

LETTER FROM THE EDITOR



Hi Blues Fans,

Th s month, I'd like to dedicate my letter to Paul Wasik, brewmaster and owner of the Rockfish Grill in Anacortes, who passed away March 19. He was only 67. Entertainers have a love/hate relationship with club owners, and there are some acerbic jokes made about them and so on. Paul was the kind of club owner everyone loves.

He loved music and he also loved people, which is an irresistible combination. His contribution to the Pacific Northwest music scene is hard to measure.

I remember when the Rockfish opened more than 20 years ago. I was still drinking back then, and I was a bit of a beer snob, so the place was a sort of heaven on earth, a brew pub with a lineup of craft beers that could keep a person like me entertained indefin tely. Once Paul made a triple bock so high proof it was supposed to be served by the wineglass, but the server hadn't been informed and kindly poured me a pitcher. The last thing I remember is trying to light a cigarette. The Rockfish, always ahead of its time, was non-smoking.

I was lucky enough to start playing at the Rockfish not long after it opened, and I have played it with every band I have been in since. Paul was always there, grinning from his table over at the side, happy to visit and talk. He and his business partner Rick Star brought in touring acts from all over the country, but it never seemed to go to his head, as it does to some unfortunates in similar positions who come to enjoy making local musicians feel small.

Paul was a familiar figu e in the music community, too, turning up at blues festivals and aff bly greeting the million people who knew and liked him. He won my heart forever, though, the night my group was playing at the Mirkwood in Arlington, another excellent club, and Paul showed up with a friend to see the show. I don't think I have ever seen, in all my years, a club owner leave his own club and drive half an hour to see a band at another venue. That indicates a generosity of spirit and a true love of music that is seldom equaled.

Paul made a wonderful mark on the world with the Rockfish, a listening venue with good food, a little room to dance, a lineup of outstanding craft beer, reliably great music night after night, and a

lovable brewmaster. He left s too soon, and he will be missed.

In other news, Editor Emeritus Eric Steiner sent me an email prior to leaving on a Holland America Line cruise to see this year's solar eclipse. He won't be back 'til the end of April (long after I upload my very fi st issue flying solo to Pacific Publishing). He typed his regrets about not seeing the May issue through to completion but did yeoman's work in assembling most of the content that he received prior to our "crunched" April 1st deadline. Eric warned the blues society Board that he would not have reliable Internet access most of April.

In that email, Eric offered me consistent moral support and encouragement as I'm deep in the throes of fin shing my doctoral dissertation at the University of Washington. He reminded me that, at the Washington Blues Society, we have a team of dedicated volunteers who host many live music events, produce this magazine, maintain a Musicians Relief Fund, and keep the blues very much alive in the upper left hand corner of the Lower 48 in good times and in bad. He also reminded me that we just might be the only Blues Foundation affiliate to have produced an all-volunteer, color 32-page monthly magazine before, during and after the COVID-19 pandemic. Most importantly, Eric reminded me that this magazine contributes a sense of community across our region, and that musicians and fans alike appreciate our work.

Eric ended his email with a few encouraging words, and perhaps more importantly, connected me to Christina Hill, Pacific Publishing's Commercial Printing Manager, who has rescued another issue thanks not only to her expertise in the In Design program, but in her generosity of spirit, technical graphics acumen, and exceptional technical assistance to help me submit my fi st issue flying solo!

On Screen: James "Super Chikan" Johnson: A Life in Blues

He's the real deal, a bona fide Mississippi bluesman."

In 2018, a good friend of mine, Toronto musician and actor, Raoul Bhaenja, and I were chatting on the phone about a super successful show he had recently when he brought famed Mississippi blues legend, James 'Super Chikan' Johnson, to Toronto to do a series of shows.

"Mark," he said. "He's the real deal, a bona fide, Mississippi bluesman! You should bring him to Vancouver and do some shows as well. Plus, he's a great guy, you'll love him!"

I then talked to my partner in my Vancouver band, The Mojo Stars, and we both decided that it sounded like a great idea.

I reached out to Chikan, who needed no convincing, and before we knew it, in January 2019, we were backing him up at a series of sold-out shows in and around the Vancouver area.

While we were in the middle of the shows with Chikan, talking to Raoul, he came up with yet another brilliant suggestion.

"Mark, you've always wanted to do a documentary. What about doing one on Chikan?" he asked.

