#### Hi Blues Fans,

In this issue, we celebrate Alice Stuart, her Hall of Fame career, and her musical legacy. Over the many years I have known Alice, I got to know her and we became good friends. She was an amazing person, and I found her history inspiring.

She came to Seattle after graduating from high school in Chelan all by herself, got a job, and figured out what she wanted to do! At that time, this was a very uncommon thing for a young woman to do. Fortunately for her she settled in the University District and met some of the local musicians from the music scene that had developed there. She found her life's work, spent many years in Seattle, and started her long path in becoming a foundational artist who opened doors for women to be professional musicians. She spent several years here and learned from some of Seattle's best musicians at that time. It quickly became apparent that Alice had talent and passion to express her self and her ideas.

After spending several years in Seattle, she moved south to California and was quickly noticed and really started making a name for herself. She played the Berkeley Folk Festival, was invited back for a second and a third time which was not common for a new musician. In California, she met a "who's who" of professional musicians and played with many well-known performers such as Mississippi John Hurt, Frank Zappa, and Van Morrison. By the mid 70s, she was well established, credited with opening the doors for women to play lead guitar and front their own bands!

Later, she returned to Seattle and started her band that most of us know, "Alice Stuart and the Formerlys".

Some of my favorite moments working with Alice when she decided to try her luck in Memphis at the International Blues Challenge. We spent a lot of time together doing the fundraising for the trip and she did well as the solo/duo representative for the Washington Blues Society. I also worked with her at many other gigs and always enjoyed our time together. She was a one-of-a-kind performer and is recognized by many for opening doors for women in music. I will miss Alice and her friendship. She was truly one of best!

#### LETTER FROM THE EDITOR



This issue is courtesy of Eric Steiner. I'm on tour right now, and the tour is going very well, and part of the reason it's going very well is that we have a heavy schedule. I have been able to do very little on this issue, but Eric stepped up and made it happen.

He had already said he would try to cover for me some while I was on tour, and he had the September issue just about all organized and ready to go, and then we lost Alice

Stuart. To say that Alice was a giant in Pacific Northwest blues doesn't do her importance justice. She is a giant in the history of women in music. The best source I know to read her whole story is online at Historylink.org, which is a lot more informative than Wikipedia. Suffice it to say, she was a huge deal in the seethingly brilliant music world of the early 1960-70s, a lead guitarist, bandleader, and widely respected blues/folk musician at a time when women in music were seldom taken as seriously as were men.

For me, Alice Stuart represented a woman who lived a fully realized, almost magical life. She was in the Mothers of Invention and had a brief romance with Frank Zappa. She toured with top acts of the 1960s and 1970s. She was a close friend of John Fogerty. She recorded on Chris Strackwitz' Arhoolie Records label, arguably the most consequential folk label of the era. She lived in Los Angeles when it seemed like everything exciting in American music was happening there and elsewhere in California.

I've always had a nostalgia for the 1960s, even though I wasn't born yet. She was right where I would like to imagine myself: a full participant in the art renaissance. The cover of her album *Full Time Woman*, released in 1970 on Fanstasy Records, epitomizes how I see her in that era. She's leaning down from her motorcycle to kiss her young child. You get the sense she's going on the road (although touring from a motorcycle would be tricky) and kissing her kid goodbye. She's a full-time woman, a musician in charge of her own life who also can be a mother. It was a transgressive image at the time; women were supposed to be the ones who stayed with the kids while the men went adventuring and writing poignant but manly songs like "Freebird" and "Ramble On" about it. And women generally sat on the back of the motorcycle.

Every time we lose someone like Alice, it feels like we've lost a link back to a time in which people still had the gumption to change the world. Alice and her generation of musicians and artists had audacity. They remade culture to suit themselves with the sort of righteous fervor I associate with the French Revolution; reckless



but certain that change was vital and they were the ones to bring it about. Taj Mahal once commented that Alice Stuart had cut the road that Bonnie Raitt walked. Alice and a handful of ferociously talented women like her cut the road all of us have walked ever since. I'm out here walking it now. As I write, I'm sitting in the lobby of a La Quinta Inn in Nashville, with my portable office all spread out around me.

We just wrapped up a very successful, but also very grueling, couple of weeks in the Midwest, and tomorrow we start our tour of the Southeast, with dates in Tennessee, North and South Carolina and Florida before making our way back along the Gulf Coast and up through Texas.

I love this life. These days each year are the days that sustain me for the rest of the year. When I'm on the road playing our own music, I feel freer than I do at any other time. I would do this year-round if I could. It's hard keeping everything in balance, traveling while working on the *Bluesletter* and finishing my degree and doing whatever side hustles I can to keep the bills paid. That album cover from *Full Time Woman* says a lot about that; Alice did it all with young kids. I respected Alice immensely and I also liked her a lot. With this letter, I add my voice to the thousands remembering her now. May she rest any way she wants to, just the way she lived.

