LETTER FROM THE EDITOR



Hello blues lovers!

School may be out for the summer, but that hasn't prevented one of my best students from the School of Journalism at the University of Washington from presenting an article for the Bluesletter. Josh Hill was a reluctant journalist at best during the spring quarter. The long-haired, black-clad young writer has a future in mind

that does not involve the high-stress tasks that confront journalists, including reaching out to perfect strangers, asking for interviews, and navigating the social and professional tensions associated with public aff irs reporting. Josh would prefer to do social media work or graphics behind the scenes.

I understand that. Journalism is so stressful that there is a legend that the Arizona Sun once had an account with an alcoholism rehab center for its reporters. But Josh turned out to be so talented as a reporter that I found myself reluctant to resign myself to a world in which the reticent student did not publish work.

Then, when students were assigned to write about a local nonprofit, Josh picked the Rhapsody Project. Of course, I got quite excited. We at the Bluesletter follow that organization, devoted as it is to heritage music, with great interest. I'm glad to share Josh's story on the organization's recent expansion into Richmond, Virginia, and I hope you enjoy it as much as I enjoyed seeing it come to pass.

As this issue makes its way into venues and mailboxes, my trio and I will spend the month of August on tour, traveling all the way to Florida and back up the Gulf Coast to Texas. We already returned from a jaunt that took us to the Rocky Mountain states and on to Arizona so that we could appear at the Portland Waterfront and at the Winthrop music festivals before heading out again.

When we head back out, we are going to be talking up some of the artists we met at the festivals. We shared the stage this year at Portland with two acts that were new to us, and you need to know about both of them. The fi st is Gemini Dragon, a New Orleans duo made up of a phenomenal singer named Gemini and her blazing guitarist Christian. They are doing cutting edge blues and roots music that sounds like what might happen if Tina Turner had joined the White Stripes. It's exciting and creative and also incredibly catchy.

The second act is Portland's Miss Vee. For one thing, she knows how to make an appearance. When she showed up backstage I thought, wow, that lady looks amazing. She had on a rainbow-sequined tunic that caught the sun like a prism and a mass of shiny braids in a beautiful turquoise wrap. Then I realized that was her day clothes. When she came out on stage, she was wearing a full-on turquoise ball gown with wide Disney princess skirts and aqua chiffon over the shoulder. It was like seeing Aretha Franklin rock up at Madison Square Garden.

The look goes perfectly with her style. One of her new originals, called "Six Days a Week," is such an infectious soul banger I'm still hearing it in my sleep a week later. She is a pro, too. We were backing her on stage and we learned one of her songs in the wrong key. The original was in F and we'd missed an email in which she'd asked for it in Bb. That's about as far from the correct key as you can get, but she sang the daylights out of it, wrong key and all.

Oddly, the same thing happened to me on the same stage nearly 20 years ago. I was with a group of Washington Blues Society award winners that played Waterfront, and a song I sing in D got played in G. That is a nightmare, let me tell you, but I did my best. I guarantee it was nowhere near as good as Miss Vee's F version of a Bb song. I'm still dying over that, but she was as gracious as could be. Classy, elegant, and talented. I'm looking forward to hearing more from her, and we are working to get her up to Seattle for a show. Stay tuned!

Phoenix in Furs is a blistering musical celebration of rebirth, rising from the embers of the past lives of two unique individuals, Casaundra May and James Cox. With musical roots four miles off Highway 61 on Dry Bayou Road, South of Rolling Fork in the heart of the Mississippi Delta, Casaundra and James explore numerous genres with a theatrical flair and a commanding sound that beckons you deeper into their world. Kokomo Arnold and Amy Winehouse collaborated with Tom Waits, Muddy Waters, and Meg and Jack White, raising good times from the ashes of the bad.

Casaundra May lives her life with the same passion and intensity that she brings to the stage. Having lived across the Skagit Valley for most of her life, she channels great jazz and blues singers from the Golden Age of music. But, Casaundra's been through some stuff. The all-nighters, passionate fi hters, and deals that came undone, reborn in a voice, irrepressible, and nostalgic for a time that never was. Occasionally scandalous, eternally entertaining, Casaundra dominates her space and carries the room with her charm and a sound at once unique yet familiar and exciting.

Having grown up on the shores of the Mississippi River listening to the trains during the fi al days of the Rock Island Line, James Cox kicked around on the guitar for a long time but never did anything with it. When he fi ally got serious, he was too old to get good, but here he is.

