The blues society's monthly Blues Bash at Aurora Borealis on November 8th was quite an event. Not only was the music exceptional, but also was the food. Yes, the food. As many of you know, Aurora Borealis has great food. The only problem was that downstairs in the Event Center the only available food offerings were from their limited appetizer menu.

Now, don't get me wrong, their appetizers are really first rate.

But, quite often, I crave something a little more substantial. As I'm sure many of you do, too. Well, never fear. They have decided to make their full menu available to everyone attending the second Tuesday of the month Washington Blues Society Blues Bash. Not only that, but they are now offering full table service for beverages as well as food! That's right, no more having to stand and wait at the bar for your tasty beverage.

As a result of these great changes, now everyone can enjoy a great meal along with great music every month!

And, speaking of great music, there was a lot of that, too.

The night started off with a solo set from Anthony Duron Estrada, and if you haven't heard this man yet, you are missing out. Anthony played an engrossing set featuring a varied mix of older, delta style blues. And, he performed it with soul! The only things that would have made it more authentic would have been moonshine in Mason jars and sawdust on the floor. He took us all back to the time when blues was new, raw, and fresh. He sang, he shouted, he told stories. Anthony is living proof that traditional blues is alive and well and still relevant today.

After a brief intermission, where we gave away 11 CDs and a pair of tickets to see Joe Bonamassa in concert, we braced ourselves



for the night's featured group, Annie & The All-Star Band. Believe me, "All-Star" is an understatement. The band featured Billy Stapleton on guitar, Jeff Davies on bass, Steve Peterson on drums, and you'd be hard pressed to find a tighter, more experienced group anywhere. Toss in the charismatic and gifted Annie Eastwood and you don't simply have a band, you have a FORCE!

When I first moved to Western Washington in 1997, one of the first performers I heard was "Stickshift Annie" Eastwood. I've lost track of how many times I have been privileged to hear her perform, but I have never heard her sound better that she did at the Bash. She was on fire and the band was fanning the flames! She cooed, she crooned, and she growled. She served us her soul on a platter. And no one left hungry.

Normally at our Blues Bashes, the featured band plays 50 or 60 minutes. But the joint was rocking, and Annie lived up to her name as her and the boys double-clutched and kicked it into overdrive and played for almost 80 minutes! The crowd was dancing, clapping, hooting, and hollering for more. And the All-Stars gave it to them.

Sure, it's great to watch online.

But, seriously folks... you should have been there!

## Alabama Mike & Kid Andersen: Live at West of the Waterway

I recently discovered a new showcase and it's called "West of The Waterway." Located between the tracks for the huge TEMCO Grain dock and the Foss Waterway in Tacoma. It's been around for quite a while as an event venue for weddings and other large events, and I didn't know they hosted musical productions. Turns out that they do, and they do it well. Spacious stage, very nice sound system, ample seating, and courteous, attentive staff.

On Thursday December 8th, I was lucky enough to see the show featuring Alabama Mike and Kid Andersen.

Alabama Mike is a force to be reckoned with, a masterful and hard-driving blues singer and harmonica player who is also one of the most creative and prolific songwriters working today. His decades of performing the blues have enabled him to hone his craft. Mike is the real deal, and he was backed up for this show by a cadre of highly qualified musicians.

Kid Andersen is the Norwegian-born guitar phenomenon who tours the world with the multi-award-winning band "Rick Estrin & The Nightcats," and he produces and engineers many of the biggest blues albums each year at his internationally renowned Greaseland Studios in San Jose, California.

Lorenzo Farrell plays keyboards with Rick Estrin & The Nightcats. His playing was tasteful and well suited to the music. His ability to play fills as well as cover the bass lines is exceptional.

David Hudson is the drummer for The T-Town Aces and competently rounded out the band. David has been playing in the Pacific Northwest for decades and never disappoints.

These four gifted musicians made for a wildly entertaining evening of soulful blues storytelling and high-level fun.

Mike was gracious enough to call up a few local musicians to spice things up. Steve



Bailey on harmonica was first He stepped up and illustrated why he's been a solid fixture on the Pacific Northwest blues scene for decades.

A few songs later, Mike summoned Mr. Ioel Astley to the stage, and he also rose to the occasion and added some tasty "tin sandwich" to the mix. Joel's Christmas CD was recorded, mixed, and mastered at Kid Andersen's Greaseland studio.

