

# The 2021 Big Blues Bender in Las Vegas!

The Blues Nation arrived in force at Las Vegas' Westgate Resort from all over the world on September 8th. There were many old friends greeting each other and new Blues Bender fans trying to figure out how to see and hear it all. The Blues Bender family, support staff and navigators, greeted each guest and passed out wristbands and schedules. One of the Big Blues Bender greeters, Mikey Mo, said he walked 20 miles the first day making sure everything was ready for our five-day blues party. Thanks to all the people that put this great event together, now in its seventh year.

The Big Blues Bender required masks for all, and staff gently reminded fans to always cover their nose and mouth. There were very few times that I saw anyone without a mask.

On Wednesday evening, I attended The Handy Artist Relief Fund (HART) party, which was sold out. 100 per cent of the funds raised went directly to The HART Fund and each performer donated their time. The lineup included the Bender Brass, with Jimmy Carpenter, Doug Woolverton, and Mark Earley. Special guests included Bettye LaVette, John Nemeth, Alastair Greene, Johnny Sansone, Jason Ricci, Kevin Burt, King Solomon Hicks Trio, and Chris Cain.

The benefit featured several beautiful, donated guitars, which raised thousands of dollars for Blues Foundation HART Fund. The HART Fund supports health care, preventive medicine, financial assistance, and more, to musicians who are in need. Master of Ceremonies Llou Johnson, the

voice of Bluesville on SIRIUS XM Satellite Radio, ran as fast as he could to each of the first day's 13 shows!

### Thursday's Theme: Mardi Gras!

On Thursday, the first official Big Blues Bender event was The Ballers, all-inclusive package that featured a welcome party with Tab Benoit at The Cabaret Venue holding 400. The room offered intimate seating on the main floor and balcony options, too. It was so full at times that we felt we could reach out to the artists and shake their hands.

Then, it was time for the Welcome Reception at the Bender Ballroom for returning Blues Benders as well as a Virgin Party (first time attendees like me) with a capacity around 500. All virgins received beads, as Thursday's theme was Mardi Gras theme, and leis to welcome us. There was a joyous, second line at the start, with "As the Saints Go Marching In" heading to the stage.

The Bender Brass Band, led by Jimmy Carpenter kicked things off and featured Alastair Greene, Albert Castiglia, JP Soars, Chris Cain, and more.

We all then went to the International Theater to hear and feel the music of the Blind Boys of Alabama, with special guest Charlie Musselwhite. Together since the 1950s, the Blind Boys of Alabama's gospel tunes inspired us all to get up and testify.

There was a Howl at The Moon Jam later on, and it went on 'til oh-dark-thirty.

### Friday's Theme: Pirates & Wenches!

Friday started with an impromptu blues society discussion facilitated by Granite State Blues Society board member Rachael Barnard. The Granite State Blues Society formed in 2002 in Bedford, New Hampshire, and Rachael stressed that meetings like this can strengthen the network of blues societies, better serve the blues community, and perhaps most importantly,

support the musicians who make blues music! Blues society members from across North America, including Washington, Utah, New Hampshire, Massachusetts, and Chicago, were well-represented. We talked about potential locations youth blues programs, and the consensus seemed that local libraries would be a natural venue. We also talked about the importance of blues society Bluesletters, websites, volunteers, and we hoped to meet at other blues festivals on the blues highway.

### Harp Benders Panel

Jason Ricci, Johnny Sansone, Kevin Burt, John Nemeth, and others convened at the Cabaret Room. Each musician told stories about how they picked up the love and art of playing the harmonica. It was a thrill to learn who inspired each of these outstanding blues artists, and I was particularly intrigued about each artist's influences. I thought the best part of the panel was the discussion on how each musician focused on either playing in the old style or develop a style of their own. At the end of the discussion, the musicians played an impromptu jam that had us dancing and cheering the panel's music!

### The Pool Stage

The Pool Stage opened on Friday. It was a huge venue, and it was a relief to put our feet in the pool and enjoy the music of Chr

Cain, the Alastair Greene Band with Tab Benoit on drums and Corey Duplechin on bass. JP Soars & The Gypsy Blues Revue livened up the venue, too. There were plenty of huge cooling mist fans and plenty of shade. After all it's Vegas, baby, at 104 degrees in the shade.

Each of the four Big Blues Bender venues were rocking, and I chose the International Theater at 6:00 PM to catch Victor Wainwright & The Train. This was the first time I had seen and heard Victor and his band. Victor is such a talented piano player, and has a soulful voice. Made the evening start out strong.

The North Mississippi Allstars were up next, and I felt like we were in the deep south. The band featured music from their new album Up and Rolling. Luther Dickinson, lead singer and guitarist, mentioned his deep roots playing with Otha Turner and was outstanding singing and some amazing guitar work. Luther is also with The Black Crowes.

The Allman Betts Band had us all feeling the music of The Allman Brothers, but not as a cover band. Their newest album Bless Your Heart featured at the show was recorded at The Muscle Shoals Sound Studios and included several Allman Brothers standards. Band members include

Devon Allman and Duane Betts on vocals and guitar, Barry Oakley, Jr., on bass, two drummers and a sound that we all enjoyed with standing ovations from the audience.

Later that night and into the next day I attended the Howl at The Moon Jam from two until five in the morning. Wonderful artists played and their enjoyment of jamming with each other showed with smiles all around.

### Saturday's Theme: Tye Dye

On Saturday, my fourth day at this year's Blues Bender, I was up early to see Carolyn Wonderland in the Bender Ballroom playing music from her new Alligator CD, Tempting Fate. Carolyn is from Texas, and recently played with John Mayall for the past few years. As all Blues Bender attendees will tell you, we were all running and gunning attending each of the fine shows, and Jason Ricci played The Cabaret as soon as Carolyn finished. We all rushed out to see Jason, and he was in fine form with his huge white Zoot suit coat and his powerful, original harp sound. This is the first time I've seen Jason live, and he has made me a fan for life!

