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LETTER FROM THE EDITOR



Hello Blues Lovers!

This month, because of a brief and frightening health scare, I had a chance to see what an amazing community we have.

The short version of a rather longer story is that I got a bit run down, then when I got sick due to something else, I flat out collapsed on the street and my poor husband had to call an ambulance and I spent the night in the hospital for the first time in my life.

I posted an account of that incident on my Facebook page, and I was immediately inundated with good wishes and concern from dozens of people from our music community. Many people sent me messages with their experiences and with suggestions for what to discuss with my doctor. Another thing that warmed my heart a million times over was the people who reached out to my poor, frazzled husband, to see if he was doing all right.

To this day, I still don't know exactly what caused my blood pressure to drop so suddenly or so far—I've certainly been ill before but never had my legs given out like that—but I learned one thing: if something more serious should ever befall me, I now know folks would be there for my husband, and I wouldn't be alone with it either, and that is such a comfort. I've seen this community rally for others who have had various crises, but it's different when it's me in the hospital, and finding oneself on the receiving end of all that warm concern is humbling.

We have a special thing in the Pacific Northwest blues community.

That community is really large, too. As I write this, I'm resting up from a busy weekend traveling to Idaho and Oregon to play music. We did a show in Boise on a Thursday night, with support from the Boise Blues Society.

The president and some of the other board members were there and they were talking about how they hope to coordinate with other blues societies in the region to establish a route for touring musicians. If the societies were able to offer, say, a Thursday in Boise, a Friday or Saturday in Spokane or Seattle, a Tuesday blues society event in Seattle, and then a Wednesday in Portland, swinging through the Pacific Northwest would be a lot more viable for mid-level national acts, especially during the off season.

I am quite excited about the return of Black Nativity, the annual Christmas musical play written by Langston Hughes and produced in Seattle for many years by Reverend Patrinell "Pat" Wright of the Total Experience Gospel Choir. Pat Wright died last year, and it seemed that the beloved annual Seattle run of the show might never

return after the COVID-19 years.

This winter it is back, and our amazing intern Will Crocket, who continues to write wonderful things for us even though summer is long over and he's back in school, has a great story about Black Nativity in this issue. It would be fun to plan an outing! Hit me up on social media if that sounds like fun and maybe we can round up a posse and go see it. I used to go every year and I have missed it! That's how I first heard the incomparable Josephine Howell, one of the greatest blues/gospel voices maybe in the whole nation. I remember thinking that if she and some of the other choir singers in the show started working in local blues clubs, people like me would never find work again. They are tremendously talented and skilled.

There are several blues society events coming up too, including the Holiday Party, and I hope I can see some folks there as well.

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Shemekia Copeland at Seattle's Jazz Alley!

She turned Seattle's most elegant room for live music... into a blues club on Chicago's South Side..."

This past October, I had the privilege of introducing Shemekia Copeland over the course of two nights at Seattle's Jazz Alley as she was touring on the strength of her 2023 Grammy-nominated CD in the Best Contemporary Blues Album category, Done Come Too Far (Alligator Records).

I was pleased that former blues society Secretary, Rocky Nelson, joined me as he interviewed Shemekia from her home in Chicago when he hosted the Blues Power Hour on Armed Forces Radio in Afghanistan in 2008. After the show, he gave Shemekia a CD of that same Christmas broadcast to the troops with her interview. More about that later.

And the Winner Is...

At this year's Blues Music Awards, she was nominated for Album Of The Year (for the Grammy Award-nominated Done Come Too Far, Song Of The Year (for "Too Far To Be Gone," co-written by John Hahn and Will Kimbrough), Instrumentalist of the Year (Vocals), and Contemporary Blues Album of the Year. Of these four nominations, Shemekia received the Instrumentalist of the Year (Vocals) Keeping the Blues Alive Award from The Blues Foundation in Memphis.

In September of this year, Shemekia Copeland received the Female Blues Artist of the Year and Vocalist of the Year at the 2023 Blues Blast Music Awards in her home state in Peoria at the 3300 Event Center.

In addition to these well-deserved nominations and awards, Shemekia Copeland also received five awards from Living Blues magazine's prestigious Critics' Poll, Best Blues Album of 2022, and Readers' Poll. More information: https://livingblues.com/30thannual-living-blues-awards-2023/.

Live in Seattle

At each Seattle show, she turned Seattle's most elegant room for live music into a blues club on Chicago's South Side or a Mississippi

Juke Joint. Each set would have been right at home at Theresa's or the Checkerboard Lounge on the South Side, or Po' Monkey's Lounge in the Delta or at the Ground Zero Blues Club in Clarksdale.

"She would blow the doors off of Red's" quipped Rocky about another world-class juke joint in Clarksdale.