### **Remembering an Icon: Alice Stuart**

Pacific Northwest Musicians Share Memories of Alice Stuart

"Very sad to hear that dear sweet Alice Stuart has passed. She is a trailblazer who inspired so many, myself included. A quick story. She was typically gracious when I tentatively asked if she would like to play at the first of what became many, House of Bourbon revues I staged at the legendary Highway 99 Blues Club in Seattle starting around 2010. This was a huge gift as she was without doubt the 'big draw' of the night and had to drive several hours to get to the gig, and then back home after. I'll never forget her humility and kindness at that moment. For those that didn't know her, Alice came across as super intelligent and generally mild mannered, but beneath that had a steely side you definitely did not want to cross. During that first show, the chatter at the tables was kinda loud, and Alice being Alice, stopped playing and told folks to shut the hell up. Priceless. Thank you, Alice, for everything." "I first met Alice Stuart in 1994 when I was playing with Laura Love at the Strawberry Music Festival held at the time in Camp Mather, just outside of Yosemite National Park. I didn't know anything about her at the time. She wasn't performing and seemed a bit awestruck by our performance. We did play together a little the next day informally but at the time to me she was just a new fan who played music. In retrospect I think at the time she was just getting back into playing after a fairly lengthy hiatus and probably felt a bit like the world had passed her by. When we returned to play the Strawberry festival a couple of years later Alice was on the bill. I caught part of her set. I liked it but unfortunately didn't give it the attention it deserved. My loss. A few years later Alice moved to the Seattle area. I saw her perform, heard her recordings, performed with her on occasion and we became friends. And I finally got that she was the real deal - and then some. I was truly honored when she asked me to play her wedding reception in 2002. Apart from

being a true artist Alice was funny as hell she was great company, and she didn't take any shit from anyone. I will miss her. RIP Alice. " Rod Cook

"Few Pacific Northwest musicians reach the heights nationally that Alice did. A kind, sweet lady. RIP." Dennis Dudley

"Alice was a great friend of Curley Cooke's, so during the five years that Curley and I were together before he passed on, I got to see her and hang out with her often. I had the amazing opportunity to work with her for a month teaching Blues in Schools at Purdy Women's Prison. She used to say as we left the prison every day "But for the grace of God." She was incredibly compassionate and patient with women we were working with. I realized how blessed I was to be her friend and music partner for a time. I'm sorry it won't be happening again. ## **One Special Memory of Alice Stuart**

"I will miss her very much and she is in my heart."

One time, Alice Stuart invited me to hear her play in Olympia, and during the show, she called me up on stage.

She asked me to talk about myself, and I normally don't like to do that. She wanted me to talk about the Washington Blues Society, writing articles about her, and my radio show, "Blues Power Hour." I developed, produced, and DJ'd the first-ever all blues radio program in the history of Armed Forces Network. Broadcasting from Bagram Air Field in Afghanistan, the show reached all troops in theatre of all nations participating in Operation Enduring Freedom (and at least five European countries). I was wearing a silk jacket bought on Bagram Air Field with NATO flags on it. She said she wanted it and I handed it over to her right then and there with pride. We talked about our relationship. Alice wore that jacket at many of her subsequent events.

I was a little embarrassed, but obliged her.

We had many meetings over the years (at restaurants and at her home in Tumwater) and she regaled me with stories of the many well-known artists she played with and mentored like Bonnie Raitt during her early 1960s days in Los Angeles days. Alice was an extremely giving and selfless individual. I will miss her very much and she is in my heart.

Back in 2006, Washington Blues Society Bluesletter Editor Eric Steiner emailed me and asked if I might be willing and able to show Alice Stuart around Chicago. I've since relocated back to my hometown of Detroit, and fondly recall our time in Chicago. I am saddened to learn about Alice's passing.

Alice was coming to town to play a couple of gigs, and to see if she could make any contacts for future gigs in the area. She stayed with her friend on Chicago's North Side.. She had a show booked nearby in Rogers Park at the now-shuttered Heartland Cafe.

Alice and I met down on Halstead Street to check out two legendary Chicago blues clubs: Kingston Mines and B.L.U.E.S. Kingston Mines, opened in 1968, is Chicago's oldest continuously operating blues club. B.L.U.E.S. did not survive the pandemic and closed in 2022. In 2006, when Alice and I hung out at B.L.U.E.S, this joint was jumpin.

Alice was a fun lady and we hit it off right away. She had a lot of great stories about Frank Zappa, John Fogerty, and others.

I told her that I was almost finished tracking



my new album. I offered to give her a tour of Red Brick Recording Studios on Madison Street in Chicago's West Loop and introduce her to producer Bud Johnson Sadly, Bud committed suicide in 2022.

Alice listened to a couple of my tracks and seemed to like them. So, I decided to "shoot my shot"... I asked Alice if she might be willing to play on a song.

"ABSOLUTELY!," she said. I was absolutely thrilled that Alice wanted to play on my CD!

So, we invited her back the next afternoon

and she cut tracks on three of my songs on my 2006 CD, *Down by the River* (Fat Bank Music). She was incredibly generous with her time and talent. Alice played rhythm guitar on the original songs "Snaggle Tooth" and "Clouds," and she also played the solo on my re-working of Muddy Waters' "Can't Lose What You Never Had.." She killed it!

Unfortunately, that album is not available on any digital platforms. I do, however, have some physical CD copies available at my live shows and through my website (www. patsmillie.com).

Over the years, Alice and I stayed in touch a little bit through Facebook. We'd encourage each other and comment on each other's posts about gigs and/or press reviews, etc. I remember having at least one or two phone calls with her, checking in. Unfortunately, Alice and I never were able to reconnect.

