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LETTER FROM THE EDITOR



Hello Blues Lovers!

Best of the season to everyone! I think I already got the best of the season. I was just about ready to turn in early the first Saturday night in December when I got a text message. It was from Rae Gordon, the Portland singer who came in third in the International Blues Challenge in one of the years I was down there and who is one of the best singers on the whole west coast. We've done a few shows with her band and

we all love her, because she is screamingly funny and incredibly nice and her band is, like so many Portland blues acts, phenomenal.

"My bass player can't make it to the Washington Blues Society Holiday Party, can you?" the text read.

I'm not taking a lot of work these days because I'm working about 10-12 hours a day on my dissertation at the University of Washington, but I found I had time for that!

So, the next night after Rae Gordon's text, I piled my gear in the rig and headed for the Washington Blues Society holiday party and made my way down to the Aurora Borealis on Highway 99, which, for you non-Seattleites, is a notorious stretch of bad behavior in high heels (and has been for a century).

I rather like it, despite the desperation out there along that historic road. Cities are so full of veneers, highly over-branded chain restaurants, personality-free hotel chains, soulless deserts of uninspiring retail, that the cold wet reality of Highway 99, the city with its makeup off, is something of a relief sometimes.

It's the same reason I love the blues. It's reality, heartbreak, and all. But I digress.

While I loaded in at the Aurora Borealis, I asked Rae's guys about the band playing on stage.

They sounded great, but I couldn't see them from backstage. They told me it was the Fat James Band! When I first moved to the coast in 1993, my little prog rock band competed in a battle of the bands that a Bellingham radio station had held at a crazy venue that was associated with a water slide park, as I recall.

The host band was a band called The Fat James Band, and the bass player needed to borrow my less-than-awesome Crate amp. I quickly found out he was better than me by several orders of magnitude. I was then quite proud he was playing my amp. That, of course, was Tracy Arrington, who was just about 30 at the time. He was a good friend for many years until we lost him in 2019.

We went on to win the battle of the bands, which was nice, we got enough free studio time to cut a single, and ended up moving to Bellingham because we liked it. We got to know the name Fat James extremely well. He was a legend even then. Now he's gone, too, of course, but I never forgot how fast they used to play "Messing With The Kid," and for kicks if I called that song at a jam I'd count it at mach speed, because the Donald "Duck" Dunn bassline for that no joke at any tempo and Tracy used to play it at the speed of light. It always makes me think of him, as my picking hand turns to wood about halfway through the song.

At the Aurora Borealis there were two remaining members of that legendary band, Chip Hart on drums and Dave Cashin on keys, with Chris Eger stepping into Fat James' shoes as few could and his dad doing an outstanding job on bass. Rae was sitting in the little hall we stash our gear in, fretting that her act wasn't nearly as rock-androll as the show onstage, hopefully no one would be disappointed?

I assured her no one would be disappointed. She's a trifle eccentric, as am I, and began to create fashion items out of holiday décor.

"I need a flower," she said.

I promised to get one and headed out into the ballroom. Gawd, was it packed. I had a heck of a time crossing the room because there were several hundred people I hadn't seen for a while. I finally made it to the other side, where CD Woodbury was doing the honors as Santa, and found some table decorations with poinsettias in them.

Mission accomplished, I found that flower.

I brought one back to Rae, and we both wound up wearing pieces of it.

What a good time that was! I was still boiling over about it several days later. This blues society really throws a great party. I never get to go to those things because I am always gigging, but this time I got to, oddly enough, because of the dissertation projects.

I have until March 15th to finish the thing, and then I'll get to go to lots of events, and you can bet I will!

The All Stars are produced by Highway 99's founder Steve Sarkowsky. Over the years, the group has played clubs, festivals, and special events. Now the group has landed at Seattle's Jazz Alley, one of the finest venues of its type in the country.

Back again will be the same solid and multiaward-winning lineup as the first two years.


Blues artists scheduled to appear include award-winning blues man Bob Corritore from Phoenix on harmonica, and two exceptional blues musicians from Portland, Oregon; Lisa Mann on bass and vocals and Ben Rice on guitar and vocals. This should be a highly anticipated show as it has become a regular feature at Seattle's Jazz Alley.

