LETTER FROM THE EDITOR



Hi Bluesletter Readers,

As I type these words past our "deadline dash," Governor Jay Inslee has announced a rather strong return to where we were back in March with new limits on indoor dining, haircuts at barber shops and salons, closures of movie theatres and new limits on retail stores down to 25% from 30% and new safeguards for religious services and family gatherings.

From what I've learned since my last business trip was abruptly curtailed in Los Angeles this past March by an alarming rise in COVID-19 cases, I think Inslee's new requirements are right-on. Sure, I clearly understand that many small businesses will not survive the third resurgence of the unprecedented COVID-19 virus, I really do. However, I really don't like it, and at times while I wished our governor adapted the strategies of leaders of our neighbors in Idaho, I've reflected with close and extended family members about the crucial need for us to stay home this Thanksgiving and Christmas seasons. Again, it's not my first choice, but I clearly understand why the latest clampdown in Washington State is essential.

All that said, I'm pleased that this issue of the Bluesletter has some very familiar and reliable content as well as some new and innovative features as well. We have a preview of the $24^{\rm th}$ annual Maple Blues Awards nominees thanks to the venerable Toronto Blues Society.

I've long considered these awards from our Northern neighbors to be an important, early in the year follow-up to the International Blues Foundation and Keeping the Blues Alive Awards from The Blues Foundation in Memphis. Next up, we have the nomination ballot for next year's Washington Blues Society Board of Directors and the nomination ballot of the 2021 Best of the Blues ("BB Awards") of the Washington Blues Society. Each of these features have been regular and expected content for each December Bluesletter.

I am pleased that this issue also includes two new innovations: 1) Our first-ever Bluesletter Music Buyer's Guide and 2) A look back at each Bluesletter cover of 2020. Please use our Bluesletter Music Buyer's Guide to buy music from regional and local artists. Our online version at www.wablues.org is more up-to-date than our print version, so please check it out for the latest and greatest. This past year, the Bluesletter has worked to acknowledge and include more diverse artists on the cover and I'm pleased at how each cover looks on one page. Please join me in looking back to a very challenging year faced by blues muscians in our extended blues family.

During the production of this month's issue, I reconnected with former Washington Blues Society Board member Roy Brown at Starbucks near my home in Mill Creek. Next month, I plan to review his fi st novel, Awakened from Oblivion. It was a lot of fun to learn about his work behind the keyboard as a novelist. Perhaps more importantly, I enjoyed talking to him and remembered the spark that fueled his "Sound Off" column these pages many years ago, his years of work as Education Director for the Washington Blues Society and special moments all dressed up in a tuxedo at the podium as host of several Best of the Blues ("BB Awards") shows.

As Roy talked, I thought about one of my favorite movies of all time, "Casablanca." Especially when Victor Laslzo, a freedom fi hter who escaped from a concentration camp played by Paul Heinreid. When he met Rick Blaine, the perennially fatigued proprietor of Rick's Café Americain in Casablanca, played by Humphrey Bogart. Victor welcomed Rick back to the to the side of the good guys.

I thought of that moment in the movie when Roy returned to his car with his sidekick, Huck, welcoming him back, tail a-wagging.

"Roy, welcome back to the fi ht." If that reference is lost on some readers, please watch "Casablanca." Here's looking at you, kid.

24th Maple Blues Awards Nominees Announced

Congratulations to the Toronto Blues Society on its 25th anniversary!

Despite 2020 being the year that really wasn't, the Toronto Blues Society continues to support and promote Canadian blues artists by announcing the nominees for the upcoming 24th annual Maple Blues Awards. The winners will be announced online from four cities over four nights on February 1, 8, 15, and 22.

Leading the way in nominations is Toronto's Jack de Keyzer, who along with his bandmates garnered seven nominations for Entertainer of the Year, Electric Act of the Year, Male Vocalist of the Year, Recording/ Producer of the Year, Guitarist of the Year, Horn Player of the Year (for Richard Thornton) and Bassist of the Year (for Alan Duffy).

