My schedule's pretty tight, but I had set aside a couple days to do my share of the layout, starting two days ago. Two days ago, When I sat down to do it, nothing was in the Dropbox. I emailed Eric, asked him where the files had got to, and waited for him to see my message given the time difference between Seattle and where the ship was.

The following day, I woke up to a message from Eric saying that everything was in its usual spot. I checked. I still couldn't see it. I spent most of the day doing everything I could think of.. I restarted my computer and Dropbox many, many times. I tried using the online Dropbox.com site. I updated all the relevant software, checked permissions, Googled my snout off, and nothing worked.

This morning, with 24 hours to go by the drop-dead date, I was beginning to freak out. I still couldn't access the files! Eric and I steadily worked troubleshot all day. Among my many freak-out measures I created a folder in Google Drive, sent him a link, and asked if he could try popping everything into it to see if it would



work where Dropbox would not.

He loaded everything into the Google Drive folder and got a message saying that it was working, but it would take 75 minutes to upload. That was more time than he expected to have wireless service, but we crossed our fingers. By then I was searching cruise forums, looking for answers to cruise ship-specific Dropbox troubles. Eric, at the same time, was reaching out to guest services on the ship.

Here's what we both learned at the same time: cruise ships block many content sharing sites like Dropbox. But they make an exception for Google Drive. Ten minutes ago, the files came through in Google Drive, I'm good to go finishing the layout, but may need to work through the night to hit the deadline, and Eric is no doubt recovering from a near heart attack. At least a cruise ship is a nice place to decompress!

Michelle D'Amour and the Love Dealers will perform at the April Blues Bash presented by the Washington Blues Society at the Aurora Borealis, Shoreline on Tuesday April 8 after an accoustic opening set by Seattle veteran Blues man John Paynich.

An award-winning blues band that delivers fun, funky original tunes as well as strong interpretations of blues classics, Michele and The Lover Dealers have released seven studio albums. The most recent, Hot Mess, was released in October 2022, charted internationally, and won two silver medals from the Global Music Awards. D'Amour is backed by her husband Patrick McDanel on Bass and Carl Martin on Drums along with newly acquired classically trained guitarist Steve Gorringe, with Sax Man Noel Barnes and Keyboard pro Merlyn Ahern rounding out the ensemble.

Seamonster Lounge in Seattle Steps Up"... the "Musicians' Living Room," ... the only venue in the city offering live music seven days a week."

The modest confines of the Seamonster Lounge on 45th Street in the Wallingford neighborhood of Seattle labels itself as the "Musicians' Living Room," and it's the only enue in the city offering live music seven days a week. The club hosts an intriguing array of residencies for the late shows bolstered by ever changing opening acts, and early shows feature a variety of genres that feature some of the area's most talented players.

On Mondays, the club hosts the La Luz social gathering focused on Latin, funk and Afrobeat music.

On Tuesdays, the acclaimed Hammond organ keyboardist Joe Doria performs with one of his many Seattle based groups, such as McTuff, his own Joe Doria Trio, the Drunken Masters, Skerik's Syncopated Taint Septet, and AriSawkaDoria.

Wednesday is the night the Seamonster is open to a variety of new groups and touring bands, from funky brass bands, country and Americana, roots, reggae and dub step.

For over a decade, a new style of music has been growing and evolving in the clubs of Seattle as a refreshing and innovative style of flowing, live improvised music that incorporates elements of jazz with soul, rock and funk some simply call "Groove." On Thursdays, the club showcases the acts leading the charge of this emergent genre.

Fridays at the Seamonster are all about "The Funk," with the all-star group Funky 2 Death hosting the late show after a cavalcade of opening acts who bring old and new school funk and soul each week.

Salsa Saturday opens the events every weekend followed by a mixed bag of groups for headline shows.

Sundays are a laid back affair in Wallingford. Award winning songwriter Randy Weeks hosts afternoon sessions on the first and third Sunday of each month alternating with local roots and blues acts, followed by local legend Ron Weinstein and his trio playing "Cheap Jazz" in the evenings, inviting listeners to drink Spanish coffee or sip martinis as the "best way to end the week and start the next."