Towards the end of the show, Kid and Mike called upon the incredible Tim Lerch to share guitar duties on a few songs. If there is a better guitarist in the Pacific Northwest, I've never heard them. "World class" is the term that comes to mind every time I hear him play. The other adjectives simply aren't enough.

The show closed with Kid's wife Lisa Anderson joining the band of vocals. What a great voice!

Lisa's a strong stage talent in her own right.

The show was produced by Tacoma based-BTB Arts & Entertainment, and I look for a future article showcasing their visions for live blues in the Pacific Northwest.

All in all, it was one of the best local shows I've experienced in quite a while. I'm looking forward to attending future shows at West of the Waterway. I encourage everyone to check it out.






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## Mark Hummel's 30th Annual Blues Harmonica Blowout!

Legendary harp tour stops in Yakima, Seattle & Mt. Vernon this month!

This month, Mark Hummel brings his 30th annual Blues Harmonica Blowout to the Evergreen State on the 15th at Yakima' Seasons Performance Hall, followed by two dates at Seattle's Triple Door on the 17th and 18th, and playing Mount Vernon's historic Lincoln Theatre on the 20th. Joining Mark Hummel on this special tour are harmonica aces Magic Dick (J. Geils Band), John Nemeth, Sugar Ray Norcia, and Aki Kumar. Duke Robillard and Anson Funderburgh play guitar, and Wes Starr and Randy Bermudes drive the Blues Harmonica Blowout on drums and bass.

Mark Hummel's Blues Harmonica Blowout celebrates 30 years this month as the past two years' blowouts were postponed due to the pandemic. The Blowout started on a Sunday night in 1991 at Ashkenaz in Berkeley with four harmonica players: Rick Estrin, Mark Hummel, Dave Earl, and Doug Jay. Throughout the years, the traveling blues show has featured many of the top harp blowers, including Huey Lewis, John Mayall, James Cotton, Charlie Musselwhite, John Hammond, Magic Dick, Lee Oskar, Jerry Portnov, Corky Siegel, Jason Ricci, Howard Levy, Lazy Lester, Carey Bell, Snooky Pryor, Billy Boy Arnold, Rod Piazza, Kim Wilson, Rick Estrin, Sugar Ray Norris, James Harman, Paul DeLay, Sam Myers, Norton Buffalo, Curtis Salgado, Carlos Del Junco and Gary Primich. The guitar chair is equally stunning with Elvin Bishop, Duke Robillard, Anson Funderburgh, Jr Watson, Steve Freund, Little Charlie Baty, Billy Flynn, Rusty Zinn, Bob Welsh, Charles Wheal... Blowout tours have covered thousands of miles to every part of the US and Canada and including a few European tours. Mark Hummel's Blues Harmonica Blowouts have carried the blues torch to many blues fans everywhere!

Mark Hummel, Harp Blowout Producer, Grammy nominee/Blues Award winner/ author/harp man started playing harmonica in 1970 and has gone on to become one of the premier blues harmonica players of his generation. Hummel has been featured on over thirty recordings since 1985 including the Grammy nominated 2013 Blind Pig release Remembering Little Walter (a live recording from a previous Mark Hummel Blues Harmonica Blowout. Hummel's latest CD is Wayback Machine on Electro-Fi. It rated #5 in Roots Music Revue and #20 in Living Blues Magazine for 2020.

Magic Dick, nee Richard Salwitz, was born in New London, Connecticut and is the original harp man from the J. Geils Band, whose many hits flooded the airwaves during the 1970's and 1980's. Chart-toppers like "Freeze Frame", "Centerfold", "First I Look at the Purse", "Must A Got Lost". "Give It to Me" and Magic Dick's own "Whammer Jammer" were in the Top 10 off and on for 20 years, and made them one of the top bands, along with WAR, that featured harmonica prominently in the frontline. Magic Dick went on to start 'Bluestime' with J. Geils after the original band broke up, making two CDs for Rounder Records. Magic Dick is perhaps one of the most famous harp blowers on earth, partially because "Whammer Jammer" was played on Armed Forces Radio in Vietnam through the late '60's until the war ended. It was the first song most baby boomers tried to learn on harmonica, along with John Mayall's classic, "Room to Move." In 1979, Rolling Stone Record Guide music critic Dave Marsh described Magic Dick as possibly "the best white musician to ever play blues harmonica."