She started each show off with "Walk Around Heaven," which featured the exceptional slide guitar from Ken "Willie" Scandlyn, who's played in Shemekia's band for the past 14 years. Ken was very generous with his time, talking to us about how much fun Shemekia's latest tour is, and how tight the band was. Bassist Kevin Jenkins has been with her 19 years, lead guitarist Arthur Neilson has served 25, and drummer Dan Hickey, who is also a long-time member of Shemekia's road-tested band.

"The shows in Seattle were so much fun," said Shemekia after the show. "It was especially great to see all the people from the Washington Blues Society. Those people know how to party. I had a blast!"

Each set included over 90 minutes of music. For me, Shemekia's plaintive and emotional treatments of "Clotilda's on Fire," which tells the story of the last slave ship to arrive on US shores five decades after slavery was outlawed. From the stage, she described how mainstream media covered this sad discovery of American history.

"This ship was on 60 Minutes, Questlove did a special show about the Clotilda, and there were about 27 books devoted to its discovery."

When I first heard "Clotilda's on Fire" on her Uncivil Wars CD, I wondered why it wasn't in every high school's history curriculum across the nation. It certainly should be.

During each set, Shemekia told stories behind the songs, and she honored the memory of her father Johnny Copeland and her mother, Sandra, who passed away last year. One of the most touching songs she

included in each set was "Nobody But You," a love song that Johnny wrote about Sandra. The audience delighted in Shemekia's traditional call and response on the song's upbeat refrain.

"She totally engaged the crowd throughout her sets," said Rocky.

I particularly liked learning about "that pretty boy" in her life, her seven-year old son Johnny. She also told us that she's "going to keep on making records" as she considers herself "the Susan Lucci of the blues," a reference to an actress who won her first Daytime Emmy Award on her 21st nomination.

"That was a stunner to me, " exclaimed Rocky. "John Hahn's songwriting and her powerful vocals are a natural for the Grammys!"

On John Prine's "Great Rain," guitarist Ken "Willie" Scandlyn fueled Dan Hickey and Kevin Jenkin's powerful engine room with a solid foundation on a song from one of Chicago's foremost troubadours from that city's folk renaissance in the late 70s.

When Shemekia talked about her husband. an avowed metal-head fond of bands like

Metallica, on John Hahn's "I Fell in Love with a Honky (in a Honky-Tonk Bar)," she said she sang this song at the Ryman Auditorium when she opened for Jason Isbell, in one of the most hallowed halls for country music in Nashville. For me, that's country music street cred of the highest order.

"That sure was a heel-kicking, country romp that must have been a hoot at the Ryman!" said Rocky.

"Ain't Got Time for Hate" is more than just a song that started her 2019 CD, America's Child. It's much more than just a slogan posted over an American flag on a T-shirt that I bought at Jazz Alley from Shemekia at the merch booth. I consider the song to be an urgent rallying cry for a decidedly divided United States of America in 2023.

Shemekia Copeland's sets in Seattle filled Jazz Alley each night. It was also a thrill to sit near bluesman John Stephan, whom Rocky recognized as a much appreciated performer at the Salmon Bay Eagles' Thursday Blues Nights, and reconnect with Scotty Harris, Barbara Hammerman and Amanda Gresham of United By Music North America.

"It was good to see you and Rocky last night at Jazz Alley," John Stephan wrote me the morning after the show. "I always hook up with Arthur and Shemekia when they're in town. I met them at Bumbershoot in Memorial Stadium 20 years ago while I was working with Bonnie Raitt. Nice people."

I particularly liked it when Shemekia recognized their work with United By Music North America from the stage. It was also nice to see current Washington Blues Society Secretary Marisue Thomas out on the town.

I asked Rocky, a former Washington Blues Society Secretary, to help me introduce Shemekia to a full and excited, blues loving house. I invited Rocky because I knew it would be special for him to share with Shemekia how much her career has meant to him and to her loving fans.

A Little History: The Blues Power Hour

In 2008, Rocky interviewed her by phone from her home in Chicago when he hosted the Blues Power Hour in Afghanistan on Armed Forces Radio during the allimportant Christmas radio program.

"The holidays are always a time of being with loved ones, and those in a war zone were far away from theirs, and in harm's way," said Rocky. "Her contributions were extremely poignant to those serving their country and missing their families from afar."

Rocky had not heard Shemekia perform since Koko Taylor's last performance at the Blues Music Awards in Memphis in May of 2009.

I noticed that Rocky was unusually pensive when Shemekia asked if she could "take us to church." Rocky nodded, and I thought of his work with the Rev. Al Green at his Full Gospel Tabernacle church in Memphis (especially when he worked with a Ft. Lewis Army unit to design and paint a large, motivational sign out of plywood with the troops,: "Less Al Qaeda/More Al Green").