Ottawa's JW-Jones and his band(s) are nominated in five categories including Entertainer of the Year, Electric Act of the Year, New Artist of the Year (for Jones' second project HOROJO Trio), Recording/ Producer of the Year and Guitarist of the

Toronto's Samantha Martin and Delta Sugar have been nominated for four Maple Blues Awards in the categories of Entertainer of the Year, Electric Act of the Year, Female Vocalist of the Year and Drummer of the Year (for Dani Nash). The esteemed Blues Booster of the Year Award winner will be announced at a later date.

"The Pandemic has given us a new reason to feel the blues, but fortunately we will honour the latest body of work and artists with trophies and digital celebrations", says Derek Andrews, President of Toronto Blues Society. "Congratulations to all the nominees."

Registration and voting for the 24th Annual Maple Blues Awards will be open to the Canadian public from November 2nd at 12AM Eastern Time, through to December 1st 11:59PM Eastern Time. Blues fans can register and vote at www.mapleblues.ca.

The artists perform in an empty venue with no audience and are instead filmed with multiple camera angles and broadcast out to a live virtual audience across various platforms. The live streams are presented at no cost, and fans are encouraged to "Pay-What-You-Will" with contributions supporting the artists, venue, and various nonprofit social causes. Keeping performers and limited crew safe is the #1 priority and Nectar Lounge has a series of ground rules that require strict adherence as prerequisite to proceeding with each of these performances. The venue limits the number of people in the building to the absolute minimum of essential workforce only and has measures in place to promote social distancing before, during, and after performances. Self-reporting and temperature taking is a mandatory request to ensure nobody is symptomatic.

Musicians are encouraged to wear masks while not performing. Nectar Lounge employees sanitize equipment after each performance, and do not allow sharing of microphones. Hand sanitizer is available throughout and, of course, encourage hand hygiene, while discouraging any/all contact between individuals, face touching, etc., and prohibiting close contact between crew members and performers.

Nectar Virtual Concert Series (NVCS) is produced using the pro venue sound, lights, videography and stage at Seattle's Nectar Lounge, an independent music venue forced to shut down in mid-March due to the Coronavirus pandemic.

Our goal is to deliver the closest-to-actual live concert experience in a virtual concert format. Performances are filmed and broadcast live so that the performers can read your comments and engage with the audience in real time... so let them know you're out there!

So where is everybody?

The artists perform in an empty venue with no actual audience and are instead filmed with multiple camera angles and broadcast out to a live virtual audience across various platforms.

But we couldn't do it without your support!

The live streams are presented at no cost, and fans are encouraged to "Pay-What-You-Will" with contributions powering the streams and directly supporting the artists, venue, and various social causes. As of mid-November, NVCS has produced over 100 Virtual Concerts thanks to the support of generous viewers like YOU!

Keeping performers and limited crew safe is the #1 priority and we have a series of ground rules that require strict adherence as prerequisite to proceeding with each of these performances. We limit the people in the building to the absolute minimum of essential workforce only and have measures in place to promote social distancing before, during, and after performances. Self-reporting and temperature taking is a mandatory request to ensure nobody is symptomatic.

Musicians are required to wear masks while not performing, and encouraged to mask up while performing when they can. We do sanitize equipment after each performance, and do not allow sharing of microphones.

Hand sanitizer is available throughout and, of course, we encourage hand hygiene, while discouraging any/all contact between individuals, face touching,

Remembering Drummer Douglas Roach

"You may have seen Douglas play at venues such as Egan's, Frankie's, the Bite of Tacoma..."

Douglas Roach was a lifelong musician. His fi st professional venture was Paragon, a dance band made up of family members, which played in Tucson, Arizona, for seven years in the 1980s. Paragon recorded an album of original tunes (two of them written by Douglas) with tracks being played on local radio stations.

In college and law school, he made extra money playing in a polka band, complete with lederhosen.

