
Until then, stay safe and get out and enjoy some live music, it will be good for you!

LETTER FROM THE EDITOR



Hi Bluesletter Readers,

I am very pleased that this issue has a diverse mix of stories, advertising, and updated talent listings and calendar. Our listings generate the greatest number of comments and inquiries, and this month's three-page live music calendar has over 290 different events with live blues in the greater Pacific Northwest (and Montana, too!).

In March of 2020, when COVID-19 essentially shut down live music, I never thought that our magazine would again have such a robust calendar! This likely means that we are experiencing a "new normal." While many events have loosened up mask requirements, I'll likely mask up when I attend a festival or similar large-scale event.

Check Out This Month's Calendar (and Talent Guide!)

In reviewing the calendar, I noticed several new listings as well as many events that have resumed after a COVID-19 hiatus.

This month, the Kettle River Music Foundation presents the Kettle River Music Festival at Curlew in the Okanagan Hills, Maple Falls hosts the Big Foot Festival in Whatcom County, the Gig Harbor Sportsmen's club welcomes the Rockin' Rhythm and Blues Festival, and Deming Log Show Grounds brings the Subdued Stringband Jamboree to the home of the Mount Baker Rhythm and Blues Festival. The calendar also includes two Treasure State events: The Riverfront Blues Festival in Libby and the Big Sky Blues Festival in Noxon. Washington Blues Society member bluesman (and Michigander by way of Chicago) Keith Scott has chronicled his blues and fishing travels in Montana in these pages, and these blues festivals are on my "blues bucket list."

As I prepared this month's talent guide, Rob Moitoza, Charlie Butts & The Filter Tips, TJ Read, and Mike Haley asked me to update their listings. I don't think that any musician has landed a paying gig simply by listing their band name in our talent guide. However, I think our printed (and online) talent listings help artists feel a part of a larger music community. Our talent guide, blues jam and open mic listing, and calendar, all show that we have a vibrant live blues music community across The Evergreen State. When we have a volunteer to check our radio listings, I'll bring back our radio listing, too.

Volunteers!

The Washington Blues Society depends on volunteers to host its monthly Blues Bashes, special events like festivals and other live music events, and to produce a 32-page color monthly magazine in the Adobe In Design program. I had wanted to design an ad inspired by Jefferson Airplane's 1969 LP Volunteers. This was the Airplane's last LP on RCA that closed out a tumultuous decade. I'm pleased to report that Vice President Rick Bowen designed a much more

attractive ad to get readers' (and potential volunteers') attention in this issue. The ad includes a link for further information, and I hope readers will consider volunteering for the blues society. Whether it's just checking IDs at the door or participating in the monthly Board of Directors meeting, the blues welcomes volunteers to move forward.

Please consider running for an elected position on the blues society's Board of Directors or seek a Board-appointed position. The five positions are elected by the membership to one year terms are President, Vice President, Treasurer, Secretary, and Editor. In turn, the Board appoints Music, Membership, Education, Volunteers, Merchandise, and Advertising Directors. Next month, I'll include a summary of skills that contribute to the success of each position.

Nominations for elected positions are solicited in October, due to a board member or our PO Box at the November Blues Bash, and members vote for these positions during the December Blues Bash. Please contact an elected board member or appointed director for more information.

The Deadline Dash...

Speaking (or, more accurately, typing) of volunteers, I look forward to preparing my five remaining Bluesletters. The last day of my current term of elected office as Editor is December 31, 2022, and I look forward to helping my replacement. It would be nice to identify an Editor who can be nominated at our November Blues Bash so that the membership can vote on the nominee the following month.