At that moment, Scanlan and Nielsen's guitars launched into riffs straight out of Memphis on the John Hahn-Will Kimbrough's cowrite,"Walk Until I Ride," a moving song about the civil rights movement that is starkly relevant today.

"Her vocals are so uplifting that she makes

you feel you're living right," Rocky wrote in my notebook. "They are simply magical, especially for all those people who still believe in the magic of live music," said Rocky remembering John Sebastian's song that launched the career of The Lovin' Spoonful in 1965, "Do You Believe in Magic?"

"I have never had the chance to properly thank her," continued Rocky. "Thanks for the invitation, Eric. I'm very, very grateful. Please also thank Jazz Alley's owner John Dimitriou, publicist Rachael Millikan, and host Rob Perry for this opportunity."

"I first interviewed Shemekia 20 years ago in the corner not far from stage right. She clutched a stuffed Teddy Bear in her arms and seemed quite comfortable to discuss her musical career as it was just taking off," Rocky recalled.

"Each night on this tour, she powerfully took us on an emotional blues journey of love, loss, redemption and hope," continued Rocky. "With her dynamic and exceptionally diverse vocal range, she has matured spectacularly!"

As we left Jazz Alley, Rocky Nelson gave Shemekia a CD of his 2008 Blues Power Hour radio show, and she planted a kiss on his cheek.

"Thank you so much, Rocky," said Shemekia.

Several songs continue to resonate with me weeks, and months, after Rocky and I left Jazz Alley. Rocky was especially proud of her rocking rendition of Rick Vito's "It's 2 AM" that she left the crowd wanting still more for her curtain calls.

"This song was a foxhole favorite, and I played it on almost every Blues Power Hour show," reminisced Rocky.

"Her sets ran the gambit of country, blues and jazz but, she can also flat rock-out!" Rocky said with pride.

Black Nativity: A Holiday Tradition Returns

For 14 years, Langston Hughes's gospel songplay, Black Nativity, an all-Black adaptation of the Nativity story, was staged by Seattle's Intiman Theater.

This production of *Black Nativity* served as a staple not only of the festive holiday season, but also of our community's love for holiday spirit, faith, and quality drama.

The curtain fell on the last production of Black Nativity in 2012 at the Intiman Theatre due to a number of reasons, the most pressing being financial challenges.

However, after 11 years, it finally returns to the Intiman Theatre for the Seattle community for its debut on December 12th. and will run until December 30th.

Up until the last production of *Black Nativity* at the Intiman, legendary figures Jacqueline Moscou, Rev. Dr. Samuel McKinney and Patrinell Wright were the visionaries behind this renowned production. Attending their production of Black Nativity had become a tradition for many families during the holidays, and its 11-year absence has since been deeply felt by the community.

This season, new creatives of color are reinventing and renewing the production, who vow to respect what the production has meant in the past, in addition to bringing in their own perspectives and narratives indicative of the times. After all, a lot has happened since 2012.

Wesley Fruge', Intiman's current Managing Director and longtime theater expert, said that being brought on to Intiman has been an incredible honor. Fruge said that he has always sought to elevate historically marginalized voices and to keep theater alive as an effective tool for societal critique

"I think Intiman is really focused on bringing underrepresented voices to the stage, which is something that's a passion area of mine,"

"We're investing in new voices and younger

audiences and more diverse audiences to participate in this really important art formwhich is more than just an art, but it's also part of our democracy," he continued.

Fruge' said that the history behind Black Nativity is bigger than any one member of the project, or even the production itself.

"When you're out and you're meeting people and they're telling you stories about Intiman, they know Intiman better than I do," he said. "They might have been coming here longer than I've even lived in Seattle."

"One of the things that people tell me is the sort of impact that Black Nativity has had in their lives and in this community," continued Fruge'. "When you hear that so consistently, you're like 'There's something there that's missing that we haven't been able to do in many years."

Fruge' explained that he is excited to be working with Intiman's creative team and Black Nativity's new artistic lineup, including decorated Director Valerie Curtis-Newton.

"Valerie is one of the most storied, legendary directors in town and working around the country," he said. "We're very lucky that we've been able to collaborate with her so much... so lucky to learn from Val and get to see and enjoy her work."

Curtis-Newton, the Head of Directing and Playwriting at the University of Washington, Founding Director at the Hansberry Project, and renowned director and writer, spoke about the demand for Black Nativity in its

"Every year people were asking them when tickets were going to go on sale, so they (Intiman) knew that there was an interest in return of Black Nativity," she said.

"They just found themselves in a more stable place and decided to reinvest in community coming out of the pandemic," Curtis-Newton continued.

"It seemed like a really great opportunity to call folks together, and I was really honored to be asked to be a part of it," she said.

Jacqueline Moscou's production of Black Nativity left Curtis-Newton with an incredible legacy to honor. Curtis-Newton spoke about delivering this play with respect to Pat Wright and the other incredible community leaders that were involved in Black Nativity 11 years ago.

