#### LETTER FROM THE EDITOR



Dear Blues Lovers,

First things first: We could use a volunteer or two to write CD reviews of about 300 words each. Blues artists and publicists send us CDs for review every week or

so, but we don't have enough writers to get to them all. People like to read CD reviews, so we'd sure like to have more of them!

This issue includes two stories centered on Clarksdale, Mississippi. Clarksdale is one of the most interesting places I've ever been, so I am glad to see it. The first story is a 2021 interview with the colorful Clarksdale character Bill Luckett, who died shortly after the interview was done. We've published excerpts of the interview before but never the full thing. The interview, though, gives a great account of the culture of Clarksdale, including the surreal experience that is the Ground Zero blues club, and appears here in its entirety.

The second is a story about Clarksdale artist Super Chikan, who visited Seattle and Tacoma on a tour that combined screenings of a new documentary about him with live performances. My husband and drummer, Tommy Cook, and I were lucky enough to take the rhythm section role in the performances at those shows, and we also got to watch the documentary of Super Chikan's life in Clarksdale.

Clarksdale is an odd blend of life imitating art imitating life. It can be jarring. I have played at Ground Zero, the club once coowned by Bill Luckett. When I got there, it felt like a potent connection with history. It's an old building, a former grocery store that sat empty for 30 years, and it's beat up, with paint flaking off the brick walls, corrugated tin sheets buckling off the sides of an outdoor table, and garage sale chairs inside scraping on old wood floors. Every surface is covered with old posters, graffiti and band stickers, and the ceiling beams are festooned with extension cords and Christmas lights.

Then I learned that Morgan Freeman coowned it with Bill Luckett. It's not beat up and ratty because that's all the owners can afford. It's intentional. It caters to a strange American appetite for some authentic experience of the rural poverty that gave birth to the howl that was and is the blues. I realized that Clarksdale is not entirely what it seems, and I wasn't sure what to make of it.

I think about Clarksdale a lot. It's a pretty unique place. The first time I went to that town, I was touring with Randy Oxford over 10 years ago. We were competing at the International Blues Challenge in Memphis, and Randy had built a short Midwest tour around that competition. Beale Street in Memphis is a gaudy, cheerful place jammed with tchotchke shops and music bars, illuminated in neon light, and replete with signs advertising "finger lickin' chicken" and

Because Clarksdale is recognized as the birthplace of American blues, I expected to find a similar street when we arrived there the day before Martin Luther King, Jr. Day in 2014.

There was almost nothing there. The monument to the crossroads with the guitars is impressive enough, but there is no gift shop nearby, no "finger lickin' chicken" place or music club with hawkers leaning out the doors to entice passersby. At the time, there was only Abe's BBQ, which looks like it predates Moses, two gas stations, a laundromat and a U-Haul place.

We stopped at the crossroads marker at the intersection of highways 49 and 61, where legend has it that Robert Johnson signed a contract promising the devil his soul in exchange for his prodigious talent and fame. If he did, he got a raw deal; he is perhaps America's first member of the "27 Club" of musicians who have died at that age.

I've been to Clarksdale several times since that first visit with the Randy Oxford Band. Since then, my trio has played the Hambone Art Gallery nearly every summer. The gallery is owned by the remarkable artist and musician Stan Street, and blues artists from all over the world play his intimate venue in downtown Clarksdale. I look forward to returning there next month.

These days, I realize how complex Clarksdale is. It is a place of considerable poverty still.

Half the downtown is boarded up. It's also still producing some of the world's best blues acts like Super Chikan and Kingfish. Ground Zero might be cosplaying as a beatup old blues joint, but the blues music on its stage night after night, including Chikan, is as real as it gets. The economic struggle of Clarksdale is as real as it ever was, too. People go there looking for a connection with what the blues was yesterday and find what it is today, a blend of history and modernity, myth and reality.