Up until then, I had been working on short films and music videos with my wife, Maki, and my film making partner, Brian. I had always wanted to do a documentary. So, we tested the waters, pulled out cameras, filmed some of the Vancouver shows and conducted ad hoc interviews with Chikan. He was a natural subject! He was honest, revealing, and already more than willing to indulge in some introspection on camera. We were going to do our fi st documentary!

Once Chikan headed back to Clarksdale, we got busy and booked our tickets to visit him and start filming. Of course, within months the whole world would be in pandemic lockdown, so we bided our time until 2022 when Brian, myself, and a friend of ours on a third camera, travelled to Chikan's hometown of Clarksdale where we spent an intense week filming him, interviewing his peers, such as Cedric Burnside, Charlie Musswelwhite, Adam Gussow, and many others. We learned a great deal about the man behind the music. Once that week was done, we headed back to Vancouver and started editing. Back home, it wasn't long before we decided, that although we had some great footage, we needed even more to tell the full story.

With the help of a grant from the Mississippi Humanities, we headed back down south and one of our fi st stops was Jackson State University, where Chikan regaled a room full of eager young music students with stories about his life and career in the music business.

The students were absolutely enthralled, their enthusiasm perhaps buoyed by his appearance on the famed investigative journalism show, *60 Minutes*, the night before when reporter Jon Wertheim interviewed Chikan and Christone "Kingfish" Ingram about the blues in Mississippi. One week later, we were convinced that we had completely captured not only what made Chikan who he was, but also how his career and outlook on life had been shaped the environment in which her grew up. Not only in his home town of Clarksdale, but also across the state of Mississippi.

We also had the opportunity to interview more of Chikan's peers, none other than the great Bobby Rush, the 90-year-old multiple Grammy winner. Rush had acted as a type of mentor to Chikan many years ago.

We spent the next few months editing, working hard to get the film done in time for the 14th Clarksdale Film and Music Festival, which had invited us to premiere the documentary at their event. We succeeded in meeting their deadline!

On a clear, crisp Mississippi night, Brian and








I nervously stood at the back of a crowded theatre, watching Chikan and the audience watch our film.

It was surreal to watch those two years of hard work roll across the screen, but once the fi al credits had faded away, the reaction of the audience was far exceeded our expectations, with the best compliment coming from Adam Gussow, harmonica legend and the focus of Netflix's 2018 breakout music documentary, *Satan, and Adam*. He wrote that the film was "The best blues documentary I've ever seen."

The home crowd loved it, and most importantly, so did Chikan himself!

Once you have a documentary all wrapped up and ready to go, "what's next?" you might ask. The answer is simple. Share it with as many people as possible. We currently are negotiating with various distribution companies, and entering it into film festivals with the hope that it gets accepted and that we get to bring Chikan as a special guest. We have just received a confi mation to get another grant from Mississippi Humanities which enables us to travel back to Mississippi to screen the film at select theatres where we will have Chikan on hand to answer

questions and to perform.

On a musical front, in February of this year, we played the Saskatoon and Regina Blues Festivals in Canada, again with The Mojo Stars and Chikan.

We had a great weekend in Saskatchewan,

bringing Chikan's unique sound to some extremely receptive audiences, and getting to share the bill with one of Chikan's fans,

the Texan guitar slinger, Mike Zito.

Now, we are ready to come to Washington State to share with film and music lovers a movie about a man who really is one of the last true delta bluesmen. The fact that everyone will get to hear the music of that man, well... we think it doesn't get any better than that!

Blue Moon Marquee Receives JUNO for Blues Album of the Year

Congratulations to the Washington Blues Society's 2020 International Blues Challenge Representative!

The Washington Blues Society congratulates its 2020 International Blues Challenge representative, Blue Moon Marquee, for its well-deserved honors at the prestigious Juno Music Awards in the Blues Album of the Year (Album de Blues de L'anee) category on March 23, 2024 presented by Music Canada.

Blue Moon Marquee is a Canadian swing blues duo from Duncan, British Columbia, consisting of vocalist and guitarist A.W. Cardinal and vocalist, bassist, and drummer Jasmine Colette. The pair have been writing originals roots music and touring for over nine years, and in 2020 the duo went to Memphis, Tennessee to compete at the international Blues Challenge representing the Washington Blues Society. Their highly anticipated 5th album Scream, Holler & Howl, Co-Produced by Blues legend Duke Robillard captured their most sophisticated collection of songs to date and earned Blues Moon Marquee the Blues Foundation's Blues Music Award nomination for Emerging

Artist of the Year(2023). The release also swept the Maple Blues Awards (Canada's highest honor in Blues) with four wins including, Album of the Year, Songwriter of the Year, Acoustic Act of the Year and Entertainer of the Year. Most recently they were honored as at the Summer Solstice Indigenous Music Awards with Live Musical Performance of the Year and Roots Album of the Year and two JUNO award nominations Blues Album of the Year & Contemporary Indigenous Artist. On March 23, 2024, at the opening night ceremony at Scotiabank Centre in Halifax, Blue Moon Marquee received the JUNO for Blues Album of the Year.