The first Blues Bash features music from 2024 International Blues Challenge competitors who will represent Washington State in Memphis, the James Howard Band and The Blue Healers. The January Blues Bash is the Washington Blues Society's annual, traditional sendoff party and fundraising event.

Please make plans to join us as the acts work on fine-tuning their International Blues Challenge sets, and the membership gets a chance to wish them the best of luck on Beale Street. The second Blues Bash at CCR on January 23rd features music from Whitewing.

The monthly Blues Bashes are presented free, and all are welcome. Aurora Borealis is an all -ages venue, and CCR Sports is reserved for patrons 21 and older.

We will have a door prize raffle with prizes including tickets to Jazz Alley in Seattle, and more. We encourage everyone to tip the band in support of their volunteer performances.

More about January's Blues Bash performers:

James Howard has been playing guitar for 46 years and teaching guitar professionally since 1984. In 2012, James won the Best Blues Guitarist award in Lee Ritenour and Yamaha's Six String Theory Global Guitar Competition, with applicants submitting from 49 countries world-wide. The James Howard Band won the Washington Blues Society's competition in 2016 and again in 2023 and represented the Pacific Northwest at the prestigious International Blues Challenge in Memphis, Tennessee. Diversifying to make a living in music, James Howard fronted his own band, worked as a sideman and studio musician for other artists, and played flamenco guitar at Benaroya Hall in Seattle backed by a 25-piece orchestra. He even played country guitar in Loretta Lynn's granddaughter, Tayla Lynn's, band. Currently James is producing an album by artist Chuck Cossan and touring backed by Kevin Cook on drums and Jack Dolan on bass.

Blue Healers is a roots duo based in Snohomish, Washington. Playing stripped down originals and covers with grit, Don Forsyth is an innovative guitarist with deep blues influences and an unconventional expansive and expressive style. Diane Forsyth is a singer and bass playing songwriter with soul, folk, country, and

interstellar influences. Blue Healers won the 2023 Washington Blues Society local blues challenge in the solo/duo category and will represent Washington State in Memphis in January 2024. They were also nominated Best Solo/Duo 2022 & 2023; Don was nominated Best Acoustic Blues guitar 2023 by the Washington Blues Society and best blues band by the Seattle Weekly in 2009. They have opened for Foghat and Baby Gramps and have shared the stage, and Don has co-written with the legendary songwriter Dan Bern among other honors.

Whitewing is a collaboration of musicians united by a common vision of bringing love and joy to the world through music with dedication to playing from the heart. This diverse Western Washington-based group brings sassy, soulful energy to both wellknown and hidden gem traditional blues as well as blues-influenced R&B, soul, and funk covers. Soul-singer Andie Whitewing is the lead vocalist and frontwoman of Whitewing. Born and raised on the Cajun prairies of Southwest Louisiana and deeply influenced by generations of ancestors who were professional musicians, she is a fourth generation recording artist and a voice for healing and social justice. With a versatile, dynamic vocal range and styling, Andie brings deep feeling and interpretation to every performance.





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2024 Tour Preview: Gov't Mule 30 Years Strong!

This year's Gov't Mule tour is titled "30 Years Strong" because 2024 begins the 30th anniversary of the band's first performances. So, to get Bluesletter readers in the mood for the tour, I reached out to industry professionals and friends of Warren Haynes who were there, back in the day, in 1993/1994 when Gov't Mule was little more than shit talk on one of the Allman Brothers Band's (ABB) tour busses.

I was there, too, back in Georgia, and hope that you'll join me at the Vancouver, British Columbia, Seattle, and Portland shows of Gov't Mule 30 Years Strong. The band plays the Vogue Theatre in Vancouver on February 8th, Seattle's Moore Theatre on the 9th, and Portland's Roseland Theatre on the 11th before heading down to California.

I've written about these formative tours, and years, for the Bluesletter, and other magazines like the legendary Hittin' the Note and wanted to reach out to friends and fans who were there in the beginning.

I looked for questions for Warren that would take him back from late Fall of 2023 back to 1993-94. I told each of his friends, and those who worked on that tour, that I would interview Warren for these articles with the slant that I would mention their name and ask Warren a question that they had contributed. Several agreed, and what follows is an edited summary of their contributions and Warren's replies.