Several years ago, I dreamed of asking writers that I enjoy to contribute to the Bluesletter as their stories often included blues and jazz music. Scottish writer Ian Rankin has featured music cued up by Detective John Rebus (and a stop at Butch's Gun Shop on Greenwood in Seattle). Before leaving the Los Angeles Police Department, Detective Harry Bosch enjoyed old-school vinyl in Michael Connelly's award-winning novels. I also wanted to bring back a column like former Vice President Rev. Deb Englehart's "Scene & Heard," have more musicians' stories in our magazine, and include the unique perspectives of men and women behind the sound board who work hard to get the sound just right at blues society events. I hope that the next editor will have similar ideas and bring his or her own unique perspective to a monthly magazine from an all-volunteer affiliate of The Blues Foundation.

Until next month, tell a friend about a local blues show. More importantly, go! Because, in the words of White Rock Blues Society President Rod Dranfield, "If no one knows, no one goes."

Wheels of Soul Tour Rolls into Auburn this August 26th!

The Tedeschi Trucks Band brings I Am the Moon to the Pacific Northwest!

The Tedeschi Trucks Band's Wheels of Soul Summer Tour 2022, with special guests Los Lobos and Gabe Dixon, will perform an all-ages show at 6 PM on Friday, August 26, 2022, at the White River Amphitheatre in Auburn.

The tour reflects the most ambitious studio project of the band's storied career: *I Am the Moon*, an epic undertaking in four albums with 24 original songs. Inspired by a mythic Persian tale of star-crossed lovers, and emotionally driven by the isolation and disconnection of the pandemic era, the thematic *I Am the Moon* totals more than two hours of music, unfolding across a robust tapestry of genre-defying explorations that propel the treasured Americana ensemble into new and thrilling creative territory

Four albums comprise *I Am the Moon: I. Crescent, II. Ascension, III. The Fall,* and *IV. Farewell,* and each one will be released in successive months digitally and on CD, starting with *I. Crescent* last month. All vinyl configurations, including individual LPs and the 4-LP *I Am the Moon Deluxe Box* will be available on September 9th.

The decision to sequence and release *I Am the Moon* in four distinct episodes came "when we started thinking of records we love," Trucks says, citing *Axis: Bold as Love*, the 1967 LP by the Jimi Hendrix Experience. "It's 36 minutes long. That's the way to digest a record."

With that approach in mind, the Tedeschi Trucks Band will present *I Am the Moon: The Film* with immersive visual companions to each album. The corresponding films will debut three days prior to each audio release, offering fans an early opportunity to digest each album in its entirety as a communal listening and viewing experience via the band's YouTube channel. Directed by Alix Lambert, the

films combine studio and performance footage with atmospheric photography and imagery beautifully capturing the music's kaleidoscopic textures. The first episode: *I Am the Moon: The Film - I. Crescent*, launched on Tuesday, May 31st

The concept behind *I Am the Moon*, the GRAMMY-winning band's fifth studio recording, was suggested by vocalist Mike Mattison in May 2020, two months after the band was forced off the road by the pandemic.

The 12th century poem, "Layla & Majnun" by Persian poet Nizami Ganjavi was the title inspiration for Eric Clapton's 1970 double-LP with Derek and the Dominos, Layla and Other Assorted Love Songs (an influential album for the Tedeschi Trucks Band). But, Ganjavi's poem resonated with Mattison and the rest of the band in an altogether different way.

Finding complex themes and storylines that inspired their creative process, they forged a new, modern interpretation of Ganjavi's vast 100-page poem. *I Am the Moon* was written collectively and collaboratively, with band members contributing their own unique perspectives on the work. By January 2021, the band was recording at Tedeschi and Trucks' home studio, Swamp Raga, in Jacksonville, Florida, with Derek behind the soundboard as producer and long-time studio engineer Bobby Tis in charge of recording and mixing.

Operatic in scope, Tedeschi Trucks Band explores romantic relationships, collective struggle, faith, and the human experience on *I Am the Moon*.

"It's amazing," Trucks says, "Because we wrote most of this music in a pretty short time span. There are even chord changes that mirror other tunes on the albums – themes and variations, lyrical allusions, that pop back up. You always want to do something bigger and thematic. This is the

first time it happened naturally."

