Hello Blues Fans

The International Blues Challenge has come and gone, and our representatives did us proud. Each Washington Blues Society act, including Joel Astley in the band category and Brian Butler in the solo/duo category, made the semi-finals. And I am also chuffed because, hot diggity dog, my friend Josh Hoyer went and won the thing with

his incredible blues and soul band.

I first met Josh when he played keyboards and I played bass on a Midwest tour with a band called The Soul of John Black. Through many wintery miles in a white Econoline van, I found him to be hilarious, personable, and insanely talented.

A resident of Lincoln, Nebraska, he was a mighty figure in the fantastic Midwest blues scene, and he also booked one of its top clubs, Lincoln's legendary Zoo Bar. We stayed in touch over the years as he helped us out with Zoo Bar dates on our summer tours and as I tried to find him work on the West Coast.

Josh's first album, Josh Hoyer and the Shadowboxers, was a revelation. It felt like I was hearing The Commitments play a set of all originals with Curtis Salgado and the Blues Brothers thrown in. I wondered when he was going to make his way to the top of the national scene like others I've seen over the years, including John Nemeth and Seattle blues rocker Ayron Jones.

It kept not happening. He toured, played great festivals, even the Portland Waterfront Festival, won awards, got great reviews, and even appeared for several episodes on The Voice. He regularly got new albums out, each equally fantastic. I'm as prone to professional envy as the next artist, but it literally made me mad at the world to see Josh continuously get overlooked by the star-making blues labels and booking agencies. If anybody deserved success, he did.

He even thought about packing it in once in a while. He was out there trying to tour with a six-piece band, which is financially tough, especially when you've got a family. Last summer, I caught up with him at the Omaha In The Market For Blues Festival and we sat down for a bit and talked. He had just put out an album called Green Light and, like all the other stuff he'd done, it was remarkable. I recently noticed he'd won a cool award for it in Nebraska, and that, at least, was good.

Then I heard about his band's win in Memphis. Winning the IBC has launched other notable careers, including that of Danielle Nicole and Mr. Sipp. I hope this is the break he's overdue for.

And I hope we can get him to Washington this summer, as we did a couple of years ago with our other IBC-winning friend from Nebraska, Hector Anchondo. If we do, I'll be sure to let you all know. I attended the December Blues Bash at the Aurora Borealis on December 10. It was the send off partyfor the musicians who were selected to go to the International Blues Challenge in Memphis in January.

The entrants this year were Brian Butler in the solo/duo category and the Joel Astley Band in the bandcategory. The Washington Blues Society supports musicians by paying for the travel expenses to Memphis. Several items were auctioned from the stage at the Blues Bash.

I wondered if I could contribute in some way. I am a prolific quilter.



Could I possibly design, find fabrics and construct a music themed quilt in time to be auctioned at the WBS Holiday Party on December 22?

I searched fabric stores from Lynnwood to Everett and was able to find some music themed fabrics. I worked ten days straight to construct the quilt on my home sewing machine.

After sewing the quilt, I asked Brian Butler, Joel Astley and his band members to sign the labels which I stitched onto the quilt. Joel added some of his artwork to the labels and I printed some information about the IBC.

At the WBC Holiday Party on December 22, the music themed quilt was auctioned from the stage and raised \$150 for the travel fund for the IBC musicians. The woman who bought the quilt planned to send it to her grandson as a holiday gift.

I may make another music themed quilt at the end of 2025 for the next IBC travel fund but next time, I will have more than ten days to complete it!



Preview: Joe Bonamassa US Spring Tour 2025

This year's tour opens at Seattle's Climate Pledge Arena on February 16th!By Kirk Andersonrecently released album titled "V".

We are lucky to be living in a time of talented, blues guitarists who have been practicing their craft for more than 25 years. These devoted and talented musicians are in the lineage of Robert Johnson > Charley Patton > Muddy Waters > Buddy Guy > Duane Allman > Eric Clapton (I am sure you can add your favorites into this list without too much thought!).

Bonnie Raitt> Derek Trucks > Robben Ford > Kenny Wayne Shepherd all have started playing guitar very early in life and remained true to the music, the studio, the road, and to the fans. Another one of these musicians continuing to help satisfy our blues jones and further the art form of blues is Joe Bonamassa.

The Pacific Northwest has been chosen to be the first gig kicking off a major 2025 tour as Joe will be at the Climate Pledge Arena in Seattle on February 16, 2025. In Joe's last tour, he played the much smaller but among the largest theatre offerings in Seattle at the Paramount Theatre and in Portland at the Arlene Schnitzer Concert Hall. By playing the 18,300 seat Climate Pledge Arena, Joe moves up to a venue that touring heavyweights occupy.

