Hello Blues Fans-

I have had a good month. After 11 years of graduate school, five of which were spent working on a master's and six of which were spent working on a PhD, I have submitted my dissertation. On June 5, I will defend it. Then I will make any revisions the committee wants and get those turned in by June 13. Then I am Dr. P!

Those who are not close followers of the Letter From the Editor may not know that this is relevant to the doings of the Bluesletter, but it will result in some changes that have been a long time coming.

Former WBS president Tony Frederickson prevailed upon me to take the role of editor over two years ago. It wasn't the first time he'd mentioned it, and I'd always been interested. I have a journalism degree and a decade of experience as a newspaper editor. It sounded like a good use of my skills, and I had some ideas I wanted to try out.

But I knew better than to take on anything while involved in the grueling grind of a PhD. I tried to pass, but Tony was persistent. Eric Steiner had been running the Bluesletter for over 20 years, and he was clean worn out. I knew there were only the slimmest of chances I could make it work, but I agreed to a meeting with Eric.

Part of that was because I didn't know how to use the publishing software InDesign, a powerful Adobe product that is an industry standard in publishing. But Eric showed me the basics, and Sean Donovan, who now does our amazing covers, taught me more. YouTube did the rest. As I have learned, I've taken over more and more of the actual layout and design of the issues. A couple of months ago, I did my first one unaided while Eric was on a cruise.

Now, I can finally relieve Eric of the bulk of the responsibility of getting this publication out each month. I'm going to try out some of my ideas, and I'm eager to hear yours, too. Eric likes doing layout, and he says he'll stick around to help with that, just for fun. I'm glad of it.

I will make a small confession at this point. I went to grad school so I could tour. When I quit working as a backup bass player for touring bands and started my trio, I wanted a way to keep touring without living out of a car in this expensive region. Grad school let me earn a journalism instructor, and it gave me my summers off. It's worked well. And don't get me wrong, I loved grad school. A decade living



the life of the mind was a gigantic, massive privilege.

Now I need to find a job. I will bust my tail until I find either a remote job or a teaching job on the West Coast, ideally in the Pacific Northwest. I'm worried I might wind up out of state, which would throw the editorship back into chaos, but we all knew that was a risk when I came on board. I didn't come all this way just to surrender to a merciless day gig that means my touring life is over, though. Nor do I want to live anywhere else. These are dark days for those looking for work at major universities, but I don't care, I'll work at any community college that will have me. Cross your fingers for me!

Because music, as always, comes first. Thank you all for your patience while I finished this incredibly long project.

Bobby Patterson: From Spokane & Beyond Welcome Bobby Patterson back to the Bluesletter with a new CD!

The following is a brief email exchange between me and Bobby Patterson, Spokane's long-time, award-winning bluesman. Special thanks to drummer Ken Danielson for connecting us virtually during the production of the June issue!

ES: "I really enjoyed your set at last year's Washington Blues Society International Blues Challenge finals in Conway last summer. You brought a whole new band from the trio that played at the 2022 International Blues Challenge in Memphis. Would you please introduce your bandmates to our readers?"

BP: "The current lineup on the new album is myself on guitar and lead vocal; Ken Danielson drums and vocals; Tom Brewster bass and vocals; David Goering on keys; and Charles Swanson sax percussion and vocals."

BP: "I listened to the new record, Bobby Patterson 5, and recommend it highly in this issue. You've really upped your production values on this CD. I've enjoyed many of your earlier CDs ever since I first saw you play "Illustrated Man" at the Mt. Baker Rhythm and Blues Festival or aboard the blues barge at the Coeur d'Alene Blues Festival many years ago How is the new CD different from prior Bobby Patterson Band or CDs from The Fat Tones?"

BP: "The previous albums were mostly three piece with big guitar and big vocals, now it's truly a five piece show band with BIG **EVERYTHING!**"

ES: "Yes, and it really shows through on the new CD. The pandemic and the economy have hit live music with an unprecedented "one-two punch." Many musicians have stopped playing, and some of my favorite live music venues live on only in my memory or on the Internet. The region's blues festivals have also significantly changed. How have you adapted to this unpredictable, new reality as a blues artist?"

