As I am writing this letter, we lost another good friend. Lissa Ramaglia passed away this January. I am blessed to have had the opportunity to get to meet many individuals through the Washington Blues Society. I value all these connections whether it is members, music fans, industry pros, and of course, musicians. Lissa was always friendly and engaging, she always had a positive outlook and connected with everyone. I have so many memories of our talks and there a few that stand out to me. 



In Memoriam: Artists We Lost in 2021

As in prior In Memoriam listings printed in these pages, I've added a few personal, introductory comments regarding artists we have lost last year. The list is admittedly broad as my musical tastes are as varied as my CD and vinyl record collections. I have had the good fortune to know several individuals on this list, including Clarksdale's Bill Luckett and Chicago's Bob Koester, and I last met blues harp player James Harman as he walked into Seattle's Highway 99 blues club just after it closed with Anson Funderburgh (James and Anson were in town for a Mark Hummel Blues Revue at Jazz Alley).

Two members of UB40 are also on this list, Brian Travers and Astro, and one of my favorite concerts of 1988 was UB40 at the Paramount Theatre in Seattle, where they played Neil Diamond's "Red, Red Wine" and The Slickers' "Johnny Too Bad." The list also includes John Drake, who sang with Ted Nugent and the Amboy Dukes, on my fi st 45 RPM record bought with my *Park Forest Star* paper route money near Chicago Heights in the 1970s, "Journey to the Center of the Mind."

When I learned that Charlie Watts passed awaylast August, I thought of his exceptional performance at Qwest Field in 2019, plus earlier Rolling Stones tours that I've had the privilege to see, such as Bridges to Babylon in Seattle, Steel Wheels in Vancouver, and Some Girls in Chicago.

Memories of Gary Yeoman

"He was a preacher with a Fender Strat & an attitude."

Th s is a story of my experience with Yo (Gary Yeoman) and his impact on me, the Pacific Northwest, and the blues. He was dedicated to the blues. He found a family of great people in the blues, and he knew how to speak to them with a guitar and a story in a way we could all understand. He proved that with a story and a groove, it is possible to entertain the masses. In my humble opinion this is 99% of a song. Simplicity is nothing to be ashamed of in music. A groove and a story can be told with ease and understood when it's not all cluttered up with big words and a flashy, complicated chord structure. His focus was on bringing a good party and smiles to those that attended his shows. He loved that part of it most of all. I learned a lot about how to work a crowd performing with him. It came naturally for Yo. I on the other hand struggled with that for a long time. The ability to communicate with a room full of sweaty people can be challenging if you don't have the confide ce to deliver the thought. Some people never really figu e it out, but not Yo.

He was a preacher with a Fender Strat and an attitude.

Yo loved musicians and everything they had to offer. He wanted to be a part of it. Who wouldn't? He bought a guitar and had a player named Mike help him learn to navigate around the fretboard. He was

hooked up with a band called The Dawgs. There was Diana Redlin on harp and vocals, Slim Medina on bass and Carmine (Monoxide) Conti on drums. They showed Yo the ropes and he learned the necessary chord progression for almost all blues songs. The coveted 1-4-5 chord changes with the pentatonic scale. It didn't take long for Yo to fi d his niche, and he never strayed from it. There will be no Skynyrd tunes on the stage.

He always told people who asked him to play something like that, "Honey I may be big and square and look like a jukebox, but I'm not."

Now, that's funny!

I met him as he was hosting the Wednesday night Blues Jam at the Red Lion Tavern in Spokane. Too Slim and the Taildraggers came out of that joint. It was big fun to go there. All sorts of great national blues artists came to play there. I went in there to fi d the blues and take it all in. Yo was always very supportive and inclusive. Everybody deserved a chance but make no mistake if you stunk up the place he would come up to the stage after two songs and graciously ask the audience to offer up a round of applause and they would. Then the jammers would exit the stage and he would pick up his Strat and play a couple tunes to restore order to the show. It happened to me once. I went home to practice and didn't let that happen again.

He would talk with me about the blues and steered me in the right direction as far as what to listen to. Willie Dixon, Buddy and Junior, Little Walter, Hubert Sumlin... etc. I soaked it up like a sponge. I would get a cassette tape once or twice a month with stuff he would compile for me. It was all I listened to.

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In Memoriam: Clifford "Buck" England

"... it is important that those of us here today remember Buck. Tell stories. Laugh, cry & remember..."

Editor's Note: Special thanks to Rev. Dave Brown for sending the eulogy he read at Clifford "Buck" England's memorial service at Immanuel Presbyterian Church Nov. 28, 2021

I want to begin with a poem by Mary Oliver, *When Death Comes*

When death comes like the hungry bear in autumn,

When death comes and takes all the bright coins from his purse,

To buy me, and snaps the purse shut;

When death comes like the measle-pox

When death comes like an iceberg between the shoulder blades,

I want to step through the door full of curiosity, wondering:

What is it going to be like, that cottage of darkness?

And therefore, I look upon everything as a brotherhood and a sisterhood,

And I look upon time as no more than an idea, and I consider eternity as another possibility,

And I think of each life as a fl wer, as common as a fi ld daisy, and as singular,

And each name a comfortable music in the mouth, tending, as all music does, toward silence.