More recently, he started or participated in several bands that have graced the Seattle rock, blues, and jazz scene since 2004, including the rock and blues band Ruby's Basement, the Temptation Trio, Bluetopia and the Melcats.



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It was his life-long dream to have a jazz group of his own, a dream he fi ally realized with the Douglas Roach Jazz Combo, a superbly polished ensemble delivering "instrumental jazz with attitude."

You may have seen Douglas play at venues such as Egan's, Frankie's, the Wallingford Street Fair, the Bite of Tacoma, the Western Washington State Fair, and the Den.

His last public performances, in the age of COVID-19, were impeccably produced events featuring the Douglas Roach Jazz Combo and the Melcats, livestreamed from his deck for the pleasure of his neighbors as well as a wide electronic audience.

Douglas was a renaissance man. In addition to his drumming, he was a talented singer, and he and his spouse Ruby Blondell sang for many years with the Kirkland Choral Society. He also accompanied the Kirkland Choral Society on drums in many concerts.

A former contractor, Douglas spent a great deal of his time building beautiful custom drum kits. Besides being a gifted musician, he was a highly respected construction attorney as well as a husband, father, grandfather, and friend to many.

Douglas is survived by his spouse, Ruby



Blondell, his four children and their families, his parents and three siblings, as well as legions of friends.

Blues You Can Use: CD Reviews

Dennis Jones Soft, Hard & Loud (Blue Rock Records)

Upon returning from another successful European tour with his power trio, Los Angeles-based guitarist Dennis Jones dove headlong into songwriting for his seventh album. The stalwart singer songwriter and guitar gunslinger crafted another set of tunes showcasing his musical dexterity and poignant worldview. The title references the dynamic range of the trio who are able to go from a whisper to a scream, so he called the new album Soft, Hard and Loud. The sessions began in February 2020, but met with stoppages and challenges that most artists are facing this year. Undaunted, Jones used the time to craft thought provoking lyrics and ear grabbing riffs on another energetic set of high-powered blues, funky rock riffs and super charged soul. His muscular rhythm section of Raymond Johnson on drums and Cornelius Memes on bass, who co-produced the album with Jones, blaze on every track showing off their formidable shops earned by countless hours on the road playing shows from small gin joints to Colosseum seating venues. The trio invited special guests Bennett Paysinger to drop tasty Hammond B3 on a few tracks, while blues woman Allison August, added sweet harmonies to the project. Jones' early aspirations as a drummer who then switched to guitar shine through on the tantalizing rhythms of the opening track "Revolves Around You" along with its precocious word play. The autobiographical "I Love the Blues" speaks openly about his small-town roots and growing up in rural Maryland with a family that supported his musical aspirations. Jones uses an overdriven Les Paul plugged straight into an amp fi ing a riff over a four on the fl or beat to deliver his assessment of the current state of the world on the acerbic rocker "Like

Sheep." Howlin Wolf made the world aware of the southern phraseology of "Back Door Man" in 1960, and here Jones fl ps that idea around on the fast-moving blues of "Front Door Man" entreating his lady to make him her number one lover. He gets romantic on the classic rhythm and blues sonnet "Nothing on You. The heavy duty bump and grind blues, "When I Wake Up," is a fie y showstopper full of guitar pyrotechnics, revealing Jones' influences from Hendrix styled wah-wah and Buddy Guy-inspired bravado. Jones saves the bulk of his angst for the fi ale, a guitar-driven vigorous rebuke of southern culture, "Burn The Plantation Down," exorcising the demons inside a man in bondage, struggling to set himself and his family free. Another strong effort from a hard-working showman and his team.