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Preview: 1st Annual Kitsap Blues Music Festival

Recently, I met with Nate Murphy, Operations Director for Bremerton's Admiral Theatre, to learn about the 2024 1st Annual Kitsap Blues Music Festival during Labor Day weekend at the Kitsap County Fairgrounds that he's helping to manage. During his normal daily functions, he talked to me about the upcoming blues festival from his office at the Admiral Theatre in beautiful downtown Bremerton. He talked me through one of the fi est, live blues festival line-ups that I've seen lately and the support around it. Nate struck me as being honest and straightforward in the four hours I spent with him for this preview. His passion, vision and intent for this blues music event impressed me of its forthcoming overall success.

"The Kitsap County Fair has been a highlight of the summer for 100+ years, and Bremerton's Admiral Theatre has presented live blues for 30+ years, including Samantha Fish, Keb' Mo,' Taj Mahal, Coco Montoya, and Colin James. It was just a natural step forward by the Admiral theatre, the Kitsap Fair and Stampede Association to launch a new annual event," said Nate enthusiastically.

Nate talked about the wealth of experience within the Admiral Theatre, Kitsap County Fair and Stampede Association that those principals will bring to the 1st Annual Kitsap Blues Music Festival. "Th s is where the decades of live music and event experience between the Admiral Theatre, the Kitsap Fair and Stampede Association comes into play," he said with pride.

"The Admiral attracts 50,000+ patrons a year, and the Kitsap County Fair attracts 80,000+ people a year. While our preparation is on par with the fair, which is happening the week before the Kitsap Blues Music Festival, expected attendance will be a small fraction of the fair crowd. Th s is by design, especially for this fi st year."

I asked him about concerns for safety and security plus amenities and comforts to expect for that weekend.

"The experience is everything," he quickly

responded. "From arrival and tickets, multiple safety and fi st aid stations, food and beverage vendors and availability of water, hand-washing stations, rest rooms, showers (for campers), it's all covered! It has the combination of live music, great food and beverage options, RV and tent camping, and time outdoors to catch up with friends and family in a fun, safe environment." The Washington Blues Society will have a booth for swag, membership information, and sell artist merch.

"Selecting the lineup for this year's festival was a true collaborative effort between the Admiral Theatre Executive Director Brian Johnson, Fair and Stampede team Jeff Nilsen, Jamie Jensen and others," said Nate. "Since each group books entertainment for the Admiral Theatre and the Kitsap Fair, they have existing relationships with top agents and artists to get the best artists on stage."

"We put together a line-up of touring blues artists and amazing up and coming regional artists, including Samantha Fish, Joanne Shaw Taylor, Curtis Salgado, Tommy Castro and The Painkillers, Jontavious Willis, Jackie Venson, Tinsley Ellis, Too Slim and The Taildraggers, and many more. We have 20 world-class artists over the long Labor Day weekend," said. Nate.

I'm glad to see Everett, Washington's hometown hero, a champion of Eugene, Oregon, and harp and vocal icon (according to National Public Radio), Curtis Salgado, on the lineup. Curtis has been honored by many Blues Music Awards at The Blues Foundation, recently took home another "Best Soul Blues Artist" pyramid in Memphis. On the heels of the Alligator Records critically acclaimed efforts, *Beautiful Lowdown, Damage Control*, and *Rough Cut*, Curtis is at the top of his game. Alligator Records founder Bruce Iglauer added Curtis in 2012 to the label.

"With Curtis Salgado, Tommy Castro, Too Slim, Tinsley Ellis and my local favorite Nick Vigarino, that's a ton of testosterone on stage. You have two of the most accomplished blueswomen, along with such





talented regional artists on the same bill. Your co-headliners are well-known, highoctane women," I asked. "Do you think they can hold their own with the guys?"

"High-octane is right. Simply put, the ladies make this festival," Nate said. "In addition to headliners Samantha Fish and Joanne Shaw Taylor, we added Jackie Venson from Austin, and regional artists the Stacy Jones Band, Anni Piper, and Kara Hesse. We wanted to work with Joanne Shaw Taylor for years, and coming off her recent work with Joe Bonamassa, the stars aligned, and we're thrilled to have her headline the main stage on Saturday night. We welcomed Samantha Fish to the Admiral Theatre for a sold out show last year and she blew the roof off the place. Samantha headlines on Sunday night. The schedule for this 1st year is packed with world-class blues talent over the Labor Day weekend, and the blues men and blues women are scheduled to give fans an opportunity to see each artist on both stages with little overlap."