The Pool Stage was hopping with Albert Castiglia, who played tunes from his newest CD, Masterpiece, produced by Mike Zito on Gul Coast Records. Many fans greeted him

and danced to his music. Lindsay Beaver and her band at The Caberet played an outstanding set. Lindsay is on Bruce Iglauer's Alligator Records, and Bruce is a big fan (as we now all are).

Then, it was on to The Bender Ballroom where we all went to church with Sugaray Rayford and Friends. Lots of testifying and hollerin' going on as the right way to start out a Sunday.

# **Touching Lives One Instrument at a Time**

"... my band director literally saved my life by putting a musical instrument in my hands."

The Washington Blues Editor's Note: Society has had a special relationship with Music4Life for several years. Every one of our instrument-playing members started playing somewhere as a child. We want that opportunity made available to as many children as possible. So we asked Music4Life how it's going in these pandemic days. Here's their status report.

Music4Life was founded in 2007 on the back of a napkin at the Tully's Coffee in Seattle's Magnolia Village. Seattle Public School's Dick Lee asked me if I knew anyone in Rotary who'd be willing to help acquire lovingly used musical instruments for his students. I told him of my childhood experience as an at-risk youth in southwest Wisconsin and how my band director literally saved my life by putting a musical instrument in my hands. As a Seattle Downtown Rotary member, I'd be willing, but we needed a bigger purpose. I'd develop a program plan to discuss with him and we'd decide whether it was a go or no-go.

Two weeks later, I came back with a plan that still forms the essence of what Music4Life does today, including the name of Music4Life. We've not looked back since. Music4Life provides donated-andrepaired instruments at no cost to 11 public school districts to students in-need. We started Music4Life for the Seattle Public Schools, and have expanded to Highline, Shoreline, Edmonds, Everett Northshore, Bremerton, Auburn, Kent, Marysville, and most recently, Riverview Public Schools. Riverview serves Duvall and Carnation.

We've provided ready-to-play instruments that thousands of kids. A core part of the idea is that the instruments are provided to the public school districts on a long-term loan basis. When the student leaves the school district for any reason (graduation, parents move out of the district, etc.), the instrument is returned to the district so another child can benefit from its use.

How are we doing during the pandemic? We use two metrics to measure progress: 1) Number of ready-to-play instruments provided, and 2) Fair market value after repairs are completed. Let's look at the last few years with each metric.

During the 2015-16 fiscal year, Music4Life provided 143 musical instruments valued at \$102,323 (Fair Market Value, or FMV). Music4Life adds one new program each year. Instrument value is determined by third-party experts, the local repair shops that do the work on each instrument.

Since the 2015-2016 School
Year, Music4Life has provided:

Total instrument values declined in 2018-19 likely due the simple fact that a piano is worth more than a piccolo. That's seen the following year, too, when the numbers of instruments declined, but instrument values stayed the same.

The last pre-pandemic year was 2018-19, when we had enjoyed exponential growth. Then, the pandemic hit during the second half of 2019-20. Schools closed, and repair shops shut down for several months, just

as other businesses did. The number of instruments we provided dropped significantly especially during March through July. One instrument was provided in March, none during April through July, and just 13 during August.

Many people were just plain scared during these lean months. Music4Life tried to keep things in perspective: we stressed the critical need for food and housing support. On our website, we added: "Told that a new federal program was likely to succeed in the long run, (Harry Hopkins, a top aide to President Franklin Roosevelt) answered, 'That's not good enough. People don't eat in the long run.

"Feeding people and other emergencies during the current COVID-19 crisis are of compelling importance. We recommend supporting Northwest Harvest and Harvest Against Hunger, formerly Rotary First Harvest. We asked everyone to dig deeper to support them. Eventually, we expect to get through this mess. Once on the other side of it, we're certain that the need by our kids for ready-to-play musical instruments will be just as important as it ever has been."

Two primary things happened during the pandemic: We provided ready-to-play instruments at a stable rate to our districts and the number of participating districts increased. Not one left.

Take, for instance, the program we started with the Seattle Symphony providing recorders to third- and fourth-graders. The kids would get new recorders, take a couple months to learn to play them, and then be invited to Benaroya Hall to play with the Seattle Symphony.

Can you imagine the life-long memory that creates?! This program has gone away while tthe Seattle Symphony Orchestra hasn't been playing for anyone.

Instead of recorders, Music4Life provided harmonicas to several school districts. The harmonica is a key gateway, starter instrument for many young people.

SmartMusic is one software program that allows kids to keep playing their instruments every day as teachers review and teach kids what they're doing well or not-so-well. This software has been used by many teachers as kids have been isolated at home.

One donor of Hawaiian ancestry has provided 60 ukuleles, 30 for each of two middle school classes in the Highline School District. Those ukes are being used right now by these kids.

Music4Life normally doesn't provide pianos to school districts. School districts tell us each year that they don't need nor want more upright pianos. They have enough of them.

What they really do need are funds to get their existing uprights tuned, an expense many of them can't afford.

During the pandemic, we've developed a program that places ready-to-play baby grands and grands in a few districts. We've provided a Steinway to Everett, a Kohler & Campbell to Edmonds, another grand to

All repair work is done for us locally, by such as Kennelly Keys Music based in Lynnwood, Ted Brown Music in Tacoma, Hammond Ashley Violins in Issaquah, Bigfoot Music in Arlington and Bandwright Music in Bellevue. Rafael Carrabba Violins in Seattle and Olsen Violins in Ballard also help acquire musical instruments.

Many organizations have continued or renewed their support for Music4Life, such as KING-FM, that finished a two-month run of public service announcements for Music4Life that resulted in increased in instrument and financial donations, including one \$9,500 violin; Lamar Advertising renewed its billboard and signage support that helped the first sellout in 10 years of the Des Moines Rotary's Blues 'n Brews Festival, many Rotary Clubs that support us financially; legal services provided pro bono since our formation by Foster Garvey; the Washington Blues Society and the South Sound Blues Society; community arts commissions, public school foundations and others who donate instruments and financially support our 11 programs.