Boise, Idaho native John Nemeth's national debut for Blind Pig Records, Magic Touch (2007), produced by Anson Funderburgh, received an ecstatic response from fans and the media, and he was hailed as the new voice of the blues. Living Blues magazine enthused, "Magic Touch gives hope that the blues will survive." In 2008, Németh was recruited by Elvin Bishop to





do some performances and contribute four vocal tracks to his Grammy-nominated album The Blues Rolls On.

Németh released two more albums for the label, both hitting #6 on the Billboard Blues Chart, which began his long string of Blues Music Award (BMA) nominations, numbering 20 at last count. Nemeth also won two Blues Blast Music Awards - Best New Artist Debut Recording and Sean Costello Rising Star Award. In 2013 Nemeth relocated to Memphis, TN, where he teamed up with producer Scott Bomar and his classic Memphis Soul band, the Bo-Keys, to create an album of revisited soul classics, Memphis Grease (2014 Blue Corn), which debuted at #4 on the Billboard Blues



Chart, John Nemeth won the 2014 BMA for Best Soul Blues Male Artist, followed by Memphis Grease winning Best Soul Blues Album in 2015. Nemeth's newest release Maybe the Last Time with Elvin Bishop is sitting at Number One on the charts!

Sugar Ray Norcia is a singer-harp man and also a three time Grammy nominee whose career kicked into high gear in 1979 when he formed the original Sugar Ray and the Bluetones with guitar giant Ronnie Earl. The band has remained in high regard receiving a total of 27 Blues Music Award nominations, and includes winning two Blues Music Awards in 2014. They have appeared on over sixty albums. In 2012 Sugar Ray was inducted into the Rhode Island's Music Hall of Fame. He toured with Roomful of Blues for 8 years. In 2016 Sugar Ray and his band The Bluetones released their CD called Seeing Is Believing. Sugar Ray was nominated for an unprecedented seven Blues Music Awards in 2017 including Traditional Blues Male Artist and also B.B. King Entertainer of the Year! In 2020 Sugar Ray and the Bluetones featuring Little Charlie Baty recorded a new CD/album on Severn Records called Too FarfFrom The Bar. The album was nominated for five Blues Music Awards. In 2021 Sugar Ray and his band won the prestigious Blues Blast Music Award for the Best Blues Band.

Aki Kumar, India-born, now San Jose, California-based aka "The Only Bombay Blues Man," left his home in Mumbai with the intention of working as a software engineer in Silicon Valley. Then, he discovered the blues, and his life dramatically changed. Singing and playing harmonica, he steeped himself in the music and became a fixture in the blues clubs throughout Northern California, where he developed a unique, audacious blend of Chicago-style blues which then led to playing retro Bollywood pop mixed with the blues. Aki recorded for Little Village Foundation and has been featured in Variety, NPR... He's played major festivals including Hardly Strictly Bluegrass, San Diego Blues Festival, and the Waterfront Blues Festival.

Rhode Island based guitarist and singer Duke Robillard founded the band Roomful of Blues in 1967 and was, for a time, a member of the Fabulous Thunderbirds. Although Robillard is best known as a rock and blues guitarist, he also plays jazz and swing. He played in bands as Mike "Honey Bear" Robillard and worked for the Guild Guitar Company. He spent over a decade leading Roomful of Blues before departing and becoming guitarist and singer with Robert Gordon and later a member of the Legendary Blues Band. He started the Duke Robillard Band in 1981 eventually adopting the name Duke Robillard and the Pleasure Kings, with whom he toured throughout the 1980s and recorded for Rounder Records. Duke Robillard became a member of the Fabulous Thunderbirds in 1990. He formed a duo with Herb Ellis and the swing trio New Guitar Summit with Gerry Beaudoin and Jay Geils. He was briefly guitarist in 2013 touring with Bob Dylan for his Time Out of Mind album. Robillard's newest release on Stony Plain is Blues Bash, by Duke Robillard and Friends (both Mark Hummel and Bob Welsh appear).

Guitarist Anson Funderburgh is a long-time member of the Golden State Lone Star Blues

Revue born in Plano, Texas where he first picked up the guitar in high school and was hit by the blues bug through Jimmy Reed, and Lightnin' Hopkins. By 1978, he started Anson and the Rockets with vocalist/ harmonica player Darrell Nulisch with the group being signed to Black Top Records a couple years later. In 1986 Nulisch was replaced by Blind Sam Myers who stayed with the group until his death in 2006. Anson and the Rockets went on to win 10

Blues Music Awards (formerly known as the W.C. Handy Blues Awards) widely regarded as the highest honor for blues artists in the United States.