Chris Samardzich, Owner and performer, with Peter Rabinowitz, of the Brotherhood of the Light since 1990 (torch passed from Brother Ed). Brotherhood of the Light was the original San Francisco psychedelic art light show (Google them, Bluesletter kids).

Chris remembers hearing a Gov't Mule demo (now released as Tel-star Sessions) in 1994 on the tour bus coming down the Hudson Valley to the Beacon Theatre in New York. Chris asked Warren, "Thinking back, how you would describe your feelings about

the demo and the band at the time of the Tel-star demo?"

Warren remembered the demos originally as a super low budget record. At the time, he and ABB bassist Allen Woody were just hired guns with the ABB. Together with

drummer Matt Abts, Warren shared that they had a shared mission, shared work ethic and loved the same music. They were just making it up as they went along. Great Memories and such a positive energy.

Kirk West (yep, I did a Bluesletter article

on Kirk's coffee table book, "The Blues in Black & White" in May 2021). Kirk was the ABB's tour manager at the time, and his wife Kirsten had purchased the 1970s home of many of the ABB. As they renovated it into what is now the ABB museum, the front room grew into an informal rehearsal space for Gov't Mule.

Thinking back to very early Mule days, the band loved Kirsten and her peach and cherry cobbler every night. By morning: 'ALL GONE!' Then, the first Mule tour from Macon to Athens and back to Atlanta's Center Stage Theater happened with a hitch. Or six.

"Had we not had that bus," said Kirk as he remembered Arthur's antique tour bus. "We would have been in a world of hurt."

"However, in three days, we experienced two accidents and air brakes!" he said.

Warren laughed at this memory, and recalled many storied events, including side swiping a parked car. He remembered standing outside of Rivalry's nightclub on Cherry Street in Macon, visiting with fans, and then someone yelled "the bus is rolling!"

Everyone is laughing until they realized the airbrakes had given out and the bus was rolling into the outside sitting area of the Rookery Restaurant next door. Warren remembers bassist Allen Woody, sharing that they bought a bunch of damaged Cinzano umbrellas that were at each table that night. Warren remembers that was a different life back then.

John Lynskey, Editor-in-Chief of the internationally acclaimed and distributed Hittin' the Note magazine since 1995, co-Author of Gregg Allman's bestselling autobiography, My Cross to Bear and resident historian at the ABB museum at the Big House in Macon, Georgia. John asked Warren about guitarists who influenced him and many were surprised at this question.

"Steve Howe, guitarist and vocalist for the band Yes," shared Warren.

I thought the influence is not overt, you can hear Warren's respect and reverence for Steve in many of the tunes in many of both Gov't Mule and solo Warren Haynes tunes.

Sara Thrift, longtime friend from college days at Emory University in Atlanta. Her first question was right after Gov't Mule completed their late fall 2023 European tour.

"As you are moving into the 30th year of the Mule, while turning a page with new bassist Kevin Scott, you seemingly are reaching back into the old school Mule repertoire full throttle again," said Sara. "Really good stuff! How does it feel to play these tunes and receive such a positive response?"

"Jorgen Carlsson (Gov't Mule bass player for 15 years) was out with Covid-19 while on tour, so they had to find someone who would be able to sit in for a few shows and keep up with the other members," said Warren. "Jorgen's 15-year run allowed the musicians to explore different realms.

Warren explained that in the same way, "Kevin's style allows them to go back and explore some of the excitement of the older catalogue in time for the 30th anniversary. The subsequent shows with Kevin went well as his style shifts the sound back to the early days right now."

Warren called Widespread Panic bassist and friend Dave Schools to see if he could sit in for a few shows since he had already sat in with the band after founding bassist Allen Woody passed. Dave couldn't do it but recommended Kevin Scott. The gigs went well and Jorgen returned for the tour and subsequent post Covid-19 recording of Heavy Load Blues and Peace Like a River.

In 2023 Jorgen decided to explore, as an artist, different roads. Change can be good or bad... really more about perspective and desire, eh? But Warren is excited to take the change dealt them and explore Kevin's style.

"Thinking back 30 years, is there anyone you've toured or travelled with who was as hard to round up to get on the (tour) bus as Allen Woody?" asked Sara.

"NO! (Dead silence)," Warren laughed. Warren remembers that Allen always seemed to get on the bus early and leave something so we knew he had been on the bus early... and then left the bus. Then, it was time to round up Woody! (This last one was for all of you out there that knew Allen.).

