

LETTER FROM THE EDITOR



Hello everyone!

I'm back from a two-month tour, and here I want to reflect on the power and purpose of blues societies we have worked with on tour. When I first started touring, I found out that there are a great number of blues societies that pool their money to pay national acts to come play for them. This year we did several.

The first one we do each year is in Omaha. They do a Thursday night concert

series year-round and have for more than 20 years. I've played it with three different bands, and it's always packed. Then we do Blue Monday at the Alamo in Springfield. It's low paying, but there are lots of nationally known bands that play it, because it's hotels and income on a Monday night when most touring bands are spending their own money. Tips there are great, and merch sales are pretty good, too. The audience is fantastic.

There is a series in northern Illinois, too, that I've played several times. The last one I played was on a stage in a cornfield. Too Slim was the headliner. We did our set, and just before Too Slim started, a massive storm swept in. We ended up waiting out one of the worst thunderstorms I've ever seen in a metal farm shed, all trying to stay away from the walls.

When we play in Florida, we get astonishing support from blues societies there, of which there are about seven. They do a ton of promotions for touring bands and come to the shows, too. They've even helped us find really good venues twice. In Birmingham this year we played a blues society show in a beautiful house. There were about 20-25 people there, which feels like a lot in a living room. Blues societies in Colorado, especially Mile High, have members that help touring bands find local gigs.

Our blues society is tremendously supportive of local acts, but now, with the President's Bash, it looks like we'll add touring artists to the entertainment roster as well. Tony is lining up great shows, and I'm pretty excited about it. For one thing, life on the road keeps getting harder. Most people don't have CD players any more. Selling merch isn't what it used to be. Clubs keep closing. Gas prices go up. The more blues societies support touring artists, the more life the touring scene will have. It was hard drawing big names to the upper left corner of the US even before the Highway 99 closed. But with the President's Bash happening one Tuesday a month, we can attract tours the same way other clubs do, by hiring on an off night.

I often dream of what would happen If we coordinated with a club in Spokane and another in Portland and partnered with the Cascade Blues Association to offer a steady Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday series. We might get a lot more of the nationally touring bands coming through that otherwise never seem to make it out here.

On another, sadder note, school is about to start. I have to finish my PhD this year. I suspected when I agreed to take this role that it might prove to be too much, and I'm afraid that it has. I have told Eric Steiner, the previous editor and the hero who handled most of the job while I was on tour, that I have to step back from this role until June. He graciously agreed to step back in. I'll keep writing a letter from the editor as I will keep the title barring a successful run by someone else next year. When June comes around, I will be done with college, one way or the other, and I look forward to stepping more fully back into the role.

Preview: 16th Annual Bellevue Jazz & Blues Music Series

Celebrate Live Music October 4-8, 2023 in Downtown Bellevue!

The Bellevue Downtown Association's Annual Jazz & Blues Music Series returns to Downtown Bellevue October 4th through the 8th. The heart of the music series will center around two ticketed headliner performances at the Meydenbauer Center Theatre at 11100 NE 6th Street in downtown Bellevue.

The Stacy Jones Band will grace the stage on October 6th with a blend of high-energy blues and dynamic vocals, and Pearl Diango with Gail Pettis will follow up with Hot Club jazz tunes on October 7th. During the series, 20+ live performances will take place around Downtown Bellevue.

The association encourages patrons to enjoy dinner at a local restaurant and watch a performance! Participating venues include Bake's Place Bar & Bistro, El Gaucho, Lincoln Square North and South, AC Hotel Bellevue by Marriott, Bellevue Arts Museum, and Bellevue Place. Highlights include jazz, blues, and funk, pianist/singer Jose "Juicy" Gonzales, New Age Flamenco, Rod Cook and Toast, and Snohomish and Bellevue High student showcases.

Patrick Bannon, Bellevue Downtown Association president, puts an emphasis on the wanderer.

"You could just create your own calendar and figure out what works for you," he says.

The series is set up in a way where passersby can interact with music wherever they go in downtown Bellevue. From Bake's Place to The Bellevue Collection, jazz and blues will permeate through city spaces.