Drummer and Rome, Georgia native Wes Starr has played with a who's who of famed musicians in Texas (Asleep at the Wheel, Anson Funderburgh, Delbert McClinton, Willie Nelson, Marcia Ball, Jimmie Dale Gilmore, Omar and the Howlers and Sam Myers) after living in Austin for over 40 years. Wes won a Grammy during his seven year stint in country superstar Hal Ketcham's band.

Petaluma, California native Randy Bermudes is an in-demand blues and roots bassist. Randy started with Hummel, moved on to Little Charlie and the Nightcats for five years and two albums, then joined Charlie Musselwhite for four years and two albums, seven years and two albums with The Fabulous Thunderbirds and back to Charlie Musselwhite, where he's been ever since.

Washington Blues Society members, including musicians, their friends and fans, and all others who enjoy grooving (and dancing!) to fantastic blues performances at a first-rate, centrally located Puget Sound venue.

#### This Article's Focus

Advertising the club as a great spot to get together with friends and fellow Washington Blues Society members, as well as getting a few customers' and performers' "takes" on the Blues Bash at Aurora Borealis.

#### Setting the Scene

Every blues venue delivers a vibe of its own, but the very best are havens for performers and listeners alike! Mark Benzion, guitarist extraordinaire for The Billy Appleton Band, recently shared his observations and experiences at the Aurora Borealis with me.

"Over my career as a musician playing many clubs, very few provide an optimal environment for artists to express themselves fully and for patrons to have an equally pleasant experience. The Aurora Borealis certainly hits the mark and is on the short list of best music venues in the Pacific Northwest," said Mark.

As my wife and I walked in the door half an hour or so before the entertainment began, we felt we belonged, as part of a blues-loving mega-family.

Many patrons coming in from the wintry outdoors danced their way into the club, hugs, and first-name greetings all around. And, to top it off, admission was free!

"Welcome to the Aurora, have a seat wherever you like, your server with be with you shortly," our greeter enthused.

As folks walked in, many called out to one another by name, happy to meet up with fellow blues fans and Washington Blues Society members at this Blues Bash, including blues society officers President Tony Frederickson and Vice President Rick Bowen.

And as people gravitated toward tables and chairs, Tony made the rounds, greeting everyone and handing out a coveted red raffle ticket to each customer.

These storied monthly Blues Bash tickets are an attraction in themselves (more on them in a bit). With raised tables facing the bar, an array of tables for four or more across from the huge bandstand, and still providing plenty of room for enthusiastic dancers of all ages, the Aurora Borealis couldn't be more accommodating. Such a joyful place!

A Billy Appleton Band member's young children cavorted among dancing couples and singles that night, and everyone was having a wonderful time.

#### The Performers: Act One

And what a superb setting and vibe for entertainers at the Aurora Borealis! For that December Blues Bash, the night featured two terrific performing groups. Taking the stage promptly at 7, Powell & McPage (Jevon Powell, acoustic guitar and vocals, and Mary McPage, vocals) entertained the ever-growing, engaged crowd with original tunes, rich harmonies, and lots of fun!

Playing a solid mix of numbers ("Rolling Down the Highway," "Another Hard Night," "A Fool Don't Care," "Ways & Means"), Powell & McPage were obviously having as great a time themselves as were their listeners and dancers.

When I asked Mary how she felt the evening

went, she extolled the club's amenities as well as the audience.

"[Usually] having to run our own PA and lighting system when we play, playing at the Aurora Borealis was like getting the Rock Star treatment!" said Mary. "It's also nice to see the dance floor being used, and it is an all ages room! Being able to bring your family to a nice club for quality entertainment is something I personally very much appreciate."

Connecting up-close and personal with these enthusiastic blues fans, Jevon and Mary also complimented the quality food and reasonably priced drinks served at the venue.

#### Special Blues Bash Moments

A little after eight, as folks were finishing dinner and waiting for Billy Appleton Band to jump up on stage, Tony grabbed the house mic to announce the winning raffle ticket numbers.