Peter V Blues Train Grass Ain't Greener on the Other Side (Self-Released)

Not to be undaunted by the particularly challenging year that is 2020, guitar journeyman Peter Veteska reloaded, regrouped, and recharged his band, the Blues Train, to complete his fi h CD for an October release. Titled Grass Ain't Greener on the Other Side, the 10-song set is a departure from his previous jazz and funk influences, with the renowned hardworking guitarist going for a purer rock and blues sound. Peter V and longtime bandmate drummer Alex D'Agnese, join forces with Bassist Coo Mo Jee, and Keyboardist Jeff Levine to further home in on They're tight East Coast blues rock power. The quartet is joined by special guests Mikey Junior on vocals and blues harp, powerhouse vocalist Jenn Barne, and Delaware blues veteran Roger Girke. The sessions were expertly

engineered by Joseph DiMaio at Shorefi e Studios capturing the record with a hurricane brewing outside their doors. The fun begins with Peter V playing the role of a man bewitched on the slinky rocker "Am I Wrong Pretty Baby," as Mikey Junior echoes his words with greasy blues harp. The hardworking Jenn Barnes who leads her own band on the Jersey Shore joins Peter for a cover of the 1960 Dinah Washington and Brook Benton hit "Baby You've Got What it Takes," reimagining the swinging tune as a hot Texas blues shuffl that amps up the steamy vocal interplay. The groovy dance track "Running Like a Dog," features lead lines on Stratocaster and Hammond B3 showcasing be effective new partnership between Peter V and Levine. The whole band stretches out on the swinging "You Give Me Lovin," before Peter gets sentimental on the Rat Pack-styled "Learning the Blues." D'Agnese throws down a great New Orleans boogaloo on the other fi e dance track "Drinking and Drinking." Peter enlisted another hard-working musician from the mid-Atlantic region, Roger Girke, to trade vocals and guitar solos on a freewheeling cover of Ray Charles' classic "Heartbreaker." The Blues Train then cruise at full steam through a rousing version of the Willie Cobbs' standard "You Don't Love Me," paying homage to the popular extended jam version made famous by the Allman Brothers by trading organ and guitar solos on the album's longest track. Peter closes the set with the title track "Grass Ain't Greener on the Other Side," revealing the philosophy behind his rebellious nature and showing off his formidable guitar skills on the album's dramatic fi ale. As a bonus for devoted fans ,Mikey Junior sits in with the band on "All Night Long," a swinging acoustic blues encore.

Buddy Guy said this about Vanessa: "... Came onstage with me... I forgot where I was, but she's playing an alto sax, and man, she was amazing!" A fitting intro to her 4th self-produced CD that features funk, soul, rock, and blues. Heart on the Line starts off with a funky James Brown tune, "Super Bad," propelled by a powerful bass beat by Scot Sutherland and tight vocals and a soulful sax solo by Vanessa. "What Makes You Beautiful" is a laid-back tune with Vanessa doing double duty on lead and background vocals. Up comes "Bloodhound" with Vanessa playing a Resonator guitar on this Delta blues original and Laura Chavez (formerly with Candye Kane) laying down a nice lead solo. "I Don't Want Anything to Change" is a sweet ballad that will leave you feeling smiling with Vanessa's soothing vocals and great sax. Picking up the tempo with "Leave Your Hat On," the band put together a nice rendition of the Randy Newman classic with a Big Band feel with nice tempo changes and another fi e solo by Chavez. Another of the disc's eight originals is "Take a Chance on Me" with great horn work including Quinn Carson on trombone and Doug Woolverton on trumpet. "Weep and Moan" is a soulful tune that will bring up visions of a smokefilled bar at closing time. "Who's in Power" includes some nice keyboards by William Gorman and asks some relevant questions in this strangest of years. Laid back, Funky, Lots of horns + Dynamite Vocals = "Freshly Squozen," - a toe tapping, head bobbing tune! The album closes out with the title song "Heart on the Line," an uplifting song that includes "going home to kick my shoes off" in the chorus. I fi d this lends itself well to Vanessa's aura, as does the photos by Beth Vermeer gracing the cover and back of this fi e CD. Ray Kurth

Artists and crew will share stories and offer glimpses into live entertainment production; lineup and additional details will be revealed in the coming weeks.

Funds raised by the festival will be donated to MusiCares, the Roadie Clinic, and Country Music Association Foundation. Contributions can be made via the festival's website now through December.