The Fabulous Thunderbirds' Jazz Alley Residency

As the seasons shift from Winter to Spring in Seattle, our minds naturally turn to music and sharing special events with friends and loved ones. As the pandemic recedes further into the rearview mirror, the Fabulous Thunderbirds bring their tour supporting their double Grammy Award-nominated 2024 release, Struck Down on the award-winning Stony Plain label.

Kim Wilson and the Fabulous Thunderbirds will be in Seattle for a very special six-show residency from April 24th to the 27th at the nation's third-longest-running dinner club that features live music, Jazz Alley.

For 44 years, Jazz Alley has served as an important stop for touring musicians, and a gathering place for fans of all genres radiating from the venue's strong foundation built on jazz music.

"It's going to be fun. Looking forward to it," said Kim. "That's what's cool about playing at a place like Jazz Alley. It's like playing in your living room."

This year, KNKX radio and the Washington Blues Society join forces to support these six performances at Jazz Alley, offering music fans in Seattle, the state of Washington, surrounding states and Canadian provinces, an outstanding opportunity to enjoy their favorite musicians in an incredibly intimate setting. The reasonable ticket prices and validated parking make it possible to attend more than one show.

I asked Kim about how they might approach these six back-to-back shows.

"Every set is different," he said, noting

that while they're supporting the double Grammy-nominated *Struck Down*, they're aware that there will be songs from the Fabulous Thunderbirds' deep, back catalog that people want to hear.

"We watch the audience response," he continued. "That's when the magic happens... spontaneity."

Starting right after Valentine's Day at the Vero Beach Blues Festival in Florida, the Fabulous Thunderbirds' tour will run through the East Coast and Midwest, with Seattle being the only multiple-night stop before heading back down through California and Texas.

"I think *Struck Down* is my best album with The Fabulous Thunderbirds... by far," says Kim.

Bringing years of Texas blues history with them, The Fabulous Thunderbirds were formed in 1974 and released their first album, The Fabulous Thunderbirds, in 1979. They've since released 11 studio albums and three compilation albums, culminating in their 2024 studio release, *Struck Down*. *Struck Down* was nominated for both the Best American Roots Performance and Best Traditional Blues Album at the Grammy Awards.

Among their many accolades, the band's hit "Wrap It Up" from 1986 helped propel the album *Tuff Enuff* to platinum sales status, selling more than a million copies. Led by founding member Kim Wilson, the Fabulous Thunderbirds have received six Grammy Award nominations and more than 20 Blues Music Award nominations. Muddy Waters even called Kim Wilson his favorite vocalist, and greatest harmonica, player since Little Walter.

When talking about the full-time members of the Thunderbirds, Wilson said, "The strength of this band has inspired me to be more creative. This band really allows me to do anything I want to do: modern, traditional, anything in between. They are masters of it all. They are exceptional musicians"

I asked Kim what we could expect out of this six-night residency at Seattle's Jazz Alley.

"Controlled aggression," he said. They're going to see a good example of that over the nights. That's the way it's always been done, when it's done correctly."

"Every note I play on the harmonica is a tribute to all of the unbelievable people that I've known," he continued. "I've played with just about everybody. I learned from them all, but created my own sound."

All of this comes to Seattle for what is sure to be six legendary performances.

Buddy Guy to Join Experience Hendrix' Closing Show

"A veritable 'who's who' of blues & rock and roll guitarists on the 2025 tour."

During the production of this issue, I received a link from former Secretary, and frequent volunteer and contributor, Rocky Nelson. He sent me a link from the Consequence.net site about Buddy Guy joining the last show of this year's Experience Hendrix tour.

I delved a little deeper into the Consequence. net website and found over 50 sub-sites dedicated to popular culture, music, film, TV, and heavy metal. It was a multilayered resource on many topics that interest me, and I thought it was one of the more informative websites I've ever seen.

The link featured an article and ad about the 88 year old Buddy Guy playing the last show of the 2025 Experience Hendrix tour at Atlanta's Fox Theatre. The tour, which began on March 11th in Cincinnati, features guitarists

Eric Johnson, Kenny Wayne Shepherd, Zakk Wylde, Devon Allman, Samantha Fish, and more. Like the other Experience Hendrix tours over the years, each night will prominently feature Jimi Hendrix' songs.