The Tedeschi Trucks Band have extensive tour dates planned for 2022 including their annual headlining Wheels of Soul summer U.S. tour.

The limited-edition, *I Am the Moon Deluxe Box Set*, each individually-numbered, includes all four albums in the *I Am the Moon* series on 180g black vinyl, plus additional special items will be available on September 9th. 

"Where I Got My Name (Down in Mississippi)"

"A family revelation turned into blues medicine for historical trauma."

Before there was a vaccination, the only COIVD medicine I had for the isolation of the lockdown periods was making music with my oldest friend, Daniel Rapport. We have been friends since we were born, formed a band in high school, and now have an acoustic blues duo, The Blue Tide. We have long drawn our inspiration from the Mississippi Delta blues, with Daniel playing acoustic and slide guitar and myself on harmonica. As COVID took off, with the death toll rising and all of us sheltering in place, I was able to connect (remotely at first, then later in person) and overcome the loneliness by writing lyrics about the pandemic and pairing them with the guitar licks Daniel was writing. During this time, we experienced the uprising for Black lives of 2020 and raging climate change-induced wildfires that filled the air with thick plumes of smoke — and so we began writing songs about the overlapping pandemics of COVID, racism, and the climate crisis.

As I continued to work on our *Plague Blues* album over the summer, my dad Gerald Lenoir made a stunning discovery: our family was enslaved on the same plantation in Morgantown, Mississippi, as the family of the legendary blues artist, J.B. Lenoir. After years of investigating our genealogy, he finally found out the specific plantation — the Lenoir Plantation — our family had been enslaved on in Morgantown, Mississippi.


Then, a few weeks later, I had an unnerving experience that made it all too real. My dad sent an email to me and told me to open the attachment to see a photo he had found of the enslaver's mansion on the Lenoir Plantation (which you will see featured in our music video). I clicked open the attachment and a sepia tone image with an over-exposed edge popped up that revealed the two-story big house

with French windows that opened onto an impressive oval balcony, supported by columns, all surrounded by a picket fence. As my eyes swept the snapshot, my process of seeing and meaning-making decelerated dramatically; the light gathered by my cornea, the refracted rays traveling through my pupil, and the visual signals that went to my brain via the optic nerve must have been detoured, taking a circuitous route, because even though I was looking directly at the photo, I lost the ability to really see and process the information I was taking in for an indeterminate period.

When the information finally arrived at my visual cortex, I could understand that standing there, on the second-floor balcony, peering back at me were five people with white skin; the family that had bought, owned, used, and abused, my family. When my bewilderment subsided enough for me to regain awareness of where I was and what I was looking at, I zoomed in to try to see the faces of these people who had demanded to be called master. But as I got closer to their faces the image blurred (much like my understanding of what was happening at that moment) and I couldn't clearly see the faces of those who had inflicted generations of pain and anguish on my ancestors - a trauma passed down through the generations that still resides in my body, and a trauma that was being triggered in that very moment as my pulse quickened, my breathing turned shallow, my chest tightened, and my hands clenched. I became aware in that moment of the historical trauma that was disrupting my body's equilibrium, causing my cerebrum to register sorrow, fear, and fury, which then triggered the release of hormones to the ocular area and produced


Seeing the enslavers who stole my family's — and J.B.'s family's — freedom reified enslavement for me in a way, I realized






only then, had been abstract. At that point I struggled to process my emotions, but I knew I had to create something to tell the story of my family and our connection to J.B.

J.B. Lenoir, a blues hall of famer, is one of the most prolific social commentary blues artists of all time, with songs about police violence, lynching, the Vietnam War, and even had a song about President Eisenhower the record company refused to release. His "Alabama Blues" was featured in the soundtrack to the movie *Selma*. Yet, J.B. never got stuck in one genre of blues, and as one of his song's attests, "I Sing Um the Way I feel"; and he did just that,





singing about joy, pain, drinking, politics, and playing everything from electric guitar big band blues, to solo acoustic guitar, and even creating a unique blues sound he called "African hunch rhythm" with his incorporation of African drums.