Music4Life is a community service activity that values kids, instrumental music or education. If you share one or more of those values, , you're welcome to join one of our chapters in western Washington. Or, help us start a new chapter to help at-risk students by opening the wonderful world of music to them for the rest of their lives.

# **Curtis Salgado Returns to Arlington!**

It's not your standard blues club: There's no booze at the Byrnes Performing Arts Center in Arlington because it's the high school theater.

The annual Legends of the Blues concert in Arlington welcomes loyal blues fans to town in a fundraiser for the not-for-profit Arlington Arts Council, on Saturday, November 20<sup>th</sup>.

Tickets are \$25 plus fee at brownpapertickets.com and \$25 with no fee at Flowers by George, 335 N. Olympic Avenue in downtown Arlington, and at the door, if space is available. Youth 12 and younger are free.

The Arlington Arts Council takes seriously the non-profit title, giving its income from the blues concert and other fundraisers through the years to the community in the form of public art. The council settled on live blues music largely because the blues community stepped up and brought a crowd to town. Jeff Nicely produced the legends concert for the past six or seven years prior to retiring from the volunteer position after the 2019 concert (Maybe he knew about the impending pandemic). Washington Blues Society President Tony Frederickson also stepped up, and helped promote the concert through the Washington Blues Society and its considerable network of blues fans.

Frederickson will MC this 8th annual Legends of the Blues Concert featuring Curtis Salgado on Saturday, November 20th. Jeff Nicely opens the show on blues harp with his music partner Randy Norris, on guitar. Jeff and Randy are both residents of the Arlington area.

The Arlington Arts Council is dedicated to providing all kinds of art experiences for the community, and it has focused its first 20 years on public art, including sculptures and murals in downtown Arlington.

In recent years, the City of Arlington has established a fund for public art through a construction sales tax, and arts council is contributing \$10,000 in glass art by Gerry Newcomb to beautify an obelisk in a Peace Plaza. Peace Plaza is located along the Centennial Trail near Haller Park and the bridge over the Stillaguamish River, a grand finale of sorts for its 20 years of accumulating public art for Arlington.

The Arlington Arts Council continues to provide a variety of arts experiences for the community, including music and opportunities for members to show their work. Along with the annual blues concert, the arts council presents the annual Eagle Photo Contest, an art show during the Stillaguamish Eagle Festival in February, and the Art in Legion Park on the last weekend of August (which features local musicians along with visual artists).

The arts council booked Curtis Salgado for 2020 because he brought a good crowd to town in 2018 and everyone loved the concert. Of course, last year was cancelled and the City of Arlington agreed to carry over the tourism grant to 2021.

Salgado is no stranger in the Pacific Northwest. Born in Everett, he has been performing, and recording around the world for 40 years. His latest album, Damage Control, is his first full-band recording in four years, and includes 12 fresh, original songs, with a rock-n-roll flare and one cover, "Slow Down" by Larry Williams.

As Salgado himself said, "Life is all about damage control... trouble and then some. It's about dealing with what gets thrown at you and saying, 'I ain't finished yet." Salgado has won nine Blues Music Awards including BB King Entertainer of the Year.

"We look forward to hosting Curtis again and look forward to a fun and safe gathering of blues fans," said Sarah Arney, president of Arlington Arts Council. "And to see Jeff and Randy up there on the big stage!"

Blues fans are encouraged to come to town early that day, take a walk along the Centennial Trail to see the city's public art collection, the result of 20 years of effort by the Arlington Arts Council, and have some supper too. You could even spend the night at a local hotel, to support the tourism fund that supports the Arlington Arts Council's efforts.

(NOTE: Depending on the pandemic, the school district might require certain seating restrictions, and these details will be confirmed until the week of the show. The Byrnes Performing Arts Center will do what is required to keep guests safe).

Benjamin Hunter is an award-winning multi-instrumentalist, composer, community activist, social entrepreneur, and educator.



## A Tale of Three Cities... Part 2

"It was the best of times; It was the worst of times..."

Editor's Note: Some sections of this article first appeared in select editions of the Cascade Blues Society's Blues Notes publication,.

So starts Charles Dickens' A Tale of Two Cities, a story of a life deprived in lock down and then released back to uncertainty.

Third wave of the Covid-19 pandemic spreading across our planet "...the worst of times," and live music is cautiously reemerging, and there's new music, "...the best of times."

In May of 2020, I covered the Allman Betts Band's history and release of their first CD, Down to the River for the Washington Blues Society. This first tour was picking up steam when it ran headlong into the Covid-19 pandemic and was shut down just as the band headed up the California coast for Oregon and Washington.

The band and the support around them persevered through the pandemic by going back to Muscle Shoals Sound Studio to record their second CD, Bless Your Heart. As 2021 slogged on, the Allman Betts Band moved through live streams, and then pushed to find ways to have live shows. A well-managed bubble allowed the band to make a full run with Southern rockers Blackberry Smoke and gave them back momentum to continue with their own tour. As promised, they rescheduled tour dates in the Pacific Northwest. As many readers of the Cascade Blues Association and the Washington Blues Society know, the September 1st issue of the Blues Notes and the Bluesletter both contained previews of the four scheduled Pacific Northwest shows: Bend, Oregon; Portland, Oregon; Seattle Washington and Spokane Washington.

If you missed these earlier articles, please visit each blues society's publication online



to learn about the musicians in this band. We are lucky that the Allman Betts Band, just like the bands of the principal player's fathers, will likely be with us for the long haul.

This article covers the band's show in Spokane and the complementary article in the Cascade Blues Association's Blues Notes, will cover the shows in Bend and Portland. We'll also look at the venues and the music communities around the venues that supported the tour. While the band's representatives had set up interviews with band members on the road, they were cancelled in favor of securing the protective bubble around the band that kept the tour rolling.