The link also included news about Buddy Guy's latest recording with the alt-rock band Switchfoot, "Last Man Standing." I had not heard of Switchfoot before Rocky's link, and have learned the band is perhaps best known for *The Beautiful Letdown* CD and best-selling songs "Meant to Live" and "Dare You to Move."

I had the good fortune of seeing Buddy Guy live at Seattle's Paramount Theatre a couple of years ago, and highly recommend readers go to his blues club in Chicago, Buddy Guy's Legends!

A New Resource for Potential Contributors!

As I've typed in the pages of this magazine for more issues than I care to remember, Editor Polly O'Keary and I continue to receive, month-in and month-out, images that we cannot use as they are not formatted according to our printer's specifications listed on page four of every issue.

I've offered instructions in this space with quick, 17-step formatting suggestions in the Adobe PhotoShop program many, many times, and this month, I'm grateful for frequent contributor Kathy Rankin's link to a free website that can correctly format RGB (that's red/green/blue) images into images suitable for old-school, print media in the CMYK (that's cyan-magenta-yellow-black) format.


During the production of this issue, Polly and I received several great images from contributors who "point and click" with their cell phone cameras and just send us the photos "in the moment." We're grateful for these images, but ask that potential contributors take a little time and format them as camera-ready images that our printer can use.

So, please consider using www.rgb2cmyk. org in addition to standard photo processing software like Adobe PhotoShop.


The site will help format images compatible with our printer's specifications, and often these images are very large. In many cases, the images will be too large to send as email attachments (and Polly and I recommend using a file sharing service like Dropbox).

The website appears to be hosted by a nonprofit organization in Europe. Some public libraries offer access to PhotoShop and other image improvement and editing programs, and I encourage all potential contributing photographers to help Polly and me improve the images in this publication.










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Previews: April 2025 Blues on the Road

Great live music in the Evergreen State & British Columbia's Lower Mainland this month!



Last year, Matt won the Entertainer of the year, Male Vocalist of the Year, Recording/Producer of the Year and Songwriter of the Year awards at the 27th Maple Blues Awards of the Toronto Blues Society. Matt's 2023 release on the Sonic label, Big Bottle of Joy, was nominated for a 2024 Best Blues Album of the Year in Canada's prestigious Juno Awards. Matt's been on the blues road for nearly 25 years, and he's released 16 albums. On the 25th, Sonic will release his newest release, The Hammer & The Rose. The Birth of a Band! Garfield Jazz Tribute to Quincy Jones

On the 7th, Garfield High School Jazz celebrates the life and legacy of Quincy Jones (Class of 1950), highlighting his unique library of work and collaborations with Count Basie, Frank Sinatra, and Ella Fitzgerald. Under the direction of Jared Sessink, the Garfield Jazz Program



continues a tradition of musical excellence. celebrating the big band works of Duke Ellington, Count Basie, Quincy Jones, and others. Garfield Jazz has participated in the Essentially Ellington competition and festival 20 times, starting in 1999. The program currently serves over 90 students across three big band ensembles and a vocal jazz ensemble. Garfield High School, located in Seattle's Central District, is a public school that attracts students from a variety of backgrounds. This performance is a fundraiser supported by the Garfield Jazz Foundation, the non-profit, all parent volunteer organization that provides the resources to nurture, sustain, and develop the Garfield High School Jazz Program. For most of the shows, Alison Young will join guitarist A.W. Cardinal and bassist Jasmine Collette on sax and Doug Phillips will play piano. On the 11th, the band will play the Spirit Bar in Nelson and continue the next night at the Charles Bailey Theatre in Trail. The next week, Doug, A.W. and Jasmine play on the 19th at the Sid Williams Theatre in Courtney and on the 20th at the Heriot Bay Inn in Heriot Bay. Last year, Blue Moon Marquee was honored with a Best Blues Album in Canad'a prestigious



Juno Awards for Scream, Holler & Howl (Stony Plain), and this year, the duo is nominated in the same category for a CD they recorded live, with no overdubs, in New Orleans' 9th Ward, New Orleans Sessions (Stony Plain). In 2020, Blue Moon Marquee made it to the semi-finals of the International Blues Challenge representing the Washington Blues Society in the Solo/ Duo category, and I've enjoyed this duo's music since I first heard them in 2018. 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The Muddy Waters School of Management

"I had it in mind, even then, to either play music or preach... I wanted to be a known person."

