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

Hi Bluesletter Readers,

I wanted to take a moment to thank former Washington Blues Society volunteers like Nick Vigarino, Susan Waterworth and Rhea Rolfe, as I understand that they were present in the early years when the Secretary of State's office in Olympia recognized the Washington Blues Society as an official nonprofit organization 32 years ago in February of 1989.

This was a few years before I attended a Board meeting at the Salmon Bay Eagles when I expressed interest in editing the Bluesletter.. I didn't know then what I know now. That gleam in former Education Director's eye shone brightly when I told him that, "yes, Roy, I'd like to help out!"

I'm admittedly a relative latecomer to our blues society, but there's one thing I know for sure. We have a vibrant, diverse and surprisingly unpredictable blues community here in the upper left-hand corner of the continental USA. During my brief tenure, the Bluesletter has transitioned from a 24-page paper magazine with blue spot color on select pages (where the ink rubbed off on volunteers' hands when we did those mailout meetings at the Salmon Bay Eagles). With other volunteer editors like Mary McPage, Jesse Phillips and Rosie Gaynor, I have learned a great deal on how to put together a 32-page all-color magazine that blues fans would actually read. I have received a great deal of coaching from the team behind the printing press at Seattle's Pacific Publishing, and I'm grateful to learn new things about the Adobe In Design program every month.

This month, the Bluesletter remembers artists from our extended arts family we lost in 2020, starting with Nora Michaels' photo in the Table of Contents page. This month also includes a report from Westport from frequent contributor Rocky Nelson and the All In Band. Dr. Brinda Fuller Willis, of Twice as Nice Entertainment LLC in Mississippi, remembers Charley Pride and Joseph "Mojo" Morganfield, and during the production of this issue, I received a most welcome email from Delmark Productions PR man, Kevin Johnson. Kevin sent me an electronic copy of Morganfield's



Celebration of Life program, and while I would have preferred to reconnect with Kevin under different circumstances, it was good to hear from him. He helped me at several Chicago Blues Festivals in the last decade with the right information on Delmark artists at the right time. Also, in this issue, frequent contributor Kirk Anderson reflects back on 2020 and it's always a pleasure reading his work.

I look forward to when we might see live blues music again. Watching live blues virtually from my kitchen table or couch is fine, but nothing can take the place of being in a club or coffeehouse waiting for the first song of the set.

I miss that, I really do. But I clearly understand the importance of masking up, day in and day out, until we can see the COVID-19 in our rear view mirror.

## Blues Destination: Westport, Washington

A blues writer spends an eventful winter's retreat on the Washington coast!

Our fearless Bluesletter Editor, Eric Steiner, has been asking me some pretty outlandish questions of late. I dread that he's off his

Questions like, "Hey, Rocky, how would you like to be Editor of the Bluesletter?"

My response, to paraphrase former Washington Blues Society Education Director and first-time novelist Roy Brown who had a somewhat different reply to the same question, was: "I would rather have two wet wombats chew all of my fingers off to have an excuse to tell you no!"

Undaunted, Eric then asked me to produce a new Bluesletter column called "Rocky Nelson's Advice to the Lovelorn and Tips for Healthful Living." I told him to go re-read Roy Brown's first novel, Awakened from Oblivion: Love and Knowledge Will Set You Free, and quit bothering me.

I always tell him in NO in uncertain terms, "NO," as delivering on Eric's questionable requests have all the trappings of a perfectly good train wreck.

Eric, no thank you.

Period.

Draw your brakes, man. Full stop!

Eric really worries me sometimes. Last month, I emailed him links to mental health professionals, including an urgent care center that's open in his ZIP code 24/7, and they bounced back as "undeliverable." Funny, my Bluesletter stories don't bounce back. They "break on through to the other side."

He did tell me that my trip last December to Westport would give me ample opportunity to turn it into a "writer's retreat." I know he was hoping to con me into writing another article. Or three. Eric even bothered me when I worked in Afghanistan. In a war zone, like I have nothing better to do except dodge bullets and IEDs. The nerve.