Friday night, August 30th, starts off at Noon with gates opening to campers and vendors. Ticket sales begin at 6 PM and music starts at 7 PM with regional artists the Front Street Revue, Kara Hesse, and Rafael Tranquilino.

Saturday, August 31st, the main stage begins at 2 PM with Tinsley Ellis, Jackie Venson, Tommy Castro and The Painkillers, and Joanne Shaw Taylor headlining. The fi ld stage across the street features Anni Piper, Joel Astley, and Kenny James Miller Band.

On Sunday, September 1st, the mainstage features Too Slim and The Taildraggers, Jontavious Willis, Curtis Salgado, and Samantha Fish beginning at 2 PM. The field stage across the street features the James Howard Band, CD Woodbury, the Tim Hall Band, the Stacy Jones Band, and Nick Vigarino's Meantown Blues.

Personally, I look forward to seeing the festival's two leading femme fatales: Joanne Shaw Taylor and Samantha Fish.

Joanne Shaw Taylor was born in England, and at age 16 was discovered by Dave Stewart

of the Eurythmics. Her CD, *Diamonds in the Dirt*, reached #8 on the Billboard top Blues Album chart. She won Best Female Vocalist at the British Blues Awards in 2010. Her 2021 CD, *The Blues Album*, released on Joe Bonamassa's Keeping the Blues Alive Records, hit #1.

Samantha Fish played a sold-out show at the Admiral Theatre last year. Th s Kansas City native played the Crossroads Festival in 2023 at Eric Clapton's request. She's garnered a number of awards, including a 2017 Best Album Blues Blast Award for *Chills & Fever*, and a 2018 Blues Music Award in the Best Contemporary Blues Female Artist of the Year category. She's received 22 "Best of" honors, from 2016 to 2022 in the Independent Blues Awards hosted by https://www.makingascene.org/.

Coming off a successful highlight to Slash's recent SERPENT tour, the Rolling Stones asked Samantha to open for them on the last North American stop on their *Hackney Diamonds* tour in Missouri on July 21st. She'll be playing at the Thunder Ridge Nature Arena in Ridgedale in heart of the Ozarks. She previously opened for the Stones at the New Orleans Jazz Festival earlier this year. Her manager at Thunderbird Management, Reuben Williams, continues to keep this crowd pleaser very busy.

Welcome Danielle Nicole to the Pacific orthwest!

I fi st saw Danielle Schnebelen in the mid-2000s when I volunteered for The Blues Foundation at the International Blues Challenge and the Blues Music Awards, and just knew that this young Kansas City-based bassist and her brothers Nick and Kris had that "special something" as the Trampled Under Foot power trio. One of my favorite memories of that era was seeing this band play at the legendary Knuckleheads blues club in their home town. In 2008, the family band won the International Blues Challenge, and at the 2014 Blues Music Awards, Trampled Under Foot's Badlands, won the Contemporary Blues Album of the Year statuette. At the same ceremony, Danielle Schnebelen won the Best Instrumentalist Bass award.

She struck out on her own as Danielle Nicole in 2015 with *Wolf Den*, and her second CD, *Cry No More* followed in 2018, and the record was nominated for a Grammy in the contemporary blues category and debuted at #1 in the Billboard Blues Charts (it also boasts of 10 million+ Spotify streams!).

In 2019, Danielle Nicole returned to the Blues Awards stage to receive awards as a solo artist in the Contemporary Blues Female Artist and Bass Instrumentalist categories.

Th s month, Danielle Nicole is touring in Washington, Oregon, Utah and Montana on the strength of her latest CD, *The Love You Bleed* (Concord). The new album was produced by Tony Braunagel (Taj Mahal, Eric Burdon, Robert Cray) and co-produced by Nicole, with John Porter (B.B. King, Buddy Guy, Bryan Ferry) mixing. The tight knit quartet on the songs features Danielle on bass guitar and vocals; Brandon Miller (electric, acoustic, pedal steel, mandolin, and 12-string guitar); Damon Parker (keyboards); Go-Go Ray (drums); and Stevie Blacke (violin and cello).

Th s month, welcome the Danielle Nicole Band to Portland's McMenamin's Mission Theatre on the 6th, Seattle's Triple Door on the 7th, Salt Lake City's State Room on the 9th, and Cheyenne's Lincoln Cheyenne on the 10th. Th s band doesn't play the Western US very often, and these dates provide opportunities to see one of the most talented blueswomen touring North America today!

And the bands that the Washington Blues Society is sending to The Blues Foundation's 40th annual International Blues Challenge on Beale Street in Memphis, Tennessee on January 7-11, 2025 are...