I fondly remember the time I spent showing Alice around Chicago in 2006. I am forever grateful for her creative spirit and willingness to play on my album. I am extremely proud of our collaboration.

Rest easy, Alice ... your work is done.

This month is a very special month for the Pacific Northwest and the world.

#### Save the Date: September 15th!

On September 15<sup>th</sup>, Lee Oskar's Dreams We Share will release *She Said Mahalo*, produced and illustrated by Lee Oskar, recorded, and mixed by Brandon Busch, and mastered by Robert Rice. Presented as a DigiPack CD and album, *She Said Mahalo* features package layout and design by Dmitri Antos, liner notes by Keri Oskar, and original artwork by Lee Oskar. "

On the 15<sup>th</sup>, Lee Oskar and Friends will play a CD release celebration at the Royal Room, 5000 Rainier Avenue South in Seattle. Doors will open at 7 PM and the show will begin at 8 PM.

The show features Lee Oskar on harmonica, Dean Schmidt on bass, Darian Asplund on sax, Mack Grout on keys, Alex Mortland on guitar, Andrew Cloutier on drums, and Denali Williams on percussion.

Full disclosure: I been big fan of Lee Oskar's work since I first heard "Low Rider" in the 70s, and my enthusiastic review of *She Said Mahalo* is in this issue.

Last year, I had the privilege of experiencing the CD release party of Lee's groundbreaking CD, *Never Forget*, at Seattle's Triple Door. My review of that unforgettable night of music is the cover story of the May, 2022, *Bluelsetter*, and I encourage readers to discover it online. Jerry and Lois Photography's cover shot captures Lee at just the right time, and their photos of the band, and Lee, drummer Andrew Cloutier and host-KING-FM Weatherman Jeff Renner capture some pretty memorable moments from that evening.

#### A Must Listen: "Funky Rhetoric"

Leading up to the release of the full album this month, Oskar rolled out the single, "Funky Rhetoric," on Friday, June  $2^{nd}$ . Catchy and quintessentially Lee

Oskar, "Funky Rhetoric" is both fresh and familiar, contemporary and timeless (link to the song: <u>https://www.dropbox.com/s/m0c9xc6xebsyaei/08%20-%20Funky%20</u> Rhetoric.mp3?dl=0).

The 10-track album of Lee Oskar's original compositions includes rich instrumentations featuring Oskar's signature harmonica and many other outstanding musicians, including those who perform with Oskar regularly as Lee Oskar & Friends: Darian Asplund (Saxophone); Andrew Cloutier (Drums); Denali Williams (Percussion); Dean Schmidt (Bass); Brian Monroney (Guitar); Alex Mortland (Guitar); Andrew Joslyn (Strings); and Mack Grout (Keys and Piano); as well as special guest artists: Takahiro Miyazaki (Saxophone and flute); Paul Hanson (Bassoon); Randy Oxford (Trombone) Harold Brown (Drums, Percussion); Thione Diop (Percussion); Joe Doria (Organ); Phil Peterson (Strings); "Sancho" Youichrou Suzuki (Shakuhachi) and Mayo Higa (Shamisen). Oskar plays various harmonica models in altered tunings and keys on this album, as specified in the liner notes.

Lee Oskar is an internationally acclaimed harmonica virtuoso, composer, producer, manufacturer, visual artist, and lifelong musical explorer.

He is world-renowned for his iconic role as a founding member, co-composer and lead harmonica player of the pioneering funk/ jazz band that composed and recorded such hits as "Low Rider," "Spill the Wine," "Cisco Kid," "The World is a Ghetto," "Slippin' into Darkness," "Why Can't Be Friends," and many more chart-topping songs from 1969-1993. Since that time, Oskar and his original bandmates from that era perform as the LowRider Band.

In my review of the *Never Forget* CD release party last year, I wrote that "During the 1970s, Lee created what I consider the soundtrack of my teenage years through songs like "Why Can't We Be Friends,"

"Lowrider," "The World is a Ghetto," "Summer," "All Day Music," and "Spill the Wine" (with former Animal and WAR member Eric Burdon)."

With songs from *She Said Mahalo* like "Funky Rhetoric," I play Lee's new record for my 2-year old granddaughter Parker, and I absolutely love the way she smiles and moves to Lee's music. I can't wait to share the soundtrack of my teenage years with her, thanks to Lee Oskar's music.

Oskar also performs around the world with

outstanding musicians from the Pacific Northwest, known as Lee Oskar & Friends, featuring well-loved mega-hits, new arrangements of his own compositions, and exciting newer material.

Artistically, Oskar has earned critical and popular acclaim for more than four decades with his wide-ranging portfolio of unforgettable compositions evoking different moods, rhythms, and genres.

In the words of Seattle Times critic Misha Berson, "The harmonica man can really blow, but he can croon, too."

Lee Oskar has earned ASCAP writing awards, and had his signature sound celebrated in Pitbull and Kesha's smash hit, "Timber," which was inspired by Oskar's harmonica contributions in the song "San Francisco Bay."

In 2020, Lee Oskar established his own recording label, Dreams We Share.<sup>™</sup> He proudly produces professional recording artists as well as his own music.