A one off gig on the West Coast as Joe's tour then plays Milwaukee, Wisconsin. The tour then moves to the East Coast to tour through the end of winter winding its way down to Miami for Joe's "Keeping the Blues Alive at Sea X" super lineup 10th anniversary cruise followed by Joe and his band playing several weeks in Europe.

Although still in Europe, Joe shifts gears from touring with his band to the hard rock super group Black Country Communion. Consisting of bassist Glenn Hughes, drummer Jason Bonham and keyboardist Derek Serinian, Black Country Communion formed in Los Angeles back in 2009 playing on again off again as the members find time to come back to an obviously symbiotic relationship. This is in support of Black Country Communion's July 1st sees Joe back with his band as they continue to criss-cross Europe. Then, on September 15-21 sees Joe back in Seattle not for a gig to bookend the year but for the Keeping the Blues Alive at Sea Alaska blues cruise.

Bluesletter readers were turned onto an awesome gig preview cover story by Rick Bowen in the November 2022 *Bluesletter*. As I usually do, I encourage you to check out the *Bluesletter* online archive at www. wablues.org.

I personally first met Joe when he was "Joey" Bonamassa of Bloodline. Exposed to the guitar greats from England by his parents, Danny Gatton was a large influence on Joe when he was starting out gigging as "Smokin' Joe" Bonamassa outside of his school schedule. At 12, he opened for multiple B.B. King gigs. To this day as Sirius/XM's B.B. King's Bluesville channel replays interviews with its namesake where B.B. talks about how impressed he was with the young Bonamassa...AT 12 YEARS OLD!!!!.

Bloodline formed later in 1991 as a vehicle for Joe to step into the adult world of music. The name Bloodline's muse was the makeup of the band. Lead guitar-Joey Bonamassa, Berry Oakley, Jr{aka Berry Duane Oakley on lead vocals and bass (son of Berry Oakley, bassist for the Allman Brothers Band), drummer Erin Davis (Miles Davis' son), Waylon Krieger (The Doors' guitarist Robby Krieger's son), and keyboardist Lou Segreti (from "Smokin' Joe" Bonamassa's band).

As is the case in the music industry, differing ideas of follow up were too big to overcome and Joey started his solo careers as the other band members left to follow other endeavors.

I noticed that on his website and press kit, he is called a "Blues Titan." Looking at his steady growth into a venue size to the likes of Climate Pledge Arena, to his podcast "Live From Nerdsville with Joe Bonamassa," to his weekly hour long show on Sirius/XM's "Different Shades of Blue," to his newest live album *Live from Hollywood Bowl – With Orchestra*, to major presences on all social media and streaming platforms, to a first class merchandise presences to his consistent desire to help the communities that he plays in to pass along the blues to those coming up behind him. In 2022, one of Joe's charitable activities, the Fueling Musicians Initiative, received a prestigious Keeping the Blues Alive Award from The Blues Foundation. This initiative is one facet of Joe's Keeping the Blues Alive Foundation.

According to The Blues Foundation's award announcement at the time, "Awardwinning blues guitarist Joe Bonamassa founded the Keeping the Blues Alive Foundation in 2011. The foundation aims to support arts and music education through grants, scholarships, and donations to schools, colleges, and other nonprofit organizations. One of the most notable programs funded by the foundation is the Fueling Musicians initiative, designed to provide critically needed assistance to musicians whose income has been eliminated by the COVID-19 pandemic. Since its inception in 2020, this initiative has raised over \$500,000, distributing over 300 cash awards. Fueling Musicians has attracted the attention and support of Gibson, Fender, Guitar Center, Ernie Ball Music Man, and George Thorogood and the Destroyers. Since it began in 2011, the Keeping the Blues Alive Foundation has raised over \$2.7M through 680 projects that have impacted over 110,000 youth through music education.

Ronnie Baker Brooks Brings the Blues Back to Jazz Alley

"Blues-rock never sounded so outrageous" Blues Blast Magazine

Chicago guitarist, vocalist, and songwriter Ronnie Baker Brooks, one of the world's most talented and electrifying bluesmen, will bring his band to Seattle's Jazz Alley on Tuesday, Feb. 25, and Wednesday, Feb. 26.

Ronnie was born into Chicago blues royalty as the son of legendary multiple GRAMMY Award nominee, Blues Hall Of Famer, and longtime Alligator Records recording star Lonnie Brooks. He is among the few contemporary blues artists who learned his craft directly from many of the genre's icons, including Albert Collins, B.B. King, Willie Dixon, Koko Taylor and, most significantly, his father.


