# Thank You, Little Bill!

"I never let having polio stop me from following my dreams."


For over 60 years, Bill Englehart, "Little Bill" has shared his music. With the Bluenotes, his big band, as a trio or in recent years as a duo with Rod Cook, Bill has made people happy and smile. He has been on big theater stages and small dive bars. Through it all his skill as a player and as a band leader has always been front and center. Bill has decided to retire and on behalf of the Pacific Northwest blues community I say, THANK YOU, BILL, THANK YOU!

Bill is a friend. He has played Blues Vespers more than 40 times. A child of Tacoma, the city honored his seventieth birthday with a City Council proclamation.

On the stage of the Rialto Theater, at 70, he received his high school diploma. At the new McMenamin's Spanish Ballroom, the former mayor of Tacoma gave him a copy of a painting honoring Tacoma legends of the 60s and Bill is one of them. The original is displayed at the hotel. The list of those who have performed with him, who learned how to be band leaders from him is so long that I won't attempt to name them. Before the COVID pandemic, we were scheduled to celebrate his career in the fall of 2020 at McMenamins. We couldn't do that. But we can celebrate his career and we do. Again, thank you, Bill. And thank you Jan for your support and presence in our community.

I asked Bill to reflect on his career. This is what he shared.

"The first band I was in was every Saturday night at the George Washington Legion Hall in Tacoma. I was 16. At the time I was attending a school with a guy name of Eddy who was playing bass with a group at the Legion One day he asks me if I would like to bring my guitar and check it out. The band was all older black guys. Piano drums and a

sax player NO guitar. Well, they ask me if I would like to do a song. If course said, I'm in. All they played was blues and shuffles. Mostly in G. After a set or two, they wanted to know f I would like to join the band. At the time I wasn't sure if they liked my playing or was it because I had a guitar. The name of the group was the Blue Notes. Did I steal the name and use it for what was going to be doing some years later in was eventually known as the first rock and roll band in Tacoma? .... Guilty!"

"I was a working musician for 60 years. During that time, I was somehow able to accomplish more than I ever thought I could. I never let having polio stop me from following my dreams. in 1956, along with three other pickers we started the first Rock and Roll band in Tacoma. Next, we had a recording that became a national hit. Quiet as it's kept, I still receive royalties. After the band ended, I opened for almost everyone that came to Seattle. BB King, Buddy Guy, Roy Orbison AND HEY Even FABIAN!

I played no favorites. Having only one hit made it hard to start facing reality. No more hit records, no more calls to play national tours and hello drugs and hello whisky. Once after way to many years, that was put to rest, The best was waiting. I started playing with top players, over a hundred dates a year. Life was GOOD. Then It changed. I was having trouble remembering chord changes to songs I has played for years. I was playing a date with Rod Cook and I called a song to do. Rod said let's skip that one. I ask if he thought I would screw it up. His answer was no, I KNOW you will screw it up. WE both laughed. I went to see my doctor. After several tests, he told me what I already knew, DEMENTIA. I retired in December. I have stopped driving and spend most of my time in my office painting. To tell the truth, sometimes I do miss being Little Bill. He and I had one hell of a great ride for many years!!!"

Bill, it was a great ride, like you we miss the music and feel deep gratitude. You have done something special, something that made a difference, something to be proud of!

In 2009, Randy Oxford and I organized a birthday show in Tacoma. Around the same time a tribute CD was released: Big *Blues for Little Bill*. I'll close with what I wrote in those liner notes:

"No one has performed more at Blues Vespers than Little Bill and the Bluenotes. They had two guaranteed slots: December and July. Bill says it was his favorite gig. The church was always packed. Bill would say it was because at some of those shows we had a free meal. I know better, it was because of Bill.

Bill and I have been friends for a long time. In the beginning he didn't know what to do with this blues loving, beer drinking


Reverend. When he invited me to help him celebrate his 40<sup>th</sup> wedding anniversary I knew that I passed the test, and I was honored.