I don't know how he does it. Many years ago, he coaxed a picture of me atop a German Wiesel Armored Weapons Carrier (known affectionately as a "tankette"). From then on, Shemekia Copland's Manager John Hahn and I have always called my editor a "weasel," because he's as relentless as those little hunter-gatherers in his own way to fill the pages (and screens) of the Bluesletter with interesting blues copy.

He does a damn fine job at it, too. Masterful. Why fix what's not broken?

I used to tell folks when they asked me after I celebrated my fifth anniversary over there. They'd ask, "Why Afghanistan?"

I'd respond, "I came to Afghanistan for the

waters." Afghanistan is a landlocked country and mostly desert. Few got the irony. This year,

2020, I needed a change of pace and locale.

This winter, I actually went to the beach for just that same thing, the waters. I went to

the coast to experience the negative ions upclose and personal on the scenic and rugged Washington coast. Beaches, waterfalls and rain all seem to attract negative ions which, according to the health gurus, are very positive for you. These and the attraction of "wide open spaces" to roam at will appealed very much to me after living in a sandbox for the past couple of years. The "six foot rule" was easy to comply with here.

I saddled up for one of the sweetest stretches of Pacific Ocean beaches with homespun cottage communities and circled the wagons at Westport. It lies from the north, between the mouth of the Chehalis River in Aberdeen and Westport, south to the mouth of the Willapa River and Tokeland, home of the Shoalwater Bay Tribe and their casino of the same name.

I stayed at the Westport Inn, next to the docks and the Totem RV Park, owned by retired US Army 101st Airborne Sergeant Joe and his beautiful wife Vicki. Then, I struck blues writers gold in a chance meeting with some members of the All In Band, Roni Gallo, Joni and Robert Sorita, each with a unique and storied musical history. I even met them personally at the Westport Inn maintaining social distance throughout the interview. The following is an edited transcript of my virtual interview with them and I hope Bluesletter readers will look them up when in the Westport area.

It's about as virtual as it gets as I later asked Roni Gallo a series of questions and she responded with some pretty informative and hopeful stories from Roni, Joni and Robert. While the following isn't in my typical interview format, I hope that it conveys a unique sense of purpose and passion that I found in each member of the All In Band.

### Close-Up: Roni Gallo, actress and singer...

"I always wanted to be a singer", typed Roni..."As a young girl I would make up songs and sing them to my best friend on my Grandmothers front porch. My family's roots are Irish, and music played a big part in every gathering. My aunts and uncles sang in barbershop quartets; so my early holiday memories are filled with laughter and four part harmony. Although music was always a central part of my life, I did not fulfill my dream of being a singer until I moved to the small coastal town of Westport in my forties and found the blues and All In."

"I had retired from a career in corporate travel management. I decided to explore local theater with my free time and that's where I met Mark Dodson, a local business owner who created and organized the Westport Dock of the Bay Blues Festival every summer in Westport. The festival brought in artists from all over the country. Artists such as Lee Oskar from the legendary band War and Claudette King, the daughter of the late great BB King, to name a few."

"After performing in Man of La Mancha with Mr. Dodson, he invited me to sing in his band Catch of the Day with frequent guest artist Andy "Badd Dog" Koch. We played many venues over a three-year period, including the Westport Dock of the Bay Blues Festival and my love of the blues and the stage blossomed. Fate stepped into my life when the band found itself looking for a new bass player and I met Robert Sorita, who wasn't really a bass player but a fabulous song writer, arranger and guitarist who had also just relocated to our small ocean-side town and was looking to play a little music. As soon as he joined the band, I felt something very special had entered my life, and when his wife joined us to sing some backup vocals I was completely blown away by her professional polished vocals and realized I should be backing her! At some point, the 3 of us sang together and the All In Band was born. The harmonies of my childhood and dreams of being a singer were realized and I've never looked back."

### Introducing... Mr. Robert Sorita on vocals and guitar

Robert Sorita early on was the lead singer and guitarist for Venice High School Jazz

band. He met Bob Glaub in high school, they were in a blues band together, called Flagbone Sty. He played in a Vegas-type of band at 18, the Leland Scott band.