Now that you're a bit more caught up on the beginning of Gov't Mule 30 years ago, the winter 2024 tour called Thirty Years Strong gives us several opportunities to catch the Mule and this tour. Starting at The Vogue in Vancouver, British Columbia on February 9th, the tour winds down into Seattle the next night on February 10th at The Moore. An unusual night off so early in the tour off begs the question: Will there be a fill-in date on the 11th or maybe a related gig in the area?

Nothing as of press time. Then, the tour slides on down to Roseland Theatre in Portland before working down to Arcata and a gig back at The Wiltern in Los Angeles. This time, Gov't Mule isn't doing a side gig from the ABB gig at the famed Wiltern venue. This time, they are the headliners.

The tour continues down the left coast to Lincoln, California and then Oakland before heading back east by way of a gig at The Pearl in Las Vegas and back towards Texas.

So, that's three gigs within an easy drive of Seattle for 30 Years Strong. At press time there are tentative plans throughout 2024 to celebrate the 30-year anniversary of Gov't Mule, and the best way to keep track is www. MULE.net.

Leading up to the 2024 tour is the 14th Island Exodus, with four days and nights in Runaway Bay, Jamaica in mid-January when most of the US is gripped in the heart of the frigid winter. The line-up changes from year to year, but this year, Gov't Mule will host Island Exodus, featuring Warren Haynes solo, Robert Randolph (who was part of the bands who opened for Trombone Shorty

opening bands this past summer in Seattle), Samantha Fish along with Pressing Strings, and Wednesday Night Titans with saxophonist Ron Holloway.

By the time this article is printed, Gov't Mule will have finally been able to return to their New Year's Eve gigs at New York's Beacon Theatre.

Covid-19 and illness forced last minute postponements in prior years which has only sought to amp up the excitement on an already highly anticipated northeast mini run event in the rock-n-roll world.

For the Mule, and its extended family, early December means Xmas Jam.

What?

Every year Warren Haynes and Hardhead Management celebrate the holidays, the music, the musicians and the fans by putting on the Xmas jam which started in a small Asheville, North Carolina club and now has grown to the Harrah's Cherokee Center to try and accommodate all of the fans.

This central event brings together musicians from Warren's past, present and as we've seen future to come together around and with Gov't Mule to give musicians and fans a unique platform to ply their art.

Xmas Jam 2023's line-up included Slash & Myles Kennedy, Billy F. Gibbons, Jason Bonham's Led Zeppelin Evening, as well as American Babies, Karina Ryman with special guests George Port Jr., John Medeski, Bill Evans, Mike Barnes, George Morrow and more. Each musician donated their time and talent to support the Xmas Jam.

As if all of this wasn't enough, Warren and Hardhead donate funds raised during these shows to the Asheville Habitat for Humanity and now BeLoved Asheville.

This year, the musicians, fans and Asheville natives helped to get construction started on a home for a local veteran. Since 1988,



their efforts have raised \$2.8 million for the non-profit, built over 50 homes and helped pay for the infrastructure needed to service these homes for those who otherwise had few opportunities to attain the American dream of a safe and affordable home of their own

Prior to the Xmas Jam, Gov't Mule finished their Fall 2023 world tour supporting their latest release, Peace Like a River.

Running a little over two weeks and 11 European cities right before Thanksgiving, the set list make-up over the shows was of more Mule standards. It seems like the tour was a tune up for the 30th anniversary indoctrinating their new bassist to the old school of Gov't Mule.

Leading up to the European leg of the Peace Like a River world tour was a special run of shows dubbed, "Dark Side of Gov't Mule."

As I mentioned this run, Warren was quick to talk about what and why this happened as there seems to be confusion. The gigs were a set of Gov't Mule songs and a set of interpretations of Pink Floyd's Dark Side of the Moon.

This wasn't just some sort of one off tribute to rock's greatest music, but an idea that grew out of previous Gov't Mule Halloween themed gigs, like Holy Haunted House which was a Halloween tribute to Led Zeppelin.

Dark Side of the Mule which was a Halloween

tribute to Pink Floyd, and Stone Side of the Mule was a Halloween tribute to the Rolling Stones. Each of these shows are in the same vein as the 2006 New Year's Eve gig, Dub Side of the Mule, from the reggae genre.