Next month, see Blue Moon Marquee with the legendary Booker T Stax Review at Victoria's Royal Theatre on the 21, and at the end of July at the Salmon Arm Roots and Blues Festival in Salmon Arm, British Columbia. Welcome the Tedeschi Trucks Band Back to the Northwest

We have five opportunities to experience the Deuces Wild Tour in our region this month!

Four years ago, a fi e destroyed the spire and roof of the Cathedral of Notre-Dame, the 856 year old cathedral built under the reign of King Louis VII. The China-US trade war heated up. School shootings continued. Teachers went on strike. Denver legalized magic mushrooms.

Hmmm.... depression?

We have so much going on around us, and sometimes we have to fi d our center.

One chance I missed was at Seattle's Paramount Theatre in May of 2019 to see the Tedeschi Trucks Band. But two nearly sold out nights worth of fans were lost in the music as the band toured on their *Signs* CD. The 2,800 seat theatre sits at the corner of 9th Avenue and Pine Street. The venue was built in the late 1920s by Paramount Pictures as the Seattle Theatre specifi ally as a palace for the burgeoning movie and vaudeville industries. The acoustics allowed the artists of the Tedeschi Trucks Band on stage to engulf the concert goers and melt away the headlines of the day.

Fast forward three years. Headlines feature the continued battle over abortion access, the drug war in Mexico flaring up, and the stabbing of Salman Rushdie. Th s time, the band returned to Seattle to play the 16,000 seat White River Amphitheatre in Auburn for one night supporting their amazing fourpart project, I Am The Moon. Th s project is the prequel to Eric Clapton's Derek and the Domino's Layla and other Assorted Love Songs, released by Polydor Records in 1970. It is the story of the epic love between Layla and Arjan. I was at this memorable show and was transported past the news of the day for the three band line-up that featured the band's keyboardist/writer/vocalist Gabe Dixon Band, Seattle favorites Los Lobos, and the 12-piece Tedeschi Trucks Band. Fast forward two years later. The US prepares for another contentious Presidential election, the Israel-Gaza war produces loss and pain in a new spasm of a long time confli t threatening to bring in other regional political entities, while the Summer 2024 Olympics in France promises to bring people together.

Th s time, the Tedeschi Trucks Band is back at Seattle's Paramount Theatre with back-toback Memorial Day shows on May 27th and 28th. These gigs follow shows at Portland's Keller Auditorium to launch the summer 2024 *Deuces Wild* tour on the 22nd and 23rd, and a show at Vancouver's Queen Elizabeth Theatre on the 25th. After Seattle's shows, the band will head south down the left coast to California before heading back east. As of press time, the tour has 48 shows at some of North America's most respected concert halls, such as the Paramount, The Greek, The Beacon, and Red Rocks.

We are very lucky as the tour's Pacific Northwest and Lower Mainland shows are billed as "An Evening With...," meaning that there is no opening act. We are the only ones to get full nights of the band this summer! The rest of the tour has supporting artists Little Feat, Margo Price or Greensky Bluegrass. Yeah, all great bands, but opening acts mean shorter headliner sets. If past solo headliner gigs for the band are any indicator, we'll get between 2 and 2 ½ hours of this 12 piece incarnation who have been working together for three years now. Several media outlets are calling their current tour as the best live performances out there right now.

Stock market advisors tell you 'that past performance is no guarantee of future performance." The same can be said of the music industry. Everything I am reading right now shows that the Tedeschi Trucks Band continues to use their past as a basis for their artistry, and they are using their platform and artistry to keep getting better. A 2022 interview with Rick Beato (check it out on YouTube, AWESOME), Derek makes a comment that has rung in my head as I wait to see them live again: "You know, you have a 6th gear if you need it." *Spinal Tap* tuned the amp to past the high end 10 up to 11. Can't wait to see Derek and Susan shift past 5th gear into 6th!

Read with me as I get you up to speed for this tour.