And each body a lion of courage, and

something precious to the earth.

When it's over, I want to say all my life: I was a bride married to amazement.

I was the bridegroom, taking the world into my arms.

When it's over, I don't want to wonder if I have made of my life something particular, and real.

I don't want to fi d myself sighing and frightened, or full of argument.

I don't want to end up simply having visited this world.

In the poet's words, Clifford "Buck" England did not end up simply visiting this word, he lived fully in it, he made of his life, again in the poets' words, "something particular and real"

Buck, lived in Home, Washington. He was at very much at home in that community and in this state where he was born in 1942. Home is where Quirina, his wife, lover, partner, and friend lives today. Buck had four children, six grandchildren and five great children. Quirina and family, our hearts are filled with love and support for you as you grieve Buck's death. We are here for you.

Along with his large family, Clifford "Buck" England had many friends, fans, and musical collaborators who he cared about and who cared deeply about him. He didn't end up simply visiting this world he lived fully in it. Those that grieve his death bear witness to that life.

Buck, from Home, Washington, was very much at home with family and friends. He was at home in the garden, reading a book and behind the keys of the Hammond B-3 organ. He started as a piano player at the legendary Spanish Castle, found the B-3, and the rest is history. The arc of his career is amazing. He has earned a multitude of awards and honors. He began at the Spanish Castle and fittingly one of his last gigs was a Blue Vespers presents in the Spanish Ballroom at the Elks Temple. He was an amazing player, a loving dad, partner, and friend. He will be missed. He is loved, deeply.

Friends, we are gathered here to give thanks and celebrate the life of Buck. We come together in this sacred beautiful space where he loved to play. We come to this place and time from lots of different places with different experiences and understandings when it comes to religion, faith, and spirituality. Some are at home in this space or places like it. Some identify as Christian or with some other religious tradition. Others here understand themselves as "Spiritual but not religious". Some are not at home with religion or spirituality at all, while others have had some pretty bad experiences with churches and religion.

As a pastor, it is important to me to recognize and affirm this diversity.









Everyone is welcome here as we celebrate this life.

Everyone!

Indeed, I know that the "all are welcome" quality of Blues Vespers and this place was something Buck liked.

I can't recall when I fi st met Buck, it was probably at a Little Bill and the Bluenotes Blues Vespers some years ago. Little Bill and the Bluenotes played 40+ Blues Vespers at Westminster and Immanuel. Buck was part of many of them. Buck had a big heart and hauled that big B-3 organ through the doors of the church to play at several benefits I

In 2004, he played a benefit with Butterbean for the before and after school program at Westminster Presbyterian Church on the east side. Buck played at the Blues with a Feeling benefit we did in 2005 at the Swiss for a World Vision relief effort for victims of the South Asian Tsunami. He also played with my brother, Bill Sims Jr, at a benefit here for a Habitat build in Guatemala. Such generosity of spirit. Such sweet memories. So much to be thankful for.

My experience with Buck was an experience of someone kind, gentle and happy to do what he does. We never talked explicitly about spirituality, but I know he always liked that prayer circle before Blues Vespers. Mary Sutton posted a picture of Buck, Bill, Rod, Tom and I holding hands as I offered a prayer. Buck had a great smile on his face.

Dear friends, remember and celebrate the life of this amazing man.

As I say at all memorial services, the living, you and I, have a sacred duty to remember the lives of those who have died.

We are called to be good stewards of Buck's life; it is important that those of us here today remember Buck. Tell stories about him. Laugh, cry, remember!

I believe the heart of Christian faith is trust. Trust in the mystery some of us call God, for those that identify as Christian, trust that the way of Jesus and trust that in life

and death we belong to God. I believe that nothing is strong enough to separate us from that sacred love. In life and death, we belong to God.

My closing poem is by Maya Angelou: When Great Trees Fall. It begins:

When great trees fall, rocks on distant hills shudder,

Lions hunker down in tall grasses, and even elephants lumber after safety.

When great trees fall in forests,

Small things recoil into silence,

Their senses eroded beyond fear.

When great souls die, the air around us becomes light, rare, sterile.

We breathe, briefly.

Our eyes, briefly, see with a hurtful clarity.

Our memory, suddenly sharpened, examines, gnaws on kind words unsaid, promised walks never taken.

The poem ends this way:

And when great souls die,

After a period peace blooms, slowly and always irregularly.

Spaces fill with a kind of soothing electric

Our senses, restored, never to be the same, whisper to us.

They existed.

They existed.

We can be.

Be and be better.

For they existed.

We can be.

Be and be better

For Buck existed.

I give thanks to God for the life, the full rich life of Clifford "Buck" England.

Amen.

A little after The Dawgs split up, he asked me to join his new band, Yo and De Cats. I dropped everything I was doing and dove in. We played all over the Pacific Northwest. It was a blast! The booze and the girls getting crazy to the blues. I was only 24 years old, so you may use your imaginations. He always had something witty to say at the right time. When all this mayhem was going on he said, "It is a guitar player's duty to spread his seed from coast to coast." Good times.