Well, you are going to have to come up to the Conway Muse in Conway, Washington on Sunday August 4th starting at high noon to fi d out! The winners have not been announced because so far this summer of 2024, Washington state judges so far have only picked the semi-final rounds winners that will advance to the fi als at Conway Muse.

Conway Muse is a gathering place for musicians and fans as its name derives from Greek religion and mythology as the nine goddesses who have been considered the source of the knowledge embodied in poetry, lyric and songs. These days, a muse is a person, female or male, who serves as an artist's inspiration.

Surely, you've heard of the Conway Muse? Winner of several awards from Skagit Publishing People's Choice awards, Cascadia Weekly Best of Skagit awards as well as King 5 Best of Western Washington's Top 5 Best Live Music Venues, this venue is only 55 miles north of Seattle in a converted 1915 Norwegian dairy barn. Formerly a glass shop, antique shop and auction barn, Elfa Gisla and Tom Richardson purchased the building and lovingly have given us the Come on out and support the fi alists and help us inspire these musicians and vocalists until the judges pick one fi alist in the solo/duo category and one other in the band category. You will see the six best bands and solo-duo artists in the state of Washington put on their best sets as each act seeks to compete with the nation's best musicians on fabled Beale Street in Memphis!

Where are we going? One of these bands and one of the solo/duo winners will be going Memphis as Washington State's representative for the International Blues Challenge which is the Blues Foundation's signature event that turns all of Beale Street into a five-day big blues venue for more than 260 blues acts from around the world. Wednesday and Thursday at the Beale Street clubs will be the quarter-fi al rounds followed by the semi-fi als on Friday culminating with the fi alists performing at Memphis' historic Orpheum Theater on Saturday.

I caught up with Washington Blues Society President Tony Fredrickson and asked him what advice he gives to the Washington representatives while they are in Memphis. Tony said he suggests that they network, network, network as you never know who you're talking to. There are so many national and international blues and music industry's architects that come to the International Blues Challenge to check up and coming acts of the future. There are so many bands to befriend and either help (or be helped) during this week-long series of blues events and into their future.


I asked Tony, what keeps him and the Washington Blues Society volunteers going gig after gig.

Th s summer in the South Sound was jampacked with great live music, and to quote Rick Estrin, "The Hits Keep Coming." Ranging from Tacoma to Poulsbo and all points in-between, there's been stellar shows featuring national artists as well as local stars. August is chock full of super performances.

Sunday, August 25th brings back the 4th Annual Tacoma Dock Street Blues & Jazz Festival to West of the Waterway. Th s year, LTD Presents have secured a lineup of fi e musicians from all over the country as well as some local favorites. The energetic Earshot Award Winning Band, Jazz Overhaul, is opening with the Rafael Tranquilino Band coming on next with their compelling brand of rocking blues. We have the powerhouse of Andy Stokes, King Louie & Renato Caranto following with a set of funky/smooth tunes. The festival fin shes up with two sensational artists hailing from California, harmonica genius Kyle Rowland from Sacramento, and our headliner, California's Queen of the Blues & Soul, Tia Carroll & her Pacifi Northwest Band.

New this year, we have secured a second stage inside West of the Waterway where Washington Blues Society awardwinning artists The Blue Healers and John "Greyhound" Maxwell will perform in between main stage acts. The festival opens at Noon with music starting at 1 PM.

VIP Packages include a designated VIP Area, a festival t-shirt, two drink tickets and one food ticket. The 4th Annual Dock Street Blues & Jazz Festival is sponsored by KNKX Radio, The Spar Tavern, Kat McNeill and Lance Bowman, and the South Sound Blues Association.

On Sunday, August 18th at 7 PM, LTD Presents brings the fourth in their Spotlight Series to The Spar. Th s show Castro Band to the South Sound area. Los Angeles-area artist Daniel Castro was heavily influenced by the blues greats Albert King, B.B. King, and Albert Collins. After cutting his teeth in South Central L.A. blues clubs with "Mighty Mouth" Delmar Evans, who worked with the Johnny Otis Show, Castro backed other artists from Otis' band, including Pee Wee Crayton and Little Esther Phillips. He also recorded and toured with other artists, including legendary Small Faces singerbassist Ronnie Lane.

Wednesday, August 21st at The Spar features The Bennett/Matteo Band at 7pm. Th s is a special DHudson Productions event.