Gov't Mule's last album, Peace Like a River, is tied to 2021's Heavy Load Blues, in that each record is a product of the band confined, like the rest of us, during the Covid-19 lock down.

Warren told me that as the lockdown was just starting to lift, they decided to take all of the songs they had written and all of the music they had been listening to into the studio.

This time, they were at the famous Power Station studio in Waterford, Connecticut. They had one large studio set up traditionally where they would record Peace Like a River. A more traditional album where the setup allowed them to explore contemporary, melodic themes the band would record during the day.

What was different, Warren explained, is that next door in the same facility, they set up one small studio with a low ceiling with their older equipment. They were set up right on top of each other to mirror the way old school blues albums used to be recorded. Think of the legendary Chess Records studio at 2120 South Michigan Avenue in Chicago.

After creating Peace Like a River during the day in a top-notch, technologically advanced and contemporary recording studio, they'd break for dinner, move next door into a decidedly old-school recording studio with that distinctly different blues feel, and create Heavy Load Blues.

This February, please join me in celebrating 30 years of Gov't Mule in Vancouver, Seattle, and Portland. I'm admittedly biased, and I'm absolutely convinced, that you'll enjoy the blues played by Gov't Mule, especially when they play songs like "Blues Before Sunrise," "Snatch It Back & Hold It," "Ain't No Love in the Heart of the City."

When it happens, it is always a surprise, and a joy

and an incredibly rich shared experience.

We four reached it Saturday evening, later in the gig,

I'm not sure which song,

but the combined sound we created suddenly became powerful and fantastic.

The swoon.

On stage, my eyes closed,


and probably a crazy grin on my face.

The experience is recognizable,

but rare and fantastic.

I have never asked the others if they feel it, too.

It seems they must.

Friends and special guests who will show off their pro skills include Lisa Mann, Pat McDougall, CD Woodbury, Joel Astley, Timmer Blakely, Dave Melyan, Melissa Buchanan, Robert Baker, Johnny Burgin, Rae Gordon, and more!

KEEPING THE BLUES ALIVE AWARDS 2024

- RECIPIENTS

Anne Marie & Jacques Garcia

A native of France, Jacques Garcia is a lifelong blues enthusiast whose transformative encounter with Muddy Waters ignited a deep passion for the genre that continues to burn just as brightly today as it ever has. Beginning in the early 1980s, Garcia, alongside his wife Anne-Marie, became a driving force behind numerous endeavors that have helped foster a thriving blues community in France. The creation and artistic direction of the Salaise Blues Festival between 1983 and 1991 stands as one of Garcia's most notable contributions. Additionally, Garcia co-created Rhésus Blues Productions (1986-1989), which organized European tours for renowned blues musicians such as Otis Grand, Joe Louis Walker, and R.L Burnside. In 2009, Garcia founded the Black Jack Blues Association, and between 2009 and 2011, he created and managed a blues club and festival in Ampuis, France that provided a stage for both local and international musicians. Garcia's role organizing the Robert Johnson 100th Anniversary Celebration in Ste Colombe, France, and his co-creation of a conference on blues history and culture in 2012 are two other notable achievements. In 2017, Garcia and his wife founded La Maison du Blues, a blues club and café in Châtres-sur-Cher. There, they have presented over 264 concerts featuring international blues musicians. La Maison du Blues subsequently came to encompass the Blues Preservation Association and the European Blues Museum, whose grand opening featured a performance from Bobby Rush. In 2023, La Maison du Blues collaborated with the France Blues Hall of Fame to expand the European Blues Museum, adding a documentary film center with a focus on blues and civil rights.