Carmine Conti played drums with us for a while and then he went to play with Too Slim. Yo hired a drummer that came to the jams on Wednesdays. His name was Vern Petry and he played in funk bands around town. Vern was a cool fit for us. Great guy to hang with and Yo always commented on the grease he brought to the stage.

There was a place we played in Spirit Lake Idaho called the White Horse Saloon. This was a biker bar out in the sticks. Big All and Susie were the owners and they LOVED Yo. We were there a lot. So... this place being located in North Idaho in the 1980s there were a certain kind of folk living there. And only that kind of folk.

That's all I'll say about that. If you don't know the nature of the neighborhood at that time, you'll have to do some

homework.

Vern was our new drummer and was Afro-American. Big Al had no problem with this and made sure Vern had a nice stay at the club. The fi st night we took him out there he was a bit anxious. But Yo being the kind of man he was made Vern feel comfortable with the trip. We got to the bar and there were a few heads turned but by the middle of the night no one noticed what color he was. Yo had so much love in his heart for all. There was a big girl that was there all the time named Frenchie. She was drunk and after the fi st set we played, and she came up to Vern and put her arm around him and said "If anyone messes with you come see Frenchie and I'll deal with it. You're cool Vern." There was never a problem. They loved him as a brother and that is where Yo coined the phrase "Cool V."

We started playing in this place called The Fort Spokane Brewery. It was right next to Riverfront Park in downtown Spokane. We had a good time there. The fi st night we were there it was packed. The bar was not expecting the crowd we had. There was a girl there named Wendy. She was working the fl or serving drinks running her tail off. We commented on her service all night and she made a ton of money in tips. I married that one and we're still going

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strong. Being in his band led me to plenty of life changing moments.

After a few years playing in his band, I went on my way. We stayed friends and we called each other from time to time to catch up after Wendy and I packed up for Seattle. Yo went on doing his thing. He was instrumental in getting the Inland Empire Blues Society started. He helped organizing festivals and created events. He inspired artists in the Pacific Northwest and promoters to keep the blues alive. He had the soul and the grease to be a bluesman. He had some of life's misfortunes that drive us to create music. He gave musicians a platform to test their skills and hone their craft. He taught me how to listen to the music we are creating and emphasized the futility of overplaying the blues. It's mostly about the stories. Don't talk so much and more gets said.

I will never forget his infectious laugh. He grew the best weed around. Always had the right thing to say even if you didn't want to hear it.

He was my friend, and I will miss him.

I picture Yo hanging with his son Travis. I hope it was a great reunion.

RIP, my brotha.

Whether she's performing a great blues/ rock tune by Tina, Janis, Aretha, or Koko, Midnight Hour lead singer Shirel Smith has been belting out the blues since the age of four. Together with co-founder and husband Mark Rainey, Midnight Hour was born 14 years ago and has been rocking the socks off classic blues and rock audiences ever since. But, it was when longtime keyboardist Dave Townsend, bringing his penchant for strong vocal harmonies and fi st-rate musicianship to the band six years ago, that Midnight Hour found its bluesy center of gravity, its groove, and its rockin' vibe.

Midnight Hour plays more that 50 of the greatest hits of the 60s, 70s, and beyond, and does it with the band's own special innovation and style. Featuring strong lead vocals and close harmonies, this 6-piece band plays everything from Bill Withers' mournful "Ain't No Sunshine" to Tina Turner's soaring "Proud Mary" and "River Deep, Mountain High," and to the great Aretha's "Chain of Fools," right alongside genre-bending blues classics like Jimmy Reed's "Big Boss Man" and the late great Tom Petty and the Heartbreakers' mesmerizing "Breakdown."

A word about cover bands. Everyone respects and appreciates the originality and creativity gifted to the blues community by the likes of Too Slim and the Taildraggers, Janie Cribbs & the T.Rust Band, national treasure Lady A, and the amazing Stacy Jones Band. The Washington Blues Society has done a solid service to blues musicians

and afici nados alike by featuring these and other amazing musicians and innovators in recent issues of the Bluesletter.

That said, I believe that innovative, imaginative cover bands deserve a prop or two as well. Not only do the best among them feature outstanding musicianship (and showmanship!), but they also study the greats—and their greatest covers—to carve out a creative niche of their own. Thi k, for example, of the distinctly different versions of "Fever" that Peggy Lee and Joe Cocker have left for us as opportunities to riff and build on the bluesiest features of both!

Midnight Hour mixes groovin' blues and R&B classics with rock numbers ("China Grove," "Crossroads," "Radar Love," "New Orleans," "Mustang Sally") that North Sound audiences love to hear and dance to! Featuring Shirel's soaring alto-tofi st-soprano voice, and complemented harmonizing vocalist and keys magician Dave Townsend, Midnight Hour incorporates rich renditions on each one of their classic tune interpretations. Just as five band members contribute vocal harmonies across a varied repertoire of blues, R & B, and rock classics, each Midnight Hour instrumentalist-lead guitar Nick Ostrye, sax man Steve Pearse, Dave Townsend on keys, Steve Marshall on bass, and Mark Rainey on drums—takes pride in their respective solo chops as well as in providing solid, soulful back-up to those terrific vocals.