Amazingly (is it Blues Bash karma?), my sister Heather had drawn the best raffle ticket of the night! Two seats at Seattle's Jazz Alley to see The Blind Boys of Alabama! A few drawn tickets later, the magical Aurora Borealis vibe must have been working for me as well as I snagged Mary McPage's latest CD, Starlight Smoochy Smoochy.

#### The Performers: Act Two

A few moments later, The Billy Appleton Band immediately energized the crowd, and no wonder. Not only is this a top-flight band, but the house made sure that this terrific performing group would be able to perform at their very best.

As guitarist Mark Benzion shared with me "The superior onstage sound at the Aurora Borealis allowed all of us in The Billy Appleton Band to be completely relaxed, and I believe we had one of best shows ever due to the simple fact that we could clearly hear

## **Grace Love Returns with a New CD**

"It's nothing like I've ever done..."

It's been a busy decade. In the last 10 years, Grace Love has gone from being a cover band singer to being called one of the brightest lights in Seattle's emerging soul music scene, to stepping away from her own growing fame to find her own voice as a songwriter.

In February, she will release a new CD as a solo artist, and while she's still got that soul, she now brings in other influences, including rock and roll, blues, and...opera?

"It's like nothing I've ever done," said the singer, with a laugh, as she waited in the ferry line to ride out to her home in Port Townsend in early January. "It's nothing like anyone's heard me do."

That, as it happens, is the point. Love's career as a soul singer as Grace Love and the True Loves was exciting; she worked with Pearl Jam's Mike McCready, was a featured artist on KEXP and NPR, and appeared at top festivals including Folklife and Winthrop Rhythm and Blues.

But the nine-piece soul powerhouse, formed in 2014, was an old-school soul band through and through, which left Love feeling creatively limited.

"I didn't want to be forced into the soul genre. I wanted to do more," she said. "I want something under the soul. Blues, and rock and roll, if I want to. I wanted to find people who want to do experimentation. It was a hard decision."

Since leaving the band in 2016, Love has gone on a bit of a musical walkabout.

"I started playing with a lady band, and we did some rock and roll, and over the years I've tried to figure out what works and what doesn't," she said.

The new CD is a four-song EP called Work in Protest and it reflects the musical journey of the last six years, as well as some of the struggles she's faced.



"Everybody talks about a work in progress," she said. "I have had people want to destroy me and abuse me in the music industry. They wanted me to cower. But I'm going to get work done. It's an ode to not giving up when it feels like you should."

"This EP is just solely me, learning how to sample, learning how to produce, just keeping it really simple," she said. "The second single, "Broke," is nothing like I've ever done. There's distortion, toms on the floor, it is definitely a blues tune with some rock and roll in it."

Another song has some disco flavor, she said, and, yes, she even taps into a little bit

As eclectic as the album is, the live show at the CD release party, planned for Valentine's Day evening at the Tractor Tavern in Seattle, will be even more diverse. Around the traditional guitar and bass, she may bring in some surprising instrumentation.

"It could include fiddle, pedal steel, and violin or cello or something of that nature," she said.

The 60-minute set will include her new material, as well as some of her fans' old favorites, she said.

Her voice will always have soul, she said. But now her voice has rock and roll, too, and even opera. And she's also got a whole lot of blues.

"It's about, how does this make me feel?" she said. "How does this make you feel? Tome of it makes you feel all the things, some makes you weep, some makes you angry. It's rooted in the emotions. That's the relationship with blues."

## A Quitter Never Wins...

Welcome Tinsley Ellis Back to the Pacific Northwest Next Month!

A singular blues legend will be taking four stages in our Pacific Northwest community in mid March as part of another of his world tours. He'll walk out on stage in front of his 1967 Gibson Vintage Burst ES-345, his 1959 Sunburst Fender Stratocaster with its beautiful deep rosewood fret board, and his 1973 Gibson Les Paul Cherry Sunburst Deluxe to name a few.

"If you want to sound classic, use the instruments that the old masters used," said Tinsley Ellis in a recent conversation.

"A Quitter Never Wins" is a signature song written by Tinsley Ellis and Margaret Sampson. Tinsley released this hit on his fifth studio release, Storm Warning, in 1994. Johnny Lang covered it three years later on his big label debut album, Lie to Me, released the day before he turned 16. Good advice to the young gun and a definite display of how Tinsley gives back to the community for which he lives. Check out this outstanding album with Chuck Leavell (current Rolling Stones keyboardist), Oliver Woods (now of The Woods Brothers) and the debut studio appearance of Derek Trucks.