This month, I wanted to dust off one of my favorite articles about one of my favorite bluesmen that I had the privilege of meeting briefly at Mayor Michael Bilandic's shortlived ChicagoFest in 1980.

A few months after that festival, I relocated to the Pacific Northwest to work for Randy Finley at his Seven Gables Theatres chain. I'm updating this article as Muddy Waters was born and passed away in the month of April and I wanted to honor his memory.

ChicagoFest was 10-day festival that featured many different styles of music prior to the Chicago Blues Festival.

Blues Deluxe, an exceptional live record recorded by Alligator Records captured the magic of that ChicagoFest with Muddy, Koko Taylor, Son Seals, Lonnie Brooks, and Willie Dixon. It was a special experience for me because these were the same blues performers I would see on weekends at clubs around Chicagoland. Seeing them on the big stage at Navy Pier was a real thrill.

A rare summer downpour in Chicago prevented me from getting Muddy's autograph, but it sure was a thrill for this young and impressionable blues fan to meet Muddy Waters briefly.

Muddy Waters was a true giant of the blues, and this year I'm honoring his birth and death in the month of April. Muddy was born on April 4, 1915 in Rolling Fork, Mississippi, and died in his sleep on April 30, 1983 at his home in Westmont, Illinois, near Chicago next to his wife Marva.

There have been several popular self-help books on management over the past 30 or 35 years. You might have seen *The Pursuit of Wow!* by Tom Peters, *The One Minute Manager* by Ken Blanchard and or *Who Moved My Cheese?* by Dr. Spencer Johnson.

I know that these references peg me as a "reader of a certain age," and future versions of this article will include references to popular blogs and websites (instead of traditional print books).

Each of these deceptively short books try to simplify one of the most difficult subjects on the planet: management. I first learned about management in the classroom in the 70s, but since then, I've learned that the basics are critically important.

At the Washington Blues Society, our all-volunteer crew works to provide opportunities for musicians and fans to connect, for blues fans to discover new blues talent or appreciate blues elders, or simply bring people together. Our team of volunteers manages a lot, and while we may miss the mark from time to time, we try to make things right (even if we miscredit photographers or authors, order the wrong t-shirt size, or miss an edit or two in the *Bluesletter*).

I wanted to revisit the life and work of Muddy Waters. However, I wanted to look at his life through the lens of a businessman, and not necessarily as a blues man.

Whether you're a young family balancing a household budget with more month than money, or an executive managing a Fortune 500 company, I'm confident that you will learn from the life lessons of McKinley Morganfield, better known as Muddy Waters.


I'd like to call this virtual seminar "The Muddy Waters School of Management."

So, let's get started. Class is in session.

Today, we'll consider Muddy's views on the importance of determination, persistence, and risk-taking. Each of these life lessons can be applied to life and work, regardless of occupation.

Our textbooks for today's session are: Robert Gordon's Can't Be Satisfied: The Life and Times of Muddy Waters, published by Little, Brown, and Sandra Tooze's Muddy Waters: The Mojo Man, from Canada's ECW Press.

Determination is a key trait shared by many



successful people in business and in life.

Growing up in a sharecropper's family, Muddy was motivated to leave the plantation from an early age, using his skills as a preacher or a bluesman.


"I had it in mind, even then, to either play music or preach or do something that I would be known... I kept that on my mind. I wanted to be a known person," is how Muddy described his desire to James Rooney as quoted in Tooze's excellent book (Tooze, p. 29).

So, the first lesson today is determination. Persistence.

If you, as Muddy did, want to be a "known person," develop your skills the best you can, and focus on that dream.

Secondly, Muddy modeled his behavior on successful people.