"It's almost spontaneous and serendipitous that they come across the live music being played in a place where they may not expect it," Bannon says. He emphasizes this year's focus on local and regional talent.

The student showcase is a yearly favorite as students from local high schools and middle schools will show off their talents at the Bellevue Arts Museum on Sunday,





October 8th. Student showcases are always fun, especially when local youth get to be part of something much larger than their own school and school district. In the spirit of accessibility, all performances are all ages and free, with the exception of the headliners. The Stacy Jones Band and Pearl Django with Gail Pettis headline on Friday and

The Laurie Morvan Band will play Seattle's longest-running blues venue, Salmon Bay Eagles in Ballard, on October 12th, 2023

The Laurie Morvan Band is currently on a coast to coast tour, and after stops in Eugene and Portland, Laurie will be bringing her band to Seattle and her only gig will be at the home of blues in Ballard, Salmon Bay Eagles. The Salmon Bay Eagles has been hosting blues for over 33 years now, and we are proud to present this Internationally touring artist.

Her 2023 tour includes dates at the prestigious Rhythm Room in Phoenix and Buddy Guy's Legends in Chicago. Those in the South Sound will be able to see Laurie perform at the Spar in Tacoma on Wednesday, October 11th. The Salmon Bay Eagles show will be followed by three dates in British Columbia before heading back down to California.

The Laurie Morvan Band hails out of Long Beach, California and have released six highly acclaimed albums, most recently Gravity in 2018. It is her first solo album and was produced by the legendary Tony Braunagel, who also plays drums and percussion with road-tested veterans Jim Pugh, Barry Goldberg, Mike Finnigan, and Bob Glaub.

Laurie graced the cover and was the lead story in the May 2022 issue of Blues Blast



magazine and has received several welldeserved reviews from a range of music publications and websites.



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Look Sharp: The 32 Bar Blues Catalog

"I was pleasantly surprised to see that 32 Bar Blues has created a new revenue stream for blues artists."

I get a lot of catalogs in the mail. I like many of them, and I also enjoy the print Bluesletter when I get it. I simply enjoy reading print magazines. I read e-books on my Kindle from time to time, but nothing can replace paper magazines like The Sun, Afar, or The New Yorker in my hands out on my front deck. I also enjoy mail order catalogs to help me engage in "remote retail therapy," and one of my favorite recent discoveries is the 32 Bar Blues men's clothing catalog from California.

Earlier this year, I picked up my mail at the Freeland post office on Whidbey Island and the 32 Bar Blues catalog got my attention. The T-shirts with eye-catching logos of Kansas City's Milton's Tap Room, Silvertone Guitars, Woodstock, Chess Records, the Whisky A-Go-Go, and Pink Floyd just jumped off the printed page. I thought the styles of shirts, vests, jackets, hoodies, and jeans in the 32 Bar Blues catalog were both timeless and contemporary at the same time. I also appreciated the way unique references to American history, arts, and culture infused many pages of the 32 Bar Blues catalog.

According to the company, "32 Bar Blues released its first catalog in 2012, and since then, it has featured a number of pioneering and directional musicians, writers and photographers whose voices contribute to the remarkable diaspora of contemporary American art."

Not only does this arts and cultural resource sell men's clothing and a diverse selection of jazz and blues music from its shelves, screens, and print catalogs, it also offers artists a new revenue stream from sales of their CDs. I was pleasantly surprised to see that 32 Bar Blues has created a new revenue stream for blues artists.

That's really, really cool. Particularly in the context of a post-COVID 19 world for working musicians who have lost so much in the pandemic.

I gave a copy of the 32 Blues Spring 2023 catalog to Blues Music Award-winning blues artist Janiva Magness during a layover at LAX when my wife Vickie I made our way to Seine Bight, in Southern Belize, earlier this summer. I told Janiva that, someday, I'd love to see her music in the 32 Bar Blues catalog alongside her fellow female Blues Music Award recipients.

Janiva then drove us from the Hilton Embassy Suites to the small, family-owned House of Thai Taste on Venice Boulevard. After dinner, Janiva recorded a video to former Washington Blues Society Board Secretary Rocky Nelson. She had Vickie and me in stitches before I pressed "stop" on my iPhone. House of Thai Taste had some of the best Tom Yum Gai that I've ever had, and I'm glad Rocky appreciated the "shout out" from Janiva, too.

