Challenge acts. Our Pacific Northwest Showcase featured 12 different acts in a four-hour extravaganza with nonstop music (with the set changes done < 1 minute!).

Our band and solo/duo represented the Evergreeen State with great sets of music! The international showcase on Tuesday was a great example of how talented the bands and solo/duos from around the world have become. The 2023 talent level was one of the highest I have ever seen. However, looming over everything was the loss of another young man before his time. I'm writing about Tyre Nichols, a young black man that was killed in a tragic and unforgettable manner. So many different emotions, and uncertainties, impacted many in Memphis. Some were afraid that there would be rioting, some felt it would impact the IBCs, and others thought it would not be an issue. For the most part, it didn't impact the IBCs, and Beale Street was peaceful and filled with music.

For me, it was a sad reminder, and I was filled with so many thoughts about this senseless death and loss of life of another man. I am tired of learning about so many young people who leave us so early. It really doesn't even matter what the circumstances were, it is just time this stops! What can you do? Please use your voice and speak out against these tragedies. I consider the blues community as a grassroots group of people, and that is where true change begins! In my 60+ years on Earth, I have seen great things happen, and it's time we made some more happen! From civil rights, a man on the moon, to many other accomplishments. Join me, in your own way, and raise your voice end these senseless losses!

Finally, I wanted to acknowledge unintentional errors in last month's BB Awards ballot. We have worked to correct the ballot and ask for your understanding as we are all volunteers working to improve the blues society for everyone. Best of luck to each of this year's nominees!

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LETTER FROM THE EDITOR



Hi Bluesletter Readers,

I'm slowly getting the hang of putting this publication together every month. It's been fun getting a look behind the scenes. Now I want to give you a look behind the scenes! Earlier this month, Rick Bowen, our Vice President, added me to the Google Workspace that everyone shares on the Blues Society board. I quickly discovered that the Bluesletter gets a firehose of email every day. All month long there are people

contacting us about ads, about upcoming shows, about stories they would like to write or get someone else to write, about newsworthy events coming up, and about CDs that we need to review.

As the content deadline of the fifth of the month approaches, stories start pouring in from writers. Then people on the board start looking over some of the content coming in, and there starts to be panic emails. Someone's name has been misspelled on the award nominee list. A photo we need has come in the wrong format. We can't find the copy we thought we had for a festival preview.

Then there are emails about procedure-the deadline for the award nominations turned out to be so close to the deadline for the February Bluesletter content that getting everything counted, formatted, spell-checked and verified was an all-hands-on-deck situation that caused some anxiety and angst and required us to hold the presses for about 24 hours, which is almost unheard of.

Somehow, retiring editor Eric Steiner has historically managed all this chaos with very few organizational tools-he seems to have a steel trap of a brain that knows what content we have, what we expect, and where everything is and he just put it all together in InDesign every month. I start to hyperventilate at the very thought, so I'm building systems to organize and track everything that's coming in.

I also got a bit of a behind-the-scenes look at the nomination process for the Washington Blues Society BB Awards. One thing I know that many people are not aware of is that nominations are NOT done by the board, or by any other designated group, as is the case with Oscars or Grammys. Rather, nominations come from Washington Blues Society members. Any member can nominate anyone for awards in any of the categories for which they qualify by filling out and mailing in the nomination forms that appear in the back of the Bluesletter in December and January, or by filling out the online nomination form in those months.

Once we hit the deadline, one of our volunteers counts all the nominations and puts them in a spreadsheet. The top three nominationgetters make it to the ballot, which appears in the back of this Bluesletter, unless there are ties, in which case the number of nominees on the ballot may increase.

What surprised me to learn was how few nomination forms we get. The most nominations any single individual got in any category was 17, and that was about three times what most nominees got. Most people or bands or albums don't get more than four or five nominations. A lot of people make the list with just three nominations-often, I suspect, from the other members of their bands who nominate them out of loyalty and team spirit, which is a very reasonable thing to do.

What this means is that if you are a fan of a particular band or musician or graphic artist, by simply adding your nomination to the lot, you can very easily make the difference between someone making the ballot and someone not making the ballot.

As many musicians do, I have mixed feelings about awards. I have greatly appreciated the awards for which I have been nominated and those I have won these last 25 years. They really do help us get work and the vote of appreciation from my peers and music lovers out there feels good.