Larry Chambers

Larry Chambers has enjoyed a remarkably diverse and enduring career in the music industry, having showcased his talents as a songwriter, engineer, promoter, and influential figure in the soul blues genre. After beginning his journey in the midsixties in Memphis, Chambers went on to

make his mark as a songwriter for Fame Records in Muscle Shoals. His compositions graced the repertoire of notable artiists such as Wilson Pickett, Clarence Carter, and Candi Staton. Chambers also collaborated with Muscle Shoals Sound Studio and contributed co-written songs for artists on Malaco Records, including Johnnie Taylor, Bobby Bland, and Shirley Brown. In the 1970s, Chambers shifted gears into engineering, lending his expertise to several studios in Memphis. By 1978, he had entered the realm of promotions, working for Soul-Out Records before going on to carve his niche in independent promotion through the 1980s. The 1990s marked yet another evolution in his career when he received a call from John Ward to join the newly established Ecko Records. There, Chambers took on the role of Promotions Director; he also co-wrote songs for artists under the Ecko label. Notably, his collaboration with Ollie Nightingale on "I'll Drink Your Bathwater, Baby" became a soul blues classic. Today, Chambers remains an integral part of Ecko Records, where he continues to make substantial contributions as a promoter for an impressive roster of artists.

John Hall

John Hall's journey in the blues world began in 1971 during his senior year of high school, when he had his first contact with original blues music. This encounter became the catalyst for a lifelong passion for the genre. Over the years, Hall has been involved in a wide variety of endeavors within the blues community, in the process contributing significantly to the genre's promotion and development. Between 1995 and 2002, he served as the owner and operator of Rhythm Room Records and between 2002 and the present, has continued to operate and own Rhythm Room Entertainment, which produces and pro-motes some of the leading blues festivals in Massachusetts. Hall has founded The Green Harbor Roots Festival, the North River Blues Festival, and the South Shore Hurricane Relief Festival, which raised funds for New Orleans musicians impacted by Hurricane Katrina. He has served as Music Director for WATD 95.9 in Marshfield, Massachusetts, and as the Director of Advertising and Special Events for the Boston Blues Society. In addition to these contributions and his service as a judge for local blues society competitions, Hall has actively participated in numerous benefit concerts - just one example being the Musicians for Recovery Awareness event.

Mark Stenzler

Mark Stenzler, a native New Yorker and former radio pirate with Radio Free Ithaca, has been a passionate radio broadcaster on both sides of the Atlantic since 1978. In the 1980s, he relocated to Switzerland, where he continued his career in radio. A true blues enthusiast and a staunch supporter of public radio, Stenzler is widely recognized as the host of Blues Zeppelin, a program he initiated in 1989. Guided by the motto "Working hard to make reality a lot less painful," he has dedicated his time and talent to create a blues program that offers a blend of the finest blues music, news, and engaging interviews. The show can be heard on several radio stations, including Radio Bern (RaBe) in Berne, Switzerland; Radio LoRa in Zurich, Switzerland; Diis Radio in Canton Valais, Switzerland; WRFI Community Radio in Ithaca; and CJRO Community Radio in Carlsbad Springs, Ottawa, ON, Canada. Stenzler's contributions extend beyond the airwaves, as he actively collaborates with numerous festival organizers, music promoters, venues, and blues artists at various stages of their careers.

Laura Carbone

Laura Carbone is an accomplished Plattsburgh, New York-based photographer known for her contributions to leading blues publications around the world. Her work spans regional publications in upstate New York, national platforms covering blues music, and international magazines across Europe. Through her lens, Carbone magnificently captures the essence of the blues, in the process, supporting, promoting, and

expanding awareness of the genre. Beyond her photography skills, Carbone supports the blues community by wearing numerous other hats. As a promoter, she brings regional, national, and international artists to upstate New York. Along with providing unique work opportunities for these artists, her events introduce blues to a region where its presence was previously non-existent. Carbone goes the extra mile by organizing Blues in the School events, creating additional work for touring musicians, and actively supporting Kids Rock The Nation, a program that provides instruments and instruction to aspiring young music students. Moreover, Carbone demonstrates her commitment to the genre through generous acts of philanthropy. She contributes her photos to fundraisers, financially supports worthwhile causes, and frequently opens her home as a rehearsal space. Similarly, the popular house concerts she hosts provide an intimate setting for music enthusiasts. Remarkably, Carbone engages in these charitable activities without seeking recognition or expecting any tangible rewards, showcasing a genuine dedication to the blues community.