As we last left the intrepid troubadours, an unfortunate turn of events included an unexpected cancellation of the show at Seattle's Neptune Theatre due to an abundance of caution. This allowed the band to play at the Big Blues Bender in Las Vegas, but also cost them a 2,000 miles, 31-hour bus ride

as they detoured out of Portland down to Las Vegas and then back to Spokane within two days.

Martin Woldson Theater at The Fox, Spokane

Unlike the Pop-up Amphitheater in Bend, Oregon or the classic night club environment in Portland, the Martin

Woldson Theater at The Fox (the Fox) is the home to the Spokane Symphony.

Jeff vom Saal, Executive Director of the Spokane Symphony, describes the Fox as, "Spokane's living room, because it's where we all gather to be together for great live music and a wonderful variety of entertainment."

"Originally named the Fox Theater, it was built in 1931 in the middle of the Great Depression at a cost of \$1 million," said Alison Highberger, Fox Theatre Public Relations Manager. "The architect, Robert Reamer, was from Seattle and most famous for his design of Old Faithful Inn in Yellowstone National Park. Reamer also designed the 5th Avenue Theater in Seattle, and the Mount Baker Theater in Bellingham."

As I entered the Fox before the show, Jeff and Alison's words came alive. The way the staff treated us all embodied the feelings described by Jeff and Alison.

### THE ALLMAN BETTS BAND

Allman Betts Band was scheduled to play Spokane on their first tour in March of 2020 which was suddenly cut in the worldwide pandemic shutdown. The Fox told patrons who had bought tickets for that show that the Allman Betts Band said they would make it back to Spokane once touring was possible. So, they honored tickets sold the year before.

The Fox, following state and local mandates, required that anyone entering for the gig to show positive proof of vaccination or provide a negative covid-19 test within 72 hours of entering. The theatre found that these negative tests were not easy to get in the community on such short notice and felt compelled to do something more for the fans. A community nurse volunteered, and the Fox conducted the covid-19 rapid tests on site for a small fee to cover the costs. This would allow those who couldn't get the rapid test in time, or those who didn't know of the restrictions, to not be turned away at the door. They showed they cared about the community.

It was show time and River Kittens came out opening the night's festivities running through their six-song set of mandolin and acoustic guitar accompanied tunes making it obvious why the RiverFront Times named them Best Americana Artist. Their performance backed up their website descriptions of "effortless harmonies and honest song writing."

Marc Ford Band came out next with drummer Phil Jones, Berry Duane Oakley (Yup, Berry Duane Oakley from the Allman Betts Band) on bass/vocals and Marc Ford with his Asher Gold-top paired with a 40watt Bad Cat amp combo. On this tour he

is also only carrying three effects pedals; wah-wah, delay and his signature BMF overdrive. He mentioned he has no roadies on this tour. The staff is stripped down and so is the equipment.

Marc shared his feelings about how a trio allows for tighter instrumental "talk" between the musicians and favors his influences Jimi Hendrix and Stevie Ray Vaughn band format. His work as guitarist foil against Rich Robinson in the Black Crowes is integral to the classic Black Crowes sound from 1992-1997, especially on Southern Harmony and the Musical Companion. He was part of Ben Harper's band and toured with Booker T of Booker T and the MG's. Marc returned to the Black Crowes for a year back in 2005 and then with Rich Robinson in Magpie Salute. Again, he is solo... by his own choice... as he keeps an ear open for suitable opportunities.

His performance in Spokane not only showed so much of these influences, but also kicked us with the fact that he has been his own person his whole life. His music has had to be true or it wasn't going to be. As luck would have it, I sat right in front of Marc's Bad Cat amp, so I got the house mix and Marc's amp right between the ears!

Finally, it was time for the Allman Betts Band. You could tell the band was wiped out. A long tour through the rough waters of the pandemic, a 31 hour 2,000-miles bus ride within the past two days, cancellation of the European portion of the 2021 tour due to the international travel issues with the pandemic, were all taking their toll.

As Devon Allman came out with the band, he seemed more talkative. He related a story of a local friend who had called him before the show to apologize for not being able to make it as the friend he was coming with conked out. Devon told us what he told his friend: "Then you fucked up, man!"

"Let's sit back and see where they take us."

The band launched into their first tune, and any effects of the pandemic tour, and the 31 hour, 2,000-mile bus ride evaporated up into the haze of the stage lights above. Their light show from the legendary Brotherhood of the Light, was not used in Bend or Portland, but rejoined the tour in Las Vegas. Each of the prior night's shows included a canned, but relatable, light show. Nothing fancy, but it worked.

The Brotherhood of Light has a long and storied history, which begins in 1968 as this collaborative staged light shows for the first psychedelic rock concerts at the legendary Fillmore West and Winterland. What began as experiments with 16mm film and Kodak slides has evolved to DVD video and LED wall technology.

Although this was the first venue of the three shows I covered that had fixed floor and balcony seating, fans took to their feet often. Again, the band ran through tunes from their first album, Down to the River, and their newest CD, Bless Your Heart. Fans seemed to know the songs from 2019's Down to the River and were enjoying the newer tunes from Bless Your Heart. As in Portland and Bend, the fans joined in the chorus of "Down to the River" as if it was a decades old hit. Singing, smiling, highfiving and hugging.

As so many artists I have interviewed have told me over the years, the cover songs they play live must have personal meaning to them to have influenced their playing style. Devon, Duane, and Berry have told me repeatedly since I first started covering them in the late 1990s that they want to make their way in music on their own abilities and talents... and not depend not on their fathers' legacies, either.

But as with almost any family, family has a huge influence on you whether you embrace or deny it.

So, in an incredibly adult action, they also choose to embrace their heritage. They added three Allman Brothers Band tunes of significance to them: "Midnight Rider," "Blue Sky" and "Dreams." In general, they stay true to the originals, but add their own style where appropriate. Fans that came to see that got exactly what they needed as each song was greeted with sing alongs and standing ovations.