When Rocky worked overseas in the 2000s, he often told me to "tell Janiva I always wear her Love is an Army CD dog tag next to my own." In addition to nearly 30+ years volunteering for the Washington Blues Society (including three terms as elected Board Secretary), Rocky developed, produced, and hosted the first-ever U.S. Armed Forces Radio-approved blues radio program in an active war zone in 2009. His alter ego, "Rock Khan," played the blues and interviewed guests like Alligator recording artist Shemekia Copeland on his "Blues Power Hour" on Freedom Radio Afghanistan. After his first show, I added Rocky to the Bluesletter's Street Team as "International Raconteur."

"I frequently launched my Blues Power Hour with Janiva's 2008 high-energy song, "That's What Love Will Make You Do," recalled Rocky.

"I was proud to play Janiva's music on my radio show for the soldiers, sailors, airmen, and civilians supporting Operation Enduring Freedom. Like my late friend, Alice Stuart, Janiva Magness is very classy and unpretentious. Actually, I've always

thought that their lives were much more important to the blues than whatever I was doing to support it. I was honored to host the Blues Power Hour because it brought blues music to the men and women serving our country out on the front line."

32 Bar Blues Voices from the Art

I was impressed with the 32 Bar Blues catalog's "32 Bar Blues Voices from the Art" section as it delved more deeply into artists' CDs and authors' work than just a single photo and caption. On John Primer's page, I laughed when the introduction to his latest CD, Hard Times, reminded me that "You can't paint the blues without the Primer!"

"Since our first catalog in 2012, we've always featured musicians, writers and photographers alongside our clothing," says 32 Bar Blues Founder and Chairman Bruce Willard, "and we give the profits from the sales of their CDs and books directly back to them as part of our commitment to the arts. But as the COVID-19 pandemic unfolded, we knew we had to augment our efforts."

"Compelled by the pandemic and its devastating impact on live concerts, tours and gigs across the country, we reached out to the Jazz Foundation of America with an idea to create a special t-shirt to help raise awareness and crucial funds for the Jazz Foundation of America's COVID-19 Musicians' Emergency Fund," says 32 Bar Blues Editorial Director Trevor Pitchford.

"The Jazz Foundation t-shirt instantly



became one of the most popular items in our collection, so other special items and nonprofit partnerships followed - with artssupporting organizations like Keeping The Blues Alive, Notes for Notes, African Poetry Book Fund, and Vail Jazz."

"When I started 32 Bar Blues, I wanted to create a business that gave back to the artists who brought me joy and whose life work I thought needed more exposure and

celebration," says Willard. "Blues and jazz music are uniquely American art forms and we need to honor the people who help keep these arts alive. So, I'm proud of our efforts to help these artists and nonprofit partners - and I'm heartened by the strong response of our customers in support of these efforts. This is just the beginning."

32 Bar Blues Foundation

In addition to reading these visions from Bruce and Trevor, I was particularly impressed with how 32 Bar Blues "went the extra mile" during the COVID-19 pandemic. They formed the 32 Bar Blues Foundation in 2020 to feature nonprofit organizations whose work provides vital support for American music and writing. 100% of the profits that 32 Bar Blues makes from selling their books, CDs, and special logo clothing - together with any donations received at checkout - are sent back to the artists and the nonprofit organizations featured by 32 Bar Blues.

Over 10 years, 85 artists and counting, the gross sales of their work has totaled more than \$107,000 and provided national exposure with millions of full-page impressions in the 32 Bar Blues catalog. The total contributions to 32 Bar Blues'

nonprofit partners exceeded \$107,000 just after the first two years in operation.

I recommend the 32 Bar Blues catalog to Bluesletter readers, not only for its fashionable men's clothing, great t-shirts, and accessories, but also for the way 32 Bar Blues celebrates the past, present and future of American music, arts, and culture. The stories behind the songs and the artists in the catalog's pages can also inform any Blues in the Schools program (especially for younger musicians learning about this unique art form rooted in African American culture and history). 