J.B. also had a flare for showmanship and often performed in a zebra stripped tuxedo jacket, complete with tails. When J.B. died — after not receiving proper care and being released from the hospital prematurely after being in car accident —

blues great John Mayall memorialized him with the classics "The Death of J.B. Lenoir" and "I'm Gonna Fight for You, J.B."

At the time of his death, J.B. was employed as a dishwasher because, like many Black artists before him, he was fleeced by the record companies who profited off his work but didn't fairly compensate him. Because of this, even though he played with some of the biggest names in the blues — such as Muddy Waters, Memphis Minnie, Willie Dixon, Sonny Boy Williamson II, Elmore James, and Sunnyland

Slim and even toured Europe with legends such as Big Mama Thornton, he wasn't able to support himself financially with music. J.B.'s most famous song is one that he is credited as co-writing with Willie Dixon, "You Shook Me" that has been covered by Led Zeppelin and Jeff Beck, among many others.

It was simply unbelievable to me that as I was writing songs about the breakdown of our society, challenging those in power, and the power of love, I discovered a shared family origin with one of the best to ever do what I was attempting.

This revelation of my connection to J.B. inspired me to take the stage name "J.D. Lenoir" and write the lyrics to our new song, "Where I Got My Name (Down in Mississippi)."

Prine's song, "When I Get to Heaven" was also included in the program.

When I get to heaven, I'm gonna shake God's hand.

Thank him for more blessings than one man can stand,

Then I'm gonna get a guitar and start a rock-n-roll band,

Check into a swell hotel, ain't the afterlife grand?

RIP Greg, and thanks for the memories.

Editor's Note: I wish I could have participated in Greg "Slim Lively" Johnson's Celebration of Life in Portland. During my first years as a volunteer at the International Blues Challenge in Memphis, Greg coached me how to be the best venue volunteer I could be. Andie Whitewing: Moving Forward with Music

"Otis voice seemed like it would make my heart vibrate right out of my body."

Attendees of the March 2022 Blues Bash never imagined hearing Beyonce's "Daddy Lessons" cover. However, music by Whitewing is full of surprises.

According to singer Andie Whitewing, "a music project that was first founded in 2018 by me and my late partner Bill Sterling, who was also the bassist at that time. Bill was a very experienced musician and threw his full support to helping me fly. Due to the personal tragedy of losing my children in 2019, I had to take a two-year break from music to heal, and the project has only just re-formed to the point of performing out again as a duo with East Coast Dave on guitar in March, and as a full band with RK Antny at the helm on drums, vocals, and harmonica in late April. We're looking for a full-time committed bassist but have been fortunate to work with some great players as fill-ins in the meantime."

Growing up in Southwest Louisiana in the heart of Cajun Country, Whitewing feels her most "seminal musical influences are my family of origin, despite the fact that they did not want me to become a musician. My mother DeMerris had been singing all her life, mostly gospel, so from the time I had eardrums in the womb I was entraining to her voice. She is a power vocalist and soul singer and fronted show bands fulltime until I was 21. She was touring with a national act at age 19 and in her early 20s did some recording in Nashville with Buddy Emmons. My mother is also celebrated in the house/techno music scene, having recorded on the early dance club hits by DJ Icey. Her parents were my surrogate parents, and not only was her mother Dove Ann Thibodeaux a gospel singer, multiinstrumentalist, and arranger, but her father Pee Wee Whitewing a vocalist and legendary pedal steel guitar pioneer. My maternal grandparents, mother, and uncles performed southern gospel harmonies in church and family gatherings, and for the

first few years of my life I was steeped in this mode of expression as well. Pee Wee was not only my surrogate father, but he legally adopted and raised me. While he stopped playing music for about 10 years after my grandmother died, when I was in high school, we began to connect through western swing and country and western music in which he had his own origins. I also grew up next door to my Cajun greatgrandfather "Uncle Ambrose" Thibodeaux, who was a celebrated swamp pop Cajun fiddle player. There were weekly music jams and family gatherings under my greatgrandparents' porch for a long time. This was a very rich musical nursery for me."