For Midnight Hour, that includes creating medleys of classic numbers to call out a certain vibe, theme, or featured instrument. In preparation for recent gigs, Midnight Hour performed "Devil with a Blue Dress," "Good Golly, Miss Molly," and "Travelin' Band" as a hard-driving medley, facilitating the joyous celebration of good times with a bit of grittiness and dirt that so many of the greatest blues numbers exude. Dave and

Shirel's vocals dominate this one, supported by short, punchy keys and guitar solos throughout. And when Midnight Hour segues from Norah Jones' iconic ballad "Turn Me On" to Koko Taylor's and Irma Thomas's drivin' renditions of "You Can Have My Husband, But Please Don't Mess with My Man," the tenor sax serves as a smokin' complement to Shirel's sultry-turned-growlin' voice, helping to bridge those intertwining emotions-perfect for rock/blues! And what better, yet least-expected musical pairing could one imagine than Midnight Hour's brash transition from Bob Seger's road-weary lament "Turn the Page" to George T. & the Destroyers' raucous, rousing "I Drink Alone," featuring Hank "Hurricane" Carter's monster sax solo?

We're not interested in mimicking the blues, R&B, and rock classics or their artists. On the contrary, Midnight Hour is all about fi ding the creative core of each piece, then incorporating the talents of all six band members to give it a special twist, an interpretive touch that our audiences will appreciate. As guitar man Nick Ostrye mentioned during a recent rehearsal, "Th s band isn't carried on the shoulders of one

These two books were fi st published in 1999 and 2005, respectively. Each book contains short refl ctions written by Bill that give us a glimpse into his life, his journey, career, and those he met on the way. So Anyway... includes drawings by long-time Blue Note guitarist Billy Stapleton.

When I re-read each of these books, I was taken back to the early days of rhythm and blues in the Pacific Northwest. Looking back, so much has changed. Upon refl ction, so much hasn't changed. I particularly enjoyed the way Little Bill wrote about some of the folks he met on the way. I loved reading about old friends like Gaye Andersen at the New Orleans in Pioneer Square and Jimmie Jean Tuttle at the Salmon Bay Eagles.

Remembering is much more than nostalgia. It's an important part of learning where we have been. It's also an important part of discerning where we want to go.

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Hwy 99 Blues Club All Stars at Jazz Alley

Celebrate an outstanding line-up of blues artists next month!

For the fi st time, the long running band the Highway 99 All Stars will bring their powerhouse show to Jazz Alley in Seattle, February 8-10th, 2022.

The All Stars began some 16 years ago with the creation of the award-winning Highway 99 Blues Club. The band has featured close to 50 different musicians over the years while performing shows at its namesake club, other venues in town, numerous festivals, and special events. The band leans heavily into the blues, roots, and R & B for its musical offerings. Th s time around the band will feature six musicians from the Pacific Northwest and a featured guest from New Orleans. With guitars, bass, drums, keys, and harp plus four vocalists, this show will be sure and pack a suitcase full of blues.

Scheduled to appear at the three-night run will be: Jason Ricci on harp and vocals from New Orleans; Lisa Mann on bass and vocals from Portland, Robin Moxey on guitar and vocals from Los Angeles and Gig Harbor, Jeff Conlin on keys from Washington, D.C. and Snoqualmie, Ben Rice on guitar and vocals from Portland, and Steve Sarkowsky on drums from Seattle. The shows will feature a mix of acoustic and electric music plus solo and duo slots mixed in with the full band. Shows begin at 7:30 PM each night.

All Star band founder Sarkowsky said "It's a real privilege and a highlight to be able to bring the All-Stars to Jazz Alley. We have been wanting to keep presenting these shows and showcase the range of talent and relationships that we had developed at the club over the years."

The band's last show in Seattle was about a year after the club closed.

"We had wanted to do something after the fi st year of being closed," Sarkowsky





explained. "It seemed the time was right." The show, entitled "Resurrection," played to a sold out house at the Triple Door.

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Keeping the Blues Alive Awards 2022

Big Blues Bender's HART Party

The Big Blues Bender is a 4-day music festival held annually in Las Vegas, NV. Each year the opening night is a fundraiser that supports the HART (Handy Artist Relief Trust) Fund. The Bender graciously donates all of the door proceeds towards the HART Party, as well as donating items for auction. In addition, many artists voluntarily donate their time to the cause because they have been recipients of the HART Fund grant. To date, over \$200,000 has been raised by the Bender. A truly incredible support to the HART Fund program, this party helps reach a broader audience to inform them of these artist relief efforts.