The Northwest Blues Stars will play a special show on Thursday, October 12th at the Triple Door, 216 Union Street in downtown Seattle. Produced by Steve Sarkowsky, the founder and primary talent buyer for the awardwinning Highway 99 Blues Club.

The Northwest Blues Stars' debut set at the Triple Door will feature six very talented Pacific Northwest musicians who will present a show based around the classic blues hits that we all know.

"It was time to do a show where everyone knows this music and the songs have been time tested," said Sarkowsky. "This is a chance for the fans to enjoy classic as well as revamped versions of songs by some of the great blues artists," he added.

Each of the Northwest Blues Stars performed regularly at the Highway 99 Blues Club. The Blues Foundation honored the Highway 99 Blues Club with a Keeping the Blues Alive Award in 2017 in Memphis.

Too Slim and the Taildraggers opened the club in 2004 and played on the Highway 99 Blues Club's final night on New Year's Eve in 2018.

This special event will feature music from

BB King, Etta James, T Bone Walker, Koko Taylor, Little Walter, Eric Clapton, Slim Harpo and Muddy Waters. Scheduled to appear for this show are Kevin Sutton on guitar and vocals, Tommy Wall on bass and vocals, Jeff Conlin on keyboards, and Steve Sarkowsky on drums.

Special guests for the show include Polly O'Keary on bass and vocals, Kevin Sutton on guitar and vocals, and Joel Astley on harp and vocals. Polly, Kevin, and Joel have been awarded "Best of" awards by the Washington Blues Society and lead their own bands.

This should be a fantastic night of music and an exceptional salute to the blues.

October is Women-Owned Business Month!

Suggestions for funding for women entrepreneurs

Many years ago, the Bluesletter frequently featured local blueswomen on the cover in honor of Breast Cancer Awareness Month, and this year, I learned that the US Small Business Administration observes October to support women-owned businesses.

In our Talent Guide, we have about 50 women listed, and I hope this brief overview encourages Washington's blueswomen to think about potential ways to support their business apart from playing shows and selling CDs.

When I worked in grants for the US Department of Labor, and in other positions, one of my favorite things on my "to-do" list was looking for, and finding, funding and/or in-kind support for nonprofit organizations. I'm pleased that I've worked on several small grants that have been awarded to the Washington Blues Society to pay for some of the basics, like printing of the Bluesletter, upgrading equipment, and buying new merchandise for our booth.

A Unique Resource: StartUp Washington

I found a unique article on the StartUp Washington web site that referenced a study by the Kennedy School's Women and Public Policy at Harvard University that "Although nearly 40% of all privately held firms in the United States are founded by women, only 2% of U.S. venture capital funding is allocated to female-founded firms."

Wow. After reading that finding, I learned more about Startup 365, Washington's Small Business Training & Education Center. I found a single link on that site to 12 private sector potential funding sources set-aside for women-owned and -operated (http://mystartup365.com/ businesses private-small-business-grants-forwomen/).

When I had a small consulting practice, Eric Steiner Resources LLC, I relied on resources like this for funding, technical

assistance and training, and ideas on how best to serve state and county customers who engaged me in prospecting for sustainable funding sources. are hundreds of websites that provide information on grants, and I am pleased to share them in the Bluesletter from time to

In this article, I want to help readers, and potential grant applicants, learn about three of the 12 potential grant sources linked in the MyStartUp "Private Small Business Grants for Women" page. Some of these 12 sources have completed 2023 giving, and I encourage all readers to bookmark them to learn about future competitions.

The Amber Grant

I was struck by the information available at this informative grant site designed to help women entrepreneurs. There are many links to state resources specific for women-owned businesses. I looked at prior grantees funded under the Creative Arts category, and I am confident that Washington blueswomen and other artists would be competitive applicants for these funds. I was surprised that the application was just two screens with only six fields to complete. There's also a nominal \$15 application fee (but that's potentially deductible as a business activity). The site also does a good job of presenting how the fund invests \$450,000 through different competitions: Start-Up, Monthly Grant, Annual Grant, Business Category, and Nonprofit Grants. WomensNet awards a \$10,000 Amber Grant in a specific category, and this month's category is Creative Arts. As with all funding sources, it's important to learn who has received funding in the past to see if the application aligns with the funder's goals.