Sheesh! That got pretty philosophical. Playing music with Super Chikan and guitarist Mark Rankin, who was one of the two friendly Canadian filmmakers, was a joy. Chikan's a blast, and said lots of nice things, too, which was most encouraging. I sure hope we can get him back to the Northwest. As those who attended can testify, he's in a class by himself.

### Fondly Remembered: Clarksdale's Bill Luckett

"We run around like a bunch of crazies; I would call it 'Mardi Gras on steroids."

Co-Editor's Note: We are publishing Rocky Nelson's original interview with the late Bill Luckett as taken from a recorded phone conversation between Bill and Rocky mid-October 2021. Shortly after this conversation, Bill unexpectedly passed away. I folded some of this interview in Rocky's "Destination Clarksdale" article in the November 2021 issue, and upon reflection, feel that it's long past time to print the interview in total to not only honor Bill Luckett, but also Rocky's original intention. (Eric Steiner).

I'd like to share a few things with Bluesletter readers that came out of my October 2021 Washington Blues Society Bluesletter "Memphis Calling" article. In September of 2021, from my work location at Fort Polk, Louisiana, I flew to Memphis for a short vacation. In that article, I added that I was listening to Delta Kreme by the Black Keys on KROK-FM while on my way to the local airport in Alexandria.

I found out later that they had recorded a video of "Delta Kreme" in America's oldest juke joint, Jimmy "Duck" Holmes' Blue Front Café in Bentonia, Mississippi. Also, from comments from friends, it appears that several Pacific Northwest musicians have migrated south (to Nashville and Memphis) including Kevin Selfe and Tim "Too Slim" Langford. Added to this, Ground Zero owners have taken in new blood from Portland, Oregon, Eric Meier, as CFO. Other musicians have made the great state of Tennessee their home, too.

I had started the "Memphis Calling" article with a refrain from "Ode to Billie Joe." In October, I emailed that Bluesletter article to my friend, Bill Luckett, lawyer, former Mayor and co-owner of the Ground Zero Blues Club in Clarksdale, Mississippi. It seemed that my addition of the Bobby Gentry song struck a chord with him.

"You are a gifted writer," he wrote. "A group of June Bugs, of which I am a member, formally buried Billie Joe McAllister on June 3<sup>rd</sup> at Tallahatchie Flats. It made ABC News and a bunch of newspapers."

This is tremendous credit coming from such

a "Gentle Giant" of the blues industry and former Mayor of the "Home of the Crossroads!" Not having the foggiest idea of what he was talking about, I consulted the "Oracle of Google" for divination and came across the event just like the song said, "...it was the 3<sup>rd</sup> of June on a sleepy, dusty Delta day".

To my surprise and amusement, there was Bill, dressed as the Pope, officiating the "informal burial" of the fictitious Billie Joe McAllister! As the "Boss," Bruce Springsteen, sang on "Blinded by the Light:" "... Hit 'em in the funny bone that's where they expect it least!" I fell out laughing. Those June Bugs have a sense of humor and curiosity got the better of me. I have always wanted to interview Bill, so I gave him a call.

RN: "Bill, what's up with the June Bugs and who are they, if not colorful?"

BL: "The June Bugs are an eclectic group of what I define as a pseudo-intellectual, fake-academia miscreants. They're headed up by a leadership group that includes a Federal

Judge, a US Senator, literati, a funeral home director, and other well-known misfits. We are in our 3<sup>rd</sup> year of existence and we celebrate primarily June the 3<sup>rd</sup> because that's the day that Billie Joe McAllister jumped off the Tallahatchee Bridge made famous by the Bobby Gentry song. We run around like a bunch of crazies; I would call it 'Mardi Gras on steroids'. Again, I'm talking about Federal Judges, US Senators, Captains of Industry, doctors, lawyers, accountants, and other assorted somebodies."

RN: (Thinking): "That vision alone was enough to choke me up laughing and stop the interview while I caught my breath."