Sunday Blues at The Spar this August has the wonderful Kim & Brian Band bringing their 'honest blues & rock show to Old Town Tacoma on August 4th at 7 PM. Get there early for the best seat. The Lucky Losers are slated for Sunday, August 11th, and head to the free 4th Annual Tacoma Dock Street Blues & Jazz Festival at West of the Waterway for all the blues you can use and more on Sunday, August 25th from 12 PM to 7 PM. Sunday Blues at The Spar is canceled that night in honor of the festival.

There are lots of great music offerings in Gig Harbor at the Kimball Coffeehouse. On Friday, August 2nd Kimball's is excited to present the CD Woodbury Trio from 7-9 PM. Friday, August 16th is the return of The Mark DuFresne Band featuring Billy Stapleton. Washington Rhapsody Project Expands into Virginia

"I know that this music can bring people together," said Watkins. "There's no judgment in the music."

American music has a murky history. Rhapsody is creating ways to talk about it.

Musician Ben Hunter could have never imagined that Joe Seamons, the flannel-clad man his roommate dragged home from a music festival more than a decade ago, would become his best friend.

However, after over a decade of performing and educating together, the two have built one of Washington's most important music heritage programs and are poised to expand it beyond the Pacifi Northwest into Richmond, Virginia.

Though their stories couldn't be more different—Hunter is African-born and classically trained while Seamons grew up in rural Oregon listening to folk music the friends bonded over a shared love of American roots music. Seamons, born and raised in a small town with a rich logging history, began his musical journey at an early age through the folk music performances of family friends. He quickly developed an interest in the art form and its historical roots.

"Through that curiosity and deep love of Black American music, I just started to try to educate myself," said Seamons.

Hunter, who said he was raised as "something of a nomad," was born in the small nation of Lesotho in southern Africa and has moved between Arizona, Washington, and Zimbabwe throughout his life.

Having been raised as a classical violinist, he identifies his early ear for music as a primary catalyst for his appreciation for multiculturalism.

"It's not just about the music. It's the food, it's the art, it's the dance, it's the poetry. It's all these things that the culture surrounds," said Hunter. "Th s is one of the reasons that Joe and I connected so well."

Hunter said that part of what drew him and

Seamons into a friendship was the ways in which their experiences differed.

"We were both fascinated by the differences in our lives," he said.

Shortly after meeting, the two started co-billing shows in Seattle and Portland with each of their bands. That musical cooperation grew, however, following their visit to a local acoustic blues festival.

As they entered the gates, the two were greeted with a veritable feast of the senses; jam sessions grooved through the night, and the halls were flooded with the very community that served as the lifeblood of the music they both loved.

"We experienced a very similar, profound connection to what was happening," said Hunter.

Inspired by American blues and mentored by Piedmont blues harmonica master Phil Wiggins, they formed a musical duo and began performing and teaching the blues, integrating their collective knowledge of American music and history into their endeavors.

That included the troubled racial history that informed blues, folk, and other traditional American musical genres. For instance, as Seamons researched the roots of the music that had surrounded him as a youth, he learned about the troubled past of his own home state's legacy. "That led me to learn that Oregon is a uniquely racist state," he said. "I was 30 years old before I learned that fact."

European settlers in Oregon in the mid-19th century sought to make the state a whitesonly enclave, forbidding Black people from owning land and entering into legal contracts. Th s led many Black settlers to homestead just across the Columbia River in Washington, and led to a lack of diversity that lingers in Portland to the present era.

Driven by a desire to address the political

contexts in which American music evolved, Hunter and Seamons founded The Rhapsody Project, a non-profit devoted to preserving the cultural heritage of blues and roots music ethically and responsibly. The two built a curriculum that sought to teach personal heritage alongside music through the lens of anti-racism.

Th s is the crux of Rhapsody's goal: teaching music in a way that actively identifi s and challenges racism in America's past in order to change the behaviors and assumptions that perpetuate prejudice.

"Understanding one's own intersectionality, or the ways that various aspects of identity inform one's sense of self, is an essential stepping stone toward acknowledging the role identity plays in personal and artistic expression," Seamons said

"We believe anti-racist work starts with yourself," said Seamons. "It means understanding yourself as a person of culture and understanding your relationship to not just your ethnic identities, but the layers of your heritage that connect to the land you're raised on."

Founded in 2013, Rhapsody has since evolved into a multi-focus nonprofit bolstered by the dedication of local musicians who work within various programs to teach and enrich Seattle musicians of all ages and backgrounds. Th ough providing a safe space for musical expression, they have fostered a community of open-minded creatives working to lower the barriers between culture and art.