Bill and Jan's wedding took place when he was on the road. They wanted something different, more spiritual when they reaffirmed their vows on this special anniversary. We talked about doing it in a church. But, in the end, Bill and Jan opted for the New Orleans in Pioneer Square. I felt a little odd being in the New Orleans in my preacher's robe, but it made sense somehow. When they exchanged sacred vows of love on the stage there wasn't a dry eye in the house.

Little Bill is an extraordinary musician and band leader. I am convinced that one if the things that makes his legacy as a musician so powerful is who he is as a man: his integrity, his friendships and the relationship he and Jan share with one another, the solid foundation on which all of it is built."

In 2009 my liner notes ended with a "Happy Birthday!"

I'll end this with: Happy Retirement! Happy next stage of the journey, and happy painting!

## **Points West Virtual Blues Showdown!**

Calling all blues artists in Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Montana, British Columbia & Alberta

With the uncertainty the COVI-19 pandemic has presented all of us, the Washington Blues Society in partnership with the Cascade Blues Association, South Sound Blues Association, Inland Empire Blues Society, White Rock Blues Society, Fraser Valley Blues Society, Victoria Blues Society, Edmonton Blues Society, Boise Blues Society, Flathead Blues Society have decided to hold a Virtual Blues Showdown!

This event is open to all bands and solo/duos from the states of Washington, Oregon, Idaho, and Montana and the provinces of British Columbia and Alberta. We are requiring membership in one of the above Blues Societies listed above, which will be verified with each society through their leadership team.

In the spirit of The Blues Foundation's International Blues Challenge we will follow their rules. All acts will have to select either a band or a solo/duo entry, you cannot enter both.

The videos must be shot with a single static camera view from center stage house view (The Judges Perspective), with no editing or special effects, and must be a continuous video with no stops and starts. Videos should be a minimum of 23 minutes, if short of this time metric acts will have one (1) point deducted from their score. Videos should be a maximum of 25 minutes in length, if over this metric there will be one (1) point deducted for each ten seconds over the time limit. The time period starts with the first sound! This includes any introductions or other vocal opening. And ends with the last sound! This includes any closing remarks. Opening or closing remarks are not penalties and should be worked into your set. A big part of stage management and set planning.


This is a "Blues" challenge and music should be from this genre. We recognize the definition of "Blues" is wide and this will be taken into consideration with all sets. We highly encourage original compositions; however, covers are okay. All covers need to be introduced before starting them and include the songwriter, year released, and if needed who made it a hit.

All entries must be received by the Washington Blues Society by June 15<sup>th</sup>, 2021 via email at president@wablues.org, or snail mail at Washington Blues Society, PO Box 70604, Seattle, WA 98127. There will be an entry fee of \$15.00 USD, which will be used for production expenses of producing this event. All videos must be received by July 1<sup>st</sup>, 2021.


We are compiling a number of prizes, and other opportunities for all whom enter this event! So far, we have secured a Harmonica Award sponsored by Lee Oskar Harmonicas, to be awarded to best harmonica player from all entrants. We are working on a guitar award to be awarded to best guitar player from all entrants. We have secured 20 hours of studio recording time and are working on expanding this for both bands and solo/duos. We have secured paid gigs at Sunbanks Music Festival and are in discussions of multiple other festival events. As we add more, we will be posting them online at our website www.wablues.org, and the Washington Blues Society Facebook page. All of this information and additional items will also be shared with our partners to share on their pages and websites.

Judging will be conducted as per he Blues Foundation's guidelines and this information can be found at (www.blues. org/ibc/scoring.php). # **A Farewell Interview: Randy Oxford**

"Quality over quantity will be more rewarding in the long run..."

Randy Oxford, trombonist and leader of the Randy Oxford Band recently announced his retirement from all aspects of the music business. Randy has had a remarkable career, spanning four decades.

He's recorded many CDs, as both leader and sideman, performed across the United States, Canada, and Central America, taken his band to the finals of the International Blues Challenge in Memphis, won over 20 Washington Blues Society Best of the Blues Awards, including Entertainer of the Year, and been elected to the Washington Blues Society Hall of Fame. In other activities, he founded the Mountain Rhythm and Blues Festival in Ashford, Washington, started a popular Facebook page, The Randy Oxford Music Forum, and organized 70<sup>th</sup>, 75<sup>th</sup>, and 80th birthday tributes to Pacific Northwest music legend "Little Bill" Engelhart.