"I'm blessed to have played with and learned from the best. I'm carrying them within me," he says of all the legends he knew growing up and the journey he's been on.

Brooks received his first guitar from his famous father at age 9 and learned the instrument as he got older, sharing his time between playing basketball and focusing on his music. After high school, he joined his father's band – as a roadie. He earned his way slowly up the ladder, listening, watching and learning. At one show, Koko Taylor pulled him aside as he was loading the gear into the van and told him, "You learn from your daddy everything you can. And one day, it'll be up to you to carry the blues forward."

Lonnie eventually allowed Ronnie to play bass with the band before bringing him on as his full-time second guitarist. In 1991, he hit the road as part of The Alligator Records 20th Anniversary Tour band, backing Lonnie, Elvin Bishop, and Katie Webster. Each night, he'd join them, along with Koko Taylor and Lil' Ed Williams, for unforgettable blues jams.

Ronnie performed with his father for 12 years, gaining valuable experience and sharing stages with artists including Taj Mahal, Eric Clapton, Buddy Guy, and many others. During this time, his guitar skills continued to grow, along with his songwriting and performing confidence.

Among the many lessons Ronnie learned growing up was to forge his own identity, to write his own songs, to play his own brand of blues and not to imitate anyone else. Willie Dixon taught him the importance of "delivering" the song, so the people know you

believe it. Albert Collins, almost a second father to Ronnie, would say, "Take what you like from what we do and make it you."

Like all the great blues artists before him, Ronnie Baker Brooks has, through hard work, perseverance and gritty determination – along with his prodigious, natural talent and charisma – has earned his place in the upper echelons of the blues world.

"This show gives the band a chance to play some of the best known and admired songs from each of those vital cities" said Sarkowsky. "Each of those cities has a rich history and tradition of fantastic music, legendary artists and a unique sound" he added. Artists such as The Meters; Dr, John; Irma Thomas; Albert King; Otis Redding; Junior Wells; Little Walter; Buddy Guy and Elmore James, just to name a few, to be featured.

Scheduled to appear with the Northwest Blues Stars this time will be Kevin Sutton on

guitar and vocals, Robin Moxey on guitar and vocals, Tommy Wall on bass and vocals, Jeff Conlin on keys, and Steve Sarkowsky on drums, and Mark Dufresne on harp and vocals. This is a lineup heavy on experience and that has played throughout the Pacific Northwest over the years.

Meet Casey Sutton! The Washington Blues Society's incoming president brings a lot to the table

Charles Sutton, Casey to his friends, has done just about everything in blues music but serve as president of a blues society. He has owned vintage guitar stores in Hawaii and St. Louis, he has been a professional sound engineer for many bands and venues, he has managed bands, toured with bands, played with bands, been a booking agent for blues artists and venues, helped organize festivals, and he has extensive connections all over the nation.

So when he moved to Washington five years ago to be closer to his brothers, including his immensely talented brother Kevin Sutton, he thought he might be ready to move to a new chapter in his life, to charter his beloved boat and hang out with his friends and family.

"I had zero interest," Casey said. "I was like, I'm cool. I loved what I did."

But Washington Blues Society officers were not as eager to let such prodigious skills languish. Chief among them was sitting president Tony Fredrickson, who was thinking of retiring after many years at the helm. Rick Bowen, who has filled several roles in the society, including vice president, also had designs on Casey's abilities.

Finally, Rick took Casey to a ball game and the two got talking. The Blues Society had recently taken responsibility for organizing Seattle's long-running Peace Concert series, a complex task involving immense coordination between many different volunteers and professionals. Rick wondered, would Casey be interested in helping out?

"That set the hook," Casey said. He built a committee to organize the Peace Concerts and attended all the Blues Society board meetings. Inevitably, he started to notice things he thought he could contribute. So when Tony and Rick prevailed on him to consent to being nominated for president, he relented. The members voted, and the deed was done. Casey assumed the role in January.

Shortly thereafter, he shared his history with music and his visions for the future of the society with the Washington Bluesletter.

Casey grew up with his brother Kevin in Moscow, Idaho, which, as a college town, offered the brothers their first brushes with music.

"It's a small college town," Casey said. "College towns always have radio stations and money for festivals." They also had eclectic music stores, and Casey and Kevin discovered Janis Joplin and, as so many do, worked their way back through the influences of modern artists until they arrived at the originators, such as Sister Rosetta Tharpe.

"That's how we got to the blues," Casey said.

The bug bit early; Casey described recently finding a home movie made when he and Kevin were about 5 and 7 years old. Casey was playing a drum set made of paper plates, and Kevin was playing a guitar fashioned from a paper towel tube.