BP: "It's been really, really hard to watch the regional blues festivals go away, seemingly one right after another. My best example is Mt Baker Rhythm & Blues Festival. I played there 15 years in a row! This summer, we will be doing Big Sky Blues Festival over in Noxon, Montana on August 2nd at 8 PM,

Pigout in the Park in Spokane on August 29th at 8:30 PM and the Panhandle Blues Festival in Priest River, Idaho on September 6th at 8pm

ES: "I understand that you're essentially a snowbird in Yuma, Arizona for a couple of months early in the year. I'm planning a trip to the Southwest next winter and learned that you play places like the High Tanks Brewing Company and other venues. What attracts you to Yuma? I'd appreciate tips on where to see live music there."

BP: "Long story about how I ended up in Yuma. I wrote a song about it, "Blue Trailer Blues."I've been bringing original and classic blues and rock and roll to the desert for several years now and having officially turned 65, I'm fitting right in! I'm a regular at popular Arizona venues like High Tanks Brewing in Wellton and Wheezy's Bar & Grill in Fortuna Foothills. I took the band to the Desert Bar in Parker, Arizona and the Fountain of Youth in Niland, California, the Yuma Blues Festival, and put on shows in Quartzite, Arizona and the Way Point Saloon in Ramona, California. Fun in the sun!"

CD Spotight: Bobby Patterson 5Welcome Bobby Patterson back to the Bluesletter with a new CD!

The Bobby Patterson Band's new CD, Bobby Patterson Band 5 (or BPB5), features 15 originals recorded by Jimmy Hill at his award-winning Amplified Wax Studios in Spokane. The CD opens with the big band sound of "Don't Think Twice" followed by the upbeat "A Lot to Learn," deftly punctuated by Charles Swanson's horn. The jazz-inflected "Landlord" floats on Dave Goering's keyboards, and the contemplative, slow blues of "Ain't Nothing Left" takes full advantage of Bobby's textbook "stadium

style" solos that were the highlight of many Mt. Baker festivals. The engine room of Ken Danielson on drums and Tom Brewster on bass play as if they are telepathic. There's a lot to like on BPB5: My favorites are the instrumental "Matter of Time" and the story of Bobby's winter home, "Blue Trailer Blues." I keep coming back to "Blue Trailer Blues" and "Ain't Nothing Left" for Bobby's solos as they float away and return. BPB5 is a departure from Bobby's other bands (The Fat Tones or Bobby & The Two Tones, which represented the Washington Blues Society at the 2022 International Blues Challenge in Memphis after 2-year COVID break). While I've enjoyed each of Bobby Patterson's other acts, I like the full sound of this five-piece band and recommend BPB5. Eric Steiner

Juneteenth Celebrations Return to Washington

See our guide to events with music around the state

As Juneteenth approaches, communities across Washington are preparing for a vibrant week of events highlighting African American history, culture, and music. Juneteenth, a federal holiday established on June 17, 2021, celebrates the end of slavery in the United States. More specifically, it celebrates the announcement of freedom to enslaved people in Texas on June 19, 1865.

Here are several of the state's planned Juneteenth celebrations that incorporate blues music, R&B, and/or other African American genres to honor the musical legacy forged in struggle and resilience. These events were compiled at press time, May 10, when many festivals are still finalizing details.

Tacoma: In Tacoma, the largest Juneteenth festival in Washington, Juneteenth: A Road to Economic Freedom, will return to Stewart Heights Park from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. Thursday, June 19. The event, organized by WayOut Kids, drew more than 8,000 attendees in 2023, according to Parks Tacoma, and features musical performances, youth activities, and the Miss Juneteenth Pageant. This year's artists will include Grammywinning gospel artist Fred Hammond, R&B band Soul for Real, and gospel singer Crystal Aikin.

Seattle: The Songs of Black Folk: Music of Resistance & Hope will be hosted at McCaw Hall of the Seattle Center at 7 p.m. Sunday, June 22. The performances showcase the triumph of enslaved African Americans and the music born from the struggles they endured. The music invites audience members to experience Black culture through spiritual blues, gospel, jazz, R&B, and hip-hop genres. You can visit the Songs of Black Folk website for more information, including the list of performers and ticket prices.