Whitewing learned a lot about the business of music from her mother. As her mother learned music, Whitewing was drawn to combination of blues, soul, funk, and R&B.

"She used to take me with her to the record store, buy the 45s of the songs she needed to learn, hand them to me with a legal pad, and from about age 6 or so it was one of my jobs to write out the lyrics for her to learn. As a child in the 70s and 80s, I was often at practices and performances as well, so I gained a deep understanding of the "behind the scenes" of the profession as well as the challenges and rewards of being a music professional. One of the most recounted stories in my family of my early passion for music was my mastery of Gloria Gaynor's "I Will Survive" at the age of three and singing it to the little boy across the street from my driveway. I find this to be prophetic, as that song in so many ways has become an anthem for my life. Although I didn't realize it until I revisited her oeuvre around the time of her death, Aretha Franklin has been one of the most influential vocalists for me, and later Ann Wilson became one as well. As a lyric coloratura soprano, I didn't often hear someone with my voice type making powerful, soulful music that stirred me to the core, but Aretha and Ann are among the best. As a teenager I got lost in the greatest



hits collections of not only Aretha, but Otis Redding, Ray Charles, Luther Vandross, and many other contemporary R&B artists such as Regina Belle, Patti Labelle, James Ingram, Peabo Bryson, and Lisa Fischer. I have powerful whole-body memories of lying in bed in the dark as I drifted off to sleep at age 16 listening to Otis' plaintive "These Arms of Mine" and "I've Been Loving You Too Long." Otis' voice seemed like it would make my heart vibrate right out of my body. Whitney Houston was a great inspiration as well. And there's no way I can leave out Stevie Wonder and Sting, who are musical powerhouses that I've been listening to most of my life with a great deal of admiration and respect, musically and spiritually."

Whitewing describes the band's mission as "both simple and complex - to form a collaboration in which everyone is being nourished on the personal, spiritual, and musical levels which can then generate high vibration music and messaging to the community. Blues, soul, funk, and R&B cover material are a vehicle for gelling with one another and establishing ourselves, but this is ultimately an original material project in the same vein. The messaging is about healing, growth, compassion, love. We're committed to authenticity, humility, working hard, observing sobriety around the spiritual experience of music, and delivering a high quality, heartfelt, soulful musical experience to lift people through sound vibration and genuine interpersonal

connection during this very challenging transitional time for humanity. Our next priority will be to work on original material, and we plan to add a horn section, keys, and perhaps secondary percussion over time as we solidify."

Whitewing is extremely appreciative to the Washington Blues Society.

"I first became acquainted with the Washington Blues Society at the time of Fat James' death in August of 2017. I subsequently co-produced two music memorial "ruckuses" with Dave Cashin, one in Seattle, and one in Bellingham, and the Washington Blues Society got involved and asked me to write a memorial article for James for the Bluesletter. Rick Bowen has been very instrumental in making me feel connected and welcomed, and I became a member as soon as I began to put my own band together in 2018. Since then, I've written a memorial article for Tracy Arrington as well, volunteered at the occasional Washington Blues Society event, and entered the regional International Blues Challenge competitions with this project in 2019 and 2022.