Working from their home base in Jacksonville, Florida, the band uses the recording studio behind their home called Swamp Raga, a lot like Jimi Hendrix used Electric Ladyland to record all parts of ideas and use the unlimited studio time to experiment. Originating in 2007 the band's prior incarnation, Derek Trucks and Susan Tedeschi's Soul Stew Review, felt their way from the original King Curtis influence. Th ee years later they formed the original lineup of the Tedeschi Trucks Band.

Over 13 years, the band has produced five studio releases, three live CDs and then 12 archival releases of what they feel were stellar live performances. These serve as a springboard which is realized by 1,200 live shows and 13 Grammy nominations... winning 10, including Best Blues Album, Album of the Year, Band of the Year, Blue Rock Album of the Year, and Best Contemporary Blues Album.

Their fan platform, called Swamp Family, provides member exclusives, such as select free live recorded performances and exclusive information about the band. Swamp Family also tries to break the insane ticket broker headlock on fans by offering concert ticket pre-sales at fair prices without the cruel ticket broker mark-up.

Last year ended with the band playing a run of "Garden Parties" at Boston's TD Garden followed New York's Madison Square Garden. They toured Japan, did a couple of dates with the Eagles, and worked a Big Easy Cruise out of New Orleans.

The band moved into 2024 in mid-February in Atlantic City and wound their way back to New York's Beacon Theatre celebrating

their 56th show at one of the world's most revered music meccas. That same month, adding fuel to the fi e up fans locally, Pollstar announced the 48-show Deuces Wild summer tour starting right here in the Pacific orthwest.

Moving down the east coast, Allman Brothers Band legacy member Duane Betts joined the Tedeschi Trucks Band at the historic Warner Theatre in Washington while President Biden delivered the State of the Union address from the nearby White House. Derek Trucks is the nephew of the Allmans' drummer Butch Trucks and he was named after the Derek and the Dominos band with Eric Clapton and Duane Allman. Duane Betts, named after Duane Allman, is the son of Dickey Betts, the Allmans' cofounder, guitarist, writer. Duane also tours with the Allman Betts Band, with Gregg Allman's son, Devon, and he also tours with his own band, Duane Betts & Palmetto Motel. Relix Magazine covered the show, and one of the show's many highlights was Duane Betts joining the band for stellar performances on two Allman favorites written by his father:

"Blue Sky" and "In Memory of Elizabeth Reed."

April also saw the Tedeschi Trucks Band go Down Under, as they had several gigs in Australia before Susan and Derek fulfilled their invitation from seven-time Grammy award conductor Vince Mendoza to perform at the Kennedy Center in Washington, DC. Mendoza produced "Here It Is: A Tribute to Leonard Cohen" as they joined Bill Frisell, Don Henley, Trisha Yearwood, Ben Folds, and JD Souther. How many other exceptional performances in Washington, DC, will they do? Remember: Susan and Derek joined Warren Haynes at the White House to perform for President Barack Obama at the "Red, White & Blues" concert, and their version of "I'd Rather Go Blind" is one of the most moving performances of that classic Etta James song ever sung (https://www. youtube.com/watch?v=07rT1t2hkDU).

In early May, with festival season in full swing, the band is part of the Sun, Sand and Soul Festival on the white sand beaches of Miramar Beach, Florida. A three day festival where the band headlines two days and shares the stage with Blackberry Smoke, The Teskey Brothers, Karina Rykman, JJ Grey & MOFRO, Maggie Rose and again with Duane Betts & Palmetto Motel. Th s is Blackberry's fi st gigs after drummer, Brit Turner, unexpectedly passed away.

After the festival, the band will take a couple of weeks off to rest up for the summer tour that kicks off in ur own back yard.

As the summer of 2024 continues, the Tedeschi Trucks Band is slated to open for Chris Stapleton's stadium show at Globe Life Field in Arlington, Texas, and the band will also be a major draw for the four-day Bourbon & Blues Festival in Lexington, KY, in September. Over the summer, I expect that the band will announce their fall and early winter tour legs. I also expect they will announce their plans for 2025, and fi st on their calendar is the Dead Ahead Festival in January on the Riviera Maya.

Finally, to get you ready for the upcoming gigs, there is an interview I mentioned earlier with Derek Trucks from the summer of 2022 backstage at Atlanta's Legendary Fox Theatre. The interviewer is one of the best music interviewers who has knowledge of the instruments, songwriting, performing, and does his research. I've never seen Derek talk so much and be so engaged. Check out the Derek Trucks interview by Rick Beato on YouTube (apologies, geeking out again!).