Anthony "Personal Power" Robbins has acknowledged that this skill is an important one, and his star turn in the movie *Shallow Hal* aside, Robbins is an inspiring figure to



many people who attend his seminars and buy his books.

Coming up, Muddy looked up to Big Bill Broonzy and Broonzy's observation goes a long way to explain the importance of persistence.

In Gordon's book, Muddy recalled that "Big Bill, he don't care where you from. He didn't look you over 'cause he been on records a long time.'

'Do your thing, stay with it, man. If you stay with it, you going to make it.' That's what Big Bill told me. Mostly I try to be like him." (Gordon, p. 73).

So, it's not enough just to have a dream. You've got to stay with that dream and be persistent. It helps if you have a path to follow (even if someone has blazed that trail).

Finally, Muddy realized the importance of taking risks.

In the Mississippi Delta, Muddy played harp and acoustic guitar after he finished work at the plantation.

Folklorist Alan Lomax captured Muddy on the Stovall Plantation in 1941 and 1942 with the assistance of noted Fisk University scholar John Work III, and in 1994, the *Complete Plantation Recordings* (MCA) received the 1994 W.C. Handy Award for Reissue Album of the Year.

When Muddy added the electric guitar to his blues toolbox, it was more complicated than just plugging in an axe.

As Robert Gordon relays in *Can't Be Satisfied*, Muddy understood that any mistake would be amplified on an electric guitar, but that was a risk Muddy was prepared to take. He could have just focused on playing harp and acoustic guitar, but he didn't.

Far from it.

"That loud sound would tell everything you were doing," said Muddy.

"On acoustic you could mess up a lot of stuff and no one would know that you ever missed." (Gordon, p. 79).

These lessons in determination, persistence and risk-taking just skim the surface of the potential of Muddy Waters as a management guru.

In future classes, we'll look at how Muddy the bandleader helped launch the careers of many bluesmen, from Jimmy Rogers to Pinetop Perkins and James Cotton.

Muddy knew blues talent when he saw it.

Or, more importantly, when he felt it.

For Muddy, the blues was a feeling, and this feeling helped propel him, and his protégées, to the top of the blues charts for more than four decades of the 20th century.

Few bluesmen have had the power and passion of Muddy Waters, and I'd like to recall the words inscribed on a plaque honoring his memory that's nestled in the cotton fields where he lived and worked near

Stovall, Mississippi that I discovered on my first pilgrimage to the Mississippi Delta over 35 years ago (when Roger Stolle had just opened the must-visit Cat Head store in downtown Clarksdale).

"With legends like The Rolling Stones (whose name came from a Muddy song), The Beatles, Chuck Berry, Bob Dylan, and Jimi Hendrix acknowledging his influence, his position as a godfather of rock is secure. As his friend and protégé Eric Clapton said, 'Muddy Waters' music changed my life, and whether you know it or not, and like it or not, it probably changed yours, too."

Right on, Mr. Clapton!

For me, each trip back to the Mississippi Delta, Memphis and Clarksdale has been unforgettable. The food, the people and the music of the Delta all combine for an exceptional blues experience and I always encourage blues fans to make that trip.

Some of my fondest memories in the Delta include shopping for CDs and t-shirts at Cat Head, bunking at the Hopson Plantation, and just hanging out at juke joints like Red's and the Ground Zero Blues Club. I look forward to retracing my steps there.

I'm going to bring this class to a close with just one homework assignment.

Listen to the blues, particularly the blues of the King Bee himself. Whether you choose his later GRAMMY-winning work produced by Johnny Winter on the Blue Sky label, Muddy's salad days on Chess, or Muddy's early plantation recordings captured by Alan Lomax and John Work, you'll discover a true giant of American music.

From the Delta to the Swamp, Hill Country to Gospel, Roots Blues to Retro Rock

Earning its tag #bestlittlefest, the awardwinning Winthrop Rhythm & Blues Festival consistently presents beloved, classic Blues superheroes alongside the hottest new and emerging artists, all in a gorgeously intimate setting in the foothills of the Cascade Mountains. Maintaining their grassroots tradition (by hosting and honoring Blues legends) while simultaneously leading the way with fresh talent (on the verge of breaking out worldwide) is the creative signature of this venerable musical community celebration. Winthrop's 38th annual Festival, July 18-20, continues this extraordinary trajectory with a rich, varied and brilliantly curated 2025 lineup that promises to connect you deeply with the past while joyfully propelling you into the future.