BL: "We have a higher purpose too. We have white paper readings and there is an intellectual component aside from the craziness. We host cocktail parties, have readings, talk about books and carry-on generally. It was started three years ago by a US District Court Judge, Mike Mills, here in the Northern District of Mississippi. I was asked to join a year later. The first year

they celebrated William Faulkner, the writer from Oxford, Mississippi. The second year, we celebrated Bobby Gentry's "Ode to Billie Joe," Emmett Till, the young black kid from Chicago who was killed in Mississippi, and we celebrated Robert Johnson, who's buried in three different locations around here. We threw flowers off the Tallahatchie Bridge and sang songs, had some Gospel music, and generally had a good time. This year, we celebrated Tennessee Williams, who spent part of his youth here and named most of his characters and venues out of people and places around Clarksdale. We also toured the Tennessee Williams museum at Saint George Episcopal Church here in Clarksdale. Then we celebrated with some good music, had a concert at Ground Zero and had a pickup band. The band, which was composed of US Senator Robert Wicker, and Mike Mills on guitar, and other really incredible musicians, they learned the chords to Al Green songs. Now Morgan Freeman, who was not a member, still celebrated with us by jumping up on stage and singing Al Green's 'Let's Stay Together.' He brought the house down, it's on YouTube! This year, 2022, we don't have any plans but I'm sure we will come up with something pretty interesting!"

RN: "Bill, is there an actual philanthropic component to the June Bugs' activities?"

BL: "We are paying for a documentary, although Judge Mills is paying for it mostly out of his own pocket, and we hope to reimburse him for that. We are filming some of these events, for entertainment purposes really. We have about 50 members, judges from Texas, San Francisco, Florida and international businessmen. It's really a great group of people. This year, as you know now, we were out at the cemetery for graveside services, and I was blessing the tomb in my Pope's outfit and the Greenwood Commonwealth newspaper took the photo. You have my permission to use that as it is public domain now."

RN: "Bill, this year marks the 20th anniversary of the opening of the Ground Zero Blues Club. How did you celebrate that?"

BL: "We had a soft opening on May 11th, 2001. We had a Grand Opening on that Memorial Day weekend attended by Ashley and Wynona Judd, and of course, Morgan Freeman. We had our 20th anniversary this last Memorial Day. Over the long haul, we had a financial history of just trying to keep it open for a number of years. Finally, just a few years ago, we actually started to break even. We didn't get into it to make money, as you know most similar businesses fail in the first year or two and it's a tough business. We have persevered and now we have prevailed. We have an iconic brand, we're known worldwide, we are ranked the number one blues club in the America by the Best Blues Clubs dot org and American Airlines picked us as one of the best music venues in the world and Fodor's, the travel folks, rank us and Clarksdale as the number one music city in America over Nashville! They named Ground Zero as the anchor of the city. That alone puts us ahead of what, Chicago, St Louis, Austin, New York, LA, you name it. Just think about that. We have achieved that by offering good food, good drink, and great music, that's just the right combination. We feature music four nights a week; some weeks, it's more than that. Morgan and I were very fortunate to have the idea and get it going. We have two other owners. Morgan Freeman, Howard Stovall of the famous Stovall Plantation, and lately we brought in Eric Meier from Portland, Oregon. It's a wonderful thing, and I'm just so proud of it that you can tell it in my voice."

RN: "In the past 20 years please give our readers some of your most memorable times there and all the blues celebrities you have met."

BL: "Over the years, we've had the "old codgers", the old bluesmen-music guys, bring in their children and their grandchildren to show them where the "old guys" music came from. Everybody from Paul Simon, George Thorongood, Delaney and Bramlett, Lyle Lovett, Gene Simmons, Robert Plant, too! Oh, I can't think of them all and I don't want to leave anybody out. We've been scene shot in about 6 movies; the whole World comes here to little bitty Clarksdale, Mississippi. You can sit on the front porch of Ground Zero blues club and meet the world! It's just phenomenal! From French Polynesia, to South Africa to South Korea to south China and every European country. One Christmas Eve, we had the leader of The House of Lords come here from the UK. I can't even think about all of them off the top of my head and again, I don't want to leave anyone out.