As the May *Bluesletter* hits the streets, you have four weeks until the Tedeschi Trucks Band returns to the Pacific Northwest (and Lower Mainland) with five opportunities to experience the Deuces Wild" tour.

Always in memory... Kofi Burbridge, keyboard player and flautist of the Tedeschi Trucks Band. He passed away in 2019 on the day that the band's fourth CD, *Signs*, was released, and he added so much to the band's sound.

Seth James Lessons (Qualifi d Records)

In the age of Spotify, making a playlist of your favorite artist's songs has become as easy as click of a button. Texas troubadour Seth James has taken that obsession one step further and made a deep dive into the catalog of one of his all-time heroes, Delbert McClinton, and recorded an album of his songs as a loving tribute. The 11 song collection includes well known hits and some lesser known deep cuts from the member of the Texas Heritage Songwriters Hall of Fame. For James, the natural choice for this endeavor was to partner with Grammy winning keyboardist, guitarist, producer, songwriter and engineer, Kevin McKendree, who worked with Delbert for 25+ years. The pair built an all-star band for the sessions at Rock House Studios including former members of Delbert's band to give each track depth and authenticity. James has the uncanny approach with his vocals matching the style of McClinton who created a signature blend of blues, R&B, rock, country, soul, and roots funk that earned him the moniker "the Founding Father of Americana" by Rolling Stone. With the Lessons CD, Seth James and Kevin McKendree pay tribute to Delbert McClinton's skills as an artist, which is to surround oneself with great people who help you manifest your dreams and ambitions in to reality. Shawn Kellerman Kell's Kitchen (Songsurfer Records)

Why don't I like Shawn Kellerman's new CD *Kell's* Kitchen? I pay for Sirius/XM in my car and for the past two weeks, Kellerman has me wasting subscription money I pay them as Kell's Kitchen has been on repeat in my car for two weeks! What's not to like? From the disc opener "SKB," Shawn invites each of us to "...party with the SKB." The tune opens with a slow drum roll quickly joined by Shawn's wide open Fender solo as the band joins in and Shawn's distinctive voice pushes the action. In this tune, Shawn has four driving solos that keeps you interested as a driving double bass kick pedal/keyboard bridge gives a sonic pause before the band jumps back into the tune. The songs are fresh with fun, straight forward blues, rock,

funk, Chicago Shuffle, Southern Boogie and stomp. The songs don't bog down after the opening two or three songs. Shawn takes what he learned from his mentors and seamlessly weaves in his own ideas. Early reviews of Shawn's vocals have called them "serviceable," but on this CD, I thought the skills that Shawn has learned are on full display through this album as he shows several vocal styles that support each song. I often hate pompous critics looking for "who knows what." It's hard not to provide a quick sentence to highlight each of the 14 songs on Kell's Kitchen, because each song has something unique that somehow Kellerman weaves into a coherent release. Somehow, Shawn manages to direct 22 different players contributing to the disc. One of which was his mentor Lucky Peterson who Shawn supported on tour for eight years. Lucky passed away in 2020, but Shawn has resurrected a favorite clip of Lucky's as he plays his Hammond B3 on the closing song, "Living Off the Love You Give" from Little Milton. Bobby Rush, another one of Shawn's employers, shows his love for Shawn on vocals and harmonica on "We are Blues Men." At 24, Bobby invited Shawn to move from Kitchener, Ontario to Mississippi to join his band and play the 'chitlin' circuit (small bars across the south where African Americans found their only source of income from music back in the day). It's New Orleans Harmonica master Jason Ricci who I fi ally got to see live at Mark Hummel's Harmonica Blowout at the Triple Door in Seattle that adds his unique harmonica style on three of the tunes on Kell's Kitchen adding to the driving nature of the disc. Since Shawn was a teenager, he's played 34 states and 20 countries as he's got much more to come. Shawn's on the job training came from Mel Brown, Bobby Rush, and the late Lucky Peterson as he usually played with older musicians. Not only did he learn how to leave it all on the stage(or studio), he learned about songwriting, song composition, collaboration and the art of getting the sound in your head...onto the media. In Kellerman's fi st three CD's released in 2001, 2007 and 2009, you can see his growth and influences as the discs shows glimpses of Shawn from the future. But the newest release, Kell's Kitchen, shows what he's been learning the past 15 years. He delivers it with an unvielding nod to the blues and rock. Kirk Anderson.