Rainier Beach: The 24th annual Atlantic Street Center Juneteenth Celebration will take place from 5 to 8 p.m. Wednesday, June 18, at Rainier Beach Community Center. The event celebrates African American culture with performances, free food, cultural showcases, and much more.

Seattle: The Africatown Juneteenth Celebration, part of the Summer of Soul series, will be held from 12 to 8 p.m. Thursday, June 19, at Jimi Hendrix Park in Seattle's Central District. Organizers describe the event as a celebration of Black resilience, community, and history.

Seattle: On Saturday, June 21, the ninth annual "It Takes a Village" festival, hosted by the African American Leadership Forum of Seattle, will occur from 1 to 6 p.m. at Othello Park. The free event includes live music, local food vendors, and activities for family and friends.

Vancouver: Juneteenth in Vancouver is a music-forward celebration. This year, the city's artists include Wamba, playing the music of Ghana as well as traditional music from Africa and the world such as Afrobeat, Afrojazz, Latin, Funk, Calypso, Salsa, Afro-Cuban, Reggae, Soca, Samba, funk, soul, highlife, juju, mbalax and more. Also on the lineup is Jujuba, a "funky, danceable stuly of Nigerian Afrobeat and Juju music." This 10-piece act includes the Nigerian drummer Nojeem Lasisi, on the world's most respected players of the talking drum.

Tri-Cities: Vibe Bingo, anyone? The Tri-Cities is holding one of the more creative events of the year. Although it does not include live music, it looks like a lot of fun. The Tri-Cities Diversity and Inclusion Council will hold a lively 21 and over bingo session Saturday, June 28, at the Holiday Inn Express & Suites in Pasco from 7-10 p.m. The way it works, according to the Vibe Bingo website, is that songs replace the traditional bingo letters and numbers. Contestants mark songs off their bingo cards as each is played. The organizers say to expect old school and new school R&B and Hip Hop. Tickets are \$25 in advance, \$30 at the door, include a bingo card and marker, and the funds go to support scholarships.
















Honoring Koko Taylor: The Queen of the Blues

"Everyone was really impressed, including all of Koko's family and friends. So well done."

Last month, Editor Emeritus Eric Steiner asked me for a remembrance of Koko Taylor's last public performance at the 30th Blues Music Awards on May 7th, 2009, before her passing on June 3rd, and how a Washington Blues Society member wrote a eulogy read at her funeral. It was pretty hard work to resurrect this article accurately from memory and archived emails, but I think it's fitting to honor Koko Taylor's memory this month 16 years after she left us. (www. kokotaylor.com)

No one said the blues was easy.

In 2008, after more than a year in very dangerous parts of Afghanistan for Operation Enduring Freedom, I received a new assignment to Bagram Air Field from the US Army Corps of Engineers. Bagram was the home of the Armed Forces Network radio station that broadcast to the troops in the field.

I visited the station and asked why they didn't play any blues over the air. Station staff asked me if I was interested in developing, producing, and hosting an "All Blues" radio show on Freedom Radio, and in 2008, I did. I named it the "Blues Power Hour," and it became a weekly, one-hour blues radio program.

Unbeknownst to me, the "Blues Power Hour" attracted the attention of the Blues Foundation, first-call blues musicians, and legendary blues music producers. At Bagram, I worked long 12-hour night shifts seven days a week, but still found the time to devote to the blues.

I played songs by Koko Taylor, Howlin' Wolf, Muddy Waters, B. B. King, Shemekia Copeland, Janiva Magness, Steve Miller, Curtis Salgado, Joe Bonamassa, the Stones and standards from major and minor blues labels. The show's intro riff was from "Blues Power," written by Eric Clapton and Leon Russell. It was fun, but also very hard work to produce a radio show, and have it authorized, script by script, by US Air Force

censors.

In 2009, Eric asked me to attend the Blues Music Awards in Memphis. I enlisted station manager, TSgt Deidre Hines, in charge of my show while on leave. I then put together commemorative flags and certificates to be flown for special blues music supporters to distribute. It was just a small thing that I could do for the blues with the support of the 455th Air Expeditionary Wing Command (not knowing the effect it would have later). I bought flags at the PX, filled forms to identify each recipient, and then drove them to Wing Command.