RN: "Ground Zero, being such an important destination on the Mississippi Blues Trail ,and you being the ex-Mayor and all, please inform would-be travelers about all the other sites in and around Clarksdale."

BL: "Clarksdale has some other clubs. Even though we have only been open 20 years, we are called the "Grand Daddy" of Clarksdale clubs. We started a resurgence here, if you will, in reopening of Juke Joints in Clarksdale. Now there are probably four or five and they are active all the time. Clarksdale itself offers live music seven nights a week, some overlap with our four nights a week. You can come here and somewhere; you can hear live music every night of the week. We are the envy of a lot of these local cities and not so local cities. Half of our customers and visitors to Clarksdale come from Europe and Australia. One half. Right now, due to the COVID travel restrictions, that has had quite a big impact on our business, so we had to really scale back a lot. We must wait for the gates to America reopen before we can get back to normal." (Cont'd on page 8)

RN: "Bill, you are a lawyer, you have been the past Mayor of Clarksdale, played a judge in a movie, masqueraded as the Pope, coowner of the leading Mississippi blues club, and a philanthropic June Bug. Looks like you have all the bases covered. You sir are a true renaissance man! You have championed civil rights as a lawyer for a very long time and are a lifetime member of the NAACP. We all owe you a debt of gratitude for this. What is next on your agenda? I heard tell that you plan to open a second location for Ground Zero in Biloxi, Mississippi this fall. What is your vision for that?"

BL: "We just licensed the use of our brand name to a few developers in Biloxi on the Gulf Coast. We hope we expand from there. We were hesitant to start with because there can only be but one Ground Zero Blues Club, meaning the place of beginning of something. This area, Clarksdale in particular, was the place of beginning of the best known blues, the Delta blues. Virtually every great blues musician has passed through here sometime in his, or her, careers. John Lee Hooker, born here. Sam Cooke, born here. Ike Turner, born here. Muddy Waters, lived here. Howlin' Wolf, came here. You name 'em, they've all come through Clarksdale If they get their music chops honed here in this very discerning, scrutinizing crowd we used to have here, they could go anywhere in the world and make it."

RN: "Bill, I have to come back and visit you and have a Mint Julep with y'all, hopefully on a June 3rd. It sounds like a hoot!"

BL: "Rocky, you come back and visit anytime, you are always welcome. We'd love to have you and we'll make a good time of it!"

As he hung up, I had no doubt about that. During each visit, I always could tell there was something in the water in and around

Clarksdale, and Bill certainly wasn't talking "mocktails." I figured Bill and the Junebugs could sell tickets to these shenanigans. They'd make a mint!

Author's Note: Sadly, on November 3rd 2021, he passed away just days after this interview took place. Not knowing that this would be his last interview, I am proud to have met and known Bill. He made everyone he met feel like they were his best friend. I hope this recounting of our last meeting has shed light on one of the blues' most ardent supporters. His devotion to service lives on. I am also very proud that a flag that I had flown by the US Air Force during Operation Enduring Freedom in Afghanistan, and presented to him and Morgan Freeman at the club, hangs in the Ground Zero Blues Club to this day.

Bill Luckett, Renaissance Man. May he Rest in Peace.

My solo project, The Chronicles of Christi Michelle, spins melodramatic tales of my life, love, survival, heartache, and joy that are the essence of the blues and the muse for each song delivered with deadly conviction.

I do my best to catch the audience's attention by performing solo shows with a four-string cigar box guitar and suitcase kick drum, and I am pleased that many fans have compared me to Adele, Janis Joplin, and Tina Turner. I am truly honored and humbled by these comparisons.

#### On Stage

As a hobbyist-historian, I play traditional blues with a cigar box guitar because of its simplicity. My core motivation is to lightly play accompaniment so that I can revel in the freedom of not needing anyone else to make music with me. I have spent a better part of my life feeling inadequate to create without the support of other musicians to bring the music in my heart to life. With this current solo project, I carry my head held high because I am proving to myself that I have what it takes to make my own music.