- MH: Congratulations on a long and successful career. Was there anything in particular that led you to decide to retire at this time?
- RO: No, other than having time away from the music business during quarantine to think about things. Although I still have opportunities in the future to play some real cool gigs in the U.S., Canada and abroad, this feels like the right time for me to call it a career. Going full speed ahead in the music business for more than four decades feels like enough. I will continue to be a big supporter of live music and the musicians who perform it. Now I will be out in the audience cheering them on. That's something I've always loved to do when I wasn't performing.
- MH: When did you first start playing music? Was there anyone who was especially helpful in those early days?

- RO: I started playing the trombone in grade school, and it's the only instrument I've ever played professionally. At my high school, just west of Chicago, we had a great music program. Steve Hoernemann was my band director. He had a big influence on me. He showed me how to approach music as a full-time career, and not get distracted by anything else.
- MH: How do you get into playing professionally?
- RO: Although I was a "wannabe" hippie stoner type in high school my father was able to talk me into auditioning for the U.S. Army Band. I thought he was crazy when he first mentioned it, but I auditioned anyway at the Great Lakes Naval Base in Chicago. After I passed the audition, I was still skeptical. Then they told me there was an opening for a trombone player in Berlin, Germany. BINGO! All I had to do was make it through boot camp and I was on my way to getting paid to play trombone, right out of high school. After boot camp and the Armed Forces School of Music in Norfolk, Virginia I was off to Germany for 3 years. I had so much fun playing music full time, with some really good musicians, that I signed up for an additional three years, with a guaranteed spot in Monterey, California. I think that being in the Army Band for six years was the best thing I could have done. Going to college wouldn't have given me the massive amount of playing time I got in the Army, not to mention a decent paycheck. I would highly recommend to any young instrumentalist coming out of high school that they consider auditioning for a military band. It changed my life and jump started my career as a professional musician.

- MH: Besides playing in the Army Band, what are some other experiences that shaped your development as a musician or band leader?
- RO: Something that really helped my career was hosting jams. Beginning in 2000 I was hosting four jams a week around the Pacific Northwest. I'd hire a different featured artist for each one. It enabled me to meet and play with many great musicians. Some of them later joined The Randy Oxford Band. I was also lucky to play in some of the top Pacific Northwest bands before starting my own band, which helped me learn what to do and what not to do as a band leader. Playing with Little Bill and the Bluenotes for eight years was a great experience, and Bill was really my mentor in terms of being a band leader.

I ended up being the only vegetarian trombone player leading his own blues band in the music world. LOL! I also really enjoyed playing and touring with Junkyard Jane and recorded four CDs with them.

Another great experience was being a jam host and performer on the Legendary Rhythm and Blues Cruise for 16 years. Also, for the last 6 years I was a member of the Bender Brass, the house band for The Big Blues Bender, a week-long festival in Las Vegas. I got to back up many of the big names who played the event, including Delbert McClinton, Bobby Rush, and Curtis Salgado.

- MH: You've had a lot of outstanding musicians come through the Randy Oxford Band over the years. Are there any that had a significant impact on your music, or on the direction of the band?
- RO: It would be a monumental task to mention any particular names, because there were so many over the 17 years that I was a band leader. I was fortunate to be able to tap into amazing talent time and time again. Hosting so many jams helped me meet some stellar musicians and really honorable human beings.

My situation was a little different from most band leaders because I don't sing, so I got to feature many different vocalists. I always tried to feature at least three different singers per show, in addition to my main vocalist. I also always featured at least two guitar players. My goal as a band leader was to showcase every member of the group at every show and give them a chance to shine. I had a reputation for this, which along with the ability to book quality gigs, helped me attract top talent. I enjoyed changing my lineups over the years to keep things fresh and exciting.