Finally, I am always looking for signs of working or not working when a new band starts. Pandemic era international travel has postponed the 2021 European portion tour until 2022. The Allman Betts Band is slated to finish their current Autumn in America Tour in Honolulu, Hawaii on Halloween.

Less than two weeks later, they start on the Allman Family Revival tour, which includes 18 dates throughout the US following the theme of prior Allman Family Reunion and Revival one off gigs since 2017, which honored Gregg Allman.

As Rolling Stone reporter Andy Greene noted on September 14th, "The Allman Betts Band will be the featured act alongside Robert Randolph, Donavan Frankenreiter, Eric Gales, Joanne Shaw Taylor, Jimmy Hall and Lamar Williams, Jr. They will be joined in select cities by Kenny Wayne Shepherd, G. Love, Samantha Fish, Alex Orbison and Kenny Aronoff."

Looks like signs of rolling with the punches, big and small, and get up and keep moving forward has been, and continues to be, a hallmark of the Allman Betts Band.

By following the Allman Betts Band in the pages (and screens) of the Washington Blues Society Bluesletter and Cascade Blues Association Blues Notes, you're an important part of supporting this new band.

Let's sit back and see where they take us.

# The Story Behind the CD

"Since I'm not a singer, I try to with chords what songwriters do with lyrics."

I'm a bass player and have been playing bass since 1971. I started playing acoustic guitar prior to that, I became more interested in bass, and I still play bass for The Vududes.

I began my career in Morton, Illinois and I moved to Seattle in 1981 after I graduated from Bradley University in Peoria. Playing acoustic guitar is something I enjoy doing when I want to take a little break from playing bass. As a guitarist, it's nice to have that alternative.

My recording process is a little unusual in that don't overdub any parts, so if I make a mistake, I just start over. This process is kind of time consuming, but that process ensures that I know the song and can perform it. Songs from Mill Hill is the first CD I have ever made by myself (although I have played bass on CDs from Dana Osborn and Fat Cat as well as recordings by Terry Halstead and Pat Gossan).

I have played bass for many Seattle bands, including Risk, Major Major, Loose Shoes, Bluetown, The Dana Osborn Group, Fat Cat and The Vududes. I have played bass all over Seattle since 1981, but I have never performed live as a solo acoustic guitarist.

Since I'm not a singer, I try to do with chords what songwriters do with lyrics. My influences on guitar are Wes Montgomery, Merle Travis, Herb Ellis and Hank Garland as well as local guitarists that I have worked

with including Terry Halstead, Matt Gallagher, Michael Marriott, Tim Tennis, Pat Hewitt, Terry Davidson, Dana Osborn, Hans Ipsen and Dan Newton, as well as Illinois guitarists Rick Martin and the late Jerry Drake.

Some of the songs on the CD have been around for a long time. "Aletha," for example, was written as a bass etude in 1985 and not transposed to guitar until 2018. "Sometime In Spring" was a song that was intended to feature Fat Cat guitarist Hans Ipsen, but Hans died in an auto accident before the song could be incorporated into the Fat Cat setlist.

"Sons of Illinois" is a tip of the cap to Illinois musicians Rick Martin, Jerry Drake, Bobby Gregory, and Mitch Marine. "Montana Joyride" recalls a road trip across Montana with my brother in a rented Cadillac.

Jerry's Tune" is an ode to the late Illinois guitarist Jerry Drake, and "Beautiful Waitress" was inspired by the notion that oftentimes the prettiest woman in a restaurant is the waitress.

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# Blues Destination: Clarksdale, Mississippi

20 Years of Blues at the Ground Zero Blues Club!

I'd like to share a few things with Bluesletter readers to follow-up on last month's article about Memphis. Normally, I research first for accuracy, but for that article, I just winged it. I found out after my article landed in the October issue that the Black Keys recorded a video of Delta Kreme in America's oldest Juke Joint, Jimmy "Duck" Holmes' Blue Front Café in Bentonia and learned that many Pacific Northwest musicians have migrated South, including Kevin Selfe and Tim "Too Slim" Langford. Also, the new CFO at the Ground Zero Blues Club hails from the Rose City, Eric Meier.

My mention of Bobbie Gentry's song, "Ode to Billie Joe," struck a chord with Bill Luckett, co-owner of the Ground Zero Blues Club.

"You are a gifted writer!!!," Typed Bill via email to me. "A group of June Bugs, of which I am a member, formally buried Billy Joe McAllister on June 3rd at Tallahatchie Flats. It made ABC News and a bunch of newspapers."

This is tremendous credit coming from such a "Gentle Giant" of the blues industry and former Mayor of the Crossroads! Not having the foggiest idea of what he was talking about, I consulted the Oracle of Google, and there it was just like the song said ... "It was the 3<sup>rd</sup> of June on a sleepy, dusty Delta day."

To my surprise and amusement, I saw Bill, dressed as the Pope, officiating the "informal burial" of the fictitious Billie Joe McAllister in that ABC news story online. As The Boss, Bruce Springsteen, sang on "Blinded by the Light:" ... Hit 'em in the funny bone that's where they expect it least!' I fell out laughing. Those June Bugs have a sense of humor, and curiosity got the better of me.

I called Bill and we talked June Bugs, Clarksdale, the blues, Ground Zero Blues Club, and perhaps most importantly, looked over the horizon at a new normal that included a revitalized downtown Clarksdale filled with returning blues fans from all over

"The June Bugs are an eclectic group of what I define as a pseudo-intellectual, fakeacademia miscreants," said Bill. "They're headed up by a leadership group that includes a Federal Judge, a US Senator, literati, a funeral home director, and other well-known misfits. We are in our 3rd year of existence, and we celebrate primarily June the 3<sup>rd</sup> because that's the day that Billie Joe McAllister jumped off the Tallahatchie bridge made famous by the Boddy Gentry song. We run around like a bunch of crazies, I would call it 'Mardi Gras on steroids.' Again, I'm talking about Federal Judges, US Senators, captains of industry, doctors, lawyers, accountants and other assorted somebodies."