I felt guilty flying on Allegiant from BLI-LAS as my primary airline and credit card allegiance has been to Alaska Airlines for 22+ years. However, Allegiant's quick 2-hour ride to Las Vegas, significantly lower ticket prices, and amenities for veterans (free checked bags, priority boarding and a free beverage) rationalized my airline infidelity.

Growing up on the far South Side of Chicago, I have fond memories of Midwestern summers. I relished the heat and humidity, as I was just a kid having fun outside. This year, I lasted 17 minutes on Bernie's deck poolside in the 117 degree heat.

En route to the BLI, I joined the Las Vegas Blues Society. Blues society President Jimmy Carpenter won The Blues Foundation's prestigious Blues Music Award for Best Instrumentalist – Horn in 2021 and 2022, and I looked forward to learning more about how the Las Vegas Blues Society promotes the blues in Nevada.

During our visit, a blues society go-to venue, the Sand Dollar Lounge, celebrated its 48<sup>th</sup> anniversary on Spring Mountain Road near The Mirage on The Strip. A second Sand Dollar, opened last year, is across the street from the Golden Nugget downtown.

This month, the Las Vegas Blues Society is hosting an annual Handy Artists Relief Trust (HART Fund) fundraiser on the  $6^{th}$ prior to the sold-out Big Blues Bender, which is billed as a " musical vacation of a lifetime! 50+ artists, 5 stages, 4 days & nights

of 'round the clock world class blues music, all within a four-star Las Vegas resort!" The Westgate Las Vegas Resort and Casino hosts the 4-day event, and it would be a thrill to see Bob Margolin's "50 Years with Muddy Waters" show, Keb' Mo,' Beth Hart, the Blood Brothers, Jimmie Vaughan, and the rest of the line-up!

Earlier this year, Margie bought tickets to Dave Koz' 2023 Summer Horns Tour at Reynolds Hall in the Smith Center for the Performing Arts in downtown Las Vegas (near the Golden Nugget). Seventeen years in the making, the 11-year old Smith Center is an elegant space housing Reynolds Hall, Myron's at The Smith Center, and the Troesh Studio Theater.

Dave Koz' set featured 16+ songs from his smooth jazz catalog, but for me, that label's a misnomer. This outfit rocked. Sax players Candy Dulfer and Eric Darius joined Dave, and the show had many memorable songs.

I enjoyed Koz ' "Highwire," "Saxagogo," and "Night on the Town," but the real highlight for me was a tribute to the late Bobby Caldwell, a James Brown medley, and Candy Dulfer's haunting "Lily Was Here" recorded with Dave Stewart in 1989. I liked it when they played the sax riff of Gerry Rafftery's 1978 "Baker Street," as it reminded me of when I last emerged up from the Bakerloo line of the London Underground.

When I got home, my Las Vegas Blues Society shirt was in my mailbox. I forgot that new members get free t-shirts with the society's "Bet on the Blues" tagline. A nice touch for new members.

I look forward to returning to Las Vegas and Henderson in cooler weather, especially to catch a show at the Sand Dollar! The blues society also hosts an all-ages jam at the Soul Belly BBQ on Main Street on the second Saturday of the month in the afternoon, and it looks like a lot of fun.

When in Las Vegas, I enjoy reading local writers like John 'Kats" Katsilometes in the *Las Vegas Review-Journal*. Las Vegas is also opening a new concert hall, called The Sphere, where U2 will play their *Achtung Baby* CD in its entirety during their upcoming Las Vegas residency. I'm really intrigued by The Sphere, and could see the orb in the distance on The Strip from Bernie and Margie's deck in Henderson.

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## **Simply an Exceptional Soul Food Lunch**

"Polly was right. I found myself in a Mississippi restaurant in Seattle's Central District." By Eric Steiner

This past April, Editor Polly O'Keary covered the grand opening of Seattle's Simply Soulful restaurant, and during the production of the last issue, Polly and I joined Bluesletter Intern Will Crockett for lunch there. Simply Soulful is at 23<sup>rd</sup> and Jackson, an historically significant intersection in Seattle's Black community.

My smoked brisket and fries reminded me of Abe's BBQ on DeSoto Avenue in Clarksdale and Alcenia's Restaurant on Front Street in Memphis. Classic Southern places.

Will had just returned from a Widespread Panic show at Red Rocks Amphitheatre in Colorado, and Polly was rehearsing for her upcoming tour down the Oregon coast. This was no ordinary lunch, though.

During lunch, I was struck by three distinct sparks that have infused this magazine with a new sense of energy and purpose.

First of all, Polly is Will's professor of communications in her work toward her Ph.D. at the University of Washington in her day job, and Will is eager to hone his skills as one of our newest volunteers.

Secondly, I found Will's energy to not only learn about our blues community, but also his skill in crafting readable and interesting stories, refreshing.

Finally, our 90-minute lunch flew by as we explored new ways to show readers about our region's diverse and accomplished blues community in a Black-owned restaurant across the street from a shuttered Starbucks that once counted Magic Johnson as one of its backers. Jazzman Ray Brown recorded *Live at Starbucks* at the former 23<sup>rd</sup> and Jackson store to honor the neighborhood's place in Seattle music history.