- MH: This year presented past unprecedented challenges to the local musical community. But even before the pandemic, we saw the closing of the Highway 99 Blues Club in Seattle and other music venues. There's also concern that the blues audience is aging, and not being replaced by young people, who are more into other kinds of music. How would you assess the current blues scene, and where do you see things going?
- RO: That's a tough question to answer. These are strange times indeed for the music industry. My heart goes out to the venue owners who were shut down for almost an entire year. It's been very difficult for festival and concert promoters too. In fact, all forms of the performing arts took a big hit. It seems like live performances were the first thing to be cancelled, and the last thing to bounce back. Hopefully, we will see a full return this year.

As for the average blues fan getting older, I see a trend at many major festivals that looks promising. I see more and more variety in the music being played at so called "blues festivals," and I think that is helping attract music fans of all ages. I believe that with the right balance of old and new sounds, live blues music will be supported by the younger generation. Also, I always encourage my fellow band leaders to mix in some young talent with the more established musicians in their lineups. This has worked well for me over the years and

helps draw an audience of all ages. Another positive thing is seeing how popular the blues is around the world. I've put together blues show in the U.S. and Canada with an international band that included musicians from many different countries, including England, Scotland, Russia, Mexico, and Portugal. These shows often consisted of 10 or more musicians, and the age of the players ranged from 17 to 70 years old.

- MH: Based on all your experience, is there any advice you'd like to offer to your fellow musicians, especially younger ones in the early stages of trying to build their career?
- RO: My general advice would be to make music your number one priority. Try to participate in multiple jam sessions each week in order to network with other musicians. Donate your time and talent by performing at charitable fundraising events. Help other musicians find bands and gigs whenever you can. It always pays off one way or another. The music business is a family and a community.

Don't be discouraged by being turned

down by a venue or a festival. Many of my most high-profile gigs took me years to get. Stay persistent. It's the nature of the music business to be turned down 90% of the time. Of those gigs you do get, make them count. Quality over quantity will be more rewarding in the long run.

- MH: Any closing words or final thoughts as you consider your career?
- RO: One thing I'm proud of is that I helped bring the trombone to the forefront and make it more of a lead instrument in the blues. In a world of guitars, harmonicas, and keyboards, I feel like the trombone added a different sound.

On a personal note, I want to send out

a heartfelt "thank you" to all in the music world, onstage and off, and to the many fans who have enriched my life in so many ways. I've had a fun and fulfilling career that I would not trade for anything in the world. I am truly fortunate and incredibly grateful to have met so many amazing souls along the way.

Faith, hope and love have gotten me through both the tough times and the good times in my career, and I know these things will get me through this next stage of my life too.


"Two Scoops:" An Appreciation

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# **That Empty Spot on Your Coffee Table**

Blues in Black & White by Kirk West, the Allman Brothers Band's "Tour Mystic"

St. Louis Missouri's world-famous Gateway Arch is backed to the East by "the Big Muddy." The Mississippi River. Seven blocks to the Southwest is Busch Stadium. Home to the St. Louis Cardinals baseball team. Seven blocks to the Northwest is the historic National Blues Museum, a woman-led non-profit organization whose mission statement includes exploring and preserving the historical significance of the blues as the foundation of American music.

In 2016, the museum asked photographer Kirk West to pull together elements of his life's work in a 65-picture photo exhibit to debut in 2017. A look at the blues from the viewfinder of a lifelong, established photographer with an inside hook to the venues in one of the great Meccas of American blues ... Chicago.

It was our own Editor Eric Steiner's article in the April Bluesletter that spoke of "the Muddy Waters school of management." Eric recalled his time in Chicago and the Chicago sound of the blues. This made me look down at my coffee table where I saw Kirk West's 200-page, hardcover book which the National Blues Museum Exhibit inspired. It seemed like maybe Eric and Kirk may have walked down some of the same streets and "walked lightly" into some of the same "dimly lit South side and North side clubs." Maybe they even worked in the photo pit at the same Chicago Blues Festival!

As I spoke with Kirk about this article, instead of questions and answers, Kirk allowed me to pick out eight pictures from the book that came out of this year long search for his best pictures for the exhibit, *The Blues in Black & White*. I asked Kirk to look at one picture at a time and write down one or two sentences that came to his mind about that picture. Not only do you get a glimpse of the intimate blues scene and those in the picture, you get the thoughts that those pictures evoke in the artist/photographer. Damn, I just know Kirk's going to hate that description!