Anthony Geraci Tears in My Eyes (Blue Heart Records)

Taking to heart what Oscar Wilde famously said, "Imitation is the sincerest form of flattery," award winning piano man Anthony Geraci pays tribute to the old masters on his second CD on Blue Heart Records, Tears In My Eyes. The CD has 11 new tunes recorded with his band the Boston Blues All-Stars, which features guitarist Barret Andeson, drummer Marty Richards, Paul Loranger on bass, with with special guest's violinist Anne Harris, and old friend vocalist Sugar Ray Norcia. The hot off the fl or tracks are from two studio sessions and refl ct what veteran players know and love about the world of blues, jazz, jam and soul. In the throwback manner of the heyday of the genre, Geraci and the band booked a session at Studio Faust Records in Prague in the Czech Republic when they were in the midst a five week 2022 European tour to catch the group at their peak. Seven original tunes emerged from a day of recording with engineer Derek Saxenmeyer. The remaining four tunes were recorded in February 2023 at Wellspring Sound Studio in Acton, Massachusetts resulting in very diverse album from very fi e blues players. Rick J Bowen



Blind Lemon Pledge Oh, So Good (Self-Released)

Blind Lemon Pledge (James Byfi ld) knows how to mine the depths of acoustic blues and roots songwriting like few others. The Bay Area guitarist, poet and roots music devote' returns with his 10th CD, Oh So Good, released this past February. Joining him on 12 new tracks are Peter Grenell on bass and Juli Moscovitz on drums who add gentle accompaniment to Byfi ld's mostly acoustic guitar work and home spun vocals on a set of 11 originals and an imaginative cover of the beloved "House of the Rising Sun." Blind Lemon Pledge again demonstrates his gifts as a prolific songwriter who continues to fearlessly explore the depths of folk, jazz, blues, and Americana by plying together clap trap rhythms with sweet swinging melodies and evocative imagery. 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Powerhouse Line-up of Blues Rockers to Headline Winthrop 2024

The Record Company, Galactic, Colin James, Eric Gales, and Nikki Hill are among the top acts at what will be a formidable lineup at the Winthrop Rhythm and Blues Festival July 19-21 this year. The gamut of performances run from Americana and roots through traditional blues, New Orleans funk, zydeco, and old-school rock and roll, all tied together by a deep relationship with the blues.



Galactic is one of the world's most famous and influential New Orleans jazz funk bands. For more than 25 years they have blended New Orleans' frenetic "bounce" funk with hip hop, traditional brass, blues, jazz, electronica and rock to become a leading instrumental band and a backing band for some of America's greatest legends, including Macy Grey. Their albums often feature vocals from greats including Irma Thomas, Juvenile, Cyril Neville, Mavis Staples, Allen Toussaint, and JJ Grey, as well as bounce icons Katey Red and Big Freedia. The rhythm section of Rob Mercurio on bass and music historian Stanton Moore on drums form one of the most instantly recognizable groove partnerships in modern music. Fronting the band since approximately 2016 is singer Anjelika "Jelly" Joseph, who was offered the spot after several collaborative performances were highly successful. The Record Company formed in 2011 and blew up in 2016 with a debut album that earned them a Grammy nomination for Best Contemporary Blues Album. The trio describes their sounds as influenced by rock and roll like the Rolling Stones, proto-punk like the Stooges, and roots blues like John Lee Hooker. That combination has won them multiple slots on top late-night shows, world tours, and opportunities to open for B.B. King, Trombone Shorty, John Mayer, and Grace Potter, among others. Colin James is one of Canada's most enduring blues rock legends. For more than 30 years, the blues-rock guitarist and singer



has put out multi-platinum albums, top radio charts in the US and Canada, and won all of Canada's top music honors. Colin has toured, recorded, and performed with some of the world's most revered artists including Bonnie Raitt, Albert Collins, Pops Staples, Robert Cray, Albert King, Keith Richards, Lenny Kravitz, ZZ Top, Mavis Staples, Luther Allison, Roomful of Blues, Bobby King and Terry Evans, John Hammond Jr., The Chieftains, Carlos Santana, Little Feat, Johnny Hallyday, Jeff Healey, and Buddy Guy.

Eric Gales is in the running for top blues rock guitarist in the world today. The other top contender, Joe Bonamassa, is a close friend of his, and produced Gales' most recent album. Gales, a left- anded player, has been establishing himself as a guitar icon since he appeared on the science at the age







of 16, 30 years ago. He is often compared to Jimi Hendrix, but he draws on multiple influences such as Albert Collins as well. His shows are intense, as he and his band whip audiences into a frenzy with his searing guitar work and powerful sound. (Photo by Steve Rose).