During the production of this issue, I also learned that the Black-owned Black Coffee Northwest plans to move from Shoreline to the former Starbucks at 23<sup>rd</sup> and Jackson in a Vulcan Real Estate-managed area that

was once home to many Black-owned businesses.

As I finished my smoked brisket, I thanked Polly for her article on Simply Soulful in the April issue. Polly was right. I found myself in a Mississippi restaurant in Seattle's Central District. After lunch, I revisited the menu, and think that Chef Barbara Collins, daughter, and business partner Lillian Rambus have a recipe for success. Next time, I hope to get there before Barbara's sweet potato pie sells out!

I hadn't spent time at 23<sup>rd</sup> and Jackson in a long time. Back then, Promenade 23 featured a Red Apple Market and Welch's Hardware (and old-school, family-run neighborhood shop). Neighborhood mainstay Jackson's Catfish Corner is on the corner in a relative high-rise, and East African Imports Store and Restaurant is across the street.

I looked at the sidewalk in front of Simply Soulful and noticed public art, titled 78, that featured a green tone arm and a black LP that featured concentric circles of names of notable 32 venues and 70 local musicians who worked in Jackson Street's thriving music community in the 20<sup>th</sup> century. Installed in 2021, the tone arm serves as a bench overlooking the LP.

The tone arm and LP were designed by artist and composer Paul Rucker, who relocated to White Center in 2019 after nearly 20 years in the Central District.


For me, his name rang a bell.

Loudly.

Paul was the Washington Blues Society's grant officer from the City of Seattle in Mayor Greg Nickels' administration in the early 2000s. He helped us get a Mayoral Proclamation that I read at our annual picnic at Seattle's Magnuson Park, and provided valuable technical assistance during the blues society's earliest experience with City of Seattle grants.

His career as an artist, and an activist, has certainly blossomed since his tenure working as an arts administrator for the city.

Former *Seattle Times* music critic, and jazz scholar, Paul de Barros' book *Jackson Street*

*After Hours: The Roots of Jazz in Seattle* (Sasquatch Books, 1993) informed Rucker's installation in front of Vulcan Real Estate's Jackson Apartments.

Paul Rucker's other public art pieces include "In Light of History" in Baltimore, "Human Rights Legacy" in Tacoma, and "Banking While Black," a presentation of historically thriving Black Wall Streets in Tulsa, Oklahoma, Durham, North Carolina and Richmond, Virginia.

Currently, Paul is Assistant Professor and the Curator for Creative Collaboration for VCUarts at Virginia Commonwealth University in Richmond. Paul's honors and recognition include work as a Guggenheim Fellow, a TED Senior Fellow, a Rauschenburg Fellow, and an iCubed Arts Research Fellow at VCU.

Paul is also developing Cary Forward, a multidisciplinary art space and learning center in Baltimore, which will tell the story of systemic racism in the US.

He's planning to open in 2024 with initial support from the Mellon Foundation and the Art for Justice Fund.

As I learn more about Paul's work with Cary Forward, I'm adding it to my travel bucket list as I expect it will tell powerful stories just like ones I've experienced at the National Civil Rights Museum in Memphis and the Birmingham Civil Rights Institute in Alabama. As I finished this story, I was one of 1.9M viewers of Paul's powerful 7-minute TED talk, "The Symbols of Systemic Racism -and How to Take Away Their Power," which features a crash course on the Ku Klux Klan (home to five million members, the population of New York City at one time), the value of cotton sales in 1860 (\$5B in today's dollars), and Paul's own 75 Klan robes that he designed and sewed by hand that were made out of kente cloth, camouflage, burlap, silk and satin. Paul recalled seeing Klan rallies growing up in South Carolina and noted that "the Klan's robe factory in Georgia kept 20,000 robes on hand just to keep up with demand."


As I left Will and Polly to drive home, I thought of how that intersection at 23<sup>rd</sup> and Jackson had changed over the years and how gentrification has impacted the community. It's complicated, and more nuanced than my limited experience working in the Central District when I worked for the Seattle Indian Center learning about grants and human services for most of the 1990s.

However, I truly hope that Simply Soulful and Black Coffee Northwest can, over time with Vulcan Real Estate's assistance, profitably anchor one of the most storied intersections that was once home to a music Mecca of Seattle's Black community.

Selfishly, I thought of just one thing as I drove onto the ferry in Mukilteo bound for home on Whidbey Island.

When can I get back to 23<sup>rd</sup> and Jackson for a catfish lunch at the Simply Soulful Cafe with greens, mac and cheese, and sweet potato pie?









