We have fi ally made it to the end of 2021, and I have mixed feelings about it. This past year has been most challenging year I have had as part of the Washington Blues Society, and perhaps also the most rewarding (surprisingly in the context of COVID-19).

With the signifi ant impact of COVID19 on the blues society's normal routines, such as earning money to keep our programs going, mailing the Bluesletter every month to our members and street teams, and interacting with our members, has been limited. However, the last couple of months have included great, live events like the Sunbanks Music Festival and the Walla Walla Guitar Festival. Each of these festivals has allowed me to reconnect with many members and blues music fans. I am overwhelmed with the amount of genuine gratitude expressed by members and fans for the work the Board of Directors has done over the last year and a half to keep blues music out there for everyone to enjoy and escape from the stresses of the pandemic.

Many artists have been taking advantage of our live streaming events on Facebook and our new YouTube channel. I knew the numbers of views had been positive, and the feedback I received from members and fans on how these activities helped viewers with the stresses related to the pandemic. I received a lot of comments on how much we had improved the quality over the past year, and even when we had production issues, how much enjoyment many got out of these events. It made the steep learning curve worth it, and and I believe that this will be a frequent part of our annual events, and even some new fun things we have planned for the new year.

I am glad to be able to say we will be back in Memphis this year for the International Blues Challenge! We were able to hold several Washington Blues Society Semi-Final events across the state this year and while the number of entries was down a little, the talent was not! The fi als at the Aurora Borealis in Shoreline featured a great day of music. Each fi alist played a great set, and it wasn't an easy day for the judges. The Solo/Duo and Band scores were very, very close, and I would have been comfortable with any of our fi alists representing us in Memphis this next January. If you missed it the fi als are on our Washington Blues Society's own YouTube channel.

Dear Bluesletter Readers,

Welcome to the last issue of the Bluesletter in 2021. This issue contains a number of articles that give me a glimmer of hope that we just might be returning to a "new normal" with more live music rather than less.

Jane Henderson and Ilona Berzup capture the magic of the Sunbanks Roots and Blues Festival and

several previews foster an uncommon, positive, and hopeful vision of live blues events this over the next few months.

First of all, we have a preview of the Highway 99 All-Stars debut at Jazz Alley in February, a look forward to this month's fi st-ever Blues in the Schools benefit at Seattle's Café Con Leche on December 12th, and a recognition of the Salmon Bay Eagles 33rd anniversary with several special shows lined up. Prior venue guides listed over 370 venues, and I generally added them without checking their phone number or opened/closed status. Over the past month, I've verifi d that each of the 320+ listings in this issue are in indeed open (as of our November 5th published deadline). While I realize that listings like this are subject to change on a daily basis, I hope readers will consider using it as they plan their blues nights out.

As in years' past, this issue features each 2021 Bluesletter cover, and I hope that many readers will agree that we are among the most diverse blues societies publishing a printed, monthly 32-page Bluesletter in the world.



The Sunbanks Festival Shines Again!

"... a wonderful weekend of music, with great weather, and superb company!"

The good news is that the Sunbanks Blues and Roots Festival was a grand success, following a two-year delay due to pandemic restrictions. And there is no bad news! Attendees were treated to a variety of excellent blues and roots-based music, great weather, incredible scenery, and a renewal of friendships that have been formed over the 26 years the festival has survived.

Thursday night set the convivial tone with a gathering at the Cantina, featuring acoustic performances introduced by and including Billy Stoops and company. The music was punctuated by the joyous greetings of old friends. As the evening progressed and more folks arrived, Kristen Marlo and Gina Belliveau gifted us with their beautiful harmonies, followed by Older and Wiser, who interspersed their original songs with covers familiar to those of us of a certain age- think Elton John, John Mellencamp, and Buff lo Springfi ld. Many in the crowd joined them in song - a fun and up-lifting experience for all concerned.

Friday's show started at 5 PM, giving attendees, security, stage, and sound crews plenty of time to get moved in, set up, and very prepared. True Tone Audio provided great sound throughout the event and the staging was effici t and effective. There were food vendors and crafters, and three of our Washington-based blues societies, the South Sound Blues Association, the Inland Empire Blues Society, and the Washington Blues Society.