But as long as it remains a very small group of people filling out nomination forms, it will continue to be a small group of people who make it to the annual ballot. There are many, many tremendous artists out there who therefor don't get recognized. There's a keyboard player in Seattle who used to play for Little Milton who has never been nominated. There's an R&B singer who was once signed to Stevie Wonder's record label, who has her own Wikipedia page and who has an Emmy among her accolades who has never won an award from our society. A guy who has played harmonica with Eric Bibb, among others, one of the nation's top players and teachers, has never gotten a plaque from us for his work.

One of my major goals as editor of this publication is to get more folks involved in nominating deserving artists for awards. I challenge blues lovers in this region to take notice of the music you see and hear this year, at festivals, in church, at concerts large and small, and on the radio, and think of them during next year's nomination cycle. You might be the reason that person finally gets a nomination they have deserved for decades. And as an artist, I can tell you, those recognitions feel good, and they can be a lamp in the dark nights of discouragement that will inevitably strike any artist over the course of a long career, a light that reminds us that we do have support and there are people who care.

Greater Works Gospel Choir Highlight at MLK Celebration

DaNell Daymon and Greater Works is one of the area's most prominent choirs, touring nationally,

Emotion was high at South Seattle College's Brockey Center in West Seattle Friday, January 13. It was the 50th anniversary of the college's first celebration of the life of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., and more than 400 people filled the room in his remembrance.

Many people shed tears during the keynote speech from Reverend Sharon Washington Risher, whose mother and several other family members were killed in a race-motivated attack on Emanuel African Methodist Episcopal Church in Charleston, South Carolina the evening of June 17, 2015. Risher reflected on the many accomplishments of the Civil Rights movement in the United States and the work that remains to be done.

Then joy followed as awards were given to organizations who fought for racial justice, and scholarships were given to promising young students. And through it all, the outpouring of emotion found expression during several powerful performances by DaNell Daymon and Greater Works, a non-denominational choir made up of many of the area's top gospel performers whose renditions of the Black National Anthem, "We Shall Overcome," and the gospel classic "Revelations 19" brought the audience to its feet.

It was the 18-year-old choir's 18th appearance at the annual event, and with good reason. DaNell Daymon and Greater Works is one of the area's most prominent choirs, touring nationally, recording albums, and even in 2015 taking a highly regarded turn on America's Got Talent, where they survived four episodes and made it to the semifinals.

For Sandra Allen, the soloist who took the lead on the choir's performance of "Revelations 19," working with the choir is one of the rewards of a life working in gospel music.

"It's about expression," she said. "There is not another expression like it. When you are lost for words, it's art that takes you to the next level. It's addictive."

Allen has been addicted since she was 3.

"My first memory on the planet was singing at New Age Baptist Church in Seattle in the presence of my mother, grandmother, and great-grandmother," she said.

Her family has a long tradition in the church; her father and grandfather were both pastors, and she spent most of her youth in the Tri-Cities, where her grandfather, S. A. Allen, was the pastor of the Morningstar Baptist Church in Pasco.

Since then, she has become a vocal coach, top area gospel singer, and a member of the worship team at Greater Life Church in Lakewood. And she has been with DaNell Daymon and Greater Works for the last 11 years.

Going on America's Got Talent was one of the best experiences of her singing career, she said. But it was not easy.

"Those are long working days," she said. "It's not as glamorous as people think. It's long days and you're in heels the whole time."

But meeting the Make-A-Wish kids who wanted to get photos with the choir made it worth it. So did multiple standing ovations from the judges. And the audience response was the best thing of all.

"I've never felt that much energy from an audience," she said. "That place was on fire when we got done."

Being a member of the tight-knit gospel music community has also brought other exciting opportunities, such as joining Stevie Wonder on stage at Climate Pledge Arena in 2014. In fact, such opportunities are not uncommon for top area gospel singers, she said.

"When someone big like Michael Bublé comes, they will call and ask who are the big gospel choirs and the big directors to sing backup," she said. The directors will call and invite singers they know and trust to join the team for the show.

"I get to do cool stuff sometimes," she said with a smile.

For DaNell Daymon, founding the choir was a great opportunity to continue the musical tradition he'd grown up with in Rochester, New York, after a career in the U.S. Navy

brought him to the Pacific Northwest.