SAMANTHA FISH

One of the most formidable guitarists of her generation, Samantha Fish deals in her own unmatched brand of bravado, bringing both mind-blowing power and extraordinary emotional grit to everything she creates. And she's busy bringing that power to the people, earning a 2024 Grammy nomination for Death Wish Blues (her 2023 collaboration with rocker Jesse Dayton), opening for The Rolling Stones on their final 2024 U.S. tour date, kicking off the first leg of Slash's S.E.R.P.E.N.T. Tour, and featuring on the 2025 Hendrix Experience tour. Plus, she'll release her latest album, Paper Doll, - inspired by her Delta blues heroes like Junior Kimbrough and R.L. Burnside — on April 25, 2025. Fish promises her fans: "I'm always thinking about how to add to our arsenal of songs and put together an amazing show for when we're back out on the road."

ROBERT RANDOLPH

A pedal steel guitar virtuoso, Randolph burst onto the music scene in the early 2000s with his fiery, passionate instrumental work and heartfelt music, and has been on the rise ever since. Randolph's innovative

approach to the pedal steel has earned him four Grammy nominations, multiple Blues Music Awards, a BMI award, and Rolling Stone named him one of the "100 Greatest Guitarists of All Time." His work can be heard on numerous TV and film broadcasts, including his long-standing theme song for the New York Knicks, "Get There," and the current theme song for NFL Thursday Night Football, "Ain't Nothing Wrong With That."

TAB BENOIT

A Grammy nominated singer, songwriter and guitarist, Tab Benoit has built a remarkable 30+ year career on the foundation of his gritty, soulful Delta swamp blues. He's also collected impressive accolades, including 5 Blues Music Awards, twice BB King Entertainer of the Year, and induction into The Louisiana Music Hall of Fame. Benoit's accomplishments as a musician are matched only by his devotion to the environmental health of his native Louisiana wetlands. He's the founder and driving force behind Voice of the Wetlands, an organization working to preserve the coastal waters of his home state, and he starred in the iMax motion picture Hurricane on the Bayou, a documentary of Hurricane Katrina's effects and a call to protect and restore the wetlands.

SUGARAY RAYFORD

Sugaray Rayford is a man with a message and the larger-than-life personality and voice to deliver it. A soul-blues powerhouse, Rayford has crafted an incendiary sound and narrative, combining classic soul melodies and funky R&B grooves with raw blues power. His album Somebody Save Me earned a 2020 Grammy nomination, and later that year he took home Blues Music Awards for "Soul Blues Male Artist" and "B.B. King Entertainer of the Year." Rayford's follow up, In Too Deep, won numerous prizes including the Blues Music Award for "Soul Blues Album of the Year." The title track of Rayford's latest release, Human Decency (2024), reminds us that our similarities are stronger than our differences and, in the end, there is no black or white or left or right, there are only hearts and minds.

DIGGIN DIRT

Seven-piece funk-soul band Diggin Dirt is a party, with an infectious sound fueled by blazing horns, searing guitars and a relentlessly driving rhythm section. The band layers psychedelic rock, Motown soul, afrobeat and even reggae atop a thick foundation of late-60s inspired funk. Tying it all together is frontman Zach Alder, launching the ensemble into rarefied air with his pipes, charisma and natural-born soul.

CJ CHENIER & THE RED HOT LOUISI-ANA BAND

Clayton Joseph Chenier is Creole music royalty. His father, the legendary Clifton Chenier, invented the style of music we know today as Zydeco and was the first Creole musician to be recognized with a Grammy Award. Raised in this indigenous American culture with its own distinctive language, cuisine and music, C.J. delivers soulful vocals along with jaw-dropping, masterful accordion-driven Rock, Zydeco and Blues.