The evening began with 23-year-old Diego Romero, originally from Walla Walla, now performing out of Bellingham. This kid can play (and sing) the Blues! Diego and his band packed the dance "fl or" almost immediately with an upbeat, funk-infused set. Their rendition of BB King's "Never Make your Move Too Soon" was especially fine.

The Coyote Kings followed with a highenergy performance, featuring a very animated Tiff ny Danes, singing "Shaking it Down on the Wrong side of Town". She was backed by two "lead" guitarists, including band leader Robin Barrett, trading solos, and supporting chords, resulting in a rich, layered sound. At some point, Tiph gave us a heartbreakingly beautiful slow blues song in a low register -very effective and affective.

The Delgado Brothers: Bobby on bass, Joe on guitar, Steve on drums and vocals, and David Kelly on keys - treated us to original songs from their self-produced album, Two Trains. Every song resonated with thoughtful lyrics and compelling melodies. "Explore Your Mind" and "Talk to Me" were two of the many that showcased Joey Delgado's prowess on the Gibson "Les Paul" guitar he was awarded at the International Blues Challenge a few years ago.

The night ended with a tear-em-up performance by the Harlis Sweetwater

Band, pulling everyone up to the stage (again) for a high-energy set of aggressive rockin' blues. Harlis provided the roughtoned vocals and guitar, backed by bass, drums, sax, trumpet, and harp. Stand-out songs included "Evil Spirit" and "Like a Woman Should."

After a late night of music and revelry, Saturday morning's audience enjoyed an acoustic performance by Brooks Forsyth, a songwriter, skilled fi ger picking guitarist, and smooth talking (and singing) storyteller. Brooks' covers included the Tony Rice classic, "Church Street Blues," Ray Charles' "I Got a Woman," and a rollicking version of "Rock Island Line," during which he articulated the lyrics so fast, it bordered on rap.

Next up was Octopus Ballet, fronted by Sunbanks mainstay and popular vocalist and guitarist Leanne Trevelyan, with Barbara Blue on bass and Cheryl Clark on sax and clarinet. Lea introduced us to some

of her newly-created songs, including the introspective, "I Thi k, Therefore I Am," as well as selections from her collection of originals from previous albums. "Not My Favorite Mistake" and "Somebody Out There Loves You" were a couple of the many she presented, most circling around a theme of love and love loss. The fl urishes and solos added by Cheryl's clarinet lent an appropriately plaintive tone to some of the songs. Leanne's cover of KT Tunstall's, "Black Horse and the Cherry Tree" is a favorite of dancers and inspired a mostly female sing-along.

Billy Stoops and the Dirt Angels: Billy Stoops on vocals and guitar, Jim King on sax, Barbara Blue on bass, Eric Manegold of Open Range Entertainment on drums, and Leanne Trevelyan in harmony - included songs from Billy's new album Wolf Moon, as well as past favorites. He opened with the statement piece, "Know My Name" from the Dirt Angel CD, and later sang, "Long Gone". Among the many well-worded and

introspective new tunes were "Gotta Go" -with the chorus, "you're the only one here having fun", and "Wolf Moon", dedicated to his spirited, "strong and fi e" grandson.

Rich Layton and Tough Town, from Portland via Austin, pulled his audience in with a set that was a showcase of blues styles, including some rhumba, a little shuffle, and lots of Texas honky tonk. Ths was a big sounding band, with Rich Layton on harp and vocals, Larry McCoy on guitar and back-up vocals, Haus on bass, and Charles Pike on drum and back-up vocals.

They featured selections from their newest CD, Salvation Road as well well inspired covers. Two notables were "Diamond Jim" and the Kenny Rogers/First Edition's "Just Dropped In."