Upon arrival at the Memphis airport before the Blues Music Awards, several music producers met me and drove me to my hotel. After our meet and greet, we headed south to see the sights as I had a flag to deliver to the Ground Zero blues club in Clarksdale. It was my first trip to the Delta down Highway 49, via Oxford, with a stop at the Tallahatchie Bridge that Bobby Gentry made famous in "Ode to Billy Joe." At Ground Zero, I presented a flag and certificate to the late coowner Bill Luckett with Watermelon Slim's band on stage. It hit a chord with not only my hosts, but others as well. (https://www.groundzerobluesclub.com/)

I was floored by the reactions I received via email. Staggered.

"I wanted to write a quick message of support," wrote NorthernBlues Records' founder Fred Litwin. "It was terrific meeting you in Memphis, and it was inspiring to see you present an American flag to the Blues Foundation and to the Ground Zero Blues Club in Clarksdale. You moved everybody with your words and actions. Bringing the blues to the troops through your radio show is important work. The blues can be incredibly uplifting, and I am sure the troops appreciate hearing something so American and so emotional."

"I'd like to formally thank you on behalf of blues fans everywhere for all your efforts to promote the blues on your "Blues Power

Hour," wrote John Hahn (songwriter and manager of Shemekia Copeland). "You and Armed Forces Network Afghanistan are not only bringing that dream to life but are introducing our brave young men and women to a true American art form (blues music) which they can all be proud of. I just wanted to express to you how exciting it is for us to know that you are bringing the blues to our troops in Afghanistan with your radio show." (www.shemekiacopeland. com).

"Blues is the quintessential American music," emailed Alligator Records' founder Bruce Iglauer. "It is born from suffering, but the message of blues is a triumph over adversity. It's about dealing with pain and reality, and about having the confidence in yourself to speak out about your fears and thereby make them manageable. That's called empowerment. What could be more appropriate for our troops, operating under severe conditions, than this music of power and hope?"

I was extremely humbled by these sentiments from the people who bring us the blues. I vowed to fly more flags for blues people I had just met in Memphis when I returned to Afghanistan.

At the awards, I was treated to a front row center seat at the feet of Grammy Award winning "Queen of the Blues", Koko Taylor. After being honored as the Traditional Blues Female Artist of the Year, she did a smoking recital of her famous "Wang Dang Doodle" and brought the house down. At the time, we didn't know it would be her final, public performance. It was a fabulous 30th BMA and an exciting list of performers.

I returned back to my work in Afghanistan.

And then it happened.

On June 3rd, Bruce Iglauer sent me this message: "Koko Taylor, RIP." I announced it on my show dedicated to her.

I was shocked because her flag was in the air at that time.

After work, I headed to the 455th and asked if they could send the flag and certificate ASAP to Bruce in Chicago. We were a day ahead of Chicago time and they got right on it! I knew her funeral was imminent, so I started up a

quick conversation with Bruce to send him a remembrance and the flag.

I then went to work on my script.

Finishing up, I emailed it to Bruce and picture of a rose in bloom on base in the form of a sympathy card.

"I think I have something short and sweet enough that tells the story of her significance even if the flag does not arrive on time," I emailed Bruce on June 7th. "It is generically suitable enough that speaks to her family and the family of the blues for private or public announcement. I hope it speaks of what Koko meant to many in life. Good luck my friend and thank you for passing this on and being there for her family."

"Bruce, flag has been mailed APO and now on a flight to Germany then New York direct to Chicago," I wrote Bruce on June 8th. "It is priority and will take 5-7 days."

"The flag didn't get here," replied Bruce on June 12th en route to the funeral. "I'm arranging for someone to read the script anyway, with a slight explanation."

Here is the eulogy I sent to Bruce for Koko's family (not knowing it would be read at the funeral).

"To the Family of Koko Taylor and the Family of the Blues.

On June 3rd 2009, an American flag was flown with distinction on a special mission over Afghanistan. On or about the time of her passing, it was flown in honor of the life of the Queen of Chicago Blues, Koko Taylor.