A decade later, the roles the brothers would occupy in music took shape. Kevin wanted a guitar, and Casey helped him start his first band, which he then started booking. Casey's then-girlfriend and later wife was also a singer, and he booked her act as well.

After high school, Casey left for Hawaii, and as soon as Kevin graduated, he followed. By then, Casey had discovered that he could buy vintage guitars in the United States and sell them at a profit in Hawaii. He began flying all over the country, trading in guitars and meeting musicians everywhere he went.

Then Casey's wife got accepted to Washington University in St. Louis, and the Suttons moved to that cradle of blues music.

"That's where we got exposed to the total real blues," Casey said.

He opened a vintage guitar store called West End Music and held events there, including a jam session that featured many national artists and an original music night that got a write-up in Billboard Magazine. Kevin went to college and helped tend the store.

The brothers soon became integral to the rich music scene of the Midwest. Kevin

worked in multiple bands, including the St. Louis All-Stars. Casey became quite busy as a soundman and booking agent. When Stevie Ray Vaughn exploded into fame in the late 1980s, the flagging blues scene suddenly flourished.

"We were lucky," Casey said. "We rode that wave." Casey had been booking top-level artists into 300-seat rooms, but now he was selling out 700-seat theaters with the same artists.

"So many guys who were broke and desperate got back into the industry," Casey recalled.

In the next years, Casey mixed sound extensively in Chicago and other mid-west cities, managed bands, and helped organize festivals. He served on panels at SXSW as a blues promoter and later as a manager.

Kevin returned to the Pacific Northwest, started a band called Wired, rocketed to the top of the local scene, and then, in 2012, won the International Blues Challenge with his trio. Through the next years, Casey frequently came up to visit for several weeks at a time.

Then, after his youngest son graduated from high school, Casey moved to Washington to

be close to his brothers again, including a brother who serves as a public defender in Mt. Vernon. He also estimates that he has about 70 cousins around Washington and Idaho, and a sister in Moscow.

Once he took on the role of director of the Peace Concerts, he recruited a committee that over time came to include Lee Sutton, Marysue Richards Thomas, Angelo and Alicia Ortiz, Mary McPage, and Kevin Young. As of January, the committee's co-chairs are Diane Forsythe of the popular Blue Healers and folk artist Sarah St. John, both of whom have been involved with Peace Concerts for over 20 years.

Now, Casey is charting a course for the future of the Blues Society. One thing he plans to do is get more people involved. Things once relegated to individuals will soon become tasks for committees. More directors are being sought to help modernize and professionalize the organization. More income streams are being sought, especially in the

wake of COVID-19.

"We need to regroup for a post-COVID environment," Casey said. "Our mission statement is to preserve, protect, and advance the blues, and we need to find new ways to do that."

The Washington Blues Society has depended on merchandising and running beer gardens at blues festivals for much of its income. But festivals have struggled to recover in the post-pandemic years.

Also, Casey is thinking about new ways to support young blues artists, such as paying for scholarships to music seminars for promising young artists who otherwise could not afford to attend. He is in discussion with Ben Hunter and Joe Seamons of the Rhapsody Project to identify possible avenues by which that could be done.

He also hopes to identify and recruit the next generation of blues fans to carry the society into the future. And he hopes to continue to inspire Washington's many blues artists and fans to offer the skills in support of a strong society and a thriving blues scene.

"Everybody loves to get behind a team," he said. "We need to get everybody behind our local scene."

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














Around the South Sound and Beyond with LTD Presents

CD Reviews



Mitch Woods Happy Hour (MoMojo Records)

Mitch Woods' newest, and 14th (!) CD features a baker's dozen of original songs inspired by class jump blues and boogie woogie bands dating back to the 1940s. It's an infectious and diverse collection that ranges from the quietly introspective blues of "Cryin' for My Baby" (complete with Rockin 88 saxophone player Dave Somers' first class solos) to the full throttle paens to fast cars and uptempo boogie woogie of "Sold Gold Cadillac" and "Jukebox Drive." Recorded at the fabled Greaseland Studios in California, Christoffer "Kid" Anderson joins the Rockin 88s as engineer and guitarist and complements the exceptional engine room of Kedar Roy on bass and Larry Vann on drums. When I saw Mitch Woods hold court this past October at Club 88 on the 41st Legendary Rhythm and Blues Cruise aboard MS Eurodam of the Holland America Line, several songs from this CD were true crowd pleasers, such as "Mojo Mambo," "Boogie Woogie Bar-B-Q," and "Broke." That last song is about a blues fan who has more month than money at the end of the month, and it got a lot of people dancing in the Billboard Onboard lounge! (Eric Steiner)

Co-Editor's Note: This month, after hosting Club 88 aboard the 42^{nd} Legendary Rhythm and Blues Cruise, Mitch Woods will play select venues in Cruz Bay and on St. John in the US Virgin Islands and enjoy a seven day residency at Myett's Restaurant and Hotel in Leonards on the island of Tortola in the British Virgin Islands from February 4^{th} through the 19^{th} . These shows would be a nice alternative to traditionally dreary February weather of the Pacific Northwest!