"We just did auditions, found singers, did recordings, traveled, and entered choir competitions for many years," he said. "It's something that's been near and dear to me. A lot of doors have been opened to me, nationally and internationally, and it's been an amazing journey."

In fact, one such opening door took him away from the Pacific Northwest in 2016, when he was offered a full-time position making music at a very large church in Washington D.C. While there, Daymon expanded the Greater Works choir to include a branch in the nation's capital. Now the choir includes members from across the country, including from his home state of New York.

Now family life has brought him back to the coast, where the Greater Works choir keeps him very busy.

After the show at the Seattle Community College, the choir was on the road for several more days, wrapping up Martin Luther King Day observations with a show in Portland, Oregon.

Allen said that it was no surprise that singers

from Washington's thriving gospel music scene have gone on to achieve remarkable things. For example, Grammy-winning opera star J'Nai Bridges, who in January starred in "Samson and Delilah" with the Seattle Opera, started out in a Tacoma church. Neo-soul sensation Allen Stone started out on the worship team at his father's church near Chewellah. And Ayron Jones, whose rock and roll career recently had him opening for the Rolling Stones in Paris, began his singing career in Seattle area churches.

"When you are in the choir, it's about whosever will, let him come," said Allen. "So you get that talent, and in there, there are a whole lot of diamonds."

Both Allen and Daymon were excited to hear of the Washington Bluesletter's interest in the area gospel scene.

"You can't not talk about blues when you're talking about gospel!" Allen said. "And vice versa!"

How I Became "Double H"

"I got hooked, to the point where I asked my boss to change my work schedule."

I am "Double H." This stage name reflects the fact that I have cerebral palsy, yet I play the blues harp. Hence, I am the "Handicapped Harpist," AKA "Double H."

My love affair with the harmonica began when I was a child. I grew up in Des Moines, halfway between Seattle and Tacoma. However, my mom is originally from Montana. Every year, we'd go back there to visit family, including my grandfather. He had been an amateur harmonica player. He knew a few songs, though not blues songs. And, he always had a few harmonicas sitting on the coffee table.

Mom and grandpa would sit and visit about boring adult stuff. To entertain myself, I would grab one of his harmonicas and play around with it. I didn't know any tunes. I just had fun making noise on the thing. And it was particularly fun when I discovered that I could make it sound like a train. Little did I know that the "Train Chug" is actually one of the first skills taught to people learning the instrument.

After high school one day, I thought, "Maybe I should learn to play something on the harmonica. I should see if I can actually make music on the thing."

By ear, I taught myself "Amazing Grace." And it wouldn't be until many years later that I had learned to play it in 12th position. Thirty years ago, I knew nothing of playing the harmonica in different positions. Hell, I knew practically nothing about music. I only knew it sounded right.

For most of the next 25 years, I just pulled the harmonica out once in a while, just to mess around with it and teach myself a melody or two. Throughout all that time, I rarely played for other people. I thought nobody would ever want to hear my playing. Despite knowing what notes to play on a song like "Amazing Grace," cerebral palsy limits my muscular coordination. My movements are jerky, rather than smooth.

Hence, my playing was not very smooth,

Who'd ever want to listen to that?

As for blues harmonica, I was a big fan. I've always loved blues music with a harp in it. And I had purchased a couple compilation albums that featured songs by the likes of Sonny Boy Williamson, Big Walter Horton, Junior Wells, Charlie Musselwhite, and Magic Dick. I loved that stuff!

But to play it? Forget about it! They were doing stuff on the harp that I figured I'd never be able to do. So, I didn't even try to learn blues harp. There was just no way this man with cerebral palsy would ever be able to play that stuff. To try, I thought, would be setting myself up for failure.

Now, one instrument I could handle was a tambourine. Ironically, despite my handicap, I have a good sense of timing and rhythm. And I am quite adept at beating my thigh with a tambourine.

I tell you this because, about seven years ago, I was sitting in church with the lovely woman who is now my wife. The worship team led us in an up-tempo, rousing praise

I kept thinking, "Where's a tambourine when I need one?"

At the end of the service, I approached Bret, the Worship Leader, and said, "That song needs a tambourine, and I know how to play tambourine."

For about two seconds, he had a blank stare, as he pondered my words.

"You're right," said Bret. "That song does need a tambourine. I tell ya what. Next time we do that one, we'll get you onstage and have you play tambourine."

Six weeks later, he sent me a text, saying, "I need your tambourine at church this weekend. Are you available?"