At 19, he was asked to play in the Jesse Ed Davis band, and the drummer on that gig was Jimmy Karstein who went on to play with JJ Cale, Joe Cocker. Eric Clapton, etc.

When the Jesse Ed Davis Band opened for Rufus at the fabled West Hollywood venue Whisky A Go Go in 1974, Jesse invited George Harrison to watch the show. Later that night, George invited the band to a Led Zeppelin party, where Robert met Jimmy Page and John Bonham.

Robert played with the Valerie Carter Band at a CBS convention and they opened for Muddy Waters. Billy Payne played keyboards. Billy played with Little Feat, the Doobie Bros, and many others.

When Robert was 26 years old, he started writing music for Post Group's video projections. From there, he started to write music for a few commercials that aired on Los Angeles TV stations and one aired in the Midwest promoting C'est LA Jeans.

Bob Glaub and Robert wrote a hit song, "Crying for You," for popular Japanese singer-songwriter Eikichi Yazawa, a song also included in his greatest hits album few years later. The song is also popular in many Japanese karaoke bars. (Cont'd on p. 8)

While in Los Angeles, Robert Sorita met a lot of stars, including Don Henley, Joni Mitchell, Tina Turner, Olivia Newton-John, Rod Stewart, Jackson Browne, where he recorded several songs at Browne's home studio.

He also met and worked with David Linley, Jay Graydon, David Foster, Nicolette Larson, Monk Montgomery, Buzz Feiten, Robbie Krieger, Jeff Porcaro, Russ Kunkel, and others. One highlight was meeting Stevie Ray Vaughn backstage in the band's dressing room.

"Watching him warm up without an amp," said Robert. "Man I was floored, he sounded ferocious without an amp and I was like shit! WTF? Then, when I saw the show, and man, he sounded like Albert King with serious chops."

### On vocals, Joni Sorita

Joni Sorita also grew up in Los Angeles during this same time period and sang in bands from age 16. Joni went to Sonoma State where she studied voice and piano. At 18, she met Robert and fell in love with his guitar playing and songwriting.

After college, she began getting work as

a studio singer. She worked with Steven Kipner, Randy Goodwin ("There's No Turning Back"), Robert Sorita and Bob Glaub. She made a music video with Olivia Newton-John (YouTube: "Culture Shock") and has sung back up for Claudette King and Yutaka from Japan.

### Re-starting a music career in Westport, Washington

Westport is a small quiet coastal community of a couple thousand people. It survives on commercial and sports fishing, and the heart and soul of the hard-working folks who live there.

The natural beauty is primal and uncontaminated by traffic population. It's not where musicians picture (re-)starting a music career, but members of the All In Band have found dreams can grow in any environment if the intent and heart are strong with determination.

The All In Band was drawn to this peaceful environment: Robert for surfing, Joni to create a farm and care for horses and Roni to just slowdown from the stress of corporate pressure and raise her daughter mindfully, with time and loving attention.

Roni, Joni and Robert became a trio, three voices and one guitar. The trio performed at wineries, casinos, festivals and state fairs. Although the trio loved performing and connecting with the audience, it's always been about the energy of joining their voices in a vibration of pure joy that continued to motivate and spur them on.

### Leukemia, recovery and a worldwide pandemic

Then, in the summer of 2019, the unthinkable happened. Joni was diagnosed with leukemia. She ended up going through many rounds of aggressive chemotherapy and a complete bone marrow transplant. At 63, the doctors said that recovery "would be a challenge was putting it delicately." It was a challenge that Joni met head on

by applying the same fight, focus, and heart she has used in her music, she is healing her body and singing her song.

Although the bone marrow transplant left her with Bone vs. Graft Disease, which, in a cruel irony, specifically attacked her throat, she has stayed strong and adapted her vocals beautifully. The vibration of music can be healing if you're open to it, and Joni has recognized and embraced this truth.

### So, Joni recovers and All In is back at it and then... the COVID-19 pandemic hits.

The members of the All In Band are not spring chickens, and especially after Joni's existential crisis, they all are keenly aware this is their moment,

These next 5-10 years are their years to "Carpe Diem" and seize as much music as they can squeeze from each day. They've had that "Ah-Ha" realization that time, place, and age don't really mean anything. They are now laser-focused and ready to pursue their best lives. So, if they can't perform, they will create and record.