I reimagine the song "Black Betty," while still honoring the late blues artist Huddie "Lead Belly" Ledbetter's medley released on New York's Music Craft Records in 1939. During live shows, I frequently share my true story about my great Nana Betty. She was a true Puget Sound pioneer, a shady lady of the red-light district in Bellingham from the 1800s with my emotional rewrite of "Looky Yonder/Black Betty's in a Box."

My music is a natural mix of old school traditional blues filled with soulful vocal performances blending influences from pop, Gospel and classic rock. I strive to reach beyond my limits without forgetting the roots, doing so by playing my custom

instruments to support my vocals.

I am particularly proud of one of my original songs, co-written by Dave Fog. "Cost of Living" is a tender ballad about experiences of homelessness, toxic family dynamics, and addiction. Another original song, "I've Been Bad" reflects the revenge of a scorned woman, and in each tune, I share my affection for word play and authentic expression of pain, loss, and injustice.

Interpreting Janis Joplin's "Mercedes Benz," I try to share with the audience not only a unique version of that classic song, but also focus on singing A Capella.

#### In the Studio

Last Summer, I had the good fortune to work in the studio with acclaimed producer and engineer Chip Butters of ButterSound to record two original songs ("Tom Devil" and "Black Betty's in a Box") and three covers ("21st Century Mercedes Benz" and "Soul of a Man/John the Revelator"). I hope readers like them. They are posted in the Music tab on my EPK/website: www. thechroniclesofchristimichelle.com

I have been a singer since before I could talk. I sang "You are My Sunshine" before I spoke my first words. My first LP was Purple Rain in 1984, released by the artist I consider to be the most influential of my lifetime. Many blues artists, such as Robert Johnson, Muddy Waters, Lead Belly, Ma Rainey and Big Mama Thornton each have staked claim inside of my soul, and I certainly don't trust anyone who doesn't like Led Zeppelin.

Other influences like Samantha Fish, Hooten Hallers, the Black Keys, Jack White, Alabama Shakes, and Elle King have informed The Chronicles of Christi Michelle.

Let's not forget Steel Beans, the last full band I fronted back in 2011-2012. That cherished

psychedelic project has left a long-lasting mark on my heart as society witnessed the swift rise to stardom of Jeremy DeBardi's one-man-band variant of his band dynamic that he has reinvented a dozen times since 2007.

I am fortunate to play regular at Open Mics in and around Snohomish County. I have booked shows locally for over the past 13 years, and while I'm bouncing back from a year that included a very difficult experience unhoused, I look forward to recording my first EP and competing in the Washington Blues Society local International Blues Competition this year.

## Festival Preview: Ellensburg Music Festival July 26th & 27th

This year's blues lineup features Too Slim & The Taildraggers, Joel Astley & CD Woodbury!

Ellensburg Music Festival, formerly known as Jazz in the Valley, started in 1998 as a way to introduce live music to downtown Ellensburg, Washington. The small downtown core in Ellensburg combines art galleries, restaurants, wine bars, and local shops. This environment creates a unique festival where you can walk to each venue in a few block radius while seeing various genres of live music.

The 2024 lineup is stacked with great artists. On the blues side, the festival is excited to host Too Slim and the Taildraggers for a 3-hour evening set on Friday and a 2-hour daytime set on Saturday. Joel Astley and band will also be back in town, as well as CD Woodbury. Seattle's 206 Ribshack Orchestra is appearing for the first time with a combo of blues, funk and other types of music. This month's newsletter cover photo, Melany Peterson, is always a huge hit with her various genres and strong soulful vocals. Other genres you'll see include jazz (Joe Brooks Quartet, David Friesen's Circle 3 Trio, Michael Powers, Lenny Price), latin (John Roberts from Montana), jazz swing dance (Ellensburg Big Band), country (Leah Justine), folk (Zan Fiskum from The Voice TV show), and more.