Bill's stream of consciousness continued: "But, we have a higher purpose, too. We have white paper readings and there is an intellectual component aside from the craziness. We have about 50 members, including judges from Texas, San Francisco, Florida, and international businessmen. It's really a great group of people. We host cocktail parties, have readings, talk about books, and carry on generally. It was started three years ago by a US District Court Judge, Mike Mills, in the Northern District of Mississippi. I was asked to join a year later."

The June Bugs have celebrated William Faulkner, the author from nearby Oxford, Bobbie Gentry's "Ode to Billie Joe," and Robert Johnson (who's buried in three different locations in the Delta). The group has also honored Emmitt Till, a black teen from Chicago who was killed in Mississippi. This year, the June Bugs feted Tennessee Williams at his museum in the Saint George Episcopal Church in Clarksdale.

"We celebrated with some good music,"

continued Bill. "We had a concert at Ground Zero and had a pickup band. The band, which was comprised of US Senator Robert Wicker and Judge Mike Mills on guitar, and other incredible musicians. They learned the chords to Al Green songs. Morgan Freeman, who was not a member, still celebrated with us by jumping up on stage and singing Al Green's "Let's Stay Together." He brought the house down and it's on YouTube! Next year, 2022, we don't have any plans, but I'm sure we will come up with something pretty interesting!"

He left me with a feeling of having no doubt about this fact. I always could tell there was something in the water around Clarksdale, and Bill wasn't talking about mocktails, either. He could sell tickets to these shenanigans, I figured. They'd make a mint!

The June Bugs are in the process of making a documentary of their exploits, and I know that it will be a first-class production, just like Last of the Mississippi Jukes (in which Bill Luckett and Morgan Freeman introduce viewers to their blues club).

Bill and I talked about the 20th anniversary of the Ground Zero Blues Club.

"We had a soft opening on May 11 of 2001,"

he said. "We had a grand opening that Memorial Day weekend attended by Ashley and Wynona Judd, and of course, Morgan Freeman. We had our 20th anniversary this last Memorial Day. We've had a financial history of just trying to keep it open for a number of years. Finally, just a few years ago, we actually started to break even. We didn't get into it to make money, as you know most similar businesses fail in the first year or two, and it's a tough business. We have persevered and now we have prevailed. We have an iconic brand, we're known worldwide, we are ranked the number one blues club in the America by the Best Blues Clubs dot org. American Airlines picked us as one of the best music venues in the world and Fodor's, the travel folks, rank us and Clarksdale as the number one music city in America just below Nashville! They named Ground Zero as the anchor of the city. That alone puts us ahead of Chicago, St Louis, Austin, New York, LA you name it. Just think about that. We have achieved that by offering good food, good drink, and great music, that's just the right combination. We feature music four nights a week and many weeks it's more than that. Morgan and I were very fortunate to have the idea and get it going. We have two other owners: Howard Stovall of the famous Stovall Plantation, and lately we brought in Eric Meier from Portland Oregon. It's a wonderful thing,

and I'm just so proud of it that you can tell it in my voice. We support some great musicians and give people jobs. We've had about 35 employees' pre-COVID once but again, we've had to scale down because of COVID. We have 200 or something bands per year, we have festivals, special events and sometimes music 48 hours straight. We're on Facebook and people rave on it. You can look at the comments they've made. It was a haul and it was tough for many years."

"Over the years, we've had the 'old codgers," the old bluesmen-music guys, bring in their children and their grandchildren to show them where the 'old guys' music came from," continued Bill. "Everybody from Paul Simon, George Throrogood, Delaney and Bramlett, Lyle Lovett, Gene Simmons, Robert Plant, oh I can't think of them all and I don't want to leave anybody out. You can sit on the front porch of Ground Zero Blues Club and meet the world! It's just phenomenal! From French Polynesia, to South Africa to South Korea to south China and every European country. One Christmas eve, we had the leader of the UK's House of Lords come. I can't even think about all of them off the top of my head and again, I don't want to leave anyone out."

The Ground Zero Blues Club is known as "Grandaddy of Clarksdale Clubs," and I marvel at the fact that Clarksdale offers blues fans live blues music seven nights a week. Bill recounted some notable local blues destinations that should be on every blues pilgrim's itinerary.

"We have Muddy Waters' house site and the Stovall Plantation," he said. "We have the Delta Music Museum, the first museum dedicated to blues music. Roger Stolle, an advertising executive from St Louis came here and opened a very eclectic blues shop, Cat Head. He's a big authority on the blues and he's a great guy. He's done some documentaries on blues music and movies that are very popular. We have Red's Juke Joint and Lounge, that's ranked number two. Now Red, who's quite a character, would argue that his is #1, but the blues jury is still out on that. That should get anybody started on what's around town here in Clarksdale."

I've made some special memories in Clarksdale over the years and hanging out with Red at Red's Juke Joint is near the top of my list. Looking at my watch, I had to wrap up our conversation, but before I did, I wanted to close with an attitude of gratitude for his time, insights, and perhaps more importantly, friendship that included an introduction to Morgan Freeman after I spoke onstage at Ground Zero during a break from a Blues Foundation event many years ago.

Luckett is a true Renaissance man. A former Mayor of Clarksdale, successful lawyer, philanthropic June Bug, NAACP life member, imitation Pope ("William St. Clarksdale the Innocent?"), co-owner of the premier blues club, and a noted terpsichorean (I threw that in there for the June Bug literati and editor Eric Steiner better not edit that out).

Bill confirmed something I've heard on the blues grapevine. I had heard that a Ground Zero Blues Club might open in Biloxi.