"The intention was to give our students the music education that we wished we had had," said Seamons. "We were playing a lot of American roots music at the time, and really wanted to impart that music to young people and help them understand that they have a lineage as Americans that goes back in a beautiful way."

It isn't just about teaching history, though.

"We're talking compassion, we're talking

empathy, we're talking observation, we're talking patience, we're talking ensemble," said Hunter. "All of these things that really are our lessons and how we interact as people are paired in the ways that we produce or consume art, if we open ourselves up to the intersectionality of it all." Hunter, who has since assumed the role of art director for Seattle's massive annual Northwest Folklife Festival, continues working to foster the links between heritage and culture through festivals and other musical and cultural gatherings. At these events, students of Rhapsody regularly join hundreds of artists and thousands of patrons of the arts to perform and experience the fullness of the culture.

Now, one of the musicians who has helped carry out the Rhapsody mission plans to export the successful initiative to the very heart of the South from which many forms of American music were born. Guitarist and Rhapsody educator Justin Golden worked to found a chapter of the Rhapsody Project in his home state of Virginia, set to open this summer in the capital city of Richmond.

Keanya Watkins, president of the River City Blues Society of Richmond, expressed her excitement for the program. She grew up listening to the same blues music her grandparents were raised with, and when she got involved in the business end of the music business, her elders were surprised and pleased. "I never picked a lick of cotton in my life. I don't know anything about how Muddy Waters lived," she said. "I remember telling [my grandmother] I manage a blues band, and she just sort of stared at me. Then maybe a year later, somebody that she knew came to hear the band play. When I walked in the house, she said, 'You didn't tell me that your band played Muddy Waters!' After that, it just opened so much more conversation for me."

Watkins got involved in Richmond's River City Blues Society and maintained the organization's "Blues in the Schools" curriculum for years, but expressed concerns that it was inefficient in reaching multicultural youth.

Rhapsody aims to fill that gap, and Watkins believes local youths are ready for the message.

"Young people really want to have an outlet to be able to tell their story," said Watkins. "Children come to River City Blues Society events, they're dancing, they're having a great time. Young kids are really hip to this music."

Now, Rhapsody is seeking volunteers in the Richmond area to bring the harmony of diversity to their music. While musicians are warmly welcomed, being one isn't necessary to enrich Rhapsody's purpose. They are seeking students and donors of all ages to assist in furthering their anti-racist efforts.




to-date, thanks in part to the generosity of blues fans who attend the Poverty Bay Blues and Brews Festival each and every year.

Thank You for Such an Exceptional Warm Welcome!

It's amazing how much life can change in just four short years. During the height of the pandemic in 2020, we left Seattle to start a new life back in England armed only with hopes and dreams. There was no master plan, other than fi ding a new home, and figu ing out how to build a new life. No biggie. I grew up in London, but Seattle had been my home for 23 years, so leaving was bittersweet in the extreme. We had a lovely home there and many great friends; I didn't leave because I was unhappy. I left to be closer to family and childhood friends, none of whom are getting any younger. The timing was also key for my daughter's education to get her there in time to start high school. It was a wrench that we have felt virtually every day since, which is why it was so exciting to make our fi st return trip back to the Seattle area this summer.

Before I get into all that, a few words on the British blues scene. In short, it is very different than I imagined. It's dominated by blues rock which perhaps isn't surprising given the number of blues rockers this small island has generated. I had expected more of a base for the kind of stripped down, "authentic" blues that associated with the folk revival of the 60s. Like everywhere else, the audience for this kind of blues attracts older listeners and it's getting smaller by the year. There's no shortage of good players in that vein, though, and I do my best to get out and see them when I can. There are lots of good blues clubs around the country so if you ever visit and want some pointers, hit me up.

On the music front, I'm personally on a mission to evangelize what I like to call "spit and sawdust, juke joint blues" with a younger (18-40) audience and have a new band, The Too Bad Jims, that includes the immensely talented Little Victor, and Nick Simonon on drums (yes, brother to Paul of the Clash). So far people seem to really dig it, and after only a handful of gigs, we're getting a lot of festival and club bookings. We're releasing our debut album in the Fall and those of you that know me won't be surprised to hear that it's a tribute to RL Burnside. Victor knew RL and his family very well, and toured with him extensively back in the day, so there's a certain poignancy about this, too. The album aims to recreate the vibe of a fild recording and was recorded straight as a studio performance with no overdubs. If you like your blues tidy, polished and highly produced, this probably ain't your bag. I'm also breaking out on my own again as a solo artist and have played some cool places, such as London's iconic 100 Club. A new solo album is in the works for 2025, and I recorded the fi st couple of songs for it in Memphis with Charlie Musselwhite recently. After a long drought, I've also started songwriting and it feels great to have my mojo back.