Fearless Strivers Grant

Mastercard seeks to fund small businesses owned by Black women through its Fearless Fund, which awards grants every quarter. In addition to funding up to \$10,000, the Fearless Fund also supports awardees through training and technical assistance in digital and online resources. This year's quarterly applications began on February 1st and ended on September 30th, and I encourage all Black-owned and -operated artists to learn when the Fearless Fund opens in 2024.

The Idea Café Small Business Grant

When I learned how to write grants in the 90's, the industry depended on paper. Over time, the field has adopted digital technology to manage applications, awards, rejections, and training.

I wished The Idea Café existed when I worked in grants for the Federal government, as it is a "One Stop Shop" for a treasure trove of information for not only first-time grantseekers, but also grant recipients with experience in this field. After I registered for a free account at The Idea Café, I had access to the "Grants Du Jour" and "Idea Cafe's Time-Saving Guide to Government Grants."

The latter site promises to "help you dig into the SBA, CFDA, SBIR STTR Grant Program, & many more!" Those acronyms reminded me of my old job at the former Region X office of the U.S. Department of Labor Employment and Training Administration.

Looking Ahead

Next month, I'll offer a list funding resources specific to rural communities, as I now live in Island County in a rural area on South Whidbey Island. This month, Rocky Nelson and I wrote about a live blues event with Nick Vigarino and La Roca Boom with Suze Sims in Brinnon, Washington, a rural community in Jefferson County and I hope readers will enjoy our article in this issue.

Shemekia Copeland Returns to Jazz Alley!

Join the Washington Blues Society and Welcome "The Queen of the Blues" Back to Seattle!

On October 17th and 18th, the Queen of the Blues, Shemekia Copeland, returns to Jazz Alley for two special shows. After Jazz Alley, Shemekia heads South for shows in Oregon at the OK Theatre in Enterprise on the 19th and the Alberta Abbey in Portland on the 20th.

2023: An Award-Winning Year!

This year, Shemekia received three nominations from the Blues Blast Music Awards: Contemporary Blues Album of the Year (Done Come Too Far), Female Blues Artist of the Year, and Vocalist of the Year. She won the Female Blues Artist of the Year at the 2016 Blues Blast Music Awards.

At the Libera Awards this past June at Town Hall in New York City, the American Association of Independent Music awarded Shemekia the Best Blues Record for *Done Come Too Far*.

This past August, Shemekia won five Living Blues Awards, including Blues Artist of the Year (Female), and Best Recording/Contemporary Blues for *Done Come Too Far* (Alligator) in the Critics' Poll. In the Readers' Poll, she received the Blues Artist of the Year (Female), Most Outstanding Blues Singer, and Best Live Performer Awards.

Shemekia started the year off at the 2023 Blues Music Awards, honored as Best Instrumentalist/Vocals.

Crowned Queen of the Blues

At the 2011 Chicago Blues Festival, Koko Taylor's daughter Cookie presented Shemekia with Taylor's tiara, and introduced Shemekia as "the Queen of the Blues" to carry on Koko's legacy. The State of Illinois and the City of Chicago issued proclamations in honor of "Shemekia Copeland Day" and she was honored in front of 100,000 fans at the 28th Chicago Blues Festival.

Five of Copeland's CDs have been nominated for Grammy Awards, and her latest Alligator

release, *Done Come Too Far*, was nominated for a Best Contemporary Blues Album at the 65th Grammy Awards, held at Crypto.com arena in Los Angeles in February earlier this year.

On the Radio: Blues Power Hour

As of press time, I've asked Jazz Alley if former Washington Blues Society Secretary Rocky Nelson and I could introduce Shemekia this year. When Rocky worked overseas, he hosted the very first blues radio program officially approved by Armed Forces Radio, "the Blues Power Hour." His alter ego, "Rock Khan" played music from many well-known artists, and on his Christmas Show, his set list included songs from Joe Bonamassa, Eric Clapton, Susan Tedeschi, and Koko Taylor. Taylor sang "Merry, Merry Christmas" from Alligator Records' Genuine House Rocking Christmas.