"We just licensed the use of our brand name to developers in Biloxi, on the Gulf Coast," said Bill. "We hope we expand from there. We were hesitant to start expanding because there can only be but one Ground Zero Blues Club meaning the place of beginning of something. Empirical evidence shows that the real crossroads was right behind the Ground Zero Blues Club. It's where Robert Johnson sold his soul to the devil to play guitar so the story goes. It's celebrated by some highway markers that I helped design.

But it's the symbolic crossroads we celebrate which is the intersection of highway 61 and 49."

Bill summed it all up for me. "This area,

"I can't wait to get back to 387 Delta Avenue... Ground Zero for the Blues!

Clarksdale in particular, was the place of beginning of the best-known blues, the Delta Blues. Virtually every great blues musician has passed through here sometime in his, or her, careers. John Lee Hooker, born here. Sam Cooke, born here. Ike Turner, born here. Muddy Waters, lived here. Howlin' Wolf, came here. Besse Smith, died there. You name 'em, they've all come through Clarksdale. If they get their music chops honed here in this very discerning, scrutinizing crowds we used to have here, they could go anywhere in the world and play the blues."

With that, I stopped recording on my iPhone, and began transcribing our conversation. One thing's stuck with me, though: Bill's infectious and forward-looking sense of hope that will fuel a revitalized downtown Clarksdale once COVID is in our rear view

One thing's for sure: I can't wait to get back to 387 Delta Avenue in Clarksdale.

Ground Zero for the blues!

The monthly Washington Blues Society Blues Bash continues with an in person live event Tuesday November 9th at 7PM at the CCR Lounge in Snohomish. The Blues Bash will feature the Levi Platero Band from the Navajo Nation in celebration of Native American Heritage month. Seating is available indoors and outdoors weather permitting with close circuit TV viewing of the stage. No reservations 21 and older. As always, the Blues Bash is presented free, we encourage attendees to "tip the band," in support of the artists.

Levi Platero, winner of a Native American Music Association award, former member of Indigenous, and owner of his own production company, leads a seasoned band delighting audiences nationally. He has played with Los Lonely Boys, tours the Midwest and Northwest each year playing originals, blues, rock n roll, R&B, and acoustic and electric covers of Jimi Hendrix,

Stevie Ray Vaughn, and Robert Johnson.

Levi Platero is a member of the Navajo Nation headquartered in Window Rock, Arizona. His family band, The Plateros, emerged on the music scene in 2004 as a popular blues rock power trio. After touring for a decade with his family band, and a run as a member of Indigenous, Levi decided it was time to get back to his own music. He then recruited a new band, began touring, and released a self-titled EP featuring the single "Take Me Back," which went on to win the 2016 Native American Music Association Award for Best Blues Song.

Backed by his band, Levi's live shows captivate audiences with the bursts of intricate guitar acrobatics that take root way down to soulful expressions woven from the B strings of his guitar. Though an already formidable talent, Levi is grounding himself and standing in his own space as an

# Let's Improve Our Bluesletter (Please?)

I wanted to briefly ask Bluesletter readers, and current and prospective contributors, for a little help in terms of improving the way I receive stories and images for consideration of our print magazine.

Over the past few months, I have received many stories and photos that I simply cannot use as they are not formatted for traditional, old-school paper media. I offer the following suggestions to better fill the next two editions as I will have limited time to produce the December and January issues (due to family commitments for the December issue and to a previously scheduled vacation for the January issue). Plan for the December deadline as our regularly scheduled deadline of November 5th, and plan for the January deadline no later than November 26th as I'll leave on vacation with little or no online access until mid-December. As of press time, I'm avidly seeking contributions for each of the next two issues.

While I feel our printer's requirements are clearly spelled out on page four of every issue, I wanted to summarize some key points of how stories and images can land in these pages.

Photos: Must be saved as high resolution attachments, 300 DPI or greater, images formatted as CMYK for traditional print (and not social media). Social media photos are fine for the web, but their resolution, commonly at 72 DPI, does not work in print. I try not to print photos with a promotional photographer's watermark, but have made exceptions from time to time (this issue's excellent work at the 2021 Big Blues Bender by Marilyn Stringer is one example).

Reviews and stories: Just like attached photos, reviews and stories should be submitted as attachments in text or Microsoft Word format. Just like a regular newspaper column, please try to tell your story in 750 words or less (but I do welcome feature articles at twice that length).

Other Stuff: I'm always interested in

personal stories regarding how blues music has impacted readers, because if the music has touched a fan, it's likely that stories like these will resonate with readers. I prefer reviews to clock in at 300 words or less, and am open to full page reviews if the reviewer shows me through words why a shorter piece is not appropriate.

Finally, I want to do a better job of honoring those musicians we have lost. Not only the artists we have lost to COVID-19, but others who have left us due to natural causes. One of the most touching features of our Washington Blues Society Best of the Blues ("BB Awards") show and the Blues Music Awards is the way each organization remembers artists and supporters that we have lost.

I wish I could have had just a few minutes with Don Everly, Charlie Watts, Lee "Scratch" Perry, or Tom T. Hall, instead of learning about their passing through a recent obituary, as each of these artists have taught me something new through their music dating back to the 1960s.

Then, at the end of "One for the Kings," lights came on and confetti dropped to signal the end of the Big Blues Bender.