Grainne Duffy Dirt Woman Blues (Blue Heart Records)

For her sixth album, Dirt Woman Blues, Irish roots phenom, singer-songwriter and guitarist Grainne Duffy ventured far from the emerald isle to sunny Southern California to find a bigger and bolder sound. She partnered with American blues-rock guitarist Marc Ford, best known as a former member of the Black Crowes and created a tandem guitar sound with her husband Paul Sherry who also plays in her band. They enlisted Gary Clark, Jr's Austin, Texas rhythm section: drummer JJ Johnson and Bass and keyboard player Elijah Ford (Marc's son). The sessions yielded a collection of nine new tracks centered around Duffy's haunting alto and a mash up songwriting styles from Celtic storytelling to Delta Blues poetry and Laurel Canyon 70's rock. John Primer Hard Times (Blues House Productions)

John Primer's latest CD, Hard Times, was one of my favorite blues releases from 2022. Of the 13 original songs, I continue to revisit three that speak of resilience and hope: "I Won't Sweat It," ""Tough Times," and "You Mean So Much to Me." John's long-time band, The Real Deal Blues Band, really shine on this CD with Steve Bell on harmonica, Lenny Media on drums, and Dave Forte on bass. Special guests add to this "blues go-to" band's sound with Rick Kreher on second guitar, Johnny Iguana on keyboards, and John's 17-year old daughter Aliya on "Tough Times" vocals. Primer's Chicago blues apprenticeship began on Maxwell Street, continued at the fabled Theresa's Lounge, followed by work with Willie Dixon's Chicago Blues All Stars, Muddy Waters' Legendary Blues Band, a 13-year run with Magic Slim & The Teardrops, and continued success with the Real Deal Blues Band. The title tune

opens with hypnotic slide guitar and settles into a classic, infections boogie. From start to finish, *Hard Times* is a solid Chicago blues record, and Eric Kriesant's photography is bittersweet as B.L.U.E.S. on Halsted St. owners Rob Hecko and Jennifer Littleton opened their doors one last time for the album's photo shoot. John Primer returns to the Pacific Northwest this month, and I hope Washington Blues Society members will catch his shows at the Oak Harbor Music Festival and at the Washington Blues Society's inaugural President's First Tuesday Blues Bash at Aurora Borealis in Shoreline! Eric Steiner



Mike Bourne Band Cruisin' Kansas City (Blue Heart Records)

Kansas City, much like New Orleans, has a unique distinction of being a melting pot and a swingin' capital of jazz and blues musical styles that played no small part in influencing what would become R&B and rock n' roll in the 1950s. Guitar man Mike Bourne has spent time in other cities of music Chicago and Atlanta, but makes the Missouri border city his home and plays his own version of what is known as Kansas City blues. In tribute to the players who mentored him and the many late nights in the sweaty clubs of the famous 18th and Vine district he recorded, Cruisin' Kansas City, was released this summer to widespread critical acclaim. Joining Bourne for the 13 songs set are members of his band Kansas City Boogie and a collection of friends and special guests, including guitarist Johnny Burgin, keyboardists Dave Creighton and Johnny Iguana, Big D Erickson, Micky Munoz from the Hoodoo Brothers, John Paul on drums, and Greg Hopkins, trumpeter with the Buddy Rich Orchestra. Lee Oskar She Said Mahalo (Dreams We Share)

Lee Oskar's new instrumental CD, She Said Mahalo, offers many uplifting and bright moments, especially on the opening "Caribbean Love Song," and on another song with a distinctly island-influenced vibe, "Most Favored Nation." "Children of the World" and "Morning Rush" features many nuanced strings and rhythms, and the hypnotic "She Said Mahalo" weaves Lee's understated harmonica with gifted guitar parts. Joining Lee in the studio are many musicians who play with him regularly as Lee Oskar & Friends, including Darian Asplund on sax, Andrew Cloutier and Harold Brown on drums, Denali Williams on percussion, Dean Schmidt on bass, Brian Monroney and Alex Mortland on guitar, Andrew Joslyn on strings, and Mack Grout on keyboards. Special guest artists also add to the sound: Takahiro Miyazaki on sax and flute, Paul Hanson on bassoon, Randy Oxford on trombone, Thin Diop on percussion, Joe Doria on organ, Phil Peterson on strings, Sancho" Youichrou Suzuki on shakuhachi (Japanese flute) and Mayo Higa on shamisen (Asian banjo-lute). I enjoyed Lee Oskar's original art in the CD package designed by Dimitri Antos, and 12-page booklet with Lee's insightful comments on each song. When I heard the first single from the CD online earlier this summer, "Funky Rhetoric," I marveled at how the song reminded me of the joyful music that Lee Oskar made in the 70s. Arlen Roth & Jerry Jemmott Super Soul Session (Blue Heart Records)

It is such a gift and hard won privilege when an artist reaches the point in their career when they can make art for art's sake. The new album, Super Soul Session, from Arlen Roth and Jerry Jemmott reflects that joy and status. Guitar hero and music education pioneer Roth and Grammy winning bassist Jemmott, aka "The Groove Master," were both chief session and touring musicians of the late 1960s and early 1970s, working with many of the period's well-known rock, pop, soul, blues, and jazz artists. The longtime friends join forces on a baker's dozen of iconic tracks from their career discography in celebration of over 50 years of making great music. The pair invited many A-list players to join them for the New York sessions enlisting the talents of keyboardist Bruce Katz, guitarist Tom Gage, drummer Chris Parker, The Uptown Horns and special guests Jo Louis Walker and African vocalist Mukamuri. The collection of cover songs is more than a trip down memory lane, and a loving exploration and deep dive into some of the duos favorite songs, many of which they had a hand in creating the original recordings. Joel Astley Seattle To Greaseland (Blue Heart Records)