Theresa James & the Rhythm Tramps began their show with Theresa saying, "Since I found the blues, I've been feeling in the pink", a fitting introduction for a show that highlighted songs from her new CD, Rose-Colored Glasses. Perched behind her keyboard, center stage, Theresa's focus was positivity and love, sometimes in a personal sense, as in "I've Got a Love I want to Hold on To," sometimes general, as in "Everybody, Everybody." Theresa's voice was beautiful and compelling, and her musicianship worthy of the great band that supported her. Their Reggae-like version of "Piece of my Heart" (think Janis Joplin) was great fun.

Speaking of fun, The Duffy Bishop set was that and dramatic, as well. As is her way, the petite redhead hid herself within the crowd and sang a duet with her lead guitarist/ husband, slowly working her way to the stage to join a band of all-stars, including Keith Lowe on bass, Chris Carson on guitar, Chris Leighton on drums, Jon Goforth on sax, and Bruce Laven on keyboard and trumpet. With deep roots in Oregon, Duffy and Chris call Florida home, and the set referenced each one: with a nod to Portlander Paul Delay, "Pawn Shop" a sad song about failed love, and "Black Mangrove," a haunting original that evoked the mystery of the Everglades. Keith Lowe's bow work on the stand-up bass made this song a showstopper. High spirits prevailed in the silly "Monkey Pants" and the sultry "Fingerlickin"."

The late-night show was reserved for Too Slim & the Taildraggers, a wake-up call to all the hard-rocking blues lovers in the crowd. Langford is known for fast and furious guitar licks, putting an edge to everything he plays. His vocals are often rough, to match, but he can turn kind of sweet, as in his original, "Thank You for the Love." The band's rendition of the Chambers Brothers', "Time Has Come Today" and Freddy King's "Going Down" are reminders of just where the music originated.

Sunday morning needed to start gently, and it did, with dusky voiced guitarist and pianist, James Coates. Hailing from Sumner, James performed originals,

sharing thoughts on life, love, and family. Introspective, but accessible, songs like "Can I be Sane?" and "Flower Girl" spoke to those of us who have struggled with relationships and self-defeating emotions at times. The band TuN brought the rest of the folks from their campsites and cabanas to dance again in front of the stage. With a repertoire of funk, blues, soul, and a taste of Latin & jazz thrown in for heat, the uptempo dance tunes kept everyone moving. Band leader Chris Cootsona (keys, vocals), brother Craig (drums), and Stephanie Daulong (vocals) and their supporting musicians gave Sunbanks attendees a reason to move.

Sister Mercy: Veterans of multiple performances at Portland's Waterfront Blues Festival, The Gorge in Washington, and stages in Memphis and Seattle, Sister Mercy presented a big band show that enhanced an already hearty music experience. Like dessert! Vocalist Sarah Brown fronted an all-star cast of players that featured Scott Garcia on guitar, Debby Espinor on keys, John Webb on bass, and songwriter Roger Espinor on drums. There were lots of smiles as the crowd enjoyed covers from Dylan to the Doobie Brothers, as well as high energy blues-based originals punctuated by beautiful harmonies, wonderful fills by Garcia on guitar, outrageous bass and drum solos, and tasty keyboard riffs. Their encore number was Etta **Iames** classic.





Setting the Inner Compass: The Blues

"You've got to help me; I can't do it by myself. You've got to help me, baby..."

Reading poetry is one of the ways some of us nourish our faith, a way we set or reset our inner compass and stay focused on the big picture, on the spiritual journey. I know that is true for me. "Setting the Inner Compass" is a monthly column where I share poems that I fi d meaningful and hope others do as well.

Ann and I have been traveling so I apologize that my column is late this month. The theme is 'The Blues'. For more than 20 years, I have hosted Blues Vespers in Tacoma and Seattle. I came up with the idea of bringing 'the Blues', what some people call the devil's music, to church sometime in 1999. Blues Vespers is a blues concert with a poem and a brief refl ction. Blues Vespers is held at Kilworth Chapel at the University of Puget Sound and at Seattle's Interfaith Community Sanctuary. More about Vespers and my journey with blues music and musicians another time.