### And this took Roni, Robert and Joni back to All In's beginning... The Blues.

The trio has always been an eclectic mix of pop, blues, and jazz and the blues has always been a few steps away from traditional blues with the influences of many genres mixed in. They are working on a collection that will include originals and covers of some of their favorite tunes.

The latest track is a remake of the Randy Newman song, which they played for me in Westport, "Leave Your Hat On," arranged and produced by Robert. They recruited Bob Glaub on bass, and two New Orleans musicians, Shane Theriot (Hall and Oates, and Musical Director for the cable TV show, Darryl's Place) on guitar, and Doug Belote (Joe Cocker, Jim Hall, Eric Clapton, etc.) on drums.

It's a unique experience putting this project together by working virtually with other musicians, but the trio is "over the moon happy" with the outcome.

This challenge of not being able to physically perform has opened up opportunities to slow down and fine tune the details, while also getting to collaborate with some really fine musicians!

Next on the work schedule is an original by Robert called "Give and Surender." It's a blues rock song and Joni and Roni are just itching to get their vocal chops into this one.

Finally, with words of wisdom to the All In Band from Joni's dear friend, Olivia Newton-John, who is also going through significant health issues herself: "Never give up your music."

Roni, Robert and Joni take on that mantra and let it fuel their desires to make and share their music. The most important thing now is that the All In Band's magic came together with the grace of the creator.

"We love and will not stop making our music as long as it touches and inspires people of the world," said Roni.

I would like to direct readers to a fascinating and insightful PBS documentary about American Indian and Native Americans' contributions to blues, rock and roll music in general. Called Rumble: The Indians

Who Rocked the World, after Link Wray's distinctive instrumental, this documentary features many well-known musicians who have American Indian and Native American heritage.


Wray's "Rumble," incidentally, is the only instrumental song banned from the airwaves when it was released in 1958 as many radio programmers thought the song was incendiary.

It sold well in stores and on the juke box and has resurfaced in films like Pulp Fiction and Independence Day. Wray, born to Shawnee and Cherokee parents, changed rock and roll forever with that deceptively simple single built on raucous power chords.

The film also features Robbie Robertson, Buffy Ste. Marie and Jesse Ed Davis. Initially aired last January on PBS' Independent Lens showcase of new and original documentaries, Rumble: The Indians Who Rocked the World is a must-see for fans of all types of American music.

When I watched the documentary online, I remembered Robert Sorita's recollections of his work with Jesse Ed Davis and others in Los Angeles' Laurel Canyon music scene in the 70s.


The film was produced by Rezolution Films, an indigenous-led film company based in Montreal, and Rumble has received a



number of well-deserved Canadian and international awards.

## Ideas for a Weekend at Westport

"Even the bald eagles & sea lions smile at you." Everything's better at the beach!

Westport is a popular destination seaport on the rugged Washington coast and home to a small community of 2,000+ residents who are working hard to transform the local economy from a seasonal to a year-round

There are many attractive facets to Westport, including a unique viewing tower and light house, exceptional places to eat and drink, diverse lodging options and a vibrant fishing and surfing community.

"People are visitor friendly here," says Rocky. "Even the bald eagles and sea lions smile at you!"

### Westport Viewing Tower and Grays Harbor Light Station

The viewing tower at the Westport Marina provides an exceptional opportunity to see the ocean, and on a clear day, visitors can see Ocean Shores and the Olympic mountains.

Westport boasts Washington's tallest lighthouse at 107 feet first lit in 1898. The original Fresnel lens is on display up in the observation room.

### Places to Eat & Drink

Westport has many restaurants that receive top ratings from travel resources like Trip Advisor and Travelocity, such as the Blue Buoy for breakfast, Aloha Alabama BBQ for Kailua pork, Blackbeard's Brewery for craft beers, Little Richard's House of Donuts, Merino's Seafood for fresh caught fish and El Rancho for Mexican.