"In times of crisis, the entertainment and events industry have always stepped up with a call to action and so many incredible

events like Live Aid and Farm Aid to the more recent Global Citizen events," the festival's co-founder Eileen Valois said in a statement.

"Behind the scenes of every one of those benefits are the millions of people in our workforce. The average concert requires nearly 500 people to make it possible, from concessions and security to tour bus drivers, technical crew, and everyone in between. This is our crisis and now we need to take care of our own."

Added co-founder Shannon Cook: "We've seen depression and anxiety take hold across our community, loss of life due to suicide, families in fear of losing homes, and generational small businesses closing their doors. With large-scale gatherings not expected to return until mid to late 2021, workers across this industry face a very uncertain future."

Writing My First Novel

"This story is steeped in blues references and local landmarks from Seattle to Darrington."

I come from a family that writes. Grandpa Brown was the fi st. He owned a print shop that was originally located in Snohomish, moving to Everett as he grew older.

My dad and uncle, in a bit of a coup, took over the ownership of Printer Brown. Clarence Brown was a patriot: he made an offer to the government. Clarence was willing to convert his successful printing business into a tool and die shop to produce spare parts for the war effort against Hitler. A low level bureaucrat wrote back, in an insulting manner, rejecting the offer. My grandfather was incensed at the rejection of his offer and the condescending attitude of the person representing America. He wrote scathing letters back to the US government. The letters were printed in the Everett Herald, thus activating the creative writing gene that seems to be a part of our family. Printer Brown was a well-known business in Everett doing work for at least one local church, both high schools, and lots of miscellaneous work for other residents. The business also published one book. Outside the scope of business, my dad, from time to time, wrote humorous stories that were oriented to our family and were slap-yoursides and roll-on-the-fl or funny.

Son Christopher was writing a novel after school in his junior high years. He wasn't "ready for prime time," but how many junior high kids come home from school and sit down to work on a manuscript? I know only one.

I've been writing for about three decades. It started out as journal writing. Also, technical writing was about 50% of my work over a 40 year career. Most if not all that I've written is saved on a computer file. It's fun to go back to see where my head was at over a period of about 30 years. It was some time before I was ready for prime

time. Some readers might remember that I wrote consistently for Bluesletter for several


The one piece of writing I had never attempted was to write a full length novel, so why not?

I sent my fi st novel to both Eric Steiner and Rick Bowen of the Washington Blues Society for review. Eric's in the process of fin shing the book on his Kindle and he tells me that his review will land in an upcoming Bluesletter.

Briefly, *Awakened from Oblivion* is the story is about two young adults relegated to the scrap heap of shattered souls. It is set locally, and mostly takes place in Darrington and Seattle. When the two meet and the story begins to unfold, Polly June and Lester each begin to make their fi st true friend. With the help of a Native American spirit guide and the building of a relationship, both will become more than they ever could have imagined. This is indeed the theme of the story which morphs into a full blown murder mystery. This story is steeped in blues references and local landmarks from Seattle to Darrington.

True, you don't really need to know any of this, but it is preliminary to fulfilling a request from Washington Blues Society Bluesletter editor Eric Steiner. He had asked for an article about the process of writing a manuscript as I have had with no previous experience in doing so. It has been an interesting journey and it's been sometimes a very frustrating ride.

I had thought about writing a novel for some time, and the story began to form in my head. It was intriguing at fi st, but the more I thought about my idea, the more stupid the scenario seemed to be. I'm embarrassed really, to even explain the idea, but that fi st attempt did reveal one important element:



the story needed a magical character, and I explored one from the fi st attempt at the novel. He was a Native American spirit guide who lived and died hundreds of years past. Rising Star was a tribal shaman who not only healed but also taught and trained tribal members, especially the children, to rise up-- to become more than they ever could have been without the shaman's guidance.