Over the airwaves in Afghanistan, her music has fallen on the ears of many persons from many countries. This flag represents all of the people here and from all over the world that this American blues icon has touched with her life and love of music. As a great American, Koko has enhanced our country's heritage and has helped countless others enrich their lives.

From her gospel roots in Memphis, Tennessee, to her throne as the Queen of Chicago Blues, Koko's heart traveled a path of love through music. With gratitude to Willie Dixon for discovering her, insisting that she record and Bruce Iglauer for taking her music to the top, Koko shared her gift with a growing audience. Overcoming life's trials, she rose to the pinnacle of her profession. Her last, spirited performance in Memphis was a crowning glory to a life that began so humbly nearby. It gave witness to all in attendance that this woman was, is and shall ever be the Queen of Chicago Blues.

May her contributions to America's music live forever in her spirit."

"Just walked in the door from trip to Chicago and Koko's funeral," wrote John Hahn. "Your script was read by a woman on the altar to universal applause and approval. Everyone was really impressed including all Koko's family and friends. So well done. Shemekia performed a gospel song at the services."

Needless to say, I was honored and grateful at the same time.

The triangular-folded flag arrived just after the funeral. Bruce then gave it to Koko's family, and I appreciated that they accepted this gift in such a solemn moment.

"I heard from the woman who works at the flag certificate shop on base here, Danielle," I wrote to Bruce, thanking him for his help. "She told me that you wrote her and let her know my flag arrived. I'm glad you finally got it. Thanks for helping her out with some kind words, too. Hope Koko's family enjoys my gift and I appreciate you delivering it to them."

I will never forget Koko Taylor's final performance in Memphis, nor any of the great people I have met on my blues journey.

No one said the blues was easy.



The Blues Hall of Fame: Class of 2025

Congratulations to performers, Individuals (Business, Production, Media, & Academic) & Recordings

I've always considered the week around the Blues Music Awards to be one of the most exciting opportunities to experience blues music apart from International Blues Challenge week in Memphis.

This year, the Blues Hall of Fame celebrated its 10th anniversary during the first week of May, and I fondly remember working behind the scenes as a member of the Board of Directors of The Blues Foundation to help make former Executive Director Jay Sieleman's (and many, many others) dreams a brick and mortar reality. The Blues Foundation had a virtual Hall of Fame since 1980, and I was fortunate to play a small part alongside fellow board members in raising money and awareness for a blues destination that has been recognized as a Blue Star Museum by Department of Defense and museums across America, offering free admission to the nation's activeduty military personnel and their families, including National Guard and Reserve.

In addition to Blues Music Award and Blues Hall of Fame signature festivities, this week featured a screening of Robert Mugge's latest film, Deep Roots: The Art and Music of Bill Steber. Bill's photo of Bobby Rush was on the February 2022 cover of this magazine to welcome him back to the Pacific Northwest. The week also included Big Llou's 10th annual Hall of Fame Jam, a Recording Academy Panel Session, and HART Fund Musician Health screenings.

I strongly encourage readers to plan to attend the Blues Music Awards in Memphis. In my opinion, there's no other blues experience like it. I've typed in these pages before: If you work for wages or receive public benefits, set aside \$25 a month, and one day, you'll be on Beale Street. It's the same strategy I used to get me on my first Legendary Rhythm and Blues Cruise last year: It took a while, but I'm glad I did.

Congratulations to this year's Blues Hall of

Fame inductees.

Performers

Bob Stroger, still actively touring at the age of 94, is reaping the rewards for his decades of laying the foundation for countless blues bands. No performer has ever been inducted into the Blues Hall of Fame at an older age. He was also the 2024 recipient of the Blues Music Award for Instrumentalist - Bass, the fifth time he had earned the honor. The night after The Blues Foundation inducted him into the Hall of Fame, Bob Stroger received his sixth Blues Music Award for Instrumentalist - Bass.

William Bell, best known for his pioneering work at Stax Records in Memphis, has kept that honored legacy alive during his long career as soulful singer, songwriter, producer and label owner. Bell's music has also encompassed gospel, doo-wop, jazz, R&B, blues, reggae, funk, disco and collaborations with rappers, and in recent years he has been a perennial contender in the soul blues categories of the Blues Music Awards.