Ronnie Baker Brooks Blues in My DNA (Alligator Records)

Ronnie Baker Brooks' 2024 debut on Alligator Records, Blues in My DNA, is a cause for celebration. It was one of my favorite blues releases of the year, and when I saw him play many of the songs from this CD on my first Legendary Rhythm and Blues Cruise last October, I knew I'd absolutely enjoy this record. With this CD, Ronnie joins his father's storied, award-winning record label, Alligator Records, and builds upon his prior releases on the Provogue label and his own independent Watchdog Records. I had the privilege of meeting his father, Lonnie Brooks, a number of times, initially at ChicagoFest in the 70s and then an outstanding Blues Blast Music Awards many years ago at Buddy Guy's in Chicago, and the CD includes an audio snippet of Lonnie's blessing after the rousing, opening cut "I'm Feeling You." Look at 2006 Keeping the Blues Alive Award recipient Paul Natkin's CD cover photo: Ronnie's playing his father's guitar that was featured on the cover of his father's 1979 debut on Alligator Records, Bayou Lightning. The CD is a collection of 12 strong and powerful, guitar-fueled original blues songs, and my favorite cuts include the title cut, the upbeat "I Got to Make You Mine," the soulful "Accept My Love," and the eight-minute barn burner "Stuck on Stupid" (which reminded me at times of the Boz Scaggs and Duane "Sky Dog" Allman classic "Lone Me a Dime," first recorded by Alligator recording artist Fenton Robinson in 1974). During the CO-VID-19 pandemic, Ronnie effectively used social media to pivot away from live blues shows to weekly, virtual Facebook concerts, and he made it work, gaining new followers' online week after week. Joining Ronnie on this CD are Will McFarlane on rhythm guitar, Dave Smith on bass and Steve Potts on drums with Rick Steff on electric piano, Clayton Ivey on the Hammond B3, Brad

Quinn on saxophone, Drew White on trumpet, and Trenicia Hodges and Kimberlie Helton on background vocals. I think that *Blues in My DNA* is an exceptionally good CD of contemporary Chicago blues, and I wish that Ronnie Baker Brooks would return to the Pacific Northwest (and British Columbia's Lower Mainland) more often. I know that, for many of my fellow Washington Blues Society blues fans, blues is in our DNA, too. (Eric Steiner).



Leo Schumaker The Professor of the Blues!

n addition to being a writer for this magazine, I am also a blues radio programmer, hosting "Views of the Blues" every Monday afternoon for the last eighteen years on KCSB-FM in Santa Barbara, California (www.kcsb.org). For years before inaugurating my show in January 2007, I was an avid listener of other blues shows on the station hosted by programmers Greg Drust, Matt Cohen, Mike Petrini, and Leo Schumaker. Leo and I met as board members of the Santa Barbara Blues Society (SBBlues.org) and became friends. When I retired from my "day job" in summer 2006 I was ready to start my own radio show, and Leo encouraged me and was my mentor.

Leo is also a runner and has hosted a "Running a Racing" radio show. He is a lover of vintage cars. He moved to Bellingham, WA, about five years ago, where he has continued to be an avid blues promoter, and a radio programmer on KMRE-FM. He is one of the most knowledgeable blues aficionados that I know, and one of the most personable radio emcees.

Leo, did you listen to radio

when you were young?

"I sure did. Growing up in the San Jose, CA area, I would lie in bed at night with a transistor radio under my pillow, listening to rock, blues, soul, and rhythm-and-blues. I also listened to Wolfman Jack. ("Wolfman Jack" (Robert Smith) was a disc jockey who broadcast from the 1960s to the 1980s, much of the time on Mexican station XERF/XERB. That station was so powerful that it could be heard across much of the U.S.] These days I begin each of my shows with a short clip of Wolfman Jack talking. When did you begin doing radio?

"I started on KCSB 91.9 FM in Santa Barbara in 1996. I kept calling the station's disc jockeys that played blues, making requests, and finally one of them, Matt Cohen, said that with my knowledge I should get my own show, and he offered to train me."