For music venues, you will hop between two art galleries, a wine bar, three very good restaurants featuring all kinds of cuisine, and two outdoor evening stages. On Friday, July 26 2024, music will be heard between 6pm and midnight. On Saturday July 27, an outside stage will have music from 12pm to 6pm. The venues will open at 6pm on Saturday and will continue until midnight again. Other restaurants frequently hire music this weekend as well, so you can always find something good in town to eat and listen to at the same time.

Other events co-occur during the festival weekend, so it isn't just about music. Gallery One hosts a wine tasting event on Saturday July 27 between 1pm and 4pm. You get 5





tastings and a glass for an additional \$20 wine tasting fee paid directly to Gallery One at https://www.gallery-one.org/events/winesale/. Gallery One does a great job bringing various local wineries to this event, so it's always a fun time.

Also occurring Saturday is Ellensburg's downtown farmer's market. The farmer's market spans multiple blocks during every summer Saturday morning, including the Saturday of the music festival weekend. This is a great time to shop for local goods and then head to the outdoor daytime stage for music.

Maybe the best part? Tickets are only \$70 for the entire weekend OR \$50 if you want to attend one day only - if you buy NOW online at EllensburgMusicFestival.com. If you wait until the weekend of, tickets increase to \$80 for the weekend pass and \$60 for the one day pass.

Ellensburg has various lodging options, including the KOA campground, State campgrounds in the Yakima River canyon, and a bunch of motels and hotels. Marriott recently opened a new hotel on Canyon Road. Get on it now though, because lodging will typically sell out in advance.














### **CD Review**



Various Artists The Chess Project (CZYZ Records)

First, there was the legendary Chess Records, and its founders Leonard and Phil Chess. Chess' storied history includes artists like Etta James, Bo Diddley, Buddy Guy, Willie Dixon and others who defined the Chicago blues scene. Leonard's son Marshall worked at the label for 16 years. He started at the bottom and then worked up to producing 100+ records. He was later hired to run Rolling Stones Records, and in the 80's and 90's, Marshall produced CDs for the Sire and Island labels. In the early 2000s, he produced a hip-hop version of Chess Records' "Mannish Boy" with Chuck D, Common and the original Electric Mud band as he searched for a way to let a new generation express their version of traditional blues. Historically, there was blues in the plantation fields, then there was Robert Johnson, then McKinley Morganfield brought the blues from the country to the city, and 2003 included a fusion of hip-hop and Chicago blues. Now in 2024, 82-year old Marshall Chess, with his son Jamar, revisits this theme with New Moves-The Chess Project on CZYZ Records. When they arrived in the USA, immigration authorities changed the Leonard and Marshall's Polish birth name from Czyz to Chess as it was considered it unpronounceable. This collection of Chess classics features arrangements that breathe new life into the beloved blues closet. The Chess Project's team includes Skip "Little Axe" McDonald (Grandmaster Flash & the Furious Five), Eric Gales (Santana, Gary Clark, Jr, Lauryn Hill) Paul Nowinski (Keith Richard, Patti Smith), MonoNeon (Prince, Ne-Yo), Reggie Griffin (Kenny Babyface Edmonds, Chaka Kahn), Alan Glenn (Jeff Beck, Peter Green), Mohini Dey (a rising bass player from India), and Bernard

Fowler (Public Image Ltd, The Rolling Stones, Bootsy Collins). Keith LeBlanc, who Marshall met when they worked at Sugar Hill Records, also produced this album. The CD features 11 tracks, opening with "Boom Boom Out Go the Lights" with an opening riff nearly indistinguishable from Little Walter's release, but this version combines the original lyrics with a fresh arrangement that carries throughout the entire CD. Other classics from the blues canon, "Going Down Slow," "Smokestack Lightning," and "Nine Below Zero" are reimagined for new audiences on New Moves - The Chess Project. Love it or hate it, as a lover of the blues, this reinterpretation of many of the genre's classics is worth your time. Bravo to Marshall Chess and his team for taking a chance on such a groundbreaking CD! Kirk Anderson

### Two Great Shows & Two Great Nights with Super Chikan!

"... without missing a beat, he walked up on stage and let his music do the rest of the talking."