"All we can do really is try to lean into the spirit of the seasons, spirit of community and hope and faith," she said.

"We are faithful and believe very much that our gifts will be sufficient to make something beautiful and excellent. That's all that we think that Pat (Wright) would ask of us, that we do our best, and we do it in the spirit of love, and of the season."

Curtis-Newton explained that this year's production will have some of the same elements the Moscou's Black Nativity, but also will be influenced by recent social evolutions.

"Every year when it's done, the second act was sort of a reflection of the current times," said Curtis-Newton.

"The biggest reason for the different second act actually has to do with the pandemic. We spent three years basically, as a community of people walled away in a bubble," she said.

"Our driving force has focused on many questions," she continued. "Questions like: How do we help people come out of the bubble? How do we simply be in the presence of each other and be glad about it? How do we make a joyful noise together?"

In addition to Curtis-Newton, there are a number of new and returning voices that will be included in this year's Black Nativity, including freshman and veteran Intiman cast members Esther Okech, Felicia Loud, Shaunyce Omar, Yusef Seevers and Jarron

A. Williams.

The Black Nativity choir will also include both new and returning talents from Intiman. The creative team also features Choreographer Vania C. Bynum and Scenic Designer Jennifer Zeyl.

An Exceptional Year for Live Music in the Pacific Northwest

""I relished the idea of taking a walk back through my 2023 music memory lane."

This past year, I saw 59 live shows, and here's my top 10.

There have been a couple of times in my life where my cornucopia of music runneth over. One time was in New Orleans in April/May of 2001 when I took a job that had me go there six weeks of training. This included the last weekend of April and first weekend of May.... The New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Festival. Seven days of music of all genres by day at the racetrack, 21 days of many of the same bands of all sizes joining local bands at the smaller music clubs that make New Orleans the king of live music!

As this was my first year leaving the concert circuit, I still had a lot of friends touring. Turns out over the 42 days I was in NOLA learning a new job, I also saw nearly 60 shows.

We entered 2023 not knowing what to expect. This past year just seemed like maybe, just maybe, live music may return to the new normal after the Covid-19 pandemic shutdown.

I did not plan or commit to hit a certain number of shows in 2023. I kept meeting kind people who loved music as much (or even more) than I do. I went to shows with friends, or went alone, and just met other music fans. I saw that, despite what social media and the news tells us, there are so many kind people happy to take the chance to talk music with a stranger. One show turned into two, then 10, and ultimately 59!

As I was talking with Editor Emeritus Eric Steiner, I related my experiences during these shows to experiences he's shared. Always fun to talk with another brother in the blues!

Eric asked if I had time to write a small piece om the best 10 shows I saw this year. I relished the idea of taking a walk back through my 2023 music memory lane. Looking back, going to 59 shows was an achievement, and selecting my top 10 was hard work. Because I enjoyed each and every show I experienced this past year.

From Chateau Ste. Michelle Winery's amphitheatre, The Crocodile, The Neptune Theatre to Jazz Alley, The Triple Door, High Dive, Nectar Lounge, Climate Pledge Arena, Tacoma Dome, Aurora Borealis, and the Edmonds Center for the Arts, these venues and hosts gave us their best.

As I look back, I have seen many of these artists before, know personally, or just never was able to see them play before. Finally, here in Seattle, their tours ran through our beautiful part of the country. Some of these artists still had original band members, some have had a few replacements due to the nature of music, and others are road shows with rotating members. Seattle continues to show why she is home to many great things to so many people.

Here are my top 10 shows of the 59 I have seen so far in 2023. No numbering system for best to worst of the 10.

Mavis Staples, by far, was at the top of my list, 30 minutes in the summer as part of a larger four band tour.

By the way, 2024 is looking to have a great start with Gov't Mule coming back for three Pacific Northwest shows, and I'll preview their "30 Years Strong" tour in an upcoming Bluesletter.

Mavis Staples. She was part of the Trombone Shorty tour with Ziggy Marley and Robert Randolph at Chateau Ste. Michelle Amphitheatre in the middle of the hot summer. Her voice rings through the decades of The Staples Family performances and was right in front of me. Her voice is still so sweet and powerful. This sweet lady commanded the stage of extremely talented musicians and commanded the VIP visitor area after her set.