This month, Alligator Records will release *The Alligator Records Christmas Collection*. The album, originally released on CD only in 1992, will be available on LP (red opaque vinyl) for the first time ever. The new LP has been remastered under the supervision of Alligator founder and president Bruce Iglauer. The original CD sold over 90,000 copies.

Last October, Shemekia Copeland was on the cover of the magazine with a photo courtesy of Shemekia's long-term manager, and Keeping the Blues Alive Award recipient, John Hahn and Washington Blues Society Rick J. Bowen. That memorable issue also included a preview by Rick, a photo that John took of Shemekia and Buddy Guy in the studio, and Suze Sim's recollections of meeting Shemekia over the years.

Each show with Shemekia Copeland is special and I'm looking forward to her return to Jazz Alley. Join the Washington Blues Society and welcome "The Queen of the Blues" back to Seattle!


This month brings some exceptional blues talent to the Pacific Northwest, and I encourage Washington Blues Society members and friends to support live music at one or more of these shows.




Chest Fever: The Official Revival of The Band

Live Blues at the Cove RV Park & Country Store in Brinnon

A benefit for the Brinnon Fire Association with Nick Vigarino & La Roca Boom with Suze Sims!

On Saturday July 29th, Rocky Nelson produced a blues show at the Cove RV Park in Brinnon, Washington. The show raised awareness of, and money for, the Brinnon Fire Association, and featured Nick Vigarino and La Roca Boom, Sue Sims' newest band. Due to the Coupeville-Pt. Townsend ferry schedule that day, Eric caught Nick Vigarino's exciting set and asked Rocky to add a review of La Roca Boom's set.

Local emergency medical volunteers grilled hotdogs next to the stage at the Cove RV Park, behind the Cove Country Store, and we felt a shared, positive sense of community among RV park residents, attendees, and visitors alike.

In addition to the live music at the benefit, Shelton-based Hitchin' Vintage Trailers hosted a show of vintage cars and campers, and the photos I took of these classic vehicles simply do not do them justice. Eric had never seen vintage RVs presented in this way before, and I marveled at the time and talent invested in these showpieces.

This summer, Rocky worked with Cove RV Park & Country Store co-owners Dan and Summer Ventura to stage the event in the RV park. Dan also serves as the President of the North Hood Canal Chamber of Commerce. When not at the store, he works tirelessly to promote tourism and business from Brinnon to Quilcene, and points South, unofficially known as "The Emerald Towns."

In rural communities, entrepreneurs like Dan wear many hats. Rocky also did some research himself and secured funding from the Jefferson Community Foundation to host what might be the first-ever community fundraiser that featured live blues music in Brinnon.

"This event would not have been possible without the generous contribution and support from the Jefferson Community Foundation," said Dan.

According to the Cove website, campers have been staying at the RV park since the 1930s, drawn in by its proximity to hiking, fishing, clamming, hunting, and all sorts of outdoors adventures. It is located between the two small towns of Quilcene and Hama Hama nestled in a scenic area of Highway 101 that hugs the shore of the great fjord, Hood Canal, and at the eastern edge of the majestic Olympic Mountains. It's hard to miss as right out front of the store boasts the largest clam pile in the world, homage to the abundance of clamming in the area. Within minutes there are marinas, three major rivers filed with sea run salmon returning to spawn, Dungeness crab, multiple species of clams, and oyster beaches.

Nick Vigarino

Nick's set featured songs from his three CDs, Victim of Cool, Temptation Road, and Ghost of Time (recorded with Kathi McDonald, Long John Baldry, Robben Ford, and Brian Auger). His work on the slide guitar, and gas can guitar, is magical. Introducing "Zihua Stomp," Nick mentioned that he's been invited to the prestigious Zihuantanejo International Guitar Festival several times, and this song is a mash-up of down-home blues and world music. After a two-year absence, the festival returned in March of 2023 and Nick was one of four USA-based guitarists invited to perform. He also played one of his most popular live songs, "What Happened to Bo Diddley's Money?", a sad commentary on how record labels took advantage of artists during the heyday of AM radio. Nick also did his usual, crowdpleasing "blues walkabout" playing slide guitar with audience members' cell phones, coffee cups and nearly anything he could pick up from off the picnic table.