I texted that I was available, then tentatively stuck my toe into the water. I then said, "I also kind of know how to play the

harmonica, and I own two or three. Would you like me to bring them?"

Bret told me to bring them. That weekend, as the Worship Team's "Special Guest," I played tambourine on the fast songs and harmonica on the slow ones. After that, the opportunities gradually became more frequent, until I actually became a member of one of the church's three Worship Teams.

One day, a couple years after that first time I joined them, I showed up for practice. Bret was the only one there, so far. He was sitting at the piano, playing something that sounded a lot like the blues.

"That's cool!" I exclaimed. "Are we playing that this weekend?" after he said yes, I asked, "What key are you in?"

He was in the key of A. So, I grabbed my A harp and fell in with him. And though I'd never played the blues before, it came out decent. I even played a solo on "All My Hope."

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This started my journey into learning blues harp. Because I realized that if our church was going to do bluesy worship songs, then I'd better start learning to play blues on the harmonica.

At that time, I'd heard of playing "Cross-Harp," but had no idea what that meant. So, I got online and started learning what that meant. I learned, not only that blues in the key of G is played on a C harmonica, but why. I studied the Circle of Fifths, and I memorized which harmonica to use for a given key.

I also got on YouTube and started watching videos on how to play blues harmonica. I started learning some basic riffs. I learned about the 12-bar progression.

I started learning about various techniques, such as warbles and bent notes. I couldn't do them very well. In fact, I sometimes still struggle with some of the techniques.

When you have cerebral palsy, some things are just naturally harder to do. But, I began working on those things, despite my doubts about how much progress I'd ever be able to make.

Several months after beginning this learning process, my church had its annual Connection Day, a day intended for us to reach out and connect with the community. The event features a classic car show, free food, games for the kids, and live music.

At this Connection Day, the music was provided by a local band called Boogie Chillin.' They played some rock 'n' roll, and they also played some blues music. I loved that!

When this three-piece band finished, I did something that is probably as inappropriate as anything could be. I introduced myself, told them I'd been learning blues harmonica, and asked if they'd ever thought about adding a harmonica player to the band.

Graciously, they didn't tell me to go do

something sexual to myself. Instead, they said: "No, we're not looking to add anyone to the band. But we do host a Blues Jam every Thursday night, down at Purdy's Public House in Sumner. Come by some Thursday night, and we'll get you up onstage."

I work nights, and at the time, I worked on Thursday nights. But these guys told me to come by, if I ever get a Thursday night off work.

A couple months later, I had a bit of vacation time to use, enabling me to go two or three times. Having never heard me before, the guys had no qualms about letting this handicapped guy get onstage and play harmonica.

Was I any good?

Compared to where I am now, no. I was terrible. Looking back, it is amazing to see the level at which I did not know what I did not know. But it was fun, and they encouraged me to come back.

I got hooked, to the point where I asked my boss to change my work schedule, so I could go to this jam every week. Now, I am one of the most regular faces you will see at this jam. I am there almost every single week.

And, it has paid off. Somebody once told me that the quickest way to improve as a musician is by attending jam sessions like this one. I can testify that this is true. Because people have noticed my improvement at church.

In fact, our pastor once came to me and said, "You've been going to that Jam on Thursday nights, and I can tell. I've never heard you sound better than you did today."

And on Thursday night, it is not uncommon for someone to ask me, "Are you playing tonight? When are they going to get you up onstage? We want to hear your harmonica,"

So much for my previous thought that nobody would ever want to hear me play.

But you know, it's all taught me a couple of valuable lessons. It has taught me, first of all,

that I was, and am, capable of improving. It is probably very true that, up until a few years ago, nobody would have wanted to hear me play the harmonica. I was bad; really bad. But when I decided to take it seriously, and actually learn how to play this instrument, my physical handicap did not keep me from improving, to the point where, now, people look forward to my playing.

The other lesson I have learned is that I don't have to be as good as Sonny Boy Williamson, Junior Wells, or any of the other harpists I enjoy listening to. I only have to be as good as I can be. That's all anyone can do, anyway, with or without cerebral palsy.





March Previews: Blues on the Road!

Join the Washington Blues Society in welcoming nationally touring artists to the Evergreen State this month!