THE HEAVY HEAVY

Formed in 2019, UK band The Heavy Heavy is so unique and powerful they were headlining shows in New York and Chicago before ever recording a full-length album. Delivering a soulful breed of rock & roll, retro grooves and intricate harmonies, they've won a devoted legion of fans who've pushed them into the top five on radio charts, and their five-piece live band has taken the stage at leading festivals like Bonnaroo, Boston Calling, and Newport Folk Festival, in addition to performing on Jimmy Kimmel Live!, The Late Show With Stephen Colbert, and CBS Saturday Morning. Paste Magazine states: "Turner and Fuller's voices melted into each other like some combed-out, tightened-up, modern-day rendering of Lindsey Buckingham and Stevie Nicks."

LUKE WINSLOW KING & ROBERTO LUTI

Luke Winslow-King is known for his soulful, burgundy voice, unique slide guitar work, and honest songs. He's released eight solo albums and shared the stage with Jack White, Taj Mahal, Roseann Cash, Marty Stewart, and Billy Strings. Winslow-King spent over

15 years in New Orleans and was named "Best Blues Artist" by Gambit Magazine after releasing his 2008 album Old/New Baby, recorded at Preservation Hall.

Tuscan guitar maestro Roberto Luti, with his unorthodox, angular and evocative slide guitar style, made a name for himself during his nearly decade-long residency in New Orleans. He became an integral part of the international recording project Playing For Change, laying original tracks for songs with a variety of major musical stars that have amassed over 100 million views on YouTube.

ANGELIQUE FRANCIS

JUNO Award winning artist Angelique Francis has established herself as a bona fide star on the Canadian Blues, Soul, Jazz and Folk scene with soulful, smoky vocals and instrumental techniques reminiscent of a bygone era, but with a unique and modern sensibility. Francis brings her signature powerhouse voice, commanding bass/guitar hooks and infectious, blues-infused melodies to an eclectic mix of musical genres. From a Sound Check Entertainment review:

LACHY DOLEY

Best known for his incredible skills on the Whammy Clavinet and the Hammond Organ, Doley is often compared to legends like Jon Lord and Keith Emerson and has been coined "The Jimi Hendrix of the Keyboard."

BEN RICE & THE PDX HUSTLE Ben Rice can seem quiet and unassuming...until he picks up a guitar, that is, earning him the nickname "blues ninja." With a traditional blues foundation and a guitar style variously described as "fearless," "inventive," and "powerful," Rice's intensity and skill never fails to turn heads.

Chicago weather drives Washington blues native back to the Northwest

People always ask me where I go in the winter to escape the Chicago cold.

"I'm heading to the West Coast and the Emerald city," I tell them.

It's a miracle that I'm finally back playing at the Seven Cedars Casino in Sequim after a long hiatus. This was the base gig for my trip, and I added the Rattlesnake Brewery in the Tri Cities, Eagle Harbor Winery on Bainbridge Island, Icicle Brewery in Leavenworth, and the Owl and Thistle in downtown Seattle for my finale with the legendary Ed Maloney hosting the show.

I escaped a brutal Midwestern snowstorm just in time on February 12th and arrived to a cold, but clear, beautiful sky in Seattle in the afternoon. I picked up my gear at Agility Audio in Fife, and it was on to my friends' Dave and Hali in Fremont for the night.

The next morning, it was on to the Tri Cities in the morning. Everything was fine until a snow and ice storm hit Yakima. I was lucky I made over the hills on Route 82 and made it to my gig at the Rattlesnake Brewery.

It was worse leaving the next morning and the mountain pass just about finished me off.

The show at the Seven Cedars Casino on Valentine's Day show was packed, and Kirk Anderson, the newest go-getter for the Washington Blues Society, showed up and we hit it off famously.

Kirk is a former road manager for some of the Allman Brothers' sons and Warren Haynes. He is good company to be associated with for sure. The rooms at the Seven Cedars are magical, to say the least, and the Native art work is world class.

On unday, I headed over to play at the Eagle Ridge Winery on Bainbridge Island. Rob and Emily are your hosts there and they love the blues and the Dead. Eagle Ridge wine is world class, and the Salish Seafood Company catered the event.