"That's it?" Super Chikan exclaimed as he looked at me in disbelief while we drove away from the border guard and onto his home soil of the US.

"I mean, he didn't even ask us to open the trunk!," he said, leaning back in the passenger seat, still marveling at the ease to which we had crossed the border from Canada.

For the next few days, Chikan would bring up this pleasant and unfortunately rare (for him) border crossing as a harbinger of good fortune. He would also bring up other things that happened during our two screenings/ shows in Seatle and Tacoma, including the time Chikan found my guitar in the parking lot of our hotel after I'd forgotten it when I hastily unpacked the car.

"Mark, I still can't believe you left it there, I mean, anybody could have taken it!"

Still, it was the friendly border guard, and not my carelessness, that set the real tone for two very memorable shows, first at Aurora Borealis in Shoreline and the second at Jazzbones in Tacoma.

Chikan, myself and my co-director, Brian, had all crossed into the USA from BC where we had done four great shows, the first of which was in Vancouver. The Vancouver show was the official Canadian premiere of our film, James "Super Chikan" Johnson - A Life in Blues. Each of the shows had been successful, and as we had made the six-hour drive from Kelowna to Seattle, our collective fingers were crossed that Washington audiences would be just as receptive.

After a nasty introduction to the Seattle traffic, we got to the first stop, Shoreline's Aurora Borealis, a lovely club that seemed to contain the perfect blend of atmosphere for a movie and live music combo.

We were immediately greeted by Washington Blues Society President, the affable Tony



Frederickson, who quickly introduced us to the awesome staff at the venue. As the patrons started to arrive, Brian set up the merch table while Chikan and I talked music with our rhythm section for the shows, the awesome bassist, Polly O'Keary, and her equally talented husband on drums, Tommy Cook. It wasn't long before everyone settled in, and we rolled the film.

For what had become usual for Brian and me at screenings of our documentary, we took up different posts around the room, watched the film again and stole looks at the audience for reactions.

As soon as the credits rolled at the end of the film, everyone clapped and a sense of relief washed over Brian and me. After a quick, but meaningful Q & A, the band and I took our places on the stage and the crowd, having just seen a film on his life, were treated to the man himself.

As soon as Chikan hit those first notes, I marveled again at just how much energy he gave on stage. He performed like a man half his age, playing ferocious guitar solos over the irresistibly funky grooves of Tommy and Polly, all the while clowning with the audience. His energy and enthusiasm reminded me of a line in our film where he said that all he had ever wanted to do was "play music and travel." Age was certainly not tempering that sentiment!

"As a white filmmaker making a film in Mississippi, did you really feel the inequality and injustice of the state?"

On the second night, we were at Tacoma's Jazzbones, and had just finished screening our film when a gentleman from Alabama

asked this very poignant and thoughtprovoking question. I answered truthfully and told him that I did feel it and then tried my best to explain what that meant to me and how it influenced the film. The gentleman directed the next question to Chikan:

"Do you feel resentful towards Mississippi for all the bad stuff that has happened there?"

Chikan took a moment and collected his thoughts.

"No. Mississippi is my home, it will always be my home, and it has given me a lot," he said."

He paused and then continued.

"You have to move on, you can't stand still and be angry, it doesn't do you any good."

He expanded more on this thought and the audience listened attentively, digesting the words of a man who has lived and breathed all of the good and bad that has emanated from his home state.

Then, without missing a beat, he walked up on stage and let his music do the rest of the talking.

### The Tedeschi Trucks Band in Portland, Seattle & Vancouver!

Deuces Wild: Five shows in six days - a great way to start the summer of 2024.

What better way to unofficially kick off summer than with five shows from the Tedeschi Trucks Band around Memorial Day weekend?

Big picture. These are the first five gigs of a 48-night *Deuces Wild* tour hitting the United States and Canada this summer. Two concerts at the Keller Auditorium in Portland, one at the Queen Elizabeth Theater in Vancouver, British Columbia and two gigs at the Paramount in Seattle. For me, it was a delightful and unforgettable whirlwind week! Let me tell you why.