Blues songs are about human experiences of loss, pain, and loneliness. Sometimes a blues song invites empathy. At other times they ask for help, like the classic "Help Me" credited to Sonny Boy Williamson and Willie Dixon:

"You got to help me; I can't do it all by

You got to help me, baby, I can't do it all by myself"

The song may be about a relationship between a man and a woman, but its opening words apply to life in general especially in the fall of 2021. We can't do it by ourselves. Times are hard for many of us. Covid's been with us for over a year and a half, there has been loss, sickness, and fear. It's been a long, hard season with the impact of climate change in our weather, with intense political division, and a general uncertainty about what's happening next.

A lot of the folks I know are tired, strained

and stressed. They have the blues.

We need each other.

Blues music began and grew out of the black experience in this country, with women and men taken against their will from Africa. They brought with them a unique five note pentatonic scale. They sang out of their experience. It started with fi ld hollers and then got caught up in the strange blend of sexual longing and gospel music. Blues music eventually headed up the river to Memphis and Chicago where it met electric guitars and eventually blended with rock n

Today, someone like Buddy Guy in a 2020 New Yorker interview, worries that the blues is a dying art form. My dear friend and brother, the legendary New York-based Blues singer Bill Sims, Jr. did not agree. Bill died in 2019 and wrote the music for Ruben Santiago Hudson's "Lackawanna Blues," which opened on Broadway this fall.

He understood the timeless nature of the songs he sang.

"The blues never goes out of date because essentially these songs are about people telling other people what's going on right and wrong in their lives," said Bill. Amen, Bill. Amen!

Blues music takes lots of different forms. As I wrote in the opening paragraph, it is a music that invites empathy, reaching out and caring about what another person is feeling and going through. It is a music that tells you are not alone when you feel weary, hurt, or lonely. I can't help but think again about Bill. Bill Sims, Jr. knew that quality in the blues he sang and would say near the end of his shows.

"Be kind, for everyone you meet is fi hting a hard battle," he always said. Bill understood how the music he played helped make a connection between people, help them know they are not alone, and they don't have to "do it by themselves."

Former U.S. Poet Laureate Billy Collins gets at this quality of blues music in his poem, and one of my favorites, "The Blues." The poem fi st appeared in The Art of Drowning (University of Pittsburgh Press) and in Sailing Alone Around the Room (Random House). Sadly, the publisher did not grant me permission to reproduce the entire poem in my column. The poem begins: "Much of what is said here must be said twice, a reminder that no one takes an immediate interest in the pain of others."

It goes on to celebrate the way the music reaches out and that the audience will not only listen, "they will shift to the sympathetic edges of their chairs..."

I really like that line "shift to the sympathetic edges of their chairs."

One of the ways forward in this difficult season is sharing our struggles with others. Knowing we are not alone gives us strength and may help us fi d the path forward.

Blues music is about life, it's a sharing of struggle. It is the music for today. We can't do it by ourselves.

Salmon Bay Eagles Celebrates 33 Years

Salmon Bay Eagles, "The Home of Blues in Ballard," has hosted live blues to music lovers and dancers since 1989. Starting out as a Sunday jam session when the late Jimie Jean Tuttle, along with then Worthy President Dave Duff, asked the late Kevin Wallace to put together a house band for a Sunday evening blues jam. The band consisted of Jimie Jean's husband, the late Kirk "Spiderman" Tuttle on drums, Jeff Davies on bass, Fast Freddie, and Kevin on guitars, and Raven Humphres on sax, and then the club hired bands to play, and the blues jam moved to Thursday nights. It is arguably the longest-running live blues show in Seattle if not Washington State.

In March of 2020, the club closed due to COVID-19 (the calendar was booked solid for months and several gigs booked to the end of 2021). When we reopened this fall, we brought back live blues on the third Thursday. On December 16th, the annual

My First Meeting with Bill Luckett

"I have always wanted to tell this story, but it is a sad occaision to do so now."

Me, John Hahn, and Steve Simon of Bluesapalooza, (funded by the Morale, Welfare and Recreation unit of Department of Defense entertainment tours), and Northern Blues label owner Fred Litwin, welcomed me in 2008 on their annual pilgrimage to Clarksdale. They have continued to make that pilgrimage, which also has included fellow blues pilgrims like Alligator Records' Bruce Iglauer.