Well, after enjoying "island time" on Bainbridge again, it was back to Fremont. After conferring with Dave and Hali, we decided, instead of risking my life going to Leavenworth back across the mountain pass, that I should head out to the Olympic Peninsula and Cape Flattery. While I've seen most of Washington State, I'd never been out to the Pacific Coast.

It was truly an awesome experience for me to visit the Makah Musuem on the reservation and enjoying fresh halibut from Bigginz Seafood in Neah Bay. When you go, tell Kindrick the owner Keith says "Hey!"

My final show at Seattle's Owl and the Thistle rounded out a great week.

Ed Maloney, from the Highway 99 Blues Club, promotes the music there. He is a real deal music promoter and we have a most interesting dialogue together that is not for the faint hearted.

CD Reviews

New music from Dudley Taft & the 2020 International Blues Challenge Solo Duo Blue Moon Marquee!



Dudley Taft The Speed Of Life (Self-Released)

Few people and the world are more dedicated to the art of electric guitar than Cincinnatibased singer-songwriter and certified guitar gunslinger Dudley Taft. The Blues Rocker returns for his 10th album, The Speed Of Life, set for a spring 2025 release, with a dozen new tracks recorded in the Czech Republic with his European touring rhythm section. Additional recording and mixing was done at his own Muchmore Studios in the Cincinnati home he acquired from guitar legend Peter Frampton. The collection of all new original material takes the listener on a journey across a musical dreamscape that flows from thundering mountain tops down to serene valleys, while he mixes a cosmic array of guitar tones that only a master craftsman could yield. Taft plays at being the gangster of love on the slinky opening track "Wanted Man," and the rumbling road song, "Miles And Miles To Go," is fueled by thundering tom toms and chiming guitars that accompany words that give insight to Taft's motivations. The seductive "Set Me on Fire" is a clever mixture of Chili Peppers funk and Texas blues that is sure to light up any dance floor. Taft makes his affections well known on the straight ahead blues bump, "Pretty Little Thing," confirming the

thanks and accolades he gives to his wife and daughter in the liner notes. The salutations continue on "Topaz Blue," an epic blues rock ballad/love song with progressive, psychedelic, and orchestral flourishes. The closer, "No Time Left," asks some heady questions and makes several poignant observations on the status of the world over another thundering drum groove and more fiery guitar work, thus putting the final touches on a very convincing thinking man's blues rock record. Blue Moon Marquee New Orleans Sessions (Self-Released)

Blue Moon Marquee's newest CD, New Orleans Sessions (Blue Moon Marquee Music) takes the award-winning British Columbia duo down to the Crescent City to record in Big Jon Atkinson's 100% old school, analog Big Tone Studio with some of the city's finest musicians. Joining vocalist and guitarist A.W. Cardinal and vocalist and upright bassist Jasmine "Badlands" Colette are Danny Abrams on baritone sax, BC Coogan on upright piano, producer (and Centrum blues faculty member) Big Jon Atkinson on harmonica, and Nicholas Solnick and Brett Gallow on drums. Blue Moon Marquee have garnered many well-deserved awards, such as the

prestigious JUNO for the 2024 Blues Album of Year (Scream, Holler & Howl, Stony Plain), and New Orleans Sessions is up for the same honor this year. A.W. and Jasmine were nominated as an Emerging Artist of the Year by The Blues Foundation, won four Maple Blues Awards (a first for an indigenous Canadian artist), were nominated for the 2024 JUNO Contemporary Indigenous Artist of the Year (as Cardinal is of Cree/Metis heritage). In 2023, they won two Summer Solstice Indigenous Music Awards for Live Performance of the Year and Roots Album of the Year. The CD is one of the most listenable and adventurous blues CDs that I've heard in a long time, particularly on covers like "Let's Get Drunk Again," "Black Rat Swing," and a new interpretation of "Saint James' Infirmary." Two originals stand out: "Red Dust Rising" and "Trickster Coyote," and if you like Arhoolie/Little Village artists HowellDevine or the Washington Blues Society's "BB Award" winner John "Greyhound" Maxwell, Blue Moon Marquee's New Orleans Sessions will definitely reach you.