Blind Willie Johnson never recorded the blues, but the Texas guitar evangelist's music has enraptured a multitude of blues fans and musicians for nearly a century. His genre has come to be called "holy blues" for its similarities to the blues format, its intensity and the superb slide guitar technique.

Henry Townsend, a key contributor to the St. Louis blues sound of the pre-World War era, enjoyed one of the longest careers in blues history. He recorded in every decade from the 1920s through the 2000s and was preparing to perform at a festival when he died on September 24, 2006, at the age of 96.

Jessie Mae Hemphill cut a unique and colorful figure as queen of the North Mississippi Hill Country blues scene. A three-time winner as traditional female blues artist of the year in the 1987, 1988 and 1994 W.C. Handy Blues Awards (later renamed the Blues Music Awards), Hemphill came from a long line of musicians dating back to her great-grandfather Dock Hemphill and

including her parents and aunts as well as her grandfather, Sid Hemphill, who recorded for Alan Lomax and Lewis Jones in 1942.

Individuals - Business, Production, Media, & Academic

Bob Geddins produced a treasure trove of records that defined the down-home blues and gospel sounds of the San Francisco/ Oakland area in the post-World War II years. While West Coast blues is often associated with smoother, polished urban styles, Geddins' most memorable records often were raw excursions into desolation and gloom—"Tin Pan Alley" by Roy Hawkins being a prime example.

The festival is held at the picturesque Skamania County Fairgrounds, along the banks of the Colombia River, in Stevenson, Washington. This iconic celebration of the blues features two days of music, plus beer, wine, and spirits from regional craft breweries and distilleries. CD Reviews

Blues you can use from Keith Scott, Jesse James & The MOB & Andrew Duncanson!



Keith Scott & the Electric Blues Junkies One Nation Under the Blues (Dreamday Music)

Today's blues monster Keith Scott received his first guitar at 14. At the University of Florida, he saw Muddy Waters. Impressed by Muddy and his band, Keith headed up to Chicago to form his own blues band—and develop his own singing and playing style. Inspired by blues royalty (Junior Wells, Eddie Taylor, BB King, Aretha & Ella), Scott honed his craft and grew his voice with the support of Chicago bluesman Hip Linkchain, who picked him up as backup guitar player in the early 80s. Hip then pushed Keith to the front of the stage as a lead singer. Since then, Keith has performed regularly at Chicago-area clubs, especially the House of Blues. This album features 15 originals that display Scott's impressive range as a front man, from sweet ballads to plaintive confessions, and evocative anthems and driving musical exhortations to make this messy, often dangerous world a better one. Yes, a melancholy response to the disaster that was COVID, but also an eclectic, enthusiastic romp through the wide range of the blues! Scott kicks off his 10th CD with the hard driving "Bring It Back," and his expressive, often plaintive voice and perfect timing typify this and every cut on this album. It's not a wail, nor a whine—just a strong, confident bluesman telling his truths ("Hey, little girl, I like what you're puttin' down ... Hey little baby, you know I got trouble"). Crisp guitar solos in the Chicago blues tradition and tight instrumentation fill out "Bring It Back" with bassman Adam Arling's solid groove and Marvin Jackson's driving drums. The upbeat, harmonica-driven "Muscatine" is a kind of jokey paean to the simple joys of infatuation. "Prettiest little girl I ever did see... Muscatine, down in Alabama doin' her thing, shakin' back down on the scene, down by the river, Muscatine, Muscatine,

shake it all night." Keith's confident, nearly hypnotic voice here is perfect for telling this story, making us want to learn even more about the mysterious Muscatine and her pull on all who might encounter or just imagine her in the here and now! Finally, in "One Nation Under the Blues," Scott confirms my sense that the blues, and Chicago blues in particular, (with its pulsing beat, engaging chord progressions, powerful vocals and just-right instrumental backing), still works wonders. When he reminds listeners that "the times get so hard man, I don't know what to do. Make my decision, do what you choose. Got to try to be one nation under the blues," Keith Scott delivers music's power to comfort us all. As he states in the liner notes, "I feel very fortunate to be able to put out a new selection of material inspired by the COVID pandemic. I call it turning a world downturn into a positive experience." Can't ask for much more than that, can we? Steve Pearse