What is your station now? "KMRE-FM in Bellingham, WA; www.kmre.org I always broadcast live on Thursday from 7 to 9 PM Pacific Time from Cascade Hall at the Whatcom Community College studios in Bellingham."

Where do you get the musi-

cal material that you play on your show?

"KMRE has a small music library, so I mostly play tracks from my own collection of CDs and vinyl records, plus new music received by KMRE. I also go to a lot of live shows and buy CDs from the artists. Many of my shows have themes, like a tribute to a certain artist. I also take requests by telephone and through my Facebook page during the show."

Do you regularly schedule live interviews in the studio or on the phone?

"Yes, I interview artists, on the phone and live in the studio, who have new music that is appealing. I also interview blues personalities, including performers, music journalists, and owners of clubs that present blues, who have a story that I feel will be interesting to listeners. In addition, I write articles for the Washington Blues Society "Bluesletter.""

Do you do interviews at shows or festivals?

"I do interviews at blues shows, festivals, and in the KMRE studios. I also film interviews and music shows for my TV show, "Adventures with Leo Schumaker," on BTV Channel 10 in Bellingham and on YouTube channel "Leo Schumaker.""

What are some of your memorable interviews?

"BB King, Taj Mahal, George Thorogood, Kim Simmonds from Savoy Brown, Randy Chortkoff of Delta Groove Records, and more. My favorite is with Bruce Iglauer of Alligator Records. I wrote it up for the Washington Blues Society and it was published over three issues of their "Bluesletter.""

Do you do emcee work for live blues shows?

"I've done emcee work at our local blues shows. I also hosted a "Battle of the Bands" for the Santa Barbara Blues Society for twenty years when I lived there. I've introduced a couple of shows on the Legendary Rhythm & Blues cruises, at the Wild Buffalo in Bellingham, and at other venues as the opportunity presents itself."

Do you listen to other radio, such as streaming like SiriusXM, and if so, what are your favorite shows and why?

"I listen to Steve Daniels on KCSB-FM [thank you, Leo], Jim Ladd, Bill Wax and Tom Petty on Sirius. I listen to Gary "The Wagman" Wagner from the Los Angeles area, John Kessler on KNKX in Seattle, and others."

If you are on public or community radio, how often do you do fundraising?

"KMRE is a community radio station. We have done fundraising once a year for the last three years."

What is your favorite part of being a radio host and why?

"I am inspired by the music to broadcast blues sets that are connected in ideas, beats, and feelings. I like talking to music artists to find out why they are so talented, and having listeners call in to my radio show with requests and ideas on whom to interview next."

Do you have a favorite record store where you get your music?

"Legendary Vinyl Records in Bellingham, Black Noise Records, and every record store I can find."

Where do you go to enjoy live music?

"Ramble Tamble, Mr. Baker Theater, and Shakedown, all in Bellingham. Also, the Lincoln Theater in Mt. Vernon, Conway Muse in Conway, Dmitri's Jazz Alley in Seattle, and Santa Barbara Blues Society events."

Do you have a favorite venue?

"Santa Barbara Blues Society events."

Favorite festival? "The Legendary Rhythm &

Blues Cruise." KMRE 88.3 FM is located in

KMRE 88.3 FM is located in Bellingham, WA. It has 2000 watts of power and reaches from Blaine, WA, 21 miles just below the Canadian border to the north and down to Mt. Vernon, 25 miles south. To the east it broadcasts to Mt. Baker 30 east, and to all ships at sea to the west. KMRE is a nonprofit 501 (c)3 community radio station. Leo Schumaker's show is named "Bluesland," on from 7 to 9 PM Pacific time. His email address is

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SMASH: A New Resource for Musicians

Editor's Note: We are pleased to welcome South Sound Blues Association President Susie Campbell to these pages! This article is an informative article to a new resource for musicians, Seattle Musicians Access to Sustainable Healthcare (SMASH).

When I moved to the Gig Harbor area in 2016, I discovered a vibrant music scene and community. Over the years, I have enjoyed getting to know many of the local bands and their members. These men and women often work a day job in addition to their night and weekend gigs, making them some of the hardest working people I know. Music is definitely a labor of love and, unfortunately, not especially well-paid. Many working musicians find themselves un/under insured for their medical and dental needs.

In my desire to be a supporter of our local music community, I became a member of SSBA, a KNKX sustaining member, and a donor/supporter of SMASH.