We had communicated via email about my upcoming leave for the Blues Music Awards, and me honoring the Ground Zero Blues Club with a flag fl wn in Afghanistan on an F-18 Super Hornet on their behalf for their devotion to keeping the home of the crossroads alive for the world of blues music.

We left around 10 AM from the Memphis airport shortly after my fli ht touched down from Steve's Johnny Walker Blues Festival in the US Virgin Islands, where I saw Curtis Salgado and Eden Brent perform. They threw my grip into the trunk of what I thought was a stretch limo and then we drove down to Oxford for lunch.

En route, we stopped at the Tallahatchie Bridge, made famous by the Bobbie Gentry song, "Ode to Billie Joe." We talked about local music history, including this song. I felt like I was walking in tall cotton with so many blues historians that I had just met that day. I felt blessed. This year, Bill gave me a reason to talk about this stop on the Mississippi Blues Trail. Hence, the reason for my article in the Bluesletter about the June Bugs of Mississippi.

First stop in Oxford: Square Books. The crew loaded up on hard-to-fi d books. It also has a great music section loaded with vintage vinyl. Then, it was on to City Grocery for shrimp and grits with iced tea where I had a splendid Mint Julep that one could only enjoy in the South. Checked out the duds at Hinton & Hinton, enjoyed the Faulkner-esque atmosphere, and hit the road for Clarksdale.

I had told Ground Zero management three months earlier from Afghanistan that I would be there on the exact day we arrived to deliver a flag fl wn on the club's behalf.

I had no idea whatsoever who owned it or who would be there. I did this because of the club's name, Ground Zero (the reason I went to Afghanistan in the fi st place) and the blues, of which I had left the Washington Blues Society weekly blues jam at the Salmon Bay Eagles for a war zone.

Next stop was Watermelon Slim's house in Clarksdale. He's been on Fred Litwin's label for years. He welcomed us in and showed us his artwork as well as his huge outdoor garden where he grows his own vegetables. Slim then told me then that he was the night's headliner at Ground Zero. Slim, a Vietnam veteran himself, understood my mission for that night.

We went to Roger Stolle's Cat Head Store to shop for records and say "hi" to the owner. After that we walked around town seeing the sights. We saw T-Model Ford driving through town in his truck and spoke with him. He was full of energy as his 80th birthday was coming up.

We then drove to Ground Zero. Many cocktails were sent my way and there were far too many for me to drink at a reasonable pace.

After lying around outside on an old busted couch with wires poking out on the front porch, and shooting pool with Slim, we had dinner there. It was fabulous, like momma's home cooking. We settled in and commandeered the whole front row center stage table. Slim performed his fi st set.

Then, I became truly blessed. I met a true Southern Gentleman.

Bill Luckett came to our table to introduce

himself to me. He knew I was there to present him the flag and when I gave it to him, he said "No, you'll have to present it to the club on stage now!"

I was horrifi d. I didn't know that Bill could talk a starving coyote out of a freshly caught chicken, but this was my fi st experience at

The place was packed, and as strange as it might seem, I have stage fright. Plus, I did not know what to say. I didn't have a word thought out, let alone one sentence, to say to the crowd. Folks were offering me this and that to say, and fi ally, I shoved all of the drinks aside and proclaimed "I have to think"!

You could hear a pin drop as I took the stage. My mind went blank. One thing I have learned in my over a decade of knowing Bill, he could make a man feel like he was capable of anything. I could feel the entire crowds eyes' focused on me. I looked at him. He gave me a subtle nod of "you know what to do." Then, it came to me. I spoke with

Only John Hahn could explain what happened next.

"You gave a beautiful speech, Rock, "said John. "Well-received. Told story of flag being fl wn. And presented that flag to Bill."

Watermelon Slim ended my presentation with a heart rendering version of taps to a solemn crowd.

That flag hangs in the Ground Zero Blues Club to this day.

I sat down, sweating bullets with folks patting me on the back, and suddenly the bouncer came up, and said "someone wants to meet you out back". That had a ring to it, a familiar one from many liquor bar lessons I have learned. Wouldn't end well.