Nikki Hill is back. She came out of the gate swinging in 2013, touring heavily behind a smash hit debut album that featured her satin and sand voice that went from velvet croon to wildcat screech in a heartbeat. Her performances are dynamic, a feast for the eyes as well as the ears, as she delivers stylish, contemporary blues and old-school rock and roll that draws on the Pentecostal churches of her youth, rock, rockabilly, and soul. Winthrop Rhythm and Blues festivals always include some of the Bayou region's top zydeco acts, and this year's traditional Louisiana zydeco act is **Dwayne Dopsie and the Zydeco Hellraisers**. Dwayne Dopsie is the son of a famous zydeco artist and has




been playing accordion since he was seven. Chris O'Leary comes to Winthrop from the heart of the blues world. He was inspired to pick up the harmonica at the age of 10 after seeing The Band live with Levon Helm on drums and getting the Muddy Waters Hard Again album. O'Leary spent many years mastering the instrument, and years later, someone gave Levon Helm a recording of O'Leary's work. Helm was so impressed he took O'Leary under his wing. O'Leary moved to New Orleans to be in the house band at Helm's bar, where he and Helm backed artists, including Hubert Sumlin, who featured O'Leary on the 2003 album About Them Shoes. That album also featured Bob Margolin, who helped O'Leary get his fi st album out, which one the Blues Blast award for Best New Artist Debut. (Photo by Paul Natkin).



Diggin' Dirt is a seven-piece band from Humboldt County in California that has grabbed national attention for a unique style of funk and soul. Tinsley Ellis Live from Bluesland on KMRE Radio!

Tinsley Ellis Talks About his 21st album, Naked TruthBy Leo SchumakerChicago.

Here is an interview that I did with Tinsley Ellis today my Bluesland radio show during the production of this month's Bluesletter. Tinsley's new album is Naked Truth on Alligator Records just released in February 2024, and I hoped our conversation sparked blues fans to attend his performances last month.

LS: I have the pleasure of talking to Tinsley Ellis tonight in support of his 21st album *Naked Truth* on Alligator Records featuring Tinsley on a Martin acoustic guitar and a Steel guitar. Tinsley your new album is beautifully recorded. Where did you record it at?

TE: I recorded it at two different studios. 11 of the 12 songs I recorded at my home studio. The 12th song I recorded, "Death Letter Blues," was recorded at Eddies Nine Volt (9 Volt) studios.

LS: "Death Letter Blues" is a Son House song. Why did you pick that one out to record?

TE: That song is pretty much a blues standard. I wanted to do my version of it. I usually perform it at my shows. I did a set on my usual electric show and now that's all I do is solo acoustic which is a full extension of that style of music.

LS: Tinsley you wrote nine of the tunes and also covered the Son House song that we mentioned, a Willie Dixon and a Leo Kotke tune. You are known as a electric blues master. Was it a challenge making an all acoustic album?

TE:Th s album,Naked Truth , is of what I play now at this point in my career.

LS: This is upcoming tour is a long trip. You're bringing a Martin guitar and a steel guitar. Tell us how important the Martin guitar is to your music.

TE: The Martin is a T-35 60's era guitar. It's a guitar my Dad, Tinsley Ellis Sr., gave me when I was in high school in the mid 70's. That's the guitar I wrote most of my songs on and now I perform with it so it's come full circle. The other guitar I'm bringing is a 1937 National Steel guitar which is the kind of guitar that Son House would have played with and Muddy Waters would have started out and played before he went electric in LS:Th s album, Naked Truth," is on Alligator Records where you've recorded several albums. What is so special about Alligator Records?

TE: Alligator is the world's leading producer of blues-rock now that Chess Records is gone. I've been with Alligator Records three different times including 1988 to 1998 then Capricorn Records, which seemed so promising with artists like The Allman Brothers, Wide Spread Panic, and others. Unfortunately, they went out of business when my album came out. I went back to Alligator Records with a couple of studio and a couple of live albums. Then I left again to start my own Heartfi er record label. I've been on a lot of record companies. It's sort of like they're passing me around like a joint.

LS: Tinsley you produced this album your-self.

TE: Yes, I did with the exception of the Son House song, which I recorded as a demo which I felt had the mojo of the original tune.