Nick Vigarino was the first president of the Washington Blues Society to serve a full term in 1990, and blues society members voted him into the Washington Blues Society Hall of Fame in 2000. In 2013, he received a Lifetime Achievement Award

from the Washington Blues Society. He was extremely excited to work with Rocky again.

"Rocky really knows how to take care of musicians," he said with obvious appreciation.

La Roca Boom

La Roca Boom, Suze Sims latest band, featured Suze's powerful vocals and percussion, Rob Gordon on guitars and vocals, Brian Hartman on saxophone and keyboards, Gary Ruhl on bass and vocals, and Rick Jacobson on drums started after the auction and raffle. Many shout-outs were given to the event coordinators, and Rocky was very grateful to be recognized in such a public manner.

Suze helped MC the event and promotion of donation-driven cause.

Folks loved her enthusiasm and poignant statements of positivity. Along with other standards, their covers of the Rolling Stones' "Can't You Hear Me Knocking" from *Sticky Fingers* and the Steely Dan classic "Kid Charlemagne" from *The Royal Scam* even got me up to shake a hip on and to offer more "cowbell" when she handed me the instrument. Suze's set certainly closed the benefit on a high note!

Folks came from far and wide and one of the people in the crowd that I interviewed is a blues DJ from Ocean Shores, Ricky B.

"I have been the host of the Blues Alley Show on KOSW 91.3 FM broadcasting from Ocean Shores for about six years and did promos for this Brinnon event six times a week for four weeks before the show," said Ricky B.

This did not go unnoticed by the event coordinators or the musicians.

"July 29th this year was a great day!" He continued. "I met a bunch of friends from Seattle at the Hitching Vintage Car &

Camper show in Brinnon, which was very cool. The big draw for me and my friends was to spend an afternoon listening to an amazing bluesman, Nick Vigarino. He was in fine form, joking with the crowd and laying down some tasty licks, and I especially enjoyed his gas can guitar work. After Nick finished his set, Suze Sims and La Roca Boom hit the stage running and turned in an inspired set. It was my first time seeing this band perform and I greatly enjoyed her funky flavored blues. The lady can flat out play and has a nice, powerful vocal delivery."

"I plan on catching this band again soon," he enthusiastically said.


Local resident, Daniel Boone, showed how diverse the crowd was in attendance.

"I attended the antique car event at the Cove RV park with my two boys ages five and eight," he said. "They had a blast looking at the classic cars. It was fun for me to listen to the live blues music and socialize with locals. The show was very family friendly and something for every age. It will definitely be high on my list of things to do next summer!"

There were many children in tow by their blues loving parents at the Cove RV Park.

The Brinnon Fire Association is a 501(c)3 non-profit organization that supports the Brinnon Fire Department through fundraising events like this benefit. These funds support the department with equipment, morale, and incidentals that may not otherwise be available due to budget constraints.

One of the more popular raffle items was Rocky Nelson's framed original watercolor artwork that paid homage to National Park Service posters created by the Works Progress Administration during America's New Deal in the 1930s and 40s. In the colorful poster, a vintage Ford Woody wagon is pulling a teardrop RV on the twists and turns of a picturesque Pacific Northwest forest road as the sun set.



CD Reviews



Ladv A Just Bein' Me (Self-Released)

Seattle artist Lady A or as she is oft referred to "The Real Lady A" doesn't pull any punches on the new album, Just Bein' Me, released July of 2023. The collection of original songs has theatrical R&B and soul blues with Gospel touches co-produced by John Oliver III and Dexter Allen, and the CD is crafted to make strong statements on the modern world. The centerpiece track, "Big Cup," is horn driven, straight talk directed at troublesome people. Guitar driven "Walking On Ice" is an indictment of social media struggles, and "Broken Pieces" spells out the deficiencies in our world that the pandemic revealed, while her solution to distractors is ignore them on the greasy groove track "Payin' You No T'antion." Lady A sings about love and its ups and downs, and hope and dreams, on the swinging opener "Could It Be," the smooth and soulful "Don't Walk Away," and the emotive "Wash These Blues Away." The piano driven alter call "God Is With Us," delivers a lasting message of hope that everyone needs. Rick J Bowen