With new editor Polly O'Keary's encouragement, I'm bringing back my summary of nationally touring artists scheduled to play in Washington to let readers who who's on tour this month in my "Blues on the Road" column. My primary sources of tour information include the award-winning Pollstar. com website, and artist, record label, and promoter resources available online.

The following is just a sampling of artists that will play Washington state this month, and all information was current as of press time. Please note that this is not a comprehensive list of nationally touring artists who will play in Washington this month. Instead, it's a series of my suggestions for Bluesletter readers to catch live shows that I would enjoy.

Legendary guitar slinger Walter Trout returns to Seattle for two shows on the 7th and 8th at Dimitriou's Jazz Alley. Walter's 2022 CD on the Mascot/Provogue label, Ride, debuted at #1 on the Billboard Blues Chart and the UK Jazz/Blues Chart.

Curtis Salgado will play two shows at Seattle's Triple Door on the 10th just before he joins Alligator Records labelmate Tinsley Ellis the next night in Tacoma. Welcome Tinsley Ellis back to the region on the 10th at Seasons Performance Hall in Yakima, followed by a show with Curtis Salgado on the 11th at McMenamin's Spanish Ballroom in Tacoma. Tinsley also plays Seattle's Triple Door with Alligator recording artist Marcia Ball on the 12th.

Following two shows at the Orpheum in Vancouver, British Columbia, singersongwriter John Mellencamp returns to Seattle's Paramount Theatre as on the 15th as part of his 76-night "2023 Live and in Person" tour presented by AEG Presents and sponsored by Turner Classic Movies. I hope his set list includes blues from his

Trouble No More CD as well as his most recent songs sung with Bruce Springsteen, "Did You Say Such a Thing?" and "Wasted

Playing for Change contributor Chris Pierce opens for whom I consider one of America's most iconic and signature troubadours, Ramblin' Jack Elliott, at Seattle's Tractor Tavern on the 12th. This is a rare opportunity to experience an artist who toured with Woody Guthrie, and later mentored a young Bob Dylan in the 60s. Ramblin' Jack was one of the many sparks on Bob Dylan's Rolling Thunder Revue tour in the 1970s. When I was in high school, it was fun following the revue's antics with playwright Sam Shepard, Beat poet Allen Ginsberg and singer Ronee Blakeley in Rolling Stone magazine. I hope (and pray) that I'm as active as Ramblin' Jack when I'm in my early 90s!

Former Bluesletter cover subject Vanessa Collier plays Dimitriou's Jazz Alley in Seattle on the 15th and 16th, and I'm particularly impressed with her songwriting and saxophone playing skills (and, Vanessa is a multiple Blues Music Award recipient as well as a Blues Blast Music Award winner, too!). On her 2019 Honey Up! national tour, Vanessa Collier played two well-received shows at the 24th Mt. Baker Rhythm and Blues Festival.

Spokane welcomes Americana artist Ryan Adams to the Fox Theatre on the 16th, and later that week on the 20th, George Thorogood & the Destroyers play The Pavilion at the Northern Quest Casino in nearby Airway Heights. I burned through several copies of George Thorogood & the Delaware Destroyers' first two LPs as an undergraduate at Illinois State University in Normal in the 70s, and George was a very important "gateway blues artist" for me as he led me directly to Elmore James' "The Sky is Crying" and "Madison Blues." Thorogood's "One Bourbon, One Scotch,

One Beer" is also a supercharged, textbook nod that led me to John Lee Hooker.

If you missed Los Lobos last month at Seattle's Triple Door, welcome "Just Another Band from East L.A." back on the 23rd at the Washington Center for the Performing Arts in Olympia, and then on the 24th at the Mount Baker Theatre in Bellingham. Los Lobos is much more than their 1987 radio hit, "La Bamba." Each time I've seen Los Lobos, I've marveled at how they have effortlessly weaved Chicano history, songs, and rhythms into their sets. I particularly like their CD of covers, *Native* Son, which includes Jackson Browne's "Jamaica Say You Will" and Buffalo Springfield's politically charged anthem from the 60s, "For What It's Worth."

After a short weekend news fast earlier this year, I played that Buffalo Springfield song from 1966, and was disappointed

that the message from Steven Stills, Neil Young, Ritchie Furay, Bruce Palmer, and Dewey Martin still resonates as loudly today as it did during the protests against the Vietnam War when I was young.