Kenny James Miller Band Tear in My Eye (Self-Released)

I first discovered this Montana-based trio many years ago on the Lake Coeur d'Alene sunset Blues Cruise during the Coeur d'Alene Blues Festival. This power trio featuring Ken Sederdahl on lead guitar, Mark Meznarich on bass and Greg Sewell on drums, played mostly original songs, and since then, they've played some of the more popular live music festivals across the greater Pacific Northwest. The name of the band reflects an earlier lineup that included the late Jimmy Groom on bass, Kenny Sederdahl on guitar, and Mark Miller on drums. The band's sixth release, Tear in My Eye, honors Spokanearea bluesman Elon C. "Sarge" Jones, who frequently sat in with the band when they returned to the Lilac City. In 2019, the Inland Empire Blues Society honored Jones with a Special Recognition Award at the 25th annual Empire Awards at the Spokane Valley Eagles. Jones, featured on the CD cover sings on the title cut, and of the CD's 14 tracks, I particularly liked "Pinkham Jelly" (about local moonshine), the heavily caffeinated "Cup of Joe," and "Big Daddy." Local bluesman Steve Kelley plays on "Big Daddy," celebrating the Big Daddy & The Blue Notes band. Logan Triplett's back cover photo of Ken and his dog Cody does a nice job of capturing Montana's big sky landscape. I enjoyed the band's show captured by Eric Funk of the Montana Public Broadcasting System's 11th & Grant series, and highly recommend this CD. -Eric Steiner



Lady A Satisfyin' (Self-Released)

Seattle blues artist Lady is back with her 9th CD, Satisfyin.' I reviewed a pre-release virtual copy prior to the Bluesletter's "deadline dash" and I look forward to buying a real, physical CD of this release. Satisfyin' offers up 10 songs that showcase Lady A's diverse musical talents, and I was hooked by the funky title tune. Joining Lady A at Seattle's Master Ian Studios are Herman Brown and Paul Richardson on guitars, multi-instrumentalist John Oliver III, John Studamire and Paul Richardson on bass, award-winning harmonica player Joe Seamons, and Paul Richardson and John Oliver III on drums. Olive and Roz Royster McCommon sing background vocals, and I particularly liked the opening "Whatever You Do" for its inspired sense of hope and positivity buoyed by Herman Brown's exceptional guitar parts and John Oliver III's evocative keyboards. The playful "Big Momma" will delight women (and their admirers) "who can't get near a size 10, and each time I revisit the uptempo"Blues on My Mind," I revel in Joe Seamon's chromatic harp playing. Perhaps my favorite songs on this CD are the two that close the set: "For the People in the Back (All I Got)" and "Heaven Help Us." When I've seen Lady A perform, she truly seeks to reach the back rows of every venue, and I hope that the terrestrial and satellite faith-based radio communities pick up the 10th song on the CD. Keep Satisfyin' at or near the top of your "Top 10 Blues CDs of 2021" and remember this CD when the Bluesletter prints its Best of the Blues Awards ("BB Awards") nomination ballot for our next awards program. - Eric Steiner

Janie Cribbs & The T.Rust Band Second Chance (Self-Released)

This past summer, I saw Janie Cribbs & The T.Rust Band play most of the songs from their newest CD, Second Chance, at the Penn Cove Taproom not far from my home in Freeland on Whidbey Island. In addition to being a bandleader based on the island, Janie Cribbs is an imaginative graphic artist. Her work is on display, and for sale, at Gordon's on Blueberry Hill, an exceptional, fine dining restaurant overlooking Holmes Harbor. Second Chance features Janie Cribbs on lead vocals, Joe Reggiatore on guitars, Kevin Holden on drums, and David Willis on bass and banjo. My favorite cuts from the CD include the anthemic "Freedom Train," mournful "Standing in the Rain," and the "Down at the Crossroads"-inspired "2 Pints of Whiskey." After the Penn Cove show, Janie sent me a link to her latest video, "Freedom Train," that recalls the struggles and violence of the civil rights movement. Sadly, the images in that video from the 1960s are still as relevant as they were during the passage of the Voting Rights Act in the Johnson Administration. After I heard Janie's "Transgendered Jesus" from her Believe CD several years ago, I recommended that she send the song to the producer of the award-winning TV show, Transparent, starring Jeffrey Tambor and Judith Light. Unfortunately, that series was cancelled, and I thought that the messages of acceptance and love in that song would have resonated with the producers of that TV series. Give Second Chance a first chance (yeah, I know that's corny, and I highly recommend this diverse blues CD). Eric Steiner



Please consider serving on the Board of the Washington Blues Society as Nominations are due during the November Blues Bash

This month, the Washington Blues Society will take nominations for the 2016 allvolunteer elected Board of Directors from members at the Blues Bash at the Collectors Choice Restaurant in Snohomish on Tuesday, November 9th.

This article is on page 31 for a reason: just like the Best of the Blues Awards ("BB Awards") nomination and voting processes, the back page includes members' mailing labels so that the Washington Blues Society can verify current membership in the Washington Blues Society. Every November, the following positions are up for nominations from members at the Blues Bash: President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer and Bluesletter Editor.

The President is the public face of the blues society and this position requires not only familiarity with the local, regional and national blues scenes, but also the ability to lead a diversely talented team of volunteers. The current President is Tony Frederickson.

The Vice President plays an important role in that he or she is often a representive of the President when he or she is working on blues society business. The current Vice President is Rick J. Bowen, and his niche includes managing the critically-important venue guide, talent listing and open mic/ blues jam listings online in a very dynamic and changing online environment.

The Secretary works behind the scenes supporting membership activities, takes and produces meeting notes at monthly Board meetings, and supports special events. The current Secretary is Marisue Thomas.

The Treasurer is responsible for accounting and financial reporting according to city, county, state and Federal requirements. This work is done in Quickbooks and includes accounting for monthly expenses and obligations, and producing profit and loss statements as well as ad-hoc financial reports required by the Board (or potential grantor). The current Treasurer is Ray Kurth.

The Bluesletter Editor produces a 32 page monthly magazine each month. The current Editor is Eric Steiner.

The term of each elected volunteer position is one calendar year. In January, the newly-seated Board will appoint Advertising, Membership, Volunteers, Technology, Information Education, Music, and Merchandise Directors. Each Board-appointed volunteer position is a 12-month appointment ending in December of 2022.

The nomination and election processes are governed by the By-Laws of the Washington Blues Society, which is a nonprofit organization recognized by the State of Washington and the federal Internal Revenue Service.

The slate of nominees for the 2022 Board of Directors will be published in the December issue of the Washington Blues Society Bluesletter and members will have the opportunity to vote during the Blues Bash at the Collectors Choice Restaurant in Snohomish on Tuesday, December 14th.