"I am continually touched and grateful for the amazing amount of hard work and effort this volunteer-run organization generates to support and promote musicians in our region. I find myself anchoring in blues because of the community - nowhere have I had a more authentic, intimate, and connected experience of sharing music very directly, with other musicians or fans, whether I'm on the stage or supporting fellow artists. Music is a spiritual vehicle that invites us to shed our egos and synchronize ourselves together vibrationally - a way of approaching unity consciousness if only fleetingly. And blues is a musical place that acknowledges the depths of sorrow and hardship that can be the greatest challenge to us in this human experience. We communicate who we are at the cellular level through our voices,



blues is not, as Buddy Guy writes 'what you sing about, the blues is what you feel.' I'm drawn to authenticity and soulfulness, and places where that is not only welcomed, but celebrated, so it's the blues and her progeny genres that beckon me."

For a chance to see Whitewing in person there are a couple of upcoming shows this month.

"We're slowing down our full band booking until we find a full-time bassist, but Dave and I will be performing an acoustic duo show at the Port Gardner Bay Winery on August 6, 7-9 PM, and we also have a private party event on the evening of August 27. At this point we're a wildcard act for the Washington Blues Society International Blues Challenge Finals as well and have a one-in-three chance of being drawn to participate in that event on August 27. We're certainly interested in discussing duo, trio, or full band gigs, too!"


more. Guests can also expect local and regional artists/vendors and kids activities and New Orleans style swag.

"There's really nothing better than taking your lunch outside and enjoying live, local jams under the sun."

Bellevue Beats is made possible by partners Amazon, the City of Bellevue, and 4Culture with media support from 425 Magazine. Together, these investments in Bellevue Beats help drive economic activity within Downtown Bellevue while providing an opportunity for live music celebrations and experiences. The following shows slated for August showcase a select number of jazz and blues-specific performances.

Darelle Holden: Thursday, August 11 at Bellevue Square Fountain Court. Holden's sultry, expressive, and singular vocal qualities will have you hooked. Her prolific career as a touring singer has taken her all over the world, both as a critically acclaimed solo artist and a much sought-after backup vocalist. Darelle has performed with legends, including Stevie Wonder, Earth Wind & Fire, Bobby Caldwell, Norman Brown, and Tom Jones, who lauded her as "a great singer".

Ben Thomas Tango Project: Wednesday, August 10 at the Bellevue Connection. Dr. Ben Thomas is one of the most indemand vibists in the Pacific Northwest. Known for combining virtuosic technique with flowing lyricism, Thomas's music spans from pyrotechnic improvisations to delicate soundscapes.

In addition to leading jazz and tango ensembles, he performs as a sideman on mallets, percussion, and bandoneon with a wide variety of groups throughout the United States, including the Jovino Santos Neto Quinteto and the Atlas Tango Project. He currently has five albums of original compositions available on Origin Records.

Thomas completed his Doctor of Musical Art in Percussion Performance at the University of Washington in 2007. Over the years, he has performed at dozens of festivals and concerts in Washington such as Bumbershoot Arts Festival, Issaquah Jazz Festival, Anacortes Arts Festival and more.

Jovino Santos Neto: Wednesday, August 17 at the Bellevue Connection. Three-time Latin Grammy nominee Jovino Santos Neto, a master pianist, composer





and arranger, is among the top Brazilian musicians working today. Currently based in Seattle, Washington, he has throughout his career been closely affiliated with the Brazilian master Hermeto Pascoal. He was an integral part of Pascoal's group from 1977 to1992, where he fine-tuned his artistry, performing around the world and co-producing several legendary records.

Jovino's personal style is a creative blend of energetic grooves, deep harmonies, telepathic improvisation, lyrical melodies

and great ensemble playing, always inspired and informed by the colorful richness of Brazilian music. His compositions include samba, choro, baião, xote, forró, marcha and many more styles, rooted in centuriesold musical tradition while pointing to new and adventurous harmonic languages.