Lee Oskar

Lee Oskar, the renowned harmonica virtuoso and founder of Lee Oskar Harmonicas, has been a stead-fast supporter of The Blues Foundation and the International Blues Challenge. His contributions to the harmonica industry have earned global recognition for innovation and consistent excellence. Born in Copenhagen, Denmark, Oskar moved to the United States in the late 1960s. He gained fame as a founding member of the immensely successful soul-funk-rock group WAR. The band produced a string of charttopping hits, including "Slippin Into Darkness," "Lowrider," "Cisco Kid," "World Is A Ghetto," "Spill The Wine," "Me And Baby Brother," and "Why Can't We Be Friends." These songs became national favorites, receiving widespread airplay and maintaining high positions on the charts for extended periods. Oskar's distinctive approach to the harmonica earned him the prestigious

title of Instrumentalist of the Year in 1976, as voted by three major music publications: Billboard, Cashbox, and Record World. In 1983, in collaboration with Tombo Manufacturing of Japan, Oskar founded Lee Oskar Harmonicas. The company became globally recognized for superior craftsmanship and meticulous attention to detail. One of its groundbreaking innovations is an interchangeable system of reed plates, combs, and cover plates, which has become the gold standard in the harmonica industry. Today, the company continues to stand as a major player in the harmonica market, second only to Hohner Harmonicas in popularity and sales. Oskar's commitment to the harmonica and the music community at large is further reflected in his active support of blues initiatives and events.

Columbus Blues Alliance

Currently celebrating its 34th anniversary, The Columbus Blues Alliance is a vibrant and dedicated force in preserving, promoting, and advancing the blues in Ohio. Comprised of passionate volunteers, the Alliance has been instrumental in fostering a thriving local blues community through a variety of mediums and initiatives; the organization also serves as a statewide hub for the genre, collaborating with four Blues societies: the Blues, Jazz & Folk Music Society of Marietta, the Cincy Blues Society, the Northeast Ohio Blues Association, and the Cleveland Blues Society. The Alliance maintains strong connections with blues venues, notably Natalie's Music Hall, and has a long track record of supporting festivals, including the Creekside Blues & Jazz Festival, which has been a cornerstone of the state's blues scene for more than 20 years. On the education front, the Alliance has rejuvenated the Columbus Blues Hall of Fame, and, in partnership with Columbus blues artist Teeny Tucker, has facilitated Blues in the Schools programs. Another education-based initiative, 614BluesEd, developed in conjunction with the Blues Society of Omaha as a means to send youth acts to the IBC in Memphis. Of course, the Alliance also actively supports the blues acts who have emerged from the Columbus Blues Challenge and gone on to compete with distinction at the IBC. The resilience that the Alliance demonstrated through the challenging times of the COVID-19 pandemic deserves high praise. The role the Alliance plays fostering all-ages live blues shows, including events at J & D's Place, The Rumba Café, CJ's Soulfood, and others, reflects an ongoing commitment to making the blues accessible to diverse audiences.

Blues Association Turkey

Known in her native Turkey as the "Turkish Xena of the Blues" and the "Turkish Queen of the Blues," Goksenin Tuncali has been a prominent figure in the country's music community for the past twenty-five years. Her multifaceted role as a songwriter, performer, and music producer reflects her deep commitment to the genre. As the Founding President of Turkey's first and only blues society, the Blues Association of Turkey, established in 1995, Tuncali has played a pivotal role in shaping the blues landscape in her country. The Association has a strong youth component, conducting international art camps supported by the European Cultural Foundation of the European Union. Recently, young Turkish musicians were sent to perform at Roots & Routes in Cologne, in collaboration with arts organizations from France, Lithuania, the Netherlands, and Austria. Tuncali has made significant strides in increasing the visibility of female musicians through events like "Blues Loving Women! Raise Your Hands!" Her latest CD, "Women's Blues," reinterprets traditional Anatolian folk music through a blues lens. The Association also introduces Turkish audiences to traditional American blues through various platforms, including social media, Spotify, and the promotion of historic CDs. This award highlights the Association's dedication to fostering a vibrant Blues community, promoting diverse musical expressions, and empowering musicians across generations and genders.