"I'm not going anywhere with anyone. Period." I said, and fin shed my cocktail.

Then, the bouncer told me the real reason and where "out back" was. "Morgan Freeman wants to meet you in the Green Room," said the very large and intimidating bouncer.

I was awestruck. Morgan Freeman? Me? I asked John to accompany me to take photos.

"We met them backstage," said John. "They knew Shemekia's work. Thought our trip to Iraq and your efforts were outstanding."

We then left for Red's Lounge with his outdoor barbecue grill smoking out front as Red collected the cover charge. As we were walking in, Cedric Burnside was leaving and we exchanged pleasantries again.

"Inside, the place was lit like a scene out of a Tarantino noir film," Continued John. "Red Christmas lights decorated the stage. Two choices of beverage: Beer or moonshine. We started on 24-ounce "oil cans" of beer while T-Model Ford played. His songs were dark and dangerous. His grandson played drums. You switched to moonshine."

For me, it was natural. Red and I got along so good he sold me his juke joint's legendary red T-Shirt right off f his back!

This was not my last meeting with Bill, Morgan or John but it was my first visit to Clarksdale home of the one and only "Crossroads"!

As our editor Eric Steiner is prone to say to me, "You're lucky," and I felt very lucky to be in the company of these blues people that I had until then only read or heard about.

Clarksdale is the home of true southern hospitality and those responsible for it, people like Bill Luckett. Bill also "schooled" me on southern humor, too! We kept in close contact over the years since this fi st meeting.

We met up at their fi e dining restaurant in Clarksdale, Maddidi's, in 2011. Sadly, it closed several years later. Th s is where I fi st had the pleasure of meeting his lovely wife, Francine. She was the true love of his life. She was gracious, demure, and when I met her, I could see why he walked her to the front row. We had a great conversation that I would always remember. When I wrote about my recent Memphis trip that started with the "Ode to Billie Joe," Bill told me about the June Bugs, and his sense of humor shined like the lamp on the Columbus and Greenville Railway Engine #803 from Yazoo.

Although I felt this information was not "blues worthy" copy, the 20th Anniversary of the Ground Zero Blues Club certainly was. I asked him for an interview, and he enthusiastically accepted.

Bill and I did a phone interview and we talked about the June Bugs' focus of bringing news

about the Delta to visitors and promotion of the great state of Mississippi. I recorded the interview. It's likely Bill's last about the June Bugs and the Ground Zero Blues Club recorded before he passed.

It was a labor of love, and Bill and I had many emails and calls together over the last five months. Some of his June Bugs tales were pretty outlandish, but I could always trust what he was saying. If Bill told you that a rooster dips snuff, you would look under its wing and fi d the can.

He knew I was in the process of retiring due to health issues, but in September he took the time to email me about my article and email his concern for my own health.

"Again, great work!," He typed. "Get yourself better, health wise!!!"

Bill could also be tougher than a one-eared alley cat, especially when it came to working for social justice on behalf of the NAACP. He fought for what was right, and was widely known as a lawyer's lawyer.

When the November interview was laid out and sent to the printer, I sent him a copy Eric Steiner sent me, and he CC'd numerous persons involved with it to thank all of us.

"Thanks to y'all, Bill Luckett".

I emailed Bill that Hurricane Ida was on its way near me in Louisiana, and Bill said, "Hang tough, buddy," and he was only concerned about others. Pure Bill Luckett.

The world has lost an honorable man, a man whose heart was as big as the world he worked hard to make a better place. A man whom I am proud to have known and called my friend, Bill Luckett.

Francine, his family, his law offic staff, his friends, and those who had opportunity to have met him, and those who have not, have my deepest condolences for their loss.

May his soul rest in peace.