After working hard to establish himself on the Pacific Northwest music scene singersongwriter, harmonica man and graphic artist Joel Astley is poised to burst on to the national scene with his debut solo album *Seattle To Greaseland*. The collection of 11 original songs was released nationally this past August by Blue Heart Records. *Seattle to Greaseland* was recorded at Greaseland Studio in San Jose, California, by acclaimed producer and multi-instrumentalist Kid Andersen who invited some of his "Greaseland Regulars," to join in on the weekend jam sessions that yielded a fine album of authentic styles from straight ahead blues to classic R&B , jumping swing and a sweet Gospel number that together create the unique vibe of West Coast blues. The opening track, "Born Crying," has a swampy down on the bayou feel and the jump blues "Candy Shop," rips at a furious sugar fueled pace. Astley turns the notion of "Hard Luck and Trouble" on its head during the honky tonk blues bouncer "Just Right" and points out how the universe eventually finds a way of balancing the scales on the slinky reverbsoaked "Karma Wheel." Anderson pumps the clavinet and June Core drives the groove on the ultra-funky "Secondhand Kid. The vaudeville number "Takin' It With Me" has theatrical flair of a pre-war, Tin Pan Alley song, and the gents keep it swinging hard on "Hot As Hell," a sure fire dance floor filler. Astely commemorates a long lost Seattle club, "88 Keys," which helped launch his career and everyone who was "in the know" called "Bobby's Place." The album closes with Astley and the crew taking us to church on the Gospel two beat "No Brighter Gold," celebrating the pure joy music brings to the world. Rick J Bowen



Jimmy Carpenter The Louisiana Record (Gulf Coast Records)

Two-time Blues Music Award winning sax player Jimmy Carpenter returned to Louisiana at the invitation of Gulf Coast Records co-owner and guitarist Mike Zito to record an album of 11 covers. The CD, The Louisiana Record, showcases not only Jimmy Carpenter's exceptional sax, but also some of the Crescent City's finest songs. While former Rockpile member Dave Edmunds' "I Hear You Knockin" hit the top 40 in 1970, the song was written by Dave Bartholomew and Pearl King for Smiley Lewis in 1955. Many of these songs share similar histories - recorded by many artists over the years - and I really enjoyed the way Mike and Jimmy updated several of them. I've heard "I Got Loaded" covered by Los Lobos and Tab Benoit many times, but the band working with Jimmy in historic Dockside Studios in Lafayette playfully nails Camille Bob's original song. Joining Jimmy and Mike in the studio are Wayne Moreau on drums, Casandra Faulconer on bass, and John Gros on keyboards. My other favorites on The Louisiana Record include Sam Cooke's "Bring It On Home to Me," Allen Toussaint's "All These Things," and a favorite sax party instrumental, Lee Allen's "Rockin' at Cosimo's." This month, I'm returning to New Orleans, and thanks to this song, I'll stop by Cosimo's on Burgundry Street in the French Quarter (although I thought this pub was related to J & M Records ("Tutti Frutti") and its founder, Cosimo Mattassa, it's not.). Different Cosimo. This record brings Jimmy Carpenter back to New Orleans as he lived and performed there from 2004 until 2016. He currently lives in Las Vegas, where he leads the Las Vegas Blues Society and plays a key role in the annual Big Blues Bender long weekend of live blues. I'm glad I discovered The Lousiana Record, and it sits with alongside CDs from Tab Benoit, Allen Toussaint, The Meters, and The Neville Brothers. Eric Steiner.





Our 1st bash is the new President's Blues Bash with Chicago bluesmen John Primer and Steve Bell at Aurora Borealis, on the 5th at 7 PM at Aurora Borealis, 16708 Aurora Avenue North in Shoreline. Our 2<sup>nd</sup> bash is also at Aurora Borealis on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Tuesday, the 12<sup>th</sup> at 7 PM featuring acoustic blues master Ross Robinson followed by another CD release event from a Seattle favorite, and multiple Washington Blues Society "Best of the Blues" award winner, Joel Astley and his band. The 3<sup>rd</sup> bash, on the 4<sup>th</sup> Tuesday of the month features former Washington Blues Society International Blues Challenge representatives the Norris & Nicely Duo and the Rafael Tranquilino Band at CCR Sports and Entertainment, 215 Cypress Avenue in Snohomish on the 26<sup>th</sup> at 7 PM.

Our monthly Blues Bashes are presented free, and all are welcome. Aurora Borealis is an all ages venue, and CCR Sports is 21+ only. We will have a door prize raffle with prizes including tickets to Seattle's Jazz Alley, and more! We encourage everyone to tip the band to support of their volunteer performances.

The following is more about each performer at our three Blues Bashes this month.

The President's Blues Bash features legendary Chicago bluesmen John Primer and Steve Bell. John has received a number of accolades since forming his first band in 1955, most recently a Blues Music Award, a Muddy Award and a Blues Blast Award. His catalogue includes 87 recordings and was Muddy Waters' music director. Steve's father, Carey Bell, taught his son to play harp, and he's be in Primer's Real Deal Blues Band since 1996. John and Steve will turn Shoreline's Aurora Borealis into a legendary Chicago blues club harking back to B.L.U.E.S., The Checkboard Lounge, Silvio's or Theresa's!