Can't Stop the Blues

"Can't Stop the Blues" (CSTB), was founded by Karen Gottheimer in March of 2020. The CSTB virtual concert series, streamed on Facebook and YouTube, created a groundbreaking, and desperately needed virtual space for the blues scene, during a time when all live performances came to a halt due to COVID-19. Karen, with assistance from Judy Eliyas and a handful of other part-time volunteers, streamed over eight shows a week for 13 months. CSTB broadcast over 450 performances, helping over 350 blues artists generate hundreds of thousands of dollars in tip revenue and merchandise sales from fans all over the world. At the same time, CSTB became a virtual community for over 50,000 blues lovers and artists. All CSTB shows are archived and accessible on Facebook and YouTube for the foreseeable future, providing a historical document of how the blues world survived through a most challenging time.

Tom Claypool

Fashioning his adult life around giving back to the music community, Tom Claypool has followed music for most of his life. Going to concerts and events eventually led to him hosting a blues show on WEVL FM 89.9, a non-profit, public radio station based in Memphis, TN. Tom has hosted on WEVL for 31 years, starting off playing blues then Cajun and Zydeco. For the last 17 years, Tom's focus has been tunes from the Crescent City with his show New Orleans Big Beat that airs every Friday. Tom is no stranger to volunteering for The Blues Foundation; he's worked with the International Blues Challenge for over 25 years, with duties ranging from MC to working in production; and 23 years on the Blues Music Awards production crew.

For the past three decades, Tom has chosen to donate his time and talents to music organizations, music events, and public radio in order to give back to the community that fi st inspired him.

FitzGerald's Roadhouse

Since 1981, FitzGerald's Roadhouse in Chicago has been a champion for all kinds of American roots music that has included a constant fl w of top-notch blues artists. In 2018, Bill FitzGerald put the club up for sale, but only to someone who would continue to support American roots music in all its forms, including blues. It took a few years for Bill to fi d the right buyer. In a move that shows the club's continued commitment to blues, the fi st annual Berwyn Blues Festival was held in September 2021. For decades, the club has prided itself on a fi st-rate sound system and sound mixers, professional staging, artist hospitality, and a great atmosphere for patrons. If you ask any artist who has played the club, they'll tell you it's among their favorites. These days, the club insists on proof of vaccination or recent testing to protect artists and guests. Between the club's founder, Bill FitzGerald, and the current owner, Will Duncan, FitzGerald's has been a welcome home to blues artists for 40 years

Fueling Musicians Program

Award-winning blues guitarist Joe Bonamassa founded the Keeping the Blues Alive Foundation in 2011. The foundation aims to support arts and music education through grants, scholarships, and donations to schools, colleges, and other nonprofit

Charley Patton: Father of Delta Blues?

"He had established himself as a performer playing parties and out-of-the-way Black-only juke joints."

On October 30, 2021, at the Rocket Mortgage Fieldhouse in Cleveland, midway through the Rock Hall of Fame Induction ceremony, Gary Clark, Jr. walked onto stage with only his acoustic guitar. Taylor Swift, Jennifer Lopez, LL Cool J, Carole King, Christina Aguilera, The Foo Fighters and Paul McCartney, performed on that same stage that night. Gary Clark was there to induct Delta blues legend Charley Patton into the Rock Hall of Fame in the Early Influence category.

Garv Clark's solo acoustic performance of Patton's "High Water Everywhere" captivated the audience and artists from every genre. They were fix ted on Gary's rendition of a stripped down sound with rhythm and lyrics indicative of Delta Blues. He performed in front of one of the most familiar pictures of Charley Patton with his guitar resting on his thigh. His right hand is in mid strum and the fi gers of his left hand not wrapping up from the bottom of the neck as we're accustomed to seeing, but coming over the top. Charley, dapper in his suit, bow tie and spats, looks right into the camera in the familiar sepia-hued photo of

Although I had heard Charley Patton's name throughout my research of the many blues artists I have covered, I really didn't know much about him. I wondered if the same hole in understanding the blues tree was there for other people who love the blues. It seems like most lovers of the blues, and even many casual listeners, know the lore of Robert Johnson's deal with the devil at the crossroads. Do only hardcore blues fans know of Patton? If so, get ready to join the hardcore brother and sisterhood!

As I started my research, the defin tive study and collection of the recorded music of Charley Patton is the Revenant Records box set, Screamin' and Hollerin' the Blues: The Worlds of Charley Patton released in 2001.

Th s exceptional box set won three Grammy Awards: Best Historical Album, Best Boxed or Special Limited Edition Package, and Best Album Notes. It is a treasure trove of material on the life, music, and legacy of Charley Patton. It's really a Charley Patton "completist's dream."

So little was recorded of Robert Johnson, yet so many more tales of his life have entered the general blues lexicon compared other artists. It seems just the opposite for the story of Charley Patton. There are many more recordings of Charley Patton than Robert Johnson, and so little is known about Charley Patton by the general population. Of course, that all changed with this boxed set. The Revenant Records box set is a reference work that sets a very high bar for similar efforts that seek to honor legacy blues artists.

A personal project and lifelong obsession by musician and Revenant's co-founder John Fahey, "Screamin'..." was birthed by Fahey's master's thesis. The collection of Patton recordings, interviews and research provides one of the best in-depth collections for any fan of the blues or rock and roll. It's a deep dive, yes; but the scope and breadth of the box set clearly shows how (and why) Charley's work affected the generations of not only blues musicians but rock and roll artists seeking their roots in the blues.