Trombone Shorty. I hadn't seen Trombone Shorty since my days working part-time in New Orleans in the late 90's - early 2000's before Katrina. He was always just a dude

in the crowd until he got on stage. His show was eye popping and wide open. The show he put on introduced me to his new repertoire as he has become a major stage draw all on his own. The few tunes from the old days brought a tear to my eye as memories came

The Northwest Blues All Stars. This regional supergroup recently played the Triple Door with bass players taking turns (Yeah, Polly, my first time seeing you doing it on stage... Yeow!). A cover of a Cab Calloway (Whoa jazz/blues swing- side roots of the Blues) found the vocals provided out in the audience standing atop the backs of the booths singing without amplification.

lazz is Dead. This show allowed me to see a band I hadn't seen since the late 90's now with Steve Kimock front and the long time bass player, Alphonso Johnson. Alphonso has been part of Santana, the Grateful Dead, Weather Report, and my memory was on a track to remember him from flugelhorn player Chuck Mangione's band. My older brother turned me onto Chuck Mangione when his song "Chase the Clouds Away" was picked to open the Montreal Olympics. I heard Alphonso play off of jazz great Esther Satterfield on "Land of Make Believe" from the same album. He stood five feet in front of me!

Dumpstafunk & Jon Cleary. This bill brought my New Orleans days back and as the concert began, the cold rain of Seattle

quickly faded and the warm Spring or Fall days I spent in New Orleans came back. Original tunes along with Doctor John and Professor Longhair covers had me tasting crawfish ettoufee!

GA-20. This trio from Boston is currently touring the world. They were at Nectar Lounge as an opener! Again, they were five feet in front of me. A trio but without a bassist. What? Yeah! I don't know how they bring so much bottom end but they bring another twist to the blues. A hot, hot mesmerizing show featuring gritty, Chicago blues from artists like Hound Dog Taylor & The House Rockers.

Too Slim & The Taildraggers. This award-winning band has a new drummer. I loved Shakey as the drummer, but the new drummer fits in in a different way. As I've written in Bluesletters for the Washington Blues Society and Blues Notes for the Cascade Blues Association, y'all here in the Pacific North-west turned me on to Tim and the band, and I want to see them every time I can. They are true Pacific Northwest blues artists and continue to thrill everyone in the audience (Shh, I think they thrill themselves too).

Tinsley Ellis, Marcia Ball & Curtis Salgado. One of my friends from Atlanta, Tinsley Ellis, finally got back to the Pacific Northwest after missing the pandemic dates and this time this 40+ year bluesman was on a double solo acoustic bill with Marcia Ball. He played Seattle with Marcia, and then played Tacoma with Curtis Salgado on a 2020 makeup date.

Most of you know Curtis and his band is a Pacific Northwest mainstay. Fans were singing along! His talent is showcased around the world. Tinsley and Marcia each played a solo set and then closed the show by playing several songs together.

Mark Hummel's Annual Blues Blowout. Mark's return to Seattle brought harmonica players from around the globe. They melded their styles together for a show that kept giving me the chance to see musicians share their talent for give and take as well as showcasing their individual talents. It was an incredible show where musicians came out into the audience to let us see them play like we were just sitting in their living room watching a friend play... an extremely talented friend play.

Los Lobos. "Just Another Band from East LA" played several shows over four consecutive sold out nights. Having seen them open for Tedeschi Trucks Band last summer at White River Amphitheatre, it was such a treat to be in such an intimate venue and being so close to them with an awesome sound system (and awesome sound tech running the sound board).

Sonny Landreth & John "Greyhound" Maxwell. This distinctive Louisiana bluesman and slide guitarist shared his unique style of slide and ran through a set list of tunes of local importance, from his own history and a new tune that he said they were working out in preparation to play at Eric Clapton's annual Crossroads Festival.

This acoustic and eclectic set was made even better by John Greyhound_Maxwell's night opening acoustic set played on his beautiful National guitars.

Dave Mason. I had never seen him before, although through my whole life, his songs where always there. From Jimi Hendrix, The Rolling Stones, Eric Clapton, David Crosby, to Steve Winwood and Traffic, Fleetwood Mac, Leon Russell and Bonnie & Delaney, Dave has been part of the magic. Again, in a small venue, his banter with the audience was so surprising and soul filling. Someone so big, just cutting it up with us in the audience.

Damn. Even Garaj Mahal played at the end of 2022!

Seattle, in terms of live music, you got it going on!

We're outta the pandemic shutdown. It's there for you. Support you favorite groups and your favorite venues. At almost every show, I took the time to thank the workers at the venues and they all responded so warmly! What are you going to do in 2024?

Hint: A majority of these artists say they try to come back to the Pacific Northwest every year, and I can't wait to see who is going to come back!





Robert "Bob" Stroger: The Godfather of Chicago Blues

During any conversation among blues fans, and knowledgeable blues aficionados, of blues bassists, blues vocalists, and blues entertainers throughout Chicagoland, North America, Europe, or South America, a leading topic of conversation is often the legendary, elder statesman and senior ambassador of the blues, Robert "Bob" Stroger. He's widely recognized as today's "Godfather of Chicago Blues."