Ross Robinson was born in Rhode Island in 1958, lived mostly in Massachusetts, and moved to Washington State in 2014. Ross has been playing Piedmont blues, Delta blues and finger style guitar since 1989. He sings and writes his own material and has played many fine venues in the Boston area,

Joel Astley came to music after many years of working as a visual artist. Since forming his first band in 2014, he has been recognized by the Washington Blues Society with multiple "Best Of The Blues" Awards, including five for Best Harmonica, three for Best Male Vocalist, three for Best Songwriter and one for Best Performer. He earned his reputation as a bandleader while performing with numerous northwest bands, and he is now leading his own award-winning band. He performs all over the Pacific Northwest, has appeared on several recordings, and has performed and toured with many national blues artists. Randy Norris and Jeff Nicely, an eclectic acoustic blues duo, deliver dynamic vocals, exceptional acoustic guitar and harmonica interplay. In 20+ years of making music together, this seasoned duo blends the sounds and elements of soul, rock, New Orleans rhythm and Delta blues. Randy and Jeff are well traveled, each with Midwest roots, playing everything from loose pickin' parties to tight funk 'n soul revues. After 10 years in Los Angeles doing session and sideman work, Randy brought his repertoire North, joining Jeff in fronting the popular turn of the century Seattlearea band, Blues Therapy. Performing as a duo since 2008, Randy Norris & Jeff Nicely earned Semi-Finalist status at the 2012 and 2013 International Blues Challenges in Memphis and were awarded the 2017 Washington Blues Society Best of the Blues Award for Solo/Duo Blues Act. Rafael Tranquilino is an accomplished music producer, instrumentalist, and a funk-, rock-, blues-, jazz-, and neo-soul artist. Awarded the 2023 Washington Blues Society's Best Electric Blues Guitar Award, Rafael's musical career began when he was 10 years old as he became a part of his family's musical legacy. He later then learned play many instruments, such as drums, bass, harmonica, and keyboards. He gained popularity in the U.S. playing guitar and as acting musical director for



the Randy Oxford Band from 2006 to 2011, before branching out and forming the Rafael Tranquilino Band. Rafael then grew to be a skilled music producer, with past and ongoing projects in the works. (Photo of Rafael Tranquilino by Gordy Mitchell).

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### **You Should Have Been There!**

#### Curley Taylor & Zydeco Trouble at the Aurora Borealis in Shoreline!

The first time I heard Curley Taylor was many years ago at the old Highway 99 Blues Club. I was impressed. It s darn difficult to find good Zydeco music up here in the Greater Pacific Northwest. We've had a long line of wannabes, but damn few of the genuine article.

The next time I heard Curley Taylor & Zydeco Trouble was at the 2022 Rainier Music Festival and I was very impressed. Their one hour set that night left me wanting more. And this year, I got it. A full evening of Curley Taylor & Zydeco Trouble on July 29, 2023 at Aurora Borealis. And this time I was greatly impressed!

First let's get some background on Curley.

Curley Taylor comes from a long line of Louisiana Zydeco musicians. He started out at 16 in his father's band, Jude Taylor and the Burning Flames. By the time he was 25, Curley was a first-call Zydeco drummer and had toured with C.J. Chenier, son of the legendary Clifton Chenier.

Along the way, Curley wanted to try accordion, the quintessential Zydeco instrument, and learned to play it within six months of picking it up. Now, eight albums later, he and his band have played Zydeco all over the USA, and Curley's most recent album, 2022's *Number Ones* is fantastic. Look for a review of it in an upcoming issue of the Bluesletter. Now, about the show in Shoreline.

Zydeco Trouble hit Aurora Borealis like a crawfish boil hits a picnic table! Steaming, hot and spicy!

First of all, the place was packed! The front half of the room was cleared of all tables and the night started with Sean "Gator Boy" Donovan and Erika Olsen showing everyone the proper way to perform the Zydeco two-step. The band hit the stage. Or rather, they commandeered the stage. And captivated the room. Curley Taylor is backed up by Dayton January on bass, Jaque Randle on scratchboard, Coutland Mack on keyboards, and Eric "Boss Hog" Minix on drums.

You'd be hard pressed to find a tighter, more well rehearsed group anywhere. And the harmonies... My gosh, if biscuits and gravy could sing, this is what they'd sound like.

Curley Taylor & Zydeco Trouble can best be described as a true 21st century Zydeco Show. They are a Zydeco show with soul! They have merged Creole heart with Cajun spice, added that New Orleans beat, mixed in some Memphis soul, tossed in some Muscle Shoals rhythm and blues, and created a savory sound that will please just about everyone's musical palate.

Mixing originals with standards such as "Big Mamou," plus Zydeco-flavored versions of classics as diverse as "Cisco Kid" and "Rockin' Robin." Curley and the guys aren t afraid to push the boundaries.

This is a Zydeco band for folks who thought they didn t like Zydeco, and if you already liked Zydeco, you'll love this band. The momentum never stopped the entire night. The crowd went crazy when Curley called the effervescent Lady A onstage to help out with the Zydeco party.

Keeping the energy going during the break between sets, Erika and Sean gave yet another dance lesson. The crowd remained until the very end. To say the joint was jumping would be an understatement. They manage to hit the Seattle area about once a year. Next year don t miss them. I know I won't. Maybe we should do this more than once a year?

For those of you who missed it... well... You should have been there.





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