Blackbeard's Brewery and the Cranberry Road Winery & Bog Water Brewing Company have diverse wine, beer and food menu, and the Hearty Galley and Westwind restaurants for breakfasts. Once our state leaders lift the restrictions required by the COVID-19 pandemic, local night spots like the Knotty Pine and

Pine Tree bars.

There are also several tourist shops that sell souvenirs and beach-related mementoes, including the Basket House, Granny Hazel's Candy and Gifts and the Sea Bird Gift and Candy Shop. For coffee drinkers, Tinderbox Coffee Roasters and Cap'n Jack's Roasters pour great cups of joe.

For Rocky, no visit to the Washington coast is complete without a stop at Brady's Oysters in nearby Aberdeen, which harvests oysters using the suspended culture method that aims to raise flavorful bivalve mollusks.

### Lodging

The Westport area has a range of lodging options that range from RV living to fullservice motels. The Totem RV Park is managed by Joe and his wife Vickie. Joe, a retired US Army sergeant, served in the prestigious 101st Airborne Division.

When Rocky is in Westport, he calls the (Photo by Michael Bruce) Totem RV Park home.

Local motel options include Chateau Westport, the Pacific Motel and RV Park, the Westport Inn, the Breakers Boutique Inn and the Westport Marina Cottages, former home to the Westport "Dock of the Bay" Blues Festival for several years.

### Fishing & Surfing

Westport is home to a destination charter fishing community with over eight charter fishing companies registered with the Westport-Grayland Chamber of Commerce.

Many charter fishermen take guests out for deep sea fishing for salmon, halibut and albacore tuna.

The region also is home to an active surfing community with easy beach access at Midway Beach Road, Grayland Beach

### Remembering Charley Pride

Our King of Country Music, Charley Frank Pride made his transition on December 12, 2020 from complications with COVID-19 in Dallas, Texas.

He was born March 18, 1934 in Sledge, Mississippi on the 40-acre farm – which he later owned - where he grew up as an 11-member sharecropping family. In 2003, 33 miles of Highway 3 - from Sledge to Tutwiler - was named the Charley Pride Highway.

Charley Pride was the first Black superstar in the country music field with 52 Top 10 country hits, 29 chart toppers, and more than 12 songs that crossed over to the pop music charts. His most famous crossover hits were "Kiss an Angel Good Mornin" and "Is Anybody Going to San Antone" during his career. Additionally, Pride was inducted into the Country Music Hall of Fame in 2000 and became a member of the Grand Ole Opry on May 1, 1993. In 1977, Charley became the 2<sup>nd</sup> Black man, after DeFord Bailey (1927-1941), to appear on the Grand Ole Opry. (Darius Carlos Rucker is only the 3rd Black man to become a member of the Grand Ole Opry {2013}).

He was also the winner of the Country Music Association's Entertainer of the Year and Top Male Vocalist of the Year in

1971-1972, and the winner of four Grammy Awards. He sold approximately 70 million records on the RCA label, out-selling Elvis Presley. On November 11, 2020, 34-yearold Jimmie Allen, a rising African American country music star, introduced Pride as he was the first Black recipient of the Willie Nelson Lifetime Achievement Award at the Country Music Award ceremonies at the Music City Center Convention Hall in Nashville, which was his final major public performance.

Pride started out leaving home at age 16-years-old to pursue a baseball career. He played for a few years in the old Negro Leagues in the 1950s. Pride told NPR that baseball was his way out of the cotton fields of Sledge, Mississippi. Charley was a big fan of Jackie Robinson and dreamed as a teenager of following Robinson into the Major Leagues. He had tryouts with the California Angels and the New York Mets but was sidelined with injuries. Later on, Charley became part owner of the Texas Rangers baseball team often singing the National Anthem before the Ranger games.

In 1956, he married Rozene Cohran from Memphis, who would become Charley's life partner and manager of the business aspects of his career. He left the Army in 1958 and played briefly with the Pioneer Baseball League. Life led him to Helena, Montana,

where he worked in a smelting plant and played on the plant's baseball team.