Over five shows in six days, the Tedeschi Trucks Band performed 98 songs, averaging 19 songs a night (they played 24 at the second Seattle show). Nightly set lists throughout the five gigs had many different songs with 32 songs only played once, 18 songs played twice and only 10 songs played three times. No song was played four times throughout the run.

The most frequently played songs included "Ain't That Something" from 2022's I Am the Moon, "Anyhow" from the 2016's Let Me Get By, "Beck's Bolero"- the 1967 B side single from Jeff Beck, "High Time We Went" (turned out to be the closer each night) from 1972's Joe Cocker, "I Want More" from 2016's Let Me Get By, "Made Up Mind" from 2013's Made Up Mind, "Outside Woman Blues" the Blind Joe Reynolds via Cream tune released in 1929/1967 as a single for Blind Joe and Disraeli Gears from Cream, "Part of Me" from Made Up Mind, and "Yes We Will" and "Playing with My Emotions" from I Am the Moon. Were any of those 10 songs your favorite?

So many highlights come to mind when these 12 band members play together. As I sat in the front row right in front of Derek's amps the first night, I remembered Derek's tone that I have known since the early 90s. It's matured from not only from his deft slide work, but also Derek's unique style of fingerpicking. That tone from his signature

Gibson SG flew from his amps right at ear level and brought back special memories of so many shows and good times 25 + years ago. I found myself tearing up several times at those memories and remembered when I first met Derek shortly before his 14<sup>th</sup> birthday.

Seeing him and Susan as band leaders today also showed me their professional growth. Watching Susan has always been a treat, but the growth in her voice, and especially when she played through her Fender, was exceptional. Susan and Derek have found a way to harness and channel Derek's power in each song, and they also have found a way to leave space for Susan to stand toe to toe with him. It was an absolute joy to see Susan take command of the stage from time to time during these shows.

Derek doesn't sing, and Susan's vocal range shifted throughout the night as she shared vocal duties with the newest band member. Gabe Dixon, who also plays keyboards and writes songs. The three-person "back-up" vocals section now all stand forward at times during the night with Derek Trucks Band vocalist Mike Mattison taking several leads and sharing vocals with Susan and Gabe. Mark Rivers added his deep vocal leads during the night and Alecia Chakour stepping forward more now than ever with two nights taking lead on "It Ain't Fair," an Aretha Franklin cover (also done by Susan solo) that leapt from the stage and through the ears to tingle the spine from tail to neck!

Each of the Tedeschi Trucks Band shows featured exceptionally good performances, but my personal favorites early in this tour include the show in Vancouver and Seattle's second show.

The horn section featured Kebbi Williams on sax for some mind-bending leads and fills with Elizabeth Lea providing trombone leads reminiscent of the New Orleans power greats. Ephraim Owens added defining trumpet solos and fills throughout each show.

Tyler "Falcon" Greenwell and Isaac Eady sat on the drum risers and propelled the driving backbeat with Brandon Boone on bass. This rhythm section continuously drove the songs from quiet and thoughtful beginnings to raging crescendos as the songs stoked our excitement from start to finish.

I was very pleased that Pacific Northwest and Lower Mainland fans showed up in force to help the Tedeschi Trucks Band launch their 2024 Deuces Wild summer tour.

We sent them off to go down to Berkeley, California for two shows that were streamed live on Brad Serling's www.nugs.net music archive (which houses many of the band's live shows). This site traces its roots to Grateful Dead and Phish tapers in the 90s, and has grown, after 115 million downloads, into a community with which hundreds of artists and labels partner to distribute music directly to their fans. The site features shows that are professionally mixed, and offers a free trial period, and links to live shows, podcasts and albums. I test-drove the site and learned that there are over 6,000 blues performances captured on it.

After leaving the Paramount Theatre, I thought of the Tedeschi Trucks Band's remaining 43 shows on this summer's Deuces Wild tour.

Farewell my friends. Safe travels.