LS:We talked about Chess Records which was the home of Willie Dixon. You cover Don't Go No Further that you is on your album. How did Willie Dixon influence you?

TE:Willie Dixon was one of the fi est songwriters and producer at Chess Records. Willie produced Muddy Waters, Howlin' Wolf and Chuck Berry. There was a time in the 80's that I could have had worked with him and had him produce me. I wish I had.

LS: You have a great tune "Window Pane" in the style of Skip James. Tell us about that.

TE: The song is in the style of Bentonia Mississippi blues with Skip James tuning on the guitar. I used the Martin guitar. That's my favorite track on the album.

LS:Who else influenced your sound?

TE: I'm from Georgia, so The Allman Brothers was my local band with Duane Allman, Gregg Allman and Dicky Betts. If someone had told me I would get to open up for them and get to know them I would have said they were kidding me. I miss Gregg Allman.

LS:Tell us how B.B. King influenced you.

TE: When I was a kid some friends of mine and I were listening to Mike Bloomfi ld and Al Kooper's Supper Sessions album and an older brother of my friend came into the room and told us to listen to the source of where that type of music came from B.B. King. I went to see B.B. King show at a teen show where the bar would close down the liquor sales and B.B. was up on stage. My Dad took us down there and I sat in the front row. That show blew my mind because I could hear where Gregg, Johnny Winter, Peter Green and others got their influence from. B.B. King greeted us all in the lobby and talked to us for a long time. During the show B.B. broke a guitar string during a song and without hesitation nodded to the sax player to solo while B.B. took a guitar string out of his pocket and a little string winder, put the new string out and came back in tune and on time. B.B. gave me that broken guitar string and I still have it. Thank you for helping support my new album Naked Truth. For more information go to Tinsleyellis.com.

The Washington Blues Society's local competitions for the 2026 International Blues Challenge in Memphis have been set! It's time for bands and solo/duo acts to make their plans to compete. One band and one solo/duo act will represent the Washington Blues Society (WBS) in Memphis at the world's largest gathering of blues musicians on January 7th-11th 2025 on Memphis' fabled Beale Street.

We are working with multiple Blues Societies across the state to hold semi-finals to make it easier for blues acts to participate. We will hold semi-final competitions on Sunday, June 2nd in Snohomish, WA, at Collectors Choice, on Sunday, June 9th in Seattle, WA at Aurora Borealis, on Sunday, June, 16^{sh,} in Spokane, WA (Venue TBA), on Sunday, June, 23rd in Sumner, WA (Venue TBA), on Sunday, June, 30th in Vancouver, WA (Venue TBA). The finalists will compete on Sunday, August 26th in Conway, WA at the Conway Muse. If we receive more than 10 applicants for any semi-final event our Board may select applicants via a lottery on May 31st, 2024.

Each competition will follow the rules of the Blues Foundation. Each set will be limited to 25 minutes, and each competitor will be allowed one 15-minute set change. Any blues act that in resides in WA, OR, ID, MT, BC or ALB, may enter, and the act must include at least one who is a Blues Society member of an associated Greater Pacific Northwest Blues Society must be verified as part of the IBC entry. The contest entry application may be downloaded from www.wablues.org, or in the August edition of the WBS Bluesletter and must include the non-refundable entry fee, which pays for the backline and a PA system. Each winner will be required to perform at a minimum of two fundraisers in 2024 and one fundraiser in 2025 at no charge. Proceeds from these events and fees, will be deposited into a WBS fund to help defray expenses to get each winning act to and from Memphis, but we cannot guarantee an "all-expense paid" trip. Band entry fee is \$30; solo duo entry fee is \$15. Applications and entry fees must be received no later than Saturday, May 25th, 2024.

All proceeds will help with expenses for Memphis. The WBS will help winners in fundraising, but cannot guarantee that all expenses for Memphis will be covered. Judges will evaluate each act using the Blues Foundation scoring criteria (www. blues.org/ibc/scoring.php) and rules (https://blues.org/official-ibc-rules/). Acts may not be affiliated the WBS Board upon application. IBC rules also prohibit any act from competing three consecutive years at the IBC. Application is an initial statement of interest and not a binding agreement between the applicant and the WBS. Make your plans to enter now! Applications and entry fees must be received no later than Saturday, May 25th 2024.

Be advised- We need at least two solo/duo acts and two band acts to hold a semi-final event. If we do not have enough entries for one of our semi-finals we will allow those affected to move toa different semi-final