Northwest upstarts Jesse Jame and the MOB blur all the lines between blues, country, funk and soul on the fun loving new album Checking the Mic released on vinyl this past January. The trio of James on guitar and vocals, Giordan Montero on bass and vocals with drummer Max Figarsky rip through six new original tunes kicking off with the New Orleans influenced title song with it's slinky silliness. James get a touch more serious on "Somehow Somewhere," and its gentle country swing. Jesse then shows off his love for the Telecaster during the frenzied modern blues "Who Was the Iceman." The gritty "Walking the Cup" works the familiar theme of struggling with sobriety that has plagued many a blues man. The quirky "The Pedestrian" shows off James' chicken pickin'

skills and the trio's nimble interaction. The closer, "Dreamt You Were There," is a sentimental love song delivered on a modern hip hop influenced soundscape. This CD is an ambitious offering from one of the talented young guitarslingers of the Pacific Northwest. Rick J. Bowen.



Andrew Duncanson California Trap (Run It Back Records)

If you are a fan of 70's soul, and classic R&B singers like Marvin Gaye, Bill Withers, and Al Green, you owe it to yourself to check out the latest album from Andrew Duncanson. The longtime front man of Illinois' Kilborn Alley Blues Band journeyed to San Jose and collaborated with Kid Anderson and his allstars at Greaseland Studios to record 13 new tracks. Chief among the A-list session players is Michael Peloquin who wrote, arranged the horn charts, and played the sax and harmonica parts. Peloquin also contributed a sublime new, original, "What Kind Of Man." Duncanson's songs are fueled by his gritty baritone and soulful songwriter sensibilities to turn a phrase in new and interesting ways on standout tracks such as "Relearning to Climb," "Town Saint," and the evocative title tune. Of course, with Anderson at the production helm, the sound is going to be big and full of special performances from the players involved. This heady dose of horn driven soul blues needs to make it onto your playlist. Rick J. Bowen.

Welcome Albert Lee, Trombone Shorty, Ana Popovic, James McMurtry & more this month!


Every June, I think of the song "Summertime Blues."

The original was a two-minute rockabilly hit released by Eddie Cochran three days after I was born in 1958, and I first discovered it ten years later listening to top 40, Chicago AM radio from the American band Blue Cheer.

"Summertime Blues" is on the list of Rolling Stones' top 100 rock and roll songs of all time, and this month, I'd like to think that the Washington Blues Society has an antidote for the summertime blues.

We've got festival season beginning in full swing this month, and I ecourage readers to check out Mark Hurwitz' excellent preview of one of America's longest running blues festival, the Gorge Blues & Brews Festival in Skamania, Washington, later this month. In this month's Blues on the Road, I've included what I consider several interesting suggestions for live shows to prevent any case of the "Summertime Blues."

Albert Lee

Help Us Build a Better Bluesletter

Reminders about formatting for current & prospective contributors

During the preparation of this month's issue, Polly and I received too many contributions we couldn't use as the contributor sent material incompatible with our printer's specs (they're on page four of each issue).

The best way to get an article published in the Bluesletter is to submit a story as an attachment in Microsoft Word on or before the deadline of the 5th of the month for the following month's issue.

Images are bit more complicated because our partners in printing, Pacific Publishing, use standard high resolution press formatting for all images. That's CMYK (shorthand for Cyan-Magenta-Yellow-Key Color, or Black). It's not the traditional primary colors of red, blue, and green (RGB images, perfect for social media and other screen-based media). CMYK, as I understand it, taps into a broader color palette than RGB and reflects a traditional four-color printing process.


Images from social media tend to be low resolution, and traditional print media requires that all images be formatted using the CYMK four-color process at high resolutions at 300 dots per inch+.

We receive hundreds of images annually from social media: While they look good online, they're not suitable for traditional, "old-school" print media.

During the production of this issue, Polly and I (plus our editor@wablues.org email address) received too many images incorrectly formatted to our printer's specs.

It's critical that writers send in material as attachments and not embedded in emails on or before the 5th of the month. We cannot use photos "taken on the run" by cell phone without specific titles instead of using phone-supplied numerical identifiers or not formatting in high resolution).