I first met Robert back in the early 1980s when he performed with Jody Noa and the Sho' 'Nuff Blues Band on one of my Sopro Music Blues Revue Concert Events, which I have produced for nearly 40 years throughout Chicagoland. I encourage Bluesletter readers to read more about my production company, and many events that have brought rock and roll, blues, and classic rock 'n roll to venues across the region, at www.sopromusic.com. Working with Robert Stroger has been a real privilege and has been one of the brightest spots in my work promoting live blues music.

Let me tell you why.

Seeing and hearing Robert perform with his exquisite perfection, all-consuming stage presence, charm, and elegance, was (and is) absolutely astounding, to say the least. Over many past decades, Robert has performed at numerous Sopro Music Blues Revues and other concert events, and he was always undeniably the star of the show, hands down.

I've had the distinct pleasure of introducing Robert on stage many, many times over the years, and each time, I've considered it a highlight of my career promoting live music. I look forward to the next time I have the opportunity to introduce Robert again further on up the road.

Becoming a friend and brother in music with Robert has been an honor and privilege that I'll always hold dear to my heart. In Robert's company, I feel I'm in the company of blues royalty. Because I am. Robert is soft-spoken,

polite, and considerate, and always sharply dressed. At every gig, Robert's the sharpest dressed man in the room wearing one of his prized, custom-tailored suits, and while on stage, he dons his trademark Stetson, widebrimmed hat.

Robert was born in Hayti, Missouri, on December 27, 1930, and arrived in Chicago in 1955, where his family took up residence in Chicago's rough and tumble, fabled West Side. He eventually met up with other Chicago blues performers at Silvio's Nightclub

on West Lake Street where he began performing as a bass guitarist. Many blues legends played at Silvio's, including Bobby Rush, Freddie King, Luther Allison, Magic Sam, Eddie Taylor Sr., Muddy Waters, and Howlin' Wolf.

Not long after, he formed his own blues band which he named the Red Tops. At the time, Chicago club owners hired musicians with uniforms, and while Robert and his family band, which included cousin Ralph Ramey

on harp and brother-in-law Johnny Ferguson on guitar, couldn't afford suits and ties, a relative sewed red circles on top of the Red Tops' tam berets. Over time, the band's name changed, and first call players like fellow bassist Willie Kent joined the band.

During Robert's seven decade career, he has performed and recorded with some of the greatest blues artists of all time, including Eddie King, Otis Rush, Sunnyland Slim, Golden "Big" Wheeler, Mark Hummel, Carey Bell, Willie "Big Eyes" Smith, Jimmy Rogers, Buster Benton, Eddie "The Chief" Clearwater, Louisiana Red, Homesick James, and Snooky Pryor. Of course, I'm partial to the work we have done together at Sopro Productions!

Around his 91st birthday two years ago, Delmark Records released *That's My Name* from Bob Stroger and the Headcutters, featuring a Brazilian blues band that has worked with Bob over the past 15 years when he has played in Brazil. The Headcutters sound like they could have recorded at 2120 South Michigan Avenue in the 1950s, and feature guitarist Ricardo Marca, harp player Joe Marhofer, bassist Arthur "Catuto" Garcia, and drummer Leandro "Cavera" Barbeta. *That's My Name* also includes guest keyboard player Luciano Leães and saxophonist Braion Johnny.

Robert's own catalogue of recordings include *In the House: Live at Lucerne, Vol. 1*, on Germany's Crosscut Records (2002) and *Bob is Back in Town*, on a label founded by Sunnyland Slim, Airway Records (2007). In 1983, Bob was part of an all-star session recorded by Norway's Strawberry Records, *Blues Meeting in Chicago*, featuring Sunnyland Slim, S.P. Leary and Zora Young.

Robert's work with Kenny "Beady Eyes" Smith, particularly on 2014's Keeping It Together (Big Eye Records) and 2011's Grammy-winning Joined at the Hip: Pinetop Perkins & Willie "Big Eyes" Smith (Telarc Records) represents what I consider to be classic, old school Chicago blues music played

by blues masters.

Five of the prestigious awards that Robert has received include the Blues Music Award for Best Bassist from The Blues Foundation in 2011, 2012, and 2013.

Earlier this year, Robert received the Living Legend Award from the Jus' Blues Music Foundation at an annual celebration of the blues at the Horseshoe Casino in Tunica, Mississippi. The award recognized Robert with "A special tribute for an artist we respect as a living legend for their outstanding accomplishments and contributions to blues and soul music." I particularly liked David Whiteis' essay in the Jus' Blues award program, which ends with "In honor of his long and still-vital career as a tireless carrier of the blues torch, we are proud to present Bob Stroger with the 2023 Jus' Bluues Living Legend Award."