Currently, Jovino leads his Seattle-based Quinteto after teaching piano and composition at Cornish College of the Arts for 26 years. He can also be heard around the world as a piano soloist, working with symphony orchestras, jazz big bands, chamber music groups, and in collaboration with musicians such as his mentor Hermeto Pascoal, Bill Frisell, Paquito d'Rivera, Airto Moreira, Claudio Roditi, David Sanchez, Joe Locke, Marco Granados and many more.

Million Dollar Nile: Wednesday, August 31 at the Bellevue Connection. Million Dollar Nile combines harmony and humor to bring you a blend of catchy originals, bluegrass standards, and the occasional surprise pop music cover. They often write lyrics about environmental issues, earning them the title "Seattle's Greenest Bluegrass Band." Most importantly, Million Dollar Nile loves to have fun and they hope you do too!

Million Dollar Nile began back in 2007 when Matt Swanson, Dan Stonington, and Nicole Comforto started playing bluegrass and original folk tunes and singing harmonies together in Seattle. Over the years they were joined by Bobby Hughes on banjo, Christian Krehbiel on drums, Charlotte Gamble on bass, and Nathan Hamm on fiddle.

"Where I Got My Name" also features introductory commentary from my Uncle Ivan "I.T." Lenoir. I recorded the interview the first time I saw I.T. after a long quarantine and he offers his raw reaction to learning about where the family was enslaved. My brother, Jamana Lenoir, of Magnum Opus Publications, produced the music video that includes archival photos provided by our dad.

The video begins with a photo of Laura Lenoir that Gerald has safeguarded for many years, the only image that remains of one of our enslaved family members. Laura was my great great grandmother, and she was born into slavery in Mississippi in 1844 and died the year my father was born in 1948. She was married to my great great grandfather, Thomas Lenoir, who was born into slavery in 1844 and died in


1922. Laura birthed 19 children, including my great grandfather, York Alonzo Lenoir. I had known about Laura and York before, but it was only when I wrote this song that I understood more deeply who they were through our family conversations about their lives and all that they had endured. This process animated my enslaved family members to me in a way that I had never experienced, and I finally felt like I had a connection to them.

The incredible family collaboration that made this video — and the self-discovery and ancestral connection that occurred through the process — has been deeply healing and has proven to be for me the best therapy for the historical trauma of slavery. For the next phase of the healing process, I have now made it my life's quest to find a way to get in touch with J.B.'s children and share our tribute song to

their father (if anyone who reads this has any connection to them, please reach out to me).

I hope you are moved by our song; both feeling the intensity of the trauma of the past and also the incredible healing power of music and storytelling.


Levi Platero Band (Photo by Brent Teets)

A winner of the Native American Music Association award, former member of Indigenous and owner of his own production company, Levi Platero leads a seasoned trio delighting audiences nationwide. He has played with artists such as Los Lonely Boys and continues to tour the Midwest and Pacific Northwest each year playing originals, blues, rock and roll, and rhythm and blues. Native American by birth, Levi Platero is a member of the Navajo Nation in the southwest United States (Albuquerque, New Mexico). With his family's band, The Platero's, they emerged on the music scene in 2004 as a

blues rock power trio with a sound that drew those who followed the likes of Stevie Ray Vaughan, Los lonely Boys and ZZ Top. After touring for a decade with his family band and, a run as a member of Indigenous, Levi decided it was time to get back to his own music. He then recruited a new band, began touring, and released a self-titled EP featuring the single "Take Me Back" which went on to win the 2016 Native American Music Association Award for Best Blues song.

The RT Collective came about as the result of two musicians wanting to explore music and go back to their roots. Award-winning guitarist Rafael Tranquilino and highly sought after bassist Patrick McDanel are both generally known as electric instrument players. They decided to go acoustic when they started getting together to jam in 2021. The chemistry from the first jam was pure and creative, and they enjoyed this new collaboration so much that they decided to become "partners in crime" for a new and fresh acoustic project. They have been performing as a duo in various venues with their "Old School" approach using just an acoustic guitar and standup bass.