In 1962, Charley was encouraged to try his hand at music by country music stars Red Foley and Red Sovine before leaving baseball. Foley and Sovine helped Pride to get to Nashville, where he met Cowboy Jack Clement, a music producer who had





worked with Sun Records' stall of music giants, such as Elvis Presley, Johnny Cash, and Roy Orbison. Chet Atkins, a RCA artist, heard Pride and got him signed with the label before he told them that Charley was Black.

Charley and Rozene left Montana and moved to Dallas, Texas, where he became an important real estate and banking investor. Eventually, they bought a home and set up a booking agency and management company in Dallas, where the couple raised their three children - Dion, Kraig, and Angela.

His first attempt in country music was a single, "The Snakes Crawl at Night", that did not do very well, but his 3rd attempt, "Just Between Me and You", scored a Top 10 spot and Grammy nominations that set him on the road to superstardom. Pride also made his mark in the gospel music world, winning a Gospel Music Performance Grammy for his 1974 song "Let Me Live".


Charley Pride had a long list of hit songs, but the top five are:

- 1. "Kiss an Angel Good Mornin"
- 2. "Is Anybody Going to San Antone"
- 3. "All I Have to Offer Is Me"
- 4. "Just Between Me and You"
- 5. "The Snakes Crawl at Night"

Charley Pride was known as a powerful singer and an astute businessman with an easy-going disposition. In August 2018, Charley was given a star on the Walk of Fame at the Mississippi Arts & Entertainment Experience (The MAX) Museum in Meridian, Mississippi. Linda Walker and Charlotte Lucille Gray, the granddaughter of the late bluesman Chick Willis, were among the fans who were in attendance when the Charley Pride star was unveiled.

Charley Pride's family and close friends held a private wake and memorial in Dallas with future plans for a public Celebration of Life Memorial Ceremony to be held at a later date. In lieu of flowers, the family asks for donations to The Pride Scholarship at Jesuit College Preparatory School, St. Phillips School and Community Center, any local food bank, or the charity of your choice.

As part of a special tribute announced by CMT, the "CMT Remembers Charley Pride" special aired on Saturday, December 19th (12 PM ET/11 AM CT).

### Remembering Joseph "Mojo" Morganfield

Joseph "Mojo" Morganfield, the youngest son of blues icon Muddy Waters, made his transition December 12, 2020 at the age of 56-years-old.

Joseph Morganfield was born on April 12, 1964 in Chicago. The aspiring bluesman passed away suddenly to the dismay of his family, friends, and fans.

Joseph had only just begun to pick up the blues mantle to carry on his father's legacy a few years ago in 2018. Like his brothers "Mud" and "Big Bill" Morganfield, Joseph was already equipped with solid guitar skills. He stepped out as a vocalist that mirrored his brothers and father's persona in recent years. From the age of 9 years old, Joseph lived with his father in their Westmont, Illinois, home. Surrounded by world-renowned blues icons and celebrated Chicago bluesmen that frequented the Westmont homeplace for social gatherings. Joseph was often witness to impromptu jam sessions that penetrated his ears, laying the groundwork for his later profession.

Prior to the start of his musical career, Joseph was immersed in the world of sports with creditable aspirations of playing on the professional level. He was a basketball standout on the courts during his formative years as a teenager and young adult.

Joseph traveled to Mississippi to place his feet on the Delta soil that birthed his father and to reconcile a relationship with his father's music that could only be accomplished in the land that is the "Birthplace of the Blues". In 2018, Joseph and other members of his extended Meridian, Glen Allan, and Rolling Fork, Mississippi family accepted an invitation to be the guests of Dr. Rolando Herts, Director of the Delta Culture & Learning Center. His cousin, Keith Johnson, the great nephew of Muddy Waters, who is also known as the "Prince of the Delta Blues", at the International Conference on the Blues that was held in Cleveland, Mississippi on the campus of Delta State University. During the conference, Joseph discussed his father's influence on him as a child, professional musician, and his impact on blues and rock music worldwide.

Joseph graciously performed on the steps of the Bolivar County Courthouse, presenting the music of Muddy Waters and many of his own tunes.