Whiteis received a Keeping the Blues Alive Award for Achievement in Journalism from The Blues Foundation in 2001. I encourage all blues fans to read not only Whiteis' page on Bob Stroger, but also the foundation's 40-page award program at https://www.jus-blues.org/2023-jus-blues-magazine.html

This past September, Robert received the Best Blues Bassist Award at the 16th annual Blues Blast Music Awards held at the 3300 Event Center in Peoria, Illinois. The *Blues Blast* is a free, weekly online blues magazine, and the June 20, 2021 issue features a cover story on Robert by Steven Ovadia with photos by Roman Sobus (https://www.blues-blastmagazine.com/featured-interview-bobstroger-2/

Robert, over the past seven decades, has toured North America, Europe, and South America.

At 93 years old, he continues to tour and perform without missing a beat, or a single note, on his vintage Fender Precision bass guitar while singing the blues, along with storytelling anecdotes, to adoring and dedicated fans across three continents.

Robert's current blues band, Bob Stroger and Friends, consists of an ever-changing line-up, includes drummer/vocalist Kenny "Beady Eyes" Smith, vocalist Kimberly Johnson, guitarist/vocalist Billy Flynn, guitarist/vocalist Joey Saye, vocalist Mike Avery, guitarist/bassist Ari Seder, vocalist Oscar Wilson, guitarist Eddie Neese, and pianist/vocalist Piano Willie. Bob Stroger and Friends regularly perform Chicago, Delta, contemporary, classic, and swing blues at blues clubs throughout Chicagoland and the Midwest.

When not playing with Bob Stroger & Friends, Robert also performs with Chicago's own West Madison Kings, with guitarist/vocalist Eddie Neese, bassist Mike McCune, drummer Pookie Styx, and keyboardist/vocalist Bill "One Take Willie" Shackford.

I've covered and explored plenty of Robert's history through his incredible music career, and I could probably write a 300+ page biography to cover his entire career. But that's for another time and place.

I trust that the readers and staff of the Washington Blues Society *Bluesletter*, (whose former president and editor, and blues journalist, Eric Steiner, asked me to write about Robert Stroger), will enjoy reading and learning about Robert's extraordinary life and times during his impeccable tenure as the world-class blues bass tone king and entertainer who will be fondly remembered for years to come.

As for myself, I'll always remember the times I spent with Robert, both on and off stage, and during the road trip when the Sho' 'Nuff Blues Band traveled to St. Louis to perform on the Wrangler Jeans Blues Competition Event.

Anyone who knows Robert knows that he'll continue to entertain us for years to come with the same grace, style, and elegance he has exhibited throughout his illustrious career, and he'll be heralded and remembered with love and appreciation by generations of blues fans for decades into the future further on up the road.

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CD Reviews



EightLock Lions Roaring in Quicksand (Steele Records)

Sometimes, you try listening to a new band because of a band member you know, and sometimes it's because the band's format piques your new band interest. In this case, the line-up piques an interest and the band's format is either going to be great or a train wreck. EightLock's founding father is none other than internationally respected guitar/ amp maker Paul Reed Smith (PRS). Paul explains the band name EightLock comes from eight strong musicians locked together in song. Based out of Stevensville, Kent Island, Maryland (an hour outside of Baltimore) since 1985, PRS guitars and amps are played by artists ranging from Carlos Santana, David Grissom, John Mayer, Eric Krasno and Jimmy Herring to Grant Mickelson (Taylor Swift), Kevin Oliver (Parliament), and Danny Rader (Keith Urban) and leading guitarists across all genres of music. Lions Roaring in Quicksand was released on December 1, 2023 with the driving single, "Breathe," out on November 10th. The CD has 14 tracks with 10 original songs and four covers, which include Al Green, Norman Whitfield (Motown) as well as Alejandro Alex Gonzalez Trujillo and Mana. The artist format includes three guitarists (including PRS), three drummers, a bass player, and a lead vocalist. Is this musical Nirvana? A train wreck? The 10 original tunes run an interesting gamut of styles which start with three drummers. Each drummer starts a harmonious groove of Baltimore funk straight from the Washington Parkway, "DC Go-Go "(stolen by so many and blended around the nation) and New Orleans Swing. OK, I heard one particular train wreck with the three drummers, but they persisted, and it became a distant memory. Instead, each brings their background to round out the overall beat of each song. Each drummer takes the lead and the others take rhythm (so to speak). What? Yeah, you just have to hear it to believe it! Can you imagine being

the bass player and having to complete the rhythm section by wrangling three drummers? The bass player's strength and experience navigates what could otherwise be very rough musical seas to pull together the melody and thump. Three guitarists that reached Paul's discerning guitar ear and piqued his interest. He has designed so many signature guitars for famous guitarists that you know he knows what to watch for and listen for. Although in a much different vein, Lions Roaring in Quicksand reminds me a little like hearing Les Paul play his famous guitar at the legendry Blue Note in NYC. Power chords, syncopation, and guitars through blasting through a Leslie speaker! Adding the strength of lead vocalist Mia Samone Davis, Lions Roaring in Quicksand is "...a heady brew of blues, soul, rock, funk and other roots sounds" that we're all in love with. Kirk Anderson