Fahey's thesis eventually morphed into a 112-page paperback, Charley Patton, published in 1970 by Studio Vista in London. Charley Patton is one of a series of books on the blues edited by the late British blues scholar Paul Oliver. Th s book is one of the many resources in the Revenant box set, and includes a biography of Charley Patton, critical analyses of many of Patton's songs with annotated sheet music, discography, and a bibliography.

Artists like Eric Clapton, Jimmy Page, Pete Townshend, and Duane Allman, all looked back from the late 60s to which they thought the roots came from. Second generation blues artists such as Son House, Muddy Waters, John Lee Hooker and Robert Johnson were on the late 50s albums they found at the mid 60s record stores. How much further back should they have

William Christopher "W.C." Handy was born in Florence, Alabama in 1873 and is widely accepted as the "Father of the Blues" for his part in helping to popularize blues music. By the 1890s, he was a regular part of the touring musical act, Mahara's Colored Minstrels. He continued to tour and is credited with establishing the harmonics and chords that became the blues sound. His progressions lead to a sheet music company and a thorough understanding of recording and distribution in the Black community. At that time, there was no mainstream cross over for Black artists As Handy encouraged other musicians from this Alabama base, he orchestrated many releases, including some on the Paramount Records label. Handy wrote Blues: An Anthology-Complete Words and Music of 53 Great Songs in the mid-20s. After this anthology, he wrote four other books prior to a subway accident in 1943 which left him blind, followed by a stroke 12 years later that left him in a wheelchair. Over 25,000 people paid their respects to Handy in Harlem at his funeral in 1958.

However, it was not W.C. Handy's blues that directly influenced late 60s rock icons. My research has led me to Charley Patton as the father of Delta blues. Let me show you why.

Bluesmen like Howlin' Wolf, Son House, Muddy Waters, John Lee Hooker and Elmore James took to the railroads and left the Delta for opportunities in St. Louis, Chicago, and Detroit. In my research, I found that each of these bluesmen also share a common source of inspiration in their interpretation of the blues: Charley Patton. There is no doubt that each of these



bluesmen also reinterpreted blues from Robert Johnson, but each of these bluesmen were also inspired by Charley Patton.

Charley was African American, although his lineage brought not only African American ancestry, but also Cherokee Indian and Caucasian roots, giving him the distinctive look refl cted in the most frequently used photos of him.

By 1900, Charley Patton's parents moved down from the northern hills of Mississippi to work on the Dockery Plantation. Located between Clarksdale and Indianola, work at Dockery was not quite as hard as on other plantations, and some sharecroppers felt that the Dockery family provided more opportunities through an on-site school for African-American men.

Charley did not work on the plantation very long but was allowed play for Dockery family events while he was there. Charley fi st learned the advantages of the rough and tumble style of playing where he would leap around the stage and play his guitar behind his knees and back. Th s style found descendants in Little Richard, Chuck Berry, and Jimi Hendrix. Little Richard, Chuck Berry, and Jimi Hendrix each stood on Charley's legacy as they made history in the early days of rock and roll.

By 1910, Charley was in his late teens, and played anywhere he could. He established himself as a songwriter and performer playing parties at out of the way Black-only juke joints across the Delta. There wasn't a lot of money in the area for a Black man to earn a living but playing a local fish fry or concert paid 25 times the daily wage of a sharecropper on a plantation.

Six years later Charley was offered a spot in W.C. Handy's band where he learned how to be a professional musician. He also learned about relationships over the course of eight marriages during his relatively young life.

As the Great Depression started, Charley



came across a white music and furniture store owner from Jackson, Mississippi who was looking for performers to record.

National Public Radio reported that Patton had heard of H.C. Spier and wrote him a letter requesting to be recorded.

"Patton was one of the best talents I ever had," said Spier on the National Public Radio broadcast. "And, he was one of the best sellers, too, on record."

Joe Cook Blues Band Doghouse Joe (Self-Released)

Veteran Blues quartet the joe Cook Blues Band demonstrate why the group was awarded the 2021 Best of the Blues Award for Best Traditional Blues Band on their strong debut album, Doghouse Joe, released in March of 2021. 16 original tracks written by Cook and guitarist Tim "Stoop Down" Sherman and the fabulous rhythm section of Conrad Ormsby on drums and the incomparable Patty Mey on bass, ,make good use of everyone's talent. The collection recorded at Buttersound Studios has a live off the floor feel that is a field mix of modern and retro sounds. Blues dance fans will appreciate the array Chicago shuffles a Bo Diddley beat and west coaster swingers that keep the album moving. Cook's voice is strong throughout and his hot Blues Harp playing works in fi e tandem with Sherman's stellar guitar chops. The album's lone cover is ripping run down of "Howling for My Darling," further proving these folks are wise to the ways of Chester Burnett. Rick J. Bowen



Polly O'Keary and the Rhythm Method 50 (Self-Released)