When planning the Seattle trip, I was really surprised, and more than a little touched, that folks remembered me and were willing to have me play. It may seem silly, but I thought I'd be long forgotten, so this was pretty heartwarming. The fi st few days back in Seattle felt really weird, as it was like I belonged, but I didn't, and it was really only after the fi st show that I got my head straight.

That first show was at the Madison where I last played eight years ago. Paul, Willow and Rob were even more amazing than I remembered and their kindness and generosity shines like a beacon. I don't know what the usual turnout is like, but it felt like a big one on that night, and it was so cool to meet up with so many old friends who'd made the trek. I played a few solo songs to start and then Rick Bowen, Paul Quilty and Bill Davis joined me to kick things up several notches. It was a blast and a real honor to play with those guys.

A few days later I played at the Washington Blues Society Blues Bash at Aurora Borealis and it was over the moon that the Mark Riley Trio was also playing. I hadn't seen Mark in many years, and it was reassuring to see him on his feet and cracking jokes as usual. For this one, Joel Astley joined me and knocked it out of the park. Th s was the fi st time we

played together, but when he stepped on stage he slotted right in as though we'd been doing this for decades. Th s was another stellar night with so many friends I hadn't seen in a very long time. For extra bonus points, it was grand to catch up with Rob Moitoza and Russ Kammerer, too.

To close out, this was an important trip for many reasons, and made entirely memorable by reconnecting with old friends. I won't try to name everyone I got to speak with (you know who you are!) but I would like to call out a few folks that deserve a special mention:

Rick Bowen: Without you, neither of these gigs would have happened. You continue to totally rock and have my deepest gratitude.

Kevin Sutton: What an amazingly generous man you are. Thank you for lending me your top-notch guitars and amps for BOTH shows.

Paul Quilty & Willow Stone: Thank you for your professionalism, kindness and for making me feel so welcome at the Madison

Bill Davis: So great to fi ally share a stage with you after all these years. You totally killed it.

Joel Astley: Dude, your reputation is 100% deserved. Let's please do it again someday.

Seattle blues folks, I love ya, and hope to be back again sometime next year!

A Drummer's Story: Casey Jones, Chicago's Blues Engineer

"Casey's drum performances, on stage, live and on Albert's albums, attracted attention worldwide."

"Good Evening, Chicago blues fans, Welcome to Sopro Music's Annual Thanksgiving Chicago All Star Blues Revue. Wait. Do you hear that? I hear that train a-coming! It's rollin' down the track. It's the IC, the old Illinois Central! It's star time! Hey, ladies and gentleman, I said it's star time! Please welcome to the stage, the original Chi-Town boogie man, the crowd pleaser, Chicago's very own blues engineer, Casey Jones!"

This was one the ways I introduced legendary drummer Casey Jones to the stage during the inaugural Sopro Music's Annual Thanksgiving Blues Revue, back in 1984, and other live music events that I produced around Chicagoland for the next 38 years.

I fi st met Casey when he and local harmonica treasure Jody Noa, blues guitarist nonpareil Lefty Dizz, and nationally renowned Bill McFarland and The Chicago Horns played at a rock and roll concert I promoted. They commandeered the stage, joined the rock band, and absolutely blues'd and rocked the full house with their powerful brand of 4/4 Chicago-style jump blues.

Over the years, Casey Jones grew into one of the most respected and highlighted performers on any stage he graced. For over six decades, he played on many Sopro Music's Blues Revue concerts and other events throughout Chicagoland and across North America.

I began my incredible blues promotion career through Sopro Productions by introducing Casey Jones that night, and it's a career that I hold near and dear to my heart until I reach my End of Days.

Casey Jones was born on July 26, 1939, in Nitta Yuma, Mississippi, and raised in nearby Greenville. In 1956, Casey relocated to Chicago where his sister and her husband bought him his fi st drum kit. He quickly became an accomplished and sought after drummer, and recorded with the iconic bluesman, "The Master of the Telecaster," Albert Collins, on Albert's *Frostbite* and *Ice Pickin*' albums, and played live with Albert and the Icebreakers for 6+ years.

Casey's drum performances, on stage, live and on Albert's albums, attracted attention worldwide, Johnny Winter hired Casey to record on his *Serious Business, Guitar Slinger, True to the Blues*, and *The Johnny Winter Story* LPs. These sessions put Casey on the top of the bill as one of the blues music world's most highly acclaimed, and in-demand, drummers.