Tinsley especially wants the readers of the Bluesletter to know how excited he is about John Mayall's new release during the pandemic, which will include "A Quitter Never Wins" with Robby Krieger (Guitarist/ Writer/Founding member of The Doors).

Tinsley was born in Atlanta, but the Ellis family soon moved to south Florida where an impressionable Tinsley Ellis experienced the blues of The Yardbirds, Cream, early Fleetwood Mac, and the legends of the blues. Tinsley distinctly remembers getting to experience a man he emulated, B.B. King. King broke a guitar string in mid song. B.B. changed out that guitar string and handed it to young Tinsley. With the blues already in Tinsley's heart, this incident drove the blues

into his soul

In the mid-70's, Tinsley moved back to Atlanta to further and complete a formal education majoring in history at Emory University. Still in his late teens, Atlanta gave Tinsley access to see more blues masters. In his 20s, he learned how to play in front of audiences by playing college parties as well as a Summer gig playing outdoors in the blistering Georgia heat at Six Flags amusement park in Atlanta. He credits double digit daily shows as an early lesson in how to play to different audiences.


Tinsley continued his musical education with local Atlanta blues band The Alley Cats. They opened for some of those same famed bluesmen. Kaedy Kiely, Georgia Radio Hall of Fame DJ and Atlanta music community heroine shares her feelings about Tinsley.

"I got to know Tinsley when we were students at Emory University around 1980," she said." "He was a very bright, down-toearth, talented guy who would have been successful at anything he chose as a career. It's truly a joy watching him become one of the world's best as an artist, I'm happy he chose to bless us with his glorious brand of

Ellis then continued his formal education 90 miles south of Atlanta in Macon. There, Tinsley studied law at Mercer University. His musical education continued in a city known for Otis Redding, Little Richard, The Allman Brothers Band and Capricorn Records. After he left Mercer, Tinsley moved back to Atlanta and met old hand blues vocalist "Chicago Bob" Nelson where they formed The Heartfixers.

The community came back around for Tinsley in 1988 where he was signed to seminal blues record label Alligator Records as a solo artist and released Georgia Blue.

Tinsley continued his growth as a writer, singer, guitarist and mentor for the next



32 years releasing 20 albums through four labels including Alligator, Capricorn, Telarc Blues, Heartfixer Music, and back again on Alligator Records.

As a career writing and playing the blues will do, change is inevitable. After six albums in nine years on Alligator, Capricorn was going through a revival. It was a natural progression for Tinsley to move to Capricorn Records with influences Widespread Panic, Gov't Mule and Col. Bruce Hampton, ret.

Tinsley continued shopping new albums through two more releases and the magic between Tinsley and Alligator came back in 2005 for the release of Tinsley's Live Highwayman. The next step for Tinsley materialized as he launched his own label, Heartfixer Music where he released four more albums including the all instrumental Get It in 2013.

In 2018, the marriage was on again as Tinsley and Alligator again took the blues trail together as Tinsley released Winning Hand and in 2020, Ice Cream in Hell. The title came to Ellis as he thought about how much you see when you're on the road. How hard it can be on the road. That's the hell.

"But the payoff is the music," said Tinsley. "That's the ice cream."

The CD features 11 songs of raw, guitar drenched experience inspired by B.B., Albert and Freddie King as well as Hound Dog Taylor, Carlos Santana, and others. Rolling Stone describes Tinsley's style, "...feral blues guitar...." Ice Cream in Hell debuted #1 on

iTunes Blues Albums. Check out the CD. Check out the shows.

The venue is often overlooked as part of the experience. Consider seeing Tinsley at one or more shows next month. Be part of different musical communities and show your support. These gigs are all short drives apart. See a second show or spend the night and experience the community. Save the venue's home page as a favorite to check out in the future. Without these venues, there is only busking on the corner or gigging in your garage to ourselves.

March 18. The Triple Door, Seattle, Washington. An awesome venue with a clean and crisp sound system. Seating is dinner theater style with comfortable tables and booths at different levels. The Triple Door which is in the historic Mann Building that originally hosted vaudeville 100 years ago was re-purposed to a music venue meant to connect the performers to the audience.

March 19. Seasons Performance Hall, Yakima, Washington. This venue, 100 years old, was built as a former church. The Seasons opened in 2005 as an acoustically pure venue in a gorgeous historical building. The staff's goal is to give you the experience of a lifetime.