Finally, I ask *Bluesletter* readers to please celebrate Maria Muldaur's birthday this year on the 29th as she brings her Bluesiana Band to Seattle's Triple Door, Bellingham's Mount Baker Theatre on the 30th, and Yakima's Seasons Performance Hall on the 31st. Personally, it's hard for me to believe that I first heard Maria Muldaur's hit, "Midnight at the Oasis, 50 years ago, and I have enjoyed each of her CDs reimagining the blues of Memphis Minnie and Blue Lu Barker.

During the pandemic, she worked with

New Orleans' Tuba Skinny on her 43rd album in 2021, Let's Get Happy Together, which was nominated for a Blues Music Award Best Acoustic Album and received an award for Best Traditional Jazz Album in New Orleans' Offbeat Magazine's Best of the Beat Awards. I remember the first time I saw Maria Muldaur at Seattle's Highway 99 Blues Club. She sang "Oasis" just fine, but I was much more impressed with the way she delivered a solid set of traditional blues from start to finish. Memphis Minnie and Blue Lu Barker would be justifiably proud!

The Rumba Kings: From Greece to the Blues

"Love from Mykonos" exudes the Mediterranean and Latin backgrounds of the Rumba Kings..."

"I was sitting on my deck looking towards the west as the sun began to set over Mykonos, Greece, and the Aegean Sea. Mykonos is set off the southeast coast of Greece in the warm Aegean waters north of the Mediterranean Sea."

Bassist, producer, and songwriter Johnny Bacolis remembers everything about the scene and remembers sipping on a scotch while taking in the whitewashed buildings of Mykonos with their iconic blue roofs.

The 1938 law decreeing whitewashing all buildings in the Cycladic Islands (Islands just off of the Greek mainland) with white limestone as limestone was thought to be a powerful disinfectant meant to fight the Cholera outbreak of the era.

The whitewashed buildings with their blue roofs reflect the colors of the national flag of Greece as well as the blue waters of the Aegean with their whitecaps. Warm and moist winds blow from the Aegean and over the arid lands of Mykonos like a moist kiss. The scents of fig trees and sea salt over the sound of the waves bring alternating classic Greek island sensations as the afternoon drifts to evening.

The setting rays of the sun project their colors over the whitewashed houses as the glass of scotch again beckons. The Bluetooth speaker he brought is cued up with a demo of the Rumba Kings latest album as the single "Love from Mykonos" joins the sights and smells.

Written by the Rumba Kings' co-founder George Stevens, "Love from Mykonos," exudes the Mediterranean and Latin backgrounds of the Rumba Kings. A perfect soundtrack for the moment and the inspiration for the supporting videos shot around Mykonos and Santorini.

The scenic vistas from Mykonos seem a long way from the blues of America, but there is



a groove in blues known as a blues rhumba groove. This groove you can hear in Albert King's "Crosscut Saw," and especially notable on B.B. King's "Woke Up This Morning" on his seminal 1956 release Live at the Regal.

Still don't hear the connection? How about the blues rhumba groove also present on the Yardbirds version of "For Your Love" to "Black Magic Woman" by Fleetwood Mac all the way through to "Don't Lie to Me (I Get Evil)" by Garry Moore, B.B. King, Albert King and The Rolling Stones. Even Los Lobos and Carlos Santana loosely use the blues rhumba groove in their music.

With that, we are going to take trip with the Rumba Kings to the full rumba side of the rhumba blues groove and their newest releases as they ramp up for their four shows at The Triple Door in Seattle. An early and late show each on Friday, March 3rd and Saturday March 4th. I saw one of their shows in late 2022 and the combination of the sights and sounds of the Rumba Kings, their guests on stage and a super comfortable venue with an exceptional staff provided an incomparable evening made to just let go and have a great

KNKX is again behind the Rumba Kings as they present the shows at the Triple Door this month. One of the nation's most popular public radio stations serving our community since 1966, KNKX's usual gig is bringing us the genre of blues and jazz over the radio waves. As with this article, they are exploring the pure rhumba side of the rumba blues groove.

The relationship between the Rumba Kings and KNKX goes back several years. Johnny describes their first encounter four or five years ago when the Rumba Kings were playing regular Thursday night gigs in Bellevue. The residency helped the band gain fans and exposure as well as bring in new and regular patrons to the venue. The performances were so successful that the Rumba Kings were tapped to play a slot at the 2018 annual Bellevue Blues and Jazz Festival as one of the headliners. With KNKX being all about the

blues, jazz and the community, the Rumba Kings' unique set led to an in-studio performance on KNKX that was so well-received that two more in studio performances followed.