CD Reviews



Danielle Nicole The Love You Bleed (40 Below Records)

Theme albums were once the staple of pop in the 50s and 60s. Grammy-nominated, seven-times Blues Music Award winner Danielle Nicolle works the topic of love with a modern blues rock edge on her new album The Love You Bleed, set for release this month. Nicole is an acclaimed vocalist and bassist whose songwriting skills are taken to the next level on this collection of a dozen original tracks. Partnering again with producer Tony Braunagel, who captured stellar performances from Nicoe, her partner guitarist Brandon Miller and drummer Go Go Ray, with support on keys from Damon Parker, the band presents a big dynamic sound that matches her powerhouse vocals. The opening track, "Love On My Brain," sets the tone with its rumbling groove and urgent vocals, and the sweet R&B of "Make Love," delivers a strong message of hope. Other standouts are the haunting "How Did We Get to Goodbye," the swampy "Head Down Low," and the lilting acoustic poem "A Lover Is Forever." Nicole's wide vocal range is on display from the tender soul ballad "Right By Your Side," to the molten rocker "Walk On By." Following up a Grammy nominated album is tough to do and Danielle Nicole has met the challenge with power and grace. Rick J Bowen.



Immediate Family (Magnolia Pictures & Magnet Releasing)

The textbook definition of "Immediate Family," is "A person's parents, siblings, spouse and children." For the band named The Immediate Family, consisting of Danny 'Kootch' Kortchmar on guitar and vocals,

Leland Sklar on bass, Russ Kunkel on drums, Waddy Wachtel on guitar and vocals, and Steve Postell on guitar and vocals, the term is more about the moment of clarity and instant commonality that materialized when they first played together, and it "immediately felt as they were a family." The new documentary created by Denny Tedesco who brought us The Wrecking Crew documentary, follows the work and lives of legendary 1970s session musicians who were featured on some of the most iconic recordings of that era. Their hundreds of album and tour credits include work with James Taylor, Linda Ronstadt, Carole King, Jackson Browne, Stevie Nicks, Phil Collins, and Keith Richards. The story is told through one on one and group interviews with the band, and the superstars they backed up, along with a treasure trove of archival material. As each song is revealed to have been a product of their endeavors, you are filled with a sense of nostalgia and awe at the breadth and depth of this body of work. The players each tell the story of their musical upbringing with color and charm, and each musician alluded to that common thread of seeing The Beatles on TV and setting the course to become rock 'n roll musicians. For real music geeks, each player recreates the part he played on one of the iconic hist songs from their discography as a "pull back the curtain" moment. The Immediate Family began touring and recording original material as a new band in 2020 after inviting guitarist Steve Postell to join the quartet. The film brings these unsung heroes into the limelight and offers us a glimpse at the unique chemistry and mental connection they share, so there is no need for a lot of discussions. "When you play together for this long," Kortchmar reveals, "things just fall into place very quickly and easily; we understand each other and understand what each other is going to do." One important communicator, however, is the song itself. "Each song tells us what it needs," Wachtel adds. If it sounds like their careers would make a good movie, you're not wrong. Rick J Bowen




Blue Healers Astro Blues (Self Released)

Astro Blues is a six-song EP released this month at the Washington Blues Society's send-off party for International Blues Challenge representatives in Shoreline at Aurora Borealis. The EP will be an important blues business card from the Blue Healers in their Memphis debut, the blues society's solo/ duo entrant in the Memphis blues competition. This EP is wholly an Evergreen State product, recorded and mixed at Thunderbolt Studios in Maltby by Steve McColl and Don Montana. and mastered at Black Belt Mastering in Brier. Blue Healers Diane and Don Forsyth, based in Snohomish, have recorded many of the songs that they played in their set at the Washington Blues Society's blues challenge finals at the Conway last year, including "How Come You Don't Call," "Astro Blues," and a particularly mournful song about miserably dark and perennially dreary (my opinion) Pacific Northwest winters, "The Weather." On the EP, special guest, and International Blues Challenge veteran himself, Dave Hudson adds exceptional drum parts that add significantly to the duo's sound. While I enjoyed each of the EP's songs as inventive original blues, the most memorable songs for me on the disc are "The Weather" and the opening cut, "Gotta Move On." "Gotta Move On is a textbook example of outstanding acoustic, country blues, and I hope this year's International Blues Challenge judges take note of this upbeat, and forward-looking song that's perfect for a road trip (as are several of the other songs on Astro Blues). This year, I plan to add both the James Howard Band and Blue Healers to each of my upcoming Blues on the Road columns as I believe it's incumbent on each blues society affiliated with The Blues Foundation to get the word out about their solo/ duo and band entrants in the International Blues Challenge in Memphis!