Blues You Can Use: CD Reviews

New blues releases from Tom Buenger, Mindi Abair & Donna Herula



Tom Buenger Suburban Gospel (Self-Released)

Many artists have pushed to be more creative in the last year due to pandemic restrictions and economic climate. California singer songwriter and blues harp man Tom Buenger teamed up with award winning guitarist Rafael Tranquilino for his debut release, Suburban Gospel. The 10song set is unique in that it uses only artful vocal arrangements and clever percussion, along with guitar and harmonica, to create a modern soul pop landscape that feels full and spacious. As the title indicates, the CD has a strong sense of influence from traditional southern Gospel music mixed with soul and blues with an overarching message of hope, peace, and love. Buenger demonstrates his wide vocal range that easily slips from a Prince-styled falsetto to a Sonny Terry-infused blues growl. Tranquilino delivers greasy slide guitar and nimble fi ger picking along with a demonstration of his technical skills as the engineer and producer of the project. Ventura guitar champ Teresa Russell drops in some tasty guest lead lines on two tracks, adding spice to the project. Suburban Gospel smooth fl wing project of uplifting music. Rick J Bowen



Mindi Abair The Best Of (Pretty Good for a Girl)

Singer, songwriter, and reigning queen of the saxophone, Mindi Abair released her fi st "Best Of" compilation in April 2021 on her own Pretty Good for A Girl Records label. During her remarkable 21-year recording career, Mindi Abair has garnered two GRAMMY Nominations, recorded

with some of the biggest names in music, and built a substantial following among jazz and blues audiences with her soaring melodies and powerhouse style. The Best of Mindi Abair is a 19-song collection of her biggest hits, fan favorites and previously unreleased material. Her smooth jazz hits, like "Lucy's," "Bloom" and "Come as You Are" open the CD. "Make It Happen," written and recorded with legendary soul icon Booker T. Jones, features his signature B3 playing. Other inspired collaborations include "I'll Be Your Home" with Keb' Mo', "Just Say When" with Gregg Allman, and her woman-powered blues anthem "Pretty Good for A Girl" with guitar hero Joe Bonamassa. Fan favorite "Be Beautiful" adds to the compilation, as does a previously unissued take on the John Lennon classic, "Imagine." "I Love to Play The Saxophone" and "Good Day for The Blues" hail from her albums with The Boneshakers, and the brand-new song, "April," was recorded as the world was shutting down in 2020 rounds out the collection. Donna Herula Bang at the Door (Self-Released)

Seeking out the influence of remote locales and their specific aesthetic qualities has long been an inspirational tool for artists and creators who have journeyed to storied lands seeking inspiration. Chicago-born guitar instructor and singer songwriter Donna Herula and partner in crime, Tony Nardiello, embarked on such journey to North Carolina to record her third album, Banging at The Door. The duo partnered up with 2019 International Blues Challenge champion Jon Shain and bassist FJ Ventre at Good Luck Studios in Chapel Hill far from the gritty streets that have made modern blues famous. The resulting almost all-acoustic recording of 11 new original songs and three select covers has a clean, wide open, relaxed sound and spontaneous feel. Th s departure from her previous solo albums allowed her explore compositions of greater emotional depth that refl ct on the world from a woman's perspective as well as a wider musical palette and the many layers of blues styles. Bang at the Door rips from the get-go with the opening title track, a lively rhumba that recounts a late night encounter with a drunken lover. Herula wrote the love note "Pass the Biscuit," for her dearly departed mentor Sonny Payne, and the second line serenade gives testimony to the impact of the legendary DJ and host of the King Biscuit Time Radio show. She pays tribute to bottleneck guitar originator Bukka White on an authentic reading of "Fixing to Die," demonstrating her expertise of real Delta blues playing. The album fi ale is an uplifting rundown of Blind Willy Johnson's standard "Soul of A Man," inviting several friends to sing with her on the chorus. Donna has gained a reputation as an excellent Resonator slide guitarist, which has earned her recognition as one of top 10 rising stars from Acoustic Guitar Magazine, well-deserved honors of representing the Windy City Blues Society at the International Blues Challenge, and her position on the faculty of the prestigious Old Town School of Folk Music in Chicago. I was inspired by a USA Today article by Mike Snider on September 25th, "Breweries craft Rock On lager to help musicians hurt by COVID. Find the beer in your state." Sweet Relief started as a CD project to benefit singer/songwriter Victoria Williams. The project featured songs by the artist performed by Pearl Jam ("Crazy Mary"), Lou Reed ("Tarbelly & Featherfoot"), and Lucinda Williams ("Main Road") to assist with Victoria's medical bills after she was diagnosed with multiple sclerosis. Victoria subsequently founded Sweet Relief Musicians Fund charity in 1993 to help musicians in need.