The longevity of a band can be short-lived, or its life can be traced back with a succession of successes and fate. So is the case with the Rumba Kings as Johnny Bacolis remembers having a vision for a new band back around 2010. He heard of another incredible musician who was playing at The Loft in Edmonds. That musician was George Stevens (front man/songwriter/lead guitarist/lead bouzouki). When Johnny saw and heard George that day, he was amazed and thought that the two could meld their styles into that vision.

Johnny asked George to meet him later at his studio and as the two played and talked, they both saw that they had similar visions for their dream group. In 2015, Johnny and George co-founded the Rumba Kings. They worked to make their dreams real as they wrote songs that pulled from their heritage and played with other musicians finding their way to that distinctive sound of the Rumba Kings.

The Rumba Kings really morphed into two bands with the same regional inspirations and song base, but one had a special sound for the studio. The other took those same influences in the direction of a live band. Inspired by the rumba of the Mediterranean, the rich history of Latin music and the likes of Chico Bouchikhi and Nicolas Reyes of the Gipsy Kings, the Rumba Kings put their full efforts into working on their first album.

In early 2016, Johnny Bacolas and George Stevens formed the band for live shows. Two lifetimes of music and influences came together. Two lifetimes of live performances and recording led to a band that the two had dreamed about and was now being brought to life.

The new Rumba Kings were performing around Seattle in small bars/clubs as they found the magic and found what needed more work. Fans started to respond to the passion coming from the stage and identified with the enjoyment that each show generated. Gigs were more and more crowded and venue size grew. More and more people heard about the excitement and wanted to be part of it.

With an outstanding set of studio musicians, they started production on their first album, *The Instrumental and Vocal Sessions, Vol. 1.* The album was a double disc venture released in 2018, which took advantage of technology and authenticity. Authenticity due to Johnny and George's background and influences and authenticity based on using musicians from Greece. Producer Johnny Bacolis used technology to mesh the musicians in Greece with the musicians in the USA through both MP3 and live inter-country mixes.

The album received continued support from KNKX as well as Seattle area newspapers. The dream that was birthed that day in the studio eight years earlier was exuding off the stage, touching fans and beckoning reality!

By 2019, The Rumba Kings released their second album, The Instrumental Sessions, Vol. II. They continued to grow towards their dream, but as is the case with many of the musicians I have covered in the pages of the Bluesletter, COVID-19 put the brakes on this growth.

But the dream was not extinguished by the extended quarantine. The dream was still very alive in Johnny and George, and they continued to work hard and focus on their dream. They released three quarantine videos in 2020. They also found ways to upgrade their live show hoping the pandemic would subside and the fans would still remember the fun that they had at their live shows.

Working with composer Seth-May Patter-

son, Rumba Kings music director Johnny Bacolis integrated one of the area's top string quartets, Arcobelano Strings, into their live show experience. The stage was set with experience, lifelong heritage inspiration and burning passion. So many elements seamlessly worked together finally brought the dream they had more than 10 years earlier to life. They continue to incorporate other artists they respect into their live shows.

"This is how George and I always envisioned our shows when we were planning them early on," said Johnny.. "It's pure class. It's a like night out at the legendary Copacabana in the 40s in New York."

Keeping in line with their influences, George adds, "If it isn't beautiful, it doesn't make the cut."



The monthly Washington Blues Society Blues Bash continues with live events on the 2nd and 4th Tuesdays of the month. On the 14th at the all-ages Aurora Borealis, 16708 Aurora Avenue North in Shoreline, and on the 28th at the 21+ CCR Sports and Entertainment, 215 Cypress Avenue North in Snohomish.

The first Blues Bash features Seattle's Elliot Bay Blues Band and guitarist Joe Hellmore.

The second Blues Bash has another pair of first time bash performers: the Best Day Ever duo of Barb Henry Kahawai and Seattle veterans Jeff and the Jet City Fliers.

The monthly Blues Bashes are presented free, and all are welcome. We will have a door prize raffle with prizes including tickets to Jazz Alley and the Neptune Theater in Seattle, and more. We encourage everyone to tip the band to support their volunteer performances. The following is a brief introduction to each Blues Bash act.