Joanne Broh Band feat. Garry Meziere Head Full of Trouble (Double Records)

Portland-based vocalist Joanne Broh and her band enlisted man of their Oregon friends to help complete the three year album project Head Full Of Trouble that made is debut last month. Ten originals tracks co-produced and co-written by guitarist Garry Meziere and bolstered by the nimble rhythm section of drummer Ed Pierce and Jon Brand on bass, feature a dozen of the region's finest musicians. Energetic jump blues number "Shakin' It," open the set that touch all the bases of classic R&B, soul, and blues genres with an easy listening smooth style.

Standouts include the horn driven anthem of optimism "I Believe," the Latin flavored title track a smoking flat tire shuffle "Late December," and the sublime jazzy album closer "Blues on a Holiday." Rick J Bowen



Coyote Kings **Hot Mess** (Twin Lion Records)

Like so many artists, eastern Washington's Coyote Kings spent the bulk of their time during the COVID lockdown working on new material in the studio. The blues rockers from the high desert enlisted a cast of characters to complete their eighth album, Hot Mess, due out this month. The result is a collection of nine new originals and an inspired cover all centered around the collaboration of singer-songwriter guitarist and founder Robin Barrett and acclaimed vocalist Tiphony Dames. The duo is supported by bass players Ralph van Deurs and Robby Walker, drummers Gordon Townsend, Emilio Cabrales, and Curtis Johnson, along with a special appearance by saxophonist Nate Miller, and backing vocals from friends Nicole Mejia and Rita Fryer. As the title says, the tracks run hot across a variety of genres from rock to soul, blues to Latin and a touch of Gospel, but all maintain that signature Coyote Kings edge that has led the group to build a solid fan base since 2006 and become one of the most in demand bands in the greater Pacific Northwest. The opening track, "Nothing Left To Prove," rolls out like a sizzling R&B duet between Dames and up and coming saxman Nate Miller. The dual vocals of Dames and Barrett on "Bad Decision" work to great effect on the AC/DC meets The Who rambunctious riff rocker. Dames stands her ground on the slinky blues "The Best You Couldn't Do" that features a ripping lead from Barrett who then takes a rare solo turn on Introspective ballad "The Quiet One," a loving tribute to a longtime friend. Dames pours her heart and soul out on the emotive "Only Love I Know" and shows off her dynamic range. Barrett takes a trip into trance

rock on the groovy "Little Bit" with smooth 80's studio vibe. The album then takes a little side trip to the dark corners of the barrio on the smooth and mysterious "When The Sun Ain't Shinin." It's got subtle, salsa overtones. Barrett returns to traditional R & B and blues on the sweetly swinging number "Keep Rollin' By." The crisp funk track, "Butterfly," speaks to the wiley ways of a dangerous woman. Taking on any song from the Lennon & McCartney catalog is a daunting endeavor for any band, but here the Coyote Kings tackle one of the greatest, "Let It Be." The band expands the title track of the final Beatles album into a Gospel-fueled showstopper of power, prayer, love, and devotion, complete with soaring vocals and chiming guitars. Rick J Bowen



Count Basie Orchestra **Basie Swings the Blues** (Candid Records)'

On October 20th, Alligator Records' partner Candid Records will release a 12-song CD of blues songs interpreted by the Count Basic Orchestra, Basie Swings the Blues. Produced by Count Basie Orchestra Musical Director Scott Barnhart, Grammy-winning producer John Burk (Ray Charles), and Grammy-winning drummer/producer Steve Jordan (The Rolling Stones), the album brings together Robert Cray, Betty LaVette, Ledisi, and several other blues luminaries to showcase a legendary big band through a blues lens. I enjoyed "I'm a Woman" with Buddy Guy, Shemekia Copeland, and Charlie Musselwhite, "Boogie in the Dark" with Bobby Rush, and "Down Home Blues" with Keb' Mo' and Lauren Mitchell. I also liked "Just for a Thrill," by Carmen Bradford (hired Mr. Basie when she was in college). Basie Swings the Blues helps me rediscover the blues through a big band. Eric Steiner



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
