots will be in the December and January issues with a due date of January 14, 2019 (due to a board member, postmarked to our PO Box or emailed to president@wablues.org).

The voting ballots will be in the February and March issues with a due date of March 10, 2020 (due to a board member, postmarked to our PO Box or emailed to president@wablues.org).

Please stay tuned to the Washington Blues Society website, Facebook page and the Bluesletter for details on the 2020 Best of the Blues Awards ("BB Awards").

Who can participate? Washington Blues Society members in current standing: See your renewal date on your membership card or the label on the back cover of this issue

How to Nominate? Simply write the name of the Washington artist or party in the category on the ballot on page 31 of your Bluesletter.

We encourage you to nominate in as many categories as you can; however, leaving some blank will not disqualify your nomination.

Your nomination must be on the Bluesletter mailed to you with your mailing label attached. For couples, a photocopy used for the second ballot should be included in a sealed envelope along with the original ballot that has your mailing label attached.

Ballots received without the mailing label attached will not be counted unless membership has been verifi d by the Board of Directors.

Not Eligible for Election. Previous recipients of both the Lifetime Achievement Award and the Blues Musicians Hall of Fame are not eligible for a second award in these categories, so don't waste your vote. See list of recipients at the Washington Blues Society web site www.wablues.org.


The BB Awards has several categories where a particular artist or event has won the award many times. We have chosen to honor four of those artists by naming those awards after them.