Having never done this kind of work before, there was a lot that I ultimately discovered. I had seldom done descriptive writing and had never tried character development. Both are central to writing a fi tion story. I needed to teach myself to describe elements in specific detail so the reader would get the image necessary to understand and enjoy the developing story. I needed to learn to develop believable characters. I found that fi tional characters, sympathetic or not, make or break a good tale. Learning how to develop them required multiple attempts until the descriptions became clear.



This project was more than sitting at the computer and typing, but a mental one. Getting excited about this project, I often daydreamed about the task of physically describing characters. That took me eventually to the keyboard to write, then revise, then write again and so forth until the words on the page conveyed the pictures that were occurring mentally. It took many months to get to that stage. Finally, I asked a couple of folks to read what was written to tell me if the descriptions indeed painted a word picture, or not. If not, the process would begin anew.

The main setting in Darrington is an A-Frame structure located on the Sauk River. I started with the description of the home on the Sauk, along with its location on the river.

I literally spent months writing, reviewing and rewriting these elements. When I was fi ally satisfi d that the writing not only explained the location physically, it would also connect emotionally with the reader.

I fi ally had a start. The description of the

main characters was not terribly difficult. When I had them and plunked them into the beginning of the story it was ready to write.

Then, a wondrous thing happened as I was sitting at the computer expecting to start writing my fi st novel.

I had no preconceived idea as to the beginning, middle and end: it didn't prove necessary. While at the keyboard, the story just began to appear. It was exactly like reading the manuscript, not writing it. It didn't feel like me beginning the story; it felt like the characters were writing through me while I was the vessel that somehow allowed the characters to emerge.

Th s "automatic writing" continued off and on, over a couple of decades. It didn't feel like I wrote this story at all: I was needed to make the keyboard sing as the story fl wed through the characters. It was Lester and Polly June who were feeding the story to my fi gers. It was so odd to sit at the keyboard with no idea about what would appear on the screen and then have the story just fl w.

The most frustrating part of the process was getting cornered by the plot where I could see no way out, like fi ding myself at the end of a blind alley with no escape. Ths happened on many occasions and was the reason the writing process took so long. When that occurred with no perceived way out I would put the story away.

Sometimes the story did not advance for months or even years. I felt a lot of discouragement, thinking the experiment was fin shed with the would-be author a failure at his fi st major project, and then all at once it would just come to me how to get out of that blind alley and advance the plot. The writing would then continue at a heightened pace. Excitement for the project grew until I found myself in another blind alley, and this was the process until the last word was written.

At that point I thought the manuscript was fin shed. Hah! Copy editing and ongoing revisions continued. The beta reading by about a dozen people was encouraging and is now complete. The consensus has been very positive. A graphic artist for the cover and spine artwork has been a godsend. She is also taking the lead on the Amazon publishing process. I hope to announce a release date for February, 2021, the week before Valentine's Day.

This has been a project I will do again. I have a sequel bubbling in my brain which will start as soon as Awakened from Oblivion is wrapped up.

Would you enjoy the read? The story is one part feel good, one part magical teaching, all wrapped up in a murder mystery exacerbated by at least a passing interest in a controversial mental health diagnosis. Editor's Note: As of our December deadline, I'm almost done reading Roy's novel. I'm impressed at how he captured the pride of place that Pacific Northwest residents feel about living in such a beautiful and complex place, whether they live on Seattle's Queen Ann Hill or communities not far from Interstate 5 like Darrington. 

My Forty Sáints, Lent

I've long been a fan of Rev. Dave Brown and his work with Blues Vespers in Tacoma and Seattle. Over the years, I've learned something new from his contributions to the Tacoma News Tribune, poetry readings at Blues Vespers at the Immanuel Presbyterian Church and his work with Imam Jamal Rahman and Rabbi Ted Falcon as the "Pacific Northwest Interfaith Amigos."