Taking advantage of a coincidental milestone in their lives the acclaimed trio Polly O'Keary and the Rhythm Method titled their latest album 50 as a testament to shared birth years and the achievement of making it to the semicentennial alive and kicking. The set of eleven original tracks released in August of 2021, takes full advantage of the award winning talents of O'Keary on Bass and vocals with drummer and producer Tommy Cook and guitarist David Miller, who makes his fi st vocal appearance on a Rhythm Method record. The "real Lady A," is special guest on the

funky opener "Brand New Day." O'Keary blasts an old flame on the swinging "To Much Like I Care," revels in hear freedom from addiction on the Latin-infused "Can't Catch Me." Miller refl cts on the troubles of a working man on the scorching Blues "Smiling." The album dishes out some heady social commentary along with the hot licks and fills out the sound beyond the power trio boundaries with guest backing vocalists and tasty keyboards. Rick J. Bowen.



Cory Vincent Cory Vincent (Self-Released)

Pacific Northwest guitarist Cory Vincent fearlessly plies all his influences into his debut self-titled album, released in August of 2021, creating a heady mixture of Jimi Hendrix, Neal Young, Nirvana, and Stevie Ray Vaughan that he calls "Grunge Blues." The seven song EP opens with the mournful lament "Back Home," that feels like long lost Stephen Foster Civil War ballad. The psychedelic blues "No Fare," sports a Manic Depression styled riff and the acoustic driven "Rock On," has a sentimental Lauren Canyon vibe. The jagged rocker "Th ow Me A Line," features some terrific interplay between Vincent and Bassist Tod Michael Bowers. The dramatic "Once Was a King," unleashes a cauldron of Zeppelin guitar fury, and drummer Dan Eddy shines on the funky "Sing A Song." The epic fi ale, "Terrestrial Blues," begins as a contemplative cowboy ballad and segues into a soaring six string denouement. Rick I. Bowen.





Tinsley Ellis Devil May Care (Alligator Records)

Tinsley Ellis has been busy ever since the pandemic cut short his 2020 tour. Tinsley Ellis' 20th release, Devil May Care, features 10 of 200 (!) songs this Southern bluesman has produced over the past 18 months woodshedding in his home studio. In 2018, Ellis returned home to Alligator Records on the Blues Music Award-nominated Winning Hand, followed by last year's Ice Cream in Hell. For fans of Southern rock-inspired blues guitar, there's a lot to like on Devil May Care. The CD starts off with the bluesy "One Less Reason" followed by some expert, fluid slide guitar on "Right Down the Drain." "Just Like Rain" fl ats atop Kevin McKendree's keyboards, Jim Hoke's sax, and Andrew Carney's trumpet. The set's mournful closer, "Slow Train to Hell" includes some inspired picking, and throughout the CD, I hear some pretty nice touches of the Allman Brothers. Devil May Care will land on many "Top 10" lists for 2022. Eric Steiner



H.C. Speir played an important part in early blues. If Patton is the father of Delta Blues, Speir is the Godfather. He was a "race records talent scout" for the Columbia, Decca, Gennett, Okeh, Paramount, and Vocalion record labels.

With the ability to cut demo recordings at his store and being a scout for major blues recording labels, word spread fast amongst the area's blues musicians, and they came from around the Delta to audition for Speir. More than any other individual, Speir was responsible for bringing the sound of the Delta blues to the nation, and then the world.

Charley auditioned for Speir. Speir heard what we all now hear. Patton had 14 sides ready. They captured "Pony Blues," arguably the signature tune that captured the Delta blues that affected and influenced so many. As country blues was popular at the time, Speir took Charley to the Paramount Records studio in Wisconsin where Charley paired up with fid ler Henry "Son" Sims.

Speir also sent Charley to record at Gennett Studios in Richmond, Indiana, where the Starr-Gennett Foundation honored Charley with an historic Paramount Records disc embedded in its historic Walk of Fame in 2008.

In 2019, noted blues historian Scott Barretta, along with fellow Mississippi Arts Commission leaders, unveiled a Mississippi Blues Trail Marker honoring Speir's achievements in the historic Farish Street neighborhood in Jackson, Mississippi.

Paramount Records issued 13 records from the two sessions the next year which propelled Charley to country blues star status. Striking while the iron was hot, Charley hustled back into the Paramount Records studio in Grafton, Wisconsin three years later as the nation started to come out of the Great Depression and the migration from the rural South to the urban North was taking hold.

In a twist of fate suitable for the blues, the Great Depression nearly wiped out the record industry. Paramount Records used inferior recording equipment and materials, and in 1932 Paramount folded. They sold each of their masters for scrap.

This left Patton's legacy on old brittle and inferior vinyl. Although his recordings on Vocalian were better recorded and preserved, it's the Paramount recordings that seemed to reach out with their rhythmic guitar playing, and sometimes scattered, lyrics.

Here the songs strayed from county blues back into the symbolic Delta blues Charley was more familiar with. Charley insisted on bringing with him his old juke joint partner Willie Brown as well as regular stage mate Son House and pianist Louise Johnson into the studio.

Not as prolific as the fi st two recording sessions, the session was marked as the rise of Son House and the forwarding of Delta



blues.