I learned about SMASH last November when I attended a KNKX Connects event at the Blue Mouse Theater in Tacoma. Stephanie Anne Johnson and Jeff Fielder performed. In addition to being a performing musician, Stephanie is the host of The Grooveyard program on KNKX, a mix of soul, jazz and blues, at 1 PM on Saturdays. During the show, Stephanie and Jeff talked about SMASH and the services it provides to musicians, including themselves. After the concert I looked into SMASH and found that it was a perfect fit for me to combine philanthropy with my love of music. I then became a supporter and donor. What surprises me is how few people in the South Sound have heard of SMASH. I've been spreading the word.

For this article, I spoke with Stephanie Johnson about their experience with SMASH. Asked how they heard about SMASH, they replied that they were asked to perform at the 2021 annual SMASH benefit concert held at the Moore theater. It had an impressive lineup of local and international touring musicians, including Dave Matthews, and Chad Smith (Red Hot Chili Peppers), and many others. After that, they attended an informational meeting and was impressed at the number of popular Seattle musicians in the crowd who were affiliated with SMASH. This is what "tipped the scales" for them and prompted them to become a member.

Stephanie received help in acquiring professional ear protection. These specialty devices can cost thousands of dollars. From start to finish, Stephanie felt treated "like a person. Some people think that being a working musician isn't a viable field of work. Being treated like a human being is very important. I feel good working with the SMASH people."

Like most working musicians, Stephanie wears multiple hats to make ends meet. In addition to performing and hosting The Grooveyard at KNKX, they do Sunday singing at affirming churches in the area and earn income from sales of music and memberships to their Patreon account. In this way they can "pay the rent and get my teeth cleaned. I am pretty blessed to be a professional musician."

I also reached out to SMASH with a few questions (Special thanks to Nikki Barron and Karina Kaiwi for their informative replies).

SC: "Who started SMASH and why?"

SMASH: "Ian Moore, a long-time touring and recording artist originally from Austin, TX, considered himself lucky that his music career had allowed him to provide for his family. Like many musicians, money was often tight, causing his access to healthcare to take a backseat to expenses like rent and food. However, while living in Austin, Moore had access to a safety net called the Health Alliance for Austin Musicians (HAAM). This resource allowed him to focus on his life and career without sacrificing his health. When he moved to Vashon Island, he no



longer qualified for HAAM and discovered nothing like it in the region. In 2016, he teamed up with Jacqueline Ryall, a longtime friend, music supporter, attorney, and Gates Foundation employee, to figure out how to bring something similar to the Pacific Northwest. They became the founding members of SMASH and recruited a dedicated group of music and nonprofit industry professionals, community leaders, and friends to make it a reality."

SC: "SMASH was originally intended to serve Seattle musicians, hence Seattle Musicians Access to Sustainable Healthcare. Now that you serve musicians in King, Snohomish, Pierce, Mason, Kitsap, and Thurston counties, why don't you call it MASH?"

SMASH: "The name change to "MASH" seems obvious, but when we decided to increase our service area, we opted to keep "SMASH" because it's more than just geography—it's about the spirit of Seattle's music scene. Ask any local musician; our music scene is more than simply a scene; it's a community. So, the "S" serves as a reminder of that."

SC: "Free health care?! What's the catch?"

SMASH: "Actually, there is one catch musicians have to keep making great music! It's free to be a member of SMASH, and musicians can still qualify even if they have insurance. Our goal is to lower barriers to access to healthcare services as much as possible. A big part of that is alleviating musicians' stress when it comes to paying for services. Some services have a small co-pay; for example, custom earplugs have a \$25 fee for members, which was implemented to help motivate members to pick them up after their appointments. Shout out to our financial supporters, and awesome providers who donate their time. We couldn't provide these services without them."

SC: "The South Sound has a vibrant music community including many talented musicians and bands, and a loyal fanbase. How is SMASH working to expand into this area?"

SMASH: "SMASH recognizes the incredible talent and tight-knit music community in the South Sound, and we're committed to expanding our reach there. We're doing this by partnering with providers in the South Sound; shout out to Dr. Kunal, who is providing dental services to our members in Puyallup! We've got big plans to continue outreach to providers in the area to increase access to more services in the South Sound. Also, many of our services are not geographically constricted. For example, our mental health program has a telehealth option, and an option for us to pay their preferred mental health provider directly. If we don't have a provider in an easy-to-access location for members, we can support musicians with transportation costs to get to Seattle. However, it's uncommon that we can't find something that works for members close to home."

SMASH membership includes access to:

- Annual primary care visit and associated labs,

- Mental healthcare,
- Preventative and acute dental care,
- Hearing screenings and ear protection,
- Eye exams with glasses,

- Physical therapy,
- Substance use disorder treatment, and
- Healthcare/health insurance navigation.