Joseph and his cousin Keith Johnson closed out the courthouse concert singing. "You Got My Mojo Working", a signature Muddy Waters song that may have provided Joseph with his blues handle - "Mojo" Morganfield.

Recently, Joseph made a decision to formally make his mark in the blues music industry signing with the Delmark Records label in early 2020 with intent of completing a full CD in 2021. Earlier this year, Joseph released an EP - "Good To Be King" - that immediately soared to the top of the blues charts and was backed by several celebrated Chicago bluesmen, collectively called the Mannish Boyz Blues Band – a fitting name to pay tribute to a Muddy Waters' titled song "Mannish Boy."

In a special quote, Joseph explained how he felt about his famous father and how he acquired his passion for the blues.

Entitled "Embrace Your Passion," it reads, "I uncovered my passion for music during the years spent with my dad, going to rehearsals, gigs, and then performing on stage. From that point on, the blues has been in my heart."

In an exclusive with the Jackson Advocate,

Larry "Mud" Morganfield, world-renowned bluesman and oldest Morganfield brother of Joseph said, "Me and Joseph grew up in the streets of Chicago, making our own way in many ways living the blues as dad was often touring.

Joseph and me learned a lot of the same blues, separately because of the age difference, but [it] came out on the other side with a passion for the music that we lived. We were both late bloomers in the blues music industry...this blues music is a feeling that you can't run away from, it's in the genes and it has to come out.

"Me and Jo Jo, as I called him, became very close later in life because we had similar experiences. I really like that new tune of his - 'Good To Be King'. It's a good solid blues song. I felt he had put the right touch on it; it was good stuff. I was proud to be included in his recent wedding ceremony. I'm sad now, but God knows best."

Services for the late Joseph "Mojo" Morganfield were held on December 16, 2020 at the West Suburban Funeral Home in Westmont, Illinois.

Since 2006, the Coyote Kings have been recording, performing and winning awards, collecting rave reviews, and playing to enthusiastic audiences and devoted fans. With seven albums released, and more on the way, "That little old band from Walla Walla" has established themselves as a presence in the Pacific Northwest and beyond.

In 2014, the band was reborn as Robin Barrett and the Kings with Robin's writing, singing and blistering guitar work fronting the band, and Kit Kuhlman and GT Townsend laying down the groove on bass and drums. The group received the 2014 Empire Award from the Inland Empire Blues Society for Best Blues Band and Robin Barrett received the Empire Award for Best Blues Guitarist. Following their 2013 Empire Award winning fourth album, Nasty Habits & Dirty Little Secrets, the Kings' album Howl also won the Empire Award in 2015 for Best Blues CD.

Tiphony Dames was born and raised in Harlem, New York. As a child, she loved dancing and singing in church. Tiph sang at The Apollo Theater when she was only 10 years old. As a young adult, she moved upstate and attended Skidmore College in Saratoga Springs. After receiving her bachelor's degree, she moved to Richland,



Washington where Robin first saw Tiph and heard her sing.

Tiph began doing festivals and blues events with the Coyote Kings in the summer of 2015. Since then, her stellar performing has helped the Coyote Kings wow audiences show after show. Tiphony received the 2016, '17, & '18 Empire Awards for Best Female Blues Performer from the Inland Empire Blues Society and has now been placed in that blues society's Hall of Fame.

The 2017 release Tiphony Dames with Coyote Kings hit #18 on the Roots Music Report's national blues-rock chart with the single "Down Around the River" hitting the Top 40 in all genres in the spring of 2017. The Coyote Kings' 7th album, Rocket, was release in March of 2019 on Underworld Records, debuting at #12 on the Roots Music Report's blues rock chart and spent 15 weeks in the top 50. Joe Lewis Band Up Next (Self-Released)