During his lifetime, Casey Jones was known in the business of the blues as a "fi st call" drummer. You can't get any better billing than that. In the 2017 Chicago Sun-Times' obituary honoring Casey Jones, Bruce Iglauer, founder of Chicago's Alligator Records, called Mr. Jones "one of the great blues drummers of his generation."During the 1960s, Casey's drumming caught the attention of some of the greatest blues' performers of alltime. The list of blues artists who hired him would fill a "Who's Who" of the blues, with musicians like Earl Hooker, McKinley Mitchell, Muddy Waters, Lou Rawls, Otis Rush, Eddie 'The Chief' Clearwater, Valerie Wellington, Johnny Littlejohn, A.C. Reed, Freddy King, Howlin' Wolf, Chuck Berry, Koko Taylor, Mighty Joe Young, Reggie Boyd, and Rickey Allen.

When Casey performed and recorded with blues artists like Albert Collins,, he began to focus on his unique vocal talent and form his own band. As a front man, Casey became the consummate performer who consistently entertained his audiences, and communicated with them with his classic wit, charm, style, and grace that ingratiated him each and every blues fan who experienced his live shows.

With relentless drive and a desire to become the best in the business, Casey's live shows consisted of an array of hit songs by the greatest bluesmen (and his sets often included several original songs, too). In 1983, Casey recorded and released his fi st album, *Still Kickin*' on his own Airwax label, followed in 1987 by *Solid Blue* released on Rooster Blues. From 1993 to 1995, he released *The Crowd Pleaser*, and *I-94 On My Way To Chicago* on Airwax.

On his four Airwax releases, Casey, performed lead vocals and drum tracks, and enlisted some of Chicago's most popular blues musicians, including Maurice Vaughan on guitar, Billy Branch on harmonica, Allen Bates on piano and organ, Greg Rzab on bass, Johnny B. Gaydon on bass, Jonathan McDonald on guitar, Jerry Barry on bass, Bill McFarland on trombone, Jerry Wilson on tenor saxophone, Paul Howard on trumpet, Robert Covington on guitar, and L.B. Blue and A.C. Reed on background vocals.


Flamboyant on-stage with his indomitable persona, Casey always dressed to the nines in high fashion. Offstage, he was, truly humble and grateful for each blues fan who attended his shows.

During Casey's live performances, he spoke to his audiences and they hung on every word.

'This next song, one of the classic golden oldies' and a top 10 hit, *Stand By Me*, was written, recorded, and performed by the late, great Ben E. King, "said Casey. "Ben made a million bucks with it. But tonight, I'm gonna perform it for you for free."

In 1961, he married the love of his life, Bernice, as they raised their family in Chicago's Morgan Park neighborhood. They lived together happily and with unconditional love for over five decades.

Sadly, we lost a great bluesman when Casey Jones reached his End of Days on May 3, 2017. Th s year, he would have celebrated his 85th birthday. Casey Jones left behind a legacy of endearing and brilliant music that will carry on and I am proud to have called him a close friend.



Editor Emeritus' Note: 19 years ago, I experienced my fi st Sopro Music's Annual Blues Music Revue in Blue(s) Island, Illinois. Casey Jones was the featured bandleader at this show. Bud Monaco introduced me to Casey Jones, who graciously recalled his time in the studio with blues legends, and before I knew it, he was back up on stage leading his band through another great set of Chicago blues. I still have that red Airwax Blues business card he gave me, and will always remember that Sopro Blues Production! Eric Steiner

Also, this summer, Cheri Adams, internationally known solo artist and all round talent brings her troupe of musicians with Beth Wulf on keys, Patty Mey on bass, and Kathie Flood on drums to present the "Women's Rockin' Blues Jam" each first Thursday of the month through October. Each of these jams are proven winners, hosted by veteran performers and Eagles members, and not to be missed!

The Salmon Bay Eagles hosts live music Thursday through Saturday and we have some great entertainment scheduled in August: The Mark Dufresne Band, Stevie & The Blue Flames, Joe Cook Blues Band, Jeff Herzog & the Jet City Flyers, Red House, and Dana Lupinacci, among others.

Dinners are provided most nights, prepared by our crack team of volunteer chefs. You can look forward to Murphy's specials, Judy's seafood, and on occasion, a special appearance by Marcia, (aka Mama, aka "the Kitchen Wench). Proceeds go to charity, so when you buy one of their meals, you will satisfy both your taste buds and your hunger to serve the greater community.