March 20. Jack London Revue, Portland, Oregon. The Jack London combines the classic speak easy feel in a historic basement Jazz club with the modern bells & whistles of a cutting edge 21st century music club. This Portland music shrine constantly books local, national and international acts giving the music fans a variety of entertainment in an incredibly intimate setting.

March 21. The Capitol Theater, Olympia, Washington. Also serving the community for nearly 100 years, this is the largest venue that Tinsley will play on this tour to the Pacific Northwest. Reopened in 1986, this more traditional theater seating combines

conventional theater service for Film Festivals and concerts alike. The attention to artists of the Blues community continues as the Capitol Theater plays host to local and national acts.

Thinking about Derek Trucks and Johnny Lang, I asked Tinsley about how he gives back to the blues by mentoring other artists.

He says he goes out as much as he can to see what music is happening in the local music scenes. When he comes across talented people of all ages who "...have their shit together," this is when he shares some of the lessons he has learned. Tinsley is also very quick to add that he's learned from them, too.

In closing our conversation, I wanted to see who Tinsley thought we should keep an open ear and open mind to. He was quick to suggest both Christone "Kingfish" Ingram and Jontavius Willis. Many Bluesletter readers will know that these guys have played the Pacific Northwest.

Have you seen them?



It all happens within the beautiful Resort on Lake Coeur d'Alene, including a cruise on the lake, March 31st through April 2nd! This year, the Coeur d'Alene Blues Festival has some real surprises.

Featured headliners combine two 2022 Blues Music Award winners: Mike Zito on the Blues Music Award for Blues Rock Album;" and Albert Castiglia won for Blues Rock Artist. They have combined their bands and will be playing together for us as blood brothers on the festival's stage! Produced by Joe Bonamassa and Josh Smith, this will be an opportunity to see Mike Zito and Albert Castiglia touring in support of their new Blood Brothers album. The new CD is a much anticipated collaboration and seen here first in the Pacific Northwest.

This year's festival also features a true soul legend, Johnny Rawls. In fact, the term "soul blues" was invented to describe his music. With a career spanning more than 50 years, he's done it all. He's an internationally recognized recording artist, music producer, and songwriter who tours extensively throughout North America and overseas. The Blues Music Awards (and its predecessor, the W.C. Handy Awards) has frequently recognized Johnny's work. To date, 10 of Johnny's albums have been nominated for Soul Blues Album of the Year, with I'm Still Around winning in 2019.

The festival is also proud to bring a true iconic icon of roots music, Maria Muldaur. Despite being best known for her 1974 pop mega-hit "Midnight at the Oasis," which received several Grammy nominations, and enshrined her forever in the hearts of Baby Boomers, Maria has toured worldwide and has recorded 41 solo albums covering all kinds of roots music, and she has now settled comfortably into her favorite idiom, the blues. Maria has so many awards and



nominations, there's only space for a few.

Her critically acclaimed 2001 Stony Plain Records release, Richland Woman Blues, was nominated for a Grammy and for a Blues Music Award, as was the follow up to that album, Sweet Lovin' Ol' Soul. Maria Muldaur & Her Garden of Joy garnered Maria a 5th Grammy nomination and was also nominated for a Blues Music Award.

In 2011, Maria released Steady Love, what she called "Bluesiana Music," her own brand of New Orleans-flavored Blues, R&B and "Swamp Funk." Steady Love reached #1 on the Living Blues Chart, and garnered her another nomination for a Best Traditional Female Blues Artist award from the Blues Foundation. For her 40th CD in 2012, Maria produced the acclaimed First Came Memphis Minnie, a loving tribute to the pioneering blues woman, and in 2018, Maria released her 41st CD, Don't You Feel My Leg -The Naughty Bawdy Blues of Blue Lu Barker, which was nominated for a Grammy in the Best Traditional Blues category. In Sept. 2019, the Americana Music Association awarded Maria a Lifetime Achievement Americana Trailblazer Award.

There are 11 other acts appearing at the festival from all over the Pacific Northwest. SideStep with Max Daniels kick off shows on the Main Stage. Max is the popular leader



of Nu Jack City, and SideStep is a trio of the Spokane area's best musicians from various funk/soul bands.


The Blues Cruise will keep two boats rocking with two newer powerful acts, Justyn Priest and Natasha's Force of Nature.