A few things we're working on behind the scenes (and screens) to improve the Bluesletter.

By the time this issue hits members' mailboxes, we will have learned who won first place at this year's International Blues Challenge in Memphis. Last issue, the Washington Blues Society entrants Brian Butler and the Joel Astley Band were on the cover, and I hope many readers noticed differences between the print and online versions of the January Bluesletter. Let me briefly explain.

First of all, during the production of the January issue in December, Polly and I were unavailable during most of the "deadline dash." Polly cared for a friend recovering from brain surgery and I was with Kirk Anderson at Seattle's historic Camlin Hotel to see the Allman Betts Family Revival at the Moore Theatre.

As a result, the file I sent to Pacific Publishing did not have the usual care, finishing or proofreading that I try to give to this magazine. Due to these other demands that took Polly and me away from our keyboards, there were many areas in need of just a little more TLC (Technical Loving Care) just one day before our print deadline.

Admittedly, part of the challenge has been my usual work style: I've tended to passively rely on editorial copy to arrive no later than the 5th of the month and advertisements to arrive on the 12th. Like last month, I missed another ad in the print issue that former Vice President Rick J. Bowen sent to me in early December: Jesse James and The Mob's CD release party in mid-January.

To prevent this from recurring, I ask advertisers to send their ads to both <u>advertising@</u> <u>wablues.org</u> and <u>editor@wablues.org</u>.

Each of these addresses reach multiple volunteers, and if more eyes are on each submission, there's a greater likelihood that we will ensure that all ads are correctly placed.

I made other changes to the January online reference copy, too. In our Dropbox folder, I noticed that Polly saved an article by firsttime contributor Susie Campbell, the newly elected President of the South Sound Blues Association whom I met on the 41st Legendary Rhythm & Blues Cruise. Reprinted from the Seattle Musicians Access to Sustainable Healthcare website, Susie's article provides timely and concrete and actionable information on health and medical care for working musicians throughout our region. This is exactly the type of editorial copy that belongs in this publication and it's very similar to the COVID-19 and grant funding and related resources for musicians we have published during the pandemic.

Last issue was only the second time in Bluesletter history in which there was no feature story aligned with the cover photo.

While I appreciated Danno Mac's vibrant and first-ever cover of our 2025 International Blues Challenge competitors, I should have asked each act to simply submit the same short introductory paragraph and high-resolution that they sent in to the International Blues Challenge program book by the deadline. Next year, I'll remind Polly to ask our acts in 2026 to do so.

Secondly, I reformatted Naomi Ishisaka's photo and Selena Guadelupe Rodridguez' excellent news about Seattle's Black and Tan Hall. I also added the venue's logo that founder Ben Hunter sent me several years ago. I also reformatted the listing of Keeping the Blues Alive Award recipients and aligned it with the Adobe In Design template.

Regular readers will also see a "teaser paragraph" and photo next to the Table of Contents on page three of the virtual version. In that paragraph, I summarize what I think are the high points of the issue, and with the page three photo, it leads readers to one of the issue's lead stories. I thought that Keith Scott's photo with Murph at Seattle's Salmon Bay Eagles complemented Keith's "View from the Stage" in the January issue nicely.

I also noticed that we continue to receive far too many photos and ads that are not formatted correctly for print.

Our printer's requirements are always listed on page four of each issue, and I encourage all potential contributors to learn how to format images and graphics as CMYK images (that's a traditional, four color process called Cyan-Magenta-Yellow-Black) instead of using the RGB format (that's a three color process reserved for screens called Red-Green-Blue). Please do not just send in photos from your phone with camera-supplied identifiers like "DSC1234.jpg," and these IDs tell us nothing about the subject of your photo. Please take the time to review your photo, make improvements to it, and send it with a file name that lets Polly and me know who is in the picture, like "Mick Jagger at Salmon Bay Eaglues by Malcolm Kennedy.pdf."

Finally, I'd be remiss if I didn't ask for new volunteers to take on tasks associated with advertising and image preparation.

We need more depth behind the screens and pages of this publication. Specifically, Polly and I would appreciate new volunteers to format and resize images and photos in the Adobe PhotoShop program according to our printer's specifications.

By the time this issue hits members' mailboxes in February, Polly and I will have met in the Mukilteo Public Library conference room and practiced critical tasks in the Adobe In Design program to produce this magazine, including Separations Previews, Color Swatch Reviews, Over Set Text, Ink Balance, Links, and other, required nit-picky minutiae.

Working together well in advance of our regular editorial deadline of the 5th of the month (and advertising deadline of the 12th of the month), we will produce a better *Bluesletter*.