Earlier this year, I bought his book, My Forty Saints, Lent 2020, printed by Benson Printing in Tacoma. I'm the fi st to admit that I'm a lapsed Catholic and have forgotten many of the lessons of Lent from the priests and the nuns at not only at St. Irenaeus Church growing up in Park Forest, Illinois, but also from members of the Catholic clergy in my extended family. One of my great uncles was an Abbot in the Order of St. Benedict and a great aunt was an elementary school teacher and a nun in the Order of St. Francis in nearby Joliet, Illinois. I wore the late Father Abbot's three-piece suit beneath my graduation gown at the 1980 ceremony at Illinois State University in Normal that featured former United Nations Ambassador Donald McHenry as guest speaker.

In the 60s, my family observed Lent that began on Ash Wednesday and ended six weeks later on Holy Thursday. During those 40 days, my family practiced traditional Catholic traditions like meat-less Fridays, giving up certain habits and we attended Mass more often than any other time of the year.

I got used to having fish on Fridays and learned about this particular (my nonCatholic friends would say "peculiar") tradition from friends at Rich East High School. In the early 70s, we traded LPs for fun and one weekend, I took home George Carlin's Class Clown and learned about the legendary comic's perspective on most things Catholic.

Recalling his youth as an Irish Catholic, Carlin poked fun at meatless Fridays.

"It's not even a sin anymore to eat meat on Friday," he said. "But I'll bet you there are still some guys in hell doing time on a meat

Despite its reference to Lent, Rev. Brown's deceptively slim volume is filled with spiritual guidance and more than a few heartfelt looks back at friends and family members who have passed. After reading the book the fi st time, I realized that it really is not a treatise on religion. Far from it. When I read My Forty Saints, Lent 2020, I felt like I was reading Rev. Dave Brown's personal diary. In a sense, I was. At fi st, I was a little uncomfortable reading about 40 guiding lights in Dave's life as each of his short descriptions include some pretty personal, intimate and heartfelt writing.

I was particularly struck by how Rev. Brown weaved blues music through stories of many of his saints. Whether they were inspired by the secular or the spiritual, or both, I appreciated the way he approached each saint with a strong sense of humility and gratitude.

On Day 35, Dave honors "Blues mothers, fathers, daughters and sons: Sister Rosetta Thorpe, Robert Johnson, Muddy Waters, Paul Butterfi ld and Michael Bloomfi ld. and many more..." I marveled at the live music that Dave has experienced, particularly when he recalled seeing the Paul Butterfi ld Blues Band with Sam Lay on drums at the legendary Greenwich Village nightclub on Bleeker Street, Café Au Go Go.

Four days of Lent later, Dave briefly recalls his "brother from another mother," Bill Sims, Jr. They fi st met at a blues jam at Seattle's fabled Larry's Greenfront in Pioneer Square, reconnected with each other in New York and Seattle, and Dave offi ated at Sims' memorial service at his father's church in Dayton, Ohio 18 years later. For me, Dave's words simply spark from the page when he's inspired by memories of saints like Bill Sims, Jr.

While Dave eloquently includes emotional and spiritual rationales for selecting each saint that has inspired him, I found six additional profiles particularly moving: poet Jane Kenyon (Day 8), good neighbor Fred Rogers (Day 12), iconic artist and Dave's neighbor in New York Richie Havens (Day 23), thoughtful anti-war protestor and scholar Rev. Dr. William Sloan Coffi (Day 28), Beatle George Harrison (Day 31) and Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. (Day 34). Dave's remembrances of celebrating his 21st birthday Woodstock seeing Richie Havens and tuning in to see the Beatles on The Ed Sullivan Show instead of leading his church youth group are two of my most favorite moments in this book.

The book includes photos from not only saints' family members but also public domain images available free online. The cover photo was taken by one of my saints, Billy Frank, Jr., at the Nisqually Wildlife Refuge. Billy Frank, Jr., former chairman of the Northwest Indian Fisheries Commission, fought for American Indian fishing rights and the refuge was renamed in his honor after President Barack Obama posthumously awarded him a Presidential Medal of Freedom in 2015.

I'll close by posing Rev. Brown's question from his introduction: "Who are the people, some well-known and some known only to you, through whom light, holy light has shined on you and for whom you are grateful?"