The line between blues and gospel, has always been thin as they are both considered the source of all modern music. While the choice to play electric guitar and sing words of praise is not a new thing, Sister Rosetta Thorpe pioneered the genre in the early 1950s, but to push it into an emerging genre is a bold choice for an artist. Contemporary Christian music has been growing in the marketplace since the late 60s, and now encompasses every major category in music and yet it has not formally recognized contemporary Christian blues artists. Joe Lewis and his power trio are trailblazers who began 2020 by representing the Lake of the Ozarks Blues Society at the International Blues Challenge in Memphis. Then, the band embarked on recording a fourth album titled *Up Next*, enlisting super producer Kevin Shirley to mix the album and having the album mastered by the legendary Bob Ludwig. The rambunctious spirit of the album and its words of positivity and praise strive to blur the line between Saturday night and Sunday morning. The session opens with a chimney guitar that leads us into the unconventional love song "I Like It," with words of continue devotion set to a Funky groove. Lewis continues to give praise for his beloved on the soul vaccination "Hot Lovin Mama," doing his best James Brown. Lewis spells out his devotion as a seeker on the dynamic "Do Your Work In Me" and then delivers a touching tribute to a dearly departed sister on the emotional ballad "Broken Angel of the Delta." The second half of the session begins with the account of the night Lewis discovered his calling while listening to a real blues man at a local juke joint on the edgy "Do Drop Inn," and then he proceeds

to lead the fellows through a blazing instrumental "Twang a Doodle Boom Boom." Up Next from the Joe Lewis Band should prove be another fine tool in their mission that may open doors as well as hearts and minds. Rick J. Bowen.



Skylar Rogers Fire Breather (Self-Released)

Chicago born vocalist Skylar Rogers followed the successful blueprint created nearly a century ago by Ma Rainey, arguably the original queen of the blues, by gathering together great original material and a team of the topnotch players as her backing band as she barnstormed around the country spreading her vision of the blues. In the two years since her debut EP, Rogers has dubbed her ensemble of musicians "The Blue Diamonds" and gave the sound she creates with them the moniker "Soul Rockin" Blues." Her new album, Fire Breather, features 10 new songs that reflect her life growing up in some of Chicago's toughest neighborhoods and the influence of the music that flows across the region from St. Louis to Memphis over to Nashville and back up to the Windy City. Rogers gives an account of how the obstinate part of her character leads to losing a lover on the album opener, "Hardheaded Woman," and then Skylar and the band seek redemption in the city of the blues on the driving track "Back To Memphis." Rogers boldly spells out how she is willing to labor for love on the organ driven funk blast "Work." A southern rock guitar riff and sassy vocals propel the album's first single "Like Father Like Daughter," and I like its radio ready style. The title track is a cautionary tale based on the classic idiom of no fury being like that of a woman scorned (and that may or may not be autobiographical). In a year full of challenges, Skylar Rogers and her band of brothers, The Blue Diamonds, met those obstacles with fire and kept breathing life into this project, one they should be proud of her for years to come. Shemekia Copeland Uncivil Wars (Alligator Records)

Shemekia Copeland's follow-up to 2018's America's Child convenes many Music City A-list artists, Mississippi blues sensation Christone "Kingfish" Ingram and guitar legend Duane Eddy ("Peter Gunn" and many, many others). Uncivil Wars offers 12 songs that reflect COVID-19 realities as well as comment on our national discourse since the release of 2018's America's Child. Many of the songs are imbued subtly with a hopeful look forward (despite the sad story behind the title tune, the reality of "Apple Pie & A .45" and a song from neighborhoods Checker Cab, Uber or Lyft would touch, "Walk Before I Ride." A "dream team" of roots and blues artists join Shemekia at Nashville's Butcher Shoppe studios, including Jerry Douglas and Sam Bush on dobro and mandolin, Lex Price on drums, and Pete Abbott on drums. Jason Isbell's searing guitar kicks off the opening "Clotilda's On Fire," which belongs in every junior high school Zoom classroom. Will Kimbrough and "Kingfish" launch "Money Makes You Ugly" with raucous and churning riffs worthy of the Glimmer Twins, and the CD transitions nicely to a second line honoring the memory of Dr. John on "Dirty Saint." Memphis legend Steve Cropper adds some tasty guitar on "In the Dark," and I hope that Shemekia's cover of her father's "Love Song" crosses over into country radio. Uncivil Wars is an exceptionally good CD from the blueswoman crowned "Queen of the Blues" at the 2011 Chicago Blues Festival. Eric Steiner