The following year, Patton's heart condition took its toll, but Charley pressed on. At 43, the American Record Company hired Charley to travel and record in New York City. Charley could not turn down the big time in the big city in 1934.

Did he know his time on Earth would end when he cut the haunting blues of "Oh Death?" at that New York session?

Later that year, Charley's heart condition, difficulty with a mitral valve, turned critical and he left his Earth for the next plane.

In 1995 they saw fit to move to the Pacific Northwest. Each member of this band has left their mark on the Pacific Northwest, and perform with the best players in town, including Lee Oskar, and have received many awards for their work. They are like brothers, and the language they speak together is effortless. Eric is from Spokane, found the blues, and never strayed from it. Something about the music touched his soul. Keeping the Blues Alive Awards 2022

Congratulations to this year's recipients awarded by The Blues Foundation

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organizations. One of the most notable programs funded by the foundation is the Fueling Musicians initiative, designed to provide critically needed assistance to musicians whose income has been eliminated by the COVID-19 pandemic. Since its inception in 2020, this initiative has raised over \$500,000, distributing over 300 cash awards. Fueling Musicians has attracted the attention and support of Gibson, Fender, Guitar Center, Ernie Ball Music Man, and George Thorogood and the Destroyers. The foundation is not only recognized by the Internal Revenue Service but also accredited by the Florida Nonprofit Alliance and GuideStar, which has helped garner substantial donors and invaluable partners.

Jerry Mason

Following his 22-year-long career in traditional radio, Jackson, Mississippibased entrepreneur, and promoter Jerry "Boogie" Mason built a network of traditional and new media connections via e-mail, print advertising, and social media, to promote blues, Southern soul, and other genres of music rooted in communities of color. His email blast, The Boogie Report, continues to alert the world's blues communities with up-to-date information on the latest recordings, tours, emerging artists, and cultural opportunities amidst the COVID-19 pandemic. Th ough Mason Media Services, Jerry aggregates relevant material from various social media and local community websites to provide a forum for readers to exchange ideas, share information, and remain connected to the arts community at large. Building on the success of The Boogie Report, Jerry hosts the Southern Soul Video Network, The Blues Buffet Radio Program, and a digital daily newsletter. Jerry has served as Publicity Chairman of the Central Mississippi Blues Society, advisory board member of the Jus' Blues Foundation, member of the Board of Directors of The Blues Foundation, and Information Office of Solomon D. Loche American Legion Post 501.

Phil Ranstrom

Phil Ranstrom is an American documentary filmmaker living in Chicago, Illinois. He has been writing, producing, and directing documentaries since the 1980s. Among his credits is the Emmy Award-winning, feature-length documentary, Cheat You Fair: The Story of Maxwell Street, narrated by actor Joe Mantegna. Th s epic film is told in three acts and details the rise and fall of Chicago's Maxwell Street, the birthplace of electric, urban blues. During the span of more than a decade, Ranstrom continued to interview and record countless vendors, residents, and blues artists, and capture an oral history that was never told. Cheat You Fair stands today as the most comprehensive history of Maxwell Street in any medium. It features interviews from blues icons including Bo Diddley, Junior Wells, Hubert Sumlin, Buddy Guy, Charlie Musselwhite, John Primer, and Uncle Johnnie Williams. Ranstrom continues to travel the world and document the blues. He's currently working on a project titled Heavenly Birds, that tells of his journey to Poland where he discovered what can only be described as "one of the greatest stories in blues and rock'n'roll history never told."

Raúl de la Rosa

Raúl de la Rosa has been a broadcaster, journalist, and cultural promoter and curator of the blues since 1964. In 1978 he organized Mexico's fi st blues festival to help share the blues and its history with the Mexican people. Raul produced eleven blues festivals between 1978 and 2012, which were held in some of Mexico's most prestigious venues. These festivals attracted an average of 10,000 - 30,000 attendees per event. While the fi st four festivals featured artists such as Willie Dixon, John Lee Hooker, Sunnyland Slim, and Jimmy Rogers, Raúl ensured that the fi al seven festivals featured more Mexican artists. This awoke signifi ant public interest as well as related workshops, conferences, and exhibitions, which were open to the public and to students of Mexico's top-rated universities. In 2002, Raúl authored the



fi st journalistic column about blues in a Mexican newspaper which continues to be published to this day. He has been a radio host and producer of Por los Senderos del Blues (Down the Trail of Blues) since 2005, where he continues to keep the blues alive in Mexico!

Jack Sullivan

For over 30 years Jack Sullivan has used his skills in magazine circulation sales for various publishing houses including Time Inc., Wenner Media, and Hearst to excel in his passion for blues music. To this day, Jack continues to be an ambassador and trendsetter for the blues. Iack has achieved national and international success as a magazine publisher, festival promoter, and online music store marketer. His many highlights over the past decade include co-founding the Bradenton Blues Festival and Camping With The Blues, launching Mojo Wax Media, publishing Blues Music Magazine, and launching online stores Blues Music and All Music Styles. Just a few years ago, Jack and his wife Susan relocated to Memphis, to open their offic in the Home of the Blues.