Lisa Biales At Christmas (Big Song Music)

Ohio blueswoman Lisa Biales' 11th CD is her first holiday CD, At Christmas. Nine of the 10 songs are originals, the one cover was written for Louis Prima and His Orchestra. "Shake Hands With Santa Claus." Recorded at Johnny Lee Schell's Ultratone Studios in Studio City, California and produced by award-winning drummer Tony Braunagel, the CD sounds like a few friends just hanging out, making music. Because that's what it is. The CD has been in the works since 2017, and Tony lined up some pretty accomplished players, and they wrote, rehearsed and recorded the CD in a week! Joining Lisa and Tony are seasoned pros like Chuck Berghoffer on bass ("These Boots Were Made for Walkin" from Frank and Nancy Sinatra), Johnny Lee Schell on guitar, and Jeff Paris on keyboards, David Carpenter on bass, Mark Pender on trumpet, Jerry Vivino and Ioe Sublett on sax, Garrett Smith on trombone, Michael G. Ronstadt on cell, Doug Hamilton on violin and Maxayn Lewis on background vocals. I enjoyed the jaunty

"The Boy I Met for Christmas," the rocking "Mary's Little Baby Boy," the title tune that joyfully evokes a Crescent City second line, and the playful "I Like You Mister Claus." I also enjoyed the nine upbeat, positive and forward-looking songs on this CD, but the story behind "When the Snowflakes Fall" reflects a reality faced by too many families (not only during the holidays, but all year long): "Her daddy never kept a job very long/Guess he went drinking all the time." I understand that Christmas-themed CDs are a decidedly niche market, but November 2023 CD reintroduced me to important messages of holiday music. At Christmas includes fun moments with Santa, a little dog named Lulu Magoo that will clean the floor for you, and the CD's closer, "Christmas Cheer" is an upbeat remembrance of all things Christmas. Various Artists **Christmas Collection** (Alligator Records)


This past October, Alligator Records released its 1992 CD, The Alligator Records Christmas Collection, on red vinyl LP. The original CD sold 90,000 copies 31 years ago, and the 2023 LP was remastered under label founder Bruce Iglauer's supervision. This timeless Christmas blues LP features 14 of the label's best-known blues artists, including Koko Taylor, Kenny Neal, Tinsley Ellise, Katie Webster, Elvin Bishop, and Charlie Musselwhite. Shortly before his 2009 Blues Power Hour radio interview with Shemekia Copeland, Armed Forces Radio Blues DJ Rocky Nelson introduced Koko Taylor's "Merry, Merry Christmas" on the all-important holiday broadcast for the troops far from home. I hope readers check out Rocky's reconnection with Shemekia at Seattle's Jazz Alley in this issue. I enjoy like William Clarke's "Please Let Me Be Your Santa Clause" and Son Seals' "Lonesome Christmas" on this reissued LP. I've got an unused LP player in my garage, and I'm going to unpack it to play The Alligator Records Christmas Collection. I hope you will, too. Eric Steiner

Closing out the evening is electric blues and slide guitarist, Jill Newman.



Steve Itterly's musical calling began as a teenager. Introduced to Bob Dylan, John Hurt, and Robert Johnson by his father, Steve felt moved by these legends, their passion, and raw potential of their guitar and vocal styles. Itterly called New York home until venturing to Boston after college where he studied country-blues and ragtime guitar with local legends: Paul Rishell and George Radcliff Thomas. However, it wasn't until after a move to Colorado, that Steve found his own voice and started writing songs.

Steve is the winner of the 2016 Telluride Blues and Brews Festival's Acoustic Blues Competition and represented the Washington Blues Society in the 2022 International Blues Challenge competition in Memphis as one half of the duo Lonesome & Pine. Steve has since shared billings with musical titans Bonnie Raitt, Taj Mahal, Keb Mo, Steve Winwood, and Anders Osborne.

Jonathan Pitman's musical journey began in Spokane at age 14 when his father gave him a box of harmonicas and instructions on how to play "Christmas In Prison" by John Prine. He spent his early years studying the recordings of Little Walter, Sonny Terry, James Cotton, and Mark Hummel to name just a few. Jonathan moved to the Seattle area in 2010 to further pursue his music.

He's quicky established himself as a versatile accompanist and has been a featured guest with many top local acts.

Although Jonathan is well versed in Chicago blues, that's not the only focus of his talents. Recently, he's also been working in projects performing Piedmont Blues, 1920's & '30's jazz, as well as bluegrass, and country.

This incredible evening of music also features Stevie & the Blue Flames, so please join your fellow Washington Blues Society members in celebrating two great blues acts on the second Tuesday at Aurora Borealis in Shoreline.