The Rock On Project has nearly 30 breweries participating from St. Augustine, Florida to Bellingham, Washington, Laguna Beach, California to Long Island, New York and Austin, Texas to Chicago, Illinois.

As of press time, participating West Coast breweries include the Fort George Brewery Silver City in Astoria, Brewing



in Bremerton, Kulsan Brewing in Bellingham, Crucible Brewery in Everett, Top Rung Brewery in Lacey, Rainy Daze Brewery in Poulsbo, Great Notion Brewery in Portland, Urban Family Brewery in Seattle, Camp Covos Brewery on Vashon Island, and Sierra Nevada Brewery in Chico, California.

Crosby Hops has teamed up with Bremerton's pop-punk rockers MxPx and Bremerton's Silver City Brewery to make a difference with donations coming from Crosby hop sales, Rock On lager sales, and special events.

Breweries can download the Rock On beer recipe or come up with their own unique beers, and many releases feature the distinctive logos of the Rock On collaborative, Sweet Relief and Crosby Hops.



Level Crossing Brewery of Salt Lake City is donating \$1 per pint to the Salt Lake City Academy of Music, a non-profit that provides instruction and instruments to children and adults. This is but one concrete example of how a Rock Onaffiliated brewery supports musicians and road crews impacted by COVID-19.

More About the Spin Offs The Spin-offs were created from the All-Star Women's Blues Jam at Spinnaker Bay Brewing in Seattle's Hillman City. Spinnaker Bay Brewing is now NWPeaks Brewing, and the Jam is no more. Lea and Dawnzella had so much fun playing together once a month that they decided to form an all-girl band, but some contents shifted, and the guitar and bass players left to pursue other projects. Lea looked at Dawnzella and said, "my husband plays guitar," and Dawnzella said "my husband plays bass," and they are both man enough to play in an all-girl band. "We play blues, funk, and soul covers with a rock edge. We have our own PA and are available to play bars, taverns, tap rooms, private parties, weddings, and festivals."

Dawnzella Gearhart on Vocals: Dawnzella has been singing for as long as she can remember. She sang in high school choir and an audition-only choir, Music Makers, as well as college choir. Dawnzella wrote and performed musical parodies in the Laughingstock Comedy Troupe and spent a couple of years on stage doing stand-up. She joined the karaoke phase in the 90's where she met her husband, "Mikey G." Th ough the years, she sat in with many bands until helped create her fi st band "Velvet Hammer" with husband "Mikey G" playing rhythm guitar. Subsequent bands included The Crack of Dawn, Jazzabelle, and Big Woody & The Clamdiggers. Her raw, honest



vocals found a home in the blues, honest vocals found a home in the blues, adding a touch of her rocker soul to each tune.

"Mikey G" Gearhart on Bass: Enjoying any type of music has always been one of Mikey's favorite things in life. His fi st instrument was a drum set that his parents bought for him at age 9 (what were they thinking?). Soon after, he began to learn guitar, begging anyone he could to teach him all about the instrument. Mikey learned to play by ear, but found it was easier to use his fi gers. He took guitar classes in high school and was given the opportunity to accompany the choir for a performance. At the turn of the century, he switched to the bass. He plays with a passion as if it's the meaning of life.

Daniel Neumeyer on Guitar: Daniel's fi st instrument was the drums. He discovered Tom Petty and the Heartbreakers in at 10 years old, started playing guitar and hasn't looked back. His guitar playing is inspired by the huge tonal sounds of artists like David Gilmour, The Edge, and Steven Wilson. Daniel strives to create complex textures through the use of space, sustain, and effects. He attended Gonzaga University, earned a degree in music, and met Lea, his

She can play any style of music, but especially enjoys laying down a sick beat in her band Auditorius or driving the groove train in The Spin-Offs
